Last Meeting: Massachusetts won, 24-14, on Oct. 11, 2003 in Williamsburg.

First and 10

William and Mary visits Massachusetts on Saturday afternoon in search of its first Atlantic 10 victory of the season. UMass leads the all-time series, 5-4, but the teams haven't met since the Minutemen earned a 24-14 victory in Williamsburg in 2003. The Tribe will be facing its first ranked opponent of the season, as UMass holds a No. 10 billing in the Sports Network I-AA Top 25. UMass is one of five nationally-ranked opponents remaining on the College's 2006 schedule. The Tribe is coming off a tough, 16-14 defeat to Hofstra at Zable Stadium on Saturday afternoon, which marked W&M's sixth consecutive loss in conference play. Hofstra kicker Rob Zarrilli's third field goal with 7:20 remaining proved to be the difference, sending W&M to four-straight home A-10 losses, which have come by a combined seven points. UMass was idle last week after posting a 48-7 victory over Stony Brook on Sept. 23. The Minutemen won their conference opener, 31-21, at Villanova on Sept. 16, while UMass' only loss came at the hands of Division I-A Navy, 21-20, on Sept. 9. Head coach Don Brown is in his third season, after serving as the head man at Northeastern from 2000 to 2003. Brown, the defensive coordinator of the '98 UMass National Championship team, is 16-10 since taking over in Amherst.

Game Credentials

Please make all press and photo requests at least one week in advance. Tickets and parking passes can be mailed with one week's notice. If not, tickets can be picked up, with proper credentials, at the Will Call Window at Zable Stadium on the morning of the game.

Press Parking

Parking for members of the working press is available just southeast of Zable Stadium in front of the University Center. Parking is limited and media members are encouraged to arrive early.

Photographers

Please observe the NCAA rules, which prohibit photographers between the 25 yard lines.

Press Box Services

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

Visiting Film Crews

Space will be allotted in the West Press Box for film and video crews of visiting teams' coaches' shows. We will provide two spots per team.

Post-Game Procedures

Head coach Jimmye Laycock and the visiting coach will be available about 10 minutes after the game in an interview area located directly below the press box. Individual W&M players' names should be given to Pete Clawson during the fourth quarter and they will be made available in the interview room.

The William and Mary Football Radio Network

The W&M Athletics Department announced a new partnership for the Tribe Radio Network. The Notice of Intent to Award issued by the College designates two local stations, 92.3 FM "The Tide" and 107.9 FM "WBACH", as the network's Co-Flagships for the coming athletics season.

"We are extremely excited to be teaming up with Tribe Athletics," said Tom Davis, the President of Davis Media LLC. "We look forward to enhancing the broadcasts and broadening the reach of the games to the many fans throughout Tidewater Virginia."

The new partnership provides the College with solid coverage of the peninsula, as the station's combined footprint reaches from eastern areas of Richmond to the western parts of Norfolk. Tribe fans in Richmond will also be able to catch the action on 1450AM WCLM, which returns for its second season as an affiliate. Also, as usual, long-standing network member WBRG, AM 1050 of Lynchburg is back to carry all the action for 2006.

Bob Sheeran remain in place to deliver all the action of Tribe football over the airwaves.

UMass Series Notes

First Meeting Came in the Postseason

The first time William and Mary and Massachusetts met on the gridiron was in 1990, when the Tribe defeated the Minutemen, 38-0, in the first round of the NCAA I-AA Playoffs in Williamsburg. That UMass squad was coached by Jim Reid, who currently is the head coach of VMI and a former-Richmond front man. Fullback, and current Indianapolis Colts' defensive backs coach, Alan Williams rushed for three touchdowns and scored on a 73-yard pass from Chris Hakel for the Tribe, and W&M kept UMass off the scoreboard despite allowing 291 total yards, 20 first downs and over 35 minutes of possession for the Minutemen.

Visiting Team Has The Luck of Late

The visiting team has won the last two meetings in the series, including UMass' 24-14 victory in Williamsburg in the last meeting in 2003. Prior to the 2003 meeting, W&M captured a 31-10 victory in Amherst in 2001. The Tribe has won two meetings in Amherst, in four visits, while UMass has come away with three victories in Williamsburg, in five all-time visits.

O'Neill The Lone Connection to the Bay State

Junior defensive end T.J. O'Neill (Duxbury) is the only player on the 2006 W&M roster from Massachusetts.

The Last Meeting

WILLIAMSBURG (11/1/03) -- A valiant Tribe comeback effort fell short as No. 7 Massachusetts topped William and Mary, 24-14, in the 2003 home-opener at Zable Stadium.

The Tribe fell behind 17-0 going into the fourth quarter before a pair of turnovers forced by the defense led to W&M scores.

UMass tailback Steve Baylark, on the second play of the final quarter, fumbled near midfield, and on the next play, Lang Campbell hit Steven Hargrove on a wheel route to bring W&M within 10 points at 17-7.

Travis McLaurin intercepted UMass quarterback Jeff Krohn on the next series, then just five plays later, the Minutemen looked to be losing their grip on the game, as fullback Nick Rogers scored from 14 yards out

to make the score 17-14. But, faced with a third and nine at the Tribe 23-yard line, Krohn found Dominique Stewart for a key touchdown to push the margin back to 10 points.

