Directions to William and Mary

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234A (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until the Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through three stoplights, and continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers). There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. William and Mary Hall will be on your left.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrop Way. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrop Way while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left.

ALEX GIBBY

Former Tribe distance ace Alex Gibby returned to William and Mary in 2003 to assume the head coaching position for men's cross country and track and field and has continued the tradition of championship excellence at the College.

At William and Mary (2003-Present) - Coaching Highlights

2006-07

Cross Country: Team won its seventh consecutive Colonial Athletic Association title ... At the Southeast Regional, upset Louisville and Virginia to take second and earn its 10th-straight trip to the NCAA Championships, one of only five schools in the nation to accomplish the feat ... Won the IC4A Championships for the first time since 1982 and third time overall ... Placed eighth at the NCAA Championships, surpassed only by the fourth-place finish in 1973 as the best ever for the Tribe ... Christo Landry finishes 34th to earn his second All-American citation ... Seven runners are All-CAA, six are All-East, five are All-Southeast ... Four named to the USTFCCCA All-Academic team, most in the nation ... Gibby named CAA Coach of the Year for fourth time ... Keith Bechtol earns his fourth Scholar-Athlete of the Year award from the CAA, and is selected to Phi Beta Kappa. **Track:** Bechtol places 14th at the NCAA 10,000m championships, one second behind All-American cut-off ... He qualifies for the NCAA meet by running 28:55.57, third-best time in school history, at Stanford ... Also qualifies for 2008 Olympic Trials ... Tribe wins two relay titles at the IC4A Championships, the indoor DMR and outdoor 4x800m ... Winning 4x800m time is 13th in the U.S. in 2007 ... Tribe wins six titles at the CAA Championships en route to finishing second ... W&M sweeps the top three spots in the 5,000m, 10,000m, and 3,000m steeplechase ... Bechtol wins the 5,000m and places third in the 10,000m ... Matt Keally wins the 10,000m ... Anthony Arena wins the steeplechase ... David Groff wins the 1,500m ... Matt Warco wins the 800m ... Groff also wins the 1,500m at the Colonial Relays, setting the meet record at that distance ... Ian Fitzgerald and Bechtol named All-Academic by USTFCCCA ... Bechtol named Athlete of the Year, Track Scholar-Athlete of the Year, and conference-wide Scholar-Athlete of the Year by the CAA ... Bechtol also named First-Team Academic All-American.

2005-06

Cross Country: Won five meets and rose to a ranking of 15th in the national polls ... Ian Fitzgerald won the CAA Championship and placed third at the Southeast Regional, leading the Tribe to victory in both races ... Southeast Region Championship was the first for the team since 2000 ... Team finished 22nd at the NCAA Championships ... Six runners named All-CAA, five named all-region, two are All-East ... Gibby named CAA and Southeast Region Coach of the Year ... Senior Mike Dominguez is Phi Beta Kappa. **Track:** Christo Landry qualifies for NCAAs in the 5,000m, placing 26th ... Earlier in the season, Landry runs 13:53.62 at Stanford, and Ian Fitzgerald runs 13:57.67 unattached ... Seniors Jeff Hedley (1,500m), Matt Keally (5,000m), and Mike Dominguez (3,000m steeplechase) all win CAA titles ... Junior Keith Bechtol wins the CAA 10,000m in meet-record time in his first race of the season ... Bechtol and Landry are both All-East outdoors, with Bechtol taking second in the 10,000m ... Bechtol named third-team Academic All-America, and becomes first athlete to ever win three Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards from the CAA.

2004-05

Cross Country: Tribe falls victim to food poisoning at the NCAA Championships and only four runners finish the race, led by freshman Christo Landry who finishes 38th to earn All-America honors ... Landry is the first Tribe freshman since 1970 to do so ... Junior Matt Keally is the CAA Champion, leading W&M to the team title ... W&M also takes second at the IC4A Championships, as four are named All-East ... In a sweep of the conference awards, Gibby is named Coach of the Year, Jeff Hedley Athlete of the Year, Landry Rookie of the Year, and senior Pat Comstock is Scholar-Athlete of the Year ... Landry goes on to race at the World Junior Cross Country Championships, and classmate Dave Mock wins the North American, Central American, and Caribbean Junior Cross Country Championship. **Track:** Ed Moran and Christo Landry qualify for the NCAA 5,000m, where Moran places seventh for his fourth All-American honor ... Moran also wins the 5,000m at both the CAA and IC4A Championships, the first conference championships of his career ... Racing at the USAT&F Championships, Moran runs 13:25.87, less than half a second off of the school record ... Landry sets the W&M freshman record in the 5,000m, running 14:01.62

to qualify for the NCAA Regional ... Sean Anastasia-Murphy becomes the first Tribe athlete since 1996 to break nine minutes in the 3,000m steeplechase, running 8:59.26 at the IC4A Championships for All-East honors ... In total, 14 athletes are named All-East ... At the CAA Championships, senior Adam Otstot wins the 3,000m steeplechase and leads a sweep of the top five spots for the College ... Pat Comstock wins the 10,000m in meet-record time, and the Tribe takes six of the top eight positions ... Comstock is selected to Phi Beta Kappa.

