William and Mary football begins its 25th season under head coach Jimmye Laycock Saturday. The winningest coach in Tribe history, Laycock has compiled a 159-110-2 record in 24 seasons at the helm of the Tribe. Today's game marks the third consecutive season W&M has opened at a Division I-A opponent and the fifth consecutive year that the Tribe schedule has featured a I-A opponent. W&M is 0-11-2 all-time against the Tar Heels, 0-2 under Laycock, with UNC winning the last meeting, 59-36, in 1991.



Quick Slant

Note of the Week: Campbell threw 22 touchdown passes in 2003, which matched the fifth-best single-season total in school history (Knight, 1993; Hakel, 1990).

The rising senior from Winchester, VA emerged with a breakout season last fall, his first campaign as the Tribe's starter. Campbell completed 182 of 285 passes, with 22 touchdowns and just seven interceptions. He averaged over 243 passing yards per game in conference play, with a pass efficiency rating of 156.7. Campbell finished the season as the league's leader in passing yards per game (229.6) and pass efficiency (152.1), while finishing second in total offense (259.6). Campbell's passer rating was seventh in the country, while he ranked 18th nationally in total offense. His improvisational skills

give the Tribe an added dimension at QB, as he possesses the ability to run or throw. He has an excellent understanding of the offense and his work in the offseason to improve arm strength should pay dividends this fall.

At the beginning of last season, all questions centered on the quarterback position and how Lang Campbell would respond as a first-year starter. Now that Lang has answered all concerns by coming into this season as a first-team all-conference selection, what areas can he improve on?

Coming into his senior year, I think the things he worked on is: one, He's put on some weight and added some strength, I think playing the entire year got the point across to him that he needs to be a little more physical to play quarterback. Two, We evaluated his progress in our offense and worked at giving him more flexibility and more decisions to make. We've put more pressure on his shoulders with respect to making decisions at the line of scrimmage. We're trying to give him more input and more opportunity within our offense.

The wide receiver position has a notable void with the departure of the school's all-time leading receiver in Rich Musinski. The likely players to replace him have experience with Dominique Thompson, Josh Lustig and Jon Pitts all returning as seniors. Can you talk about their individual strengths and your expectations for the receivers this year?

Well, they all have had good games and have played well at times in the past, but the point that we're making, the point they have to understand is that they've got to play consistently, week-in and week-out, play after play. They don't have the luxury of a fallback in Rich. In the past, if they got open, they got it thrown to them. If not, we had Rich to make the big play. But, now, they've got to all be counted into our passing game at all times. They've all got to be performers. They've all got to be ready. They've all got to have their assignments down and do it the best they can every snap, every week. Once again, I don't see us just going to one receiver that much, I see us having the ability to go to any and all of them and they've all got to be ready to perform.

The team has a new defensive coordinator in Jim Pletcher. How would you characterize his defense and, I know it's early, but how have the players adapted to his system thus far?

Well, anyone can change things around. But I think we needed to change our attitude and be a little more consistent. I think we can get better on defense, and I think player-wise we've improved a bit over last year. I'm hoping, as the season goes on we continue to get better and will grow as the season unfolds. My expectation is that we will become more cohesive and coordinated together insofar as everybody's understanding each other's role. We're still a pretty young defense, we don't have that many seniors or that much experience. It's going to be a situation where we're going to have to make up for experience with a bit of enthusiasm and effort.

Your secondary hopes to be bolstered by the return of cornerback Stephen Cason. How has he looked at camp so far and what kind of lift do you expect from him to come back from rehab on such a serious injury?

Well, Stephen's a very positive individual and he's

worked extremely hard to get to where he is right now. He's rotating in and out and maybe is showing some signs of rust and inexperience, which is to be expected. Aside from that, he has set a pretty good example for our guys. You've got pretty good competition back there for some of the positions in the secondary during preseason. Competition is something I think should help everyone improve.

It's been much publicized that this year marks your 25th season as head coach at W&M. No active coach in 1-AA has been in their program longer. What areas of your job do you look forward to most as you get ready for each season?

Well, other than the conference calls? Every year's a challenge when you're dealing with different players, coordinating it altogether, putting together the team, and it's a challenge but it's exciting. It's exciting dealing with different players and piecing together their roles. It's always something new and it's always something different.

North Carolina struggled on defense last year; a lot has been made of that. Do you feel that translates to this year? Or translate to playing a 1-AA team? How does that factor in, if at all?

