#### First and 10

William and Mary plays the second of three consecutive road games when it visits state-rival Liberty on Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m. Saturday's game marks just the third meeting in the series, which began in 2004. The Tribe has won the previous two meetings, posting a 37-17 victory in Lynchburg in 2004, before recording a 56-0 shutout win last season at Zable Stadium. The game also marks W&M's final non-conference contest of the season, as the College will then close with five consecutive Atlantic 10 games against Southern Division opponents. The Tribe is coming off a 48-7 loss at then 10th-ranked Massachusetts and has now dropped two-straight after a 38-6 victory over Big South Conference member VMI on Sept. 23. W&M is 6-0 all-time against Big South opponents. Junior quarterback Mike Potts made his first start of the season at UMass and recorded career-highs in completions (27), attempts (50) and passing yards (244), while providing the Tribe's lone score of the contest on a 35-yard, third-quarter touchdown pass. Liberty was idle last week and brings a 3-2 record under first-year head coach Danny Rocco into Saturday's match-up after dropping a 34-14 decision at Division I-A Wake Forest on Sept. 30. Saturday's affair will also serve as Liberty's homecoming game.

Lunch is served around noon, followed by opening remarks and a question and answer session with Coach Laycock. Interviews with selected players will follow the luncheon. #### **Game Credentials**

Please make all press and photo requests at least one week in advance. Tickets and parking passes can be mailed with one week's notice. If not, tickets can be picked up, with proper credentials, at the Will Call Window at Zable Stadium on the morning of the game.

#### **Press Parking**

Parking for members of the working press is available just southeast of Zable Stadium in front of the University Center. Parking is limited and media members are encouraged to arrive early.

#### **Photographers**

Please observe the NCAA rules, which prohibit photographers between the 25 yard lines.

#### **Press Box Services**

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

#### Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

#### **Visiting Film Crews**

Space will be allotted in the West Press Box for film and video crews of visiting teams' coaches' shows. We will provide two spots per team.

#### **Post-Game Procedures**

Head coach Jimmye Laycock and the visiting coach will be available about 10 minutes after the game in an interview area located directly below the press box. Individual W&M players' names should be given to Pete Clawson during the fourth quarter and they will be made available in the interview room.

#### The William and Mary Football Radio Network

The W&M Athletics Department announced a new partnership for the Tribe Radio Network. The Notice of Intent to Award issued by the College designates two local stations, 92.3 FM "The Tide" and 107.9 FM "WBACH", as the network's Co-Flagships for the coming athletics season.

"We are extremely excited to be teaming up with Tribe Athletics," said Tom Davis, the President of Davis Media LLC. "We look forward to enhancing the broadcasts and broadening the reach of the games to the many fans throughout Tidewater Virginia."

The new partnership provides the College with solid coverage of the peninsula, as the station's combined footprint reaches from eastern areas of Richmond to the western parts of Norfolk. Tribe fans in Richmond will also be able to catch the action on 1450AM WCLM, which returns for its second season as an affiliate. Also, as usual, long-standing network member WBRG, AM 1050 of Lynchburg is back to carry all the action for 2006.

#### **Liberty Series Notes**

#### State Teams To Meet for Third Time

Saturday's meeting with Liberty will mark just the third game in the series that began in 2004. W&M has won the first two contests, including a 56-0 shutout victory in Williamsburg last season. Prior to 2004, Liberty was the only Division I or I-AA school in the Commonwealth of Virginia that W&M had never faced.

#### **W&M Unbeaten Against Big South**

Since the Big South was formed in 2002, W&M has gone a perfect 6-0 against the only two teams its faced from the conference, VMI and Liberty. The Keydets joined the Big South in 2003, and the Tribe has won all four meetings since then, including a 38-6 victory at Zable Stadium on Sept. 23. W&M has also defeated Liberty in each of the last two seasons.

#### **Familiar Face**

While Danny Rocco is new to the Lynchburg campus, the Flames first-year defensive coordinator Tom Clark is very familiar to the Tribe family, as he spent three seasons (2001-03) in the same role with the College. Clark's schemes helped the College to a share of the 2001 Atlantic 10 Conference crown.

#### Tribe to Face Second First-Year Head Coach in 2006

Saturday's game will also mark the second time this season that W&M has faced a first-year head coach in Liberty's Danny Rocco. The former University of Virginia associate head coach was named the seventh-head coach in the Liberty program's history in December of 2005 and has guided the Flames to a 3-2 start. The other first-year head coach W&M has faced this season was Hofstra's Dave Cohen. The Tribe also faced VMI in veteran coach Jlm Reid's first season in Lexington this year.

