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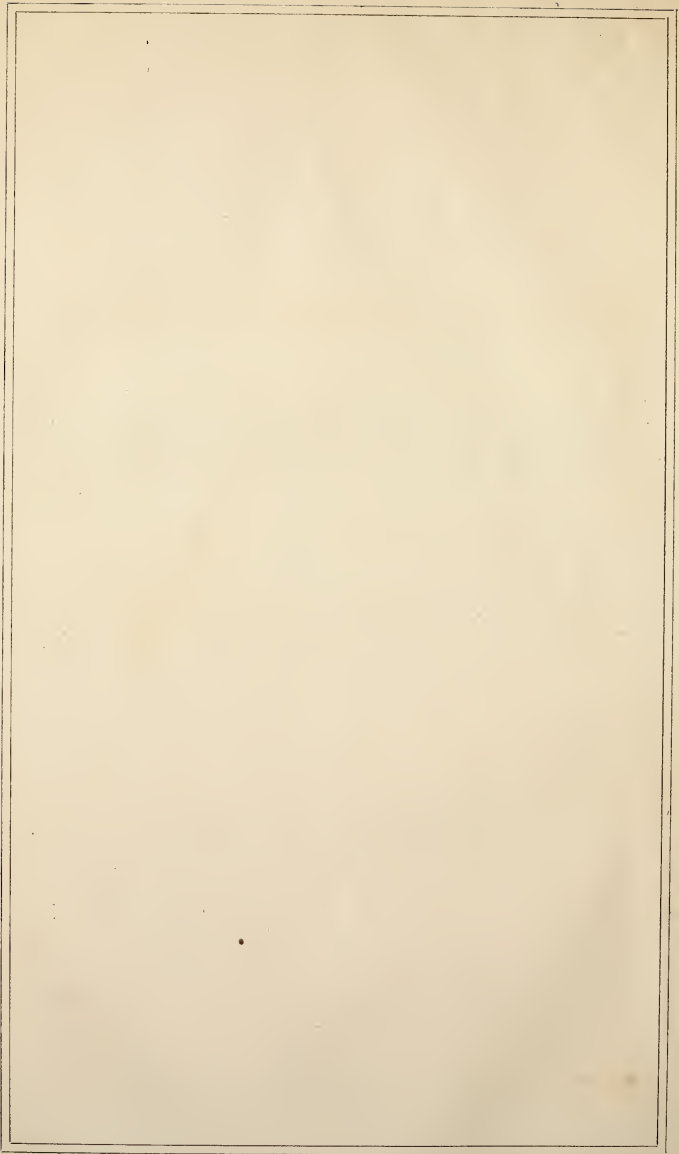

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College of William and Mary.

FOR founding a college in Virginia to educate and train Indians, so early as 1619, fifteen hundred pounds were raised in England, by virtue of letters issued by James I. to the bishops. And during this year it was "moved and obtained" by Sir Edwin Sandys, President of the Company in England, that ten thousand acres of land, intended not only for the Indian College, but also to lay "the foundation of a Seminary of learning for the English," should be laid off for "the University at Henrico." It was also determined that a hundred men should be sent from England as tenants for this land. Out of the rents, which it was supposed would be worth five hundred pounds a year, the buildings were to be erected, and the masters supported. Mr. George Thorpe, a gentleman of His Majesty's Privy Chamber, came over to be superintendent of the College. In 1621, a subscription of one hundred and twenty-five pounds was obtained; and one thousand acres of land, with five servants and an overseer, were allotted by the Company to endow at *Charles City*, a collegiate school termed the "East India School," where scholars were to be prepared for admittance into the College at Henrico. On March 22d, 1622, Mr. Thorpe and three hundred and forty of the colonists, including a number of the tenants of the College, were killed by the Indians. This caused the lands to be abandoned, and the establishment of a college to be delayed until that of William and Mary was chartered, which was in the fourth year of the reign of William and Mary, a date corresponding under the new style, with the 19th of February, A. D. 1693. This charter, sent over with Sir Edmund Andros, was granted upon the petition of the General Assembly of the Colony of Virginia, "to the end that the church of Virginia might be furnished with a Seminary of ministers of the Gospel, and that the