Well, it's all relative. They struggled within their league and by every indication they've made some major additions to their defense. They've also made some personnel additions that no question, on paper, looks like it really strengthens their defense. And again, not even to mention the matchup with us, anytime we go against a 1-A team we've got to worry about the physical matchups.

You're basically faced against Darian Durant on offense, with a new defensive coordinator. What's it going to be like going down to play in Chapel Hill?

Hang on! I mean, they've got a lot of talent on offense. Darian Durant at quarterback, Ronnie McGill at running back, they've got tremendous depth in the wide receiver corps. They did a great job. Take a look at last year, they moved the football on everybody. We've just got to hang in there, play hard, line up and get ready for the next one, and really try to eliminate the big play.

This year, you go to UNC with the new defensive unit and a young team. How do you keep your team focused in a big-time college atmosphere like Chapel Hill?

Well, you focus on the specifics of the game and you hope they can adjust to the environment. That is going to be an issue. Hopefully, they will refocus and keep their focus on playing their position, their techniques, following their assignment and not getting involved in all the periphery stuff. With that said, that may be wishful thinking on my part. There are going to be some younger guys who will be in awe a little bit and some of the older guys will talk to them. But it's part of the experience. It's part of learning, and it's part of challenging yourself.

VS. NORTH CAROLINA SEPT. 4

Silver Linings: **Jimmye Laycock** begins his 25th season as the Tribe's head coach Saturday afternoon. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 159-110-2 career record at W&M. He ranks fifth on the A-10 career victories lists (59), only three behind former Richmond and Massachusetts coach Jim Reid. W&M has made seven postseason appearances under Laycock and posted winning ledgers in 17 of the past 21 seasons.

Good Company: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock, who is entering his 25th season on the W&M sidelines, ranks third among all current Division I-A and Division I-AA head coaches in terms of most years at their current school. The two coaches ahead of Laycock are Penn State's Joe Paterno (37 years) and Florida State's Bobby Bowden (26 years).

Opening Day: Saturday, William and Mary begins its 109th season of football. The College's all-time record is 484-481-41 (.501) and only 16 Division I-AA teams have played more games in their history than the College. Since the first Tribe football season began in 1893, W&M is 57-49-3 (.537) in season-openers and 11-13 under Laycock. W&M has won seven of its last 13 season-opening games. In Laycock's 24 seasons at the helm, W&M has opened the year at home seven times, winning each time. The last time the Tribe opened the season at home was in 1997, crushing Hampton, 31-6. W&M has opened the season against a I-A foe nine times under Laycock, losing each time.

Top-Notch Competition: The 2004 campaign will mark the seventh consecutive season that W&M has faced a Division I-A opponent, which is the longest current streak in the Atlantic 10. In the last 20 years, the Tribe has faced over 25 I-A opponents, including 20 from the current BCS conferences. The last W&M win over a I-A opponent was in 1998, when the Tribe downed Temple, 45-38. A Look Back In Time: The W&M-UNC series began in 1907 with the Tar Heels claiming a 14-0 victory. At one point, the two schools were both members of the Southern Conference competing annually from 1944 to 1950. During that span, W&M went 0-5-2 against UNC, salvaging ties in 1944 (0-0) and 1948 (7-7). After leaving the SoCon in 1953 to become a charter member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, the W&M-UNC series was not renewed until 1971, when the Heels escaped with a narrow 36-35 victory in Chapel Hill. The last meeting took place in 1991, with UNC posting a 59-36 win. Read more about the last meeting between W&M and UNC below.

Coaching Connections: Current Tribe running backs coach **Steven Jerry** was a four-year letter winner at UNC from 1990-1993. Jerry caught two passes for

20 yards in the Tar Heels 21-17 victory over Mississippi State in the 1993 Peach Bowl.

UNC offensive line coach Hal Hunter began his collegiate coaching career as an assistant coach on Laycock's staff at W&M in 1982. Carolina's running backs coach, Andre Powell, made stops at VMI ('92) and URI ('93-94), both regular W&M opponents, during his career. Powell and Tribe assistant head coach **Bob Solderitch** were both members of the VMI staff in 1994.

Down right offensive: The College closed the 2003 season on a four-game winning streak, a run that will be severely tested by I-A opponent UNC on Saturday. At the root of the four-game win streak, the Tribe's high-powered offense clicking on all cylinders.

