William and Mary and VMI will meet for the 61st consecutive season on Saturday and the 82nd time overall. The Tribe has won 18-straight in the series, including last year's 34-24 win in Lexington, and have not lost to the Keydets since 1985. W&M is coming off a 9-7 upset victory at 10th-ranked New Hampshire last week in its conference-opener, while VMI dropped to 0-3 with a 16-10 loss to Tennessee Tech on homecoming in Lexington on Saturday.

## LANG CAMPBELL

#### THE CAMPBELL FILE

Senior, QB, 6-3, 205

**Hometown:** Winchester, Va. **High School:** Handley

Major: History and Economics

Honors/Awards: Preseason honorablemention All-American by I-AA.org, preseason first-team all-conference, third-team all-conference in 2003, two-time academic all-conference selection (2002, 2003. A-10 Offensive Player of the Week Sept. 4.

Note of the Week: Campbell needs only 24 passing yards to reach 3,000 for his career, which would make him the 10th player in W&M history to reach the 3,000-yard mark.

#### CAMPBELL'S 2004 CLIPS

- Thrown at least one TD pass in 11 of 12 career starts.
- Needs just 24 passing yards to reach 3,000 for his career.
- Ranks 10th on the W&M career passing yards list.
- Has been intercepted only once in last 175 pass attempts, including 104-straight w/o one.
- At UNC, became first W&M QB to pass and run for two TDs since David Corley did it vs. Maine in 2001.

The senior from Winchester, VA emerged with a breakout season last fall and has picked up right where he left off.

In the season-opener at UNC, Campbell threw for a career-high 322 yards, surpassing the 300-yard mark for the first time in his career. He completed 23 of 41 attempts and threw a pair of TD passes

against the Tar Heels. He also ran for a pair of scores and was the Tribe's second-leading rusher with 35 yards. He became the first Tribe quarterback to run and pass for two TDs in a game, since David Corley, Jr. did it in 2001.

Slowed by heavy rains and poor field conditions, Campbell was efficient at UNH, throwing for 148 yards on 11 for 23 passing and running for 42 yards on 14 attempts. His play-making ability was on full display against the Wildcats, running for several key first downs that kept the Tribe's three scoring drives alive, including a brilliant 21-yard jaunt late in the third quarter on which he appeared to have been stopped behind the line of scrimmage.



#### Campbell's Career vs. VMI

W&M is 3-0 in Campbell's career against VMI, and the senior has posted impressive numbers against the Keydets. His first career passing TD came against VMI in 2001, and in the 2002 game, Campbell recorded his only passing and rushing TDs of the season. Last year, he threw for 167 yards and 3 TDs against the Keydets and was the team's leading rusher with 52 yards on 17 attempts.



#### TRIBE HEAD COACH

## JIMMYE LAYCOCK

Silver Linings: Jimmye Laycock is in his 25th season as the Tribe's head coach. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 160-111-2 career record at W&M. He ranks fifth on the A-10 career victories lists (59), only two behind former Richmond and Massachusetts coach Jim Reid. W&M has made seven postseason appearances under Laycock and posted winning ledgers in 17 of the past 21 seasons.

Good Company: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock, in his 25th season on the W&M sidelines, ranks third among all current Division I-A and Division I-AA head coaches in terms of most years at their current school. The two coaches ahead of Laycock are Penn State's Joe Paterno (37 years) and Florida State's Bobby Bowden (26 years).

Quotes from Monday's A-10 Coaches Conference Call...

Can you talk about Saturday's game? I'm sure you've been able to dry off and get the mud off by now.

Yeah we've dried out now. It was obviously tough conditions and I thought both teams competed and played very, very hard. You have to be impressed with both teams holding onto the football and not turning it over repeatedly. We had one turnover and UNH had none. That's a great accomplishment for them. But again, I think you know, we won it by coming up with some defensive plays when we needed to and with some outstanding plays in the kicking game. Of course, Greg Kuehn was instrumental with the three field goals. That was as tough a condition as you could imagine kicking in. I thought our kickoff and punt coverage teams were excellent. I thought we did a very, very good job in those areas.

