The 16th-ranked College of William and Mary meets Towson Saturday in an Atlantic 10 conference match up. It will be the second all-time meeting between the schools, with W&M having won the only previous meeting, 43-15, in Williamsburg on Oct. 17, 1992. The Tribe is coming off a 31-28 loss at third-ranked Delaware last Saturday, a loss that snapped W&M's five-game winning streak. The Tigers are 0-4 in league play in their first season in the A10 and are coming off a 41-6 loss to Villanova.

THE CAMPBELL FILE

Campbell threw for 355 yards and four TDs against third-ranked Delaware.

The senior from Winchester, VA has emerged as one of top signal callers in the nation. The following is a brief look at his game-by-game accomplishments in 2004.

At North Carolina - Sept. 4

In the season-opener at UNC, Campbell threw for a then career-high 322 yards, surpassing the 300-yard mark for the first time in his career. He completed 23 of 41 attempts and threw a pair of TD passes and added two rushing scores.

At #10 New Hampshire - Sept. 18

Slowed by heavy rains and poor field conditions, Campbell was effective at UNH, throwing for 148 yards on 11 for 23 passing and running for 42 yards on 14 attempts to lead W&M over the 10th-ranked Wildcats, 9-7. Included in his afternoon was a crucial 5-yard run for the gameclinching first down.

Vs. VMI - Sept. 25

On his 23rd birthday against VMI, Campbell went 11-for-15 through the air for 160 yards and a pair of TD passes, before handing the quarterback duties over early in the second half in the Tribe's 42-6 victory.

Vs. Northeastern - Oct. 2

Went over the 300-yard mark against Northeastern, throwing for a career-best 378 yards on 22-of-36 passing. Campbell completed a then season-long 77-yard TD pass to Dominique Thompson in the fourth quarter that gave W&M a 35-28 advantage, and he also ran for a pair of first half scores.

At Liberty - Oct. 9

Surpassed the 300-yard mark for third time this season, throwing for 368 yards. Ten completions went to Thompson for 221 yards alone. Campbell also ran eight times for 32 yards and a TD, his fifth rushing TD of the season.

- Ranks 7th on the W&M career total offensive yards lists with 4,867.
- Ranks 7th on W&M career TD passes list with 35.
- At UNC, became first W&M QB to pass and run for two TDs since David Corley did it vs. Maine in 2001.

Vs. Rhode Island - Oct. 16

Threw for 192 yards and two TDs, both to Matt Trinkle in the first quarter, on 20-for-27 passing. He also recorded his sixth rushing TD of the season.

At Delaware - Oct. 23


Completed 20 of 30 passes for 355 yards and four TDs, all of which went to senior WR Dominique Thompson. He had a remarkable QB rating of 210.1 for the game and surpassed the 300-yard barrier for the fourth time this season. He connected with Thompson on an 87-yard TD pass, which matched the longest passing play in W&M history (See page 18).

TRIBE HEAD COACH

JIMMYE LAYCOCK

Silver Linings: Jimmye Laycock is in his 25th season as the Tribe's head coach. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 164-112-2 career record at W&M. He ranks fourth on the A-10 career victories lists (61), tied with former Richmond and Massachusetts coach Jim Reid. W&M has made seven postseason appearances under Laycock and posted winning ledgers in 17 of the past 21 seasons.

Good Company: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock, in his 25th season on the W&M sidelines, ranks third among all current Division I-A and Division I-AA head coaches in terms of most years at their current school. The two coaches ahead of Laycock are Penn State's Joe Paterno (37 years) and Florida State's Bobby Bowden (26 years).

Quotes from the Monday, Oct. 25, A-10 Coaches Conference Call...

Can you talk about what you saw from your team vs. Delaware?

Well, it was kind of like what we normally see when we play Delaware. It was a wild game with a lot of back and forth action. I thought both teams played extremely hard and there were a lot of big plays. Delaware was able to make some plays in the fourth quarter. They did a heck of a job coming back after we jumped on them early. They came back and we were not able to make some plays defensively and I guess it was a game that obviously, could have gone either way. We felt good about our effort, but I sure wish we could have made a few more plays in certain situations.

Senior WR Dominique Thompson had a school-record 244 receiving yards and it only took 6 catches to get that many yards. Does this alter the way you approach your game plan or was that sort of a fluke? In other words, do you try and get him the ball more from now on or was that just kind of an odd set up that he got that many yards?