2003-04

Cross Country: Ed Moran wins his second CAA Championship and leads six teammates on the all-conference team as the Tribe wins its fourth consecutive title ... Leading the Southeast Regional, Moran breaks his foot but runs on it for the last half-mile to finish third and help the team secure an automatic berth to the NCAA Championships ... Gibby is named CAA Coach of the Year, Moran is Athlete of the Year, David Murphy is Rookie of the Year, and Adam Otstot is Scholar-Athlete of the Year. **Track:** The Tribe wins its second-consecutive CAA crown ... Matt Wolak comes from behind to win the 800m, freshman Keith Bechtol wins the 10,000m, and sophomore Matt Keally wins the 10,000m ... Jeff Hedley qualifies for the NCAA 5,000m after finishing third at the NCAA East Regional ... Bechtol wins the IC4A 10,000m and qualifies for the USAT&F Junior National Championships, with the fastest-time run by any American junior competitor that year (29:58.13) ... Bechtol places second at the Junior Nationals, and is the highest American finisher at Junior Worlds, finishing 19th ... Bechtol is named CAA Rookie of the Year.



At Stephen F. Austin (2000-03) - Coaching Highlights

Cross Country: Head men's and women's coach ... Men's team won the Southland Conference for the first time in 2001, and again in 2002 ... Women's team won the Southland in 2002 for the first time since 1990 ... Named Coach of the Year for both men and women in 2002 after also mentoring the individual champions in both races, the first time all four titles had gone to one school. **Track:** Assistant coach for men and women, working with the middle- and long-distance runners ... Athletes set 18 school records and won 18 individual conference championships ... Under Gibby's tutelage, Ana Rodriguez led the women's track team to the 2003 Southland Outdoor Championship, winning the 5,000m and 10,000m ... Rodriguez qualified for NCAAs in the 5,000m, finishing 21st and becoming the first distance runner in school history to run at NCAAs.

At William and Mary (1997-2000)

Assistant men's coach ... Helped the Tribe cross country team win the 1997 CAA title and begin a streak of qualifying for the NCAA Championships that is still extant ... 1997 team placed ninth at the NCAA meet, and the following two years' teams each placed 13th ... Helped mentor Matt Lane, an 11-time All-American who finished fourth at the U.S. Olympic Trials in the 5,000m in both 2000 and 2004 ... Also worked with three-time All-American and 1997 NCAA 800m runner-up Anders Christiansen.

At William and Mary (1992-1997) - Athletic Achievements

Four-time All-CAA between cross country and track ... 1997 CAA 5,000m champion ... All-East in the 10,000m ... NCAA provisional qualifier at 10,000m ... Bachelor of Arts in history.

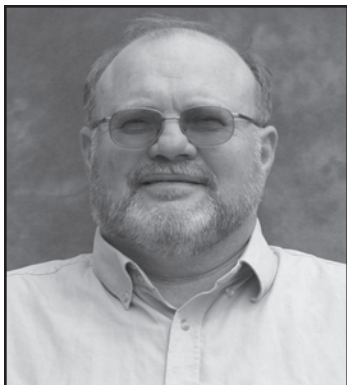
Married to head women's track and cross country coach Kathy Newberry in 2005, and they reside in Williamsburg with their dog, Oskar ... Coaches several post-collegiate distance stars, including his wife ... Newberry was a finalist in the 5,000m and 10,000m at both the 2000 and 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials, and ranked 10th in the nation in 2004 at 10,000m ... Newberry has also run for the U.S. at three World Cross Country Championships ... Ed Moran has twice finished in the top eight of the 5,000m at the USAT&F National Championships, and works as an assistant coach at W&M ... Jacob Frey has qualified for the Olympic Trials in the marathon, running 2:17:37 at the Austin Marathon in 2006, and finished seventh at the U.S. 25K National Championships that same year ... Moran achieved the Olympic "A" standard at both 5,000m and 10,000m in 2007, and will compete for a spot on the Olympic team at the 2008 Olympic Trials ... Moran and Frey both competed for the United States at the 2007 Pan-American Games ... Frey placed fourth in the marathon with a personal-record performance of 2:16:44 ... Moran won the gold medal at 5,000m with a meet-record time of 13:25.60.

DAN STIMSON



In his 22nd year as Director of Track and Field at William and Mary, Dan Stimson oversees a program that has demonstrated success both in the classroom and on the track, and has served as an exemplary model for what collegiate athletics should be all about. In recognition of his years of service, the College honored Coach Stimson in 2007 by naming the new throwing facility in his honor, the Stimson Throwing Events Area. Made possible through a generous donation from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Showker, the facility includes an Olympic throwing cage with circles for both the hammer and discus, two shot put circles, and javelin runway.