youth might be piously educated in good letters and manners, and that the Christian faith might be propagated amongst the Western Indians, to the glory of Almighty God." The design was to establish a "place of Universal Study, or perpetual College of Divinity, Philosophy, Languages, and other good arts and sciences." The *Trustees*, nominated and elected by the General Assembly, to whom the royal license was granted, were Francis Nicholson, Lieutenant Governor in the Colonies of Virginia and Maryland, William Cole, Ralph Wormley, William Byrd, and John Lear, Esquires; James Blair, John Farnifold, Stephen Fouace, and Samuel Gray, Clerks; Thomas Milner, Christopher Robinson, Charles Scarborough, John Smith, Benjamin Harrison, Miles Cary, Henry Hartwell, William Randolph, and Mathew Page, Gentlemen. "The Assembly was so fond of Governor Nicholson at that time, that they presented him with the sum of three hundred pounds as a testimony of their good disposition towards him. But he having an instruction to receive no present from the country, they drew up an address to their Majesties, praying that he might have leave to accept it, which was granted, and he gave one half thereof to the College." The Trustees were constituted the body corporate to establish the College, and to appoint Masters or Professors, but were required after the establishment, "to transfer to the President and Masters, or Professors, or their successors, the lands, manors, tenements, rents, services, rectories, portions, annuities, pensions, and advowsons of churches, with all other inheritances, franchises, possessions, goods, chattels, and personal estate." And in the fifth section of the Charter we find the following: "*It shall be called and denominated for ever, the College of William and Mary in Virginia, and the President and Masters or Professors of the said College, shall be a body politic in deed and in name.*" It was further provided that after the transfer of the corporate powers, the Trustees should be "the true, sole, and undoubted *Visitors and Governors of the College.*" "And we give and grant to them, or the major part of them, by these our Letters Patent, a continual succession, as also full and absolute liberty, power, and authority of making and enacting, framing and establishing such and so many rules, laws, statutes, orders, and injunctions for the good and wholesome government of said College, as to them and their successors shall from time to time, according to their various occasions and circumstances, seem most fit and expedient."

The Charter confirms to the President and Masters or Professors, that there shall be a Chancellor of the College; appoints "the reverend father in God, Henry, by divine permission, Bishop of London," first

Chancellor, and requires that the Visitors and Governors of the College, shall elect a discreet person to this office every seven years.

Towards the endowment of the College, William III. and Mary contributed one thousand nine hundred and eighty-five pounds fourteen shillings and tenpence, raised out of the quit-rents of the colony, and at that time in the hands of William Byrd, Auditor; one penny a pound on all tobacco exported from Virginia and Maryland; the office of Surveyor General with all its issues, fees, profits, advantages, conveniences, liberties, places, privileges, and pre-eminences whatsoever; ten thousand acres of land lying on the south side of Blackwater Swamp, and ten thousand acres lying in that neck of land, commonly called Pamunky neck, between the forks of York River.

The Faculty had the right to elect either one of their own body, one of the Visitors of the College, or "one of the better sort of inhabitants of the Colony," to represent the College in the House of Burgesses.

The first College-building, designed to be a square when completed, was unfinished in 1700. The House of Burgesses, however, met in it until 1705, when, together with library and philosophical apparatus, it was destroyed by fire. "The fire broke out about ten o'clock at night in a public time. The Governor and all the gentlemen that were in town came up to the lamentable spectacle, many getting out of their beds. But the fire had got such power before it was discovered, and was so fierce, that there was no hope of putting a stop to it, and therefore no attempts were made to that end." The second building was commenced in the time of Governor Spottswood; but owing to the want of available means, and the scarcity of workmen, it was not finished until 1723.

Now that the College was fully established, the transfer of the corporate rights was shortly made to the Faculty, and the Trustees became "The Visitors and Governors of the College of William and Mary in Virginia." The deed of transfer was drawn by John Randolph; and for his trouble, the Faculty voted him a present of fifty guineas. The original instrument is now in the library of the College. It is written upon fourteen beautifully illuminated sheets of parchment. The date of it is the twenty-seventh of February, of the second year of the reign of George the Second, which, under the new style corresponds with the 10th of March, A.D. 1729. The donations conveyed by the charter, are recapitulated in the deed of transfer. These, and those received by the Trustees during the interval between the date of the charter and that of the transfer, were both now conveyed to the Faculty. The latter are as follows: "Sundry well-disposed individuals, together gave about two thousand

