FIRST AND 10

The sixth-ranked College of William and Mary hosts 11th-ranked Hampton in the first round of the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs Saturday at 12 p.m. It marks the Tribe's first home playoff game since a first-round matchup with Jackson State in 1996, and W&M's first appearance in the tournament since 2001. Hampton last appeared in the NCAA playoffs in 1998. The College captured a piece of the Atlantic 10 Championship last weekend and the league's automatic bid with a 38-14 win over Richmond, while the Pirates, Champions of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, finished their regular season with a 58-7 victory at Savannah State.



Quick Slant

With a No. 2 national ranking in 1998, Hampton is the highest-ranked team W&M has ever beaten, winning 41-34 on Oct. 31, 1998.

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ALL-AMERICAN, PAYTON AWARD CANDIDATE LANG CAMPBELL 2004 A10 OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Campbell Class of Conference: W&M quarterback Lang Campbell, was named as the Atlantic 10 Football Conference's Offensive Player of the Year and took the first step of what could be a very busy postseason of accolades for the senior Payton Award candidate.

Campbell, who was also named to the league's first team all-conference squad, earned the A10's highest individual offensive honor by being the key component in a Tribe attack that averaged 409.0 yards and 33 points a contest. The Winchester, VA native helped power the squad to a share of the A10 Title and automatic NCAA bid by leading the conference in passing yards (3,037), passing efficiency (164.85) and total offense (3,238).

By ending the season leading the sixth-ranked Tribe to a 38-14 win over archrival Richmond with 291 yards and four touchdowns on 21 completions (in 28 attempts), Campbell earned his third A10 Offensive Player of the Week honor. His other certificates came after games on Sept. 5 (at North Carolina) and Nov. 13 (at James Madison).

Campbell headlines a list of nine Tribe all-conference honorees, and joins kicker Greg Kuehn, who was named as the league's Special Teams Player of the Year, as one of the two W&M players to be named to the first team.

With what promises to be an exciting postseason just ahead, the following is a closer look at some of the highlights for Campbell to this point in the season.

QB Efficiency

• Campbell ended the regular season as the conference's leader, and is currently third nationally,

in QB efficiency rating with a career best mark of 164.85. If he were to maintain, or improve, his rating over the remainder of the year it would stand as the Tribe's best mark since Shawn Knight established the NCAA single-season record of 204.6 in 1993. It currently would rank as the fourth-best, single-season performance in A10 history (since the league began tracking the stat in 1988).

Passing Yards

- With 291 yards vs. Richmond, Campbell improved his season average to a school-record and conference best 276.1 yds/game. Campbell became just the fourth Tribe QB to throw for 3,000 yards in a season (see complete listing on Page 17). By accomplishing this feat in the regular season, he joins former All-American signal-caller Mike Cook (1995-98) as the College's only QBs to accomplish the trick in just 11 games (Cook threw for 3,028 in 1998). Currently, Campbell is just slightly ahead of Cook's school's best single-season passing average of 275.3 yds/game, also set in 1998.
- Campbell's 3,037 passing yards is the thirdbest single-season total in school history. He can climb past Mike Cook's second-place total of 3,166 (set in 1996) with just 130 yards vs. Hampton. He is 378 yards from Chris Hakel's season record of 3,414, set during a 13-game 1990 season (See complete listing on page 17).
- With 5,543 career yards, Campbell is just the sixth QB in school history to breach the 5,000-yard mark (please see complete chart on page 17). He has reached this lofty plateau in just 21 career starts (an average of 264.0 yds/start).

Completion Percentage / Yards/Play

- From his first snaps as a starter last season, Campbell has displayed an uncanny decision-making prowess at the controls of the College's offense. This season is no different, as he is completing an eyecatching .660 of his attempts (215 of 326) and has only one interception. In fact, by completing over 75% of his attempts vs. Richmond, Campbell has now hit on better than 50% of his attempts in all but one of his 21 career starts (vs. UNH, when he connected on 11 of his 23 attempts). For his career, Campbell has a completion percentage of .650, which ranks him second all-time at the College (trailing only Shawn Knight's career mark of .655).
- Since his sub-par performance in the miserable conditions at New Hampshire, Campbell has completed an impeccable .691 percent of his passes over the last nine games (181 completions in 262 attempts). His current completion percentage of .660 is the second-best single-season mark in school history (behind only Shawn Knight's remarkable .694 mark set in 1993).
- Don't mistake Campbell's high completion percentage for the fact that he is making a living by throwing five and six-yard passes, as he is averaging an impressive 9.32 yards/attempt, a figure which ranks third nationally (among QBs with more than 175 attempts). Perhaps what is even more impressive is Campbell's average of 14.2 yds/completion, a figure that leads the league.

Interceptions

• With just one INT in 326 attempts on the season, Campbell's minuscule interception % of .31 is the best in the nation,



Campbell has been on a season-long assault of the College's career offensive charts, as he now ranks sixth in passing yards (5,543), sixth in total offense (6,076) and fifth in TD passes (45).

amongst all levels (the next closest total is Georgetown's Andrew Crawford, who sports a .64 average, with just one INT in 156 attempts).

- Campbell now has thrown 235 consecutive passes without an interception. His last pick came in the second quarter of the season's fourth game (vs. Northeastern). Campbell has thrown 17 TD passes since last being intercepted.
- In 634 career attempts, Campbell has thrown just eight interceptions.
- Campbell's TD to INT ration of 21:1 far and away the nation's best total amongst all QBs (the next best ratio belongs to Bowling Green's Omar Jacobs who sports a 10:1 TD:INT ratio; 32 TDs:3 Ints). For his career, Campbell carries an impressive interception to TD ratio of nearly six to one (45 TDs/8 INT). In 16 career conference starts, Campbell has thrown just three interceptions, as compared to 33 touchdowns.

Against the Best: Campbell's performance against James Madison was just one of many examples of his ability to excel when the spotlight is shining brightest. In fact, in five games against ranked opponents this season (all league games), he averaged 287.5 yds/game, completed 64.7% of his attempts (101 of 156) and accounted for 11 TDs (compared to just one INT).

In his lone outing vs. I-A competition, at the University of North Carolina, Campbell accounted for four touchdowns and 357 total yards in the team's hardfought 49-38 loss in Chapel Hill.



TRIBE HEAD COACH

JIMMYE LAYCOCK

Silver Linings: Jimmye Laycock is in his 25th season as the Tribe's head coach. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 168-112-2 career record at W&M. He ranks fourth on the A-10 career victories lists (65). W&M will make its ninth postseason appearance under Laycock on Saturday, and the Tribe has now posted winning ledgers in 18 of the past 22 seasons.

Good Company: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock, in his 25th season on the W&M sidelines, ranks third among all current Division I-AA and Division I-AA head coaches in terms of most years at their current school. The two coaches ahead of Laycock are Penn State's Joe Paterno (37 years) and Florida State's Bobby Bowden (26 years).

Quotes from the Monday, Nov. 22 , A-10 Coaches Conference Call...

On winning the A10 Championship.

We are extremely excited. As I told the media and the players afterwards, to represent a league as strong as the Atlantic 10 is a tremendous sense of accomplishment for our staff and for our whole team. We know as coaches, from top to bottom, how tough it is to win in the league, much less win a share of the title. We're extremely excited about representing the league and taking part in the NCAA championship.

After 11 weeks is William and Mary battle tested from playing several ranked teams in pressure situations, or are you drained?

We'll find out as we get ready and play this week against Hampton. I thought we played very well Saturday against Richmond. Hopefully, we'll continue to improve and continue to get better. I thought we played with a lot of enthusiasm and had a spring in our step on Saturday. So, I don't think we're drained. We are still okay. We're banged up as everyone is at this point in time. I think our enthusiasm level is high, and I look for us to bounce around and practice well this week

Was there a watershed moment that brought this season together, or did the success really begin the second half of last year [when the Tribe won four-straight to finish 5-5 overall]?

