Each week during the season, W&M coach **Jimmye Laycock** participates in the Atlantic 10 teleconference and gives his thoughts on the Tribe's most recent performance, plus a look ahead at the squad's next game.

1. How was it having a bye week this late in the season?

A: Well, you're at the mercy of the schedule makers on when [the bye week] happens, but I wish we could have kept playing because we've been improving lately.

2. How much of an impact on your defense has come from forcing more pressure on the quarterback?

A: Well, we need to make more things happen. We're still giving up a lot of yardage, but we're playing better in the red zone. We seem to be playing harder, but there is still room for improvement and we have to continue to work at it.

3. Can you talk about sophomore defensive end Adam O'Connor's play [six sacks, 12 TFLs, 18 QB hurries] this year?

A: Adam plays real hard. He's always played real tough and he is relentless. He gives us great effort on each snap. He's a player who didn't have a whole lot of experience coming into this year but he's gotten that as the year has gone on and now he's starting to make plays.

4. What are your thoughts on senior cornerback Billy Parker's play?

A: Billy's done a fine job for us. Sometimes, through no fault of his own, he's not as involved

in the action because of the makeup of the game. In certain situations, he may not get as much action on the corner. He's improved his tackling and his ability to take on the run. He's had a very good year.

5. What areas of the offense have you seen the most improvement on since the beginning of the season?

A: Our running game has showed the most improvement. We struggled there early for a lot of reasons. But I feel like we've improved with the cohesiveness of our offensive line that has allowed us to block better. And, certainly, the recent standout play of [redshirt freshman tailback] Delmus Coley has given us a spark in our running game.

6. What is the rotation and health of the tailbacks backs?

A: The one we're concerned about is [junior] Jon Smith. He's been nursing an injured [left] ankle for a few weeks. I would assume he'll be back [for this weekend's game vs. UNH], but we won't know until we start practicing this week. Right now Delmus is doing very well and we're going to start him this week.

7. What are your thoughts on UNH?

A: They have gotten better as the season has progressed. They play extremely hard on defense. Offensively, they really execute well. I can really appreciate how hard it is to execute well, and they do a good job of that.

Tribe TIDBITS

Magnificent Musinski: As his senior season winds down, Tribe All-American WR **Rich Musinski** seems to be stepping up his level with every outing. Once again, this was the case in the Tribe's 23-9 Homecoming win over Hofstra in the team's last outing as the 6-1, 195-pound West Pittston, PA native hauled in five receptions for 44 yards. His second catch of the game, a 13-yard gain, moved him into first place in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference's career receiving yardage list.

As one of the most brilliant four-year careers in school history winds down, Musinski is breaking a record of some variety on nearly every weekend of action. With just two games left in his career, the following are some cliff notes of what he has accomplished to this point, and what records are just on the horizon.

Campbell's Continued Success: Junior Tribe quarterback **Lang Campbell** came into the season touted, yet untested, replacement for all-time Tribe great QB Dave Corley, Jr. As the season is heading towards its conclusion, Campbell has performed to expectations, and beyond, as he has made a strong case for all-conference recognition in just his first season as a starter.

Campbell overcame a sluggish start (see Tale of Two Halves note to follow), to finish with another solid afternoon in the team's 23-9 Homecoming win over Hofstra, completing 14 of 23

attempts for 200 yards and one score.

This performance came on the heels of what stands as the Winchester, VA native's best career start vs. URI, which saw him complete 19 of 29 passes for a career-high 274 yards and two TDs. On the strength of these outings, Campbell comes into Saturday's contest with New Hampshire, leading the A-10 in passing yards per game (224.8), and is second both QB efficiency rating (147.3) and TD to INT ratio 2.8 to 1 (17 to 6), while his average of 249.0 yards per game in total offense and 17 touchdown passes ranks third. Campbell's QB efficiency ranking ranks 10th nationally, while he sits at 21st nationally in total offense.

Perhaps the most impressive portion of his game has been his uncanny accuracy. Through seven games, Campbell has completed 148 of his 233 attempts on the year (63.5%). Since throwing his second of two interceptions vs. Northeastern in the final drive of the third quarter in the season's third game, Campbell has completed a remarkable 68 percent of his passes over the next 17 quarters (87 of 128) since, with only one interception balanced against eight TD passes.

Over that same five-game span, Campbell is averaging 256 yards a game in the air and over 279 yards of total offense a per contest.

His 274-yard outing vs. URI marked the end of four straight weeks in which he threw for better than 250 yards, a feat not accomplished by a Tribe quarterback since the 1990 season when 2004 W&M Athletics Hall of Fame inductee

Chris Hakel surpassed the 250-yard barrier five straight times.