You mentioned the turnovers. How do you prepare for weather and how do you prevent turnovers, because other teams in this league weren't able to do that on Saturday?

I don't think there is any real way to completely prepare. You have to be lucky, a little bit too and again we don't do anything other than emphasize with our players abourt ball security. It's something you do daily. You don't just wait until it rains before you talk about holding on the ball. You emphasize [ball security] and our guys have been pretty good with that all the time. We just keep

working at it and do the best we can. The only turnover we had was on a snap when the ball stuck in the mud and our center couldn't get it up, and it just kind of went to the side. It really never hit the quarterback's hand or anybody's hand. That was the only turnover we had.

William and Mary gave North Carlolina the devil obviously, Maine goes down and wins at Mississippi St., New Hampshire won at Rutgers and you beat New Hampshire. Has something changed in I-AA that's making these sort of results more common?

I don't know if anything's changed. I think the entire league is very, very good. I think it's something we've talked about for quite some time. From top to bottom, that our league is extremely competitive. Coaches do a great job getting good players in and getting them better and putting them in the right situation. I think it's a reflection on the strength, top to bottom, in our league.

You mentioned after the game that the past couple of years you guys thought you need to score a lot of points to win, but this year you feel more confidence in your defense. What's the difference this year with your defense?

Well one thing I think is we have a little more depth, and we've got a little more experience in a few areas. Also, I think we have some players that can run, I think we've got pretty good speed overall defensively, maybe more so than we've had recently. We have some depth up front that allows us to rotate people. But you know, it's a work in progress, and I think we still have a ways to go. I think we still can improve defensively, I think we still need to improve defensively, but I hope we came out of that ball game with some confidence. Even though New Hampshire moved the ball at times, we came up with some big plays in some crucial situations that were against an awfully good offensive team. Now of course, both offenses were hampered with the weather, but I liked the way we flew around. I liked the way we played hard.

One guy who seemed to be on every tackle was [junior linebacker] Chris Ndubueze. Can you comment on his game?

Yeah, Chris played really well. He got around the football and played very, very well. He gets better and better as a linebacker, he's out of Dematha High School and has continued to improve. I thought he really had a good ball game up there Saturday.

### W&M GAME NOTES

#### VS. VIRGINIA MILITARY INSTITUTE SEPT. 25

Looking back: The College's hard-fought 9-7 win over 10th-ranked New Hampshire was a great start to what promises to be a grueling conference schedule for the Tribe. What the game lacked in points, it more than made up for in drama and solid defense.

Coming into the match-up, few would have predicted a defensive struggle in a game that featured two of the more explosive offensives in the conference. As the presence of hurricane Ivan and its heavy rains gradually saturated the playing surface, the game, which could have been billed as a shoot out, became a slugfest. In the end, it was the Tribe that came through with more plays in the clutch and prevailed.

The game produced more than a few interesting footnotes.

The following is a closer look at some of the more prominent bullet points:

#### The win stood as ...

- The Tribe's first win over a ranked opponent since defeating 15th-ranked Northeastern on 10/26/02 (30-13).
- The Tribe's first win over a ranked opponent on the road since opening the 2001 season with a 31-10 win at No. 21 UMass.
- The Tribe's first win over a top-10 team since Aug. 30, 1998, when it defeated a second-ranked Hampton University squad, 41-34, on the road.
- The Tribe's first win in a conference opener since 2001 (UMass) and only its second since 1998 (see Hard Start note to follow).
- The first win in Jimmye Laycock's school-record 160 career victories that didn't include a Tribe touchdown.
- The first Tribe win without scoring a touchdown since 1979, when the College defeated Appalachian State 9-0.
- W&M's fifth-straight win in conference play, dating back to last season.

The Defense Stands: In allowing the UNH offense just seven points and 226 total yards, the Tribe's defense held the Wildcats offense to 22 points and 169 yards less than its season average. The effort stands as the unit's best performance (in terms of total yards allowed) since the team's 2001 win at UMass (when the College limited the Minutemen to just 141

total yards).

After allowing five first downs, 78 yards and a touchdown on New Hampshire's first possession, the Tribe's defense gave up no points, eight first downs and 148 total yards over the final three-and-a-half quarters.