Well, a lot was said about last year. I think it is because we won our last four and carried the momentum from the wins into the off-season and had a good spring. We really started getting things on track like we had them in the past. But, if I had to look at one point, I would have to go to the North Carolina game W&M dropped narrow 49-38 decision in Sept. 4 season-opener]. I thought after that ballgame, the way we competed, the way we met the challenge, the way we played, even though we weren't able to hold on at the end to win it, I said this team has got something about it. This team can play. This team has got some competitors. They will be a challenger. And then, we went up to [then 10th-ranked] New Hampshire in the rain and met that challenge [winning 9-7]. These guys are coming to play, and I hope we keep on going and getting better. But, I think we set the tone early with the type of character and type of players we have.

On the overall performance in the A10.

I think the league has had a lot of teams that have performed very well. I don't know how you can say someone has done better than another. Obviously, I

think that we've done pretty well. We've played hard every week, but other people have too. I think it's a very competitive and tough league.

[Payton Award Candidate, senior QB] Lang Campbell certainly showed his ability last season, but this year he has really taken it up another notch. Did you see the potential he had for such success?

I did, but Lang has made it all possible. He is a hard worker and is extremely self-motivated. For example, last year he played well, but after the season he recognized that he had worn down in the last few games, so he worked out all throughout the off-season and stayed here in the summer and improved on his strength and stamina. He is a phenomenal player and it has been a pleasure coaching him and knowing him.

It has been a couple years since W&M was in the tournament, so only a few of the upperclassmen have playoff experience. How much does that mean at this point?

I don't think it matters much. I suppose it could help to have experience in situations like this where you need to win to survive. I believe how you have played at the end of the season heading into the tournament is far more important than what you and previous teams have done in the past.

What do you know about first-round opponent Hampton?

I know [Hampton head] Coach Joe Taylor and have tremendous respect for him and the program he runs at Hampton. Right now, I don't know much specifically about their team. It's been very busy this weekend, so I haven't gotten around to watching much tape yet, but we will catch up on that this week.

Would you prefer to see a tiebreaker game in the Atlantic 10 at the end of the season?

I think it would be something extremely difficult to organize and pull off. There are some outstanding teams in our conference and winning the league is a great accomplishment, whether or not there is a tie at the end. We are very proud to have finished on top, as I'm sure the other teams are too.

Are you surprised about being seeded third?

I am a little surprised considering we haven't been that high before. But, once you get into the tournament, every team is good and you have to be prepared to play regardless of the seeding.

Lang Campbell has gotten a lot of attention this year for all he has accomplished. Do you feel there are some unsung heroes on this team who have really contributed to this season's success, but haven't received as much attention?

One guy that has been under the radar a bit is our kicker [junior all-conference performer] Greg Kuehn, who has been tremendous. He has two walk-off game winners, as they call them in baseball, and also kicked three field goals in the rain at [10th-ranked] New Hampshire to win that game, 9-7. He has been a big factor this year. There are other guys on offense, like [senior all-conference running back] Jon Smith, who don't get as much attention because of the passing game, but he has always been steady and is always playing hard. He is the kind of guy you have to have a lot of respect for. On defense, there is junior linebacker Thad Wheeler, who is a walk-on and has been playing with a banged up shoulder this season. He makes you shake your head and wonder how he can play with it, but he has gone out there every day and done a great job.

NCAA PLAYOFFS FIRST ROUND VS. HAMPTON - Nov. 27, 2004

W&M PLAYOFF HISTORY

Postseason History: In earning the Atlantic 10 Conference's automatic bid, and the NCAA's No. 3 seed, the Tribe will be making its seventh appearance in the NCAA I-AA Playoffs. The Tribe has played eight total games in its six previous visits (all during head coach Jimmye Laycock's tenure), advancing to the quarterfinals on two occasions. The Tribe has won two of the eight games, including its last two home games (1996 and 1990).

The last time W&M hosted a home game in the playoffs was after the 1996 season, which also saw the College run off a 9-2 regular season record and capture the conference's automatic bid. The Southwestern Athletic Conference's Jackson State was the opponent on that afternoon, which saw the Tribe jump out to an early lead and eventually capture a decisive 45-6 win.

The Tribe is 2-1, all-time, in playoff contests at Zable. The following is a complete list the Tribe's home playoff contests.

Since the Tribe is a seeded team, and has submitted bids to host for the first three rounds, the squad is assured a second home game, should it prevail on Saturday, vs. the Pirates. A win would bring the College its first quarterfinal home game in school history.

THE W&M-HU SERIES

Against the Pirates: Saturday's game with Hampton will mark the biggest stage the young series between the two Tidewater powers has seen since the teams first met in the season opener of the 1997 season. The College has prevailed in both contests, but the last meeting (in 1998) came down to the wire as a then-second ranked Pirates squad was not defeated until W&M safety Komlan Lonergan pulled down an interception in the end zone with less than a minute remaining to secure a 41-34 Tribe win.

With less than forty minutes of interstate separating the two campuses, bragging rights for the Peninsula hang in the balance. When the Tribe started the 1997 season off with a 31-6 win over Hampton, the Pirates proceeded to rip off 10-consecutive wins to end that year and earn its first NCAA Division I-AA playoff bid. Then, HU started its 1998 season with another seven-straight wins and was ranked second nationally before the Tribe visited the Hampton campus and ended the run with the cliff-hanger victory. Despite the setback to the College, the Pirates were still counted among the nation's elite teams and eventually made a visit to the NCAA Playoffs that season as well.

Certainly, a series that is just two games old doesn't really lend itself much towards establishing trends, streaks or such, especially when the last meeting came a full seven years ago, but since its all there is, I present the following:

- In two games vs. Hampton, the Tribe has thrown for 580 yards and six TDs, completing 41 of 69 attempts (.600). Included in those 41 completions are six touchdown passes, against just one INT (former Tribe All-American Mike Cook is responsible for the majority of the numbers). Conversely, the Pirates have thrown seven interceptions over the two meetings, vs. just two scoring passes. But, the squad had completed 46 of 85 total attempts (.541) for 543 yards.
- Speaking of turnovers, Hampton committed nine in the two games, vs. just three total for the College.
- The Tribe has scored an average of 36 points in the two games, while it had limited the Pirates to an average of 20 points.
- Hampton out gained the Tribe in the second meeting, 505 total yards to 494, on the strength of a series-best 353 passing yards by QB Roy Johnson, but was slowed by his four interceptions that afternoon.
- In the first contest, at Zable Stadium, Cook was an extremely efficient 18 for 27 for 243 yards and three scores (in just over a half of work).
- The College also holds a slight edge on the ground, as it has out rushed the Pirates 246 yards to 216 in the two games. W&M is averaging 3.8 yards an attempt vs. Hampton, while HU's ground game averaged 2.6 yd/attempt in the two games.

The only possible factor that could

give the numbers above any significance is the fact that both teams have retained its head coaches since the last meeting. Hampton's Joe Taylor has been one of the more consistent winners in the I-AA ranks in recent years and has been widely recognized as one of the nation's respected coaches in his 13 years on the Pirates' sidelines. Much the same can be said for the Tribe's Jimmye Laycock, as he has shaped the College into one the nation's premier programs in his 25 years at the top of the Tribe program.

Did You Know?: That former Pirate standout running back Montrell Coley is the cousin of current William and Mary sophomore tailback Delmus Coley. Montrell was a first team All-MEAC selection and a Third Team Sports Network All-American in his senior season. Delmus seems to be ready to follow in his cousins' large footsteps, as he led the Tribe in rushing as a redshirt freshman a season ago and is preparing to make a strong comeback from a knee injury suffered in the 10th game of 2003 that sidelined him for the entire 2004 season.

Coincidence?: Including the 2004 season, the Hampton Pirates have faced the Tribe in every season that they've made

an NCAA I-AA Playoff appearance (1997 and 1998 being the other years HU has played in the I-AA postseason).

W&M TEAM NOTES

Poll Watching: With its second consecutive week with a No. 6 billing in the Sports Network I-AA Top 25, William and Mary has been ranked in the top-10 for the third consecutive week. It also is the Tribe's highest ranking since Oct. 19, 1998, when W&M was also tabbed No. 6. The Tribe was ranked No. 9 in the TSN preseason poll that year and slipped to No. 10 in the Sept. 2, 2002 poll, after a season-opening loss to Indiana. It had been 39 consecutive polling weeks since the Green and Gold appeared in the top 10, before entering at No. 10 on Nov. 7.

