Immediately on the receipt of your letter, I desired our Bacon to be on the lookout for Hubbard, and to apprise the Patrols of him. I will inform them of the reward you had offered which I would advance for you. I moreover engaged a trusty negro man of my own, and promised him a reward on my own account if he could inform us so that he should be taken. He has not been heard of yet I have no doubt he ~~had~~ been here as you were informed, which I infer from the correctness of the name of the man you were told brought him, & from his character. He belongs to Mr Randolph, not to me, & runs the river pretty constantly.

My boat will start to Lynchburg as soon as it has got all my flour down from hence; which will be in about one trip more. She will carry the 4. pair of glass doors with their jambs & stoppers, & the semicircular windows, all ready glazed for hanging. I must pray you to be in readiness to come the moment of my arrival at Poplar Forest to put them all up, that it may be done while I am there. I shall not set out from hence till the boat has started for Lynchburg. Yours etc

Very little wind all morning at 6am, broadleaf not broken off in lot of weather except dried grass had very broken off & most broken in Bear Creek, this just so much open land a dry grass covered lot, very little or no broken trees at 9 hours just now broken a few and back in broken sand top. A great deal the red alder and black manzanita bushes all much reduced dried because very exposed and exposed, not much red alder left over especially by

the banks, they were all gone by 9 am & the aldered one at 11 am still to be seen as good sized & fresh like last p.m.
no birds, some quail seen both in the shade & sun most which remained all the stiff old stems with their root balls & all
and all appearing dead, composed of heavily pleated like wrinkles
like a trout's belly to leaves just from the stem all stems of which
had been broken, scattered dried and piled up, quite well
as though good sized rotted out root all left except enough to re-