#### Homecoming Trip For Tribe's Josh Wright

When W&M visits Liberty on Saturday afternoon, it will mark another homecoming of sorts for senior defensive end Josh Wright, who hails from nearby Madison Heights, Va. In his first trip to Lynchburg in 2004, Wright recorded a pair of tackles in the Tribe's 37-17 victory over the Flames.

#### The Last Meeting

WILLIAMSBURG (9/24/05) -- W&M found the end zone on eight of its 10 possessions and piled up 635 yards of total offense, to Liberty's 145, and shut out the Flames 56-0 at Zable Stadium.

The Tribe held Liberty to a net of minus-6 yards rushing and posted its first shutout since blanking VMI, 34-0, in 2001.

Elijah Brooks paced the W&M ground attack, which rang up 335 rushing yards, with 102 yards on 22 carries, his third 100-yard game of the season. Brooks scored three rushing touchdowns, all on 1-yard runs, and added another receiving score to become the first Tribe player to score four touchdowns since Dominique Thompson at Delaware in 2004.

In his third career start, quarterback Mike Potts went for 226 yards and two touchdowns on 19-for-25 passing. Redshirt freshman Jake Phillips spelled Potts in the second half and completed 3-of-3 attempts for 74 yards. including a 34-yard touchdown toss to Elliott Mack. Phillips also ran three times for 16 yards and a score.

Christian Taylor took over for Phillips in the fourth quarter and scored on a 4-yard run, his first-career touchdown.

Joe Nicholas paced the receiving corps with 110 yards on eight catches, his second 100-yard game in three outings. Brooks finished with three catches for 43 yards, while true freshman D.J. McAulay pulled in two balls for 49 yards.

For the fourth consecutive game, linebacker Josh Rutter led the defense in tackles, recording seven total stops. Ryan Nickell made five total tackles, including 2.0 TFL, and added an interception. Defensive end Jonas Watson registered 1.5 sacks and five total stops, while free safety Kevin Allen picked off his second pass of the season.



#### **Team Notes**

#### A Win Against Liberty Would:

- Stand as the Tribe's third-straight victory over the Flames. William and Mary has won the only two previous meetings between the teams in 2004 (37-17) and 2005 (56-0).
- Avoid the team's worst start since the 2003 season. William and Mary started that campaign with a 1-5 record, before rallying to take the last four games on the schedule.
- Extend the College's winning streak against school's currently in the Big South Conference to 23 games (with 21 of those wins coming against VMI).
- Break the Tribe's current four-game road slide. William and Mary hasn't won outside the confines of Zable Stadium since recording the electric 44-41 double overtime win at Northeastern on Oct. 15, 2005.
- Give Liberty a 2-10 record against the Atlantic 10, since William and Mary joined the league in 1993. The Flames' lone win in the last 10 games against the current members of the A-10 Conference came in 2003 when Flames handed Hofstra a 49-42 overtime setback on the last game of the season.

#### Did You Know?

That William and Mary has not lost an out of conference I-AA game since falling at Furman (34-10) back in 2000. The Tribe is 9-0 out of conference vs. other I-AAs in that span.

#### Rested

For the second-straight week, the College will be facing a team that is coming off a bye-week. Last week, the Tribe faced a 10th-ranked UMass squad which had two weeks to prepare, and Liberty comes into the contest with its last action coming at Wake Forest on Sept. 30.

#### Tested

Along with being in the second game of a three-game road trip, the College will be the opponent's Homecoming guest on each of the next two weekends, as Liberty is celebrating Homecoming this weekend and James Madison is preparing to host its big alumni weekend the following Saturday (Oct. 21st).

Rounding the Homecoming festivities off, the Tribe will host its own Homecoming three weeks from Saturday, as it will host Villanova on Oct. 28th.

#### Fresh Faces

For the third time in the first six weeks of the season, William and Mary's coaching staff will face a staff that is in its first year. Danny Rocco is in his first season on the sidelines at Lynchburg, after having spent the last five years working just north at the University of Virginia. The Tribe has also faced first year staffs against VMI (Jim Reid) and Hofstra (Dave Cohen).

#### **Familiar Face**

While Danny Rocco is new to the Lynchburg campus, the Flames' first-year defensive coordinator Tom Clark is very familiar to the Tribe family, as he spent three seasons (2001–03) in the same role with the College. Clark's schemes helped the College to a share of the 2001 Atlantic 10 Conference crown.

#### In the Margin

The Tribe's 48-7 defeat at the hands of UMass stands as the College's largest margin of defeat since falling to Central Florida 52-7 in 2000. It was the program's worst loss to a I-AA teams since being handed a 52-6 loss by Furman in 1999. The loss is its largest to a conference opponent since joining the league in 1993.

The 48 points the College surrendered is tied for the most ever allowed to a conference opponent, as it has allowed the same amount on three different occasions, most recently in the 48-29 loss at Rhode Island last season.