The men's and women's programs have combined for 15 Colonial Athletic Association titles out of 20 possible since the 2002-03 school year, and have garnered numerous CAA Athlete and Rookie of the Year awards. The 2006-07 season was another banner year for the squads, as Stimson's program captured both CAA cross country titles: the seventh consecutive conference title for the men's team and fourth in a row for the women's squad. Punctuating the season was the 10th-straight NCAA team qualification for men's cross country, an achievement only four other schools can claim. To date, Stimson's programs have produced 54 All-Americans and one Olympian.

Stimson, who works primarily with the throwers, jumpers, and multi-eventers, has mentored many W&M athletes to national prominence in his tenure. Due to the absence of the javelin or the hammer throw at the high school level in Virginia and other nearby states, Stimson has earned a reputation for his ability to develop young talent.

His coaching credits include W&M hammer throw record-holder Mike Howell, who started with the hammer in his rookie season at W&M, and progressed through the ranks until his senior year, when he posted the eighth-best mark by an American collegian (206'1"). Decathlon record-holder Todd Doughty (7,240 points) benefited from his time with Stimson as well, working his way from a walk-on to one of the top 20 decathletes in the country over the course of his career at W&M.

On the women's side, Stimson coached All-America high jumper Lisa Rayner to an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championships and a school-record mark of 5'11.25" in 1994. Wendy Warren, the school record-holder in the javelin (153'6"), was discovered in a physical education class and went on to earn All-East honors and place sixth at the ECAC Championships. Stimson coached pole vaulter Charlotte LaRoche to second place in the ECAC Championships and a school record of 13'1" in her freshman season. He then guided steady improvement throughout her career, culminating in 2004 with her second conference title and double All-East honors. Stimson has had numerous All-East performers in all of the field events.

A recent example of Stimson's coaching ability can be seen in 2004 graduate Chris Parsons. As a freshman, Parsons made a powerful debut, winning CAA titles in both the shot put and the javelin, enabling him to be selected for the United States Junior National

IC4A meet. In 2003 Parsons was named CAA Scholar-Athlete of the year, after earning a pair of all-conference honors by finishing second in both the shot and the hammer at the CAA Championships. Parsons capped his career in style, winning the 2004 CAA title in the shot and hammer and breaking the NCAA Regional mark in both events.

More Stimson-guided athletes litter the W&M and CAA record books. In 2005, Ayanna Jones claimed her second shot put title at the CAA Championships, the fifth-consecutive year a Tribe woman had won the event. She would go on to shatter the 23-year old school record in the event, putting the shot 48' 6" in the ECAC Championships. 2006 graduate Andy Smith became one of only two athletes in school history to claim four CAA crowns in one event (joining Tyler Steel, winner of the hammer throw from 1997-2000) after winning the javelin for the fourth time at the 2006 conference meet.

Perhaps no event in recent years shows the effect of Stimson's tutelage more than the women's heptathlon, where four athletes in the Green and Gold have won the last five CAA titles, and six of the seven ever contested, along with the last two ECAC crowns. Alarice Cesareo earned a pair of titles in 2001 and 2003, and Phi Beta Kappa-graduate Sarah McHale won in 2004. In 2005, Bonnie Meekins won her first title with a then-record score of 4,763 points, before giving way to classmate Brenna Blevins in 2006, who scored 4,806 points. In 2007, Meekins came back again with another meet record, 5,192 points. Similarly, Blevins won the 2006 ECAC crown with a then-school record total of 5,229, the highest point total not invited to the NCAA Championships that year. Meekins provided the breakthrough this past spring, powering to a score of 5,457 to claim the Eastern title, and a trip to the NCAA meet, where she would place 16th.



In the 2006 CAA hammer throw, Liz Hager capped her career in heroic fashion. Cleared to throw only an hour before the event started because of a back injury, Hager threw 151' 9" with her only attempt, good for second place and the third-best throw in school history. Freshman Abby Lemon took her lead from Hager, setting a personal record with each of her six throws and finishing with a toss of 149' 2" to take third place in her first conference championships.

The 2007 throwing corps provided another feather in Stimson's cap, providing a school record and numerous top-10 marks despite having a grand total of two upperclassmen. Sophomore Alex Heacock captured his first CAA title in the javelin, throwing 25 feet farther than anyone else in the meet.

Abby Lemon was only four inches shy of her own conference title in the hammer throw, but did claim the Colonial Relays title with a then-school record throw of 161' 9", a mark she bettered at the ECAC Championships with a prodigious heave of 163' 11". Senior Jen Showker capped her career with lifetime-best marks in the shot put, discus (144' 9"), and hammer (142' 0"). Her put of 45' 0.5" at the CAA Championships guaranteed her third and berth at the ECAC meet, and makes her one of only four women to ever best 45 feet in the shot put.

Stimson began his career at perennial national powerhouse Tennessee, where he helped Volunteer athletes finish in the nation's top 10 on seven occasions and collect 12 Southeastern Conference titles. His coaching career started at Tennessee as a graduate assistant, helping the Vols win the 1972 NCAA cross country championship. From Knoxville, he moved to J.E.B. Stuart High School in Falls Church, Virginia for one year, then on to Miami University (Ohio) for nine years before coming to Williamsburg.

