First and 10

One of the most storied college football rivalries in the state will be renewed on Saturday night when the Virginia Military Institute visits Zable Stadium at 7 p.m. Saturday's game will mark the 83rd all-time meeting between the programs, who will line-up against each other for the 63rd consecutive season. W&M holds a 48-33-2 all-time advantage in the series that dates back to 1905, and the Tribe has won 20 consecutive decisions over the Keydets. But, W&M will be looking to snap a six-game losing streak, which dates back over the final four games of 2005, and gain its first victory of the season. The Tribe is coming off a 20-17 loss to Maine last Saturday night in its Atlantic 10 opener and is now 0-3 in night games at Zable Stadium. VMI has dropped two straight, including a 58-7 decision to reigning A-10 Champion Richmond on Saturday, after a season-opening victory over Davidson in Lexington on Sept. 2. The Keydets are led by former Spider front man Jim Reid, who is 3-7 all-time against W&M.



Press Parking

Parking for members of the working press is available just southeast of Zable Stadium in front of the University Center. Parking is limited and media members are encouraged to arrive early.

Photographers

Please observe the NCAA rules, which prohibit photographers between the 25 yard lines.

Press Box Services

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

Visiting Film Crews

Space will be allotted in the West Press Box for film and video crews of visiting teams' coaches' shows. We will provide two spots per team.

Post-Game Procedures

Head coach Jimmye Laycock and the visiting coach will be available about 10 minutes after the game in an interview area located directly below the press box. Individual W&M players' names should be given to Pete Clawson during the fourth quarter and they will be made available in the interview room.

The William and Mary Football Radio Network

The W&M Athletics Department announced a new partnership for the Tribe Radio Network. The Notice of Intent to Award issued by the College designates two local stations, 92.3 FM "The Tide" and 107.9 FM "WBACH", as the network's Co-Flagships for the coming athletics season.

The new partnership provides the College with solid coverage of the peninsula, as the station's combined footprint reaches from eastern areas of Richmond to the western parts of Norfolk. Tribe fans in Richmond will also be able to catch the action on 1450AM WCLM, which returns for its second season as an affiliate. Also, as usual, long-standing network member WBRG, AM 1050 of Lynchburg is back to carry all the action for 2006.

VMI Series Notes

Serious History

Few schools can boast such long and storied histories as the College of William and Mary (founded in 1693) and the Virginia Military Institute (founded in 1839). This same history can be applied to the football programs, as each has sponsored a team for the better part of the last century. The two schools have met on the gridiron 83 times, including at least once a year for the last 62 seasons.

The 62 consecutive games played streak is tied for the ninth longest, uninterrupted series currently being contested in the I-AA ranks. The other is the College's rivaly with Richmond. The Tribe has won 20-consecutive games in the VMI series, which stands as the second longest winning streak in an active uninterrupted series in the I-AA rank, the longest being Grambling's 29-straight wins over Prairie View.

VMI Connections

Current assistant head coach and offensive line coach Bob Solderitch had a two-year stint as an assistant at VMI (1994-95), overseeing both the offensive and defensive lines.

VMI assistant Greg Shockley is in second season in Lexington, after spending the 2004 season as tight ends and special teams coach at W&M.

Junior running back Tony Viola's brother, Andy, is a sophomore starting defensive end for VMI.

The Last Meeting

LEXINGTON, VA (9/10/05) -- Redshirt freshman quarterback Jake Phillips threw for 202 yards and a touchdown and 11th-ranked William and Mary piled up 469 yards of total offense to down VMI, 41-7, in the 83rd meeting between the state schools.

In his first-career start, Phillips completed 17 of 21 pass attempts and hit redshirt freshman tailback DeBrian Holmes for a 19-yard catch and run score in the fourth quarter.

Phillips connected on all three of his throws for 33 yards on the Tribe's opening series, leading W&M on an 87-yard march that was capped by Phillips' 1-yard sneak on fourth-and-goal from the 1.


Senior corner Stephen Cason pushed the lead to 17-0 in the second with a 57-yard interception return for a touchdown, his second pick of the

After VMI trimmed the advantage to 17-7, senior place-kicker Greg Kuehn nailed a 39-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to give the Tribe a 20-7 lead at the break.