A UMass interception on the next series ended the comeback bid however, as W&M fell to 1-4 on the season, and 0-3 in conference play.

UMass fullback Rich Demers paced the Minutemen on the ground with 171 yards on 26 carries, both career-bests.

Campbell finished 23 of 29 for 265 yards, with one touchdown and one interception. Danny Wade set a career-high with eight receptions for 80 yards, while Hargrove had 91 yards receiving.

McLaurin and Paul Carpenter each reached double-digits in tackles with 11 and 17, respectively.

Team Notes

A Win Against UMASS Would:

· Stand as the Tribe's first win over a ranked opponent on the road since the 2004 season, when the College defeated a then fourthranked James Madison squad, 27-24. The last ranked team the College has beaten was then No. 1 ranked New Hampshire, 42-10, at Zable Stadium last season.

• Snap the Tribe's current six-game conference losing streak. The College's last win in conference play came against Towson University on Oct. 22nd, 2005 (41-16).

• Stand as the Tribe's third win at Amherst in five visits. The College recorded a decisive win in its last visit, coming away with a 31-10 victory in the 2001 season opener.

• Avoid the team's worst start since the 2003 season. William and Mary started that campaign with a 1-5 record, before rallying to take the last four games on the schedule.

• Even the all-time series with the Minutemen at five games apiece. Herbert blocked a field goal in the fourth UMass has won three of the last four meetings in the series.

• Move William and Mary Head Coach Jimmye Laycock's all-time record vs. Don Brown coached squads to 3-1. Laycock had a 2-1 mark

vs. Brown in the three meetings the two had during Brown's tenure at Northeastern from 2000-03.

Milestone for Laycock

The game on Saturday vs. Hofstra stood as William and Mary Head Coach Jimmye Laycock's 300th in his career at the College. In 27 seasons at the helm, he has amassed a 176-122-2 record.

His tenure at the College is unmatched in terms of wins, as his career total of 176 is 131 more than the next closest coach, Rube McCray (45, 1944-50), or games coached, as the next closet total to his 300 is the 88 coached by Jim Root from 1972 to 1979.

In terms of current conference head coaches, only Villanova's Andy Tally and his 236 career games of head coaching experience are within 100 of Laycock's total. Taking it one step further, of the remaining 10 conference head coaches, only Maine's Jack Cosgrove (152) has even half as many games of head experience.

Selling Out

With a sell out crowd of 12,259 in place to witness Saturday's game against Hofstra, the Tribe ended a threegame homestand by averaging 11,508 fans per contest.

By drawing 10,706 and 10,206 on consecutive weeks leading up to the game with the Pride, the College has now turned in three consecutive five digits crowds for the first time since the 1993 season, when W&M drew in excess of 11,000 on four consecutive home dates. The 1995 season was the last year the team had three crowds in excess of 10,000 in the same year.

With the announced attendance of 10,706 for the home opener with Maine, the College had its second-largest home opening crowd since the 1996 season. Only last year's number of 11,741, which witnessed the team's victory over Liberty, was better over the 10-year span.

The three games William and Mary has played under the lights at Zable have averaged 11,058 fans (nearly .902 of capacity).

Did You Know?

The College has had six crowds of 10,000-plus in its last nine home games ('04 v. James Madison, 12,259; '05 v. Liberty, 11,756; '05 v. James Madison, 12,287; and '06 v. Maine 10,706; v. VMI 10,206; and Hofstra 12,259), including three sellouts.

Ironically, of the remaining three games during this span that failed to attract a five-digit crowd, one was the home win over then No. 1 ranked New Hampshire, a game played in a torrential downpour.

Heartache on the Home Front

While on the subject of home games, the 16-14 loss to Hofstra continued what has been a heart-wrenching string of conference defeats for the College at home. The past four conference home games, all losses, have seen the Tribe fall by a total of seven points [JMU, 30-29; Delaware, 22-21; Maine, 20-17; Hofstra, 16-14]. The close scores have been indicative, as the Tribe had opportunities to win each of the four late in the fourth quarter.

Prior to the current four-game home slide against conference opponents, Laycock and his charges fashioned one of the strongest home field advantages in the league, as the Tribe had won .730 of its home conference contests (38-14). Currently, the team has a 38-18 all-time home record vs. the A-10.

Youth is Served

While on the subject of youth, the College counts 25 freshman and sophomore amongst its 44 players on the two-deep going into the game with UMass (11 on offense; 14 on defense). Overall, only nine total seniors are in the starting line-up (three on offense and six on defense).

Speaking About The Two-Deep

After making it through the preseason and first two games of the schedule with a relatively light injury list, save the loss of starting senior strong safety Zach Stout, the win over the Keydets two weeks ago had a heavy cost in that two starters, sophomore middle linebacker Josh Rutter (knee) and junior fullback Matt Otey (ribs), were forced from the game with injuries. Both were unavailable in Saturday's game with Hofstra. Each will be evaluated throughout the coming weeks.

Fortunately, Tribe had able back-ups for each, as senior former all-conference linebacker Travis McLaurin teamed with fellow senior and former all-conference performer, Chris Ndubueze to fill Rutter's role on the defense and rugged redshirt freshman Raphael Bynum did a solid job in handling the starting full-back duties.

