Tribe Opens Season with Second Annual W&M Tip-Off Classic

William and Mary's men's basketball team will open the 2005-06 season Friday at 8:00 PM against the University of Maine in the second annual W&M Tip-Off Classic, presented by Jim and Jane Kaplan ... High Point University and the College of the Holy Cross are also competing in the tournament and will face each other in the first semifinal game at 6:00 PM ... The consolation and championship games will be played on Saturday night, with the Tribe's game guaranteed to once again start at 8:00 PM ... W&M won the event last season, defeating Hartford, 84-71, in the semifinal and beating Radford, 81-76, in the championship game ... Junior **Corey Cofield** was voted the tournament's most valuable player and senior **Hawley Smith** was also named to the all-tournament team.

Storylines

Friday's game will be the first between W&M and Maine ... The Tribe will also play UMBC and new Colonial Athletic Association members Georgia State and Northeastern for the first time this season ... W&M is 1-2 all-time against High Point and is winless in its three previous games against Holy Cross.

The Green and Gold returns four starters from last season, including the team's top two scorers: third team All-Colonial Athletic Association selection, junior forward **Corey Cofield** (13.2 ppg) and CAA all-rookie pick, sophomore forward **Laimis Kisielius** (8.7 ppg) ... Senior forward **Hawley Smith** and sophomore guard **Nathan Mann** also started the majority of the Tribe's games last season ... W&M returns 76.0 percent of its scoring and 82.6 percent of its rebounding from 2004-05.

This weekend, W&M will attempt to win its sixth overall and second straight regular-season tournament title ... In addition to the College winning the inaugural W&M Tip-Off Classic last season, the Tribe also won the 1962 UR Invitational, the 1977 Cougar Classic, the 1977 Tangerine Bowl Classic and the 1981 Iron Duke Classic ... W&M is 39-69 (.361) all-time in regular-season tournament games, including a 3-1 mark in those contests under third-year head coach **Tony Shaver**.

This season marks the 50th anniversary of W&M's Big Six championship won by the Tribe in the 1955-56 season ... Although not an official conference, the Big Six, comprised of Richmond, Virginia, Virginia Military Institute, Virginia Tech, Washington & Lee and W&M, was recognized by the state's media and was a closely followed competition throughout the season ... W&M and Richmond headed into the final game of the 1955-56 regular season tied at 5-2 in the Big Six standings ... The Tribe defeated the Spiders, 79-77, at the College's

Four of the 15 players on W&M's rosters list a Virginia community as their hometown, including rookie guard **Calvin Baker**, the Associated Press and Virginia High School Coaches Association Group AAA Player of the Year last season ... He is joined by fellow state all-star game participant, freshman forward **Chris Darnell** and walk-ons **Adam Trumbower** and **Chris Stratton** ... Rookie forward **Alex Smith** also has Virginia ties, having played last season for national power Oak Hill Academy, located in Mouth of Wilson, Virginia ... One of the four individuals that has already committed to play for W&M next season, forward **Danny Sumner**, is from Fairfax, VA.

New Schedule Format for CAA

With the addition of Georgia State and Northeastern to the CAA, the league will have an all-time high of 12 member institutions ... As a result, for the first time in conference history, the CAA will play an unbalanced schedule ... Each school has a set group of five opponents that it will play both at home and away each season ... The remaining six opponents are grouped into three pairs that rotate through the schedule every two years ... Each season a team will face two of those opponents both home and away, while playing the other four foes just once ... Using this rotation, each team in the CAA will host every league member at least four times in the six-year rotation ... W&M's annual home-and-home opponents are Drexel, James Madison, UNC Wilmington,

Old Dominion and Virginia Commonwealth ... This season and next, the Tribe will also play two games against George Mason and Georgia State ... This year, W&M will host single games against Delaware and Hofstra, while playing Northeastern and Towson on the road.

Cofield Closing in on 1,000

Junior forward **Corey Cofield** enters the 2005-06 season with 752 points in just two seasons (13.2 ppg) ... This season, he is likely to become the 27th player in school history to score 1,000 points, and just the 14th to reach the milestone in less than three seasons ... The last player to score 1,000 points at W&M was 2004 graduate **Adam Hess**, who is 10th in school history with 1,341 points in less than three full seasons wearing the Green and Gold.

Best Things in Life are Free (Throws)

W&M led the CAA and was 53rd in the nation with a .725 free throw percentage last season, the 10th best mark in school history ... Three players made more than 75 percent of their shots from the line, led by **Corey Cofield**, who was fourth in the CAA with a .804 FT%, leading the league in free throws made (144) and attempted (179) ... **Laimis Kisielius** (.767) and **Hawley Smith** (.752) each also made over 75 percent of their foul shots ... As a team, W&M was at least .750 from the line 11 times, including three games over 90 percent.

