Musinski Musings

- W&M's all-time leader in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns.
- Chosen to play in first-ever I-AA All-Star Game
- Broke Dave Conklin's school-record for career receptions (190) in the JMU game.
- Has gone over the 100-yard receiving mark 19 times in his 40 career games, leaving him four short of tying Jerry Rice's NCAA record
- Will become the A-10's all-time leader in receiving yards with 205 more yards this season
- Currently ranks seventh in NCAA I-AA history with 93.5 receiving yards per game in his career

Musinski Versus the Rams

W&M is 2-1 against URI in Musinski's career. In his past two games against the Rams, Musinski has averaged four catches for 131.5 yards per game. However, his first game against URI produced a career-low in receiving yards. Musinski is averaging more yards (25.3) per catch against URI than he had against the Rams in the 2000 contest (20).

Each week during the season, W&M coach **Jimmye Laycock** participates in the Atlantic 10 teleconference and gives his thoughts on the Tribe's most recent performance, plus a look ahead at the squad's next game.

1. What were your thoughts on the team's play against JMU?

A: Obviously, we're disappointed not to be able to come through with the win. In a lot of respects, I thought we played very well. James Madison made a couple of big plays in the first quarter that really hurt us [punt return for a touchdown, 54-yard pass that set up short TD run]. Our defense showed a lot of improvement. Offensively, our running game showed improvement. But coming down the stretch, we weren't able to make the plays. But I'm encouraged in a lot of ways and we just have to keep plugging away.

2. Can you speak to the contributions of sophomore kicker Greg Kuehn [8 of 10 on FGs, 12 of 12 on extra points]?

A: He's done well all year, as he did last year. He has the leg, he's worked hard on his consistency and kickoffs, and he's now developed into a top of the line kicker. I have a lot of confidence in him.

3. After reviewing the film, are you second-guessing yourself on going for it on fourth down rather than attempting field goals [on two fourth-quarter drives] against JMU?

A: The first time it was a real long field goal [would have been a 52-yard attempt into a stiff wind]. The second time we could've had a shot at it [45-yard attempt]. But there are a lot of things that go into those decisions. You look at a play here or a play there and things could've gone differently. But it wasn't a reflection on Greg at all. It was a long kick into the wind. I was disappointed earlier [first quarter] when we had to kick field goals because we couldn't get the ball into the end zone.

4. Where did you see improvements against JMU?

A: Defensively, we had the one long pass early that was a breakdown, but other than that, we kept them under control. We did get a five sacks and got some pressure on the quarterback. We controlled the running game. Offensively, we ran the ball much better. We had some chances for some bigger plays but we didn't get them.

5. Are the close losses harder to take than the ones in which you're losing by multiple scores?

A: A loss is a loss. Fortunately, we haven't had a lot of experience dealing with a lot of losses around here. But that's part of football. You want to play well and you want to play hard, and our guys are playing hard.

6. Can you discuss Rich Musinski breaking Dave Conklin's school-record for receptions?

A: It's a product of him playing very well over an extended period of time. He's been a four-year starter and he's played with some pretty good quarterbacks. Rich works very hard at being a good receiver. When he comes to play, he comes to play hard.

7. What are your thoughts on this season's Rhode Island squad?

A: It will be a little different for us in that Rhode Island is an option team. We haven't seen that this year, which is a concern. They look much improved over last year. They're turning in big plays offensively and defensively. They're playing very aggressively. It'll be a big challenge for us to make the transition to going on the road again and trying to get better.

8. How do you try to ignore the blowout that URI suffered against Delaware?

A: From what I've seen of it, it was a matter of a lot of turnovers [six]. Anytime, in this league, if you turn it over that much, it can be very difficult to overcome. I don't think it's a reflection of the difference of the two teams. That's just tough to overcome.

Tribe TIDBITS

Musinski Makes History (Again): As one of the most brilliant four-year careers in school history winds down, senior All-American wideout **Rich Musinski** seems to be breaking a record of some variety on nearly every weekend of action. With nine receptions (for 117 yards) against James Madison, Musinski moved his career total to 196 and passed Tribe all-time great Dave Conklin (1996-1999) into the College's top position for career catches.

With four games remaining in his career, the West Pittston, PA native's legacy is assured, as he now is the school's record holder in receptions (196), receiving yards (3,740), receiving touchdowns (28) and average yards per reception (19.1 – for players with more than 75 career catches).