On a positive note, the Tribe's receiving corps is due to receive a boost in the return of experienced fifth-year senior John Taylor. Taylor had a bone broken in his left hand during a pre-season scrimmage and has missed the first four games of 2006. He will likely get reps as a slot receiver.

Hard Road Ahead

A quick look at the College's schedule will show that the Tribe is going to face five opponents currently ranked in the Sports Network Top 25, including No. 10 UMass this weekend. The remaining ranked teams W&M will face are No. 7 Richmond, No. 13 James Madison, No. 17 Towson and No. 18 Delaware.

Of these five ranked opponents, the Tribe will have to face four on the road, with the only home date coming against Richmond in the season finale on Nov. 18. The last ranked team the College has beaten outside of Zable Stadium was James Madison in 2004, when the Tribe handed the then fourth-ranked Dukes a 27-24 defeat in Harrisonburg.

Team Offensive Notes

Inside The Numbers

One week removed from putting up over 400 yards of total offense and 38 points against VMI with just 52 offensive snaps, the Tribe totaled just 51 total offensive plays in the losing effort vs. Hofstra. While the Tribe's attack averaged a very respectable 5.1 yards per snap against the Pride and accumulated 259 total yards, the 51 offensive attempts is the lowest single-game home total in the 13 seasons the College has been a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference. The only lower total was the 48 snaps taken in the season ending loss at Richmond last season.

Tough Quarter

The second quarter of Saturday's contest saw the Pride dominate the clock and scoreboard, as Hofstra held the ball for 10:30, rolled to 142 yards on 23 plays and 13 points on one touchdown and two field goals by Rob Zarrilli. By contrast, the College gained just 26 yards on nine plays.

In the remaining three quarters, the Tribe out gained (233 to 202) and out-scored (14-3) the Pride.

Red Numbers

The Tribe is certainly in the black when it comes to dividends in the red zone, as the team has converted nine of its 10 red zone opportunities into points on the season. In fact, of the nine successful trips inside the opponent's 20-yard line, seven have ended with touchdowns.

The College has led the league in red zone scoring for each of the last two seasons, having converted an amazing 114 of 129 attempts (.885) over the span since the start of 2004. Of those 114 successful ventures, 89 resulted in touchdowns.

Individual Offensive Notes

Talented Tailback

While the College's offense has yet to reach its full potential early on in the 2006 campaign, senior all-conference tailback Elijah Brooks certainly seems to be in full stride. Last Saturday, he battled through a difficult first half against Hofstra that saw him gain just 20 yards on seven attempts to finish the contest with 79 yards rushing on just 15 attempts.

In a strong second half-performance vs. the Pride, Brooks gained 59 rushing yards on the eight attempts and also caught one pass for an additional 30, giving him 89 total second half yards on just nine touches.

Brooks made another large contribution, which won't show in the stats sheet, when he provided the key block on the Tribe's lone touchdown of the second half. Brooks started the scoring play by taking the handoff from W&M sophomore quarterback Jake Phillips and ran a few steps before pitching the ball back to Phillips. Then, Brooks quickly turned and delivered the play-saving block on a blitzing Pride linebacker coming from his left side. His helper allowed Phillips the extra fraction of time needed to unfurl

the well-executed 46-yard scoring pass to junior wide out Joe Nicholas.

This second half performance was a continuation of what has been an impressive season for Brooks. He has been especially effective over the last two contests, as he has run for 225 yards on just 30 total attempts, an average of better than 7.0 yds/attempt.

Against VMI on Sept. 23, the senior team captain had a game-high 146 rushing yards and three touchdowns on just 15 carries. The 146-yard effort stands as Brooks' second-best career rushing performance (149 yards vs. Marshall in '05 opener) and the evening was his sixth career 100-plus yard performance.

The performance also marked the third time in his career that he has scored three, or more, touchdowns in the same game.

For his career, Brooks currently has rushed for 1,921 yards in his Tribe career on 425 attempts, an average of 4.5 yards per attempt. He is 251 yards away from breaking into the school's all-time top 10 rushing listing, as Phil Mosser's (1970-71) 10th-place total sits at 2,171.

Currently, Brooks is fifth in the league in rushing, averaging 79.0 yards per game on the ground. He has averaged 5.4 yards per attempt over his first 59 rushes this season, good for 316 yards. Brooks has gained an additional 70 yards on six receptions and has one kick return for 12 yards, which pushes his season all-purpose total to 398 yards, an average of 6.03 yards a touch.

Good Hands

By bringing in three catches for 70 yards in the loss to Hofstra Saturday, junior all-conference candidate, wide receiver Joe Nicholas paced the Tribe's receiving corps for the third time in four games this season.

The performance extended his steak of games with at least one catch to 22. For his career, he has made at least one catch in 26 of his 28 appearances.

In fact, Nicholas has gone for three, or more, catches 20 times in his career. He has either tied or led the team in catches 15 times in his career.

Currently, Nicholas is sixth in the A-10 in receiving yards with an average of 60.0 yards per game.

As previously mention, Nicholas brought in a 46-yard scoring pass vs. Hofstra, which marks the second-straight week he has turned a scoring play of 40-plus yards with the other being a 54yard touchdown catch vs. VMI.