#### In the Numbers

Despite falling at UMass, William and Mary set season highs in both offensive plays (71 – compared to UMass' 59), passing yards (244) and time of possession (32:59).


#### Did You Know?

That when the College's punter, Blair Pritchard, drew a roughing the kicker penalty on the his first punt attempt of the game on the Tribe's opening drive, it marked the first time this season W&M received an extra set of downs via a penalty. Through 16 quarters of play, William and Mary had not gained a first down curtsey of a flag, while it had given up a total of six.

#### Youth is Served

While on the subject of youth, the College counts 23 freshmen and sophomores among its 44 players on the two-deep going into the game with Liberty (11 on offense; 12 on defense). Overall, only nine total seniors are in the starting line-up (three on offense and six on defense).

While several true freshmen are currently part of the travel party, only the cornerback duo of David Caldwell and Max Harris have seen playing time. The pair are the first true freshman to see playing time at cornerback for the Tribe since Hasani Cameron in 1998.



Sophomore Derek Cox tallied a career-high nine tackles at UMass, including five unassisted tackles. Cox is one of 23 underclassmen on the Tribe's depth chart.

#### Two-Deep Speak

After making it through the preseason and first two games of the schedule with a relatively light injury list, save the loss of starting senior strong safety Zach Stout, the win over VMI (Sept. 23) had a heavy cost in that two starters, sophomore middle linebacker Josh Rutter (knee) and junior fullback Matt Otey (ribs), were forced from the game with injuries. Both were unavailable in Saturday's game with UMass. Each will be evaluated throughout the coming weeks.

Fortunately, Tribe had able back-ups for each, as senior former all-conference linebacker Travis McLaurin teamed with fellow senior and former all-conference performer, Chris Ndubueze to fill Rutters' role on the defense and rugged redshirt freshman Raphael Bynum did a solid job in handling the starting full-back duties.

On a positive note, the Tribe's receiving corps received a boost in the return of experienced fifth-year senior John Taylor at UMass. Taylor had a bone broken in his left hand during a pre-season scrimmage and has missed the first four games of 2006. He had one catch for nine yards against the Minutemen.

#### Long Road to Travel

Coming off the difficult road trip to now eighth-ranked UMass, the Tribe is 1/7 of the way through what is easily the most brutal stretch of games in recent memory. Counting the game at UMass, the College is looking at playing five of the last seven games on the road, including four of the next five.

Making the task even more difficult is the fact there is a quality opponent at every stop along the way, starting this Saturday with a 3-2 Liberty squad. The following week sees the team travel to 13th-ranked James Madison (4-1). Traditional rivals Villanova and Delaware, who are each 2-3, are sandwiched around an appearance at conference upstart Towson, which is currently 4-1 and ranked 22nd. The final game, while at home, will feature one of the league's premier squad's in the 10th-ranked Richmond Spiders. The cumulative record of the remaining Tribe opponents is 15-11.

#### **Offensive Notes**

#### Tough Sledding

The College has scored just 90 points through the first five games of the season. This stands as the team's lowest point total through the first five games since 1982 when it posted 85 points through five contests.

#### **Red Numbers**

The College is currently the third most efficient offense in the A-10, as far as converting red zone scoring chances is concerned. William and Mary has converted on nine of its 10 total attempts on the season.

Last week vs. UMass, however, the College recorded no attempts in the red zone. For the season, the Tribe is tied with Maine for the least red zone attempts with 10.

When the College does cross into the opponent's 20-yard line it has been very efficient in finding the end zone, as of the nine successful trips, seven have ended with touchdowns.

The College has led the league in red zone scoring for each of the last two seasons, having converted an amazing 114 of 129 attempts (.885) over the span since the start of 2004. Of those 114 successful ventures, 89 resulted in touchdowns.

#### Talented Tailback

William and Mary senior all-conference tailback Elijah Brooks enters this weekend's game at Liberty averaging 70.2 yards a game. His total, which ranks seventh in the A-10, is possibly made more impressive by the fact that the Tribe, as team, is averaging only slightly better than 108 yards a contest.

Brooks found the going difficult last weekend at UMass, as he ended the contest with just 35 yards on 10 attempts. The game ended a streak which had seen him be especially effective over the previous two contests (vs. VMI and Hofstra), as he had run for 225 yards on just 30 total attempts, an average of better than 7.0 yds/attempt.

Against the Keydets three weeks ago, the senior team captain had a game-high 146 rushing yards and three touchdowns on just 15 carries. The 146-yard effort stands as Brooks' second-best career rushing performance (149 yards vs. Marshall in '05 opener) and the evening was his sixth career 100-plus yard performance.