Dominique has the ability to explode and get yards after a catch and get behind people. But no, so far as altering what we are doing or trying to. We won't be trying to force the ball to him. I see us trying to be as diversified as we can with our passing game, within reason. And, again, as I said after the ball game, he made some nice plays, but I think you've got to give a lot of credit to [All-American candidate, quarterback] Lang Campbell to be able to recognize the situations that occurred and make the decisions as to who he could get the ball too. There were some unusual situations that occurred and he got the ball to Dominique because he was the man that was open.

All season conference coaches have been talking about yards after catches and it was in one of the newspapers yesterday that Dominique had about 145 yards after catching 3 of the 4 touchdown passes.

Yeah, that's pretty good. I wish we had a few more. We could have used a few more in the fourth quarter. But you know, in a couple situations, he got behind them and took off. In one situation, we caught them in man coverage and Dominique was one on one in the field and he beat his man, and there wasn't anybody that could catch him.

A couple of times Campbell did some real subtle shoulder pumps maybe that got a safety to bite. Is he particularly good at that, it seemed to be very effective on Saturday?

He's working at it. You know I think it's something you've got to practice a little bit and you have to recognize the situations when to do it. I thought a real good one was on the first touchdown to Dominique, where he kind of gave a little head and shoulder fake and baited the corner inside and Dominique broke the back outside and we connected on the fade. In Lang's situation, you're pretty comfortable with the offense, so you can kind of add the little twists and things like that. It really helps you.

Now that you've seen them in person, what are you thoughts on Delaware?

Delaware is a very solid football team. They were able to do what they needed to do in the fourth quarter to win. They took our best shot early. I think a lot lesser team might have not responded like they did after we jumped on them. But, you have to give them a lot of credit. They showed a lot of resiliency, bounced back and fought, and they played hard. Even when we took the lead in the fourth quarter, they came back. You just have to tip your hat to them.

W&M plays at Towson this week and Towson has struggled in its first season in the A10. Is this the week to really work on your running game and get it going in the right direction?

Well, I've looked at the tape against Towson and this doesn't look like the defense you want to get your running game established against by any means. They are really good on defense. I haven't looked at offense yet, but I have looked at a lot of their defense and they fly around they do a heck of a job defensively. I'm still looking for a tape on the way somebody's moved the football on them, and I haven't seen that yet. They get a lot of people to the football, they run exceptionally well and they play with a lot of enthusiasm. This is going to be a challenge to move the ball against them.

W&M GAME NOTES

vs. Towson Oct. 30, 2004

Final Four: With the Tribe coming off a hard-fought, 31-28 loss at Delaware last Saturday, the team will be looking to rebound back to its winning ways against first year conference foe Towson.

The College can consider the game with the Tigers its first of what will amount to a crucial final four games. Despite dropping out of the conference lead (in the loss column) with undefeated league opponents Delaware and James Madison (each stand at 5-0 in the A10), it still remains as the only team with one loss.

Only one team in the last eight years has finished league play undefeated (Villanova in 1997).

With a Win over Towson the College will:

- Secure the 15th winning season in the last 17 years (only non-winning seasons have been in 1991 5-6; and 2000 5-6).
- Ensure that the squad will post a .500, or better, record in conference play for the 12th-straight year (every season the College has been a member of the league). Every other conference team has suffered through at least one losing season in league play during this span.

Did You Know?: William and Mary will be making its first visit to the state of Maryland to play football in 13 years. The last visit to play in the state came in the 1991 season, when the Tribe traveled to Annapolis and beat hosting Navy, 26-21.

Marquee Matchup: Outside the obvious impact the game will have on the A10 standings and the Tribe's post-season aspirations, one of the more interesting story lines to follow on the evening's action will be how the Tribe's high-powered passing attack fares against the stingy Tiger pass defense. Through seven games, Towson is far and away the most effective league team in stopping an opponent's passing game, as it is yielding just 119.1 yds/game through the air.

In fact, an unscientific study (a glance at the conference's stats sheet) shows that not only are teams unsuccessful in passing against the Tiger defense, they also seem to be reluctant, as TU's opponents have combined for just 161 attempts on the season (the next lowest figure in the league is the 189 faced by Richmond in the same number of games). Despite the relatively

low number of attempts, Towson still has managed 12 interceptions, while allowing just six TDs.

