Each week during the season, W&M coach **Jimmye Laycock** participates in the Atlantic 10 teleconference and gives his thoughts on the Tribe's most recent performance, plus a look ahead at the squad's next game.

1. Give a few comments on the team's 37-24 win on Saturday.

A: I was very pleased with the way we played. We executed on both sides of the ball pretty well. There are some things we need to do better, but we made some strides defensively. Offensively, the running game also made some strides. I was especially pleased to see us bounce back from adversity after giving up a 93-yard kickoff return for a touchdown [in the fourth quarter to put the game at 30-24]. Our special teams made play, pinning Rhode Island deep [at its own 1-yard line] then the defense responded with a big play to seal the win [forced fumble recovered in the end zone by Adam O'Connor]. We traveled to play a very physical, very good team and played pretty well.

2. Can you discuss the performance of Rich Musinski [career high 13 catches for 191 yards and two score] and Lang Campbell [19 of 29 for 274 yards and two scores] against Rhode Island?

A: I thought Lang did a really nice job. He did well in going to the right receivers when he should have. We weren't trying to force the ball to Rich, but it was more of a case of Lang reading the defense and making the right throw. Rich really caught the ball extremely well. Everything that was close to him was caught. And Lang continued to improve. This was probably one of his better games.

3. How happy were you with the improvement in the running game?

A: I was really pleased with our balance offensively. Our ability to run the ball set up some throws for us. [Redshirt freshman] Delmus Coley stepped up for us and did a nice job [running for 104 yards on 24 carries].

4. Defensively, who stood out for you?

A: [Sophomore defensive end] Adam O'Connor had a good game. He played very hard and was productive [recovered a fumble for a TD, contributed seven total tackles, including one sack]. And [sophomore defensive tackle] Larry Pendleton on the inside, also played very well and has continued to improve. Marques Bobo and Billy Parker had fine games, as did James Miller at the safety position.

5. What are your thoughts on this week's opponent, Hofstra?

A: They are a team with very good personnel. They have had turnover problems which has hurt them in some games, but that's the story a lot of times in this league. If you're on the wrong side of the turnover ratio, it's tough to overcome in this league. From what I've seen on tape, they play very hard. It's going to be another transition for us defensively again defensively, as we are going to go from URI's option attack to the spread offense that Hofstra runs.

6. Are you concerned about their quarterback situation, since they could start one of two players?

A: It's always a concern of whom you're going to face. But you have to take care of yourself. We have to make sure we're solid in how we play.

7. Can you talk about their wide receivers?

A: There's no doubt that they have talent. Last year we played them up there but the driving rain meant it wasn't a great game for either team to throw the football. But two years ago they played us down here and it looked like they had a NFL team out there. But we have a lot of respect for their wideouts and everything they do in the passing game.

8. How does it feel to get the team some confidence with a win?

A: It's very important to get the winning feeling. Nothing beats winning. Our players were excited and felt they accomplished a good feat. Rhode Island is a very solid, well-coached team.

Did You Know?

This week represents W&M's first Homecoming game in November since the 1994 season.

Tribe TIDBITS

Homecoming History: This weekend's game will be the 75th Homecoming contest in Tribe history. W&M is 43-31 all-time on Homecoming, including wins in 13 of its past 15 games. Last year, W&M topped 13th-ranked Northeastern, 30-13, in the Homecoming game. This week's game will be W&M's first Homecoming contest to take place in the month of November since the 1994 contest, when W&M topped Maine, 17-0, on Nov. 5. W&M is 5-3 under head coach Jimmie Laycock and 14-11 overall in Homecoming games played in November.

Magnificent Musinski: As his senior season winds down, Tribe All-American WR **Rich Musinski** seems to be stepping up his level with every outing. Certainly this was the case in the Tribe's 37-24 win over Rhode Island last week as the 6-1, 195-pound West Pittston, PA native hauled in 191 yards and two scores on a career-high 13 receptions. His afternoon of work earned him the Atlantic 10 Co-Offensive Player of the Week honors (for games played on the weekend of Oct. 25th). To go with his league honor, Musinski's 13 catches tied the College's single game record, held for the last 20 years by Glen Bodnar, who pulled down 13 spirals in the College's 48-39 loss at Colgate in 1984. For good measure, his 191-yard afternoon is the seventh-best single game receiving yardage total in school history.