Junior running back Elijah Brooks led the Tribe ground game for the second-straight week with 94 yards on 18 carries, including a third-quarter 6-yard touchdown scamper that increased the lead to 27-7. Classmate Trevor McLaurin completed the Tribe's scoring with a 1-yard touchdown run.

Cason finished with seven total tackles, including five solos. Redshirt freshman linebacker Josh Rutter paced the defense for the second time in as many weeks with nine total tackles, and senior Jonas Watson recorded 1.5 sacks.



Team Notes

A win over the Virginia Military Institute would:

- End the Tribe's current six-game losing slide going back to last season, the school's longest since Laycock's first and second years in the program, when W&M lost the last four games of 1980 and the first four of the 1981 campaign.
- End the Tribe's current three-game home losing streak, dating back to last season. The last time the College lost three-straight in Zable came between the 1998 and 1999 seasons, when the team lost its final two home games in '98 (Connecticut and Richmond) and then dropped the '99 home opener vs. Furman.
- Stand as the squad's first night win at Zable Stadium. The Tribe is currently 0-3 in night games played at the venerable structure. It would also stand as the first win for the Tribe on the College's new FieldTurf surface, which was installed this summer.
- Extend W&M's current winning streak over the Keydets to 21-straight contests.
- Move Laycock's all-time record against Jim Reid to 8-3. Reid spent nine seasons as the head coach of the University of Richmond, where his teams went 3-6 vs. Laycock's charges between the 1995 and 2003 seasons, while Reid also was a head coach at Massachusetts from 1986 to 1991, which included a 1990 NCAA Playoff loss to William and Mary.

Crowded House on Saturday Night

With an announced attendance of 10,706 on Saturday evening, the College had its second-largest home opening crowd since the 1996 season. Only last year's number of 11,741, which witnessed the team's victory over Liberty, was better over the 10-year span. In the three games played under the lights at Zable, William and Mary has averaged 11,756 fans, nearly 95.0% of capacity.

Perhaps the most impressive number in Saturday evening's turnout was the better than 2,700 students that donned yellow T-shirts and supported the home team. The College's entire undergraduate student body is listed at only 5,700.

Did You Know?:

The College has had three home crowds of 10,000-plus in its last six home games over the last two years, including Liberty (11,756) and James Madison (12,287) in 2005 and Saturday's game vs. Maine (10,706).

Prior to these three games, one had to go back 25 games, stretching between the final game of 2004 to the second to last home game of the 2000 season, to find the next three five-digit home crowds (one each in '04, '02 and '00).

Hard Road Ahead

A quick look at the College's schedule will show that the Tribe is going to face five opponents currently ranked in the SportsNetwork Top 25, including No. 7 Richmond, ninth-ranked Massachusetts, No. 17 James Madison, 18th-ranked Delaware and No. 21 Towson, which made its first top-25 appearance since 1993.

Of the five ranked opponents, the Tribe will have to face four on the road with the only home date coming against Richmond in the season finale. The last ranked team the College has beaten outside of Zable Stadium was James Madison in 2004, when the Tribe handed a then fourth-ranked Dukes squad a 27-24 defeat in Harrisonburg.

Did You Know? II: VMI will be the second of three-straight opponents to visit Zable in September. The last time the College played three-consecutive home contests in the regular season came in 1996, when the squad hosted Northeastern, Delaware and UMass. The Tribe swept the three contests on its way to capturing the first of three Atlantic 10 Conference Championships.

The College has not had three-straight September home games since 1993.

Uncharacteristic

Maine's only scoring drive of the second half, which came on its first possession of the third quarter, was aided by very unusual miscues on the Tribe's part, as the College had two personal foul penalties for 30 yards during the six play, 60-yard touchdown march. Both penalties came with the Black Bears facing third down situations.


The 30 yards in penalties is more than the entire remainder of team penalty yards on the season (three penalties for a total of 20 yards).

In fact, the Tribe has had six entire games over its last 13, including the 2006 season opener, where it had fewer than 30 penalty yards.

Heartbreak on the Homefront

Williamsburg, which has been so good to Laycock coached teams over the years, has been the location of some heartbreaking defeats over the last three home games. All

told, the College has lost its last three home games by a total of just five points.



Youth is Served

The College counts 25 freshmen and sophomores among its 44 players on the two-deep going into the game with VMI (11 on offense; 14 on defense). Overall, only eight seniors are in the starting line-up with three on offense and five on defense.