The Tigers are yielding a league-low 5.2 yards per pass attempt, while the Tribe will enter the game with a league best 9.4 yards/attempt.

Big Numbers: Speaking of the Tribe's offense, All-American candidate, QB Lang Campbell, seems to only get more and more efficient and dangerous behind the controls of the College's high potency offense.

The following are just some of highlights of what the Tribe's attack has accomplished this season:

- The College has now scored 31, or more, points in five of the seven games on the season (only exception being a 9-7 rain-soaked win at New Hampshire and the 28 point effort vs. No. 3 Delaware last Saturday). It's average of 31.9 pts/game ranks it third in the league and 25th in the nation
- It has converted all of its 32 red zone opportunities on the season into points of some kind (21 TDs, 11 FGs see chart on page 21).
- Fashioned 22 scoring drives of 60 yards or more (out of 38 total). (See a complete listing on page 20).
- Has thrown for more yards than all seven opponents on the season and has been out rushed by only three (UNC, URI and Delaware).
- Turned the ball over only four times (three fumbles, one interception). The only other turnover for the College on the season came on a muffed punt. Currently, the College is second in the conference and 19th nationally in turnover margin with a +.86/game average.
- William and Mary has fashioned at least one scoring drive in 23 of the 28 total quarters on the season.
- It's average of 281.4 passing yards/game ranks third in the conference and eighth nationally.
- Run for 15 TDs in six games, a total which eclipses the squad's 10-game total of a season ago (nine).

Rare Occurrence: When Tribe tailback Elijah Brooks had the ball forced from his grasp in the second quarter vs. Delaware,

it marked the College's first fumble by a W&M rusher in over 258 carries dating back to last season. Coming into the game, the Tribe's last fumble on a running play came vs. UNH in the 2003 season's ninth game. (W&M's only three other fumbles on the season came on a fumbled snap from center, after a reception and muffed punt).

Campbell Coming on Strong: In the face of one of the league's top defensive units, and in front of a hostile crowd, Tribe senior QB Lang Campbell came through with one of the finest performances of his career in throwing for a personal-best four TDs and 355 yards on a sparkling 20 completions in 30 attempts on the afternoon.

The Blue Hen defense had yielded only five TD passes in its first six games coming into Saturday's contest, a figure that Campbell nearly equaled ... in the first quarter. Campbell came out of the locker room with all guns blazing and connected on six of his first eight attempts for an amazing 173 yards and three TDs in the first quarter. The first quarter effort stands as the most passing yards in a single quarter in school history and ties Shawn Knight for most TD passes in quarter (2nd Quarter vs. Maine in 1993).

In fact, Campbell is currently on a

four game tear that is without compare in the school's long history of success at the QB position, as he has completed over 67% of his passes (59 of 87 attempts) for a school record 1.293 vards and seven touchdowns.

Included in this four game span are three, 300-yard plus efforts (378 vs. Northeastern; 368 at Liberty; and 355 at Delaware). Each of these three games ranks amongst the top 12 single game efforts in school history. No other Tribe signal caller has more than two performances in the top 12. (See 300 Club note to follow).

With this sparkling stretch, Campbell has dramatically improved his QB efficiency rating from 140.66 (after the third game of the season vs. VMI) to its current season high of 159.32. The mark leads the conference and is seventh nationally.

He will enter Saturday's game with Towson averaging just over 274 yds/game passing (1,923 yards), the top average in the conference. If Campbell were to retain his current pace, he will become just the fourth Tribe QB to throw for 3,000 yards in a season. If he were to accomplish this feat in the 11 game regular season, it would put him with Mike Cook (1995-98) as the College's only QBs to accomplish it in just 11 games (Cook threw for 3,028 in 1998). Cook owns the school's best

THE LAST MEETING

#10 William and Mary 43, Towson State 15 WILLIAMSBURG, VA (October 17, 1992) - Sophomore tailback Derek Fitzgerald rushed for 99 yards and three touchdowns to lead 10th-ranked William and Mary to a 43-15 victory over Towson State in the 1992 Homecoming game at Zable Stadium. With the victory, W&M improved to 6-0, its best start since opening the 1986 season 6-0.


The Tigers struck first on a five-yard TD pass from Dan Crowley to Tony Hill, but W&M responded by taking the ensuing kickoff back 68 yards to set up Fitzgerald's first TD run, a two-yard plunge.