The performance also marked the third time in his career that he has scored three, or more, touchdowns in the same game.

For his career, Brooks currently has rushed for 1,956 yards in

his Tribe career on 440 attempts, an average of 4.4 yds/carry. He is 216 yards from breaking into the school's all-time top 10 rushing listing, as Phil Mosser's (1970-71) 10th-place total sits at 2,171.

Currently, Brooks is averaging 5.1 yards/attempt over his first 69 rushes this season, good for 351 yards. Brooks has gained an additional 82 yards (on 11 receptions) and has two kick returns for 27 yards, which pushes his season all-purpose total to 460 yards, an average of 5.6 yards a touch.

#### **Good Hands**

By bringing in five spirals for 65 yards and a score in the team's loss vs. UMass, junior all-conference candidate, wide receiver Joe Nicholas paced the Tribe's receiving corps for the fourth time in five games on the season.

The performance extended his steak of games with at least one catch to 23. For his career, he has made at least one catch in 27 of his 29 appearances.

In fact, Nicholas has gone for three, or more, catches 21 times in his career. He has either tied or led the team in catches 16 times in his career.

Currently, Nicholas is sixth in the A-10 in receiving yards with an average of 60.4 yards/game.

His 35-yard, fourth-quarter catch and run for score this past weekend vs. UMass marked the third straight week that Nicholas has brought in a scoring pass of 35 yards or greater (the others were a 46 yarder vs. Hofstra and a 54-yard score vs. VMI).

For his career, Nicholas has 1,835 receiving yards on 138 grabs. He needs just three more receptions to break into the school's all-time listing (as Corey Ludwig — 1990-93 and Terry Hammons — 1991-95 are currently tied for ninth-place with 140). He is 161 receiving yards from passing David Knight (1970-72) and his 10th-place total of 1,995 yards.

#### **Record Day**

Despite the lopsided final score, Tribe junior quarterback Mike Potts showed well in his first action as the starting quarterback since the sixth game of the 2005 season at Northeastern. Playing under extreme pressure from a blitzing and stunting UMass defense, Potts stood tall in the pocket and set career highs in attempts (50), completions (27) and passing yards (244). His afternoon was highlighted by a perfectly thrown 35-yard scoring strike to junior wide out Joe Nicholas.

The touchdown extended Potts' streak of at least one touchdown accounted for in his last six career starts (the first five of which came last season).


The interception he threw late in the fourth quarter (on the Tribe's final drive and his 50th attempt of the afternoon) marked his first of the season and just the third of his career in 208 attempts (compared to 12 TDs).

Prior to his start at UMass, Potts had been extremely effective in limited action coming off the bench. Against VMI, he threw TD passes of 34- and 54-yards on his first two attempts of the contest. In just over a quarter of action, he ended his evening against the Keydets by connecting on three of four passes for 99 yards and the pair of scores.

This performance came on the heels of his 2006 debut, which saw him hit on nine of 10 passes for 99 yards, including a 49-yard score vs. Maryland.

For the season, Potts has now completed 39 of his 64 attempts (.609) for 442 yards and four TDs.

Potts has now completed 60% of his 208 career attempts (124 completions) for 1,368 yards and 12 TDs (compared to just two interceptions).

#### **Serious Depth**

The UMass game marked only the second time in 16 career games that sophomore quarterback Jake Phillips didn't see game action, as he came into the game at UMass as the reserve for the first time in the previous 10 games (dating back to last season).

While starting rights will continue to be contested as the season plays out, the College will be confident that either Potts or Phillips are worthy candidates under center.

On the season, Phillips has completed 57 of his 113 attempts for 611 yards and four scores, against just two interceptions.

In his 13 career appearances, Phillips has accounted for 26 TDs (16 passing, eight rushing).

#### **Tribal Tidbits**

The following a few selected individual offensive notes from the UMass contest:

- Senior all-conference tight end Matt Trinkle brought in a seasonhigh four spirals for 27 yards vs. UMass. The four catches ties for the second most in his career (done on two other occasions, most r
- the second most in his career (done on two other occasions, most recently vs. Northeastern in 2005). His career high is seven, which he posted in the team's win over Rhode Island in 2004.
- Speedy sophomore DJ McAulay displayed the ability to make the difficult play over the middle, as most of his four catches (for 47 yards) came in heavy traffic vs. the Minutemen. McAulay is the team's second-leading receiver in both catches (18) and yards (247.
- Redshirt freshman wide out, RJ Archer made his first career start vs. UMass, as the team started the contest in a three wide receiver set. He ended the afternoon with two catches for 54 yard, including an acrobatic 33-yarder in the second quarter. Archer has made at least one catch in each of the first five games of his career.