A native of Falconer, New York, Stimson graduated with honors from Ohio University in 1971 and holds a master's degree from Miami (Ohio). As an undergraduate, he was the All-Ohio and Central Collegiate shot put champion, as well as a two-time MAC shot put champion. He concluded his athletic career by competing in both the NCAA and AAU national championships in the shot put.

Dan and his wife Rosemary, also a Falconer native, have two children. Their son, Clare, is a local college student. Daughter Krista Crider graduated from W&M in 1996 with a B.S. in biology and earned her master's degree at the College in 1998. She earned a Ph.D. in the field of genetics and molecular biology at Emory University, and works for the Centers for Disease Control. Krista is a former W&M record holder in the hammer throw, and recently welcomed the newest addition to the Stimson family, when Samuel Daniel Crider was born in April of 2006.

up his impressive freshman season with a sophomore campaign that featured top CAA finishes in the discus (fourth), javelin (third), hammer (second) and a second straight first-place showing in the shot put. Parsons went on to garner All-East honors in the hammer at the

Ed Moran is in his third season on the William and Mary staff after a spectacular collegiate career that saw him earn four All-America honors in the 5,000m outdoors (2003, 2005) and in cross country (2000, 2002) for the College. In addition to assisting with both the men's and women's running programs, the 2003 graduate has continued to race under the tutelage of head men's coach Alex Gibby, achieving the Olympic "A" qualifying standard at 5,000m and 10,000m in 2007 and winning the 5,000m gold medal at the Pan-American Games.

A professionally-sponsored runner with Nike, Moran raced unsponsored at the 2005 USAT&F Track and Field Championships shortly after earning his fourth All-America nod. He boasted an impressive debut, running well below his previous personal record

in the 5,000m (13:39.70, second-best in school history, set a scant month-and-a-half earlier) to finish in 13:25.87. This time placed him only 49 hundredths of a second shy of the school record, running as the fastest amateur in the field of 24 runners. In 2007, he won the gold medal at the Pan-American Games with a meet-record time of 13:25.60, and will compete for a spot at the Beijing Olympics in the 2008 U.S. Olympic Trials.

In his six-year collegiate career, Moran racked up three all-conference and All-Southeast honors (never finishing worse than third), and was twice conference champion and Athlete of the Year in cross country. On the track, he earned multiple all-conference nods, was named the 2003 CAA Male Athlete of the Year and was the 2005 IC4A and CAA champion in the 5,000m.

Sean Anastasia-Murphy joins his alma mater this year as a volunteer assistant after helping the Tribe to seven Colonial Athletic Association championships during his five-year career.

As a senior, Anastasia-Murphy was the College's top finisher at the CAA cross country championships, leading the team to the conference title with his fourth-place showing. He was also a part of the program's eighth-place showing at the NCAA Championships, finishing as the sixth Tribe harrier across the line. He also ran at the national meet in 2005, finishing 135th overall, and totaled three All-CAA, two All-East, and one All-Southeast honor in cross country.

Anastasia-Murphy, a native of Gloucester, Massachusetts, was also a standout on the track. In 2005 he ran 8:59.26 in the

3,000m steeplechase, the first time a Tribe runner had run under nine minutes since 1996. His most complete season came in 2007, and it started indoors with a 4:09.97 mile at the IC4A Championships. That placed him into the finals of the event, where he would eventually finish third for All-East honors. At the same meet, he won his first conference crown by running the lead-off leg of the distance medley relay which won the IC4A title. He would go on to win the Colonial Relays 3,000m steeplechase and the Penn Relays 4x800m outdoors, and ran at the NCAA Regional in the steeplechase for the third year in a row. He finished his career with five All-East accolades and a single All-CAA citation on the track.

William and Mary Blazes to Eighth at NCAA Championships

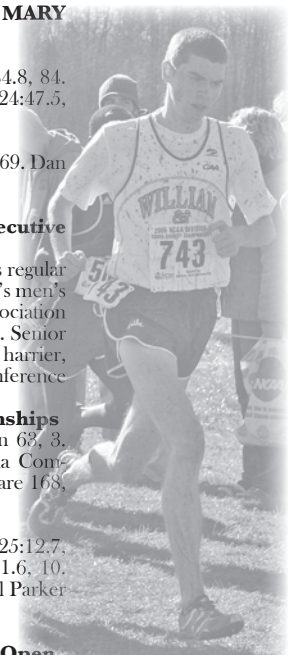

2007 OUTLOOK

After powering to its best finish at the NCAA Championships in over 30 years, not to mention capturing the IC4A title with its "B" team, the William and Mary men's cross country program is primed to challenge for a top-10 showing again at the national championships in 2007.