The Tribe went up 14-6 on quarterback Shawn Knight's 5-yard TD run in the second quarter, but Towson answered with a 5-yard TD run by John Swigart to cut the deficit to 14-12 just four minutes later. W&M took a 21-12 halftime lead when Knight connected wide receiver Corey Ludwig for a 34-yard TD pass with just under four minutes remaining in the opening half.

The second half half belonged to the Green and Gold, as Fitzgerald scored on runs of 7 and 1 yards in the third quarter and James Blocker-Bodley added a 1-yard TD run in the fourth as W&M pulled away. The Tribe defense, which was allowing only 15.6 points per game coming in, surrendered only a 33-yard field goal in the second half.

Knight finished the game 17-for-22 passing for 213 yards and a touchdown, while Blocker-Bodley ran nine times for 54 yards and the fourth-quarter score. Fitzgerald also caught three passes for 44 yards, while tight end Joe Person led the receiving corps with five catches for 56 yards.

single-season passing average of 275.3 yds/game, also set in 1998.

From his first snaps as the starter at the beginning of last season, Campbell has displayed the decision-making prowess of four-year starter at the controls of the College's offense. Certainly, this season is no different, as he is completing better than 62% of his attempts (126 of 202) and has only one interception. In fact, by completing over 66% of his attempts vs. Delaware, Campbell has now has completed better than 50% of his attempts in all but one of his 17 career starts (vs. UNH, when he connected on 11 of his 23 attempts). For his career, Campbell has a completion percentage of .633, which ranks him second all-time at the College.

But, don't mistake Campbell's high completion percentage for the fact that he is making a living by throwing five and six yard passes, as he is averaging an impressive 9.52 yards/attempt, a figure which ranks sixth nationally. Perhaps what is even more impressive is Campbell's average of 15.3 yds/completion, a figure that leads the conference and ranks second nationally (15.5, Dustin Long, Sam Houston State) among QBs who have completed more than 100 passes.

With just one INT in 202 attempts on the season, Campbell's interception % of just .50 is the best in the nation, amongst all levels (the next closest total is Georgia's David Greene, who sports a .54 average, with just one INT in 185 attempts. His TD to INT ration of 11:1 is also the nation's best total (amongst the I-AA's; Greene leads all levels with a 12:1 ratio). For his career, Campbell carries an impressive interception to TD ratio of better than four to one (35 TDs/8 INT). In 12 career conference starts, Campbell has thrown just three interceptions, as compared to 23 touchdowns.

With 2023 yards of total offense through seven games, Campbell's average of 290.3 yds/gm is second in the league and eighth nationally. But, again, his average of 7.97 yds/att is the conference's top total and ranks him third nationally (amongst I-AAs).

Campbell surpassed the 4,000-yard barrier for his career (in just 16 games) two weeks ago (vs. URI) and currently has thrown for 4,429 yards, a figure that is good for seventh-place on the Tribe's all-time career charts (see complete listings on page 11). His 4,867 yards of total offense (an average of 286.3 yards/start)

and is in seventh place on the Tribe's alltime listing in that category as well.

In his 17 career starts, Campbell has accounted for at least one TD (either pass or run) on 16 occasions (his only miss coming in the deluge at New Hampshire). Overall, he has accounted for 41 total career touchdowns (35 passing, six rushing), an average of better than two per outing.

300 Club: With four outings of 300 yards or better in five games of the 2004 season, Campbell is well on his way to making a run at Stan Yagiello's school record of six 300-yard outings in a single season. The last QBs to post four 300-yard efforts in a single season were Mike Cook (1998) and Chris Hakel (1991), with four.

Very Offensive: With Campbell at the controls, the College is averaging 32.0 points and 379.8 total yards a contest through seven games. Over his 17 career starts, the Tribe has averaged better than 30 points and 383 yards of total offense a game.

And the Award goes to: In addition to being named the A10 Offensive Player of the Week for his record-setting performance against Delaware Saturday, senior WR Dominique Thompson was tabbed the ESPN/USA Today I-AA National Offensive Player of the Week Monday and a National Weekly All-Star by the web site I-AA.org.

Thompson recorded a W&M single-game record 244 receiving yards and matched a W&M record with four touch-down receptions against the Blue Hens on just six total catches.

He ranks second in the Atlantic 10 and fourth nationally with a 126.3 receiving yards per game average and tied a league record with his four TD catches, while boasting the ninth-highest singlegame receiving yardage total in A10 history.

