The enquiries which motioned the Application we made to your Excellencies in Dec^r. last concerning the measures that were likely to be taken respecting Tobacco having been soon answered by the promulgation from Government to the last encouragement it gave to the Trade of the United States except knowing at what price the Farms is to receive the 11000 Hds Tobacco it is to take Annually During the Remainder of its lease which we suppose we shall soon be informed of in like manner. The Resolves of receiving the afores Quantities would be of little avail if it was left to the Farm to pay only what they thought proper for it

The promises contained in M^r. Lambert's Official Letter of the 29th Dec^r of granting further Commercial Advantages, has suggested the idea to some of our New England friends of opening a new Branch from their States to this Country with salt provisions of Butter Beef & Pork in which they say they can rival the fish for quality & cheapness & think this a favourable moment when the interest of America is in agitation, to obtain encouragement thereto, by obtaining that Branch should