While several true freshman are currently part of the travel party, only the cornerback duo of David Caldwell and Max Harris have seen playing time. The pair are the first true freshman to see playing time at cornerback for the Tribe since Hasani Cameron in 1998.

Team Offensive Notes

Getting a Little Possessive

The College's offense turned in its second consecutive game without committing a turnover. So far in 2006, the Tribe's offense has not committed a miscue on 139 straight offensive snaps.

William and Mary and New Hampshire are the only two teams in the league who have yet to turn it over.

Currently, the Tribe is leading the conference in turnover margin at +6, an average of 3.00 per game.

Statistically Speaking

William and Mary out-gained the Black Bears in total offense (279-264), powered mostly by the fact it out-passed (184-98) Maine's ground oriented offense. The College also recorded more first downs (17-16), had a better third down conversion percentage, converting eight of 18 attempts compared to Maine's five successes in 13 chances, while Maine also turned the ball over twice and was penalized five more yards (40-45).

Trend Setting

The College's offense has been perfect in the red zone through two games, scoring on all four visits inside the opponent's 20-yard line. After turning its first red-zone appearance of 2006 into an 8-yard touchdown pass from Jake Phillips to Elliott Mack, the Tribe was 3-for-3 on red-zone attempts vs. Maine, including a pair of touchdowns.

Diminishing Returns

With sophomore quarterback Jake Phillips attempting a career-high 44 passes, completing 22, in the losing effort, the Tribe is now 1-5 over the last two seasons when it has attempted more than 30 passes, with the only exception being the double overtime win last season at Northeastern.

Individual Offensive Notes

Phillips Continues To Play Well

As previously mentioned, Tribe quarterback Jake Phillips established a career high in attempts with 44 against Maine on Saturday. His previous single-game high was 34, set last season against Delaware. Phillips' 22 completions vs. the Black Bears stand as the second-highest single-game total for the Warm Springs, Va. native, with his career best for completions sitting at 24, set last year during the Delaware contest.

Phillips' fourth quarter, 8-yard scoring pass to junior wide out Joe Nicholas extended his streak of consecutive games with at least one touchdown pass to 11. The only career appearance where he failed to account for at least one touchdown was his first at Marshall in '05. Since that game, he has made 12-straight appearances, including eight starts, and has thrown 14 touchdown passes and run for an additional eight.

Speaking of Streaking

With five catches for 46 yards vs. Maine, Joe Nicholas extended his steak of games with at least one catch to 20. For his career, he has made at least one catch in 24 of his 26 appearances.

In fact, Nicholas has gone for three, or more, catches 18 times in his career. He has either tied or led the team in catches 13 times in his career.

Slick Sophomore

After seeing limited action as a true freshman last season, speedy sophomore D.J. McAulay has quickly emerged as one the team's primary offensive weapons in 2006. He followed up his career best, five-catch, 82-yard performance in the season opener with Maryland with another five-catch effort vs. Maine. McAulay ended with a game-high 53 receiving yards. He also added a 15-yard rush on a reverse to his evening's work.

He currently ranks third in the Atlantic 10 in both receiving yards per game (67.5) and receptions per game (5.0).


Hardworking Holmes

Sophomore tailback DeBrian Holmes was able to contribute a little of everything on Saturday evening vs. Maine, as he carried four times for 26 yards, made three receptions for nine yards and returned four kicks for 40 yards.

He scored his first touchdown of the season by taking a lateral pass from Phillips (which counts as a rush) and sprinted 14 yards down the sideline for a third quarter score. The run stands as his second career rushing touchdown, and third overall score, for his career.

Notable Accomplishment

Senior place-kicker Blair Pritchard was successful on his first career field goal attempt, a 25-yarder in the first quarter, Saturday night vs. Maine. For the season, Pritchard, who also handles the punting and kickoff chores, has been true on his first four extra point attempts.

Did You Know? III

Pritchard's 25-yard first quarter field goal was the first successful field goal attempt for the College in the previous three games. The last Tribe field goal came off the foot of four-time all-conference kicker Greg Kuehn in the third quarter of the team's game vs. James Madison (33-yards). Kuehn uncharacteristically missed his last four attempts on the season (three vs. Delaware and one at Richmond) and the College had no attempts at Maryland.

Emerging End

Junior tight end Drew Atchison made his first career catch on an acrobatic 10-yard grab at Maryland and followed that performance with an equally impressive 17-yard grab down the right sideline vs. Maine on Saturday.