Thompson is the second A10 standout to be named the ESPN/USA Today I-AA Offensive Player of the Week, joining Hofstra quarterback Bobby Seck, who was honored on Sept. 28.

Off the Charts: With a school-record 244 receiving yards and four touchdowns on just six receptions vs. Delaware, senior all-conference candidate, WR Dominique Thompson put together a performance unrivaled in the College's 100-plus year

football history.

The scintillating performance included scoring plays of 87 (also a school record), 64, 62 and 10 yards. Most of his damage came in the first quarter, as he rang the Delaware defense up or 159 yards and three scores.

The effort, which was his second 200-yard outing in the last three games, earned Thompson the league's Offensive Player of the Week honors and moved his season total to 884 yards on just 38 receptions (an average of 23.3 yds/catch).

In addition to A10 weekly honors, Thompson was named the ESPN/USA Today I-AA National Offensive Player of the Week and was tabbed a Weekly All-Star by the web site I-AA.org.

The following is a point-by-point rundown of what Thompson accomplished during the game vs. Delaware:

- Set school record for receiving yards (244, old record was 240 set by Dave Conklin vs. VMI in 1997 on nine receptions).
- Four TDs ties school record for single-game TD receptions (most recently set by Corey Ludwig in 1993 vs. Maine).
- His one-game average of 40.7 yds/catch establishes school's single game record (among players with more than five catches). He was just off the NCAA's single-game record of 44.6, set by former NFL standout John Taylor while he was at Delaware State in 1985 (vs. Division II St. Paul's, 9/21/85).
- The 159 first quarter yards is a school record
- His 87-yard TD reception ties the school's 43-year old record for longest pass play, first set by current NFL coach Dan Henning, who connected with Tom Scott vs. Navy in 1961).
- Also set the College's record for pass plays of 60 or more yards in game (three).
- His 244 yards ranks as eighth best single-game performance in A10 history and is the fourth-best effort in a game between two league teams.

The following is what Thompson has accomplished so far this season, and what could be just ahead:

- Only Tribe player to record two, 200-plus yard games in a career (much less a single season, or three game span).
- His last four games include three performances in the Tribe's top 20 single-

game records (157 vs. NE, 18th; 221 at Liberty, 4th; and 244 at Delaware, 1st). By comparison, Rich Musinski has only four games in the top 20 out of his 46 career starts (to Thompson's eight).


- With 884 receiving yards, he is just four shy of breaking into the Tribe's top 10 single season listing (10th place is Musinski's 888-yard total from last season).
- His average of 126.9 yds/game ranks fourth nationally and is second in the A10.
- If Thompson were able to maintain his current average of 126.9 yds/game he will shatter Musinski's school record single-season average of 116.1 set in 2001.
- His average of 23.4 yds/catch currently ranks second nation-

ally among players with more than 25 receptions (Morgan State's Kelvin Dickens currently leads the nation with an average of 23.5 yds/catch).

- He is just 116 yards shy of becoming just the sixth Tribe player to 1,000 receiving yards for a season.
- Has four scoring plays of 60-plus yards (87, 77, 64 and 62).
- 33 of his 38 receptions on the season have resulted in first downs for the Tribe.

More on Thompson: Two weeks ago, in the win over Liberty, Thompson established a career high in receptions with 10. His 10 catches is made more impressive by the fact that only THREE Tribe players have recorded 10, or more, receptions in the last 10 years in Laycock's diverse, spread the field, offense. For example, the top four receivers in school history (in terms of catches) combined for just a TOTAL of three 10-plus-reception afternoons (Rich Musinski, two; Dave Conklin, one).

As an added bonus, Thompson also

lends his speed and elusiveness to the kick return squad and had racked up 192 yards over 11 returns. Thompson also is averaging of 153.3 yards a game in all-purpose yards, which leads the conference and is 13th nationally, while his 5.43 catches/game stands as the seventh highest per game total in the conference.

His all-purpose yardage total of 129.50 yds/gm ranks second in the league.

Kuehn Edge: Despite missing on his only attempt vs. Delaware (a 47 yarder as time expired in the first half), junior place kicker Greg Kuehn remains firmly ranked as one of the nation's premier I-AA place-kickers. His average of 1.57 field goals per game ranks fourth in I-AA football, while his 11 total field goals trails only Hampton's Andrew Paterini (13) for the top total in the nation.

