Sixth-ranked William and Mary and eighth-ranked James Madison meet for the second time this season Friday night in the semifinals of the 2004 NCAA I-AA Football Championship. The Tribe won the previous meeting, 27-24, on Greg Kuehn's 46-yard field goal as time expired in Harrisonburg on Nov. 13. The College advanced to the semifinals with a 44-38 double-overtime victory over defending national champion Delaware on Saturday, while the Dukes defeated second-seeded Furman, 14-13, in Greenville, S.C. on Saturday. Its the first appearances in the national semifinals for both schools.

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Another Record Breaker: Another chapter in the incredible career of W&M quarterback Lang Campbell was written last week in the come from behind win over Delaware. By throwing for 342 yards and three TDs against the Blue Hens, Campbell pushed his season totals to William and Mary single-season record marks for passing yards (3,673), completions (268), and touchdown passes (27). He had already established the school's season record for total offense, which now stands at 3,972.

Payton Place: As one of the elite players in the nation, Campbell has emerged from a national vote as one of three finalists for the prestigious Payton Award, given annually to the top offensive player in I-AA football. Campbell is the first Tribe player to be voted into the final three of the award, which will be presented on Thursday, Dec. 16 in Chattanooga, TN at the I-AA College Football Awards Ceremony held on the eve of the national championship game.

Class of Conference: Campbell, was named as the Atlantic 10 Football Conference's Offensive Player of the Year, which was the first step in what is shaping up to be a very busy postseason of accolades for the senior from Winchester, VA.

Campbell, who was also named to the league's first team all-conference squad, earned the A10's highest individual offensive honor by being the key component in a Tribe attack that is averaging 430.1 yards and 34.8 points a contest. The history/economics major has helped power the squad to a share of the A10 Title and a school-record No. 3 seeding in the NCAA Championships field by leading the conference in seven different categories, including passing yards (3,673), passing efficiency (158.08) and total offense (3,972).

By ending the regular season leading the sixth-ranked Tribe to a 38-14 win over archrival Richmond with 291 yards and four touchdowns on 21 completions (in 28 attempts), Campbell earned his third A10 Offensive Player of the Week honor. His other certificates came after games on Sept. 5 (at North Carolina) and Nov. 13 (at James Madison).

Campbell headlines a list of nine Tribe all-conference honorees and joins kicker Greg Kuehn, who was named as the league's Special Teams Player of the Year, as one of the two W&M players to be named to the first team.

With a semifinal contest against league-rival James Madison looming just on the horizon, the following is a closer look at what Campbell has accomplished to this point in the season.

QB Efficiency

• Campbell ended the regular season as the conference's leader, and is currently sixth nationally, in QB efficiency rating with a mark of 158.1. If he were to maintain, or improve, his rating over the remainder of the year it would stand as the Tribe's best mark since Shawn Knight established the NCAA single-season record of 204.6 in 1993. It currently would rank as the fourth-best, single-season performance in A10 history (since the league began tracking the stat in 1988).

Passing Yards

• With 342 yards vs. Delaware, Campbell improved his season average to a school-record and conference best 282.5 yds/game. Campbell became just the fourth Tribe QB to throw for 3,000 yards in a season (see complete listing on Page 17). By accomplishing this feat in the regular season, he joins former All-American signal-caller Mike Cook (1995-98) as the College's

MORE ON CAMPBELL

only QBs to accomplish the trick in just 11 games (Cook threw for 3,028 in 1998). Currently, Campbell is ahead of Cook's school's best single-season passing average of 275.3 yds/game, also set in 1998.

• Campbell's 3,673 passing yards is the College's single-season best. He moved past Chris Hakel's previous record of 3,414 (set in 1990) with his standout afternoon vs. Delaware. (See complete listing on page 17).

• With 6,179 career passing yards, Campbell is just the fifth QB in school history to breach the 6,000-yard mark (please see complete chart on page 17). He has reached this lofty plateau in just 23 career starts (an average of 268.7 yds/start). He moved past former Shawn Knight (1991-94) into fifth place on the all-time listing this past weekend.

Completion Percentage / Yards/Play

• From his first snaps as a starter last season, Campbell has displayed an uncanny decision-making prowess at the controls of the College's offense. This season is no different, as he is completing an eye-catching .644 of his attempts (268 of 416). In fact, by completing over 56% of his attempts vs. Delaware, Campbell has now hit on better than 50% of his attempts in all but one of his 23 career starts (vs. UNH, when he connected on 11 of his 23 attempts). For his career, Campbell has a completion percentage of .642, which ranks him second all-time at the College (trailing only Shawn Knight's career mark of .655).

• Since his sub-par performance in the miserable conditions at New Hampshire, Campbell has completed an impeccable .664 percent of his passes over the last 10 games (234 completions in 352 attempts).

His current completion percentage of .644 is tied for the fourth-best single-season mark in school history.

• Don't mistake Campbell's high completion percentage for the fact that he is making a living by throwing five and six-yard passes, as he is averaging an impressive 8.83 yards/attempt, a figure which ranks third nationally (among QBs with more than 220 attempts). Perhaps what is even more impressive is Campbell's average of 13.7 yds/completion, a figure that leads the league.

Interceptions – Regular Season

• With just one INT in 326 attempts on the regular season, Campbell's minuscule interception % of .31 was the best 11-game average in the nation, amongst all levels (the next closest total was Georgetown's Andrew Crawford, who sported a .64 average, with just one INT in 156 attempts).

• Campbell ended the regular season by throwing 235 consecutive passes without an interception. His only pick came in the second quarter of the season's fourth game (vs. Northeastern).

• Campbell's regular season TD to INT ratio of 21:1 was far and away the nation's best total amongst all QBs (the next best ratio belonged to Bowling Green's Omar Jacobs who sported a 10:1 TD:INT ratio; 32 TDs:3 Ints).

• Despite his uncharacteristic three INT game vs. Hampton in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs, Campbell still carries an impressive interception to TD ratio of almost five to one (51 TDs/11 INT). In 16 career conference starts, Campbell threw just three interceptions, as compared to 33 touchdowns.

• In 724 career attempts, Campbell has thrown just 11 interceptions.

Against the Best: The semifinal match up with 8th-ranked James Madison will be the Tribe's eighth game against a ranked opponent in 13 games on the season and will provide no bigger opportunity for Campbell to once again showcase his talents. By running up 365 yards of total offense in the team's first round win against Hampton and 369 yards of total offense against Delaware, Campbell provided yet another example of his ability to excel when the spotlight is shining brightest. In the seven previous games against ranked opponents this season, he averaged 296.0 passing yards/game (2,072), completed 62.3% of his attempts (154 of 247) and accounted for 17 TDs.

In his lone outing vs. I-A competition, at the University of North Carolina, Campbell accounted for four touchdowns and 357 total yards in the team's hard-fought 49-38 loss in Chapel Hill.

Silver Linings: Jimmye Laycock is in his 25th season as the Tribe's head coach. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 170-112-2 career record at W&M. He ranks fourth on the A-10 career victories lists (65). W&M is making its ninth postseason appearance under Laycock, and the Tribe has now posted winning ledgers in 18 of the past 22 seasons.

Good Company: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock, in his 25th season on the W&M sidelines, ranks third among all current Division I-A and Division I-AA head coaches in terms of most years at their current school. The two coaches ahead of Laycock are Penn State's Joe Paterno (37 years) and Florida State's Bobby Bowden (26 years).

Second to None: The National Collegiate Athletic Association has recently released its official graduation-rates reports for all student-athletes receiving athletics aid. The report shows that the College of William and Mary has graduated an impeccable 100% of its football players that entered the program as freshman during 1997-98 school year. As the nations 10th-ranked program, the Tribe carries the highest graduation rate in the conference, leading Richmond (94%) by a full six points. Of the teams currently ranked in the national top 25, only second-ranked Furman (81%) is within 20 percentage points of the College. In fact, William and Mary is one of only four teams in the entire I-AA top 25 to have a graduation rate of 70%, or better. By comparison, the overall graduation rate amongst all schools providing athletics aid for I-AA football is 54%.

As an overall department, William and Mary has graduated its student-athletes at an 87% clip over the same span. Of the 289 student-athletes on aid who exhausted eligibility since 1997, an amazing 99% have graduated from the College.

No Place Like Home: William and Mary Head Coach Jimmye Laycock has fashioned an impressive 95-31-1 career record in Williamsburg. But, oddly enough, the 2004 season is only the second time in his 25 seasons at the helm of the program that the team has played more games at home, than on the road. The only other year Laycock's teams have hosted more than they've traveled came during the 1988 season, which saw the squad play six home contests and only five road games.

National Exposure: With the game being broadcast nationally on ESPN2, it stands as the first nationally televised game in school history. The only other game documented as being broadcast on a major television network (that was able to be unearthed) was in 1975, when the Tribe played to an ABC audience

Sensational Silver Season: With the 44-38 double overtime win over Delaware in the

second round of the NCAA Playoffs, William and Mary has fashioned one, if not THE, finest campaigns in the school's 109 years of football history. Coincidentally, all of this success has come as head coach Jimmye Laycock celebrates his milestone 25th season at the helm of the program.

Already this season, the Tribe has secured its 15th winning season in the last 17 years (only non-winning seasons have been in 1991 - 5-6; and 2000 - 5-6). With a 7-1 record in regular season conference play, the Tribe also posted its 12th-straight .500, or better, record in conference play (every season the College has been a member of the league). Every other conference team has suffered through at least one losing season in league play during this span.