pounds for encouraging and furthering so good a work"; the general assembly of the colony, in the fourth year of the reign of Queen Anne, laid duties on "raw hides and tanned hides, and upon all deer skins and furs exported," for the support and maintenance of the College; the college tract of land, with all the buildings, &c., upon it, viz: the present college buildings [This tract of land, containing three hundred and thirty acres, lying in the Parish of Bruton, was bought for one hundred and seventy pounds, of Thomas Ballard, and conveyed to the Trustees on the 20th day of December, 1693],—the donation from the executors of the Hon. Robert Boyle, Esq. [Hon. Robert Boyle, Esq., in his will, dated July 18th, 1691, directed his executors, "after debts and legacies paid," to dispose of the residue of his personal estate "for such charitable and pious uses as they in their discretion should think fit," and made the Right Honorable Richard, Earl of Burlington, Sir Henry Ashurst, Knight and Baronet, and John Marr, Gentleman, his executors. The executors proved the Will, and agreed to lay out five thousand four hundred pounds in land, and to apply the yearly rent thereof "towards propagating the christian religion amongst infidels. They bought of Sir Samuel Gerrard the Manor of Brafferton, in Yorkshire, England, and determined to grant "a rent charge in perpetuity of ninety pounds per annum" to the Company for propagating the Gospel in New England, "on condition that the Company should apply forty-five pounds a year to the salaries of two ministers to instruct the natives in the christian religion," and forty-five pounds a year to the President and Fellows of Harvard College, in Cambridge, New England, to be paid to two other ministers to teach the christian religion to the natives in or near the College. And they determined that the Manor of Brafferton, subject to the ninety pounds a year, should be conveyed to the mayor, commonalty, and citizens of London upon trust that the rents and profits thereof should be laid out for the advancement of the christian religion in Virginia, as the Earl of Burlington and the Bishop of London might direct." But there being delays in the said purchase, sometime in Trinity term, A. D. 1695, Sir Thomas Trevor, Attorney General of His Majesty, Dame Elizabeth Gerrard and Thomas Owen, executors "of Sir Samuel Gerrard," exhibited their bill in the high court of chancery against the executors of the Hon. Robert Boyle, Esq., praying that the defendants might be decreed to pay the purchase money. The Attorney General, in the same court, prayed that the defendants might go on with the purchase, and be decreed "to settle the rents thereof on such pious uses as were agreed upon." Whereupon, and upon the debate of the matters, and hearing what was alleged on either side, the court thought fit,

upon the first day of August, 1695, to decree "that the defendants should proceed on the said purchase," and that the will of the testator should be executed. In pursuance of this decree, the Earl of Burlington, and Henry, Lord Bishop of London, agreed under their hands and seals on the 21st day of December, 1697, to bestow the charity in Virginia, arranging that the annual rents, subject to the ninety pounds given to New England, should be paid to the President and Professors of "the College of William and Mary in Virginia," for the purpose of maintaining and educating Indian scholars. And that the name of the benefactor might not be forgotten, it was directed that the donation should be called "*The Charity of the Hon. Robert Boyle, Esq., of the city of London, deceased.*" On the 9th day of June, 1698, upon the petition of the defendants, the Right Hon. John Lord Somers, Baron of Eversham, Lord High Chancellor of England, ratified their action],—one thousand pounds granted by act of assembly, in the fourth year of the reign of His Majesty, King George the First, "for the maintaining and educating of scholars" at the College of William and Mary in Virginia [In compliance with a provision of this act, one hundred and fifty pounds were paid for two thousand one hundred and nineteen acres of land lying on both sides of "Nottoway River," in the counties of Prince George, Surrey, and Brunswick, and four hundred and seventy-six pounds four shillings, were paid for *seventeen negro slaves* "to be employed in tilling and manuring the said lands." The balance of the money was "placed out at interest." This estate is referred to in the following extracts from the proceedings of the Faculty. January 25th, 1742. Upon complaint of two negroes runaway from "Nottoway," the meeting have desired Mr. Thomas Dawson and John Greeme, and they have agreed to go to visit the Plantation, to enquire into the matters of fact, and to endeavor to put things to rights. Dec. 29th, 1777. Resolved that two negro fellows and a boy be ordered down from "Nottoway" quarter, to supply the place of hirelings in the College. Resolved that Mr. John Carter Bursar, be appointed to manage the sale of the "Nottoway" estate, and that he be allowed one per cent. commission on the amount thereof, and his traveling expenses],—a duty laid on liquors by the House of Burgesses in 1726, to be applied to the current expenses of the College, and for founding scholarships,—and a donation of one hundred and fifty pounds from Col. Edward Hill, of Charles City County, for the same purpose. In 1717, Mrs. Philarity Giles, of Isle of Wight, left in her will, her reversionary interest in from three to four hundred acres of land on the Blackwater, in the same county, to the "Royal College of William and Mary."

The annual value of all the duties laid for the benefit of the College before the Revolution, was about twenty-three hundred pounds.