Looking at the ESPN/USA Today I-AA Top 25, the Tribe is also ranked No. 6 in this week's installment. W&M has been ranked or receiving votes in every ESPN/USA Today poll this season. THE LAST MEETING

#12 William and Mary 41, #2 Hampton 34

HAMPTON, VA(10/31/98) - Senior All-American quarterback Mike Cook threw a 65-yard touchdown pass to sophomore wide receiver Chris Rosier with 2:53 remaining to lift 12th-ranked William and Mary over previously unbeated and second-ranked Hampton, 41-34, at Armstrong Stadium in Hampton.

It was the third time Cook and Rosier connected on scoring passes, as Cook completed 21 of 37 attempts for 339 yards and three touchdowns. Rosier hauled in seven catches for 150 yards and established a career-high for touchdown receptions.

The game-winning strike came just 33 seconds after the Pirates' Montrell Coley, cousin of current Triber RB Delmus Coley, knotted the score at 34-34 with a five-yard TD run, his second of the game

Sophomore tailback Hameen Ali carried 25 times for 133 yards and two touchdowns to pace the Tribe ground attack, and four different players recorded an interception, as W&M overcame 505 yards of total offense by Hampton.

Pirates' quarterback Roy Johnson threw for 353 and two TDs, including an 80-yard scoring strike to wide receiver Warren Broughton in the second quarter, but was interceted by the Tribe's Mike Beverly, Jimmy Cerminaro, Komlan Lonergan and Hasani Cameron.



More on the Rankings: The Nov. 13th win at then fourth-ranked James Madison was the Tribe's second win over a top-10 team on the road this season, having also defeated then 10th-ranked New Hampshire, 9-7, on Sept. 18. Overall, it was the Tribe's fifth contest against a ranked opponent this season, as W&M has posted a 4-1 mark against ranked opposition. The College will be facing its sixth ranked opponent of the season Saturday, as Hampton sports a No. 12 national ranking heading the playoffs.

JMU was the second-highest ranked team the Tribe faced this season, having also taken on Delaware, which was tabbed No. 3 at the time. Despite jumping out to a 21-7 first-quarter lead, W&M dropped a narrow 31-28 decision to the Blue Hens on Oct. 23, marking the Tribe's only loss to a ranked opponent this season.

Computer Savvy: While on the subject of rankings, William and Mary remained third in the USA Today/Sagarin computer rankings. W&M, which has been rated as high as No. 2 in the Sagarin ratings this season, owns the second-highest position of all A10 teams, one spot behind No. 2 New Hampshire, which the Tribe defeated, 9-7, on the road earlier this season.

W&M moved up 12 spots to No. 50 overall in Division I, checking in higher than such traditional I-A powers as Washington State (51), Maryland (52), Nebraska (54) and Michigan State (64).

Simply the Best: By choosing four Atlantic 10 Conference teams to compete amongst the final 16 in the championships

field, the NCAA selection committee seems to have verified what the statistics and polls have shown all season, that the A10 is the nation's premier I-AA conference. With four teams currently ranked in the national top 10 (Delaware, No. 10, James Madison, No. 9, William and Mary, No. 6 and UNH, No. 5), the case for the A10 being so strongly represented was a good one. Overall the league has a mark of 21-5 against fellow I-AA competition and has recorded a pair of wins over I-A schools. Including all games, the Atlantic 10 is a stellar 23-11 in non-conference play.

In the latest Sagarin Rankings, the A10 is far-and-away the highest I-AA conference, as can be seen by the following listing of the top 8;

Sensational Silver Season: William and Mary put an exclamation point on what has been an exceptional 2004 regular season by defeating state and conference rival Richmond, 38-14, last Saturday. Coincidentally, all of this success has come as head coach Jimmye Laycock celebrates his milestone 25th season at the helm of the program.

Already this season, the Tribe has secured its 15th winning season in the last 17 years (only non-winning seasons have been in 1991 – 5-6; and 2000 – 5-6). With a 7-1 record in conference play, the Tribe is also posted its 12th-straight .500, or better, record in conference play (every season the College has been a member of the league). Every other conference team has suffered through at least one losing season in league play during this span.

The following are some of the other significant accomplishments that the program has achieved this season:

William and Mary has ...

• Won the Atlantic 10 Co-Championship, earned the conference's automatic bid and was named as the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Playoffs, the highest seed school history.

- Defeated four ranked opponents (No. 10 New Hampshire, 9-7; No. 16 Northeastern, 38-35; No. 19 Villanova, 37-29; and No. 4 James Madison, 27-24) on the season. One has to go back to the 2001 season to find the last time the Tribe has defeated as many top 20 teams.
- Recorded a pair of road wins over two teams currently in the NCAA's Championship field of 16 (New Hampshire and James Madison).
- Improved Laycock's career record in conference play to 65-33 and his conference winning percentage to .663. Currently, his winning percentage is good for 15th on the league's all-time listing. His .663 winning percentage in conference play trails only Tubby Raymond (.701, 89-36) and Mark Whipple (.686, 35-16) amongst all-time league coaches who have 50, or more, league games under their belts.
- Secured its best regular season record since 1996 and became only the eighth team in school history to win nine games in a season.
- Won all five home games on the season, its first undefeated home regular season since 1996. The 1990 and 1996 teams are the only squads in school history to win six home games in a single year (as each won a first round home playoff game after sweeping the regular season home slate). The Tribe now has won its last six-straight home games, dating back to last season.
- Finished the season with a 7-1-conference record, which ties it for the most single-season conference wins in school history.
- Finished the regular season with a top 10 ranking for the first time since the 1996 season.
- Seen this year's senior class become the first in school history to collect two conference championship rings.

What a difference a year makes: Taking a look back at the 2003 final defensive statistics (W&M played 10 games, due to Sept. 27th cancellation of Maine game), the unit has improved in nearly every defensive category through the 2004 regular season, which not surprisingly led to an 9-2 overall mark.

Most notably, the Tribe is allowing nearly seven points fewer per game at 22.9, which ranks fourth in the A10 in scoring defense. Also, the unit is yielding close to 60 less rushing yards per contest. Going hand in hand with the decrease in

rushing yards is a dramatic decline in the number of rushing touchdowns allowed by the Tribe. In 10 games last season, W&M surrendered 24 touchdowns on the ground, but cut that number to 16 this year.

The Best Defense is ...: The Nov. 13 win at James Madison marked the end of a brutal scheduling quirk that pitted the Tribe against the Atlantic 10's current top four defenses in consecutive weeks. Starting with a Delaware squad that was second overall in the league (10/23), through this past weekend's contest with a Dukes defense that entered the game second in total defense and first in points allowed, the College managed to post very impressive numbers.

Led by Payton Award Nominee and All-American Candidate, QB Lang Campbell, W&M didn't missed a beat.

The following is a look at what the defense was averaging coming into the contest, and then what the Tribe's attack was able to post against them.

In the four games, the squad amassed 1,747 total yards, an average of 436.75 yds/gm, including 303.8 yards/game passing, and better than 33 points a contest (133 total).

Not in a Giving Mood: While several members of the Tribe football team are involved in various charities throughout the Tidewater area, the William and Mary offense, as a whole, could be classified as

downright selfish when it comes to helping handouts to opposing defenses. The win at James Madison marked the fourth time this season that the Tribe ended a game with no turnovers (the others being at UNC, vs. URI and vs. Villanova). The College has not had more than one turnover in any game and currently is second in the league, and 17th in the nation, with a +.87 turnover margin.

Did You Know?: That William and Mary's total of seven turnovers (one INT, six fumbles) on the season is the lowest figure in the nation. The next closest total on the I-AA level is 11 by Cornell.

Three teams are currently tied for the NCAA single-season record for fewest turnovers with nine (Hofstra in 1999, Harvard in 2001 and Yale in 1999).

Continued Greatness: By ending the season scoring 38 points and running up 473 total yards in the win over Richmond, the Tribe's entire offensive unit, only seems to only get more efficient and effective as the season wears on. With the standout performance over Richmond, William and Mary ended the regular season averaging 409.0 yards and 33.3 points a contest. It marks the first time since the 2001 season that the Tribe has averaged over 400 yards and 30 points a game. But, amazingly, it is the eighth time in the last 15 seasons since 1990 that a Laycock coached offense has produced a season average of better 400 yards and 30 points a contest.

The following are just some of high-

lights of what the Tribe's attack has accomplished this season:

The College's offense has ...