Since joining the team after playing baseball in his freshman year on campus, he has made tremendous prog-

ress in adding size and strength to his 6-7, 250-pound frame. Atchison's development has allowed the College to be more flexible in its use of returning all-conference tight end Matt Trinkle, who now can be used more in the slot and off the line of scrimmage to take advantage of his athleticism.

Potts Shots

Coming into the season the College had every reason to think it had some of the best depth at the quarterback position of any team in the I-AA ranks. The opener with Maryland only seemed to confirm that perspective, as junior Mike Potts came into the game for the fourth quarter and proceeded to connect on nine-straight passes, including the perfect 49-yard scoring strike to McAulay, and ended the contest 9-for-10 passing for 99 yards.

This effort was an extension of what has been a very sharp fall camp for the Middletown, Del. native. Potts, who started five of the first six games of 2005 for the Tribe, has now completed better than 64% of his 153 career attempts (94 completions) for 1,025 yards and nine touchdowns with just two interceptions.

Piece of History

Since the 1993 season, only one other Tribe quarterback has completed 90% of his passes in a single game with a minimum of 10 attempts. That accomplishment, interestingly enough, was turned in by Jake Phillips when he finished the fourth quarter and overtime periods of the team's remarkable double overtime comeback win over Northeastern completing 18 of his 20 attempts (.900) for 256 yards and four touchdowns last season.

Team Defensive Notes

Take It Away

The Tribe defense was at it again in Saturday's contest vs. Maine, forcing two turnovers on the evening. With a first-quarter fumble cause and recovery and a third-quarter interception, W&M now has six turnovers gained through two games. And, with the offense having yet to commit a turnover, the Tribe is still atop the A-10 in turnover margin at +6, an average of 3.00 turnovers gained per game.

Dating back to last season, the Tribe has now forced at least two turnovers in six of its last seven games with the only exception being the 22-21 loss to Delaware on Nov. 12. In fact, the loss to the Blue Hens is the only game W&M failed to record at least one turnover in last season.

The Tribe's interception in the second half gave W&M 11 picks over its last seven games, again with the Delaware game being the only contest without at least one interception.

Second Half Heroics Continue

After a strong second-half performance in the season opener at Maryland on Sept. 2, the Tribe's defensive effort in the second half vs. Maine mirrored the initial outing in many ways. The Black Bears used a short field to march 60 yards on the opening drive of the third quarter and take a 20-3 with Ron Whitcomb's 8-yard touchdown run, similar to how Maryland went 53 yards on its first possession of the second half and kicked a 39-yard field goal, the Terps' only points over the final 30 minutes.

Maine controlled much of the first half on the ground, rushing for 87 yards en route to 146 total yards

of offense. Add the first drive of the third quarter, which was actually inflated by two 15-yard personal foul penalties on W&M, to the first-half numbers and it shows the Black Bears managed only 56 yards rushing, just 58 total yards and four first downs the rest of the way, giving the Tribe a chance to rally.

Senior Richard Riley intercepted Whitcomb on Maine's next possession, then fellow senior Josh Wright sacked Whitcomb on the Black Bears' following possession, as the Tribe eventually forced a punt. After converting three first downs, including two by penalty, in the third quarter, Maine was 0-for-4 on third down in the fourth quarter.

Fourth Quarter Magic

The Tribe defense has certainly done its share late in games to keep things interesting over the first two contests of the season. Looking at only the fourth quarters of each game, W&M has yielded just 54 total yards of offense, or an average

of 1.9 yards per play, and both Maryland and Maine were a combined 0-for-8 on third down conversions.

Tribe Defense Strong in Second Half at Maryland

After a first half that saw Maryland ring up 261 yards of total offense and take a 24-7 lead at the break on Sept. 2, the Tribe defense settled in during the second half and turned an impressive performance of its own over the final 30 minutes.

W&M held the Terps to 105 yards of offense in the second half, with 53 of those yards coming on Maryland's first possession of the second half. That drive led to a 39-yard field goal, which was Maryland's only score of the second half.

After surrendering 13 first downs in the opening half, the Tribe limited Maryland to just five first downs in the second half, all of which came in the third quarter. In fact, after the Terps' opening drive of the third quarter, W&M yielded only 52 yards of total offense and only two first downs. In the fourth quarter alone, the Tribe surrendered just nine yards of total offense and recorded its fourth gained turnover of the game.