The Trustees, before the Act of Transfer, as the Charter directs, filled the vacancies in their body caused by death or removal. The Board was then composed of, James Blair, Rector; Hon. William Gooch, Esq., Lieutenant Governor of the Colony; Robert Carter, of Lancaster; William Byrd, of Charles City; Mann Page, of Gloucester; Cole Diggs, of York; Peter Beverly, of Gloucester; John Robinson of Spotsylvania, John Carter, of Charles City; John Grymes, of Middlesex, and William Randolph, of Henrico, Members of His Majesty's Council in the Colony; Emanuel Jones, of the Parish of Pitsworth, Gloucester; Bartholomew Yates, of the Parish of Christ's Church, Middlesex; John Skaife, of the Parish of Stratton-Major, in King and Queen, clerks; and William Cole, Esq., of the County of Warwick.

The Transfer was signed by James Blair and Stephen Fonace, the only surviving members of the original Board of Trustees.

In 1759, a grant was made to the College by the House of Burgesses of the proceeds of the tax on peddlers.

Before the Revolution, the following donations were made to the College, "for foundations or scholarships:" Robert Carter, of Corotoman, fifty pounds; Mrs. Bray, widow of Capt. Thomas Bray, New Kent, two hundred pounds; Mrs. Elizabeth Harrison, of Surrey, three hundred pounds; the Rev. James Blair, five hundred pounds; Philip Lightfoot Esq., of Sandy Point, five hundred pounds. A gilt cup was presented to the College by Lady Gooch, of England. The Earl of Burlington presented a portrait of his brother, the Hon. Robert Boyle. It now hangs in the Blue Room of the College, along with several other interesting portraits.

Dr. James Blair, a native of Scotland and an Episcopal clergyman, was the first President of the College. He was appointed to the office by the charter. At the instance of the Bishop of London he came as a missionary to Virginia, in 1685. He was appointed Commissary, or Representative of the Bishop in the colony, in 1689. He revived the project of establishing a College in Virginia, entertained in 1619, but defeated by the Indian massacre in 1622. With justice he may be considered the father of William and Mary College; for his exertions, both in this country and in England, contributed greatly to the success of the enterprise. He died in 1743, after having filled the office of President of the College for half a century.

The following extracts from the Proceedings of the Faculty, shed light upon the history of the College before the Revolutionary War:—

“June 28th, 1732.—The College Chapel was opened. Mr. President (the Rev. Mr. Blair) preached on Proverbs, xxii. 6.

“July 31st, 1732.—The foundation of the President’s house at the College was laid. The President, Mr. Dawson, Mr. Fry, Mr. Stith (afterwards the historian), and Mr. Fox, laying the first five bricks in order, one after another.

“WILLIAMSBURG, Aug. 10th, 1732.

“Instructions from the President and Masters of William and Mary College, in Virginia, to John Randolph, Esq., now bound for England.

“I. That you would represent to the Lords of the Treasury and the Commissioners of his Majesty’s customs, that the revenue of the penny per pound upon Tobacco exported from Virginia and Maryland to the other Plantations, which their late Majesties, King William and Queen Mary, gave for the support of the said College in the year 1692 (o. s.), is now very much sunk, and yields not above one half of what it yielded at that time; which sinking of the said revenue we impute to the following causes.

“The officers in the three lower counties of Pennsylvania, and the officers in North Carolina, employed in the collecting the said duty, as we are informed, instead of exacting this said penny in good money, as the act of Parliament directs, let the exporters assessed for paying the penny (pay) in the currency of those counterys, which in North Carolina is little above a quarter part, and in Pennsylvania not above one half, of what is payed in Virginia, which occasions a greater export from those places, and less from Virginia and Maryland.

“Whereas, in Virginia there was formerly an officer allowed and maintained in Elizabeth River, from which is the greatest part of the exportation of tobaccos from this country to the Plantations, and likewise a searcher at the port of Hampton, who had authority to examine and search all vessels bound to the plantations, and these two officers are either sunk, or (which is all one as to the use of them) the offices are given to men that live out of their country, and so never reside as to do their duty, which has occasioned vast frauds in that trade, that they carry out tobaccos in barrels, entered as beef or pork, or concealed under corn, and hogsheads of tobaccos at weights much less than they really weigh.

“Another great obstruction of that trade is that most of those who follow it trade in small vessels, in which the chief of their lading is wheat, or Indian corn, or beef, or pork, or pipe-staves, to which they could safely add two or three hogsheads or a few barrels of Tobacco.

But as to this case of Tobaccos, the difficulty upon them is that this act of Parliament requires a bond with security upon no less penalty than a thousand pounds sterling, that they shall land the same in England or one of the English plantations, and being perhaps utter strangers, or persons in low circumstances, can find no bondsmen that will undertake for such high sums, and so are obliged to let the exportations of Tobacco alone, or to run it without paying any duty.