- Scored 31, or more, points in eight of the 11 games on the season. It's average of 33.3 pts/game ranks it second in the league and 20th in the nation.
- Fashioned 37 scoring drives of 60 yards or more (out of 61 total). (See a complete listing on page 27).
- Thrown for more yards than 10 of 11 opponents (only exception being Villanova) on the season and has been out rushed by only four (UNC, URI, Delaware and James Madison).
- Turned the ball over only six times (five fumbles, one interception). The only other turnover for the College on the season came on a muffed punt. Currently, the College is second in the conference and 17th nationally in turnover margin with a +.82/game average.
- Been held scoreless in just eight of the 44 quarters it has played this season. Overall, the team has scored points of some kind in 82% of the quarters on the year (36 of 44).
- Averaged 283.73 passing yards/game, which ranks second in the conference and eighth nationally.

Seeing Red: The Tribe's offense is nothing, if not persistent when it comes to finishing drives. Against Richmond, the College was its usual efficient self in the red zone, as it converted all four trips inside the Spiders' 20-yard line into touchdowns.

Entering this weekend's action with Hampton, the College has converted an amazing 49 of its 52 red zone opportunities into points (36 TDs, 13 FGs; .942).

The Tribe started the season with an incredible streak of 40-straight conversions (with Campbell at QB). This was snapped two weeks ago against Villanova, as the Wildcats snuffed out a W&M fourth-andgoal attempt from the one-yard line (in the fourth quarter). Before that stop, the last time that Campbell and the Tribe's attack failed to convert an opportunity in the red zone came in the ninth game of the 2003 season (vs. UNH; a fumble at the 10-yard line late in the second quarter). Since that miscue, W&M had run off points of some variety in 48-consecutive ventures inside the opposition's 20-yard line (36 TDs, 12 FGs). (See complete chart on page 28).

Cashing In: In the regular-season ending 38-14 victory over Richmond Saturday, the Tribe forced at least one turnover for the fourth consecutive game, and for the fourth consecutive game the offense turned a take away into points.

Junior **Jon Shaw's** interception at the W&M 23-yard line in the third quarter led to a five-play, 77-yard scoring drive that was capped by a five-yard TD pass to Joe Nicholas. It was the 12th time this season that the Tribe converted a turnover into points of some kind, and more importantly, of the 12 times it was the 10th time W&M took it to the house for six points.

In the Nov. 13th win over JMU, senior Jon Smith's scored on a three-yard run three plays after **Chris Ndubueze** forced a fumble on third down, which was recovered by junior defensive back **Stephen Cason.**

Smith was the benefactor yet again in the Nov. 6th win over Villanova, scoring from 17 yards out after senior defensive lineman **Wade Harrell's** 19-yard interception return in the fourth quarter. It was Harrell's second interception of the season, extending his W&M record for interceptions by a down lineman to four.

At Towson on Oct. 30, after Ndubueze recorded his first career interception, W&M went 65 yards on 12 plays and junior Greg Kuehn kicked a 32-yard field goal to give the Tribe a 24-3 lead heading into halftime. (See scoring drives chart on page 27.)

Covering the Kicks: The Tribe completed the regular season leading the A10 in kick-off coverage, yielding just 18.5 yards per kickoff return. That figure will be severely tested in Saturday's first-round playoff game against Hampton, as the Pirates lead the nation in kickoff return averaging, gaining nearly 30 yards per return (29.5). HU senior Jerome Mathis, an All-American in the 200-yard dash, has returned 21 kicks for 722 yards this season, an average of 34.4 per attempt, and has taken a kickoff to the house four times.

No Flags on the Play: Discipline has long been a customary trademark of head coach Jimmye Laycock's program, and this season has certainly been no different, as the College has been penalized fewer times than any other A10 team (55). W&M has been flagged for a total of 456 yards this season (45.6/game).

INDIVIDUAL OFFENSIVE NOTES

Upward Trend: Despite a scintillating 322-yard, four TD effort (two passing, two rushing) performance in the season opener at North Carolina, Tribe Payton Award Candidate, QB Lang Campbell's QB efficiency rating sat at a career low 140.7 three games into the 2004 campaign. He sat sixth in the conference and was not amongst the top 20 in the nation. But, starting with his career-best 378-yard afternoon in the overtime win at Northeastern, Campbell's efficiency rating has sky-rocked a remarkable 24 full points over the past eight weekends to its current career-best mark of 164.85. This figure ranks him first in the conference and places him third nationally.

The biggest surge came over the weekends that had seen him face off against two of the better defenses in the conference (Delaware and Towson). In the two games, Campbell completed 40 of his 59 attempts (.678) for 623 yards and seven touchdowns (vs. no interceptions) and ballooned his QB rating 12 points.

Record Breaking: Campbell's 323-yard afternoon vs. James Madison was his fifth, 300-yard-plus effort in 11 games on the season, which stands the school's single-season record for 300-yard games.

Campbell passed former Tribe alltime great signal callers, Mike Cook (1998), Chris Hakel (1991) and Stan Yagiello (1985), who each turned in four afternoons of 300-plus passing yards in a single season.

The Bottom Line: While Campbell's career has produced some gaudy statistics, perhaps none are more impressive than the fact that he has lead the Tribe to wins in 11 of the last 13 games, including 10 of his last 11 conference tilts.

He sports a career overall record of 14-7 as a starter, including a 11-5 mark in conference play.

Did You Know?: NCAA Division I-AA record low for a interception percentage (among QBs with more than 324 attempts) is .84, set by Jimmy Blanchard of Portland State during the 1999 season (3 INTs in 355 attempts). Campbell's .31 is well below the mark, but, since the 2002 season, the NCAA has started to include post-season statistics in the NCAA record

books, so he must maintain it through what remains of the post season.

What's in a Name?: Lang Campbell's given name is Samuel Langdon Campbell. He goes by his middle name, as does his maternal grandfather, Samuel Langdon Gordon, whom he is named after.

Hard to Believe?: Despite the Tribe's great history of offensive excellence, and having averaged over 400 yards and nearly 30 points a game since joining the conference in 1993, Campbell is the College's first player to earn the prestigious award in the team's 12 seasons as a conference member. Two players (Jason Miller, 1995; and Darren Sharper, 1996) have earned the conference Defensive Player of the Year honors, while three have earned the Rookie of the Year honors (WR Dave Conklin, 1995; QB Dave Corley, 1999; and WR Rich Musinski, 2000).

U'Nique Performer: Entering the season, the Tribe's coaching staff had focused on finding an able replacement for the void left by the graduation of All-American WR Rich Musinski (who graduated with school career records in receptions, 223, receiving yards, 4,168, and TD receptions, 31). The team turned to senior Dominique Thompson and he responded to the challenge by turning in what has the potential to go down as one of, if not THE finest season ever by a Tribe wide out. 1,186 receiving yards and 10 TDs on just 55 catches (an average of 21.6 yds/catch) earned him his first career all-conference recognition, as he was named to the A10's Second Team, and marks him as one of the most dangerous deep threats in the league.

He has turned in four 100-yard plus receiving efforts in the last eight games. With 122 yards vs. Towson (10/30) he became just the sixth Tribe player to break the 1,000-yard barrier on a season, and the first to do it in just eight games (the previous best was nine games by Rich Musinski in 2001; which he ended with a school record 1,393 yards in 12 games).

His 10 touchdown receptions on the season is already the top single-season total since Musinski brought in 12 in 12 games in 2001. The single-season record for receiving TDs is 15, set by Vito Ragazzo in the 1947 season.

The following is a little closer look

at some of what Thompson has accomplished so far this season:

- Only Tribe player to record two, 200plus yard games (244 at Delaware, 10/23; 221 at Liberty) in a career (much less a single season, or four game span).
- His last eight games include three performances in the Tribe's top 20 single-game records (157 vs. NE, 18th; 221 at Liberty, 4th; and 244 at Delaware, 1st). By comparison, Rich Musinski has only four games in the top 20 out of his 46 career starts (to Thompson's 11). (See a complete listing on page 26)
- With 1,186 receiving yards, he holds the second position on the team's single-season receiving yardage list (see complete chart on page 17). He broke the 1,000-yard barrier quicker than any player in school history (eight games). The former record was nine games, set by Rich Musinski in 2001.
- His average of 107.8 yds/game ranks fifth nationally and is second in the A10.
- His average of 21.6 yds/catch currently ranks third nationally among players with more than 35 receptions.
- Has four scoring plays of 60-plus yards (87, 77, 64 and 62) on the season.
- 47 of his 55 receptions on the season have resulted in first downs for the Tribe.