The following are some of the other significant accomplishments that the program has achieved this season:

William and Mary has ...

- Won the Atlantic 10 Co-Championship, earned the conference's automatic bid and was named as the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Playoffs, the highest seed school history.
- Established the school's single season win record with 11.
- Defeated six ranked opponents (No. 10 New Hampshire, 9-7; No. 16 Northeastern, 38-35; No. 19 Villanova, 37-29; No. 4 James Madison, 27-24; No. 11 Hampton, 42-35; and No. 10 Delaware, 44-38(2 OT) on the season. One has to go back to the 1996 season to find the last time the Tribe defeated as many top 20 teams.
- Recorded a pair of road wins over two teams which advanced to the final eight of the NCAA's Championship field of 16 (New Hampshire and James Madison).
- Improved Laycock's career record in conference play to 65-33 and his conference winning percentage to .663. Currently, his winning percentage is good for 15th on the league's all-time listing. His .663 winning percentage in conference play trails only Tubby Raymond (.701, 89-36) and Mark Whipple (.686, 35-16) amongst all-time league coaches who have 50, or more, league games under their belts.
- Recorded its first undefeated home regular season since 1996. This year's squad joins the 1990 and 1996 teams as the only squads in school history to win six, or more, home games in a single year (as each won a first round home playoff game after sweeping the regular season home slate). The Tribe now has won its last nine-straight home games, dating back to last season.
- Finished the season with a 7-1 conference record, which ties it for the most single-season conference wins in school history.
- Finished the regular season with a top 10 ranking for the first time since the 1996 season.
- Seen this year's senior class become the first in school history to collect two conference championship rings.

NCAA SEMIFINALS VS. #8 JAMES MADISON - DEC. 10, 2004

W&M PLAYOFF HISTORY

Postseason History: Starting with a frenetic 42-35 win over 11th-ranked Hampton University in the first round, and most recently its heart-stopping 44-38 double-overtime victory over conference rival Delaware, the College has earned its first semifinal appearance in the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs.

By earning the Atlantic 10 Conference's automatic bid, and the NCAA's No. 3 seed, the 2004 season stands as the Tribe's seventh appearance in the NCAA I-AA Playoffs. The Tribe has now played 10 total games in its combined visits (all during head coach Jimmye Laycock's tenure), winning four.

The College, which has won its last four postseason home games (the other wins game in the first rounds of the 1990 and 1996 seasons), will host a semifinal playoff game for the first time in school history on Friday in what will be just the second home game held in December in school history (with the first coming this past weekend).

This will be the second-straight A10 opponent in the 2004 postseason for the College, and also the second team from the state of Virginia.

Prior to this season, the last time W&M hosted a home game in the playoffs was after the 1996 season, which also saw the College run off a 9-2 regular season record and capture the conference's automatic bid.

The Tribe is 4-1, all-time, in playoff contests at Zable. The following is a complete list the Tribe's home playoff contests.

The winner of the William and Mary-James Madison game will advance to next Friday's I-AA National Championship, held in Chattanooga, TN and play the winner of the Sam Houston State-Montana semifinal being played on Saturday afternoon.

Did You Know?: That match-up between the two state rivals marks the first appearance for either team in the national semis. In fact, no I-AA school in Virginia history has ever advanced to this round of the

NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs.

Did You Know?: That with a win Friday evening, the Tribe will have eclipsed its entire total of playoff wins in the school's history in a single year. The College came into the 2004 postseason with an all-time record of 2-6 in the NCAA Playoffs.

THE W&M-JMU SERIES

Pulling Rank: Saturday's semifinal match up with James Madison will be just the second time in history that the two programs have hooked up as top 10 teams in 27 meetings, with the first time coming earlier this season. At least one team has carried a national ranking nine times in the team's last 13 meetings (since 1993, when both joined the same conference). They have met a total of five times when both teams have held top 25 national rankings.

When at least one team has been ranked, the higher ranked team has won six of the eight games, with W&M recording one of the upsets earlier this season (as it defeated a fourth-ranked JMU team as the nation's 10th-ranked squad).

Close as it Gets: The last four games in the series have been decided by seven points or less. In fact, in the 12 previous games the two have played as conference opponents, only one has been decided by more than 14 points (a 33-7 JMU win in 1994).

Less is More?: The team with fewer total yards total yards has won the last three games in the series. Earlier this season, James Madison out gained the Tribe, 425 total yards to 378. This marked the only time in the history of the series the Tribe was able to prevail with less total yards, while James Madison has managed to manufacture wins despite producing less total yards a total of three times.

Did You Know?: James Madison is the last team to defeat the College in Zable, as the Dukes came into Williamsburg and pounded out a 24-17 win last season. Since that game, the Tribe has reeled off nine-straight home wins.

All-time, in 12 years as a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference, the Tribe's home field advantage has been as strong as any in the league, as the College owns a 38-13 edge in games played against league opponents in Zable (including playoffs). But, of those 13 losses, three have come at the hands of the Dukes, the most of any

conference opponent (tied with Massachusetts).

In Case You Wondering: One has to go all the way back to the 1917 season to find the last time W&M has defeated the same team twice in one year. That season, Randolph-Macon College (currently a Division III school) accounted for two of the Tribe's three wins, as it fell by scores of 13-0 and 21-6.

Look it Up: The William and Mary-James Madison semifinal pairing is only the second time two A10 teams have faced off in the playoffs since 1978. The only other meeting between league schools came in the last round, when the Tribe bounced Delaware from the bracket.

With a Win over James Madison the College will:

- Advance to the finals of the NCAA tournament for the first time in the school's history.
- Become the first I-AA program in Virginia history to win 12 games in a season
- Have won its eighth home game on the season, and ninth overall (dating back to last season). Currently, its seven-straight home wins tie it with the 1990 squad for the school's single-season record for victories in Williamsburg.
- Have defeated its seventh ranked team

the on the season and mark the program's fifth win over a school selected to the NCAA Championship field (New Hampshire, Delaware and Hampton being the others).

- Become the first A10 team to ever beat a conference team twice in the same season.
- Give head coach Jimmye Laycock his 171th career win in his 25th season at the helm of the program.
- Become the third A10 Conference school in the last seven years to make the finals.
- Won its 15th game in its last 16 vs. I-AA opponents (dating back to last season).
- Have beaten James Madison in Zable Stadium for the first time since the 2001 campaign.

W&M TEAM NOTES

Lights, Camera...: It has been well publicized that Friday's semifinal game will be played under the lights, to accommodate the national broadcast on ESPN 2. Musco Lighting out of Oskaloosa, Iowa will be providing the temporary lights, called the Musco-Light. Over the past two decades, Musco has established itself as the premier large-area special effect lighting company in that nation, bringing lights to hundreds of national and regional sporting events, including the New Hampshire-Montana quarterfinal game last weekend.

THE LAST MEETING

#10 William & Mary 27, #4 James Madison 24

HARRISONBURG, VA (11/13/04) - Junior all-conference kicker **Greg Kuehn** nailed a 46-yard field goal as time expired to lead 10th-ranked William and Mary to a thrilling 27-24 victory over fourth-ranked James Madison in front of 13,904 fans at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The College gained possession at its 28-yard line with 38 seconds remaining, after JMU tied the game at 24-24 with 45 seconds left. With three timeouts in hand, senior All-American and Payton Award candidate, quarterback **Lang Campbell** calmly led the Tribe on a five play, 43-yard drive to set up Kuehn's game-winning kick that gave the Tribe its first win in Harrisonburg since 1998 and its second victory over a top-10 team on the road this season.

The kick was Kuehn's second game-winning score of the season, as he also drilled a 28-yard field goal in overtime to beat 16th-ranked Northeastern, 38-35, on Oct. 2.

Campbell was brilliant all day, as he methodically picked apart the Dukes' vaunted defense for 323 yards and two touchdowns on 26 of 33 passing. It was Campbell's fifth 300-yard passing game of the season, as he moved over the 5,000-yard barrier for his career (5,302), becoming just the sixth quarterback in W&M history to accomplish the feat.

Junior **Chris Ndubueze** led the Tribe with 12 total tackles and forced a critical JMU fumble late in the game, which was recovered by classmate **Stephen Cason**, who had 10 total stops in the game. All-conference candidate, junior **Adam O'Connor** registered nine total tackles, including a team-high 1.5 for loss.

final match up with James Madison will mark the fourth-straight home for the College. One has to go back to the 1969 season to find the last time William and Mary played as many straight in the friendly confines of Zable.

Poll Watching: The College was picked No. 6 in the final regular season Sports Network Top 25 Poll, released on Nov. 22. It was the second consecutive week with a No. 6 billing, marking the third consecutive week the Tribe was ranked in the top 10. It was also the Tribe's highest ranking since Oct. 19, 1998, when W&M was also tabbed No. 6. The Tribe was ranked No. 9 in the TSN preseason poll that year and slipped to No. 10 in the Sept. 2, 2002 poll, after a season-opening loss to Indiana. It had been 39 consecutive polling weeks since the Green and Gold appeared in the top 10, before entering at No. 10 on Nov. 7.