“And the New-England men are so bold in their transgressions of the acts of trade (and are suspected of exporting much more than their country consumes, perhaps to European markets), that no ordinary officer on the eastern shore cares to meddle with them. It would require a shallop of paid force to watch the trade of the Bay both from Virginia and Maryland, which the College can't afford, nor if they could, have they authority to do it.

“No doubt the Lords of the Treasury and the Commissioners of the Customs, by ordering the same duty in intrinsic value according to the act of Parliament to be passed in North Carolina and Pennsylvania, and by giving strict orders to their officers in New England, New York, Barbadoes, and the Leeward Islands, and all the other Plantations, to inspect and search all vessels, and to give an account to the proper officer of the port from which they set out, might find out what tobacco had not payed the penny per pound, and might order prosecutions accordingly. Or if the Lords and Commissioners aforesaid, who by reason of their more extensive authority, can much better detect the above-mentioned frauds, and recover the duties, and make much better advantage than we can of that revenue, would please to recommend it to His Majesty to take the said revenues back into his own hand, both in Virginia and Maryland, and to allow the College a certain yearly valuable consideration for it out of the quit-rents of Virginia, such as it was worth when the grant was made to the College (which was about four hundred pounds sterling); both His Majesty and the College might be gainers by it; but this might be all left to your direction to manage, as the circumstances of affairs will bear.

“II. Another thing we would recommend to your care and management is, concerning a small library to be kept at the Indian House here called Brafferton, upon that share of the fund allowed by the late Honorable Robert Boyle for the education of Indian scholars at this College, out of the manor of Brafferton, in Yorkshire, in England. We have been so good husbands of our share of that revenue, that though we have built an handsome house for the Indian school, with other good conveniences for the lodging of the master and scholars, and have

defrayed all the other charges incident to that pious undertaking, in the constant cloathing and boarding the Indian scholars, and paying the master's salary, yet we have now in bank upon that fund about five hundred pounds, part of which we desired to lay out in a well-chosen library, which we judge necessary, and, indeed, the most necessary thing that is now wanting towards the finishing their education, and fitting them for what was always intended, the being put in orders, and sent out Pastours to preach in their own country-language, and instruct and convert their own people. As we do not live in an age of miracles, it is not to be doubted that Indian scholars will want the help of many books to qualify them to become good pastours and teachers, as well as others. And the fund allotted for their education being able to supply them, what reason can be given why part of it may not be employed that way? If it be alleged that our College Library, it may be expected, should supply them, it may be truly answered that at present our funds are so poor, and theirs so rich, that they can better supply us than we them. And so it would be no hardship upon them, if whilst we furnish them with Masters and Professors to teach them Latine, Greek, and Hebrew, and Philosophy, Mathematics, and Divinity, they should in their turn help themselves and us to a few necessary books for those studies. But we are willing to compound the matter with them; we have, we can't say good store of books, but enough to make a good foundation and beginning of a library, to the use of which they are every way welcome; and, if we were able, would buy a great many more, which we and they want. This want is their loss as well as ours. What can be more reasonable than that since their fund is able to do it, and ours is not able, they should contribute their share towards so necessary means of education? Some, perhaps, will be apt to object that by this means we think to make a considerable addition to the College Library at their expense; and if it were so, there would be no great harm in it, since the College Library is to be a common library to them and us. But the case will be really much better on their side, for whatever books are bought with their money, shall be not only repositied in distinct presses marked with the name of Boyle or Brafferton, and at their own house (being without the college), but every particular book shall have that inscription on the back of it; so that, although as to the use we shall have the benefit of their books, as they shall of ours, yet really the property shall not be altered. Every one shall know his own; and this of books we think as necessary a means and instrument of their education, as the paying for their victuals and cloaths, and master's salary and medicine, and falls fully within the design of the noble founder, and

therefore we hope the Earl of Burlington and my Lord Bishop of London (whose directions we are to follow in the management of this charity), will easily come into it, and then there will remain nothing (for we shall give you a letter of credit to the cashier of this fund), but to take my Lord Bishop of London, our Chancellour, his advice concerning the properest books for our use, and their best editions; and to help you in this choice you will have with you two catalogues, one of those books the College is possessed of already, and another of those which an ancient minister designs shortly to leave to it,* that you may not buy them.

e. "Upon this occasion, too, we must desire you to wait on his Grace, my Lord Arch Bishop of Canterbury, who, as he has been upon all occasions a notable friend of the College, so was pleased particularly to signify his good intentions of giving or loaning something towards our Library; pray render our thanks to his Grace, and so consult him in the books you buy for us, that he may have his share of supplying us with what part of learning he thinks most proper, that what you buy may not interfere with his Grace's intended donation. These are the chief things occur to us at present. Perhaps you may meet with some charitable benefactors especially towards our library, that being at present our chief want, and as all this will put you to trouble and charge, though you generously say nothing of it, we shall think it our duty not to be ungrateful; and so wishing you a prosperous voyage, good health, and a safe return, we rest,

"At a meeting of y^e President and Masters of William and Mary College, Sep^r y^e 14th, 1752, present,

Y^e following orders were unanimously agreed to."