The seven points are the fewest the team has allowed since 2002, when the Tribe limited Rhode Island to six points in a 44-6 win (on 11/9/02). It was the defense's best road performance (in terms of points allowed) since giving up just three in a very similarly rain-drenched win at Hofstra (16-3 on 10/12/02).

Hard Start: As was mentioned in last week's release, the Tribe has started the last nine consecutive years on the road in conference play. As if that wasn't difficult enough, the last six years have seen the College face ranked teams in those games.

The following is a look at the squad's last six conference openers.

Campbell Comes Through: While the Tribe's victory over New Hampshire saw major contributions come from all areas, the desire and determination the Tribe brought into the contest seemed to be epitomized in the play of quarterback, and All-American candidate, Lang Campbell. Despite the torrential rain, he kept the Tribe offense moving when it mattered most, throwing for 148 yards on 11-for-23 passing and running for 42 yards on 14 attempts.

But, those numbers don't tell the tale of the afternoon, as Campbell seemed to find a way to make the big play time and again.

## Some of the highlights of his effort in-

• Rushing for 20 yards and throwing for 58 yards on Tribe's first scoring drive, which ended with a 27-yard field goal by Greg Kuehn as time expired in the first half.

- Turning in key 21-yard run on fourth and one on the team's opening possession of the second half, which set up a 35-yard field goal by Kuehn.
- Stood patient in the pocket to deliver a 47-yard strike to Dominique Thompson to convert a third and 12 from the W&M 30 yard line. The play led to the game's decisive points (21-yard field goal by Kuehn) and turned the field position into the Tribe's favor for the majority of the final quarter.
- Perhaps biggest play came with just over 1:20 left to play, as the College, faced with a third and four at their own 35, needed just one more first down to ice the game and the clock. Campbell rolled left and ran through a pair of tacklers for the crucial, game-sealing, first down.

Among his Peers: On the season, Campbell is currently second in the conference in total offense, averaging 273.5 yds/game, and third in passing yards with an average of 235.0 yds/game. He is the only QB in the league with more than 20 attempts not to have thrown an interception.

**Campbell's Career:** Campbell continues to live up to all the preseason expectations through his first two starts of 2004.

He started the season by earning the league's Offensive Player of the Week

honors (for the second time in his career) by throwing for a career high 322 yards and a pair of scores, while rushing for another two TDs (also a career best) vs. North Carolina.

The following is a brief point-by-point look at what he has accomplished in his 12 games as the starting QB, and what could be just on the horizon.

#### Campbell is ...

- Just 24 yards from 3,000 for his career (in just 19 total games).
- Currently in 10th-place on the College's all-time top 10 passing yardage listing, with 2,976 (just edging by John Brosnahan's two-year total of 2,970 set between 1987-88). He needs 112 yards to move pass Dave Murhpy's ninth-place total of 3,087 set in 18 starts between the 1980 and 1983 seasons (for a complete listing see page 11)
- Now in ninth-place on the College's alltime TD pass listing (26), just two scoring connections behind eighth place and five from seventh (see listing on page 10).
- Currently second on the College's alltime completion percentage listing (.621, 231 of 372 attempts).
- Just 325 yards of total offense from moving into the College's all-time top 10 in that category. He has amassed 3,382 (2,976 passing, 406 rushing) for his career (see chart on page 11).

#### W&M 34, VMI 24

**LEXINGTON, VA (9/13/03)** -- Redshirt freshman **Matt Trinkle** caught his first career touchdown pass with 9:20 remaining in the fourth quarter to break a 24-24 tie, and William and Mary held on for a 34-24 victory over VMI before a crowd of 7,125 at Alumni Memorial Field.

The Tribe captured its 18th consecutive victory over the Keydets, though VMI gave W&M quite a test in the 60th-straight meeting between the squads.

Quarterback **Lang Campbell** tossed three touchdown passes, while linebacker **Travis McLaurin** paced the defense with a 28-yard fumble return for a touchdown and a blocked field goal. Also, defensive end **Adam O'Connor** had two tackles for loss, a sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his first career start.

Steven Hargrove, who came in as the Atlantic 10's leader in all-purpose yards, caught his third touchdown pass of the season and racked up 146 all-purpose yards to remain tops in the conference.