W&M has been ranked or received votes in every ESPN/USA Today poll this season. Here is a complete listing of the Tribe's week-by-week rankings in each poll this season, after the previous week's game:

More on the Rankings: With Saturday's 44-38 double-overtime victory over 10th-ranked Delaware, the Tribe defeated its

sixth ranked opponent of the season. It was the College's seventh game against a ranked opponent, and it avenged W&M's only loss to a ranked team, a 31-28 setback in Newark on Oct. 23, when the Blue Hens were ranked third.

The Tribe also defeated then fourth-ranked James Madison, 27-24, on Nov. 13, giving W&M its second win over a top-10 team on the road this season, having also defeated then 10th-ranked New Hampshire, 9-7, on Sept. 18.

Computer Savvy: While on the subject of rankings, William and Mary remained third in this week's USA Today/Sagarin computer rankings. W&M, which has been rated as high as No. 2 in I-AA in the Sagarin ratings this season, owns the second-highest position of all A10 teams, one spot behind No. 2 New Hampshire, which the Tribe defeated, 9-7, on the road earlier this season. The Wildcats lost in the quarterfinals last week, 47-17, at Montana.

W&M also remained at No. 50 overall in Division I, checking in higher than such traditional I-A powers as Maryland (51), Pittsburgh (52), Syracuse (57), and Kansas State (61).

A10 teams comprised three of the top four spots in this week's rankings, including Friday's opponent, fourth-rated James Madison.

Incredible Comeback: By outscoring Delaware by a total of 34-7 over the final 15 minutes of play and two overtime periods, the Tribe posted its largest fourth quarter comeback in Laycock's 25th year tenure (by overcoming a 31-10 UD lead).

Did You Know?: W&M had overcome a 28-0 halftime deficit at Northern Iowa in the quarterfinal round of the NCAA playoffs in 1996 to tie the game at 35-35 with five minutes remaining in regulation. But, that team was unable to finish the improbable comeback, as it eventually fell 38-35 (after the Panthers converted a muffed Tribe punt return attempt into the decisive points on a short field goal).

Better Late Than Never: Of the 86 points the College has racked up in the first two

rounds, an amazing 56 have come after the start of the fourth quarter. In the 42-35 win over Hampton, the Green and Gold needed every one of the three TDs it posted over the final 15 minutes to down a Pirate squad that had countered with 14 fourth-quarter points of its own. W&M delivered a staggering onslaught in the final quarter (and overtimes) against Delaware, racking up 34 points and 176 total yards.

Coming into the post-season the Tribe had posted just 80 total fourth-quarter points in 11 games.

Time Well Spent: When Hampton scored on its first possession of the second half vs. the Tribe (and converted the subsequent two-point conversion), it marked the first, and only, third quarter points the College has yielded in the last seven games. Much of the credit for this can be attributed to William and Mary first-year defensive coordinator Jim Pletcher, who brings more than 30 years of coaching experience to the Tribe's staff. His veteran instincts and ability to communicate has allowed him to make key strategic in-game adjustments to his schemes all season, as the Tribe has allowed just 50 total third quarter points all season.

These adjustments have fallen in line with similar adjustments Laycock makes on the offensive side of the line of scrimmage to give the Tribe a commanding +65 point third quarter advantage over opponents on the season (the next largest single quarter margin is +20 in the second quarter).

Overall, the College has won five of the six games that had seen it trailing at the half (only loss coming in the first Delaware game).

Simply the Best: By choosing four Atlantic 10 Conference teams to compete amongst the final 16 in the championships field, the NCAA selection committee gave the conference nearly unprecedented representation (tying it with last seasons quartet of Gateway Conference teams as the most from one league in I-AA Playoff history). The league's four teams verified what the statistics and polls have shown all season, that the A10 is the nation's premier I-AA conference, by going 6-2 in first round action (with one of the two losses coming when Delaware lost to fellow A10 rival W&M last Saturday). With four teams currently ranked in the national top 10 (Delaware, No. 10, James Madison, No. 9, William and Mary, No. 6 and UNH, No. 5), the case for the A10 being so strongly represented was a good one. Overall the league has a mark of 26-6 against fellow I-AA competition and has

recorded a pair of wins over I-A schools. Including all games, the Atlantic 10 is a stellar 28-12 in non-conference play. Already this postseason, the league has a notched wins over second-seeded Furman (JMU, 14-13) and fourth-seeded Georgia Southern (UNH, 27-23)

In the latest Sagarin Rankings, the A10 is far-and-away the highest I-AA conference, as can be seen by the following listing of the top 7:

No Flags on the Play: Discipline has long been a trademark of head coach Jimmye Laycock's program, and this season has been no different, as the College has been penalized fewer times (63) than any other A10 team, which includes the Tribe's two playoff victories. W&M has been flagged for a total of 539 yards this season (41.5 per game).

W&M TEAM OFFENSIVE NOTES

Not in a Giving Mood: While several members of the Tribe football team are involved in various charities throughout the Tidewater area, the William and Mary offense, as a whole, could be classified as downright selfish when it comes to hand-outs to opposing defenses. The Tribe has recorded four games with no turnovers (at UNC, vs. URI, at JMU and vs. Villanova). The College did not have more than one turnover in any game during the regular season.

In fact, William and Mary's total of seven turnovers (one INT, six fumbles) during the regular season was the lowest figure in the nation. The next closest total on the I-AA level was 11 by Cornell.

The Tribe established an NCAA record (for a 10 or 11 game single-season) for fewest turnovers, besting the previous low of nine held by three different teams (Hofstra in 1999, Harvard in 2001 and Yale in 1999).

With the three turnovers vs. Hampton, William and Mary will not hold the single-season record, since the NCAA started to recognize post season stats as official season stats, starting in the 2002 season.

Gearing Up: By rolling up an eye-catching 1,092 yards and 86 points in two-post season games, including a season-best

592 yards vs. Hampton last weekend, the Tribe's entire offensive unit, only seems to only get more efficient and effective as the season wears on. The Tribe followed the standout performance vs. the Pirates with an equally impressive 500 yard outing vs. Delaware that included a season high 44-point outburst. William and Mary will enter Friday's contest averaging 430.3 yards and 34.8 points a contest. It marks the first time since the 2001 season that the Tribe has averaged over 400 yards and 30 points a game. But, amazingly, it is the eighth time in the last 15 seasons since 1990 that a Laycock coached offense has produced a season average of better 400 yards and 30 points a contest.

The following are just some of highlights of what the Tribe's attack has accomplished this season:

The College's offense has ...

- Scored 31, or more, points in 10 of the 13 games on the season. It's average of 34.8 pts/game ranks it second in the league and 14th in the nation.
- Averaged 430.1 yds/game, a figure which is the tops in the conference and 13th nationally. The College's record average for a season came during the 1990 season which saw the team lead the nation with a 495.2 yds/gm.
- Averaged 289.0 passing yards/game, which ranks second in the conference and ninth nationally
- Been held scoreless in just 10 of the 54 quarters it has played this season (including overtime periods). Overall, the team has scored points of some kind in 81% of the quarters on the year (44 of 54).
- Fashioned 42 scoring drives of 60 yards or more (out of 75 total). (See a complete listing on page 28).
- Thrown for more yards than 12 of 13 opponents (only exception being Villanova) on the season and has been out rushed by only five (UNC, URI, Delaware (twice) and James Madison).
- Turned the ball over only 10 times (six fumbles, four interceptions). The only other turnover for the College on the season came on a muffed punt. Currently, the College is second in the conference and 21st nationally in turnover margin with a +.62/game average.

Making It's Point(s): William and Mary has scored 452 points on the season, an average of nearly 35 points a contest and stands just 16 points from breaking the school's single-season record for points in a season (467, set by the 1990 club, which turned the trick in just 13 games). The 1990 team holds the team's single season record for scoring average (35.9).



Sophomore Elijah Brooks has rushed for 202 yards in his last two games, including a W&M season-high 120 yards against Hampton.

Key Number?: The Tribe is 10-1 on the season when it rushes 30, or more, times in a game. The squad's only loss on the season, when it rushed more than 30 times came in the season opener at North Carolina (31 rushes). Perhaps, not coincidentally, the College has not lost when it has out-rushed an opponent (7-0).

Did You Know?: That with an average of just over 41.0 penalty yards a contest, the Tribe is the least penalized team remaining in the playoffs. The next lowest total is James Madison's average of just over 58 yards a contest. By contrast, Sam Houston State averages nearly 80 penalty yds/contest (78.00).

Overall, the College's average of 41.5 yards a contest ranked ninth lowest amongst all I-AA schools.

Seeing Red: The Tribe's offense is nothing, if not persistent when it comes to finishing drives. Despite a pair of empty visits inside the Blue Hen 20-yard line, the Tribe still sports brings an impressive conversion rate of .900 into Friday's contest with James Madison (58 of its 65; 44 TDs, 14 FGs).

The Tribe started the season with an incredible streak of 40-straight conversions (with Campbell at QB). The first miss on the year didn't come until the ninth game of the season, against Villanova, as the Wildcats snuffed out a W&M fourth-and-goal attempt from the one-yard line (in the fourth quarter). Before that stop, the last time that Campbell and the Tribe's attack failed to convert an opportunity in the red zone came in the ninth game of the 2003 season (vs. UNH; a fumble at the 10-yard

line late in the second quarter). Since that miscue, W&M had run off points of some variety in 48-consecutive ventures inside the opposition's 20-yard line (36 TDs, 12 FGs). (See complete chart on page 29).