"1. Ordered, Y^t no scholar belonging to any school in the college of what age, rank, or quality soever, do keep any race horse at y^e college in y^e town, or anywhere in the neighbourhood. Y^t they be not anyway concerned in making races, or in backing or abetting those made by others, and y^t all race horses kept in y^e neighbourhood of y^e college and

belonging to any of y^e scholars, be immediately dispatched and sent off, and never again brought back, and all this under pain of y^e severest animadversion and punishment."

"2. Ordered, Y^t no scholar belonging to y^e college of what age, rank, or quality soever, or wheresoever residing within or without y^e college, do presume to appear playing or betting at y^e billiard or other gaming tables, or be any way concerned in keeping or fighting cocks, under pain of y^e like severe animadversions or punishment

"Jany. y^e 14, 1754. Resolved, Y^t a person be appointed to hear such boys as shall be recommended by their parents or guardians, a chapter in the Bible every school-day, at 12 o'clock, and y^t he have y^e yearly salary of one pistole for each boy so recommended."

"Aug. 29, 1754. Resolved unanimously, Y^t Mr. Commissary Dawson be allowed y^e use of y^e Hall and great room during y^e meeting of y^e clergy."

"Sept. 7th, 1754. The college allows only to the sick, tea to be made and sent by the house-keeper, and wine-why."

"Jany. 1st, 1756. Richard Collhyon was by them examined, and is thought capable of teaching the Grammar School at Norfolk."

"April 2nd, 1756. Y^e day Benj. Franklin, Esquire, favored y^e society with his company, and had y^e Degree of A. M. conferred upon him by y^e Rev. G. Dawson, A. M., President, to whom he was in publick presented by the Rev. William Preston, A. M."

"March 24th, 1756. Resolved, Y^t y^e young gentlemen, when they leave the Grammar School, shall be obliged to appear in academical dress."

"June 26, 1761. Resolved, That Mrs. Foster be appointed stocking-mender in the college, and that she be paid annually the sum of twelve pounds, provided she furnish herself with lodging, diet, fire, and candles."

"March 2d, 1768. Resolved, that an advertisement be inserted in the Gazette to inform the public that the college is now clear of small-pox.

"June 17th, 1768. Resolved, that the sum of fifty pounds per annum be appropriated out of the college revenue for the purchase of medals and other honorary rewards, to be distributed annually by the president and masters amongst such of the students, as shall best deserve them by their public examinations.

"Sept. 4th. 1769. Resolved unanimously, that the college-vote for James City be given to Robt. C. Nicholas and Lewis Burwell, Esqs.

“April 11th, 1771. This day was received from the honorable the president, and the other gentlemen appointed to take care of Lord Botetourt’s effects the following extract of a letter from his grace the Duke of Beaufort. ‘I understand that his lordship expressed a desire sometime before he died to be buried in Virginia, so that I do not intend to remove the body to England; but hope the president, &c. of the college will permit me to erect a monument near the place where he was buried, as the only means I have of expressing in some degree the sincere regard and affection I bore towards him. And I flatter myself, it may not be disagreeable to the Virginians, to have this remembrance of a person whom they held in so high estimation, and whose loss they so greatly lament.’ Which being read the application therein contained received the unanimous assent of the society, who are glad of any opportunity of showing their sincere regard to the memory of Lord Botetourt.

“May 3d, 1771. Resolved unanimously, that a negro woman belonging to his late excellency’s (Lord Botetourt) estate be purchased for the use of the college, if to be had at a moderate price.

“February 14th, 1772. Upon motion made by Mr. Johnson, it was ordered that the students in the philosophy schools shall speak Latin declamations of their own composition, and that by two of them in rotation this exercise shall be performed in the chapel immediately after evening service, every second Thursday during term-time.

“July 29th, 1772. That the medal assigned by his excellency Lord Botetourt, for the encouragement of students in philosophical learning, be given to Mr. Nathaniel Burwell, as being the best proficient. Resolved, that the medal assigned by his lordship for the encouragement of classical learning be given to Mr. James Maddison.