He has recorded three field goals in one game on three separate occasions this season and a total of six times in his career. Kuehn currently has 38 career FGs (on 53 attempts, .717 conversion), a total that is the fourth best Tribe history and the seventh-best career total in the Atlantic 10

(see chart on page 11).

Kuehn's average of 8.43 points a game leads all conference kickers and ranks 16th nationally amongst all players.

When he was true on his only attempt on the afternoon, vs. URI (a 28 yarder), he extended his streak of makes from inside the 40-yard line to 13 (dating back to last season), and for his career, he has misfired only a total of five times in 35 career tries from inside the 40 (.857).

Kuehn has already earned the Atlantic 10's Special Team's Player of the Week honors on two occasions this season. His first honor came when he provided all the points in the Tribe's 9-7 upset at then 10th-ranked New Hampshire. He was recognized again, for his efforts against Northeastern, when he was no less valuable, and possibly even a little more clutch, as accounted for 12 points on three field goals and three extra points. His final field goal of that afternoon came on a 28-yard effort in overtime and sealed the 38-35 win for the College.

Kuehn has already put himself in the Tribe's record books this season, as he has been true on all 26 of his extra point attempts. Against VMI, his first attempt marked the 51st-straight conversion, breaking former All-American Brett Sterba's school-record of 50, set between the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Kuehn has now booted 71 consecutive extra points and has not missed a point after since the 2002 season (vs. NE). For his career, Kuehn has converted 94 of his 95 XPT attempts (.989).

The College's success in the kicking game has been well documented over the seasons, as a Tribe place kicker has been named to the all-conference team in each of the last seven years. Kuehn has earned the honor each of the past two years and seems to be on track for a third in 2004.

The Tribe's school record for career field goals is held by current NFL standout, Steve Christie, who hammered out 57 career three-pointers. Two-time allconference performer, Brian Shallcross is second with 48 treys, while Sterba sits in third with 46. Shallcross and Sterba currently hold the first and second positions on the A10's career field goal chart, respectively.

With at least four games remaining in his junior season, Kuehn seems on track to make a run at Christie's career mark, as he'll enter Saturday's game averaging better than one FG/start (38 FGs in 28 career

games). For perspective's sake, Christie and Shallcross entered their senior seasons with 36 and 33 field goals, respectively.

Game within the Game: The Tribe has been winning the turnover battle so far this season carrying a +6 turnover margin through the first seven games. The defense has collected five fumbles, returning them for a total of 39 yards along with picking off six passes with a combined 70 return yards. On the flip side, the College's offense has been extremely stingy, losing only four fumbles and throwing just a single interception.

The College is currently the second least penalized team in the conference, as it earns an average of 49.4 penalty yards per game. But, in spite of this relatively low number, W&M's opponents have been just a little more careful of the flags, as the Tribe opponents have been flagged for an average of only 37.6 yards per game, the lowest total of any group of opponents in the Atlantic 10.

Converting when it counts: The Tribe offense has made a living on converting points inside the red zone. They are the only team in the Atlantic 10 that can boast a 1.000 conversion percentage, having yet to come away empty handed inside their opponent's 20 yard line. Close to the goal line is not the only place the offense steps it up as they are second in the Conference in third down conversions. Their 45.8% conversion rate on 49 of 107 third down attempts is second only to Northeastern in the Atlantic 10. These 49 conversions include 11 touchdowns on third down and Greg Kuehn's overtime, game winning field goal against Northeastern.

Holding his own: Filling in for injured starting middle linebacker Travis McLaurin the last two weeks, junior **Thad Wheeler** has put together two fine performances in place of McLaurin.

In the win over URI on Oct. 16, Wheeler entered the game in the first quarter and went on to record a careerhigh 16 tackles against the Rams. Before that game, Wheeler had made just seven total stops on the season. Two of the stops against the Rams' vaunted option offense went for a total loss of five yards.

Wheeler made his first career start Saturday against Delaware and tallied nine total tackles, including one for a loss. Perhaps his biggest stop came early





in the third quarter, as the Blue Hens ran an option play to the right on fourth-and-goal from the 1-yard line, when Wheeler stayed with UD quarterback Sonny Riccio and stopped him, along with William Turner and Chris Ndubueze, short of the goal line, turning the ball over to W&M on downs.

Wright on: Sophomore defensive end Josh Wright recorded a career-high 10 total tackles in the loss to Delaware Saturday, including seven solo stops.