In its final four games last season, the Tribe averaged 458 yards of total offense, including 215 rushing YD/GM, as opposed to 333 yards of total offense and 110 rushing yards per game in its first six contests (1-5) of 2003.

Complementing the team's rushing attack during the win streak was Campbell's precision passing. In the final four games of 2003, the Tribe signal caller completed 67 of 104 (64.4%) pass attempts for 972 yards and seven touch-

downs, against just one interception.

Campbell's Campaign: In his quest for All-America honors, senior quarterback Lang Campbell looks to build on an outstanding 2003 season. Here is a quick look back at Campbell's junior season:

Campbell's 2003 Season

- Completed 182 of 285 passes for 2,296 yards with 22 touchdowns and just seven interceptions.
- Led the A-10 in passing yards per game (229.6) and pass efficiency (152.1), while finishing second in total offense (259.6).
- Finished second on the team with 300 rushing yards on 77 attempts, averaging nearly four yards per carry.
- His 22 touchdown passes matched the fifth-best single-season total in school history, while his 2,596 yards of total offense ranked as the 10th-best season in school history.
- Averaged 243 passing yards in the Tribe's final four games, all victories, completing 64% of his passes (67-104) with nine touchdowns and just one interception.
- Threw for over 200 yards in each of the last seven games and tossed at least three touchdown passes in five of the 10 contests.
- Became the sixth W&M QB to win the league's efficiency title since the Tribe

THE LAST MEETING

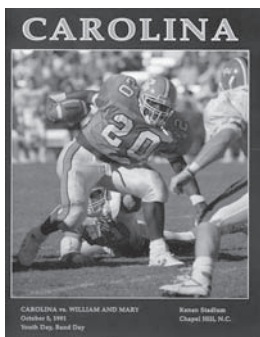
The Tar Heels broke a 7-7 tie after the opening period with three second-quarter touchdowns and racked up 309 rushing yards to run past the Tribe, 59-36, on Oct. 5, 1991, in Chapel Hill.

In the second quarter, UNC scored on 23-yard run by junior Randy Jordan and got two special teams scores from senior Eric Blount, who returned a punt 76 yards for a touchdown and once again found paydirt on a 93-yard kickoff return as the Tar Heels took a 31-13 lead at intermission.

The Tar Heels extended their lead to 45-13 early in the third, after consecutive touchdown runs from sophomore Natrone Means and Jordan. Jordan rushed for 153 yards on the day with three touchdowns, while sophomore Natrone Means carried 19 times for 78 yards and also found the end zone three times.

For W&M, senior quarterback Chris Hakel completed 27 of 41 pass attempts for 324 yards and two touchdowns, as the Tribe held a 397-152 advantage in passing yards. Each team recorded 25 first downs in the game, and the Tribe outgained the Tar Heels 479-449 in total offense.

Hakel's passing performance at UNC still ranks as the 19th-best single-game effort in school history. He went on to throw for 2,974 yards that season, which is the fourth-best season total in W&M history.

•Threw for more than 250 yards in four straight games last season (UD, UMass, JMU, URI), becoming the first Tribe QB to do so since the 1990 season when 2004 W&M Hall of Fame Inductee Chris Hakel surpassed the 250-yard barrier five-straight times between the season's sixth and 10th games.

•In conference games, Campbell led the A-10 in total offense (272.8), pass efficiency (156.7) and passing yards per game (243.5).

W&M vs. ACC: Since the Atlantic Coast Conference was formed in 1953, W&M has posted a 10-30 (.250) record against ACC opponents. If you count games the Tribe played against current ACC teams Florida State, Virginia Tech and Miami before they joined the conference, W&M's all-time record against current ACC teams since 1953 is 17-59-1. The last ACC team W&M faced was N.C. State in 1999, with the Wolfpack coming away as 38-9 victors. The last victory over an ACC team for W&M came in 1986, when the Tribe downed state-rival Virginia, 41-37, in Charlottesville.

Player Connections: The Tribe has five players on its roster that hail from the Tar Heel state: **Dominique Thompson** (Durham/Riverside H.S.), **John Pitts, Jr.** (Kernersville/East Forsyth), **Derek Cox** (Winterville/J.H. Rose), **Brian Williamson** (Nakina/Whiteville) and **Adam O'Connor** (Greensboro/Ragsdale).

