This makes the pace of "Pinafore" more difficult to maintain. The cast did surprisingly well, however, in the first act,

keeping the pace quite well.

The second act leans heavily upon the principals, with several extended solos which were well handled. Somehow, however, the moments of full stage ensemble here seemed to bog down a bit, but not to the extent that the effect was lost.

The outstanding thing about this performance, as in last sea-son's, was that despite some technical flaws, these young people managed to stage and present a major theatrical work entirely on their own, relying entirely upon their own good sense and judgment, and to achieve a major proportion of success. The over-all style was there. This is no mean accomplishment.