For his career, Nicholas has 1,770 receiving yards on 133 grabs. He needs just eight more receptions to break into the school's all-time listing (as Corey Ludwig – 1990-93 and Terry Hammons – 1991-95 are currently tied for ninth-place with 140). He is 226 receiving yards from passing David Knight (1970-72) and his 10th-place total of 1,995 yards.



Looking Deep

Tribe sophomore quarterback Jake Phillips made the most of his nine completions [on 22 attempts] against Hofstra, as he threw for 189 yards and two touchdowns. In his afternoon, he had his three longest completions of the season, starting with a 46-yard connection to sophomore speedster D.J. McAulay on his first attempt. He also struck on a 46-yard touchdown pass to Nicholas in the third quarter and started the last drive of the fourth quarter with a 30-yard connection to Brooks.

Last week, vs. VMI, Phillips had his streak of consecutive game with at least one touchdown come to an end at 11. It stood as only his second career appearance (the other being in limited action in his first career game at Marshall last season) where he has failed to produce a score, either with his arm or legs. In his 13 career appearances, Phillips has accounted for 26 touchdowns (16 passing, eight rushing).

Potts Nearly Perfect

Tribe junior reserve quarterback Mike Potts continues to have

a scorching hot hand in the early going, as he entered the contest with VMI in the third quarter and threw touchdown passes of 34- and 54-yards on his first two attempts. He ended the evening connecting on three of four passes for 99 yards and the pair of scores.

This performance comes on the heels of his 2006 debut which saw him hit on nine of 10 passes for 99 yards, including a 49-yard score vs. Maryland.

Though he is well off the national qualifying standard for the category (a minimum requirement of 15 attempts per appearance), his quarterback efficiency number is sitting at an obese 275.23 (by comparison, the national high for I-AA is 188.9).

Coming into the season the College had every reason to think it has some of the best depth at the quarterback position of any team in the I-AA ranks and Potts' play only confirms that perspective, as the Delaware native has now completed 12 of this 14 attempts on the season for 198 yards and three scores.

Potts, who started five of the first six games of 2005 for the Tribe, has now completed better than 61% of his 158 career attempts (97 completions) for 1,124 yards and 11 TDs (compared to just two interceptions).

Piece of History

Since the 1993 season, only one other Tribe QB has ever completed 90% of his passes in a single game (with a minimum of 10 attempts). That accomplishment, interestingly enough, was turned in by Jake Phillips when he finished the fourth quarter and overtime periods of the team's remarkable double overtime comeback win over North-eastern completing 18 of his 20 attempts (.900) for 256 yards and four TDs.

Tribal Tidbits


The following are a few selected individual offensive notes from the VMI contest:

• Senior team captain and preseason all-American selection, center Cody Morris, led the breakout offensive evening

for the offensive front, as he and his mates helped power a Tribe attack that averaged 8.5 yards a rush and 472 total yards on the evening. Morris is playing center after spending the previous three seasons as the starting guard.

Firsts: Redshirt freshman fullback Raphael Bynum recorded his first career carry against the Keydets, powering for 12 yards. Fellow redshirt freshman, tailback Matt Nickerson also recorded his first career carry, gaining three yards on a fourth-quarter attempt.
Sophomore Elliott Mack turned in a slick 34-yard TD reception vs. VMI and pushed his career total to six touchdowns on just 31 receptions (an average of one TD per every five receptions). Mack finished with three receptions for 54 yards vs. the Keydets.

• Fellow speedy sophomore D.J. McAulay brought in just two passes for 12 yards on Saturday evening, but he still ranks sixth in the league with an average of 4.00 catches a contest. He is tied with Nicholas for the team lead in receptions on the season with 12 for 147 yards.


Team Defensive Notes

Turnovers Streak Remains Intact

With a fumble recovery against Hofstra on Saturday, the Tribe has recorded at least one gained turnover in all four games this season. Saturday's fumble recovery was W&M's 10th gained turnover this season, which ranks tied for 27th in Division I-AA, while the College's turnover margin of 1.50 is tied for eighth.

Through four games, the Tribe has gained a total of 10 turnovers on three interceptions and seven fumble recoveries, which is one more take-away than the unit had through four games last season. W&M is well on-pace to post back-to-back seasons with 20, or more, turnovers for the first time since the 2001 and '02 seasons. With 27 total turnovers gained last season, W&M reached the 20-mark for the first time since 2002. Under Laycock, W&M has failed to record at least 20 caused turnovers in a season only four times [2004 (19), 2003 (18), 2000 (18), 1992 (19)].

Dating back to last season, the Tribe has now forced at least one turnovers in seven of its eight seven games with the only exception being the 22-21 loss to Delaware on Nov. 12. In fact, the loss to the Blue Hens is the only game W&M failed to record at least one turnover in last season.

Tribe Defense Continues to Control Second Half

William and Mary's defense has developed quite a knack for turning up the pressure in the second half this season, and Saturday's effort over the final 30 minutes against Hofstra was no different. For the second-straight week, the Tribe held an opponent to only a second-half field goal, after also limiting VMI to just a fourth-quarter field goal on Sept. 23. Unfortunately for W&M, however, Rob Zarrilli's 47-yarder in the fourth quarter Saturday was the difference in the Tribe's 16-14 loss.