He ended his regular season with a solid four-catch, 74-yard performance vs. Richmond, that was highlighted by a 25-yard TD catch in the first quarter. He also contributed a 38-yard reception in the third quarter that set the team up inside the Spider five-yard line and led directly to another Tribe score. This performance was one-week removed from an effort at James Madison, that at least on paper, would seem a fairly non-descript, as Thompson tallied a modest three catches for 59 yards. These numbers would seem to be especially tame compared to some of the huge outings he has put up in the past couple of weeks. But, numbers are deceiving as Thompson played a crucial role in helping lead the Tribe to the upset in Harrisonburg.

His first catch of the afternoon came on the Tribe's first, and only, possession of the third quarter. W&M, trailing by seven points, had come up empty on its last two series (in the second quarter) and was desperately looking to make a play. Faced with a third and seven at its own 42-yard line, Thompson provided the spark by

connecting with Campbell on a slick 35-yard pick up on a crossing route that put the Tribe in business on the Madison 23. Just five snaps later, the College was in the end zone and back in the ball game.

Thompson came through even larger on the crucial final series, where the Tribe moved 43 yards in just five plays (and 38 seconds) to set up the game-winning field goal. Despite drawing extra attention from the Madison defense, the native of Durham, NC still worked his way open for a pair of clutch catches on the improbable drive. His first was a quick stop route along the sideline that picked up six yards and stopped the clock. This set up his second reception, which was an 18-yard gain over the middle, which ended with him holding onto the ball after taking a huge hit. Two plays later, place kicker Greg Kuehn ended it with his right foot.

Record Setting: Thompson had a schoolrecord 244 receiving yard afternoon vs. Delaware (10/23). His four touchdowneffort, on just six receptions, vs. the Blue Hens ranks as a performance unrivaled in the College's 100-plus year football history. The scintillating effort included scoring plays of 87 (also a school record), 64, 62 and 10 yards. Most of his damage came in the first quarter, as he rang the Delaware defense up or 159 yards and three scores. The afternoon, which was his second 200yard outing in the last four games, earned Thompson the league's Offensive Player of the Week, as well as national honors from ESPN/USA Today, who named him its I-AA National Offensive Player of the Week. He was also tabbed as Weekly All-Star by the web site I-AA.org.

The following is a point-by-point rundown of what Thompson accomplished during the game vs. Delaware:

- Set school record for receiving yards (244, old record was 240 set by Dave Conklin vs. VMI in 1997 on nine receptions).
- Four TDs ties school record for singlegame TD receptions (most recently set by Corey Ludwig in 1993 vs. Maine).
- His one-game average of 40.7 yds/catch establishes school's single game record (among players with more than five catches). He was just off the NCAA's singlegame record of 44.6, set by former NFL standout John Taylor while he was at Delaware State in 1985 (vs. Division II St.

Paul's, 9/21/85).

- The 159 first quarter yards is a school record.
- His 87-yard TD reception ties the school's 43-year old record for longest pass play, first set by current NFL coach Dan Henning, who connected with Tom Scott vs. Navy in 1961.
- Also set the College's record for pass plays of 60 or more yards in game (three).
- His 244 yards ranks as eighth best single-game performance in A10 history and is the fourth-best effort in a game between two league teams.

More on Thompson: In the Tribe's win over Liberty (10/9), Thompson established a career high in receptions with 10 (for 221 yards). His 10 catches is made more impressive by the fact that only THREE Tribe players have recorded 10, or more, receptions in the last 10 years in Laycock's diverse, spread the field, offense. For example, the top four receivers in school history (in terms of catches) combined for just a TOTAL of three 10-plus-reception afternoons (Rich Musinski, two; Dave Conklin, one).

Fantastic Frosh: Redshirt freshman Joe Nicholas has steadily emerged one of the conference's most reliable possession receivers over the final weeks of the season. He has teamed with senior John Pitts and junior TE Adam Bratton (see Big Target note to follow) to give opposing defenses fits by working underneath zones and in the flats. With at least one game left in his 2004 season, and 42 catches already to his credit, Nicholas is just three receptions away from breaking the William and Mary freshman record.

He has caught five, or more, passes in four of the last five games, and has caught at least one ball in 10 of the 11 games on the season. Two weeks ago, in the crucial win at James Madison, Nicholas established a career-best seven receptions against the stingy Dukes defense for 77 yards. Last week against Richmond, he brought down six spirals for 91 yards and a touchdown. Also included in his afternoon, was a career long 51-yard catch and run. He had his career-best afternoon, in terms of yardage, vs. Northeastern, when he collected 111 yards on six receptions.

Three players hold the Tribe's freshman record for receptions and, perhaps not

coincidently, all three went on to place in the top five in both the College's all-time receptions and receiving yardage listings. The following is a listing of the top five seasons by freshman receivers in school history.

Did You Know?: That Conklin, Rosier and Musinski each earned the league's Rookie of the Year Award for their stand-out freshman campaigns. Nicholas would probably had an outside chance at the honor this season, had New Hampshire freshman QB Ricky Santos not turned in such gaudy numbers in leading the Wildcats to an improbable top 5 national ranking.

Big Target: As previously mentioned, sure-handed senior John Pitts has also been a consistent contributor to the College's attack. Pitts, who came into the season with just 21 career receptions for 310 yards, has made at least one catch in all 11 games and has been especially clutch, as of late. This past weekend, on the College's first second half possession vs. Richmond, he sparked what turned out to be a 24-point, third-quarter explosion by the College by cradling a perfectly

placed pass and racing 64 yards deep into Spider territory. W&M scored on the next play and the rout was on. Pitts ended the afternoon with a career-best 93 yards on just four receptions. Just three weeks prior, against 19th-ranked Villanova, Pitts established a career-high with six catches for 64 yards, while a five-yard TD grab at fourth-ranked James Madison highlighted his four-catch, 61-yard performance vs. the Dukes the following week.

Working primarily out of the slot receiver position, Pitts' sure hands, large frame (6-3, 215 pounds), and veteran's understanding of the College's intricate offense makes it very difficult for opposing defenses to match up with him. He currently is third on the squad in both receptions (31) and yards (417).

Great Endings: While he isn't currently working on an English writing degree, junior Adam Bratton has been giving the Tribe fans some great "endings" from his tight end position over the last four weeks. All terrible (and that was terrible) puns aside, Bratton has elevated his game as the College has hit the stretch run. Of his 10 total receptions and 131 yards on the season, nine catches and 113 yards, plus all three of his TDs, have come over the last four contests. This past weekend, he established career highs for catches (three) and TDs (two) in the win over Richmond. One week earlier, in the win over James Madison, Bratton turned in his career high yardage after with 45 on just two catches.

Bratton's increased production has corresponded with his recovery from a painful hip injury sustained in the Tribe's win over Northeastern, which caused him to see limited action over the next three games. Also, he has needed to step up his game an additional notch after fellow tight end Matt Trinkle was put out of action in the win at Towson (four games ago).

Large and Taking Charge: After gaining 694 yards (258 attempts) through the first seven games, including a season low 30 yards vs. Delaware, the Tribe has reversed the trend and produced 584 yards (on 148 attempts) over the final four games. The College was averaging just less than 2.7 yds/att after the contest with Delaware, but has now upped its season average to 3.4 yds/attempt.

Obviously, the heart of this turnaround comes from the play of the front five. Four

of the Tribe's five offensive lineman; center Pat Mulloy, tackles Matt Witham and Mike Grenz, and guard Ryan Lumm; have started the majority of the last 21 games for the College, while sophomore guard Cody Morris, has started every game this season and was a key component in the playing rotation last year. This cohesiveness has given the Tribe outstanding pass blocking all season (having allowed just 16 sacks) and is starting to tell in the rushing game.