W&M TEAM DEFENSIVE NOTES

What a difference a year makes: Taking a look back at the 2003 defensive statistics (W&M played 10 games, due to Sept. 27th cancellation of Maine game), the unit improved in nearly every defensive category during the 2004 regular season, which not surprisingly led to an 9-2 regular season mark and a berth in the I-AA Playoffs.

Most notably, the Tribe allowed nearly seven points fewer per game at 22.9. Also, the unit yielded close to 60 less rushing yards per contest. Going hand in hand with the decrease in rushing yards is a dramatic decline in the number of rushing touchdowns allowed by the Tribe. In 10 games last season, W&M surrendered 24 touchdowns on the ground, but cut that number to 16 this year.

Cashing In: In the regular-season ending 38-14 victory over Richmond on Nov. 20, the Tribe forced at least one turnover for the fourth consecutive game, and for the fourth consecutive game the offense turned a take away into points. The streak continued in the first round of the NCAA I-AA Playoffs against Hampton, as the defense forced a crucial fumble in the fourth quarter that led to a touchdown on the very next play.

On Saturday, the defense provided six points of its own, as junior defensive back **Stephen Cason** intercepted a pass at the W&M 38-yard line and raced 62 yards for the score. It was the Tribe's first defensive touchdown of the season, and the first interception returned for a score since James Miller accomplished the feat in the 2003 season-finale at Richmond.

It was the 14th time this season that the Tribe converted a turnover into points, and more importantly, of the 14 times it was the 12th time W&M took it to the house for six points.

Against Hampton, after Dominique Thompson tied the score in the fourth quarter with a 92-yard kickoff return for a TD, the Pirates regained control at their own 47-yard line and moved nine yards on their first two plays. On third-and-one, HU quarterback Princeton Shepherd attempted to pitch to receiver Jerome Mathis, who tallied 394 all-purpose yards in the contest, but junior strong safety **Jon Shaw** broke into the backfield and hit Shepherd, causing a fumble that was recovered by all-conference defensive end **Adam O'Connor** and returned to the Pirates' 45-yard line. On the next play, Payton Award Finalist Lang Campbell hooked up with Thompson on a 45-yard scoring pass that put W&M ahead for good, 42-35, with 10:07 remaining.

In the season finale against Richmond, Shaw was at it again, as his interception at the W&M 23-yard line in the third quarter led to a five-play, 77-yard scoring drive that was capped by a five-yard TD pass to Joe Nicholas.

In the Nov. 13th win over JMU, senior Jon Smith's scored on a three-yard run three plays after **Chris Ndubueze** forced a fumble on third down, which was recovered by junior defensive back **Stephen Cason**.

Smith was the benefactor yet again in the Nov. 6th win over Villanova, scoring from 17 yards out after senior defensive lineman **Wade Harrell's** 19-yard interception return in the fourth quarter. It was Harrell's second interception of the season, extending his W&M record for interceptions by a down lineman to four.

At Towson on Oct. 30, after Ndubueze recorded his first career interception, W&M went 65 yards on 12 plays and junior Greg Kuehn kicked a 32-yard field goal to give the Tribe a 24-3 lead heading into halftime. (See scoring drives chart on page 28.)

When it counts: Glancing over the final stats from Saturday's quarterfinal victory over Delaware, it would be easy to say it wasn't the Tribe's best defensive effort of the season. But, what the final numbers don't show were the defense's dominating and inspired play in the fourth quarter, which ultimately forced overtime.

Through three quarters, the Blue Hens racked up 424 yards of total offense, including 211 on the ground and UD quarterback Sonny Riccio had completed 18 of 26 passes for 213 yards and two touchdowns. In the four quarter however, junior corner **Stephen Cason** sparked a miraculous Tribe comeback, intercepting Riccio at the W&M 38-yard line and racing 62 yards for a touchdown.

In the final frame, the College held UD to 16 total yards, including minus-six rushing yards, and Riccio completed just three of nine attempts and was picked off twice, as the Tribe rallied from a 31-10 deficit to force overtime.

Answering the Call: Despite 394 all-purpose yards for Hampton's star wide receiver Jerome Mathis in the Tribe's 42-35 first-round victory on Nov. 27, head coach Jimmie Laycock cited the Tribe's defensive effort as one of the keys to the first-round victory.

The Pirates brought a pair of 1,000-yard rushers into the game, in Alzono Coleman (1,110) and Ardell Daniels (1,046) and were the MEAC's top rushing team, averaging 235.4 yards per game on the ground through 11 regular season games. The Tribe held Hampton's top two backs to fewer than 100 yards combined, and the Pirates managed only 128 total rushing yards in the contest.

But, the defense's best production came on three consecutive scoreless Hampton drives in the fourth quarter, which ultimately swung the game in the Green and Gold's favor.

- After senior Dominique Thompson returned a kickoff 92 yards for a TD to tie the game at 28 with 11:47 remaining, reminiscent of the Tribe's 27-24 last-second win at JMU on Nov. 13, the defense came up with a huge game-changing play.

Mathis returned the ensuing kickoff to the Hampton 47-yard line, and Coleman gained five and four yards to start the drive and move into W&M territory. On third down-and-one, HU quarterback Princeton Shepherd attempted to pitch to Mathis on an option play, but junior strong safety **Jon Shaw** broke into the backfield and disrupted the pitch, which was recovered by all-conference defensive end **Adam O'Connor**. One play later, the Tribe led 35-28, as Lang Campbell and Dominique Thompson hooked up on a 45-yard scoring play.

- On the Pirates' next series, HU again had excellent field position, as Mathis brought the kickoff back 29 yards to the 50. The Pirates gained a pair of first downs and were stationed at the Tribe's 24 with a first-and-10, looking to knot the score. O'Connor stopped Daniels for a one-yard loss on first down, and an incomplete pass brought up third-and-11.

Richard Riley and **Ryan Nickell** forced Coleman out of bounds for a two-yard loss to set up fourth-and-13, when Shepherd went to the end zone for Mathis, but junior **Alan Wheeling** overcame a

push-off and broke up the pass, turning the ball over to the Tribe on downs.

- After a Tribe turnover on the resulting possession, the defense was forced back into action deep in its own territory, as the Pirates intercepted Campbell at the 30-yard line.

Coleman gained five on first down, and Daniels added a yard on second down to set up third-and-five from the 25. HU called Daniels' number one more time on third down, but Nickell shot through the line and stopped the play for no gain.

On fourth down, Shepherd dropped back to pass, but all-conference linebacker **Chris Ndubueze** came through clean and brought Shepherd down for a loss of 16 yards and another turnover on downs.

This time, however, the Tribe went 60 yards on four plays to effectively seal the victory with Jon Smith's four-yard TD run with 1:56 remaining.

What makes the defense's fourth quarter heroics against Hampton even more impressive, was the fact it was on the field for 11:28 of the final frame. While the Tribe put up 21 points in the stanza, it consumed just 2:02 on the scoring plays, which included a 92-yard kickoff return and a one-play, 45-yard drive that took just nine seconds.

Cornering the Market: Cason's interception in the fourth quarter Saturday was the first by a Tribe cornerback this season. It didn't take long, however, for another corner to follow suit, as sophomore **Alan Wheeling** intercepted UD quarterback Sonny Riccio on the Blue Hens' final drive in regulation.

W&M INDIVIDUAL OFFENSIVE NOTES

When It Counts: Certainly, any coach would want the ball in the hands of his most experienced and dangerous players when the game is on the line, and in Lang Campbell, Dominique Thompson and Jon Smith the Tribe has a trio of talented veteran players to rely on in crunch time. Never has this been more evident than in the first two games of the NCAA Playoffs, as all three have been off the charts in the decisive fourth quarters.

Campbell has lived up to his billing as an All-American candidate by completing 15 of his 22 fourth quarter (and overtime) playoff attempts for 166 yards and three TDs. Smith has turned in three scoring runs and 64 rushing yards on just eight touches in the same span, while Thompson has turned in 222 all-purpose yards (125 on kick returns and 97 receiving yards on four catches). Thompson has ac-

counted for a pair of scores, one on a 92-yard kick return and the other on a 45-yard TD catch.

What's in a Name?: Lang Campbell's given name is Samuel Langdon Campbell. He goes by his middle name, as does his maternal grandfather, Samuel Langdon Gordon, whom he is named after.

Hard to Believe?: Despite the Tribe's great history of offensive excellence, and having averaged over 400 yards and nearly 30 points a game since joining the conference in 1993, Campbell is the College's first player to earn the prestigious award in the team's 12 seasons as a conference member. Two players (Jason Miller, 1995; and Darren Sharper, 1996) have earned the conference Defensive Player of the Year honors, while three have earned the Rookie of the Year honors (WR Dave Conklin, 1995; QB Dave Corley, 1999; and WR Rich Musinski, 2000).

Another Record in Reach: Having already set the school's single-season records for passing yards (3,673), TD passes (27), completions (268) and total offense (3,972), Campbell is with reasonable reach of his first conference record. If he were able to accumulate 401 yards of total offense over the remainder of the 2004 season, he will eclipse Tom Ehrhardt's single-season record of 4372, set during his senior season at Rhode Island in 1985.

Simply Sensational: Senior WR Dominique Thompson has contributed everything from the subtle to the spectacular for the Tribe this season. His performances the last two Saturdays qualify as the latter, as he has amassed 358 all-purpose yards,

including 203 through the air, and three TDs in two playoff contests.