Leading the charge will be a quartet of experienced seniors. Any conversation must begin with two-time All-American **Christo Landry**, who will look to join Matt Lane as the only Tribe athletes with three All-America certificates in cross country. Landry redshirted during the outdoor track season, and after more than six months of continuous training, will be favored at most every meet he enters. Looking to earn his first All-America certificate will be **Ian Fitzgerald**, the 2005 Southeast Region third-place finisher. Fitzgerald qualified for the NCAA East Regional last spring after timing 13:57.35 for 5,000m, and was part of the IC4A-title winning distance medley relay indoors.

Adam Tenerowicz will re-enter the competitive arena in cross country for the first time since the 2005 NCAA Championships, and will be counted on to quickly ramp back up to the level of running that saw him earn all-region honors in 2004 and 2005. **Dave Mock** will also look for a top-100 finish at the NCAA Championships, and will also be a likely favorite for the CAA individual title. Mock, who placed fifth at last year's conference meet, is the highest-finishing W&M returnee and second-highest returnee overall. Redshirt-sophomore **Colin Leak** was the seventh runner at the NCAA Championships for the Tribe in 2006, and followed up in the spring with his second-straight runner-up showing in the CAA 10,000m.

Senior **Rob Dennis** figures to lead a pack of runners who will push to finish out the varsity squad. Dennis will look to become a full-time contributor to the Tribe's best effort, after racing at the Pre-National Invitational open race and leading the "B" team to the IC4A title with his fifth-place showing last fall. Redshirt-freshman **Patterson Wilhelm** will be close behind after winning the "B" race of the Colonial Inter-Regional in an unattached performance, and earning All-CAA honors and a pair of IC4A qualifications on the track. Classmate **Jeff Perrella** also redshirted the fall season in 2006, and earned an IC4A bid at 5,000m when he ran 14:35.59 at the Colonial Relays.

Seniors **James Picard** and **Dan MacKay** will each be counted on to provide either solid depth to the first seven, or exceptional leadership for the "B" team. Picard earned All-CAA and All-East accolades last fall, placing seventh at the IC4A meet, before qualifying for the IC4A 10,000m in the spring. MacKay has earned multiple IC4A-qualifications on the track, and raced at both the CAA and IC4A Championships last fall. Sophomore **Drew Midland** will look to join them, after earning All-East honors last fall and racing to personal-record times at 3,000m and 5,000m during the winter and spring.

The next set of athletes will be counted on to push the top runners hard and step up to the varsity squad where needed. Sophomore **Ben Massam** showed flashes of brilliance early in his freshman year, before illness forced him to the sidelines early in the track season. Junior **Jared Campbell** was just shy of earning All-CAA honors at last year's cross country championships, placing 15th before racing to 33rd at the IC4A meet. Classmate **Karl Lang** was the Tribe's fourth runner in the victory at the Tribe Open, and placed 45th at the IC4A Championships. Redshirt-sophomore **Harry Miller** will be seeing his first in-uniform cross country action this fall, after earning All-CAA honors last spring by finishing third in the 3,000m steeplechase.

A pair of middle-distance aces will contend for all-conference and All-East accolades on the trails to go along with their considerable accomplishments on the track. **David Groff** and **Ryan Jones** won IC4A titles in the 4x800m relay last spring as part of the team that ran 7:24.97, the 13th-best time in the United States this year. Groff, who was on both the CAA and

IC4A Championship squad last fall, also won the 1,500m titles at the CAA track championships and the Colonial Relays, the latter in a meet-record time of 3:46.98. Jones will be looking for his first in-uniform cross country appearance, but has finished third at 800m at the CAA Championships each of the past two years and also has a pair of All-East honors to go along with his 4x800m title.

Providing depth to the squad will be a mix of underclassmen, led by redshirt-juniors **Bryce Wilk** and **Ollie Ehlinger**. Wilk is a two-time runner-up at the IC4A Coaches race, and Ehlinger set personal records in every event he ran during the spring. Included in the group will be redshirt-sophomores **Charlie Swartz** and **Cabell Rosanelli**; and redshirt-freshmen **Jay Bilsborough**, **Sean Mahoney**, **Skeeter Morris**, **Robert Sagar**, and **Lewis Woodard**.

Joining the Tribe this year are eight highly accomplished freshmen from around the nation. **Peter Asaro** comes to the College from Gloucester, Massachusetts, where he finished third individually to lead the Fishermen to a fifth-place team finish at the All-State cross country meet. He ran 4:21.85 in the mile to take fifth at the all-state outdoor track championships, after finishing third indoors. **Tom Burke** earned all-state honors in both cross country and track in each of his last two years for Edina High in Minnesota, posting a best finish of eighth at the state cross country championships as a senior. He has run 4:15 for 1,600m and 9:10 for 3,200m while racking up six all-conference citations.