As one of the most brilliant four-year careers in school history winds down, Musinski is breaking a record of some variety on nearly every weekend of action. With just three games left in his career, the following are some cliff notes of what he has accomplished to this point and what is on the horizon.

The 2003 Season

- Leads the A-10 in receptions game (6.86) and is 12th nationally
- Leads A-10 in receiving yards per game (93.0) and is 21st nationally
- Second in league TD receptions (six)

More on the 2003 season: No Tribe receiver has ever lead the league in receptions per game ... If he maintains, or improves, current average of 6.86 receptions per game, he would set school's single season mark in category (record is 6.7 set by Chuck Albertson in 1966) ... Averaging better than seven catches, nearly 100 yards (99.4) and more than one TD per game in league play ... Has been over 100 receiving yards in four of seven games, including last two ... Has had eight or more receptions in four of seven games.

- Needs just 14 more yards to pass Brian Forster (1983-87) as the league's top receiver (3,944)
- 209 career receptions ranks 8th all-time (Forster leads with 284)
- 30 career TDs receptions ranks eighth all-time
- 116.1 yards per game average in 2001 ranks as the fourth-best single season in A-10 history

More on Musinski in the A-10 Record Books:

Two-time first team all-conference selection – if selected to first team in 2003 will join only three other players in league history to have earned first team all-league honors three times in career (Bill Brooks, Boston U., and Dameon Reilly, URI; 1983-85; and Milt Morin, UMass, 1963-65) ... Named the league's Rookie of the Year in 2000.

In the NCAA Division I-AA Record Books

- Currently sits sixth all-time in career receiving yards (3,776) – see chart below
- Career average of 94.4 ranks seventh all-time
- 20 career 100-yard receiving games places him three shy of equaling Jerry Rice's record of 23.
- With 224 more receiving yards over final three games, he will become just third player in I-AA history to reach the 4,000 yard barrier

The Lang Legend Continues to Grow: Certainly, Musinski's continued success has been closely associated with the emergence of junior Tribe quarterback **Lang Campbell**, who has quickly established himself as one of the league's premier players in just his first season as the starter.

Last week's contest vs. URI quite possibly could have been the break out game for the Winchester, VA native, as he completed 19 of 29 passes for a career high 274 yards and two TDs. On the strength of this outing, Campbell comes into Saturday's contest with Hofstra, tied for the league lead in touchdown passes with 16, second in passing yds/gm (228.3), QB efficiency rating (147.2) and TD to INT ratio 2.7 to 1 (16 to 6), while his average of 251 yds/gm in total offense ranks third. Campbell's QB efficiency ranking ranks 12th nationally, while he 21st nationally in total offense.

Perhaps the most impressive portion of his game has been his uncanny accuracy. Through seven games, Campbell has completed 134 of his 210 attempts on the year (63.8%). Since throwing his second of two interceptions vs. Northeastern in the final drive of the third quarter in the season's third game, Campbell has completed a remarkable 69 percent of his passes over the next 17 quarters (73 of 105) since, with only one interception balanced against seven TD passes.

Over that same four-game span, Campbell is averaging 270 yards a game in the air and over 290 yards of total offense a per contest. In fact, his 274-yard outing vs. URI marked the fourth-straight week he threw for better than 250 yards, a feat not accomplished by a Tribe quarterback

since the 1990 season when 2004 W&M Hall of Fame inductee Chris Hakel surpassed the 250-yard barrier five straight time between the season's sixth and 10th games

His command of the Tribe's attack is quantified by the fact that he averages completing passes to seven different receivers a game. This is in spite of the fact that he has one of the premier go-to players in the conference in All-American wideout Rich Musinski.