Thompson has emerged as the kind of threat that few could have predicted for the 6-1, 190-pound native of Durham, NC. While he had no lack of ability (as he is arguably the team's purest athlete), Thompson had started only one career game and never posted more than 17 catches in any of his previous three seasons on the squad. Entering the season, the Tribe's coaching staff had tabbed him as one of many who would attempt to replace former Tribe All-American WR Rich Musinski (who graduated with school career records in receptions, 223, receiving yards, 4,168, and TD receptions, 31). The team turned to senior Dominique Thompson and he responded to the challenge by turning in what is arguably THE finest season ever by a Tribe wide out. He currently has amassed a school-record 1,489 receiving yards and 12 TDs on 71 catches (an average of 21.0 yds/catch). His efforts earned him his first career all-conference recognition, as he was named to the A10's Second Team, and marks him as one of the most dangerous deep threats in the league.

The following is a little closer look at some of what Thompson has accomplished so far this season:

- By reeling in nine catches for 185 yards vs. Delaware, he turned in his second-straight, 100-plus receiving afternoon and sixth on the season. With 122 yards vs. Towson (10/30) he became just the sixth Tribe player to break the 1,000-yard barrier on a season, and the first to do it in just eight games (the previous best was nine games by Rich Musinski in 2001; which he ended with a 1,393 yards in 12 games).

- His 12 touchdown receptions on the season matches Musinski's 2001 total as the top single-season total of the past since Vito Ragazzo posted a school record 15 in the 1947 season (which stands as one of the oldest offensive marks in the Tribe record books).

- Needs just one more reception to tie Michael Clemons' school single-season reception record (72 established in 1985).
- Only Tribe player to record two, 200-plus yard games (244 at Delaware, 10/23; 221 at Liberty) in a career (much less a single season, or four game span).
- His last nine games include four performances in the Tribe's top 20 single-game records (157 vs. NE, 19th; 221 at Liberty, 4th; 244 at Delaware on 10/23, 1st and 185 vs. Delaware on 12/3, 9th). By comparison, Rich Musinski has only four games in the top 20 out of his 46 career starts (to Thompson's 14). (See a complete listing on page 26)
- With 1,489 receiving yards, he established the school's single season record. He broke the 1,000-yard barrier quicker than any player in school history (eight games). The former record was nine games, set by Rich Musinski in 2001.
- His average of 114.5 yds/game ranks fourth nationally and is second in the A10.
- His average of 21.0 yds/catch leads all players on the I-AA who have more than 60 receptions by nearly three full yards (next closest is Cal Poly's Darrell Jones, 18.03 yds/rec. on 62 grabs).
- Has five scoring plays of 60-plus yards (92, 87, 77, 64 and 62) on the season.
- 60 of his 71 receptions on the season have resulted in first downs for the Tribe.

Hen Hater: One program that will certainly send a present and a card to Dominique Thompson when he graduates next spring will be the Delaware Blue Hens. In two games vs. the Hens this season, Thompson amassed a gaudy 429 receiving yards on 19 catches and four TDs. The first contest (on 10/23) saw the Durham, NC native turn in a school-record 244 receiving yard afternoon. His four touchdown-effort, on just six receptions, vs. the Blue Hens ranks as a performance unrivaled in the College's 100-plus year football history. The spectacular effort included scoring plays of 87 (also a school record), 64, 62 and 10 yards. Most of his damage came in the first quarter, as he rang the Delaware defense up or 159 yards and three scores. The afternoon, which was his second 200-yard outing in the a four game span, earned Thompson the league's Offensive Player of the Week, as well as national honors

from ESPN/USA Today, who named him its I-AA National Offensive Player of the Week. He was also tabbed as a Weekly All-Star by the web site I-AA.org.

The following is a point-by-point rundown of what Thompson accomplished during the season first game vs. Delaware:

- Set school record for receiving yards with 244. (The old record was 240 set by Dave Conklin vs. VMI in 1997 – on nine receptions).
- Four TDs ties school record for single-game TD receptions (most recently set by Corey Ludwig in 1993 vs. Maine).
- His one-game average of 40.7 yds/catch establishes school's single-game record (among players with more than five catches). He was just off the NCAA's single-game record of 44.6, set by former NFL standout John Taylor while he was at Delaware State in 1985 (vs. Division II St. Paul's, 9/21/85).
- The 159 first quarter yards is a school record.
- His 87-yard TD reception ties the school's 43-year old record for longest pass play, first set by current NFL coach Dan Henning, who connected with Tom Scott vs. Navy in 1961.
- Also set the College's record for pass plays of 60 or more yards in game (three).
- His 244 yards ranks as the eighth best single-game performance in A10 history and is the fourth-best effort in a game between two league teams.

Sinking the Pirate Ship: Senior WR Dominique Thompson turned in one of his finest performances of the season in the College's scintillating 42-35 first round win over Hampton, with 118 yards (on seven catches) and two touchdowns, while adding a blazing 92-yard kick return for another score and tacking on 27 rushing yards for good measure.

His kick return was perhaps the game's biggest play, as it came with just 12:01 remaining in the contest, after the Pirates had just struck for another big-play touchdown and pushed out to a 28-21 lead. Thompson cradled the ensuing kick along the left hash mark and seared through the center of the HU kick cover unit 92 yards for his first career touchdown return, and the Tribe's first kickoff return for a score since 1995, tying the game at 28-28 just 14 seconds later.

After W&M's defense forced a Hampton turnover on the next possession, the Tribe held a 35-28 advantage one play later, as Campbell and Thompson hooked up on a 45-yard scoring play with 9:58 remaining. The play was liter-

ally Thompson's next touch, and stood as Thompson's second touchdown reception of the game, as he also hauled in a 27-yard scoring pass on the Tribe's first possession of the second half to erase a 13-7 halftime deficit.

More on Thompson: In the Tribe's win over Liberty (10/9), Thompson established a career high in receptions with 10 (for 221 yards). His 10 catches is made more impressive by the fact that only four Tribe players have recorded 10 or more receptions in the last 10 years in Laycock's diverse, spread the field, offense. For example, the top four receivers in school history (in terms of catches) combined for just a TOTAL of three 10-plus-reception afternoons (Rich Musinski, two; Dave Conklin, one).

Freshman Phenom: After setting College's rookie record for catches in a season with five receptions (53 yards) vs. Hampton (11/27), redshirt freshman Joe Nicholas significantly added to that total with an eye-popping 11 catches (94 yards, 2 TD) last Saturday against Delaware in the NCAA quarterfinals, bringing his total to 58 receptions on the year. The 11 catches is tied with six other players for sixth-most in a single game in W&M history, just two away from the school record of 13, most recently set by Rich Musinski last season at Rhode Island (10/25).

Nicholas scored two of the Tribe's biggest catches of the season in the post-season contest against the Blue Hens, first making a spectacular over-the-shoulder catch with just 1:06 remaining in regula-

tion to tie the game and send the contest to overtime. After UD scored a TD to start the first extra period, Nicholas came through with another game-tying TD catch, to send the game to the decisive second overtime frame.

The 6-3, 205-pound native of Sugarloaf, PA has used his big frame and sticky hands to steadily emerge as one of the conference's most reliable possession receivers. He has teamed with senior John Pitts and junior TE Adam Bratton (see Big Target note to follow) to give opposing defenses fits by working underneath zones and in the flats.

Nicholas has now caught five or more passes in six of the last seven games, and has brought in at least one ball in 12 of the 13 games on the season. In the team's crucial win at James Madison (11/13), Nicholas caught a then career-best seven receptions for 77 yards against the stingy Dukes defense. In the regular season finale vs. Richmond, he brought down six spirals for 91 yards and a touchdown. Also included in his afternoon, was a career long 51-yard catch-and-run. He had his career-best afternoon, in terms of yardage, vs. Northeastern, when he collected 111 yards on six receptions.

Prior to this season, three players were tied for the school's freshman record of 44 receptions. Not coincidentally, all three went on to place in the top four in both the College's all-time receptions and receiving yardage listings. The following is a listing of the top four seasons by freshman receivers in school history, followed by how they ended on the career listing in receptions and yardage.

Did You Know?: That Conklin, Rosier and Musinski each earned the league's Rookie of the Year Award for their stand-out freshman campaigns. Nicholas would have had an outside chance at the honor this season, had New Hampshire freshman QB Ricky Santos not turned in such gaudy numbers in leading the Wildcats to a top five national ranking.

Big Target: As previously mentioned, sure-handed senior John Pitts has also been a consistent contributor to the College's attack. Pitts, who came into the season with just 21 career receptions for 310 yards, has made at least one catch in all 13 games and has been especially

clutch, as of late. Saturday against UD, he caught just two balls for 15 yards, but his first catch of the day was a big one, as he took an 11-yard pass from Campbell into the end zone for his second TD of the season, tying the game at early in the first quarter. The previous weekend, in the win over Hampton, Pitts was a prime target, as he tied his career best with six catches for 80 yards. Three weeks ago, on the College's first second half possession vs. Richmond, he sparked what turned out to be a 24-point, third-quarter explosion by the College by cradling a perfectly-placed pass and racing 64 yards deep into Spider territory. W&M scored on the next play and the rout was on. Pitts ended the afternoon with a career-best 93 yards on just four receptions. Against 19th-ranked Villanova (11/6), Pitts established his career-high with six catches for 64 yards, while a five-yard TD grab at fourth-ranked James Madison highlighted his four-catch, 61-yard performance vs. the Dukes the following week.