But, the unit can still find some positives in another otherwise strong second-half performance. After surrendering 115 yards rushing and 212 total yards in the first half, the Tribe held Hofstra to 132 total yards in the second half, including only 15 yards rushing. W&M blocked a third-quarter field goal attempt, which preserved a 14-13 lead, and turned in perhaps the biggest stop of the game following Zarrilli's third field goal that put Hofstra ahead.

Trailing by a point with under five minutes remaining and needing the ball back, W&M came up with a huge three-and-out, as Hofstra running back Kareem Huggins was stopped after a minimal gain on first down from the Pride 16. On second down, redshirt freshman defensive end Adrian Tracy dropped Huggins for a 3-yard loss back to the 14, before an incomplete pass led to a Pride punt. Hofstra was 0-for-4 on third down attempts in the fourth quarter.

Additionally, the Tribe has now allowed only one score by each opponent in the second half, yielding a field goal at Maryland, a third-quarter touchdown on the first drive of the second half vs. Maine, a late fourth-quarter field goal vs. VMI and the fourth-quarter field goal for Hofstra. Opponents are averaging just 5.0 points in the second half against W&M and 49.5 total yards in the fourth quarter, which is a little inflated after VMI's 105 yards in the fourth quarter.

Tribe Defense Tough on Third Down In Second Half

After holding Hofstra to a 0-for-4 effort on third down conversions in the fourth quarter Saturday, VMI is still the only opponent to convert a third down attempt against the Tribe this season in the fourth quarter. The Keydets went 1-for-3 in the period. Through four games, opponents are just 1-for-15 (.067) on third down conversions in the fourth quarter. Maryland was 0-for-6 on third downs in the second half, while Maine went 0-for-4 in the fourth quarter.

Overall, opponents have converted just 27.5% (14-51) of third down opportunities in four games, a figure that ranks third in the A-10 and tied for 10th nationally in I-AA.

Early Returns: Tribe Defense Enjoying Better Start To '06

Although its always difficult to compare one team to another, and one season to another, the defense has shown a solid improvement from last season over the first four games this year.

Through four games, the Tribe is allowing 17.2 points per game, which ranks fifth in the A-10, compared to a 2005 scoring average of 22.8 through four games, which was also bolstered by a 56-0 shutout of Liberty. The Tribe's rushing defense has continued to improve each week and is now down to 168.5 yards per game, but perhaps the biggest improvement, at least statistically, has been in pass defense. W&M is yielding an average of 135.8 yards per game through the air this season, ranking fourth in the A-10, compared to an average of 212.8 passing yards per game through four games of 2005. In total defense, the Tribe currently ranks sixth in the league, allowing 304.2 total yards per game, while the unit was allowing 354.8 total yards per game in 2005. Also, opponents owned a 40% success rate on third down through four games in 2005, compared to 27.5% this season.

Youthful Contributions

A look down the Tribe's depth chart for UMass reveals 13 underclassmen, consisting of either sophomores, redshirt freshmen or true freshmen, in the 22 possible spots. So, not surprisingly, the Tribe's top three tacklers through four games are all underclassmen. Redshirt freshman Adrian Tracy leads the team now with 28 total tackles, which includes 13 unassisted tackles and team-leading totals of 5.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 quarterback sacks. Sophomore safety Kevin Allen is second on the squad with 26 tackles, including 14 unassisted, followed by sophomore linebacker Michael Pigram with 22 stops. Pigram had a career-high 10 stops in the loss to Hofstra, including nine unassisted tackles, and forced a fumble.

Right Place, Right Time

After junior defensive end T.J. O'Neill recovered a Hofstra fumble on Saturday, the Tribe now has seven fumble recoveries through four games. It was O'Neill's second recovery of the season, which is tied for the team lead with two other players. Senior end Josh Wright and sophomore corner Derek Cox also each have recovered a pair of fumbles this season. The trio are tied for the league

lead. Reserve defensive end Ryan Jones has the unit's other fumble recovery.

Been a While

When redshirt freshman defensive tackle, C.J. Herbert blocked a Hofstra field goal attempt in the third quarter Saturday, it marked the Tribe's first blocked field goal attempt since 2004. The last blocked field goal was by current senior defensive tackle Brian Williamson, who rejected a 33-yard attempt by Villanova on Oct. 11, 2004.

Double Down Times Two

With sophomore Michael Pigram and redshirt freshman Adrian Tracy each recording 10 tackles in Saturday's contest vs. Hofstra, it marked the first time this season W&M had two players with double-digit tackles. Both marks were career-highs for Tracy and Pigram. Last season, the Tribe had two, or more, players with double-figure tackles on six different occasions.

Individual Defensive Notes

Tracy Emerging As One of League's Top Rookies

One week after earning the Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week citation, redshirt freshman defensive lineman Adrian Tracy continued to show he is developing into one the of the league's top young defenders with another solid performance vs. Hofstra on Saturday.

Tracy, who has started each of the Tribe's four games at defensive end, recorded a career-high 10 total tackles vs. the Pride, which included four unassisted tackles, two solo tackles for loss and a solo quarterback sack. Tracy's two tackles behind the line of scrimmage resulted in a total loss of 12 yards, including nine on the passer sack.