Overall, UNC has seven players from the Old Dominion, including four that came from the same high school as a current Tribe player. W&M sophomore **Corey Davis** and UNC freshman Antwain Carey are both products of Deep Creek H.S. in Chesapeake, Tribe freshman **Jerrett Brown** and UNC sophomore Kareen Taylor both attended Hopewell

H.S., W&M freshman **Kevin Allen** and Tar Heel freshman Wyatt Hicks were teammates at Highland Springs H.S. last year and Tribe freshman **Ryan Skibinski** and UNC sophomore Jon Hamlett are graduates of Jefferson Forest H.S. in Lynchburg.

Double Vision: The W&M football roster features two sets of identical twins in **Trevor** and **Travis McLaurin** and **Corey** and **Craig Patterson**. Trevor McLaurin wears No. 52 and plays middle line-backer, while brother Travis sports jersey number 23 and plays tailback. Craig (No. 5) and Corey Patterson (No. 6) are both defensive backs.

A-10 vs. Division I-A: In addition to W&M's battle in Chapel Hill Saturday, another A-10 team will be taking on a I-A opponent, less than 40 miles away, as Richmond visits N.C. State at 6 p.m.

Overall, there are a conference-record tying eight games in 2004 featuring A-10 teams against I-A opponents. Atlantic 10 teams enter the 2004 campaign looking to knock off a I-A team for the third consecutive season, a feat that has not been duplicated since the 1998-2000 seasons. Last year, two A-10 teams knocked off I-A opponents, as Delaware defeated Navy (21-17) and Villanova downed Temple (23-20, 2 OT). Here is a list of the A-10 vs. Division I-A in 2004:

No Flags on the Play: Discipline is certainly one trademark of Laycock's program, and 2004 was no different as W&M was the least penalized team in the A-10 (50) and yielded the fewest penalty yards among conference schools (40.6 yards per game, 406 total penalty yards).

In fact, the Tribe had 17 fewer penalties and 87 less penalty yards than the next closest league opponent (Richmond, 67 for 493 yards).

More on the McLaurin's: The McLaurin twins each made significant contribu-

tions last season, and the 2004 campaign should be no different. **Travis** (pictured above) earned third-team all-conference honors last season after recording 120 tackles in his first season as a starter, while **Trevor** emerged as one of the Tribe's top rushing threats late last season.

Travis earned A-10 Defensive Player of the Week honors in October after a 13-tackle effort against Massachusetts, and Trevor was the A-10 Rookie of the Week after scoring three TDs in a win over New Hampshire in November.

Keepin' It Rolling: After averaging about 110 rushing yards through its first six games in 2003, the Tribe's ground attack rolled out an average of 215 rushing yards per game in the final four contests, all W&M victories. One of the main reasons for the increased rushing output was the consistent play of the offensive line, which bodes well for the 2004 season as five starters return.

Senior **Matthew Witham** started all 10 games at right tackle last season, while junior **Ryan Lumm** equaled the feat at left guard. Junior **Michael Grenz** also started 10 games in 2003, filling in for injured starter **Patrick Mulloy** at center for three games, before moving to right

tackle for the final seven. Mulloy returned from injury to start the final seven games at center and will once again anchor the o-line this season. Sophomore **Cody Morris**, who started one game in 2003, will be the regular at right guard.

Behind the big men, a stable of viable running options will exist in senior tailback **Jon Smith**, sophomore transfer **Elijah Brooks**, sophomore tailback **Trevor McLaurin**, sophomore fullback **LeVince Parrot** and redshirt freshman **Tony Viola**.

Return to Form: Senior tailback **Jon Smith**, an all-conference performer in 2002, is looking to rebound from an injury-plagued campaign in 2003 and once again assert himself as the Tribe's feature running threat.

Smith needs just 363 yards to crack the top 10 list of all-time rushing yards in W&M history. He has four 100-yard games to his credit, including a career-best 198-yard performance against New Hampshire in 2002.

Battling through injuries last season, Smith was still a productive back, gaining 212 yards on the ground in seven games with a pair of TDs. He also caught eight passes for 85 yards and another score.

Cason Back in Action: Prior to the start of fall camp, junior corner **Stephen Cason** was cleared to return to the playing field for the 2004 season, after missing all of last year with a severe neck injury suffered in a car accident prior to the start of the 2003 campaign.

As a redshirt freshman in 2002, Cason started 10 of the 11 games he played in, making 47 tackles, 34 solo, and recording three interceptions and eight pass breakups. In addition to his defensive duties, Cason returned seven kickoffs for the Tribe and led the squad with an averaged of 28.1 yards per kickoff return.