His command of the Tribe's attack is quantified by the fact that he averages completing passes to seven different receivers a game, in spite of the fact that he has one of the premier go-to players in the nation in All-American wideout Rich Musinski.

Not just a one-dimensional player, Campbell also is the squad's second-leading rusher from scrimmage on the season, gaining 304 yards on 63 attempts. His net rushing total on the season is reduced to 194 when yards lost on sacks are factored in (-110 yards on 17 sacks).

Campbell in a Nutshell: The following is a brief look at what could be ahead for Campbell in the remaining two games, as far as W&M single-season records are concerned:

- With 39 more completions, he will move into 10th-place on completions list (10th-place currently held by Chris Garrity, 186 in 1981).
- One more TD pass will place him in 10th-place tie (with three others, most recently Dave Corley with 18 in 1999 season) ... Four more TD passes will move him into fifth-place.
- Currently ranks sixth all-time with a .635 completion percentage
- Vying to become the sixth W&M QB to win the league's efficiency title since joining conference 11 years ago.
- A W&M QB has earned all-conference recognition of some kind in each of the past five seasons, and nine of the 11 years the College has been in the A-10 conference.

Cruising Coley: With injuries to junior starting tailback Jon Smith and sophomore Steven Hargrove, diminutive redshirt freshman tailback Delmus Coley has had to hitch Tribe's rushing attack to his 5-9, 195-pound frame over the past two games. The Virginia Beach native has only seemed to gain strength and confidence as he has taken the majority of the carries and snaps at the position that entered the season as the deepest on the Tribe's roster. Fortunately for the College's faithful, Coley has been equal to the challenge and has emerged as a legitimate workhorse with game-breaking speed.

With Smith in street clothes, and Hargrove hobbled, Coley was the featured back vs. Hofstra on an afternoon which saw the Tribe determined to establish a ground game. Sixty minutes and a career-high 25 carries later, Coley proved to be more than equal to the heavy load, as he ended the day with 133 yards and a pair of scores.

This performance came on the heels of a 24-carry, 104-yard effort vs. URI and marks the only two times this season that a Tribe running back has broken the 100-yard rushing mark. In fact, his 24 carries vs. the Rams was more than twice the number of carries that any W&M back

this season has carried the ball in any one game (Jon Smith 11, two times, last coming vs. JMU). Prior to the game with the Rams, Smith had been the last Tribe running back to go over the 100-yard mark, when he rushed for 192 yards vs. JMU in the 10th game of the 2002 season (seven games prior to the URI contest).

With just two contests remaining, Coley leads the College in rushing yards (356), attempts (79) and rushing TDs (two). If he should finish the season as the College's leading rusher, he will become just the fourth freshman to lead the team in rushing in Laycock's 24 seasons as the head coach (joining Robert Green, 1988, Derek Fitzgerald, 1993, and Jon Smith, 2001).

In a side note, the lowest Tribe team-leading single-season rushing total for a season was 288 yards by Jeff Powell in 1982.

Rushing In: After averaging only slightly better than 110.0 yards per game through the first six contests, the Tribe's offensive attack has slashed out nearly 400 yards on the ground over the past two games (203 vs. URI and 196 vs. Hofstra). This effort, powered by Coley's emergence, has improved the team's rushing average from a season worst 110.0 (coming into the URI game), to 133.0 yards per game.

Since coming into the league in 1993, the Tribe's worst single season rushing average was 135.3, set last season (1,487 yards over 11 games).

On the Rise: Going hand-in-hand with the increased run-production, the Tribe's total offense figures have also improved dramatically over the past two games. Coming off the loss at James Madison (10/25), the team was averaging just 332.5 yards per game in total offense, a figure

that is about 70 yards off the average Laycock's team's have posted in the same span (403.4 yards over 114 games since joining conference in 1993).

By maintaining, or bettering, its current 358.5 yards/game average, the College will better the lowest total offense average of any Laycock coached team in the same span (357.5 set in 1995).

If Campbell and the Tribe's passing attack can maintain its current average of 226 yards per game, it will mark the eighth-straight year that the College has averaged better than 210 yards per game in the air. The last time the College didn't average better than 210 yards passing over a season was in 1995 (160.5 yards per game).

Tale of Two Halves: Speaking of marked improvements, the Tribe's chalk talk at the half of the Homecoming win vs. Hofstra must have been something special, as the team rebounded from a 6-0 deficit over the first 30 minutes to record a 23-9 win. The 23-point outburst was not only the team's highest scoring half of the season, but possibly its best played on both sides of the ball.

Offensively, Campbell and Coley dominated

the final two quarters, as Coley ripped off 116 of his 133 total rushing yards and Campbell threw for 123 of his 200 yards. Campbell completed all seven passes he attempted, including a 51-yard strike to Dominique Thompson for the Tribe's first score of the game on the second possession of the half. The team's third possession of the half belonged to Coley, as he took the ball seven-straight times and moved the team 67 yards to paydirt, giving the team a 15-9 lead it would never relinquish with a one-yard TD run. This scoring scamper was set up by his career-best 49-yard sprint (on a fourth and one), which set up the College at the Pride's five-yard line.