Through four games, Tracy now leads the team in tackles (28), tackles for loss (5.5) and sacks (2.5). Additionally, the rookie's sack total of 2.5 is tied for the sixth-best mark in the Atlantic 10, while is his average of 0.62 sacks per game is also tied for sixth in the league. Tracy's total of 28 stops is the second-best mark in the A-10 by a freshman, but is the top total by a freshman defensive lineman.

Tracy recorded a team-high nine tackles, including five unassisted stops and 1.5 tackles for loss against the Keydets on Sept. 23 to earn A-10 Rookie of the Week honors. Tracy had an unassisted sack in the third quarter, also assisted on another pass sack and forced a fumble, as W&M limited VMI to 243 to-tal yards and picked up its first win of the season.

Sophomore Linebacker Michael Pigram Has Career Day vs. Hofstra


In the absence of starting middle linebacker Josh Rutter on Saturday, sophomore Michael Pigram picked up the slack with an outstanding effort vs. Hofstra, recording a career-high 10 total tackles and a forced fumble. Nine of Pigram's stops were unassisted, including one behind the line of scrimmage for a 3-yard loss. It marked the first time in Pigram's career he led the squad in tackles in just his second season of collegiate football, after seeing extensive time last year as a true freshman.

Pigram is now third on the team with 22 total tackles through four games, including 2.5 stops behind the line of scrimmage.

Veteran Linebackers Contribute vs. Hofstra

Prior to the start of the season, W&M knew its young defense would have to count on senior linebackers Travis McLaurin and Chris Ndubueze to provide veteran leadership both on and off the field, with each returning after having missed the 2005 season.

But, with sophomore Josh Rutter out with a knee injury for Saturday's game with Hofstra, the duo, along with Pigram, helped make up for the loss of one of the league's top defenders. McLaurin made his first at middle linebacker since the 2004



Ndubueze was second on the team with eight tackles vs. VMI on Sept. 23, while McLaurin also had seven total stops vs. the Keydets.

The pair of have combined for 25 total tackles in the last two games.

Herbert Turns in Big Plays vs. Hofstra

Redshirt freshman defensive tackle C.J. Herbert recorded two of the biggest plays of his young career on Saturday against Hofstra, registering a solo quarterback sack and a blocked field goal. He finished with four total tackles.

With the Tribe holding a narrow 14-13 lead early in the fourth quarter Saturday, Hofstra lined up for a 33-yard field goal attempt that would have given the Pride the lead. But, Herbert skied to deny Rob Zarrilli's attempt, notching the Tribe's first blocked field goal since 2004. Later in the period, with Hofstra facing a first-and-20 from the Tribe 45-yard line, Herbert dropped HU quarterback Anton Clarkson for an 8-yard loss back to the Pride 47.



Senior Blair Pritchard averaged 46.0 yards on five punts Saturday vs. Hofstra. He also recorded a pair of touchbacks on kickoffs.

Herbert has enjoyed a solid rookie season and, along with some of the unit's other youthful defenders, has shown the Tribe faithful that W&M's defense will be strong up front for years to come. Herbert has 11 total tackles on the year, having started each of the first four games at tackle.

Game Notes/Hono

More on the Defensive Line

Complimenting the play of Tracy and Herbert up front this season has been the steady contributions from veteran line leaders Josh Wright and Brian Williamson. The senior duo each had standout efforts in the Hofstra game on Saturday, combining for 12 total tackles with six between them. Wright had a pair of unassisted stops and forced a fumble, his first of the season, while Williamson also had two solo stops and assisted on another behind the line of scrimmage.

Wright has put together a solid senior campaign through four games with 15 total tackles, including 3.0 stops for loss. He's tied for the team and league lead with two fumble recoveries and also has 1.5 quarterback sacks and a pass break-up to his credit.

Pritchard Shakes Off Slow Start With Big Effort vs. Hofstra

After averaging 32.3 yards per punt through the first three games of the season, senior Blair Pritchard turned in his finest effort of the season on Saturday vs. Hofstra. Pritchard needed only five punts to total 230 yards for a season-best average of 46.0 yards per punt. He boomed a season-long 50-yarder and downed one inside the Pride's 20-yard line. With the effort, he added nearly four total yards to his season average, which now stands at 36.1 yards per punt and ranks seventh in the A-10, just behind his brother, Jason who kicks for JMU and averages of 37.2 yards per punt.

Riley Steps Up Play in Secondary

Senior corner Richard Riley had two of the bigger hits in the win over VMI, both of which resulted in substantial lost yardage for the Keydets. Riley dropped VMI fullback Sean Mizzer for a 5-yard loss on a third-and-two in the first quarter, leading to a VMI punt, and later stuffed one of the Keydet wing backs on a pitch out for another 5-yard loss on a third-down attempt in the second quarter. In total, Riley tallied four tackles on the evening.

Riley's play in the defensive backfield has been representative of a reliable collective effort by the secondary so far. The secondary was probably the area hardest hit by graduation from last season, after the Tribe lost three of its four starters from the final 2005 depth chart. Riley turned in his second-career interception against Maine on Sept. 16 with five tackles and is tied for second on the team with 3.0 tackles for loss.