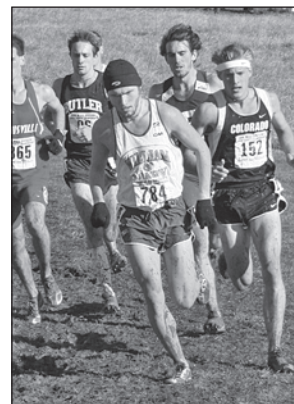
Andrew Mearns is no stranger to the College as he grew up in Williamsburg and earned six all-state honors at Jamestown High School. The 2007 Colonial Relays Champion in the boy's 3,000m (8:39.42), Mearns is a two-time runner-up in the 2,000m steeplechase at the AAU National Championships, and was named the 2007 *Virginia Gazette* Runner of the Year. **Paul Norland** ran for Thomas Jefferson High in Virginia, the same program as Landry and 2007 graduate **Keith Bechtol**. As a senior, he earned four all-state accolades, finishing 11th at the Virginia AAA cross country meet, fourth in the indoor 3,200m, second in the indoor 4x800m, and third in the outdoor 3,200m. He has run 9:20.11 for 3,200m.

Sean Sewell is a six-time North Carolina Independent School state champion, and was named Performer of the Meet at the outdoor championships in 2007. Sewell has posted career-best marks of 4:15 in the mile and 9:25 for 3,200m. **Brian Sklodowski** won seven Delaware state titles in track and cross country, and added a pair of titles at the Meet of Champions for good measure during his tenure at the Tatnall School. Named State Runner of the Year five times, three in cross country, two in track, Sklodowski is the state all-divisions record holder at 1,600m (4:11.93) and 3,200m (9:16.80).

Axel Stanovsky has come the longest distance of any recruit, as he did his prep running at Everett High in Everett, Washington. The 1,600m and 3,200m district champ as a senior, Stanovsky has run 4:18 and 9:28, respectively, at those distances. **Chris Tyson** ran for the late Bill Findler '70 at Washington-Lee in Arlington, cruising to the Virginia AAA state title in the indoor 1,000m with a time of 2:31.05. He also earned all-state mention outdoors, taking eighth in the mile. His best effort at one mile was a 4:13.64 showing at the Penn Relays. He was an All-American indoors in the mile after finishing fifth at the NSIC championships, and was the 3,000m runner-up at the Colonial Relays.

GENE R. NICHOL PRESIDENT

Gene R. Nichol became the 26th president of the College of William and Mary on July 1, 2005.

Before returning to Williamsburg, where he taught two decades ago, Nichol was Burton Craige Professor and Dean of the law school at the University of North Carolina. He served as Law Dean at the University of Colorado from 1988 to 1995, and as James Gould Cutler Professor and Director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law at William and Mary

from 1985 to 1988. Nichol was also a faculty member at the University of Florida and West Virginia University. He founded the Byron R. White Center for the Study of American Constitutional Law at the University of Colorado (1990) and the Center for Civil Rights at the University of North Carolina (2001).

Nichol teaches courses in constitutional law and civil rights. He is the co-author of *Federal Courts: Cases, Comments, and Questions* (West, 2000) and a contributor to *Where We Stand: Voices of Southern Dissent* (NewSouth Books, 2004). Nichol has published articles and essays in the *Harvard Law Review*, the *Yale Law Journal*, the *University of Chicago Law Review*, the *University of Pennsylvania Law Review*, the *Michigan Law Review*, the *California Law Review*, the *Virginia Law Review* and an array of other leading legal journals. From 1998 to 1999, he was a political columnist for the *Rocky Mountain News* and the *Colorado Daily*. From 1999 to 2005, he was a regular op-ed writer for the *Raleigh News & Observer*. He has also written for *The Nation* and other periodicals.

Nichol has been significantly involved in public affairs. He has testified before a number of committees of the United States Congress and various state legislatures. In 1991, he was appointed special master by a three-judge federal court in Colorado to mediate a redistricting dispute between the governor and the legislature. The accord was ratified by statute. A year later he helped head the Colorado Reapportionment Commission. In 2004, Nichol led the North Carolina Bi-Partisan Commission on Lobbying Reform; legislation was passed enacting commission recommendations. He ran unsuccessfully for national political office while in Colorado. He has been elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

In 2003, Nichol won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day address. Two years later, Governor Michael Easley inducted Nichol into the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the state of North Carolina's highest civilian honor, and the national judicial access organization, Equal Justice Works, named him outstanding law school dean of the year.

At the College of William and Mary, Nichol has markedly increased access for students of color. He also created the Gateway William and Mary program, an innovative financial aid program that puts a quality education within the reach of all Virginians, regardless of their ability to pay.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played varsity football. He obtained his J.D. from the University of Texas, graduating Order of the Coif in 1976. He is married to Glenn George, a scholar of employment and labor law and a member of the faculty at the William and Mary's Marshall-Wythe School of Law. They have three daughters: Jesse (19), Jenny (18), and Soren (14).

SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR CHANCELLOR

Sandra Day O'Connor, one of the most distinguished jurists in the history of the United States Supreme Court—and its first female justice—addressed the most profound legal issues of her age with wisdom, courage, and skill. After a long career in public service, including nearly a quarter century on the nation's highest court, she retired in 2006.