Facility Upgrades

During the summer, W&M Hall underwent a major renovation project with the installation of a new hardwood floor ... The \$750,000 project included a wall-to-wall, 16,900 square foot permanent wood floor, large enough for two full basketball courts when the arena's bleachers are retracted ... The floor was manufactured by Connor Sports Flooring Corporation and was installed by Recreation Plus of Hopewell, Virginia.

Shaver Named to Episcopal HS Hall of Fame

Head coach **Tony Shaver** was inducted into the Episcopal High School (Alexandria, VA) Hall of Fame on Nov. 11 ... Shaver coached at the school for 10 seasons (1977-86), winning 73 percent of his games and two IAC championships ... After the 1986 season he was named the Virginia State Private School Coach of the Year and his team was ranked first in Northern Virginia by the *Alexandria Gazette*.

Five former W&M players are currently playing professionally overseas, including three who graduated within the last three years ... All five are playing in their country's top division of professional basketball.

Todd Cauthorn (1993), Sheffield Sharks (England - BBL)

Player/assistant coach for Sheffield averaging 6.4 points and 4.1 rebounds per game ... The Sharks are tied for fifth with a 4-4 record in the British Basketball League

Zeb Cope (2004), Boncourt (Switzerland - LNA)

Scored 30 points in a 105-91 win over Nyon on Nov. 14 ... Ranked fifth in Switzerland with 21.7 ppg and second with 13.0 rpg ... Boncourt is first in its league with a 6-1 record.

Adam Hess (2004), CEZ Basketball Nymburk (Czech Republic - NBL)

Scored 16 points in a 115-65 win over BK Sadska on Nov. 12 ... Fifth in the league with a 27.50 value index rating and tied for fourth in scoring with 21.75 ppg ... Led team with 20 points in a FIBA EuroCup win on Nov. 9 ... Nymburk is tied for first in the country with a 5-0 record.

Jimmy Moran (2001), Gran Canaria (Spain - ACB)

Scored two points in a 78-71 win over TAU Ceramica on Nov. 13 ... Averaging 3.4 points and 2.3 rebounds per game ... Team is tied for fourth in the league with a 4-3 record

W&M Signs Four Early

W&M head coach Tony Shaver and his staff completed their recruiting for next season's class with the signing of four individuals on the first day of the early signing period (Nov. 9). The four future Tribe players are 6-10 forward **Steven Hess**, 6-2 guard **Matt McFadden**, 6-3 guard **David Schneider** and 6-7 forward **Danny Sumner**.

Steven Hess, 6-10, F, Gastonia, NC (Gaston Day School)

Hess averaged 16 points and nine rebounds for Gaston Day School last season, helping his team reach the semifinals of the state tournament in North Carolina's largest independent-school classification. He is a McDonald's All-American nominee and was an All-Southern Piedmont Athletic Association selection.

Matt McFadden, 6-2, G, Medford, NJ (Shawnee High School)

McFadden averaged 13 points, five assists, four rebounds and 2.5 steals per game last season at Shawnee High School. A three-time team captain, he was an All-Olympic Conference selection last year, helping his team to a 25-2 record, as Shawnee HS won the South Jersey Group 4 championship and advanced to the semifinals of the state tournament.

David Schneider, 6-3, G, Phoenix, AZ (Brophy Prep)

Schneider averaged 18.1 points, 6.2 rebounds and 6.1 assists per game last season at Brophy Prep and was a first team all-region and honorable mention all-state selection. His father, Jeff, played basketball at Virginia Tech, ending his college career in 1982 with 276 assists, ninth-most in school history, before being selected in the fifth round of the 1982 NBA Draft by the Houston Rockets.

Danny Sumner, 6-7, F, Fairfax, VA (Paul VI)

Sumner averaged 14 points and 10 rebounds a game for Paul VI High School last season, as his team reached the Virginia Independent Schools Division I state final for the second straight year. Sumner was named to the 2005 Virginia Independent All-Tournament team and was an honorable mention Washington Post All-Metropolitan selection. He will be the Tribe's first men's basketball player from Paul VI since **David Cully**, who graduated from W&M in 1996 as the College's all-time blocked shots leader (248) and fifth-leading rebounder (783).

1. The first settlement in Maine was established by the Plymouth Company at Popham in 1607, the same year as the settlement at Jamestown, Virginia. Because the Popham colony didn't survive the harsh Maine winter, Jamestown is considered America's first permanent settlement.
2. Maine has one county (Aroostook) so large (6,453 square miles) that it is bigger than the combined size of the states of Connecticut and Rhode Island.
3. The town of York, chartered in 1641, is recognized as the first chartered town in the U.S.
4. Machias Seal Island, located off the easternmost point of Maine, is claimed by both the U.S. and Canada and is the only U.S. land area still in dispute with respect to sovereignty.
5. Maine has 3,500 miles of coastline, the longest of any state in the continental U.S.
6. The state of Maine produces more than 90% of the nation's low-bush blueberries, lobsters and wooden toothpicks and leads the world in the production of flat tins of sardines.
7. The average summer daytime temperature in Maine is approximately 70 degrees and the average temperature in the winter is about 22 degrees. Maine averages between 60 and 90 inches of snowfall a year.
8. Maine is the only state in the continental U.S. that does not have any poisonous snakes.
9. Approximately 80% of Maine's 30,862 square miles of land area is covered by trees.
10. When Maine's official license plate featured a red lobster, it was the only state in the nation to have a dead animal on its license plate. (Lobsters don't turn red until after they have been cooked.)