With 205 more yards over the final stretch, Musinski will move past Brian Forster (1983-1987) career total of 3,944 yards into the Atlantic 10's top spot for career receiving yards. With 411 yards, Musinski will become just the third player in NCAA I-AA history to log 4,000, or more, yards in a career (not counting playoff games). The other two are Jerry Rice (Mississippi Valley State) and Jacquay Nunnally (Florida A&M), who amassed 4,623 and 4,239 yards, respectively, in their careers.

Currently, Musinski's 3,589 career regular season yards ranks ninth, all-time, on the NCAA listing (which follows below). His career yards per reception of 19.1 ranks him second among those listed on the top 10 in the all-time listing.

On the Mark: Going hand-in-hand with the College's success in the red zone is the accuracy and strength of Tribe kicker **Greg Kuehn**. Against JMU, Kuehn nailed all three of his field goal attempts. All of Kuehn's kicks came in the first half, tying a school-record for FGs in a half (last set in 2000 by Brett Sterba vs. Northeastern).

On the season, Kuehn has made eight of 10 field goals and all 12 of his PAT attempts. He leads the league in field goals per game (1.33), and is ranked 11th in the nation in that category. Kuehn is also the Tribe leading scorer on the year with 36 points.

When looking at the place kicking position for the College, there is certainly a legacy of success under Jimmie Laycock. In the previous 10

seasons the College has spent in the A10, a Tribe kicker has earned all-conference honors of some variety in six of those years. Steve Christie (1989) and Brett Sterba (1999) have earned All-America recognition at the position in recent years.

Just 16 games into his collegiate career, Kuehn's accomplishments already rank him amongst the College's best at his position, as he has converted 22 of his 31 career attempts (.709). With four games still remaining in his sophomore season, Kuehn's 22 FGs trails only Brett Sterba's 28 (between 1998-99) for the most by a Tribe kicker in his first two seasons as the starting kicker. Percentage wise, his 70.9 percent success rate would be third, behind Brian Morris (21 of 27, 77.7 percent, 1982-83) and Sterba (29 of 38, 76.3 percent).

A current NFL kicker with San Diego, Christie holds the Tribe's school record for career field goals with 57, accumulated between the 1986 and 1989 seasons. Only two other players have kicked for all four seasons in a Tribe uniform; Brian Shallcross (1995-97) and Brian Morris (1982-85).

Uncanny Campbell: Speaking of players on the mark, quarterback junior Tribe quarterback **Lang Campbell** has not been lacking in the accuracy department himself. He has completed 115 of his 181 attempts on the year (63.5%), good for 1,324 yards and 13 TDs. Since throwing his second of two interceptions vs. Northeastern in the final drive of the third quarter in the season's third game, Campbell has completed a remarkable 70 percent of his passes over the next 13 quarters (73 of 105), with only one interception balanced against five TD passes.

Over that same three-game span, Campbell is averaging 267 yards a game in the air and over 288 yards of total offense a per contest.

His command of the Tribe's attack is quantified by the fact that he averages completing passes to seven different receivers a game. This is in spite of the fact that he has one of the premier go-to players in the conference in All-American wideout Rich Musinski.

He is currently second in the A-10 in passing yards a game with an average of 220.7, while his QB efficiency rating of 142.1 is fourth in the league.

Conversion Conversation: As the season reaches its mid-point, the Tribe offense has established a very positive trend in having success in the opposition's red zone. After converting all three ventures inside the James Madison 20-yard line on Saturday, the Tribe has now been turned 14 of its 15 red zone chances into points (nine TDs, five FGs).

The only team to stop the Tribe in its red zone was UMass, which turned in a fourth-quarter interception in the end zone, thwarting a Tribe

scoring drive that had progressed to the Minuteman eight-yard line. The pick ended what had been a streak of 11-consecutive red zone conversions to start the season for the College.

Rocking Rogers: Senior tailback **Nick Rogers** has proven to the squad's most consistent ball carrier this season and one of its most improved performers. He is currently the team's leader in rushing yardage (161), yards per carry (5.0) and rushing TDs (one).

Putting his season accomplishments into perspective, coming into the year Rogers had a career rushing total of just 377 yards over 23 career games. He is just two yards shy of eclipsing his 11-game rushing total from a season ago (161 yards on 23 attempts).