The College's starting five will hold a significant size advantage vs. the Pirates' defensive front, as the Tribe's six starters (including the TE Adam Bratton) along the offensive front average 6-4, 285 pounds, compared to the Richmond defensive front which averages 6-5, 263 pounds. 
Did You Know?: In his first full season as a starter, sophomore guard Cody Morris earned Second Team All-Atlantic 10 honors and extended an impressive streak that has seen at least one Tribe offensive lineman earn all-conference recognition since it joined the league before the 1993 season. In all, 15 William and Mary offensive lineman have earned a total of 20 all-conference certificates in the 12 seasons the College has been a conference member.

Morris joins former guard Josh Beyer as the only Tribe lineman to earn the all-conference recognition as a sophomore. Beyer went on to earn All-American honors after both his junior and senior seasons of 1995 and 1996.

One Solid Senior: While on the subject of all-conference performances, Tribe senior tailback Jon Smith ran his way to his second career all-conference honors in 2004, as he was named to the A10's Third-Team. Few backs in the league can boast of as long and as steady a career as Smith has provided for the College's backfield the better part of the last four seasons, as he has seen action in 42 career games.

His experience allows him to excel at all the subtle alignments and assignments required of his position. This season, he has teamed with sophomore tailback Elijah Brooks to provide quarterback Lang Campbell with an especially outstanding pair of blitz pickups in the passing game.

Starting with his season-best rushing performance vs. Towson (113 yards on 16

carries), Smith has scored at least one TD in each of the last four games, including a three-TD effort in the win over Villanova. Last week, in the win over Richmond, Smith rushed for a touchdown and 88 yards on 12 carries and pushed his season total to 590 yards (on 153 attempts). He currently is among the league's leaders in touchdown runs, with 11 on the year.

For his career, Smith currently ranks eighth on the Tribes's all-time rushing list with 2,352 yards. (Please see complete listing on page 18).

A typical effort for Smith came in the Tribe's win at James Madison. While he and Brooks combined to rush for only 40 yards on 17 carries, each found other ways to contribute, as the pair contributed a collective six catches for 66 yards. Also, Smith hammered out a three-yard fourth quarter scoring jaunt. The TD run was only the third rushing TD that the Dukes have yielded to I-AA competition on the year.

He now has 2,264 career rushing yards, a figure which places him in eighth place on the Tribe's all-time list (see complete listing on page 18).

Familiar Territory: Smith's touchdown vs. the Spiders marked his 35 career rushing TDs in his 42 career games. His 11 rushing TDs on the season are the most he

has had in a single season since recording 13 in his redshirt freshman year of 2001.

Clutch Kicker: Junior kicker Greg Kuehn was one of two Tribe players to earn first team all-conference honors in 2004. The honor was his third in three-years as the starter and has positioned him as one of the elite kickers in the nation. Much of his accolades have come as a result of his penchant for coming through with the clutch kicks throughout his 32 career games. Included in his late heroics was the game-winner vs. then 16th-ranked Northeastern in overtime earlier this season, but none really can compare to his coming through with the 46-yard game winner at then third-ranked James Madison two weekends past.

In the face of a stiff breeze, which was gusting up to 20 mph throughout the game, Kuehn delivered a FG that sailed through the uprights with no time remaining on the game clock and put the College in charge of its own destiny, as far as post-season and conference title hopes were concerned.

This past weekend, Kuehn nailed his only attempt of the afternoon, a 44-yarder, and maintained his conference lead in FG/gm with an average of 1.45. After having spent the majority of the season as the national leader in field goals, his average currently ranks him tied for second place amongst all I-AA kicker, while his 16 total field goals (in 21 attempts) also rank as the second highest figure in the nation.

Kuehn has recorded three field goals in one game on three separate occasions this season and a total of six times in his career. Kuehn currently has 43 career FGs (on 60 attempts, .717 conversion %), a total that is the fourth-best in Tribe history and the fifth-best career total in the Atlantic 10 (see chart on page 18).

Kuehn's average of 8.4 points/game is second amongst conference kickers and ranks 22nd nationally amongst all players.

The gusty conditions at James Madison two weeks ago pushed a 32-yard attempt just left and snapped a string of 14 consecutive makes from inside of 40 yards (which dated back to last season), but he still has been nearly automatic from the range, as he misfired only a total of six times in 38 career tries from inside the 40 (.842).

Kuehn earned the Atlantic 10's Spe-

cial Team's Player of the Week honors on two occasions this season and was named the Special Teams Player of the Year. His first honor came when he provided all the points in the Tribe's 9-7 upset at then 10th-ranked New Hampshire. He was recognized again, for his efforts against Northeastern, when he was no less valuable, and possibly even a little more clutch, as accounted for 12 points on three field goals and three extra points. His final field goal of that afternoon came on a 28-yard effort in overtime and sealed the 38-35 win for the College.


Kuehn has already put himself in the Tribe's record books this season, as he has been true on all 44 of his extra point attempts. Against VMI (9/25), his first attempt marked the 51st-straight conversion, breaking former All-American Brett Sterba's school-record of 50, set between the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Kuehn has now booted 88 consecutive extra points and has not missed a point after since the 2002 season (vs. Northeastern). For his career, Kuehn has converted 111 of his 112 XPT attempts (.991). His 111 career extra points ranks tied for eighth in the A10's all-time listing.

The College's success in the kicking game has been well documented over the seasons, as a Tribe place kicker has been named to the all-conference team in each of the last eight years. As has been previously mentioned, Kuehn now has earned the honor each of the his three seasons as a starter and will be poised to enter is senior season as the only kicker to ever earn all-conference recognition four times.

The Tribe's school record for career field goals is held by current NFL stand-out, Steve Christie, who hammered out 57 career three-pointers. Two-time all-conference performer, Brian Shallcross is second with 48 treys, while Sterba sits in third with 46. Shallcross and Sterba currently hold the second and third positions on the A10's career field goal chart, respectively.

With at least one more game remaining in his junior season, Kuehn seems on track to make a run at Christie's career mark, as he'll enter Saturday's game averaging better than one FG/start (43 FGs in 32 career games). For perspective's sake, Christie and Shallcross entered their senior seasons with 36 and 33 field goals, respectively.

In Case You Missed It: In the face of

one of the league's top defensive units, and in front of a hostile crowd, Campbell came through with one of the finest performances of his career in throwing for a personal-best four TDs and 355 yards on a sparkling 20 completions in 30 attempts against the then third-ranked Delaware Blue Hens (10/23). The Blue Hen defense had yielded only five TD passes in its first six games coming into the contest, a figure that Campbell nearly equaled ... in the first quarter.

Campbell came out of the locker room with all guns blazing and connected on six of his first eight attempts for an amazing 173 yards and three TDs in the first quarter. The first quarter effort stands as the most passing yards in a single quarter in school history and ties Shawn Knight for most TD passes in quarter (2nd Quarter vs. Maine in 1993).

More than One Way to Skin a (Wild) Cat:

Facing a near must win situation against a surging Villanova squad that had won it previous three games by an average of better than 30 points, Campbell did a little of everything to fashion one of his more complete efforts on the season. Campbell was at the center of an offensive attack that kept an outstanding Wildcat defense on its heels the entire afternoon. In addition to receiving Campbell's usually efficient passing (22 completions in 34 attempts for 232 yards and a touchdown), the Win-

chester, VA native aided in ground game as well, by rushing for a season-best 60 yards (on 10 attempts) and a touchdown.

Campbell now has rushed for seven TDs on the season, the most for a Tribe quarterback since 2005 W&M Athletics Hall of Fame Inductee Chris Hakel (1988-91) powered out 11 scores in the recordbreaking 1990 season which saw the Tribe establish the school's single-season scoring (426 points) and total offense (6438 in 13 games) standards.

INDIVIDUAL DEFENSIVE NOTES

O'Connor Overpowering: Junior defensive end **Adam O'Connor** has been a dominant force on the Tribe front line this season, and his efforts were rewarded in the form of a second team All-Atlantic 10 citation.

O'Connor is second in the league with 8.0 sacks on the year, and he also ranks seventh with 12.0 total tackles for loss. His eight sacks this season are the most by a Tribe player, since Luke Cullinane pulled down a school-record 12 quarterbacks in 1996.