• Carrying a career TD/INT ratio of nearly four to one (26 TD/7 INT).

**Serious History:** Few schools can boast such long and storied histories as the College of William and Mary (founded in 1693) and the Virginia Military Institute (founded in 1839). This same history can be applied to the football programs, as each has sponsored a program for the better part of the last century. The two schools have met on the gridiron 81 times, including at least once a year for the last 61 seasons, including 2004.

The 61 consecutive games are the ninth longest, uninterrupted series currently being contested in the I-AA ranks. The Tribe has won 18-consecutive games in the series, which stands as the second longest winning streak in an active uninterrupted series in the I-AA rank (the longest being Grambling's 27-straight wins over Prairie View)

Since 1993, the Tribe has had an average margin of victory of nearly 30 points over the Keydets. But, the last two seasons have seen the Keydets score 31 and 24 points vs. the Tribe, respectively. Last season's game was decided by just 10 points, the closest game in the series since W&M won 21-16 in 1992.

Laycock and McCombs: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock and VMI's Cal McCombs will be leading their teams into battle on Saturday, but in 1973-74, they were on the same sideline as coaches at The Citadel. McCombs was the team's wide receivers coach, while Laycock coached the offensive backfield at the time. The 1973 team finished 3-8 under future NFL coach Bobby Ross, while the 1974 squad went 4-7. Coincidentally, both seasons featured a loss to William and Mary and a loss to VMI.

**High School Connections:** There are several instances of former high school teammates lining up on opposite sides of the field for Saturday's clash between W&M and VMI.

Here is a quick list...

- W&M's Stephen Cason and VMI's Andrew Walton were teammates at James River High School in Richmond.
- VMI's Justin Chetney and Maury Pauling , along with W&M defensive lineman Jason Bowles, all went to Phoebus High School

in Hampton.

- Tribe lineman Brian Neely, defensive back Zach Stout and linebacker Jeff Thomas and VMI tackle Donnie Johnston all attended Lee-Davis High School in Mechanicsville, VA.
- Keydets defensive end Charlie Liesfield and Tribe wide out Nathan Holston are both graduates of Monacan High School in Richmond.
- Bethel High School in Hampton, VA is the alma mater of W&M defensive end Jonas Watson and VMI quarterback Josh Lyles.
- Tribe redshirt freshman running back Tony Viola and Keydets senior wide receiver John Puvogel each attended Stonewall Jackson High School in Manassas, VA.
- A pair of redshirt freshmen, VMI's Cliff Schademan and W&M's Brad Stewart, teamed up at Pittsburgh's Bethel Park High School.
- VMI senior slotback R.C. Simmons was a high school teammate of W&M quarterback Lang Campbell at Winchester's Handley High School.

Big South Battles: The Keydets are in their second season of play in the five-team Big South Conference, after ending their long-time run in the Southern Conference. VMI went 2-2 in conference play last season, which was only the second season of Big South football. Last year's tilt with VMI was W&M's first against a Big South opponent, while the 2004 slate features two contests in VMI and the first-ever meeting with Liberty.

Kuehn on Kicking: The College's success in the kicking game has been well documented over the years, as a Tribe place kicker has been named to the all-conference team in each of the last seven years. Current kicker, junior Greg Kuehn has earned the honor each of the past two years and seems to be on track for a third in 2004. This past weekend, he accounted for all the team's points in the win over UNH, by hitting true on all three of his attempts on the rain-swept afternoon.

His efforts not only earned him the Atlantic 10's Special Teams Player of the Week honors, but also pushed his career

field goal total to 31, making him only the fourth place kicker in school history to pass the 30 field goal mark. The game stands as the fourth time Kuehn has connected on three field goals, with the last time coming in a 37-24 victory over Rhode Island on Oct. 25th of last season.

Kuehn is poised to break into the A10's all-time top 10 for career field goals as he is currently just three FGs from Villanova's Mark Kiefer's career total of 34 (1994-97, see complete listing on page 11).