The kinesiology major from Garrettsville, OH was solid once again against James Madison, as he carried the ball six times for 34 yards and also chipped in three receptions for 38 yards.

In an interesting side note, Rogers remains the only Tribe ball-carrier to score in the last seven games, going back to last season (as his 38-yard TD scamper vs. James Madison was the last Tribe scoring run till Rogers hit paydirt two weeks ago vs. UMass).

The five game stint without a rushing TD is the longest dry spell on the ground for the College in Laycock's 24-year tenure as the head coach.

Wade Watch: Much like Rogers, wideout **Danny Wade** seems to have saved his best performance for last, as he is having a career year in his senior season. With four games to play, Wade is second

on the team in both receptions (27) and receiving yards (296). Both figures stand as career-highs for the Martinsville, VA native and, on his current pace, he seems a lock to surpass his career totals of 30 catches for 351 yards that he carried into this season.

Wade has been especially effective over the past three weeks, as he has brought down 18 receptions for 198 yards. One week after establishing a career high both in catches and yards at fourth-ranked Delaware (7 receptions for 78 yards), Wade broke both marks against the seventh-ranked Minutemen by turning in an eight catch, 80-yard afternoon.

Coming into this year, Wade's career-best for receptions and yards in a season was 24 for 279 yards (set last year).

On the Defensive: Several Tribe players turned in outstanding performances in last week's game against JMU. The Tribe limited the Dukes to just 309 yards of total offense, a season-best. That was highlighted by another strong showing from the squad's starting linebackers and all-conference candidates, **Paul Carpenter** and **Travis McLaurin**. Carpenter followed up last week's 19-tackle performance with a 16-tackle showing against the Dukes. McLaurin finished with 13 tackles, reaching double-digits in tackles for the sixth time in as many games this year. Carpenter's 35 tackles in two games are the most for the Tribe in consecutive games since Marty Magerko recorded back-to-back 18-tackle showings in the 2001 season. Carpenter took 58 snaps against JMU, meaning he recorded a tackle on one of every 3.6 plays he participated in. McLaurin's

ratio was one tackle for every 3.8 plays.

A pair of youngsters from Norfolk, sophomore lineman **Larry Pendleton** and sophomore safety **James Miller** also stood out against JMU. Pendleton had a career-high 11 tackles while taking 41 snaps (average of one tackle for every 3.7 snaps), while Miller also had a career day with 10 tackles, including a TFL, plus a fumble recovery. For his efforts, Miller earned the coaching staff's Defensive Player of the Week accolade.

Putting the Pressure On: The W&M defense recorded five sacks and four other tackles for loss against JMU, season-bests in both categories. Leading the way was sophomore defensive end **Adam O'Connor**. The Greensboro, NC native made six tackles against the Dukes, including a pair of sacks. For the season, O'Connor ranks fifth in the league with four sacks, and his 8.5 TFLs is fourth-best in the conference. He has also contributed 13 quarterback hurries, by far the top mark on the squad. Also impressive is that O'Connor participated in 61 plays against JMU, 13 more than the next defensive lineman.

Specializing: Tribe punter **Mike Mesi** has continued to excel this season, proving to be one of the team's most consistent performers. The JMU game was no exception, as Mesi punted four times for an average of 40.2 yards per kick. The junior from Eatontown, NJ, is third in the league and 24th in the country with an average of 41.03 yards per punt.

Making Progress: William and Mary's offense put up 372 yards of total offense, its second-best showing of the season, in the loss to James Madison. The Tribe continued to increase its average yards per play, as it has done all year long. Since starting the year with an average of 4.7 yards per play against Western Michigan, W&M has not decreased from game-to-game. The College stayed at 4.7 yards per play against VMI, moved up to 5.2 yards per play against Northeastern and then 5.3 yards per play against Delaware before averaging 6.0 yards per play against both UMass and James Madison. The continued improvement is certainly helped by the presence of a pair of experienced players up front. Senior guard **Steve Stocki** and sophomore center **Patrick Mulloy** have each missed time this year due to injuries, but both have been healthy for the past two seasons.

Tough Competition: Through six games, the Tribe has faced some very stiff competition. It's opponents have a cumulative combined record of 25-10. The NCAA ranks W&M's cumulative strength of schedule (for past opposition) as the second-toughest among all I-AA schools, and the highest for a team that plays in a scholarship

league). The NCAA's rankings are based on cumulative record of past opponents against "like" competition (I-AA vs. I-AA, for example). The next highest mark in the A-10 belongs to Hofstra, which is 11th with a past opponent winning percentage of .619 (26-16).