Not just a one-dimensional player, Campbell also is the squad's leading rusher from scrimmage on the season, gaining 262 yards on a team high 58 attempts. His net rushing total on the season is reduced to 159 when yards lost on sacks are factored in (-103 yards on 15 sacks).

Conversion Conversation: Through seven games on the season, the Tribe offense has established a very positive trend in having success in the opposition's red zone. Despite having its worst statistical afternoon of the season by "only" scoring on five of seven opportunities vs. the Rams. Even with the off-afternoon vs. the Rams, W&M has turned 19 of its 22 red zone chances into points (11 TDs, eight FGs).

On the Mark: Going hand-in-hand with the College's success in the red zone is the accuracy and strength of Tribe kicker **Greg Kuehn** right leg. Despite missing a pair of field goal attempts at Rhode Island (kicking into a stiff wind), Kuehn still managed to nailed three field goals on the afternoon. This effort came on the heels of the Potomac Falls, VA native record tying afternoon the week prior vs. JMU, when he tied a school-

record for FGs in a half with three (last set in 2000 by Brett Sterba vs. Northeastern)

On the season, Kuehn has made 11 of 15 field goals and all 16 of his PAT attempts. He leads the league, and is sixth nationally, in field goals per game (1.57). Kuehn leads the Tribe, and is third in the league in scoring by averaging seven points per game (49 total).

When looking at the place kicking position for the College, there is certainly a legacy of success under Jimmie Laycock. In the previous 10 seasons the College has spent in the A10, a Tribe kicker has earned all-conference honors of some variety in six of those years. Steve Christie (1989) and Brett Sterba (1999) have earned All-America recognition at the position in recent years.

Just 17 games into his collegiate career, Kuehn's accomplishments already rank him amongst the College's best at his position, as he has converted 25 of his 36 career attempts (.694). With three games still remaining in his sophomore season, Kuehn's 25 FGs trails only Brett Sterba's 28 (between 1998-99) for the most by a Tribe kicker in his first two seasons as the starting kicker. Percentage wise, his 69.4 percent success rate would be third, behind Brian Morris (21 of 27, 77.7 percent, 1982-83) and Sterba (29 of 38, 76.3 percent).

A current NFL kicker with San Diego, Christie holds the Tribe's school record for career field goals with 57, accumulated between the 1986 and 1989 seasons. Only two other players have kicked for all four seasons in a Tribe uniform; Brian Shallcross (1995-97) and Brian Morris (1982-85).

Cruising Corey: Redshirt freshman tailback Delmus Coley's 24-carry, 104-yard effort vs. URI marks the first time this season that a Tribe running back has broken the 100-yard rushing mark. In fact, his 24 carries is more than twice the number of carries that any W&M back this season has carried the ball in any one game (Jon Smith 11, two times, last coming vs. JMU). Smith was also the last Tribe running back to go over the 100-yard mark, when he rushed for 192 yards vs. JMU in the 10th game of the 2002 season (seven games prior to last weekend).

The standout afternoon spurred the College to a season-best 203 rushing yards and pushed his season rushing total to a team-high 233 yards (on 54 carries)

Rogers: Senior fullback Nick Rogers also played a major role in the Tribe's big day on the ground, as he served as a standout lead blocker and also proved to be his usual steady self when his number was called, as he carried seven times for 35 yards (5.0 yds/att).

Over the course of the first seven games, Rogers has proven to the squad's most consis-

tent ball carrier and one of its most improved performers. He is currently second on the team in rushing yardage (196) and leads the team in yards per carry (5.0) and rushing TDs (one).

Putting his season accomplishments into perspective, coming into the year Rogers had a career rushing total of just 377 yards over 23 career games. He is just two yards shy of eclipsing his 11-game rushing total from a season ago (161 yards on 23 attempts).

In an interesting side note, Rogers remains the only Tribe ball-carrier to score in the last seven games, going back to last season (as his 38-yard TD scamper vs. James Madison was the last Tribe scoring run till Rogers hit paydirt two weeks ago vs. UMass).