The Tribe's school record for career field goals is held by current NFL standout, Steve Christie, who hammered out 57 career three-pointers. Two-time allconference performer, Brian Shallcross is second with 48 treys, while former All-American Brett Sterba sits in third with 46. Shallcross and Sterba currently hold the first and second positions on the A10's career field goal chart, respectively.

With at least nine games remaining in his junior season, Kuehn seems on track to make a run at Christie's career mark, as he'll enter next weekend's action averaging better than one FG/start (31 FGs in 23 career games). For perspective's sake, Christie and Shallcross entered their senior seasons with 36 and 33 field goals, respectively.

Hazardous Workplace: OSHA would not have approved of the conditions that long snapper Thad Wheeler, punter Mike Mesi, holder Lang Campbell or place kicker Greg Kuehn were forced to work under on Saturday at UNH.

In the face of severe weather conditions, Wheeler and Mesi were able to connect and deliver seven punts without a hitch and played a vital role in helping keep the UNH offense out of decent field position. Wheeler also worked flawlessly with Campbell in converting all three snaps into successful placements for Kuehn. In a game that saw UNH misfire on two field goal attempts and average just 29 yards a punt, the edge the Tribe had in the special teams played a major role in the outcome of the contest.

**Steady Smith:** Punishing senior tailback Jon Smith pounded out a team-high 63 yards on 23 carries in the win over UNH, marking the most carries and yards he's had in a single game since rushing 27 times for 92 yards vs. James Madison in 2002. The Tribe turned to Smith's sure

hands and sturdy legs early and often while trying to establish a solid ground game and control the clock. While his efforts may not have translated into gaudy numbers, he played a large role in helping the College control more than 35 minutes of the game clock (11 more than UNH).

The effort also inched him closer to several career milestones. With just 153 more yards, Smith will move his career total to 2,000 yards (currently at 1,847) and become the 11th Tribe running back to reach the lofty barrier. With 285 yards rushing, Smith can move into possession of 10th-place all-time on the College's career rushing listing (see chart on page 11).

**Lustig Lost:** W&M's upset win didn't come without a cost, as senior wide receiver Josh Lustig (Erie, PA) suffered a fractured left ankle and will be out an indefinite amount of time.

The injury occurred in the fourth quarter, as Lustig was being dragged out of bounds at the end of a 17-yard completion. Lustig, who has turned in several big plays this season, including a 46-yard TD catch vs. North Carolina, was the team's leading receiver (nine catches for 163 yards, one TD) and kick returner (six for 135 yards). Lustig entered this weekend's action as the Atlantic 10's leader in all-purpose yards (148.5 yds/gm) and is ranked

seventh in both receiving yards (81.5 yds/gm) and receptions (4.50 catches/gm).

Fellow senior Jon Pitts (Kernersville, NC) will step into Lustig's starting role, opposite senior Dominique Thompson (Durham, NC) for this weekend's contest vs. the Virginia Military Institute.

Talented Mr. Thompson: While on the subject of receivers, one focus of the College's spring and fall camps was to develop a replacement for the large shoes left vacated by the graduation of Musinski. The staff is now going to rely on a duo of senior receivers (Dominique Thompson and Jon Pitts) to fill the void. While they are both capable of making plays, Thompson's sheer athleticism casts him as the team's most dangerous big-play threat. He didn't disappoint in his debut appearance in the role, as he brought down six catches for 83 yards and also contributed a rush for 13 yards (and had another rush of more than 15 yards called back on clipping penalty).

Like Lustig, he equaled his entire 2003 total of catches (six) on the afternoon, while his 83 receiving yards stands as his career, single-game, best.

Thompson was the team's leading receiver at UNH, pulling in three catches for 55 yards, including a season-long 47-yard reception. With the loss of Lustig, Thompson is now the Tribe's top receiver

with nine catches for 138 yards and TD.

**Zoned Out**: After finishing last season with 30 conversions in its 36 red zone opportunities (21 TDs/nine FGs), the Tribe seems to have come into 2004 with an even better 'nose' for the end zone. The College came away with points on all five of its red zone opportunities vs. UNC, including four TDs (and one FG), and was again perfect at UNH in the zone with three Greg Kuehn field goals (see page 21).