O'Connor was also named the Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Week on Nov. 7, for his efforts in the Tribe's crucial 37-29 victory over Villanova. O'Connor wreaked havoc in the Wildcats' backfield all afternoon, as he recorded three sacks in the contest, which was just a half-sack short of a W&M single-game record. The single-game record for sacks stands at 3.5, set by Cullinane in 1996, coincidentally against Villanova. O'Connor had five total tackles, all solo, and added another quarterback hurry against the Wildcats.

In his last two games, O'Connor has tallied 12 total tackles, including a season-high, nine-tackle performance in the win over JMU on Nov. 13. He registered a team-high 1.5 tackles for loss against the Dukes and swatted down one pass attempt.

Against Richmond, O'Connor was in on three stops, including his eighth sack of the season.

All-around Effort: Junior defensive back **Stephen Cason** joined O'Connor on the All-Atlantic 10 Second Team, to say the least, a significant accomplishment, after Cason missed the entire 2003 season.

Driving back to his native Richmond in a treacherous summer downpour prior to the 2003 season, Cason was involved in

a single-car accident that left him pinned under his vehicle with a broken neck. After extensive rehabilitation, Cason was cleared to play again just in time for 2004 summer camp.

He had an immediate impact in his first game back, forcing a fumble that led to a Tribe touchdown in the season-opening, 49-38, loss at Division I-A North Carolina. Against the Tar Heels, Cason recorded six total tackles, including five solo, and also broke up a pass. The forced fumble came on a cornerback blitz, as he came down the line and stripped UNC quarterback Darian Durant.

Cason had perhaps his best all-around performance in the Tribe's 27-24 victory at fourth-ranked JMU on Nov. 13. He was third on the squad, and one of four W&M players in double-figure tackles, with 10 total stops, including six solos. He also made one of the key plays of the day, recovering a fumble that was caused by linebacker **Chris Ndubueze**, when the JMU quarterback attempted to stretch the ball across the first-down marker. The recovery led to a three-yard TD run by **Jon Smith** three plays later, which gave the Tribe its first lead of the game at 24-17 with 5:40 remaining.

In addition to his defensive chores, Cason reclaimed the kickoff return duties for the Tribe, taking three kicks back for a total of 77 yards, which included a long of

On the year, Cason has tallied 59 total tackles, which ranks fourth on the squad, and has 6.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks to his credit. He ranks eighth in the A10 in kickoff return average, gaining 23.2 yards per return.

Break-out Season: With most of the preseason media attention aimed at all-conference linebacker **Travis McLaurin**, this season has truly been a breakthrough for the Tribe's other junior LB, **Chris Ndubueze**, who this week was named to the All-Atlantic 10 Second Team.

Ndubueze has emerged as one the defenses key contributors, registering a career and team-high 94 total tackles in the regular season. He had four double-digit games to his credit, including a personal-best 16-tackle effort in the slop at 10th-ranked New Hampshire on Sept. 18. In the 9-7 win over the Wildcats, Ndbubueze was in on 10 solo stops, a season-high for the Tribe.

He recorded his first-career interception in the 41-16 win over Towson on Oct. 30 and returned it 10 yards, eventually leading to a 32-yard field goal by Greg Kuehn.

Perhaps his biggest play of the

season came in the 27-24 victory at fourth-ranked James Madison on Nov. 13, when he forced a fumble in the fourth quarter, as the JMU quarterback attempted to stretch the ball over the first-down line on third-and-short. Stephen Cason recovered the fumble and the momentum swung clearly in favor of the Green and Gold, as Jon Smith scored from five yards out three plays later to give W&M its first lead of the game 24-17. Ndubueze tallied 12 total tackles, including six solos, against the Dukes.

The Last Line: Another key component of the defense's improvement this season has been the play of secondary-leader free safety James Miller. In terms of tackles, the junior is second to only Ndubueze on the squad with 90 total stops, while Miller leads the team with three interceptions and 10 passes defended. He has four double-digit tackle games on his resume, including a 15-tackle performance in the season-opener at I-A North Carolina.

Miller's three interceptions came in consecutive games against VMI, Northeastern and Liberty, with maybe the biggest in the Tribe's 38-35 overtime win over the 16th-ranked Huskies on Oct. 2.

With the Tribe trailing 28-27 late in the fourth quarter, Miller stepped in front of a pass from NU quarterback Shawn Brady in the end zone with 3:24 remaining in the game. A Huskies' TD would almost certainly have sealed W&M's fate, instead the Tribe offense took over at its 20-yard line and two plays later Lang Campbell hit Dominique Thompson on a 77-yard TD pass for the go-ahead score.

At Liberty, Miller struck in the fourth quarter once again, returning his third pick of the season 70 yards to set up Jon Smith's 1-yard TD run.

He earned Quarterback Club defensive player of the week honors for efforts in the win at JMU, when he tallied 11 total tackles.

Mesi on the Mark: Senior punter Mike Mesi was named to the third team all-conference squad for the second sraight year, after another solid season for the Tribe's special teams. Mesi has come on strong as the season has worn down, averaging better than 40 yards per punt in six of the last

seven games. He ranks third in the A10 with an average of 39.5 yards per punt and 11 of his kicks have been downed inside the opponent's 20.

Mesi had an outstanding game against Villanova on Nov. 6 and perhaps, had one of the biggest plays of the game.

Midway through the third quarter, with the game tied at 21-21, Mesi uncorked a 55-yard punt that was downed at the Villanova two-yard line. Three plays later, the Wildcats were forced to punt and the snap sailed out of the end zone for a safety.


Mesi punted four times in the game for an average of 43.0 yards per kick and three of his four punts were downed inside the Wildcats' 20-yard line.

At JMU on Nov. 13, Mesi's kicking numbers may not have been quite as attractive, but the punter made two spectacular plays that didn't show up in the final stats. He twice corralled low snaps that skipped off JMU's slick artificial surface, preventing any losses or blocked punts on the plays. He punted three times for 105 yards, including a long of 42.

Against Richmond Saturday, Mesi punted four times for an average of 42.0 yards and three of his four kicks were downed inside the 20.

Campbell had the Division I-A North Carolina defense on its "heels" most of the afternoon, throwing for a career-high 322 yards and two TDs, including a 46-yard strike to Lustig to open the scoring. Lustig hauled in a career-best 112 yards on six catches. Campbell added a pair of rushing TDs in the first half and Greg Kuehn booted a 21-yard FG as time expired, as the Tribe built a 10-point halftime lead.

Stephen Cason and Alan Wheeling each forced a fumble in the first half, Travis McLaurin recovered two fumbles in the first half, including one he returned 33 yards and Wade Harrell returned his third-career interception 37 yards to set up Keuhn's FG, as W&M forced four turnovers in a game for the first time since 2002 (IU). James Miller, who also recovered a fumble, led the Tribe with 15 tackles.

DURHAM, NH (9/18/04) - All-conference kicker Greg Kuehn connected on field goals of 27, 35 and 21 yards and the Tribe defense held the Wildcats' high-powered offense in check, as W&M won its conference-opener, 9-7, over 10th-ranked New Hampshire at rained-soaked Cowell Stadium.

Playing in heavy rains from the remnants of Hurricane Ivan, W&M held UNH to 226 offensive yards, nearly 150 below its average, after yielding 575 yard to North Carolina two weeks prior. It was the fewest yards allowed by a W&M defense since yielding 141 to Massachusetts in the 2001 season-opener.

All-American candidate Lang Campbell and the Tribe offense were efficient in the treacherous conditions, as Campbell threw for 148 vards on 11 for 23 passing and ran for 42 yards on 14 attempts. With 148 passing yards, he moved into 10th place on the W&M career passing list. Senior Jon Smith churned out 63 yards on 23 carries.

Kuehn kicked three field goals for the fourth time in his career, with the last coming in a win over Rhode Island on Oct. 25, 2003.

Chris Ndubueze paced the defense with a career-high 16 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Junior Larry Pendleton tallied seven tackles and a sack, while sophomore **Josh Wright**, who made his first career start, also recorded a sack.

The win gave W&M its first victory over a ranked opponent since knocking off 15th-ranked Northeastern in Williamsburg on Oct. 26, 2002.

W&M 42, VMI 6 WILLIAMSBURG (9/25/04) - All-American candidate Lang Campbell threw for 137 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the first half to surpass the 3,000-yard mark for his career, as W&M used four second-quarter touchdowns and another outstanding defensive effort to knock off state-rival VMI, 42-6, in front of 8,101 fans at Zable Stadium.