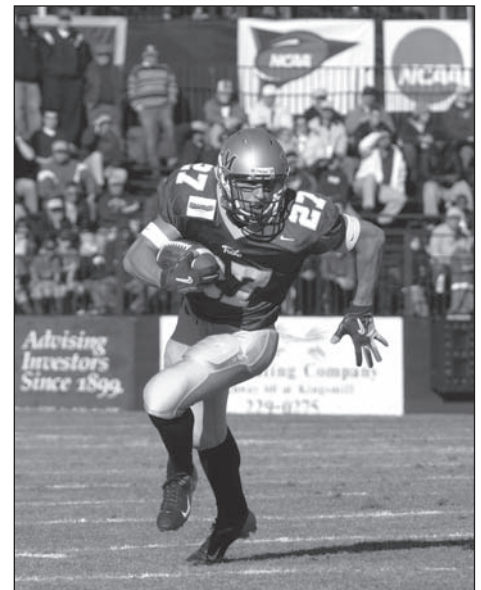
Working primarily out of the slot receiver position, Pitts' sure hands, large frame (6-3, 215 pounds), and veteran's understanding of the College's intricate offense makes it very difficult for opposing defenses to match up with him. He currently is third on the squad in both receptions (39) and yards (512).

Did You Know?: The Tribe's trio of Thompson (1,489), Nicholas (680) and Pitts (512) are the first trio of W&M players since the 1998 season to have collected over 500 receiving yards in the same season.

The last trio to accomplish the feat was Dave Conklin (925 yards), Chris Rosier (726) and current NFL tight end/long snapper Mike Leach (653) in 1998.

Great Endings: While he isn't currently working on an English writing degree, junior Adam Bratton has been giving the Tribe fans some great "endings" from his tight end position over the last four weeks. Bratton has elevated his game as the College has hit the stretch run. Of his 14 total receptions and 181 yards on the season, 12 catches and 163 yards, plus all four of his TDs, have come over the last six contests. Two weekends ago against Hampton, he established career highs for catches with three and scored a TD. He turned in a career best two TD effort in the win over Richmond three weeks ago. In the win over James Madison (11/13), Bratton turned in his career-high yardage with 45 on just two catches.

Bratton's increased production has corresponded with his recovery from a

painful hip injury sustained in the Tribe's win over Northeastern, which caused him to see limited action over the next three games. Also, he has needed to step up his game an additional notch after fellow tight end Matt Trinkle was put out of action in the win at Towson (10/30).

Did You Know?: In his first full season as a starter, sophomore guard Cody Morris earned Second Team All-Atlantic 10 honors and extended an impressive streak that has seen at least one Tribe offensive lineman earn all-conference recognition since joining the league before the 1993 season. In all, 15 William and Mary offensive linemen have earned a total of 20 all-conference certificates in the 12 seasons the College has been a conference member.

Morris joins former guard Josh Beyer as the only Tribe lineman to earn the all-conference recognition as a sophomore. Beyer went on to earn All-American honors after both his junior and senior seasons of 1995 and 1996.

Spectacularly Steady: While on the subject of all-conference performances, Tribe senior tailback Jon Smith ran his way to his second career all-conference honors in 2004, as he was named to the A10's Third Team. Few backs in the league can boast of as long and as steady a career as Smith has provided for the College's backfield the better part of the last four seasons, as he has seen action in 44 career games.

A hard runner, whose experience allows him to excel at all the subtle alignments and assignments required of his position, Smith's best attribute is the fact he

can do everything well. This season, he has teamed with sophomore tailback Elijah Brooks to provide quarterback Lang Campbell with an especially outstanding pair of blitz pickups in the passing game.

Starting with his season-best rushing performance vs. Towson (113 yards on 16 carries), Smith has scored at least one TD in each of the last six games, including a two-TD effort in each of the Tribe's post-season contests. Last week against Delaware, Smith had 13 carries for 52 yards and two touchdowns. Smith first scored on a two-yard carry with 9:56 left in the fourth quarter, to bring W&M one score away from tying UD, 31-24. He then scored the game-winning points in the second overtime session, taking a seven-yard run into the end zone for his team and A10-leading 15th TD of the season. Two weeks ago, in the win over HU, Smith rushed for a pair of touchdowns and 83 yards on 12 carries and pushed his season total to 671 yards (on 166 attempts).

For his career, Smith ranks sixth on the Tribes's all-time rushing list with 2,485 yards. (Please see complete listing on page 19).

A typical effort for Smith came in the Tribe's win at James Madison. While he and Brooks combined to rush for only 40 yards on 17 carries, each found other ways to contribute, as the pair contributed six catches for 66 yards. Also, Smith hammered out a three-yard fourth quarter scoring jaunt. The TD run was only the third rushing TD that the Dukes had yielded to I-AA competition on the year.

Familiar Territory: Smith's pair of touchdowns vs. the Blue Hens moved his career total to 39, accumulated in his 44 career games. His 15 rushing TDs on the season set a personal single-season high breaking his previous personal mark of 13 as a true freshman in 2001. He is currently ninth all-time in the Atlantic 10 Conference, and trails only Flying Jack Cloud (45) in the Tribe's record books.

Clutch Kicker: Junior kicker Greg Kuehn was one of two Tribe players to earn first team all-conference honors in 2004 and was also named the A10 Special Teams Player of the Year. The honor was his third in three years as the starter and has positioned him as one of the elite kickers in the nation. Much of his accolades have come as a result of his penchant for coming through with the clutch kicks throughout his 33 career games. Included in his late heroics was the game-winner vs. then 16th-ranked Northeastern in overtime earlier this season, but none really can compare to his coming through with the

46-yard game winner at then third-ranked James Madison.

In the face of a stiff breeze, which was gusting up to 20 mph throughout the game, Kuehn delivered a FG that sailed through the uprights with no time remaining on the game clock and put the College in charge of its own destiny, as far as post-season and conference title hopes were concerned.

Kuehn has not been at his best this postseason, as he has missed four of five attempts from inside 40 yards. After having spent the majority of the season as the national leader in field goals, his average of 1.31 FG per game ranks him eighth among all I-AA kickers, while his 17 field goals (in 26 attempts) is tied for first in the nation.

Kuehn has recorded three field goals in one game on three separate occasions this season and a total of six times in his career. Kuehn currently has 44 career FGs (on 65 attempts, .677 conversion pct.), a total that is the fourth-best in Tribe history and tied for the third-best career total in the Atlantic 10 (see chart on page 19). Kuehn's average of 8.2 points per game leads the team and is third in the A10.

Kuehn earned the Atlantic 10's Special Team's Player of the Week honors on two occasions this season. His first honor came when he provided all the points in the Tribe's 9-7 upset at then 10th-ranked New Hampshire. He was recognized again for his efforts against Northeastern, when he was no less valuable, and possibly even a little more clutch, as he accounted for 12 points on three field goals and three extra points. His final field goal of that afternoon came on a 28-yard effort in overtime and sealed the 38-35 win for the College.

Kuehn has already put himself in the Tribe's record book this season, as he was been true on his first 55 extra point attempts, the only miss coming on the Tribe's game-clinching TD in the second overtime. Against VMI (9/25), his first attempt marked the 51st-straight conversion, breaking former All-American Brett Sterba's school record of 50, set between the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Before his last miss Kuehn had booted 99 consecutive extra points and had not missed a PAT since the 2002 season (vs. Northeastern). For his career, Kuehn has converted 122 of his 124 XPT attempts (.984). His 122 career extra points ranks sixth in A10 history.

The College's success in the kicking game has been well documented over the seasons, as a Tribe place kicker has been named to the all-conference team in each of the last eight years. As has been previ-

ously mentioned, Kuehn now has earned the honor each of his three seasons as a starter and will be poised to finish next season as the only kicker to ever earn all-conference recognition four times.

The Tribe's school record for career field goals is held by current NFL standout, Steve Christie, who hammered out 57 career three-pointers. Two-time all-conference performer, Brian Shallcross is second with 48 treys, while Sterba sits in third with 46. Shallcross and Sterba currently hold the second and third positions on the A10's career field goal chart, respectively (see chart on page 19).

With at least one game remaining in his junior season, Kuehn seems on track to make a run at Christie's career mark, as he'll enter Saturday's game averaging better than one FG/start (44 FGs in 34 career games). For perspective's sake, Christie and Shallcross entered their senior seasons with 36 and 33 field goals, respectively.

In Case You Missed It: In the face of one of the league's top defensive units, and in front of a hostile crowd, Campbell came through with one of the finest performances of his career in throwing for a personal-best four TDs and 355 yards on a sparkling 20 completions in 30 attempts against the then third-ranked Delaware Blue Hens (10/23). The Blue Hen defense had yielded only five TD passes in its first six games coming into the contest, a figure that Campbell nearly equaled ... in the first quarter.

Campbell came out of the locker room with all guns blazing and connected on six of his first eight attempts for an amazing 173 yards and three TDs in the first quarter. The first quarter effort stands as the most passing yards in a single quarter in school history and ties Shawn Knight for most TD passes in quarter (2nd Quarter vs. Maine in 1993).

More than One Way to Skin a (Wild)Cat: Facing a near must-win situation against a surging Villanova squad that had won it previous three games by an average of better than 30 points, Campbell did a little of everything to fashion one of his more complete efforts on the season. Campbell was at the center of an offensive attack that kept an outstanding Wildcat defense on its heels the entire afternoon. In addition to receiving Campbell's usually efficient passing (22 completions in 34 attempts for 232 yards and a touchdown), the Winchester, VA native aided in the ground game as well, rushing for a season-best 60 yards (on 10 attempts) and a touchdown.