That comes on the heels of a seventackle effort in the win over Rhode Island on Oct. 16. Wright assumed a starting role in the Sept. 18 win at New Hampshire and has been a key figure on the defensive line ever since. He leads all defensive linemen with 30 total tackles and has 4.5 TFLs, one sack and four quarterback hurries to his credit.

When it counts: Junior defensive end Jonas Watson has started just one game, the season-opener at UNC Sept. 4, and has seen limited action in the Tribe's other six games, but has posted impressive numbers in his limited role.

Watson leads the squad with 4.5 sacks, resulting in a total loss of 38 yards. One of those sacks came Saturday at Delaware, as he pulled down UD quarterback Sonny Riccio on third-and-10 on the Hens' opening drive of the second half.

Watson also leads the team with 7.0 total tackles for loss and has registered one quarterback hurry and recovered a fumble.

Backing the Line: Entering the season, much of the attention drawn about the W&M linebackers was centered around junior all-conference performer **Travis** McLaurin. But, the inspiring play of fellow junior **Chris Ndubueze** and sophomore **Ryan Nickell** makes the Tribe linebacking corps one of the best units in the A10.

Ndubueze leads the squad with 61 total tackles, after sharing team-high honors with 11 against Delaware Saturday. He also had two pass break-ups in the loss. His finest effort came in the Sept. 18 win over UNH, when he tallied a career-high 16 total tackles.

Nickell ranks fifth on the team with

33 total tackles, including 6.5 total tackles for loss, which trails only Watson. Against URI, Nickell recorded nine total stops, including 2.5 TFLs and followed that up with six solo tackles against Delaware Saturday. Perhaps his best effort came in the 42-6 win over VMI on Sept. 25, when Nickell registered the first two interceptions of his career on consecutive VMI snaps.

McLaurin is fourth on the squad with 38 total tackles, putting all three linebackers in the team's top five. In addition to his 38 tackles, McLaurin has recovered three fumbles, which ties for the A10 lead.

CHAPEL HILL, NC (9/4/04) -- Despite career days from Lang Campbell and Josh Lustig and four first-half turnovers, the Tar Heels used three fourth-quarter TDs from Ronnie McGill to rally past the Tribe, 49-38, at Kenan Stadium.

Campbell had the Division I-A North Carolina defense on its "heels" most of the afternoon, throwing for a career-high 322 yards and two TDs, including a 46-yard strike to Lustig to open the scoring. Lustig hauled in a career-best 112 yards on six catches. Campbell added a pair of rushing TDs in the first half and Greg Kuehn booted a 21-yard FG as time expired, as the Tribe built a 10-point halftime lead.

Stephen Cason and Alan Wheeling each forced a fumble in the first half, Travis McLaurin recovered two fumbles in the first half, including one he returned 33 yards and Wade Harrell returned his third-career interception 37 yards to set up Keuhn's FG, as W&M forced four turnovers in a game for the first time since 2002 (IU). James Miller, who also recovered a fumble, led the Tribe with 15 tackles.

Dominique Thompson, a NC native, caught six passes for 83 yards and a TD, while Jon Smith added a 2-yard TD run.

DURHAM, NH (9/18/04) - All-conference kicker Greg Kuehn connected on field goals of 27, 35 and 21 yards and the Tribe defense held the Wildcats' high-powered offense in check, as W&M won its conference-opener, 9-7, over 10th-ranked New Hampshire at rained-soaked Cowell Stadium.

Playing in heavy rains from the remnants of Hurricane Ivan, W&M held UNH to 226 offensive yards, nearly 150 below its average, after yielding 575 yard to North Carolina two weeks prior. It was the fewest yards allowed by a W&M defense since yielding 141 to Massachusetts in the 2001 season-opener.

All-American candidate Lang Campbell and the Tribe offense were efficient in the treacherous conditions, as Campbell threw for 148 vards on 11 for 23 passing and ran for 42 yards on 14 attempts. With 148 passing yards, he moved into 10th place on the W&M career passing list. Senior Jon Smith churned out 63 yards on 23 carries.

Kuehn kicked three field goals for the fourth time in his career, with the last coming in a win over Rhode Island on Oct. 25, 2003.

Chris Ndubueze paced the defense with a career-high 16 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Junior Larry Pendleton tallied seven tackles and a sack, while sophomore Josh Wright, who made his first career start, also recorded a sack.