#### **Team Defensive Notes**

#### **Turnover Streak Snapped at UMass**

For the first time this season, the Tribe defense failed to recorded at least one gained turnover in Saturday's loss at No. 10 -ranked Massachusetts. W&M had recorded 10 turnovers through its first four games and had gained at least one turnover in five-straight, dating back to 2005.

The streak reached five games with a fumble recovery against Hofstra on Sept. 30. With 10 turnovers on the season, however, the Tribe's 1.00 turnover margin is still good for second in the Atlantic 10 and 13th nationally in Division I-AA.

W&M is still on-pace to post back-to-back seasons with 20, or more, turnovers for the first time since the 2001 and '02 seasons. With 27 total turnovers gained last season, W&M reached the 20-mark for the first time since 2002. Under Laycock, W&M has failed to record at least 20 caused turnovers in a season only four times [2004 (19), 2003 (18), 2000 (18), 1992 (19)].


#### **Youthful Contributions**

A look down the Tribe's depth chart for Liberty reveals 13 underclassmen, consisting of either sophomores, redshirt freshmen or true freshmen, in the 22 possible spots. So, not surprisingly, the Tribe's top three tacklers through four games are all underclassmen. Sophomore safety Kevin Allen leads W&M with 32 total tackles through the UMass game with 16 unassisted stops and 16 assists, while redshirt freshman Adrian Tracy is second on the squad with 30 total tackles, which includes 13 unassisted tackles and team-leading totals of 6.0 tackles for loss and 2.5 quarterback sacks. Sophomore linebacker Michael Pigram is third with 26 stops. Pigram had a career-high 10 stops in the loss to Hofstra, including nine unassisted tackles, and forced a fumble.

The trend continued in the loss to UMass Saturday, as sophomore corner Derek Cox led the team with nine tack-les, while Allen finished with six stops and true freshman corner David Caldwell added four tackles. Sophomore safety David Houff turned in a solid performance as well with three unassisted tackles.

#### Right Place, Right Time

After junior defensive end T.J. O'Neill recovered a Hofstra fumble, the Tribe had seven fumble recoveries through four games. It was O'Neill's second recovery of the season, which is tied for the team lead with two other players. Senior end Josh Wright and sophomore corner Derek Cox also each have recovered a pair of fumbles this season. The trio are tied for the league lead. Reserve defensive end Ryan Jones has the unit's other fumble recovery.

#### Been a While

When redshirt freshman defensive tackle, C.J. Herbert blocked a Hofstra field goal attempt in the third quarter, it marked the Tribe's first blocked field goal attempt since 2004. The last blocked field goal was by current senior defensive tackle Brian Williamson, who rejected a 33-yard attempt by Villanova on Oct. 11, 2004.

#### **Double Down Times Two**

With sophomore Michael Pigram and redshirt freshman Adrian Tracy each recording 10 tackles in the contest vs. Hofstra, it marked the first time this season W&M had two players with double-digit tackles. Both marks were career-highs for Tracy and Pigram. Last season, the Tribe had two, or more, players with double-figure tackles on six different occasions.

#### **Individual Defensive Notes**

#### Tracy Emerging As One of League's Top Rookies

After earning the Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week citation on Sept. 24, redshirt freshman defensive lineman Adrian Tracy contin-

ues to show he is developing into one the of the league's top young defenders.

Tracy, who has started each of the Tribe's five games at defensive end, recorded a career-high 10 total tackles against Hofstra on Sept. 30 and had a pair of stops, including an assist behind the line of scrimmage, at UMass on Saturday. Against Hofstra, Tracy had four unassisted tackles, two solo tackles for loss and a solo quarterback sack. Tracy's two tackles behind the line of scrimmage vs. the Pride resulted in a total loss of 12 yards, including nine on the passer sack.

Through five games, Tracy is second on the team in tackles (30), while leading the squad in tackles for loss (6.0) and sacks (2.5). Additionally, the rookie's sack total of 2.5 is tied for the eighth-best mark in the Atlantic 10, while is his average of 0.50 sacks per game is also tied for eighth in the league. Tracy's total of 30 stops is the second-best mark in the A-10 by a freshman, but is the top total by a freshman defensive lineman.

Tracy recorded a team-high nine tackles, including five unassisted stops and 1.5 tackles for loss against VMI on Sept. 23 to earn A-10 Rookie of the Week honors. Tracy had an unassisted sack in the third quarter, also assisted on another pass sack and forced a fumble, as W&M limited VMI to 243 to-tal yards and picked up its first win of the season.

#### Derek Cox Records Career-High at Massachusetts

Sophomore corner Derek Cox registered a career-best nine total tackles in the loss to UMass on Saturday, recording five unassisted stops and four assists. Cox also broke up a pass attempt to earn the coaching staff's defensive player of the week award.