Additionally, Maryland was a combined 0-for-6 on third down conversions in the second half. The Terps finished the contest just 2-of-10 on third downs.

Covering the Kicks

W&M continued to do a nice job covering kickoffs in the Maine contest, limiting the Black Bears to 53 yards on four attempts (13.2). Through two games, the Tribe leads the A-10 in kickoff coverage, yielding an average of 12.6 yards per return.

The Tribe also turned in a very solid effort in kick coverage against Maryland, holding the Terps to 35 kickoff return yards on three attempts, an average of 11.7 yards per return. Conversely, the Tribe averaged 22.5 yards per kickoff return on four attempts.

Individual Defensive Notes

Wright Cited for Play vs. Maine

Senior defensive end Josh Wright was named the coaching staff's defensive player of the week for his efforts in the loss to Maine. Wright was credited with six total tackles in the contest, including a key solo sack in the third quarter on a first down play for the Black Bears. He leads the Tribe with two tackles for loss through two games and now has nine total stops on the season.

Wright also had a solid opener at Maryland, recording two solo tackles, including one for a 2-yard loss. Wright recovered a pair of Maryland fumbles in the loss, a mark that leads the Atlantic 10 through three weeks of the season.

Familiar Name On Top

Sophomore linebacker Josh Rutter's name could be found in a familiar place in Saturday's box score, on top of the defensive statistics page after leading the Tribe with 10 total tackles, his sixth-career double-digit tackle game. It marked the first time this season Rutter paced the defense, after leading the unit in tackles

on six occasions in his rookie season of 2005.

Rutter led the Tribe and all Atlantic 10 rookies with 109 total tackles last season. Rutter became the first Tribe freshman under Laycock to lead the team in tackles and the first underclassman to do so since Chris Stahl led W&M (94) as a sophomore in 1999.

In fact, the only other first-year player to ever lead the Tribe in tackles, under Laycock, was Mark Hughes (134), who led W&M as walk-on sophomore in 1989. Rutter could become just the third defender, and first since Adrian Rich (1991-92), to lead the Tribe in tackles in back-to-back seasons. Through two games, he leads the squad with 17 total stops.

Allen Continues Solid Play in Secondary

After leading the Tribe in tackles at Maryland in the season opener, sophomore Kevin Allen made his first career start at strong safety against Maine on Saturday. Allen responded

with another solid showing, recording eight total tackles, including four solo stops, and a forced fumble on the Black Bears' first offensive possession of the game.

Allen, who had an interception in the opener vs. Maryland, broke into the backfield on an option play Saturday night and disrupted the pitch from quarterback Ron Whitcomb with a hard hit. Derek Cox recovered for the Tribe, which eventually converted a 25-yard field goal after the turnover.

Through two games, Allen is second on the team with 16 total tackles, including nine unassisted stops.

Secondary Continues to Come Together

Allen's play in the defensive backfield has been representative of a rather reliable collective effort by the secondary through the first two games of the season. The secondary was probably the area hardest hit by graduation from last season, after the Tribe lost three of its four starters from the final 2005 depth chart.

So far, however, the unit has seen contributions from both its veteran holdovers and younger prospects. Senior Richard Riley recorded his second career interception in the loss to Maine and added five total tackles, while classmate Alan Wheeling continues to develop into his new role at safety, tallying eight tackles, with five solos, through two games. Sophomore corner Derek Cox broke up three pass attempts in the opener at Maryland and recovered a fumble with two unassisted tackles in Saturday's loss to Maine

Three players in the secondary saw their first collegiate action in the opener at Maryland, including redshirt freshman Sheldon Alexander who started at strong safety. True freshman David Caldwell made an impact in his first collegiate game, registering four total tackles at Maryland, and saw snaps against Maine on Saturday. True freshman corner Max Harris also playing for the first time against Maine Saturday.


Defensive Line Continues to Improve

Another area that was depleted after 2005 was the Tribe's defensive line, where again a mix of veteran leadership and standout play and youthful contributions has continued to progress through the early part of the season.

One of the veterans, who is actually new to the defensive line, is T.J. O'Neill, who turned in a strong performance at end against Maine. O'Neill tallied four unassisted tackles, including a sack that resulted in a 5-yard loss. He finished with five tackles and is third on the team with 10 total stops through his first two games at defensive end.