“October 14th, 1773. Agreed unanimously, that Mr. Thomas Jefferson be appointed surveyor of Albemarle, in the room of Mr. Nicholas Lewis, who has sent his letter of resignation, and that he be allowed to have a deputy.

“April, 1775. Whereas, we have received from the Bursar the disagreeable news, that His Excellency Lord Dunmore entertains thoughts of resigning the office of visitor and governor of the college. Resolved unanimously, that the President and Mr. Gwatkin do wait on his lordship to thank him most cordially for his past favors to the college, and most humbly to request that he will continue to act as a visitor and governor of the college, and to afford his protection to the president and professors as far as they shall appear to him to deserve his countenance.”

Before the Revolution the College consisted of a school of Divinity, one of Philosophy in which Natural Philosophy and Mathematics were taught, a Grammar school for instruction in the Ancient Languages, and an Indian school supported by the donation of the Hon. Robert Boyle, in which from about the year 1700 to that of 1776 eight to ten Indians were annually maintained and educated. Some of these Indians came a distance of four hundred miles from the College.

The College long exercised the duties of the office of Surveyor General of the colony of Virginia; and among the surveyors appointed by it were George Washington, and Zachary Taylor of Orange, the grandfather of the late Gen. Taylor, President of the United States.

For about seventy years previous to the Revolution, the average number of students was about sixty; from ten to fifteen of whom were received on the scholarships or foundations. At the beginning of the Revolution the number was seventy.

Many of the distinguished gentlemen of Virginia, as will be seen from this catalogue, conspicuous in the measures that led to the Revolution, and for active co-operation with the patriots during the struggle for independence, were alumni of William and Mary College. And, notwithstanding the fact that most of the Faculty were of the Church Establishment, and inclined to the cause of Royalty, there are well-authenticated anecdotes which indicate that the spirit of rebellion found its way even into the corporation of the College. Towards the close of the war, three of the professors and more than thirty students joined the army. Among the latter were James Monroe and John Marshall.

The parent society, in this country, of the Phi Beta Kappa was organized at William and Mary College as early as 1776. The first meeting was held in the Apollo Hall of the old Raleigh Tavern of Williamsburg, the room in which the first revolutionary spirit of Virginia was breathed in the burning words of Henry. The original charter of this society is now in the possession of the Historical Society of this State.

In 1781, the exercises of the College were suspended, and the buildings were alternately occupied, the summer before the memorable siege of Yorktown, by the British and French troops. Whilst occupied by the latter, the College was injured, and the President's house destroyed by fire. This was subsequently rebuilt at the expense of the French government. It does not appear how long the College was closed; probably the exercises were suspended not more than a year. In 1790, there was a respectable number of students.

After the Revolution, the General Assembly of Virginia gave to the

College the Palace Lands and the houses upon them, a tract of land near Williamsburg, known as the "Vineyard," and a few acres not far from Jamestown. The organization of the College was now changed. Mr. Jefferson, in his Autobiography, says, "On the 1st of June, 1779, I was appointed Governor of the Commonwealth, and retired from the Legislature. Being elected also one of the Visitors of William and Mary College, a self-electing body, I effected during my residence in Williamsburg that year a change in the organization of that institution, by abolishing the Grammar School and the two Professorships of Divinity and Oriental Languages, and substituting a Professorship of Law and Police, one of Anatomy, Medicine, and Chemistry, and one of Modern Languages; and the charter confining us to six Professors, we added the Law of Nature and Nations, and the Fine Arts, to the duties of the Moral Professor, and Natural History to those of the Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy." The Indian school was abandoned in consequence of the loss of the manor of Brafferton by the Revolution.

In 1788 George Washington was made chancellor of the College. His letter of acceptance is as follows :—

MOUNT VERNON, *April 30th, 1788.*

DEAR SIR,

I am now to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th inst., in which you did me the favor to enclose an extract from the original statute designating the duties of the office to which I had been appointed.

Influenced by a heartfelt desire to promote the cause of science in general and the College of William and Mary in particular. I accept the office of chancellor of the same, and request you will be pleased to give official notice thereof to the learned body who have thought proper to honor me with the appointment.

I confide fully in their strenuous endeavours for placing the system of education on such a basis as will render it most beneficial to the State, and the republic of letters, as well as to the more extensive interests of humanity and religion. In return they will do me the justice to believe, that I shall not be tardy in giving my cheerful concurrence to such measures as may be best calculated for the attainment of those desirable and important objects.

For the expressions of politeness and friendship blended with your communication, I pray you to receive my best acknowledgements. With sentiments of the highest esteem and regard.