Playing on his 23rd birthday, Campbell went over the 3,000-yard plateau in the first quarter and went on to complete 11-of-15 passes for 160 yards to move into ninth place (3,136) on the College's career passing yards lists. With two TD passes, Campbell also moved into eighth place (28) on the career list at W&M.

The Tribe defense forced four turnovers for the second time this season (UNC) and held the Keydets to 197 total yards, the first time a W&M defense surrendered fewer than 200 total yards since a season-opening win at UMass in 2001 (146). Dating back to a 9-7 win at UNH on Sept. 18, W&M has not allowed a touchdown for over seven consecutive quarters, a feat that has not been accomplished since 1995.

Sophomore linebacker Ryan Nickell recorded interceptions on consecutive VMI offensive plays from scrimmage, while all-conference linebacker Travis McLaurin and Chris Ndubueze each had six tackles and defensive end Adam O'Connor recorded five stops, a sack and three quarterback hurries.

Senior tailback Jon Smith led the Tribe ground game with 52 yards and two TDs, as he inched closer to 2,000 rushing yards for his career (1,899).

WILLIAMSBURG (10/2/04) - Powered by a career-best 378-yard passing performance by All-American candidate Lang Campbell, the College pulled off a thrilling 38-35 overtime victory over 16th-ranked Northeastern at Zable Stadium.

The decisive points came off the foot of all-conference kicker Greg Kuehn, who nailed a 28-yard FG in the first overtime period. He ended the afternoon converting three of his four FG opportunities.

After the Tribe scored on a 77-yard TD pass from Campbell to **Dominique Thompson** with 2:34 remaining in the fourth quarter, and also got the two-point conversion on a pass to redshirt freshman receiver Joe Nicholas, W&M had a 35-28 lead. But, NU quarterback Shawn Brady's third TD pass tied the game with 42 seconds remaining and forced OT.

W&M won the toss and elected to play defense first. On the Huskies' first snap, junior Adam O'Connor sacked Brady, and NU eventually missed a 53-yard FG attempt. On the Tribe's OT possession, Nicholas caught a key first-down pass from Campbell on third-and-long, and two plays later Kuehn drilled the game-winner.

Campbell ended the day 22 of 36 for 378 yards, including the score to Thompson. He also ran for a pair of TDs. The 378 passing yards ranks as the eighth-best single-game performance in W&M history, and it was his second game over 300 yards in four games this season.

Thompson led the Tribe with a career-high 157 yards on five grabs, while Nicholas hauled in a career-best 111 yards on six catches.

The Tribe defense recorded a season-high seven sacks, led by **Jonas Watson** with two. All-conference candidate Adam O'Connor registered 1.5 sacks to bring his team-leading total

The win gave W&M its fourth consecutive victory and eighth-straight win over a Division I-AA opponent, dating back to the 2003 season.

WILLIAMSBURG, VA (10/16/04) - All-American candidate, senior quarterback Lang Campbell threw a pair of first-quarter TD passes to sophomore tight end Matt Trinkle and later rushed for another score, as the 16th-ranked Tribe held off Rhode Island, 31-24, in front of Homecoming crowd of 8,774 at Zable Stadium.

With the game tied at 24-24, sophomore tailback Elijah Brooks plowed into the end zone from two yards out with just over eight minutes remaining in the game for the decisive points. Brooks led the Tribe ground attack with 54 yards on 12 carries, while senior Jon Smith surpassed the 2,000-yard mark for his career (2,027) with 36 yards on 13 attempts.

Campbell completed 20-of-27 passes for 192 yards, and Trinkle recorded a career-high seven catches for a personal-best 51 yards. With two TD passes, Campbell moved into seventh place on the W&M career list (31), while also moving into seventh place on the W&M career passing yardage list (4,074).

Junior linebacker Thad Wheeler registered a career-high 16 tackles filling in for starter Travis McLaurin, who was hampered by a knee injury suffered early on. Fellow linebacker Chris Ndubueze made 14 total stops, and junior safety James Miller was in on 13 total tackles to give the Tribe three players in double-digit tackles.

With the win, W&M won its fifth consecutive game overall and its seventh-straight conference game dating back to last season. It was also the Tribe's eighth consecutive win over a Division I-AA opponent, dating back to 2003.

NEWARK, DE (10/23/04) - Despite a recordsetting performance from senior wide receiver **Dominique Thompson** and four TD passes from All-American candidate, senior Lang Campbell, the 14th-ranked Tribe dropped a hard-fought 31-28 decision to third-ranked Delaware in front of 22,058 fans at Delaware Stadium.

Thompson set a W&M single-game record with 244 receiving yards, surpassing the previous mark of 240 set by Dave Conklin against VMI in 1997. He also caught all four of Campbell's TD passes, matching a W&M record also held by Vito Ragazzo (1949, vs. WFU) and Corey Ludwig (1993, vs. Maine).

Campbell completed 20 of 30 passes for 355 yards and a career-best four TDs, surpassing the 300-yard mark for the fourth time this season.

The duo connected on scoring plays of 10, 62, 87 and 64 yards with the 87-yard completion tying the longest pass play in W&M history (Dan Henning to Tom Scott vs. Navy, 1961).

W&M scored on its first three possessions and held a 21-7 advantage in front of shocked sellout crowd at the end of one quarter, but the defending I-AA National Champions outscored the Tribe 24-7 to close the game, capped by a 25-yard TD pass from Sonny Riccio to Joseph Blaymaier with 4:41 remaining.

Junior linebacker Chris Ndubueze and junior corner Stephen Cason share the team-lead with 11 tackles apiece, while sophomore end Josh Wright recorded a career-high 10 stops in the loss.

TOWSON, MD (10/30/04) - Senior All-American candidate, quarterback Lang Campbell threw for 268 yards and three touchdowns in three quarters, and the 16th-ranked Tribe piled up a season-high 585 yards of total offense to subdue Towson, 41-16.

Campbell completed 20-of-29 attempts and his three touchdown passes brought his season total to 14, seven of which have come in the last two games. The 268 passing yards brought his career total to 4,697, moving him into sixth place on the W&M career list, while his three TD passes brought his career total to 38, also moving him into sixth place on the W&M career list in that category.

Senior wide receiver **Dominique Thomp**son caught seven passes for 122 yards and two touchdowns, his fifth and sixth scoring receptions in the last two games. Thompson went over the 1,000-yard mark on the season early in the third quarter, becoming just the sixth player in W&M history to record a 1,000-yard receiving season.

Just as impressive as Campbell's feats through air was the Tribe's ground attack, which racked up a season-high 280 rushing yards after averaging just 99.1 yards per game coming in. Senior tailback Jon Smith led the rushing attack with a season-high 113 yards on six carries and added a running score. Smith became the first Tribe player this season to surpass the century mark on the ground, and it was his fifth 100-yard rushing game of his career (5), moving him into a tie for eighth place on the W&M career list.

Junior all-conference candidate Adam O'Connor recorded three sacks in the game, just a half-sack away from a W&M single-game record. For his efforts, O'Connor was named the A10 Defensive Player of the Week.

The College gained possession at its 28-yard line with 38 seconds remaining, after JMU tied the game at 24-24 with 45 seconds left. With three timeouts in hand, senior All-American and Payton Award candidate, quarterback Lang Campbell calmly led the Tribe on a five play, 43yard drive to set up Kuehn's game-winning kick that gave the Tribe its first win in Harrisonburg since 1998 and its second victory over a top-10 team on the road this season.

The kick was Kuehn's second game-winning score of the season, as he also drilled a 28-yard field goal in overtime to beat 16th-ranked Northeastern, 38-35, on Oct. 2.

Campbell was brilliant all day, as he methodically picked apart the Dukes' vaunted defense for 323 yards and two touchdowns on 26 of 33 passing. It was Campbell's fifth 300-yard passing game of the season, as he moved over the 5,000-yard barrier for his career (5,302), becoming just the sixth quarterback in W&M history to accomplish the feat.

Junior Chris Ndubueze led the Tribe with 12 total tackles and forced a critical JMU fumble late in the game, which was recovered by classmate **Stephen Cason**, who had 10 total stops in the game. All-conference candidate, junior Adam O'Connor registered nine total tackles, including a team-high 1.5 for loss.