Campbell now has rushed for seven

TDs on the season, the most for a Tribe quarterback since 2005 W&M Athletics Hall of Fame Inductee Chris Hakel (1988-91) powered out 11 scores in the record-breaking 1990 season which saw the Tribe establish the school's single-season scoring (426 points) and total offense (6,438 in 13 games) standards.

W&M INDIVIDUAL DEFENSIVE NOTES

O'Connor Overpowering: Junior defensive end **Adam O'Connor** has been a dominant force on the Tribe front line this season, and his efforts were rewarded in the form of a second team All-Atlantic 10 citation.

O'Connor is tied for second in the league with 8.0 sacks on the year, and he also ranks sixth with 14.5 total tackles for loss. His eight sacks this season are the most by a Tribe player since Luke Cullinane pulled down a school-record 12 quarterbacks in 1996.

O'Connor was also named the Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Week on Nov. 7, for his efforts in the Tribe's crucial 37-29 victory over Villanova. O'Connor wreaked havoc in the Wildcats' backfield all afternoon, as he recorded three sacks in the contest, which was just a half-sack short of a W&M single-game record. The single-game record for sacks stands at 3.5, set by Cullinane in 1996, coincidentally against Villanova. O'Connor had five total tackles, all solo, and added another quarterback hurry against the Wildcats.

In his last four games, O'Connor has tallied 18 total tackles, including a season-high, nine-tackle performance in the win over JMU on Nov. 13. He registered a team-high 1.5 tackles for loss against the Dukes and swatted down one pass attempt.

Against Richmond, O'Connor was in on three stops, including his eighth sack of the season.

He recorded three total tackles in the first-round win over Hampton, including 1.5 for loss. He also recovered a crucial fumble in the fourth quarter that was caused by Jon Shaw and returned it to the Pirates' 45 to set up a W&M touchdown.

In quarterfinals against Delaware Saturday, O'Connor registered three tackles, including a solo TFL during the Tribe's impressive fourth quarter surge.

All-Around Effort: Junior defensive back **Stephen Cason** joined O'Connor on the All-Atlantic 10 Second Team, a significant accomplishment, after Cason missed the entire 2003 season.

Driving back to his native Richmond in a treacherous summer downpour prior

to the 2003 season, Cason was involved in a single-car accident that left him pinned under his vehicle with a broken neck. After extensive rehabilitation, Cason was cleared to play again just in time for 2004 summer camp.

He had an immediate impact in his first game back, forcing a fumble that led to a Tribe touchdown in the season-opening, 49-38, loss at Division I-A North Carolina. Against the Tar Heels, Cason recorded six total tackles, including five solo, and also broke up a pass. The forced fumble came on a cornerback blitz, as he came down the line and stripped UNC quarterback Darian Durant.

Cason had perhaps his best all-around performance in the Tribe's 27-24 victory at fourth-ranked JMU on Nov. 13. He was third on the squad, and one of four W&M players in double-figure tackles, with 10 total stops, including six solos. He also made one of the key plays of the day, recovering a fumble that was caused by linebacker **Chris Ndubueze**, when the JMU quarterback attempted to stretch the ball across the first-down marker. The recovery led to a three-yard TD run by **Jon Smith** three plays later, which gave the Tribe its first lead of the game at 24-17 with 5:40 remaining.

In addition to his defensive chores, Cason reclaimed the kickoff return duties for the Tribe, taking three kicks back for a total of 77 yards, which included a long of 27.

Against Hampton, Cason registered eight total tackles, six solos, including a key sack that resulted in a 12-yard loss. He also returned three kickoffs for a total of 61 yards, including a long of 30.

He registered his biggest play of the season in Saturday's quarterfinal win over Delaware, intercepting UD quarterback Sonny Riccio on the first play of the fourth quarter and racing 62 yards for a touchdown. The score cut the Tribe's deficit to 31-17, and W&M went on to force overtime and ultimately prevail in two extra frames.

On the year, Cason has tallied 70 total tackles, which ranks fourth on the squad, and has 7.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks to his credit. He ranks ninth in the A10 in kickoff return average, gaining 22.7 yards per return.

Break-out Season: With most of the preseason media attention aimed at all-conference linebacker **Travis McLaurin**, this season has truly been a breakthrough for the Tribe's other junior LB, **Chris Ndubueze**, who was named to the All-Atlantic 10 Second Team.

Ndubueze has emerged as one the

defenses key contributors, registering a career and team-high 107 total tackles this season. He has four double-digit games to his credit, including a personal-best 16-tackle effort in the slop at 10th-ranked New Hampshire on Sept. 18. In the 9-7 win over the Wildcats, Ndubueze was in on 10 solo stops, a season-high for the Tribe.

He recorded his first career interception in the 41-16 win over Towson on Oct. 30 and returned it 10 yards, eventually leading to a 32-yard field goal by Greg Kuehn.

In the win over Hampton, Ndubueze had one of the many key defensive plays in the fourth quarter. With the Tribe clinging to a 35-28 lead, Hampton gained possession at the Tribe's 30-yard line after an interception. The Pirates moved six yards on three rushing plays to start the drive, and faced with fourth-and-four at the 24, decided to go for it.

Pirates' quarterback Princeton Shepherd dropped back to pass on fourth down, was pursued by Ndubueze and dropped for a 16-yard loss, turning the ball over to W&M on downs. The Tribe went 60 yards on four plays after the sack, capped by Jon Smith's four-yard TD run to take a 42-28 advantage with 1:56 remaining.

He earned coaching staff defensive player of the week honors for his efforts in the win over Delaware Saturday, recording seven total tackles.

Perhaps Ndubueze's biggest play of the season came in the 27-24 victory at fourth-ranked James Madison on Nov. 13, when he forced a fumble in the fourth quarter, as the JMU quarterback attempted to stretch the ball over

the first-down line on third-and-short. Stephen Cason recovered the fumble and the momentum swung clearly in favor of the Green and Gold, as Jon Smith scored from five yards out three plays later to give W&M its first lead of the game 24-17. Ndubueze tallied 12 total tackles, including six solos, against the Dukes.

The Last Line: Another key component of the defense's improvement this season has been the play of secondary-leader free safety **James Miller**. In terms of tackles, the junior is second to only Ndubueze on the squad with 100 total stops, while Miller leads the team with three interceptions and 12 passes defended. He has four double-digit tackle games on his resume, including a 15-tackle performance in the season-opener at I-A North Carolina.

Miller's three interceptions came in consecutive games against VMI, Northeastern and Liberty, with maybe the biggest in the Tribe's 38-35 overtime win over the 16th-ranked Huskies on Oct. 2.

With the Tribe trailing 28-27 late in the fourth quarter, Miller stepped in front of a pass from NU quarterback Shawn Brady in the end zone with 3:24 remaining in the game. A Huskies' TD would almost certainly have sealed W&M's fate, instead the Tribe offense took over at its 20-yard line and two plays later Lang Campbell hit Dominique Thompson on a 77-yard TD pass for the go-ahead score.

At Liberty, Miller struck in the fourth quarter once again, returning his third pick of the season 70 yards to set up Jon Smith's 1-yard TD run.

He earned Quarterback Club defensive player of the week honors for efforts in the win at JMU, when he tallied 11 total tackles.

Shaw Coming on Strong: Reading through the Cashing In note, you may have noticed junior strong safety **Jon Shaw** has come up with some big-time plays for the Tribe defense in recent weeks.

In the regular season finale against Richmond Nov. 20th, Shaw recorded four solo tackles, including his first sack of the season, and registered his second interception of the season. The INT came in the decisive third quarter, when W&M outscored the Spiders 24-0 en route to a 38-14 victory.

In the first round of the NCAA I-AA Playoffs against Hampton, Shaw tallied a team and career-high nine total tackles, including a solo stop for a loss. As previously mentioned, he also caused a critical

turnover in the fourth quarter, breaking up a pitch from the Pirates' quarterback at the HU 47-yard line. The fumble was recovered by Adam O'Connor, and on the Tribe's first offensive play from scrimmage, Lang Campbell and Dominique Thompson hooked up on a 45-yard scoring pass to the College ahead for good, 35-28.

He added four solo stops in the win over Delaware Saturday.

On the season, Shaw ranks sixth on the team with 65 total tackles and has contributed 3.5 tackles for loss, one sack, a pair of interceptions and six pass break-ups, in addition to his key forced fumble against Hampton.

Backing the Line: In addition to the outstanding play of all-conference linebacker **Chris Ndubueze** (see Break-out Season Note in Individual Defensive Notes), the Tribe defense has been lifted by the emergence of another duo of talented linebackers in sophomore **Ryan Nickell** and junior **Thad Wheeler**.

Nickell has been a steady contributor for the Tribe this season, ranking among the team leaders in tackles, tackles for loss and interceptions.

He has recorded at least one TFL in three of his last four games, which includes a career-high 11-tackle effort in the win over Delaware Saturday. His previous career-best came in the first meeting with JMU, as the sophomore registered 10 total tackles against the Dukes.

Both of his interceptions came against VMI in the season's third game, as he picked off the Keydet quarterback on consecutive VMI snaps.