A Fresh Start: Redshirt freshman wide out Joe Nicholas made the most of his first collegiate experience by contributing four catches for 48 yards in his role as the Tribe's slot receiver at UNC.

At UNH, he made his first career start and caught one ball for nine yards to set up Kuehn's game-winning field goal from 21 yards.

He has shown the ability to go up in a crowd and bring down the difficult catches, as he primarily has been working over the middle. After overseeing his conversion from defensive back to WR this offseason, the staff is counting on his continued improvement and will be looking for him to display some of the same play-making ability he turned in during a standout spring practice session.

Picking Up Right Where...: In the season-opener on Sept. 4, Travis McLaurin made seven tackles and recovered two fumbles, one of which he returned 33 yards to set up a Tribe TD. At UNH, he took part in eight total tackles, four solo, including one for a 2-yard loss.

McLaurin earned third-team all-conference honors last season after recording 120 tackles in his first season as a starter and entered the 2004 campaign as a preseason first team selection. He earned A-10 Defensive Player of the Week honors in October after a 13-tackle effort against Massachusetts.

Cason Back in Action: Prior to the start of fall camp, junior corner Stephen Cason was cleared to return to the playing field for the 2004 season, after missing all of last year with a severe neck injury suffered in a car accident prior to the start of the 2003 campaign.

In his first two games back, Cason has made an immediate impact, showing

flashes of his big-play ability that made him a standout performer as a redshirt freshman in 2002.

Against the Tar Heels, Cason registered six tackles, five solo, forced a fumble and broke up a pass. The fumble came midway through the second quarter and was recovered by Travis McLaurin and returned to the Tribe 4-yard line, leading to a Tribe TD. At UNH, he added three solo tackles.

In 2002, Cason started 10 of the 11 games he played in, making 47 tackles (34 solo) and recording three interceptions and eight pass breakups. In addition to his defensive duties, Cason returned seven kickoffs for the Tribe and led the squad with an average of 28.1 yards per kickoff return.

In perhaps his best individual performance with the Tribe, Cason earned A10 Rookie of the Week Honors after making eight tackles, intercepting a pass and blocking a field goal against JMU in 2002.

The Last Line: Junior safety James Miller has also seen his late-season success spill over into the 2004 season, as he had a career day at UNC with 15 tackles and followed that up with a nine-tackle effort at UNH. His total against the Tar Heels included eight unassisted stops and he recovered a UNC fumble on the W&M 1-yard line.

Going back to the second half of the 2003 season, Miller has begun to emerge as one of the Tribe's top defensive contributors. Starting with the Oct. 18 contest against JMU, Miller has recorded at least seven tackles in seven consecutive games, including three double-digit games (JMU, 11, 10/18/03; URI, 10, 10/25/03; UNC, 15, 9/4/04).

Here is a quick look at Miller's last seven games:

- vs. JMU 10/18/03 11 total tackles, fumble recovery, one tackle for loss.
- at URI 10/25/03 10 total tackles, two for loss.

More Than the Numbers: With only six tackles through two games, one might easily overlook Adam O'Connor's contributions on the defensive front. The Tribe defense received an outstanding effort against the Tar Heels from O'Connor, who along with Jonas Watson recorded the only sack of the game. The 6-7 O'Connor applied a consistent pass rush on the afternoon, resulting in the sack and an additional two quarterback hurries. He added another tackle for loss and was credited with three total stops in the game. At UNH, O'Connor was again disrupting the opponent's passing game and was one of the reason's W&M was able to hold Wildcat quarterback Ricky Santos, who passed for 385 yards and five TDs a week earlier at I-A Rutgers, to 103 passing yards.

In the Trenches: Given the poor field and weather conditions at UNH on Saturday, the Wildcat offense put an emphasis on running the ball, and the Tribe defensive line responded with a dominating performance.

In addition to O'Connor's efforts, junior tackle Larry Pendleton and senior tackle Mike McCarthy each made seven total stops, while senior tackle Justin Kelly registered five tackles and sophomore Josh Wright, who made his first career start, added four tackles and a sack. Along with Wright, Pendleton, who also contributed a sack, McCarthy and Kelly each had one tackle for loss, which resulted in a total of 20 lost yards for the defensive front.