Wave That Flag: Discipline is certainly one trademark of Laycock's program, and this season is no different as the College currently is tops in the league with the fewest penalties (42) and penalty yards (43.6 yards per game – 349 total yards).

In fact, the Tribe has 13 fewer penalties and 71 less yards than the next closest league opponent (Richmond, 55 for 420 yards).

Two the Point: Fresh off two successful two-point conversions in the win over Hofstra, William and Mary moved its team total to four two-pointers on the season, the top mark in the league. The Tribe is now four of five on the year in two-point conversion attempts, with its only miss coming vs. Northeastern, when a misfired extra point snap resulted in a failed scramble by Campbell.

Invading the Airways: After getting off to the difficult start vs. Division I-A Western Michigan, the Tribe's pass defense has been nothing short of sensational over the seven games since yielding 489 yards and six TDs to the Broncos in the season opener. W&M has allowed an average of just 170.6 yards per game and two touchdowns in the span, while gathering in five interceptions.

W&M's defense has allowed the fewest passing yards in conference play, as league opponents are averaging just 162.5 yards per game via the pass. The College has allowed just two receiving touchdowns in league play, which is five less scoring passes than the next closest conference defense (Maine, 7).

Conversion Conversation: Despite missing one opportunity in the red zone vs. Hofstra (missed 30-yards field goal), the College still converted two of its three chances inside the Pride's 20-yards line into decisive second half TDs. The afternoon moved the College's red zone conversion percentage to a very respectable .840 on the season (21 of its 25 red zone; 13 TDs, eight FGs).

Senior Citizen: After spending the better part of the last three seasons as a reserve, senior full-back **Nick Rogers** has started every game at full-back, making major contributions as a standout lead blocker and steady performer when his own number is called. Perhaps the team's most improved player, Rogers has proven to the squad's most consistent ball carrier. He is currently second on the team in rushing yardage (202) and leads the team in yards per carry (5.1).

Putting his season accomplishments into perspective, coming into the year Rogers had a career rushing total of just 377 yards over 23 career games. He has already eclipsed his 11-game rushing total from a season ago (161 yards on 23 attempts) with two games remaining.

Tackle Time: W&M's duo of senior **Paul Carpenter** and sophomore **Travis McLaurin** lead a tough group of linebackers that have performed at a very consistent level all year for W&M. McLaurin is fourth in the league with 12.0 tackles per game, while Carpenter is sixth with 11.4 tackles per contest. The Tribe hasn't had a pair of players finish with over 10 tackles per game since the 2000 season, when Todd Greineder and Jimmy Cerminaro each accomplished the feat.

Talented Mr. Thompson: One player who the Tribe's coaching staff will look to step up into the void left by the injury to Wade will be athletic junior receiver Dominique Thompson. Thompson displayed his big-play ability on the team's first scoring play vs. Hofstra, as he reeled in a career long 51-yard TD spiral from Campbell, easily out striding past the Pride's defensive back to the ball and end zone.

While the Durham, NC native has only four catches on the year, to this point, two have gone for scores (as he also pulled down an acrobatic eight-yard scoring catch in the College's home loss to James Madison).

An explosive athlete with an outstanding burst off the line of scrimmage, Thompson is also one of the squad's best special teams players. In addition to his TD catch, vs. the Pride, Thompson also contributed four special teams tackles. This came one week removed from his sparkling hustle play on punt coverage against URI, when he ran down a 61-yard rocket off the foot of Tribe punter Mike Mesi and downed it on the Rams one-yard line, pinning URI against its own goal

line with less than five minutes to play and the College clinging to a six-point lead.

Wade Out: Much like Rogers, wideout **Danny Wade** had saved his best performance for last, as he was having a career year through the first eight games in his senior season. Unfortunately for the College, Wade's season's is likely over after he re-injured his shoulder that had caused him to miss his sophomore season on a diving reception in the team's Homecoming win over Hofstra. Fittingly, the catch went for 22 yards and a first down.

Currently, Wade is second on the team in both receptions (29) and receiving yards (322). Both figures stand as career-highs for the Martinsville, VA native.

Wade had been especially effective over the past four weeks, as he has brought down 20 receptions for 220 yards. One week after establishing a career high both in catches and yards at fourth-ranked Delaware (7 receptions for 78 yards), Wade broke both marks against the seventh-ranked Minutemen by turning in an eight catch, 80-yard afternoon.

