
Musinski Versus the Broncos

Tribe Head Coach JIMMYE LAYCOCK

Each week during the season, W&M coach **Jimmye Laycock** participates in the Atlantic 10 teleconference and gives his thoughts on the Tribe's most recent performance, plus a look ahead at the squad's next game. Here's an excerpt of Laycock's comments from this week's teleconference:

1. Have you had any problems with the harsh weather that has been in the Tidewater area during preseason practice, whether it be excessive heat or rain, and if so, how have you been getting along with that?

A: We haven't had much of a rain problem since early on, but its hot here. Its been hot and humid and we've had to cut back on a few things in practice. We just have to be smart and make sure our players do things right. Last week was pretty tough with the heat.

2. What did you learn about Western Michigan after its game this week?

A: Well they're very good, I know that. They were right in that game all the way. I've had plenty of people calling me and telling me that I'd better watch out, because they're a very good team. They're a good program and a good team, but we knew that. But that's been emphasized more to us and our players. It'll be challenging.

3. Has your attitude regarding playing against I-A competition changed over the years?

A: No, not really. We still look at it as part of our players' college experience. I want them to be challenged and they want to be challenged. We feel like we can be competitive and see what we can do against a I-A team, and our players look forward to that.

4. What surprises were there for you in the preseason?

A: Offensively, **Dominique Thompson** at wide receiver really stepped up. He's had a very good preseason. **Delmus Coley**, a redshirt freshman tailback, had a very good spring and came into preseason and has really performed consistently. Defensively, [junior tackle] **Justin Kelly** has improved his strength and had a real good preseason.

5. What does Delmus Coley bring to the table in addition to the already strong backfield of Jon Smith and Steven Hargrove?

A: Delmus is a different type of back from those guys. He's like the more traditional type of back that we've had here in the past. He's got the lower center of gravity and the capability to change directions, to cut, and to make people miss. He

plays very hard. He's probably a little quicker than the other two, and better with his lateral movement than those guys.

6. How is the offensive line looking so far?

A: It's a work in progress. We're not there yet. We're still working at it. They've steadily improved, but we have a long way to go. We're still looking at some matchups in there, and we've experimented with switching some guys from guard to tackle, and from left side to right side. [sophomore tackle] **Matt Morgan** had been out, but we're starting to get him back in a little bit. We're still looking at a couple of freshmen in there, and they've showed some positive progress. We may have one or two freshmen who will play.

7. What are your thoughts on the freshmen possibly cracking the lineup on the offensive line?

A: It'd be remarkable if they played, and played well. Obviously, it's not what we want to do, but given the situation, the guys have done pretty well

8. What are your thoughts on the idea of playing preseason games, or scrimmages against other squads?

A: I don't have anything to compare it to, because its never been done before. But I know sometimes where it'd be very good to go against somebody else. I know some other levels do it. I certainly would be interested in it if that was proposed.

TIDBITS

Opening Day: Saturday, William and Mary begins its 108th season of football. The College's all-time record in football is 479-476-41 (.502). Only 16 Division I-AA teams have played more football games than William and Mary. Since the first Tribe football season began in 1893, W&M is 57-48-3 (.542) in the first game of the year and 11-12 under head coach Jimmye Laycock. W&M has won seven of its last 12 opening day games. In Coach Laycock's 21 seasons with the Tribe, the team has opened at home just four times, all of them wins. W&M has played against a I-A opponent in the opening game on eight occasions under Laycock, losing each time.

First Game Success: Rich Musinski has a reputation as a fast starter, as he's played very well in his three season-openers at W&M. In 2000, the first game of Musinski's career saw him catch four passes for 104 yards, including an 86-yard touchdown, against UMass. The two teams opened the season again in 2001, and Musinski didn't disappoint, snagging 10 balls for 161 yards and three touchdowns. Last season, against Big Ten opponent Indiana, Musinski snagged six catches for 60 yards and a touchdown. On average, Musinski has nearly seven catches and 108 yards in the season-opening game.

Lang's Turn: Junior quarterback Lang Campbell (Winchester, VA) will make his debut as W&M's starting quarterback in the game against Western Michigan. Campbell has seen limited playing time over the past two years as the backup to Dave Corley, Jr., who ended his career as the College's all-time leading passer. Campbell can take solace in the fact that many of the 13 different players who have started their first game at quarterback under current head coach Jimmye Laycock have had success in their initial outing.

1982 – Stan Yagiello completed 31 of 49 passes for 414 yards and two scores in a 35-17 loss at Miami

1982 – Dave Murphy was 23 of 44 for 277 yards and one TD in a 17-14 win over Dartmouth.

1986 – Ken Lambiotte went 24 of 34 for 303 yards and three TDs in a 42-21 win over Colgate. 1987 – John Brosnahan was 15 of 29 for 219 yards, with one score and one INT as the Tribe lost at ETSU, 49-25.

1988 – Craig Argo completed 9 of 24 passes for 74 yards, and also rushed for 66 yards in a 30-7 victory over VMI.

