The particular attention your Excellency pays to the interest of America persuades us that much will have been given to the principal branch of its commerce that of Tobacco, which at the present moment, all concern'd therein seem in expectation to know the resolves for what the Farm Gen<sup>l</sup> may have occasion for next year.

Although we have intimation that its Directors in the receiving ports will have orders to receive in February next on the lowest terms they can purchase - we presume your Excellency may know more of its intent and could make us such observations on that subject as might be for the interest of our American friends which is the sole Motive for requesting such ~~an~~ information as you shall deem will answer that purpose. Until we are honoured with your opinion we shall keep up the prices of the tobacco we have in store, in the hopes that some advantage will result from it.

Since the last Spring the Farms have received

receive & no Tobacco that were not wanted for, except  
when it could be obtained under the regulated prices  
but as it can never be our interest to lessen them we  
endeavour to favour all that militates with that  
Design ; we cannot but think fixed prices  
provided proper ones are allowed must be in favour  
of the seller who has also the liberty of holding in  
reserve such Tobcos as will command a higher price  
with another purchaser, for under the three qualities  
the farm receives, much inferior sorts finds a market  
there which could not be placed any where else  
with so much advantage to the owner the difference  
in price allowed for it bearing no proportion to  
the quality this is an uncontrollable fact

From the assurances that have been  
given that no further contract should be allowed  
of it cannot be surmised any renewal of that with  
Mr Morris or any other will have place too much  
as been said on the advantage of leaving the supply  
of the farm open to every one to need any further  
comment. We rely much on your doing every  
thing possible therein that can tend to the benefit of