Most recently, the games been especially daunting, as the College has faced three straight teams (No. 4 Northeastern, No. 4 Delaware and No. 7 UMass) ranked in the top 10 at the time, with two of those contests coming on the road. Also, last week's opponent, JMU, is just behind that trio in the A-10 standings with a 3-2 league record.

However, the news does get better for the Tribe faithful, in the fact that the road for the remainder of the season doesn't appear quite so daunting, at least on paper, as the five remaining opponents on the Tribe's schedule currently combine for a 7-21 record against I-AAs (.250 winning percentage). W&M has already played the top six teams in this week's conference standings, with remaining games against seventh-place Rhode Island, eighth-place Hofstra, 11th-place New Hampshire and eighth-place Richmond.

Team Superlatives: Several individual and team performances against the Dukes ranked as the tops for the Tribe this year. Junior quarterback **Lang Campbell** had a 23-yard scramble in the first quarter that ranks as the longest rush of the year for W&M. Campbell tied his season and career-high with 37 pass attempts. The completion from Campbell to senior wideout **Rich Musinski** in the opening quarter went 54 yards, a season-high for the Tribe. Musinski's nine catches tied his season-best, and the 117 yards were the most he's recorded on the season. Kicker **Greg Kuehn** nailed three field goals, including a season-best 49-yarder.

As a team, W&M's average of 4.6 yards per rush was its best of the year. Also, the five sacks recorded by the Tribe defense is another season-best.

Campbell played well for W&M, completing 18 of 31 passes for 181 yards and three scores, including two to **Steven Hargrove**. **Rich Musinski** had eight catches for 101 yards, leaving him six short of tying Jerry Rice's I-AA record for 100-yard games in a career.

Defensively, the Tribe was led by linebackers **Paul Carpenter** and **Travis McLaurin**, who each had 14 tackles on the evening. Senior corner **Billy Parker** had a 27-yard fumble return and linebacker **Chris Outlaw** contributed a 68-yard interception return for the Tribe defense.

Fullback **Nick Rogers** had a one-yard TD catch for the Tribe, while sophomore kicker **Greg Kuehn** nailed a 33-yard field goal and converted all three of his PAT attempts.

Quarterback **Lang Campbell** tossed three touchdown passes, while linebacker **Travis McLaurin** paced the defense with a 28-yard fumble return for a touchdown and a blocked field goal. Also, defensive end **Adam O'Connor** had two tackles for loss, a sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his first career start.

Steven Hargrove, who came in as the Atlantic 10's leader in all-purpose yards, caught his third touchdown pass of the season and racked up 146 all-purpose yards to remain tops in the conference.

BOSTON, MA (9/20/03) - Just days after Hurricane Isabel affected life in and around the Williamsburg area, the W&M football squad ran into another power, this time in the force of No. 4 Northeastern. The Huskies broke open a close game in the third quarter and pulled away for a 48-14 win over the Tribe.

W&M (1-2, 0-1) spotted NU a 3-0 lead but took the lead when junior quarterback **Lang Campbell** connected with senior All-America candidate **Rich Musinski** on a 25-yard touchdown pass with just over eight minutes remaining in the first quarter.

W&M closed a 17-6 halftime margin to within three points at 17-14 in the third quarter on a TD pass from Campbell to **Danny Wade**. That's when Northeastern (4-0, 1-0) did its own imitation of Hurricane Isabel, as the Huskies scored on a seven-yard run by Anthony Riley, and added a safety and two more touchdown runs in the third quarter to take a 41-14 lead into the final stanza.

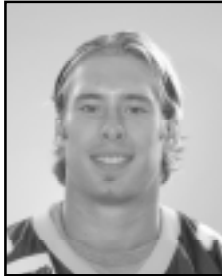

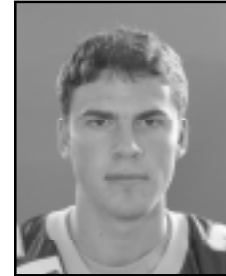

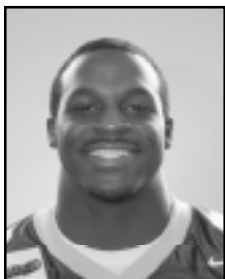