On the Mark: Going hand-in-hand with the College's success in the red zone has been the accuracy and strength of Tribe kicker **Greg Kuehn** right leg. Kuehn has made 11 of 16 field goals and all 17 of his PAT attempts. He leads the league, and is ninth nationally, in field goals per game (1.38). Kuehn leads the Tribe, and is fifth in the league in scoring by averaging 6.25 points per game (50 total).

When looking at the place kicking position for the College, there is certainly a legacy of success under Jimmie Laycock. In the previous 10 seasons the College has spent in the A10, a Tribe kicker has earned all-conference honors of some variety in six of those years. Steve Christie (1989) and Brett Sterba (1999) have earned All-America recognition at the position in recent years.

Just 18 games into his collegiate career, Kuehn's accomplishments already rank him amongst the College's best at his position, as he has converted 25 of his 37 career attempts (.676). With two games still remaining in his sophomore season, Kuehn's 25 FGs trails only Brett Sterba's 28 (between 1998-99) for the most by a Tribe kicker in his first two seasons as the starting kicker. Percentage wise, his 67.6 percent success rate would be third, behind Brian Morris (21 of 27, 77.7 percent, 1982-83) and Sterba (29 of 38, 76.3 percent).

A current NFL kicker with San Diego, Christie holds the Tribe's school record for career field goals with 57, accumulated between the 1986 and 1989 seasons. Only two other players have kicked for all four seasons in a Tribe uniform; Brian Shallcross (1995-97) and Brian Morris (1982-85).

Corner Pocket: Senior cornerback Billy Parker has come on strong as of late in his final season. Parker earned the coaching staff's Defensive Player of the Week honor against Hofstra after recording seven tackles, including two TFLs, as the Tribe held the Pride to just 160 passing yards.

Putting the Pressure On: The W&M defense recorded five sacks and four other tackles for loss against Hofstra, continuing the team's trend of pressuring opponent signal callers. Leading the way, once again, was sophomore defensive end **Adam O'Connor**. The Greensboro, NC native and all-conference candidate made six tackles against the Pride, including three TFLs and two sacks.

For the season, O'Connor ranks third the league with six sacks, and his 12.0 TFLs is fourth-best in the conference. He has also contributed an amazing 18 quarterback hurries, by far the top

mark on the squad. His six sacks, through just eight games, is already the highest single-season total for a Tribe player since former standout Luke Cullinane recorded also recorded six in his senior season of 1997. Cullinane is also the last player to turn in more than six sacks on a year, as he established the school-record for sacks in a single season with 12 in 1996.

Specializing: Tribe junior punter **Mike Mesi** is proving to be one of the team's most consistent performers on the season. The junior punter currently is second in the conference and 18th in the nation with a 41.16 yards per attempt average.

An outstanding all-around athlete, Mesi, who came to the College as a quarterback, combines a strong leg with uncanny accuracy, as he has pinched the ball inside the opponent's 20-yard line 13 times this season.

Campbell played well for W&M, completing 18 of 31 passes for 181 yards and three scores, including two to **Steven Hargrove**. **Rich Musinski** had eight catches for 101 yards, leaving him six short of tying Jerry Rice's I-AA record for 100-yard games in a career.

Defensively, the Tribe was led by linebackers **Paul Carpenter** and **Travis McLaurin**, who each had 14 tackles on the evening. Senior corner **Billy Parker** had a 27-yard fumble return and linebacker **Chris Outlaw** contributed a 68-yard interception return for the Tribe defense.

Fullback **Nick Rogers** had a one-yard TD catch for the Tribe, while sophomore kicker **Greg Kuehn** nailed a 33-yard field goal and converted all three of his PAT attempts.

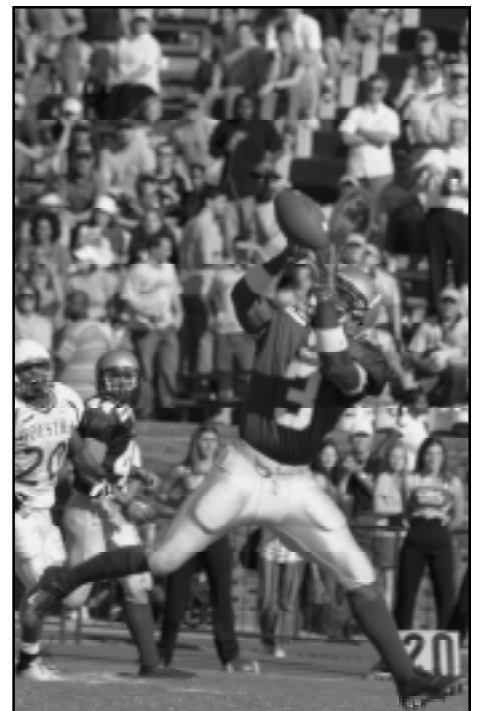