True Freshmen Contribute Against VMI

The Tribe's true freshman duo at corner, David Caldwell and Max Harris, contributed in the win over VMI on Saturday, as the pair combined to record seven total tackles and a formed fumble. Caldwell tallied five stops, including two unassisted, while Harris added two unassisted tackles and registered the first forced fumble of his career in the fourth quarter. Caldwell has nine tackles in three games, while Harris has seen playing time in the last two.

The two are the first Tribe true freshman defenders to see playing time at corner since Hasani Cameron in 1998.

Reserve Defenders See Action Against VMI

With Saturday's one-sided score in the fourth quarter, several of the Tribe's reserve defenders had a chance to get on the field, and most took advantage of the opportunity. Junior linebacker Ryan Horvath recorded a career-high four tackles, including two unassisted stops, while redshirt freshman Sean Lissemore, who continues to work his way into the tackle rotation, tallied four assists. Sophomore safety David Houff recorded three tackles, including a nice open field solo stop. Junior end Ryan Jones made three tackles and recovered a fourth quarter fumble, while tackle Daniel Pulley registered a career-best three tackles.

Comments from Monday's Atlantic 10 Conference Call:

With so many narrow losses, dating back to late last season, do you think there is a common denominator in these games?

JL: No, it's just a fine line between winning and losing, and we have got to play better. I don't know if you can compare years, but I look at this year's team and our guys work hard and practice hard and want to do well. For one reason or another, we are just coming up at little bit short. All we know how to do is work hard to get better.

What are some of the inconsistencies that you guys need to work on?

JL: You don't talk about one person or one area, it goes all across the board, and it's a matter of just working to improve.

Tackling, you can always point to a couple of missed tackles here and there. You could point to a couple of dropped passes, and then you could always talk about a missed pick up or blocks up front.

Can you talk about the confidence level you have when you have a good kicking game?

JL: It definitely makes a difference when you get into [an opponent's] territory, as far as where you're going to go [for a first down] and what kind shots you take, and when you take those shots and when you don't. It affects your approach, but I think you have to look at your kicker and at what you can do offensively. Hofstra had a great kicker, and we were fortunate to block one field goal.

Have you gotten any word on [sophomore linebacker] Josh Rutter's status, and do you have any feeling on how his absence affected Saturday?

JL: When you lose a player of that caliber, it has got to affect you. And again, I don't know how long he will be out right now. I still don't know. When you don't have a starting player in there, who's very good, it makes a difference. But, I think the other guys have stepped up. [Sophomore] Michael Pigram played a heck of a ball game at linebacker. He played every snap at outside backer and played very well. We have some players in there that can play, and they just need to keep working, keep getting better.

What were your thoughts on your running game and your offensive linemen?

JL: I thought we made some mistakes. Some mistakes put us in too many long yardage situations, and when you're in long yardage situations, you're not going to be running the ball as well, so you have to throw. I think when situations were presented, we didn't take advantage of it in the passing game. I don't know if we'll be a great running team this year, but we're going to be better at it than we are now.

Can you talk a little about Saturday's game [vs. #10 Massachusetts] and what concerns you have?

JL: From looking at film, because we haven't played [UMass] in a few years, I've seen that they are a complete football team. I mean you look at teams, and sometimes you think they are very athletic and can run well, but lack the physical part. I think [UMass] has both of them together, and they are a physical team that is also very athletic. They can run on both sides of the ball, offensively and defensively. They run to the ball and run the ball well, and they can play physical defense and physical offense. I think it's a very good team, a very solid team, and there's no question that they ought to be one of the top teams in the nation.

From your own team coming off a disappointing loss, can you talk about the way your guys react to a game like that?

JL: They better play better, or they're looking for a real long day out there. I don't know how they will react, but I think they will come back and practice hard, work hard and prepare hard and, hopefully, we'll play better. That is what I expect, and I think that's what they expect.

Where do you need to improve most this week?

JL: I don't know if there is any one area that we need to improve the most, but I think we need to cut out the mistakes and play our game on both sides of the ball. I think if we cut our mistakes, we will improve. If we improve well enough to play against a team like UMass, then we're set because that is a very, very good team.

The center will provide a new home for team and coaches lockers, an athletic training room, an equipment storage area, coaches offices, conference rooms, and administrative support areas – as well as

an entrance that will include a Tribe Football Hall of Fame space. The project is scheduled to be finished in the fall of 2007.

The two-story football complex was designed by Moseley Architects out of Virginia Beach and HOK Sport, an internationally renowned architectural firm based in Kansas City, Mo., whose clients include sports venues at nearly every level, including Oriole Park at Camden Yards.

Officials worked closely with the building designers to ensure the complex complements the architecture of Zable Stadium and conforms to the campus design guidelines.

FieldTurf Installation at Zable Stadium

During the spring, the W&M Athletics Department announced plans for the conversion of the natural grass playing surface in Zable Stadium to a state of the art, synthetic playing surface for the 2006 football season.

In July, the installation of the new playing surface, FieldTurf Pro, was completed, giving the Tribe one of the nation's finest playing fields. The installation, at an estimated total cost of \$840,000, was performed by Ballard Sports out of Cary, N.C.