Many of those who shaped the institutions of the United States, which have shaped the destinies of the human race, were trained in the "College of William and Mary in Virginia." It is much to be regretted that a full list of the alumni cannot be made out; but imperfect as it is, it contains such names as Theodrick Bland, Peyton Randolph, Carter Braxton, George Wythe, Thomas Jefferson [soon after Mr. Jefferson's entrance into college Dr. William Small was made per interim Professor of Philosophy; and Mr. Jefferson declared, that it was Dr. Small's instruction and intercourse that "probably fixed his destinies for life"], John Page, Edmund Randolph, James Monroe, John Marshall, James Barbour, Philip P. Barbour, William B. Giles, Benjamin Watkins Leigh, Chapman Johnson, John Tyler, John Randolph of Roanoke, Spencer Roane, Littleton W. Tasewell, Wm. C. Rives, John J. Crittenden, William S. Archer, John Nelson, and Winfield Scott, foremost amongst the most distinguished in American history.

There seems to be something like fortunate design in the very location of the old College; for her position to some degree illustrates her history. On the one side lies Jamestown, the scene of early colonial suffering and success; in front, the site of the ancient capitol, where she watched her sons in the hour of trial; on the other side, the heights of Yorktown whose thunders pealed the triumph of right and liberty.

To him who is fond of antiquarian lore, the Library of the College presents indeed an Elysian field. Tome upon tome is to be found in the collection, that alone represents in this new world the labors of the learned authors that lived centuries ago in the old. Folio volumes of divinity, musty with age and crumbling, teach the passer-by, who does not stop to read the lesson upon their pages, the vanity of life and the futility of fame.

The dead of the chapel of William and Mary, are a part of her history. In its vaults rest the remains of Sir John Randolph, son of William Randolph of Turkey Island, of his sons John Randolph, Attorney General of the crown for the colony, and Peyton Randolph, President of the first American Congress, of Lord Botetourt, of Bishop Madison, and of Chancellor Nelson.

The names of the Visitors, Bursars, Faculty and Students at College after 1738, in the following Catalogue, are taken from papers and records in possession of the Faculty. The names of those supposed to have been students at an earlier date were obtained from different sources.

The College records containing the names of Students before 1827, being exceedingly imperfect and in a mutilated condition, it is certain a great number are omitted. Any person who may detect an error in this Catalogue will confer a favor on the Faculty, by communicating it without delay to the Professor of History, &c. in the College.

Degrees.

There are three regular Degrees, *viz.* BACHELOR OF PHILOSOPHY, BACHELOR OF ARTS, AND MASTER OF ARTS.

REQUIRED FOR B. P.—The three years Course. Latin and Greek omitted; or its equivalent, *i. e.* proficiency in two Departments, and in the Junior Classes of three of the remaining Departments.

REQUIRED FOR A. B.—The three years Course; or its equivalent, *i. e.* proficiency in four Departments and in the Junior Classes of the remaining Departments.

REQUIRED FOR A. M.—The Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and in addition proficiency in any two Modern Languages, in the advanced Metaphysical Course, in English Literature, in Analytical Geometry, in Differential and Integral Calculus, and in Mixed Mathematics.

Certificates of Proficiency may be awarded, upon examination in any class or department, to those whose preparation before coming to College, warrants it.

Every candidate for a degree shall, at least thirty days before Commencement, hand to the President an essay prepared to be spoken in public; from which the Faculty shall select a certain number to be spoken on the day of Commencement. No speech not so selected shall be delivered on that day; nor shall a diploma be granted to any student who shall fail to hand in such an essay, and deliver it publicly, if required to do so.

The city of Williamsburg, in which the College is located, has a population of nearly two thousand, and has long been celebrated for the elegant hospitality of its inhabitants, making it a most agreeable residence for the student. Of late, the town and the adjacent country have been much improved. Timber has been cleared away, and a better system of cultivation introduced; and the result has been a decided improvement in the healthiness of the locality. Few places in the State can boast a more salubrious climate than this during the College session. Diseases peculiar to the low country, prevail only in the months of August and September; and of late years these have been very mild in their character, and easily controlled by medicines. From October to July, while the College is in session, these diseases are never contracted. The winter climate is delightful: the cold being moderated by the large bodies of salt-water in the vicinity; while it is too far distant from the ocean to be much affected by storms. The heat of summer is neutralized by the same means; so that, in the hottest weather, the thermometer ranges from three to five degrees lower than that of Richmond.

Students from the upper country need be under no apprehension from the effect of the climate; while to those predisposed to pulmonary complaints it would be decidedly beneficial. During the present century only six deaths have occurred among the students of the College; and two of these were from drowning.