Cox is off to a solid start in his second season in the secondary, tallying 20 tackles, including 13 solos, through five games with five pass break-ups. Cox ranks fifth in the Atlantic 10 in passes defended.

#### Pritchard Shakes Off Slow Start

After averaging 32.3 yards per punt through the first three games of the season, senior Blair Pritchard turned in his finest effort of the season vs. Hofstra on Sept. 30 and followed with a solid outing at UMass Saturday. Pritchard needed only five punts to total 230 yards for a season-best average of 46.0 yards per punt against Hofstra, then averaged 37.2 yards per punt on eight attempts against the Minutemen. He boomed a season-long 50-yarder and downed one inside the Pride's 20-yard line and also downed one inside the 20 against UMass. With the two efforts, he has added over four total yards to his season average, which now stands at 36.5 yards per punt and ranks sixth in the A-10. More importantly, the Tribe's net punting average has drastically improved the past couple weeks, now standing at 32.8, which ranks sixth in the league.

#### Sophomore Linebacker Michael Pigram Has Career Day vs. Hofstra

Sophomore Michael Pigram turned in a career effort vs. Hofstra on Sept. 30, recording a career-high 10 total tackles and a forced fumble. Nine of Pigram's stops were unassisted, including one behind the line of scrimmage for a 3-yard loss. It marked the first time in Pigram's career he led the squad in tackles in just his second season of collegiate football, after seeing extensive time last year as a true freshman.

Pigram is now third on the team with 26 total tackles through five games, including 2.5 stops behind the line of scrimmage.




Junior T.J. O'Neill had eight total tackles in the loss at UMass and is now fifth on the Tribe with 23 total stops this season.

#### Veteran Linebackers Contribute

Prior to the start of the season, W&M knew its young defense would have to count on senior linebackers Travis McLaurin and Chris Ndubueze to provide veteran leadership both on and off the field, with each returning after having missed the 2005 season.

But, with sophomore Josh Rutter out with a knee injury for the game with Hofstra, the duo, along with Pigram, helped make up for the loss of one of the league's top defenders. McLaurin made his first at middle linebacker since the 2004 season and finished with five total tackles. He also scooped up C.J. Herbert's blocked field goal and turned in a short return. Ndubueze also enjoyed a solid afternoon, collecting five tackles and one pass break-up. Ndubueze was second on the team with eight tackles vs. VMI on Sept. 23, while McLaurin also had seven total stops vs. the Keydets.

On Saturday at No. UMass, McLaurin recorded eight assisted tackles in the middle, while Ndubueze tallied three. Over the last three games, the duo has combined for 36 total tackles.

#### Herbert Turns in Big Plays vs. Hofstra

Redshirt freshman defensive tackle C.J. Herbert recorded two of the biggest plays of his young career against Hofstra, registering a solo quarterback sack and a blocked field goal. He finished with four total tackles.

With the Tribe holding a narrow 14-13 lead early in the fourth quarter Saturday, Hofstra lined up for a 33-yard field goal attempt that would have given the Pride the lead. But, Herbert skied to deny Rob Zarrilli's attempt, notching the Tribe's first blocked field goal since 2004. Later in the period, with Hofstra facing a first-and-20 from the Tribe 45-yard line, Herbert dropped HU quarterback Anton Clarkson for an 8-yard loss back to the Pride 47.

Herbert has enjoyed a solid rookie season and, along with some of the unit's other youthful defenders, has shown the Tribe faithful that W&M's defense will be strong up front for years to come. Herbert has 17 total tackles on the year, after another solid effort at UMass on Saturday. Herbert tallied six tackles against the Minutemen, including one unassisted stop.

#### More on the Defensive Line

Complimenting the play of Tracy and Herbert up front this season has been the steady contributions from veteran line leaders Josh Wright and Brian Williamson. The senior duo each had standout efforts in the Hofstra game, combining for 12 total tackles with six between them. Wright had a pair of unassisted stops and forced a fumble, his first of the season, while Williamson also had two solo stops and assisted on another behind the line of scrimmage.

Wright has put together a solid senior campaign through five games with 17 total tackles, including 3.5 stops for loss. He's tied for the team and league lead with two fumble recoveries and also has 1.5 quarterback sacks and a pass break-up to his credit.

Another bright spot along the defensive front has been junior T.J. O'Neill, who has adjusted nicely at defensive end after playing at linebacker during his first three years in the program. O'Neill was second on the team at UMass with eight total tackles and now has 23 total on the season to rank fifth on the team. O'Neill has recorded a solo quarterback sack this season and has recovered a pair of fumbles.