The five-game stint without a rushing TD is the longest dry spell on the ground for the College in Laycock's 24-year tenure as the head coach.

Outstanding O'Connor: Much like Rogers' contributions, the standout play of sophomore defensive end Adam O'Connor has been one of the more pleasant surprises on the season for the College. This past weekend vs. URI, O'Connor

sealed the Tribe's 37-24 win by recovering an errant fourth-quarter Ram pitch attempt in the end zone. In addition to the touchdown, he also added seven tackles and a sack (-2 yards) to his afternoon's efforts.

A relative untested commodity coming into the season, the 6-6, 250-pound history major has quietly made a pitch for all-conference recognition over the past two weeks, which have seen him record 14 tackles (seven each vs. JMU and URI). On the season, he currently is tied for fourth in the league in both sacks (4.0) and tackles for losses (9.0). He has also contributed 13 quarterback hurries, by far the top mark on the squad.

O'Connor's consistently improving play has been indicative of the attacking style of defense the young W&M defense is looking to play. Tribe defensive coordinator Tom Clark and his staff came into 2003 looking to emphasize finding ways to pressure opposing QBs, and through seven games in 2003 it seems as if his off-season scheming is paying dividends. In just the past two weeks alone, the W&M defense has recorded seven sacks (five vs. JMU, two against URI) and seven other tackles for losses. On the season, the College has racked up 36 TFLs, including 16 sacks (-115 yards). The 16 sacks equals the squad's 11 game total from a season ago.

Hot Foot: If football officially recognized 'assists' as a statistical category, Tribe punter **Mike Mesi** and gunner/receiver **Dominique Thompson** would have received one for O'Connor's TD recovery vs. URI. Clinging to a six-point lead with just under five minutes to play in the contest, W&M was forced into a punting situation from its own 38-yard line. In the face of an all-out Ram punt rush, Mesi calmly stepped up and nailed a career best tying 61-yard punt that was downed by Thompson after a brilliant hustle play on the URI one-yard line. The Tribe defense picked up on the momentum the standout special team's play created and eventually converted a forced turnover into six points and effectively put game out of reach. For good measure, Mesi came out for his next punt and pinned the Rams on its own five-yard line.

On the season, the junior from Eatontown, NJ, is currently second in the league and 22nd in the nation in punting, with an average of 41.1 yds/att.

Wade Watch: Senior WR **Danny Wade** seems to have saved his best performance for last, as he is having a career year in his senior season. With three games to play, Wade is second on the team in both receptions (28) and receiving yards (300). Both figures stand as career-highs for the Martinsville, VA native and, on his current pace, he seems a lock to surpass his entire career totals of 30 catches for 351 yards that he carried into this season.

Wade has been especially effective over the past four weeks, as he has brought down 19 receptions for 202 yards. One week after establishing a career high both in catches and yards at fourth-ranked Delaware (7 receptions for 78 yards), Wade broke both marks against the seventh-ranked Minutemen by turning in an eight catch, 80-yard afternoon.

Coming into this year, Wade's career-best for receptions and yards in a season was 24 for 279 yards (set last year).

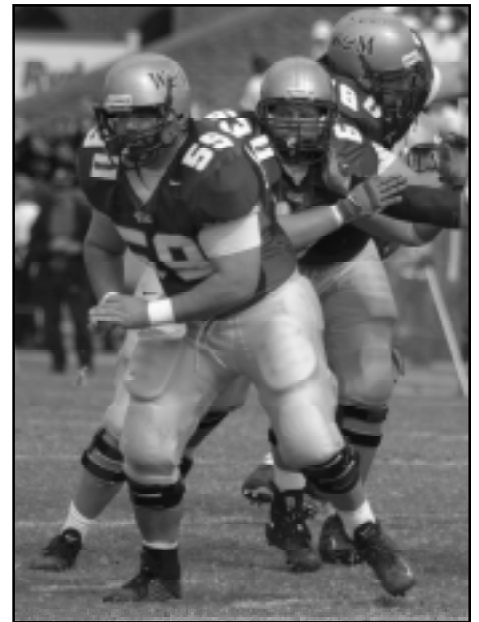
On This Date: The 17th anniversary of one of the most memorable wins in Tribe football history falls on the same date as Saturday's game. On Nov. 1, 1986, W&M shocked the Virginia Cavaliers, 41-37, in Charlottesville. The Tribe stunned UVA and its Homecoming crowd as W&M quarterback Ken Lambiotte threw for 307 yards and three touchdowns. He also ran for a pair of scores in the upset.