Justice O'Connor spent her childhood on an isolated cattle ranch in southeastern Arizona tending to a variety of ranch chores, raising farm animals, and reading voraciously. After completing school in El Paso, Texas, she journeyed west to continue her education at Stanford University, where her professors inspired and challenged her to make a difference in her nation and the world.

Justice O'Connor earned a B.A. in economics (magna cum laude) from Stanford University and a LL.B. from Stanford Law School. She was an editor of the law review and graduated third in her law class—two spots behind her friend and future colleague, the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist.

After being admitted to the bar, Justice O'Connor served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the U.S. Army Quartermaster Market Center in Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms, during which she served as Majority Leader. In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She succeeded the Honorable Henry A. Kissinger as Chancellor of the College of William and Mary in 2005. In the year since her investiture, she has visited the College several times, visiting classes, talking with students, and addressing two academic conferences.

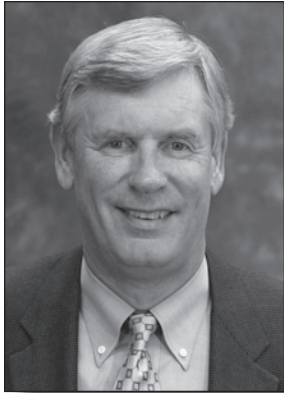
She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, whom she met in law school. They have three sons: Scott, Brian, and Jay.

ADMINISTRATION



TERRY DRISCOLL **ATHLETICS DIRECTOR**

Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 12th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that William and Mary President Gene Nichol proclaimed "The nation's gold standard" when it came to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last four years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 19 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Swimming and Women's Tennis). In 2004-05, the Tribe captured five CAA championships and an Atlantic 10 Football title. As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no team in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 88 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has twice posted a 100 percent graduation rate, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 22 individuals receive the honor.

Despite the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). The total increased significantly when Driscoll announced plans to build the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium, which is scheduled to open in time for the 2008 season. This impressive structure follows closely on the heels of the installation of a \$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006) and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006) inside the stadium. Yet another significant upgrade will be unveiled inside the venerable structure for 2007, as the department will install an \$800,000-plus brand new video scoreboard by the season opener.

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associ-

ates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



BARB BLOSSER **SENIOR EXECUTIVE** **ASSOCIATE AD/SWA**

Few names in the William and Mary Athletics Department are as familiar, or respected, as that of Senior Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser. Since first arriving on campus in 1978, Blosser has touched the lives of thousands of Tribe student-athletes.

She has held her current title since April of 2004, after spending the previous 12 years as the associate athletics director. In each role, Blosser has served as an integral part of nearly every facet of the department's daily operations.

Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a then school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the assistant to the associate athletics director. Over the past 17 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

TRIBE ATHLETICS



ATHLETIC SUCCESS

The 2006-07 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 88.

The men's cross country squad won its seventh consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fourth straight. The women's swimming team won its first CAA Championship, while the women's tennis team added its 19th all-time CAA crown in the spring.

Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic reached the title match of the NCAA Doubles Championship, earning All-America honors. Katie Radloff became the first female swimmer to advance to the NCAA's since 1983. Additionally, Keith Bechtol raced to a 14th-place finish in the 10,000m, while Bonnie Meekins placed 16th in the heptathlon at the NCAA Track and Field Championships.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities.

This year, the NCAA honored 13 W&M teams as recipients of its public recognition award. The Tribe teams recognized are baseball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Additionally, in the latest NCAA graduation rate reports, three Tribe teams posted 100% graduation rates, including football, women's basketball and women's cross country/track.

Since 1992, 39 student-athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including three in the past academic year. Keith Bechtol (men's track) was a First-Team selection, Ryan Overdevest (men's soccer) was a Second-Team selection and Anna Young (women's soccer) was a Third-Team selection.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 22 winners. Bechtol was the CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in both cross country and track and field, bringing his career award total to five. Meghan Bishop (women's cross country) earned her fourth CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year award in the fall in cross country.

In addition, four of W&M's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.

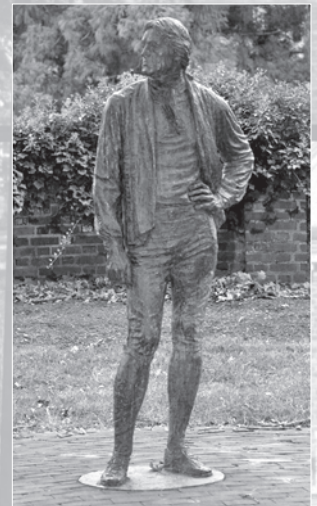
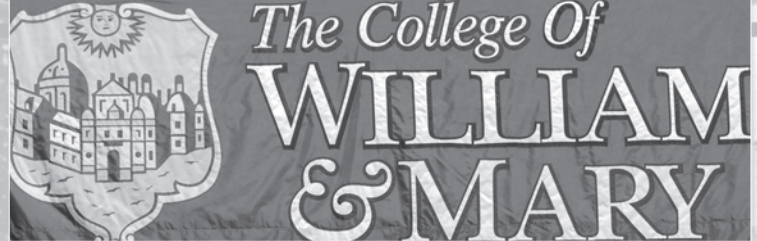
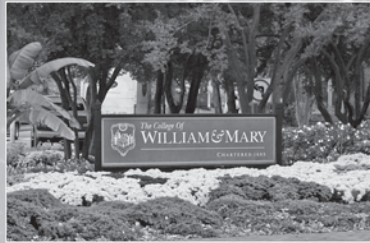
For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).