#### True Freshmen Contribute Against VMI

The Tribe's true freshman duo at corner, David Caldwell and Max Harris, contributed in the win over VMI on Sept. 23, as the pair combined to record seven total tackles and a formed fumble. Caldwell tallied five stops, including two unassisted, while Harris added two unassisted tackles and registered the first forced fumble of his career in the fourth quarter. Caldwell has nine tackles in three games, while Harris has seen playing time in the last two.

The two are the first Tribe true freshman defenders to see playing time at corner since Hasani Cameron in 1998.

#### Reserve Defenders See Action Against VMI

With the one-sided score in the fourth quarter against VMI, several of the Tribe's reserve defenders had a chance to get on the field, and most took advantage of the opportunity. Junior linebacker Ryan Horvath recorded a careerhigh four tackles, including two unassisted stops, while redshirt freshman Sean Lissemore, who continues to work his way into the tackle rotation, tallied four assists. Sophomore safety David Houff recorded three tackles, including a nice open field solo stop. Junior end Ryan Jones made three tackles and recovered a fourth quarter fumble, while tackle Daniel Pulley registered a career-best three tackles.

Comments from Monday's Atlantic 10 Conference Call:

#### Comment's on the 48-7 loss at Massachusetts Saturday:

JL: I thought we went against a really good UMass team. I thought UMass was every bit as good as we thought they would be, and they executed and played very well. We had a hard time against a very good team. I thought we played hard. But, we needed to play a whole lot better to compete with them. They're strong in all aspects of the game.



#### When did you decide to switch quarterbacks and what was the thought process behind it?:

JL: We looked at it during the week, and we increased Mike's [Potts] snaps during the week. I don't think, offensively, we've been playing as well as we need to play, and Mike deserved a shot. It wasn't that Jake [Phillips] wasn't playing well. Jake played very well, but the fact we were not being as effective as we'd like to be offensively, it was worth a shot with Mike. We gave him a shot, and I thought he played well.

#### Will you stick with the same situation this week [against Liberty]?:

JL: It will still be evaluated this week. It is not as if someone beat someone out. We've got two quarterbacks who can play.

#### Comments on the running game:

JL: I think when you're down against a good defense bringing people [on the blitz], you're not going to spend time running the ball just to kill clock. I know we have to improve our running game, but I don't think the game up there was a true indication of where we are with the running game. We do have to run the ball better and get more balance, but we got in a situation [at UMass] where there was a lot of pressure. They do a heck of a job on defense.

### Was this a game where maybe losing defensive players like linebacker Josh Rutter and free safety Zach Stout caught up with you a little bit, or was it just such an excellent performance by UMass?:

JL: Not having those guys didn't help. But, I don't know if you can blame it on that. [UMass] was very good, very physical. They were moving it around, and when you get a game like that, you get some guys sometimes who get caught up in the game and try to freelance, rather than play their assignments or keys, or trust their reads. We kind of got carried away with some things. And, one problem leads to another problem, and next thing you know you've got a whole bunch of problems out there.

#### Comments on Mike Potts' play at quarterback vs. UMass:

JL: Mike played a very solid game. I think there are plays that I'd like for him to read more, and he could have done better. But, a quarterback's performance level is dictated by the people around him, and he has to have help from receivers and help from the line. But again, I thought Mike played a solid game.

### Considering the time you spent with [former W&M assistant and current Liberty defensive coach] Tom Clark on your staff, are you surprised with the success Liberty's defense has had?:

JL: No, no not at all. Tom is a good coach. Tom's a very solid coach. I haven't looked at all the tapes yet, but they are very talented on defense and obviously they are very well coached on defense. No, it doesn't surprise me.

#### You talked about [Liberty's] defense, but what else do you see from Liberty this week?:

JL: I haven't really looked at their offense, but they have two very good quarterbacks and do different things with their quarterbacks, switching it up a little bit. They have good effort, and they're winning. They played Wake Forest, and I thought they played well. They very well could have won [against] Towson [Lost, 10-3]. It was a close game, and the other games they have won pretty easily. With the new staff, I think they've got them playing with a lot of enthusiasm, very hard, and they're very solid in what they're doing.

### After last year's 56-0 victory over Liberty in Williamsburg, how do you sell you're team on the fact that maybe this Liberty team is different?:

JL: Well, number one, I think our guys are intelligent enough to look at tapes and know when they see a good team. And, I think when they look at the tapes they will see Liberty is a good team. There's no question about that. With that said, I think they'll look at the games we've played this year, and the mistakes we've made and things we haven't done, and understand we've got to get better. That is the bottom line. We have to improve as a football team.

# Making An Impact: Facility Upgrades 7

### The Jimmye Laycock Football Center

On Friday, Sept. 15, ground was broken on the Jimmye Laycock Football Center, a future 30,000-square foot complex that will be located at the northwest corner of the stadium on what is the Tribe's football practice field at a cost of \$11 million.