FieldTurf features a non-abrasive fiber surface that resembles natural grass blades. Its blend of specially treated Polyethylene fibers prevents abrasions, or "rug burn". Unlike traditional synthetic turf, which relied on an

underlying shock pad for player comfort and safety, FieldTurf grass fibers are surrounded and stabilized by a special blend of "synthetic earth" - a mixture of smooth, rounded silica sand and rubber granules. The sand and rubber are precision layered and provide a stable, resilient, uniform, shock-absorbing surface.

The Tribe's playing field is the same surface used by 24 NFL teams, including the Detroit Lions, host of Super Bowl XL in 2006. It is a football-dedicated surface and only has markings specific to the sport.

The FieldTurf project is the second major completed up-

grade at the venerable stadium, as last season saw the school raise \$650,000 to place permanent light fixtures at Zable.

In the Spotlight

Richard Riley, Senior, Defensive Back

Q: Where are you from?: I'm originally from Gaithersburg, Md. My parents were both born and raised in Jamaica.

Q: Do you still have family in Jamaica?: Yes, I have family who reside in Jamaica, as well as Trinidad, and some of the other islands in the Caribbean.

Q: Have you spent any time there? Yes, I went down in 1997, for the end of my seventh grade year and stayed through all of eighth grade, and the summer before going into ninth grade.

Q: So why did you go?: My father and I had spoken about the experience of going down and living my grandparents and getting more familiar with my roots, and spend time in the same home that he had been raised in when he was young. It meant a lot to him. I thought it would be a good experience, and it turned out to be a great experience for me.

Q: What did you take from your time down there?: I was exposed to the great difference in cultures between America and Jamaica. Obviously, the Jamaicans have far fewer consumer goods. It's just a different world, you have less want down there because there is less to have, and it gives you a greater appreciation of a lot of the little things that we Americans don't look at as a luxury. Also, it's just a different type of lifestyle, a different setting. The homes are built differently, mainly because of the climate, but it's just a lot more laid back, a more simple life. Everything's different, like the humor, expectations.

Q: What would you say is your most lasting impression of that time in your life?: It would have to be going down there and having my eyes opened to what my parents saw as they were raised. Because, growing up, you be with your parents, and they would listen to a certain type of music, and they talked in a certain way, with your family members, and growing up as a Jamaican American, it's almost like, you feel that connection, "Okay, I can relate to that, because my parents are Jamaican", but at the same time you live in an American society, you're raised in American culture. Obviously, I was born and raised here [in the USA], this is my home first and foremost, but my roots are in Jamaica and after experiencing the culture for myself, I can always go back there and be able to identify that as my home now, as well. I feel like I had a connection, and to actually go there, and to develop my own roots there, within myself as opposed to through my parents.

Q: How well do your relatives from other countries understand the game of football?: When I first when down, I brought my football with me and I would ask everyone if they wanted to play football, and automatically they assumed that I was talking about soccer. So, I took out the ball and nobody really knew what to do with it. They had no idea, but the thing about that, I was young, that was back in '97. More people down there have cable and satellites now, they watch football. It's not the most popular sport. Soccer, cricket, and basketball are pretty popular sports. But, people definitely know about football.

Q: What were some of your interests growing up, outside of athletics?: I was a member of the science club. I've always had an attraction to math and sciences because it's something that you work through; it's not something that's just giving information.

Q: What was the last book that you read?: The autobiography of Angela Davis. A friend of mine gave it to me and was just like "read it", it's about a revolutionist, she was part of the Black Panther movement, and it was just an interesting look at the time period politically.

Q: If you were flipping through channels, what movie would make you stop and watch?: Ninja Turtles 2, if Ninja Turtles 2 came on, that's a classic movie, and they never try to rerun it. They play Ninja Turtles 1, but they never play Ninja Turtles 2. I was absolutely obsessed with Ninja Turtles. Period. Point blank. I don't know why, I look back on it and I don't know why.

Q: What Ninja Turtle did you most closely identify with?: See, that's the thing about the Ninja Turtles, one of them does not have just one identity. They have their intelligent sides; they have their bad sides, like Raphael. You know, the intelligent side was Donatello. Sometimes you feel like you have to make the right decision to be a leader, and that's your Leonardo that's within you. Then sometimes you want to party, and that's the Michelangelo that's within you. So, they all come together, and I felt like I identified with every single Ninja Turtle. I love them all. They formed a unit.

Q: What's been your favorite class at William and Mary?: My favorite class would definitely have to be Beginning Acting, with Professor Westberg. Beginning Acting was like breath of fresh air from everything, all the books and all the lectures. It was just a totally different class.

Q: What's your hardest class at William and Mary?: Hardest class ever, Italian 102, and I advise that nobody takes Italian 102.

Q: [Senior defensive back] Alan Wheeling has presented you as the best entertainer of the defensive back group and you give fantastic impressions. Can you tell me whom you do your best impressions of?: I do a great Jerry Fife [William and Mary's Head Athletic Equipment Manager].

Q: How about amongst team members?: I try to do them all. I guess I do a great [senior defensive tackle] Brian Williamson, but he's never heard me do it.

Q: Of all the defensive backs, whose the most likely to pull a practical joke?: That's easy, Zach Stout. He pulls pranks everyday.

Q: What has been your favorite summer job that you've ever had?: I actually used to work at a retirement home called Asbury Methodist Village for about three years.