1989 – Chris Hakel went 11 of 28 for 171 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-31 tie with Princeton.
1992 – Shawn Knight had a solid outing, completing 10 of 16 passes for 134 yards (0 TDs, 0 INTs) in a 21-16 win over VMI.

1993 – Todd Durkin was 15 of 22 for 142 yards (0 TDs, 0 INTs) in a 10-0 loss to Division I-A

Tulane.

1994 – Matt Byrne completed 12 of 22 passes for 251 yards, with two TDs and two INTs in a 17-12 win over Northeastern.

1996 – Mike Cook went 12 of 27 for 318 yards and three scores in a 39-33 loss at Division I-A Central Florida.

1997 – Daron Pope completed 17 of 28 passes for 220 yards and one score in a 24-22 loss to New Hampshire.

1997 – Steve Fill had an outstanding game, completing 16 of 25 attempts for 300 yards and four touchdowns in a 38-25 win over JMU.

1999 – Dave Corley, Jr. made his first start a memorable one, completing 14 of 22 passes for 246 yards and four scores in a 42-30 win at Northeastern.

In all, signal-callers making their first career start under Laycock have averaged completing 16 of 29 passing for 236 yards and nearly two touchdowns.

Rich's Rewards: Senior wideout Rich Musinski (West Pittston, PA)has earned a number of citations this spring, including preseason All-America honors from The Sports Network, Don Hansen's Football Gazette and I-AA.org. Also, Musinski was named as one of the 16 players to watch for the Walter Payton Award, which goes to the top player in Division I-AA football. In addition, he was a first-team all-conference selection at wide receiver.

Musinski is the Tribe's all-time leader in receiving yards (3,280). He comes into his senior season needing just 30 catches to break Dave Conklin's school record for receptions. Coming into his final fall with the Tribe, Musinski has several conference and national marks within reach. Musinski is seventh in NCAA I-AA history with an average of 96.5 receiving yards per game in his career. In 34 career games, Musinski has reached the 100-yard receiving mark 16 times, just eight shy of Jerry Rice's NCAA record of 24 100-yard games. With 664 receiving yards this season, Musinski will become the Atlantic

10's all-time leader in receiving yards.

Musinski's selection to the Payton Watch List marks the second-consecutive year that a Tribe player has been on the list, as graduated quarterback Dave Corley, Jr. made the list last season.

A-10 Accolades: William and Mary was well-represented on the Atlantic 10's preseason all-conference squads, led by the senior trio of wideout **Rich Musinski (West Pittston, PA)** and defensive backs **Marques Bobo (Charlotte, NC)** and **Billy Parker (Mechanicsville, VA)**. The three players all earned first-team citations, and were among five W&M players selected.

Joining those three on the all-conference squad were second team picks Jon Smith (Cincinnati, OH) at tailback and Paul Carpenter (Winchester, VA) at linebacker.

In addition to the individual selections, the league also announced its preseason standings picks, and W&M was picked seventh in the 11-team league. The Tribe can take solace in the fact that since the Atlantic 10 adopted a one-division format in 1999, a team predicted seventh or lower has claimed at least a share of the league title in each of the past four years. Last year, Northeastern won the league after being tabbed as the 10th best team in the league in the preseason.

A Previous Encounter: W&M has never faced WMU in football, and in his 24 years as head coach of the Tribe, Jimmye Laycock has never faced a team led by WMU coach Gary Darnell. However, in 1977, the Clemson Tigers, with Laycock as their offensive coordinator, battled North Carolina, where Darnell was the linebackers coach. Who got the best in that battle? Its hard to tell, as the teams played to a 13-13 tie.

League Leaders: W&M has multiple players returning who led the conference in a category last year. Senior wideout Rich Musinski (West Pittston, PA) is the top returnee in terms of receiving yards (103.6 yards per game). Senior defensive back Billy Parker (Mechanicsville, VA) led the conference in interceptions (five) and passes defended (20) in 2002. Placekicker Greg Kuehn led the conference is scoring among kickers (7.1 points per game), as well as field goals (1.27 per game). Also, sophomore Steven Hargrove (Alexandria, VA) was the league's top kick returner (25.0 yards per return) last season.

Coaching Connections: There are a pair of connections between the coaching staffs for this week's game. WMU safeties and special teams caoch Wally Ake is a 1972 graduate of William and Mary, and was an all-conference linebacker under coach Lou Holtz in 1970. Also, WMU graduate assistant Wes Dodson, who played for the Broncos from 1997-2001, is the stepbrother

of Tribe defensive assistant coach Trevor Andrews.

Against the Best: William and Mary has played many games against Division I-A opposition since joining the I-AA ranks, including five season-openers against I-A schools. Here's a breakdown of the Tribe's season openers against I-A competition since 1983:

1985: L, 30-23, at Wake Forest 1988: L, 31-23, at Virginia 1995: L, 40-16, at Virginia 1996: L, 39-33, at Central Florida

2002: L, 25-17, at Indiana

Road Warriors: W&M will play its first three games away from the friendly confines of Zable Stadium, as the Tribe will travel to VMI and Northeastern after the Western Michigan game. There have been 11 instances in W&M's storied football history that the squad has opened with three games on the road. The College has finished with a winning record in four of those seasons. W&M is 4-7 in the first game of a threegame road trip to open the season, 5-6 in the second game and 2-7-2 in the third game.