Sophomore Josh Larkins continued to solidify his role in the defensive tackle rotation with a good game against Maine, registering five stops with three unassisted tackles.

Redshirt freshman Adrian Tracy started for the second time at end opposite Wright, while classmate C.J. Herbert also is a first-year starter at defensive tackle. Tracy has nine tackles through two games with an unassisted stop behind the line of scrimmage, while Herbert was credited with three stops in Saturday's loss to Maine.

Comments from Monday's Atlantic 10 Conference Call:

Opening Comments on Maine Game

JL: I thought we played hard, and in spurts we played well. We didn't play consistent enough to be successful against a very good team.

You suggested that the running part of your offence wasn't what you would like it to be, and [senior tailback Elijah] Brooks has been a good back in the past, so is it safe to assume that blocking would be a problem now?

JL: It could. It isn't great. Elijah is a good back. Maybe, we need to stick with it a little bit more and mix it up a bit. We'd like to run the football, and we'd like to be a little more balanced. But, to move the ball, it might mean we have to throw it a bit more. We just have to get better. I think potentially, we could be a pretty good balanced team. We just have to get better. We have an inexperienced offensive line. At times we've been good, and at others, we've haven't been as good as we'd like to be.

After the game you said, you were concerned with a lack of consistency. Was that a product of the bye-week or a product of Maine?

JL: I think it was a product of our inexperience and a product of Maine. I don't think the bye-week has anything to do with it. We did prepare fine and practice was fine during the week. But, I don't think we played bad. We didn't turn it over, and we didn't have many penalties. We had a couple [penalties] that were strange, but I just thought we were a little bit inconsistent.

Did you take any positives out of the game?

JL: Yeah, I thought that [sophomore linebacker] Josh Rutter, and [senior defensive end] Josh Wright on defense played really well. [Senior] Matt Trinkle at tight end did a nice job, and I think [sophomore quarterback] Jake Phillips handled himself in a really tough position. There were a lot of good things, but again, we just have to get better. It's a work in progress, and we are going to have to take steps each week to get better. I think we are getting better, but we still have a ways to go. Jake was under the gun quite a bit during the game, but had no interceptions, and there was no panic on his part.

On Friday, the school held the groundbreaking on the new football facility. Talk about how that went and what the facility will mean to the program?

JL: The ceremony went well. It was a neat set up with a crowd of a lot of different people and former players. The president was outstanding. We are very fortunate to have a president like Gene Nichol. He's just so supportive [of the program] and the people that helped us with the project. I think it shows the commitment by the university and will be something that recognizes the performance and tradition of the program. That's the reason why we got it. The future, that's obviously part of it, but the reasons William and Mary made this commitment is because of the success of a lot of coaches and players over the years, and it gives us a chance, hopefully, to teach better as coaches and a chance for our players to learn better.

Thoughts on Saturday night's game against VMI.

JL: Well, I know [VMI] will come ready to play. We always have good games with them, and I know they will play hard and play well. It was probably a tough one for them last week against Richmond. Richmond is very, very good. But, you have to be impressed with VMI. There's no quit in them. They hung in there and played, and played hard all the way. I know coach [Jim] Reid, and I know they'll be ready to play. And, I know that we better take care of our business and get ourselves ready to play.

What kind of difficulties does VMI's offense present in your preparation?

JL: For any defense, if you don't see [the option offense] that much, it makes it a big deal, and we've had trouble with it in the past. We went up to Rhode Island last year and had a lot of trouble with it, and I hope we learned from that.

Maine quarterback Ron Whitcomb was able to run the ball effectively on Saturday. What troubles does that present and what did you think of what he did running?

JL: Well, I thought he did a great job. I thought some of the runs were pretty good, especially with some of the runs that were from pick and go, or the ones off the read. I think he showed the experience that you like to have in the quarterback spot, in making the decision of where to go, when to pull it down, when not to. He performed very well, and he was what made them go offensively.

Making An Impact: Facility Upgrades 💆 🧖

The Jimmye Laycock Football Center

On Friday, Sept. 15, ground was broken on the Jimmye Laycock Football Center, a future 30,000-square foot complex that will be located at the northwest corner of the stadium on what is the Tribe's football practice field at a cost of \$11 million.