Head Coach Tony Shaver

William and Mary head coach Tony Shaver is in his third season at the helm of the Tribe men's basketball program. Officially hired on May 2, 2003, Shaver is the 31st men's basketball coach in the history of the College.

"Bringing a coach and person the caliber of a Tony Shaver into the William and Mary program certainly makes this an exciting day for the College," said director of athletics Terry Driscoll at the time of the hire. "His resume speaks for itself in terms of his coaching abilities, but beyond that, I believe that he possesses all the intangible qualities that will make him a perfect fit for our school and program."

The Green and Gold continued to make strides in Shaver's second season leading the Tribe. W&M immediately started the season on a high note, defeating Radford and Hartford to win the inaugural W&M Tip-Off Classic, the first regular season tournament title for the College since 1981. The Tribe defeated James Madison in the first round of the Colonial Athletic Association Tournament for W&M's first postseason win since 1997, and just the third in the last 20 years.

Shaver began his Tribe career with a 91-64 pounding of Liberty on Nov. 23, 2003. He also won his first ever Colonial Athletic Association contest, as the Tribe knocked off two-time defending league champion UNC Wilmington, 67-66, in overtime on Dec. 4, 2003. In his first contest against a nationally ranked opponent, W&M also performed well, leading No. 15 Pittsburgh by 10 points midway through the first half, before the Panthers, who attempted 28 more free throws than the Tribe, won 70-55.

There have been individual successes as well for the Green and Gold under Shaver's reign. 2004 graduate Adam Hess, currently playing professionally in Europe, became the first player in school history to lead the CAA in scoring. An outstanding student and athlete, Hess was named the CAA Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year (for all sports) and was a first team Academic All-America and all-conference selection as a senior. Current junior Corey Cofield was voted the 2004 CAA Rookie of the Year, leading all freshmen in the league in points, rebounds and field goal percentage. Cofield earned his second straight selection to the All-CAA third team in 2005, while current sophomore Laimis Kisielius earned a spot on the CAA All-Rookie team last season.

Shaver came to W&M after coaching 17 seasons at Hampden-Sydney, compiling a record of 358-121 (.747). He turned the Tigers into a Division III national powerhouse, leading the men's basketball team to eight Old Dominion Athletic Conference titles, 12 20-win seasons and 11 NCAA Division III Tournament appearances. The winningest basketball coach in the program's history, he was named the ODAC and South Region Coach of the Year in 1995, 1999 and 2000, and was picked as the Virginia Sports Information Directors Division II-III Coach of the Year in 1997, 1999 and 2000.

In 2003, Shaver took the Tigers to the NCAA Division III Final Four, as his team finished with a record of 28-4, tied for the second-most wins in the program's history. In 1999, Shaver led H-SC to the national championship game, where the Ti-

gers lost by one point in double-overtime to Wisconsin-Platteville. The team finished 29-3, setting a school record for most wins in a season.

Shaver also has a firm commitment to his players' success in the classroom. In 1999, one of his charges, Jack Jirak, was named the ODAC Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was also awarded the Gammon Cup as the top-student-athlete at the college. Two of Shaver's players, David Hobbs (1999) and Russell Turner (1992) earned Academic All-America honors. A number of his players have been named to the Academic All-ODAC squad, including six student-athletes in 1998.

Shaver first led the Tigers to the national postseason in 1988-89, just his third season as the team's head coach. That year, H-SC won the ODAC championship, ending the season with a 21-8 record.

Prior to taking over at Hampden-Sydney for the 1986-87 campaign, Shaver spent 10 years as the head boys' basketball coach at Episcopal High School in Alexandria, Virginia. He was named the Virginia State Private School Coach of the Year in 1986, and was twice picked as the Alexandria Coach of the Year, while winning 73 percent of his games.

A 1976 graduate of North Carolina, Shaver was a guard on the Tar Heel men's basketball

team from 1972-75 under head coach Dean Smith. Originally a walk-on, he earned a scholarship his rookie season, when he was awarded the prestigious Butch Bennett Award, presented to the team's most outstanding freshman.

A native of High Point, North Carolina, Shaver and his wife, Ann, are the parents of three sons: Christopher (24), a former standout pitcher on the Tribe's baseball team, who is currently pitching with the Chicago Cubs organization, Austin (21) and Jackson (14).