Nickell is third on the squad with 79 total stops this season and ranks second with 10.5 tackles for loss. In addition to his two picks, he has contributed a sack, two pass break-ups and a blocked extra-point.

Wheeler saw his first extensive action of the season in the Homecoming win over Rhode Island on Oct. 16, when all-

conference linebacker Travis McLaurin went down with a knee injury. Wheeler came in and recorded a career-high 16 tackles in the game, more than doubling his entire season-total prior to the game. He followed that performance with his first career start at Delaware on Oct. 23, making nine total stops, including a TFL.

Including his career afternoon against URI, Wheeler has tallied 61 total tackles, the third-most on the team during that span. He has also contributed five TFLs, a sack and two pass break-ups.

On the year, Wheeler now ranks fifth on the team with 68 total tackles and has 5.0 TFLs, including the one sack.

The Wright Move: Although the finals stats may not show it, sophomore defensive end **Josh Wright** had an outstanding afternoon for the Tribe on Saturday, especially in the fourth quarter. Wright consistently applied pressure on UD quarterback Sonny Riccio, forcing him to scramble out of the pocket and hurry throws. In fact, Wright played a key role in the final play of double-overtime, chasing down Riccio as he threw the incomplete pass on fourth-and-goal from the nine that ended the game.

On the Blue Hens' first possession of

the second half, Wright may have provided a prelude to what was in-store from the Tribe defense, as he came down the line and crushed Riccio from his blind side on a second-and-four from the UD 49-yard line, knocking the ball loose for a forced fumble and sack by definition. Although the fumble was recovered by the Blue Hens, Cason hurried Riccio into an incomplete pass on third down and UD was forced to punt.

Wright was credited with six total tackles in the game, two solo, to go along with the sack and forced fumble.

After battling through a wrist injury through the latter part of summer camp, Wright assumed a starting role at defensive end in the season's second game, a 9-7 win at 10th-ranked New Hampshire, and has not disappointed since. He is seventh on the squad and tops among defensive linemen with 53 total tackles, which includes 7.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. Wright has also added six quarterback hurries.

Mesi on the Mark: Senior punter **Mike Mesi** was named to the third team all-conference squad for the second straight year, after another solid season for the Tribe's special teams. Mesi has come on strong as the season has worn down, averaging better than 40 yards per punt in six of the last nine games. He ranks third in the A10 with an average of 39.1 yards per punt and 13 of his kicks have been downed inside the opponent's 20.

Mesi had an outstanding game against Villanova on Nov. 6 and perhaps, had one of the biggest plays of the game.

Midway through the third quarter, with the game tied at 21-21, Mesi uncorked a 55-yard punt that was downed at the Villanova two-yard line. Three plays later, the Wildcats were forced to punt and the snap sailed out of the end zone for a safety.

Mesi punted four times in the game for an average of 43.0 yards per kick and three of his four punts were downed inside the Wildcats' 20-yard line.

At JMU on Nov. 13, Mesi's kicking numbers may not have been quite as attractive, but the punter made two spectacular plays that didn't show up in the final stats. He twice corralled low snaps that skipped off JMU's slick artificial surface, preventing any losses or blocked punts on the plays. He punted three times for 105 yards, including a long of 42.

Against Richmond on Nov. 20, Mesi punted four times for an average of 42.0 yards and three of his four kicks were downed inside the 20.

DURHAM, NH (9/18/04) - All-conference kicker **Greg Kuehn** connected on field goals of 27, 35 and 21 yards and the Tribe defense held the Wildcats' high-powered offense in check, as W&M won its conference-opener, 9-7, over 10th-ranked New Hampshire at rained-soaked Cowell Stadium.

Playing in heavy rains from the remnants of Hurricane Ivan, W&M held UNH to 226 offensive yards, nearly 150 below its average, after yielding 575 yard to North Carolina two weeks prior. It was the fewest yards allowed by a W&M defense since yielding 141 to Massachusetts in the 2001 season-opener.

All-American candidate **Lang Campbell** and the Tribe offense were efficient in the treacherous conditions, as Campbell threw for 148 yards on 11 for 23 passing and ran for 42 yards on 14 attempts. With 148 passing yards, he moved into 10th place on the W&M career passing list. Senior Jon Smith churned out 63 yards on 23 carries.

Kuehn kicked three field goals for the fourth time in his career, with the last coming in a win over Rhode Island on Oct. 25, 2003.

Chris Ndubueze paced the defense with a career-high 16 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Junior **Larry Pendleton** tallied seven tackles and a sack, while sophomore **Josh Wright**, who made his first career start, also recorded a sack.

The win gave W&M its first victory over a ranked opponent since knocking off 15th-ranked Northeastern in Williamsburg on Oct. 26, 2002.

WILLIAMSBURG (9/25/04) - All-American candidate **Lang Campbell** threw for 137 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the first half to surpass the 3,000-yard mark for his career, as W&M used four second-quarter touchdowns and another outstanding defensive effort to knock off state-rival VMI, 42-6, in front of 8,101 fans at Zable Stadium.

Playing on his 23rd birthday, Campbell went over the 3,000-yard plateau in the first quarter and went on to complete 11-of-15 passes for 160 yards to move into ninth place (3,136) on the College's career passing yards lists. With two TD passes, Campbell also moved into eighth place (28) on the career list at W&M.

The Tribe defense forced four turnovers for the second time this season (UNC) and held the Keydets to 197 total yards, the first time a W&M defense surrendered fewer than 200 total yards since a season-opening win at UMass in 2001 (146). Dating back to a 9-7 win at UNH on Sept. 18, W&M has not allowed a touchdown for over seven consecutive quarters, a feat that has not been accomplished since 1995.

On the Tribe's OT possession, Nicholas caught a key first-down pass from Campbell on third-and-long, and two plays later Kuehn drilled the game-winner.

Campbell ended the day 22 of 36 for 378 yards, including the score to Thompson. He also ran for a pair of TDs. The 378 passing yards ranks as the eighth-best single-game performance in W&M history, and it was his second game over 300 yards in four games this season.

Thompson led the Tribe with a career-high 157 yards on five grabs, while Nicholas hauled in a career-best 111 yards on six catches.

TOWSON, MD (10/30/04) - Senior All-American candidate, quarterback **Lang Campbell** threw for 268 yards and three touchdowns in three quarters, and the 16th-ranked Tribe piled up a season-high 585 yards of total offense to subdue Towson, 41-16.

Campbell completed 20-of-29 attempts and his three touchdown passes brought his season total to 14, seven of which have come in the last two games. The 268 passing yards brought his career total to 4,697, moving him into sixth place on the W&M career list, while his three TD passes brought his career total to 38, also moving him into sixth place on the W&M career list in that category.

Senior wide receiver **Dominique Thompson** caught seven passes for 122 yards and two touchdowns, his fifth and sixth scoring receptions in the last two games. Thompson went over the 1,000-yard mark on the season early in the third quarter, becoming just the sixth player in W&M history to record a 1,000-yard receiving season.

Just as impressive as Campbell's feats through air was the Tribe's ground attack, which racked up a season-high 280 rushing yards after averaging just 99.1 yards per game coming in. HARRISONBURG, VA (11/13/04) - Junior all-conference kicker **Greg Kuehn** nailed a 46-yard field goal as time expired to lead 10th-ranked William and Mary to a thrilling 27-24 victory over fourth-ranked James Madison in front of 13,904 fans at Bridgeforth Stadium.

The College gained possession at its 28-yard line with 38 seconds remaining, after JMU tied the game at 24-24 with 45 seconds left. With three timeouts in hand, senior All-American and Payton Award candidate, quarterback **Lang Campbell** calmly led the Tribe on a five play, 43-yard drive to set up Kuehn's game-winning kick that gave the Tribe its first win in Harrisonburg since 1998 and its second victory over a top-10 team on the road this season.

The kick was Kuehn's second game-winning score of the season, as he also drilled a 28-yard field goal in overtime to beat 16th-ranked Northeastern, 38-35, on Oct. 2.

Campbell was brilliant all day, as he methodically picked apart the Dukes' vaunted defense for 323 yards and two touchdowns on 26 of 33 passing. It was Campbell's fifth 300-yard passing game of the season, as he moved over the 5,000-yard barrier for his career (5,302), becoming just the sixth quarterback in W&M history to accomplish the feat.

Junior **Chris Ndubueze** led the Tribe with 12 total tackles and forced a critical JMU fumble late in the game, which was recovered by classmate **Stephen Cason**, who had 10 total stops in the game. All-conference candidate, junior **Adam O'Connor** registered nine total tackles, including a team-high 1.5 for loss.

Senior tailback **Jon Smith** and Campbell each contributed to the Tribe's impressive rushing attack, as Smith racked up 80 yards and two scores on 13 carries, while Campbell added a season-high 71 yards on nine attempts.

Nicholas set a freshman record with 11 receptions, which went for 94 yards and two TDs. Senior WR **Dominique Thompson** caught nine passes for 185 yards, his sixth 100-yard receiving game of the season. He also established a new single-season record with 1,489 yards.

Campbell became just the fifth quarterback in school history to throw for 6,000 yards, while also establishing season records for yards (3,673) and TD passes (27).

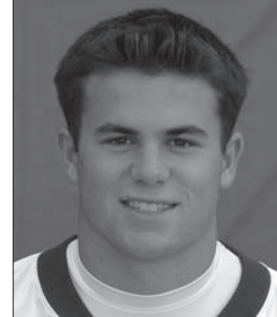