The ceremony was attended by many prominent alumni and former players, as well a number of friends and donors to the Athletics Department.

The center will provide a new home for team and coaches lockers, an athletic training room, an equipment storage area, coaches offices, conference rooms, and administrative support areas — as well as an entrance that will include a Tribe Football Hall of

an entrance that will include a Tribe Football Hall of Fame space. The project is scheduled to be finished in the fall of 2007.

The two-story football complex was designed by Moseley Architects out of Virginia Beach and HOK Sport, an internationally renowned architectural firm based in Kansas City, Mo., whose clients include sports venues at nearly every level, including Oriole Park at Camden Yards.

Officials worked closely with the building designers to ensure the complex complements the architecture of Zable Stadium and conforms to the campus design guidelines.

FieldTurf Installation at Zable Stadium

During the spring, the W&M Athletics Department announced plans for the conversion of the natural grass playing surface in Zable Stadium to a state of the art, synthetic playing surface for the 2006 football season.

In July, the installation of the new playing surface, FieldTurf Pro, was completed, giving the Tribe one of the nation's finest playing fields. The installation, at an estimated total cost of \$840,000, was performed by Ballard Sports out of Cary, N.C.

FieldTurf features a non-abrasive fiber surface that resembles natural grass blades. Its blend of specially treated Polyethylene fibers prevents abrasions, or "rug burn". Unlike traditional synthetic turf, which relied on an

underlying shock pad for player comfort and safety, FieldTurf grass fibers are surrounded and stabilized by a special blend of "synthetic earth" - a mixture of smooth, rounded silica sand and rubber granules. The sand and rubber are precision layered and provide a stable, resilient, uniform, shock-absorbing surface.

The Tribe's playing field is the same surface used by 24 NFL teams, including the Detroit Lions, host of Super Bowl XL in 2006. It is a football-dedicated surface and only has markings specific to the sport.

The FieldTurf project is the second major completed upgrade at the venerable stadium, as last season saw the school raise \$650,000 to place permanent light fixtures at Zable.

Did he have any influence on your decision to attend W&M?: Yes and no. He gave me a lot of good advice about the school, but in the end, it was my decision to come here.



What was the worst summer job?: Waiting tables. I just couldn't seem to carry the try right. I quit after three days.


What is the hardest class you've had at William and Mary?: Well, I came here as a pre-med major and took biology. Soon after that class I became an economics major.



Sophomore Derek Cox recovered a fumble and registered three pass break-ups, while senior defensive end Josh Wright recovereda pair of Maryland fumbles.

WILLIAMSBURG (9/16/06) -- Maine quarterback Ron Whitcomb rushed for a pair of scores and passed for another to lead the Black Bears past William and Mary, 20-17, in an Atlantic 10 Conference game at Zable Stadium.

Whitcomb, who finished with 64 yards rushing on 21 attempts and 98 yards through the air on 9-of-15 passing, crossed the goal line for the second time on an 8-yard run to give Maine a commanding 20-3 lead in the third quarter.

Tribe quarterback Jake Phillips passed for 184 yards and a touchdown, completing 22 of his career-high 44 attempts. Joe Nicholas brought in five receptions for 46 yards and a touchdown, and DeBrian Holmes scored on a 14-yard run, finishing with 26 yards on four attempts.

Sophomore Kevin Allen forces W&M's offense came alive behind Phillips in the a Maine fumble in the first third, as the Tribe engineered a nine-play, 74-yard quarter. scoring drive. Phillips completed a lateral swing pass

to Holmes, who finished the drive with a 14-yard scoring run to cut the deficit to 20-10.

Corner Richard Riley ended Maine's next drive with an interception near midfield, but the Tribe's offensive try stalled at the Maine 37-yard line.

Josh Wright came up with another big defensive play on the next series, sacking Whitcomb for a 3-yard loss on first down. Maine eventually was forced to punt, giving it back to W&M.

Consecutive completions by Phillips to R.J. Archer moved the Tribe inside the 20-yard line, and Phillips eventually connected with Nicholas on an 8-yard touchdown pass that trimmed the Maine lead to 20-17 with 8:30 remaining.

W&M had two more possessions in the final seven minutes, but the Tribe could only manage one more first down the rest of the way.

McAulay finished with five catches for 53 yards, and Archer recorded three receptions for 25 yards. Brooks led the Tribe rushing attack with 29 yards on 12 carries.