More on the Defense: Coming into Saturday's game, the UNH offense was averaging 357.0 yards of total offense per game and was a week removed from a 385-yard, 5-TD performance from freshman quarterback Ricky Santos. Against the Tribe however, the Wildcats managed only 226 total yards, and Santos threw for just 103 yards.

The performance marked a vast improvement from the Tribe's first game in which W&M allowed 575 total yards and 49 points to Division I-A North Carolina, and it was the fewest yards W&M has surrendered since yielding 141 in the 2001 season-opener at Massachusetts, a 31-10 victory, and the fewest allowed

since a 44-6 win over Rhode Island on Nov. 9, 2002.

Here are a few more defensive highlights from Saturday:

- After yielding 321 rushing yards in its season-opener at UNC, the Tribe defense held UNH to 123 yards on the ground and an average of only 2.9 yards per rushing attempt.
- The 103 passing yards were the fewest allowed since W&M held Rhode Island to 77 in a 37-24 Tribe victory on Oct. 25th last season. Of the 103 total passing yards, W&M yielded only 31 in the second half.
- The 123 rushing yards were the fewest allowed since W&M held Indiana to 103 in the 2001 season-opening loss in Bloomington.
- After giving up five first downs and 74 total yards in the opening quarter, the W&M defense held UNH to three first downs and 57 total yards in the second and third quarters combined.
- The Tribe surrendered 78 yards and a touchdown on the Wildcats' opening possession, before holding UNH scoreless for the rest of the game and limiting the Wildcats to 148 total yards in that span.
- W&M forced the Wildcats to go threeand-out four times in the game, three of which came on UNH's first four possession of the second half. The defense also held on three consecutive plays after a W&M turnover on its own 27-yard line, which resulted in a missed field goal from 41 yards.
- The W&M defense allowed UNH into Tribe territory only twice in the second half, which came on the Wildcats' final two possessions and resulted in a missed field goal and turnover on downs.

When it Counts: Junior defensive lineman Jonas Watson took part in only two plays against UNH, but made the very most of his opportunities. Watson came in for what became the final two defensive plays of the game, stopping a UNH screen pass with James Miller on third-and-10, then he and Travis McLaurin pulled down Santos from behind on fourth-and-seven, after the rookie quarterback attempted to run for the first down.

All in a day's work: Junior linebacker Chris Ndubueze recorded a team and career-high 16 tackles in the win over UNH. Ndubueze made 10 solo stops on the rainsoaked afternoon. His previous careerbest was 11, which came against Hofstra last season. He now has four double-digit tackle games to his credit.

Take It Away: The Tribe defense forced four turnovers in the season-opening loss at North Carolina on Sept. 4, which was the first time W&M recorded four turnovers in a game since a season-opening loss at Division I-A Indiana in 2002. At UNC, even more important was the timing of a couple of the turnovers.

Travis McLaurin recovered a fumble on the Tar Heels' opening possession after a 25-yard pass completion, while corner Alan Wheeling forced a fumble at the W&M 1-yard line, saving what appeared to be a 48-yard UNC TD run.

The other two turnovers came on Cason's forced fumble and defensive lineman Wade Harrell's third career interception. Harrell tipped an attempted screen pass, corralled it and rumbled 37 yards to the UNC 2-yard line, which set up a 21yard FG and 24-14 halftime lead.

A Tradition of QBs: With Lang Campbell earning third-team all-conference honors in 2003, it marked the sixth consecutive season that a W&M quarterback earned all-conference recognition of some kind. In fact, a Tribe signal caller has garnered all-conference accolades in 10 of the 12 seasons that W&M has been in the Atlantic 10.

Preseason All-Conference Awards: All-American candidate Lang Campbell, linebacker Travis McLaurin and tight end Adam Bratton all earned preseason first team All-Atlantic 10 honors, while specialists Greg Kuehn and Mike Mesi each garnered second-team honors.

Campbell, a co-captain, led the league in passing yards per game (229.6) and pass efficiency (152.1) in 2003, en route to third team all-conference accolades. McLaurin was also a third-team A-10 selection last year, after making 120 tackles and recording three sacks, an interception and a fumble recovery. Bratton saw action in all 10 games last season, making six starts, and caught seven passes for 77 vards.