A Michigan State of Mind: The Tribe will be making the program's third-ever trip to the Wolverine State with the game in Kalamazoo this weekend. Both of W&M's previous two trips to Michigan went to Lansing, where the Tribe battled Michigan State in 1949 and 1950. MSU won the 1949 contest, 42-13, and the 1950 game, 33-14.

No Crossover: W&M and Western Michigan are in an interesting situation with this week's game, as the Tribe has no players from Michigan on its current roster and the Broncos don't have a single player from the Old Dominion State on their 2003 roster.

Return of the MAC: Western Michigan's appearance on this year's W&M schedule marks the first time since 1982 that the Tribe has played a school from the Mid-American Conference. The College has battled current MAC schools Marshall and Central Florida since then, but they were not in the MAC at the time of the game. W&M opened up the 1982 campaign with a 35-17 loss at Miami (OH). Against current MAC schools, W&M has an all-time record of 5-8-1.

TIDBITS

Brotherly Love: W&M's two sets of twin brothers are back with the team this year. Juniors Corey and Craig Patterson are key contributors to the W&M secondary, while sophomores Travis (linebacker) and Trevor (H-back) McLaurin will each have the chance to contribute. This week's W&M opponent, Western Michigan, has a pair of brothers on the roster, though Chad and Jason Feldpausch are not twins.

More Than Musinski: A quick observation of the Tribe receiving corps would likely start and stop with All-American Rich Musinski (West Pittston, PA). But a closer examination shows that the Tribe has an experienced and talented crew returning that is capable of big plays from any spot on the field. Versatile senior Danny Wade (Martinsville, VA) caught 24 passes, including three touchdowns, last season, and his 6-foot-5 frame presents an inviting target for W&M quarterback Lang Campbell (Winchester, VA). Junior Dominique Thompson (Durham, NC) snagged 17 catches last year, and his 14.5 yards per catch were second on the team to Musinski among those with 10 or more receptions. Sure-handed Josh Lustig (Erie, PA) made 11 receptions in his sophomore season and seems poised to build upon that this year. And 6-foot-3, 215-pound junior **John Pitts** (**Kernersville**, **NC**) made five catches for 66 yards, despite playing in only six games due to injury.

Good Things Come in 3's: The 2003 season already has one thing going for it, as far as history goes. Since 1923, only one Tribe team has had a losing record in the '3' year of that decade, as shown here:

Senior Leaders: A W&M strong spot this year, as in most years, is senior leadership at key positions. On the defensive front, Donté Lewis (Bowie, MD) is the veteran among a group of youngsters. In the same role for the linebacking corps is Paul Carpenter (Winchester, VA). In the defensive backfield, the responsibility falls to Marques Bobo (Charlotte, NC) and Billy Parker (Mechanicsville, VA). On offense, Rich Musinski (West Pittston, PA) and Danny Wade (Martinsville, VA) are the leaders of the wide receiving crew, while Zach Smith (Lineboro, MD) is the elder statesman of the tight ends and Nick Rogers (Garrettsville, OH) is in the same spot for the running backs. On the offensive line,

senior guard **Steve Stocki** (**Bealeton**, **VA**) is the leader of the very young group. The senior leadership should go a long way towards helping the Tribe in its search for its 18th winning season in the past 21 years.

W&M In the Polls: The Tribe isn't ranked in the top 25 of either of the two major preseason polls, though W&M did receive votes in each poll. In the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll, W&M received 13 votes, good enough for 47th best in the country. W&M placed 42nd in the Sports Network poll. Also, in noted statistician Jeff Sagarin's rankings, W&M is one of the toprated I-AA teams in the nation. The rankings, which take into account strength of schedule and margin of victory, among other things, have the Atlantic 10 rated as I-AA's top conference. W&M is ranked 15th among all I-AA schools in Sagarin's rankings. In the combined I-A and I-AA rankings, W&M is No. 118 in the nation, just behind ACC school Duke and just ahead of future Big East school Connecticut.

Good Company: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock, who has completed 23 years as the W&M leader, ranks third among all current Division I-A and Division I-AA head coaches in terms of most years at their current school. The two coaches ahead of him are Penn State's Joe Paterno (37 years) and Florida State's Bobby Bowden (26 years).

A-10 vs. I-A: In addition to the Tribe's battle with Western Michigan, there are three other games this weekend that feature teams from the Atlantic 10 Football conference against Division I-A schools. James Madison will travel to Virginia Tech, Villanova visits crosstown rival Temple and New Hampshire, like W&M, battles a MAC school in Central Michigan.

Turf Wars: The game against Western Michigan is the first of two games on artificial turf that the Tribe plays this season. Waldo Stadium features a NexTurf surface. W&M also plays on the artificial AstroPlay turf at Northeastern on September 27. Last season, the Tribe was 1-4 on artificial surfaces while going 5-1 on natural grass.