Rising to the Occasion: A trio of Tribe standouts have excelled on Homecoming in the past few years. Senior wideout **Rich Musinski** had six catches for 132 yards and two scores last year against Northeastern. In 2001, Musinski caught eight passes for 144 yards and a score in the 42-20 win over Maine. And in 2000, Musinski had four catches for 75 yards in a 26-15 win over Northeastern. Musinski is averaging six catches for 117 yards and one touchdown on Homecoming. Junior tailback **Jon Smith** has also performed well, rushing for an average of 100 yards and one score in his two Homecoming games. Defensively, senior linebacker **Paul Carpenter** has recorded a total of 21 tackles in the previous two Homecoming contests.

On the Defensive: Several Tribe players turned in outstanding performances in last week's game against Rhode Island. The Tribe limited the Rams to just 336 yards of total offense, the second-best showing of the year by the W&M defenders.

Coming into the game against JMU two weeks ago, the Tribe was giving up an average of 487 yards per game of total offense. But in the contests against the Dukes and the Rams, the Tribe has given up just over 322 yards per game, a drop of 165 yards from the average of the first five weeks.

Leading the way are the Tribe's all-conference candidates at linebacker, **Paul Carpenter** and **Travis McLaurin**. McLaurin finished with the game against the Rams with 13 tackles, reaching double-digits in tackles for the seventh time in as many games this year. McLaurin recorded his 13 tackles on just 47 snaps against URI, meaning he made a tackle on one out of every 3.6 snaps he took. Carpenter's had 35 tackles in back-to-back games against UMass and JMU, the most for the Tribe in consecutive games since Marty



The return from injury of Patrick Mulloy (59) and Steve Stocki has solidified the offensive line.

Magerko recorded back-to-back 18-tackle showings in the 2001 season.

Continuing their strong play of late were a pair of youngsters from Norfolk, sophomore lineman **Larry Pendleton** and sophomore safety **James Miller**. One week after setting a career-high with 11 tackles, Pendleton made 10 stops against URI. Miller stepped up to become one of the team's top tacklers for the second-straight game. He made 10 tackles, all solo stops, plus recorded a pair of tackles for loss.

Making Progress: William and Mary's offense continued to show improvement in the win over Rhode Island. W&M averaged 6.2 yards per play against the Rams, topping the previous season-best of 6.0 yards per play that W&M achieved against both UMass and JMU. In each of the past three games, W&M has averaged more yards per play than the opposition. Also, the Tribe controlled the time of possession, holding the ball for eight minutes and 33 seconds, by far a longer edge than in any other game this season. The offensive upgrade is certainly helped by the presence of a pair of experienced players up front. Senior guard **Steve Stocki** and sophomore center **Patrick Mulloy** have each missed time this year due to injuries, but both have been healthy for the past two seasons.

Campbell played well for W&M, completing 18 of 31 passes for 181 yards and three scores, including two to **Steven Hargrove**. **Rich Musinski** had eight catches for 101 yards, leaving him six short of tying Jerry Rice's I-AA record for 100-yard games in a career.

Defensively, the Tribe was led by linebackers **Paul Carpenter** and **Travis McLaurin**, who each had 14 tackles on the evening. Senior corner **Billy Parker** had a 27-yard fumble return and linebacker **Chris Outlaw** contributed a 68-yard interception return for the Tribe defense.

Fullback **Nick Rogers** had a one-yard TD catch for the Tribe, while sophomore kicker **Greg Kuehn** nailed a 33-yard field goal and converted all three of his PAT attempts.