The win gave W&M its first victory over a ranked opponent since knocking off 15th-ranked Northeastern in Williamsburg on Oct. 26, 2002.

W&M 42, VMI 6 WILLIAMSBURG (9/25/04) - All-American candidate Lang Campbell threw for 137 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the first half to surpass the 3,000-yard mark for his career, as W&M used four second-quarter touchdowns and another outstanding defensive effort to knock off state-rival VMI, 42-6, in front of 8,101 fans at Zable Stadium.

Playing on his 23rd birthday, Campbell went over the 3,000-yard plateau in the first quarter and went on to complete 11-of-15 passes for 160 yards to move into ninth place (3,136) on the College's career passing yards lists. With two TD passes, Campbell also moved into eighth place (28) on the career list at W&M.

The Tribe defense forced four turnovers for the second time this season (UNC) and held the Keydets to 197 total yards, the first time a W&M defense surrendered fewer than 200 total yards since a season-opening win at UMass in 2001 (146). Dating back to a 9-7 win at UNH on Sept. 18, W&M has not allowed a touchdown for over seven consecutive quarters, a feat that has not been accomplished since 1995.

Sophomore linebacker Ryan Nickell recorded interceptions on consecutive VMI offensive plays from scrimmage, while all-conference linebacker Travis McLaurin and Chris Ndubueze each had six tackles and defensive end Adam O'Connor recorded five stops, a sack and three quarterback hurries.

Senior tailback Jon Smith led the Tribe ground game with 52 yards and two TDs, as he inched closer to 2,000 rushing yards for his career

WILLIAMSBURG (10/2/04) - Powered by a career-best 378-yard passing performance by All-American candidate Lang Campbell, the College pulled off a thrilling 38-35 overtime victory over 16th-ranked Northeastern at Zable Stadium.

The decisive points came off the foot of all-conference kicker Greg Kuehn, who nailed a 28-yard FG in the first overtime period. He ended the afternoon converting three of his four FG opportunities.

After the Tribe scored on a 77-yard TD pass from Campbell to **Dominique Thompson** with 2:34 remaining in the fourth quarter, and also got the two-point conversion on a pass to redshirt freshman receiver Joe Nicholas, W&M had a 35-28 lead. But, NU quarterback Shawn Brady's third TD pass tied the game with 42 seconds remaining and forced OT.

W&M won the toss and elected to play defense first. On the Huskies' first snap, junior Adam O'Connor sacked Brady, and NU eventually missed a 53-yard FG attempt. On the Tribe's OT possession, Nicholas caught a key first-down pass from Campbell on third-and-long, and two plays later Kuehn drilled the game-winner.

Campbell ended the day 22 of 36 for 378 yards, including the score to Thompson. He also ran for a pair of TDs. The 378 passing yards ranks as the eighth-best single-game performance in W&M history, and it was his second game over 300 yards in four games this season.

Thompson led the Tribe with a career-high 157 yards on five grabs, while Nicholas hauled in a career-best 111 yards on six catches.

#18 W&M 37, LU 17 LYNCHBURG, VA (10/9/04) - Senior All-American candidate Lang Campbell threw for 368 yards, including 221 to senior wide receiver **Dominique** Thompson, as the 18th-ranked College of William and Mary defeated Liberty, 37-17.

In the first-ever meeting between the schools, Campbell completed 19-of-30 passes to surpass the 300-yard mark for the second time in as many games and the third time this season. Thompson pulled in a career-high 10 catches for a personalbest 221 yards, which ranks as the third-best single-game performance in W&M history behind only David Conklin's 240-yard performance against VMI on Sept. 13, 1997, and Mike Sutton's 226-yard effort at Marshall on Nov. 5, 1983. The College piled up a season-high 498 total yards of offense to the Flames' 264.

Senior Jon Smith carried 19 times for 51 yards and a pair of TDs, while Campbell and sophomore Elijah Brooks each added a score on the ground, as W&M recorded a season-high four rushing TDs.

Junior cornerback Stephen Cason had an outstanding game to pace the defense, sharing team-high honors with eight total tackles, in addition to 1.5 sacks, three pass breakups and 2.5 total tackles for loss. The Tribe defense recorded a season-high seven sacks, led by **Jonas Watson** with two. All-conference candidate Adam O'Connor registered 1.5 sacks to bring his team-leading total

The win gave W&M its fourth consecutive victory and eighth-straight win over a Division I-AA opponent, dating back to the 2003 season.