In perhaps his best individual performance with the Tribe, Cason earned A-10 Rookie of the Week Honors after making eight tackles, intercepting a pass and blocking a field goal against JMU in 2002.

Through the Air: Going hand-in-hand with the late-season increase in rushing production, the Tribe's total offensive figures dramatically improved over the final four games, as W&M upped its per game total offense average to 458 yards from 333 in the first six games of 2003.

One of the major reasons for the overall increased offensive production, the performance of quarterback Lang Campbell. In 2003, the Tribe averaged 230.6 passing yards per game, which marked the eighth consecutive season that the College has averaged better than 210 yards per game in the air. The last time W&M failed to averaged 210 passing yards per game for a season was in 1995 (160.5 yards per game), which was also the Tribe's worst output of total yards since joining the Atlantic 10 (357.5 yards per game).

A Tradition of QBs: With **Lang Campbell** earning third-team all-conference honors in 2003, it marked the sixth consecutive season that a W&M quarterback earned all-conference recognition of some kind. In fact, a Tribe signal caller has garnered all-conference accolades in 10 of the 12 seasons that W&M has been in the Atlantic 10.

In the Zone: Putting points on the board is the objective of any offensive drive, however when the team advances inside the opponent's 20-yard line the task becomes imperative. In 2003, W&M con-

verted a very respectable 30 of 36 (.833) trips inside the opponent's "red-zone" into points (21 TDs, nine FGs).

In its final two games of the season, the College scored on nine of its 11 ventures into the red-zone. Despite suffering a very uncharacteristic pair of turnovers in the red-zone against UNH, the Tribe converted three of its five chances inside the Wildcats' 20-yard line into scores (2 TDs, FG). In the season finale at Richmond, W&M was a perfect 6-for-6 on the afternoon in the red-zone, piling up six touchdowns on the Spiders.

Two the Point: The Tribe converted four two-point conversions in five attempts in 2003, which was the league standard. The team's only miss on the year came at Northeastern, when a misfired extra-point snap resulted in a failed scramble by Lang Campbell. The only other A-10 team with more than one two-point conversion was New Hampshire, which recorded three.

Splitting the Up-rights: One of the key components of the Tribe's success in the red-zone last season was the accuracy and strength of Tribe kicker **Greg Kuehn**. Kuehn made 13 of 18 field-goal attempts in 2003 and converted all 30 of his PAT attempts. He led the league and ranked eighth nationally with 1.3 field goals per game and ranked sixth in the A-10 in overall scoring with 6.9 points per game.

When looking at the place kicking position for the College, there is certainly a legacy of success under Jimmie Laycock. In the previous 12 seasons W&M has been in the A-10, a Tribe kicker has earned all-conference honors of some variety in seven of those years. Steve Christie (1989) and Brett Sterba (1999) have garnered All-America recognition at the position in recent years.

Two seasons into his collegiate career, Kuehn's accomplishments already rank him amongst the College's best at his position, as he has converted 27 of his 39 career attempts (.692). With 27 field goals in his first two seasons, Kuehn trailed only Brett Sterba's 28 between 1998-99 for the most by a Tribe kicker in his first two seasons as a starter.

An NFL veteran, Christie holds the school record for career field goals with 57, accumulated between the 1986 and

1989 seasons. Only two other players have kicked all four seasons in a Tribe uniform: Brian Shallcross (1993-97) and Brian Morris (1982-85).

Preseason All-Conference Awards: All-American candidate **Lang Campbell**, linebacker **Travis McLaurin** and tight end **Adam Bratton** all earned preseason first team All-Atlantic 10 honors, while specialists **Greg Kuehn** and **Mike Mesi** each garnered second-team honors.

Campbell, a co-captain, led the league in passing yards per game (229.6) and pass efficiency (152.1) in 2003, en route to third team all-conference accolades. McLaurin was also a third-team A-10 selection last year, after making 120 tackles and recording three sacks, an interception and a fumble recovery. Bratton saw action in all 10 games last season, making six starts, and caught seven passes for 77 yards.

Kuehn, a two-time all-conference performer, has led the Tribe in scoring each of the last two seasons. Perfect on extra-point attempts in 2003, Kuehn nailed 30 of 30 PATs and converted 13 of 18 field goal attempts with a long of 49 yards. Mesi averaged 41.2 yards per punt last season and had 14 kicks downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line, which earned him second team all-conference status.