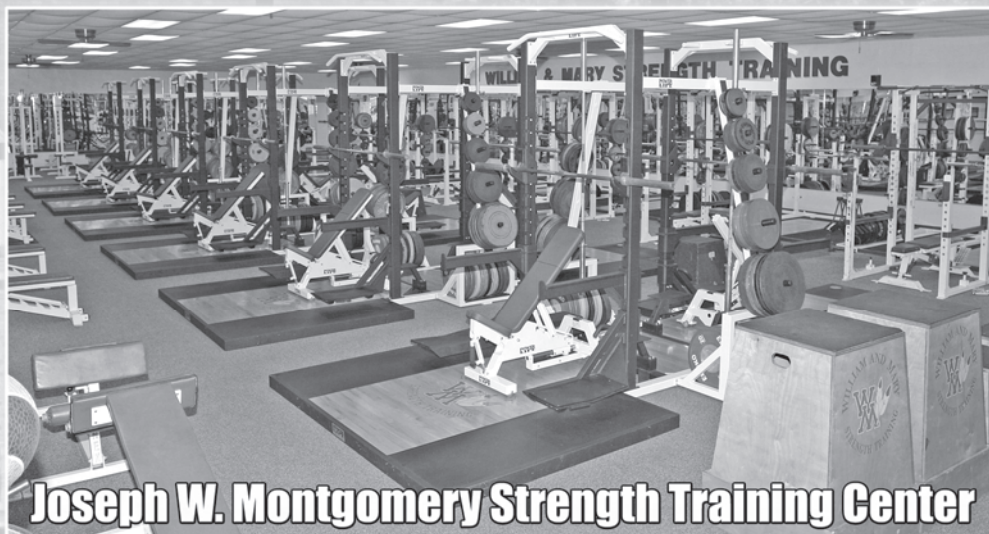

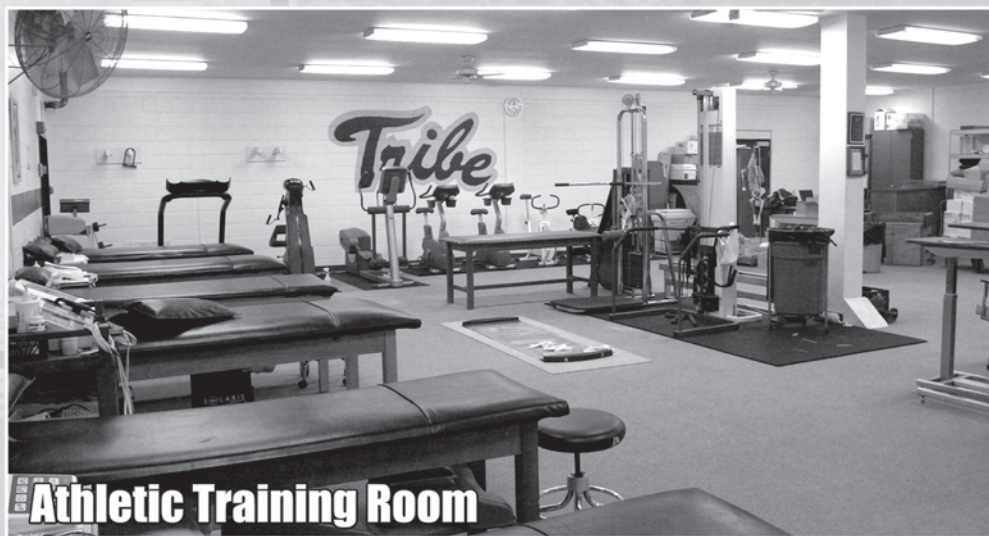
Athletics Department Goals

Sports Psychology

Compliance, Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to ensure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength, Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

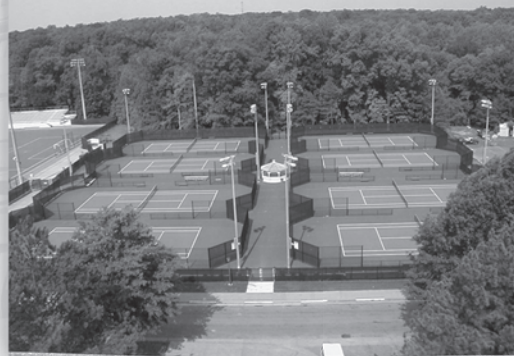