Kuehn, a two-time all-conference performer, has led the Tribe in scoring each of the last two seasons, while Mesi

averaged 41.2 yards per punt last season and had 14 kicks downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line, which earned him second team all-conference status.

No Flags on the Play: Discipline is certainly one trademark of Laycock's program, and 203 was no different as W&M was the least penalized team in the A-10 (50) and yielded the fewest penalty yards among conference schools (40.6 yards per game, 406 total penalty yards).

The 2004 season has started off in much of the same fashion, as W&M ranks third in the league in penalty yards per game (47.5).

Double Vision: The W&M football roster features two sets of identical twins in Trevor and Travis McLaurin and Corev and Craig Patterson. Trevor McLaurin wears No. 52 and plays middle linebacker, while brother Travis sports jersey number 23 and plays tailback. Craig (No. 5) and Corey Patterson (No. 6) are both defensive backs.

A-10 vs. Division I-A: In addition to W&M's Sept. 4 battle in Chapel Hill, there are a conference-record tying eight games in 2004 featuring A-10 teams against I-A opponents. Atlantic 10 teams entered the 2004 campaign looking to knock off a I-A team for the third consecutive season, a feat that was accomplished for the first time since the 1998-2000 seasons, with New Hampshire's 35-24 win at Rutgers on Sept. 11.

Last year, two A-10 teams knocked off I-A opponents, as Delaware defeated Navy (21-17) and Villanova downed Temple (23-20, 2 OT). That feat was once again accomplished this season, as Maine downed Mississippi State 9-7 on Satur-

CHAPEL HILL, NC (9/4/04) -- Despite career days from Lang Campbell and Josh Lustig and four first-half turnovers, the Tar Heels used three fourth-quarter TDs from Ronnie McGill to rally past the Tribe, 49-38, at Kenan Stadium.

Campbell had the Divison I-A North Carolina defense on its "heels" most of the afternoon, throwing for a career-high 322 yards and two TDs, including a 46-yard strike to Lustig to open the scoring. Lustig hauled in a career-best 112 yards on six catches. Campbell added a pair of rushing TDs in the first half and Greg Kuehn booted a 21-yard FG as time expired, as the Tribe built a 10-point halftime lead.

Stephen Cason and Alan Wheeling each forced a fumble in the first half, Travis McLaurin recovered two fumbles in the first half, including one he returned 33 yards and Wade Harrell returned his third-career interception 37 yards to set up Keuhn's FG, as W&M forced four turnovers in a game for the first time since 2002 (IU). James Miller, who also recovered a fumble, led the Tribe with 15 tackles.

Dominique Thompson, a NC native, caught six passes for 83 yards and a TD, while **Jon** Smith added a 2-yard TD run.

DURHAM, NH (9/18/04) - All-conference kicker Greg Kuehn connected on field goals of 27, 35 and 21 yards and the Tribe defense held the Wildcats' high-powered offense in check, as W&M won its conference-opener, 9-7, over 10th-ranked New Hampshire at rained-soaked Cowell Stadium.

Playing in heavy rains from the remnants of Hurricane Ivan, W&M held UNH to 226 offensive yards, nearly 150 below its average, after yielding 575 yard to North Carolina two weeks prior. It was the fewest yards allowed by a W&M defense since yielding 141 to Massachusetts in the 2001 season-opener.

All-American candidate Lang Campbell and the Tribe offense were efficient in the treacherous conditions, as Campbell threw for 148 yards on 11 for 23 passing and ran for 42 yards on 14 attempts. With 148 passing yards, he moved into 10th place on the W&M career passing list. Senior Jon Smith churned out 63 yards on 23 carries.

Kuehn kicked three field goals for the fourth time in his career, with the last coming in a win over Rhode Island on Oct. 25, 2003.

Chris Ndubueze paced the defense with a career-high 16 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Junior Larry Pendleton tallied seven tackles and a sack, while sophomore Josh Wright, who made his first career start, also recorded a sack.

The win gave W&M its first victory over a ranked opponent since knocking off 15th-ranked Northeastern in Williamsburg on Oct. 26, 2002.