The ceremony was attended by many prominent alumni and former players, as well a number of friends and donors to the Athletics Department.

The center will provide a new home for team and coaches lockers, an athletic training room, an equipment storage area, coaches offices, conference rooms, and administrative support areas — as well as an entrance that will include a Tribe Football Hall of



the many guests for Friday's ground-breaking ceremony for the Jimmye Laycock Center.

an entrance that will include a Tribe Football Hall of Fame space. The project is scheduled to be finished in the fall of 2007.

The two-story football complex was designed by Moseley Architects out of Virginia Beach and HOK Sport, an internationally renowned architectural firm based in Kansas City, Mo., whose clients include sports venues at nearly every level, including Oriole Park at Camden Yards.

Officials worked closely with the building designers to ensure the complex complements the architecture of Zable Stadium and conforms to the campus design guidelines.

#### FieldTurf Installation at Zable Stadium

During the spring, the W&M Athletics Department announced plans for the conversion of the natural grass playing surface in Zable Stadium to a state of the art, synthetic playing surface for the 2006 football season.

In July, the installation of the new playing surface, FieldTurf Pro, was completed, giving the Tribe one of the nation's finest playing fields. The installation, at an estimated total cost of \$840,000, was performed by Ballard Sports out of Cary, N.C.

FieldTurf features a non-abrasive fiber surface that resembles natural grass blades. Its blend of specially treated Polyethylene fibers prevents abrasions, or "rug burn". Unlike traditional synthetic turf, which relied on an

underlying shock pad for player comfort and safety, FieldTurf grass fibers are surrounded and stabilized by a special blend of "synthetic earth" - a mixture of smooth, rounded silica sand and rubber granules. The sand and rubber are precision layered and provide a stable, resilient, uniform, shock-absorbing surface.

The Tribe's playing field is the same surface used by 24 NFL teams, including the Detroit Lions, host of Super Bowl XL in 2006. It is a football-dedicated surface and only has markings specific to the sport.

The FieldTurf project is the second major completed upgrade at the venerable stadium, as last season saw the school raise \$650,000 to place permanent light fixtures at Zable.

## In the Spotlight

#### **Trevor McLaurin. Senior. Linebacker**

Q: Where are you from?: I'm from Wilmington, Delaware.

Q: From when you were in high school, you and your identical twin brother, Travis (the team's starting middle linebacker) have always been on the same teams in the same games. Do you two have any out-of-sports interests together?: Nothing really organized, just simple stuff. We both like to cook, and we both like going to the movies, and back in the day, we used to be some mean basketball players on the streets at the local parks, but we gave that up for football, so that was about it. Cooking, movies, and a little bit of basketball.

Q: What kind of cooking did you do?: We do it all, we do breakfast, we do dinner, Thanksgiving, desserts, cakes, cinnamon buns, anything we want

Q: Where does your interest in cooking come from?: In high school, you had to take a type of elective, and I wasn't really into auto shop, and I wasn't into tech ed or computers, but I like to eat, so why not learn how to cook?

Q: Between the two of you, which one has the specialties in what?: I'm more the pastry man, Travis is more of your lean meats and your side dishes. You know, we come together to make a great meal.

Q: Would you say you and your brother complement each other as individuals, as well?: Definitely. I'm the more outgoing, social one, while Travis is more reserved. So when it's time to be reserved, he'll make it more reserved and when it's time to cut loose, and be outgoing and social, you know, I'm the one to get everybody talking and introducing him and everything and bring him out of his shell. Once you get Travis going, he is very funny in his own right.



**Q: Did you guys ever consider going to a different school?:** There was a brief moment when I was considering going to James Madison, while he was intent on coming to William and Mary all the way. I thought about it, and going to school with your brother makes the transition a lot easier, and it made it a lot easier on my parents.

Q: What are your plans for after graduation?: I'm thinking about staying in the Virginia area, or going down to where my mother lives, in Florida, around the Fort Lauderdale area, and working in the fields of financial annalist, or as a financial advisor.

Q: What is the one thing about the both of you that is most similar, and then the one thing about you that is the most dissimilar?: I think the most similar thing is just our love for football and working out. Dissimilar, it would be our social lives. Travis likes to kick back and relax and unwind. I like to be out more, rolling around, hanging out with different groups of people and everything.

Q: What has been your favorite class at W&M?: Beginning acting, I'm in there with Travis and we did some improv work. We're also in there with [senior tailbacks] Elijah Brooks and Delmus Coley. You get that improv going and you never know what's coming out. So we just get to let loose for two hours and twenty minutes and have a great time.

Q: What's been your hardest class?: I'm an economics major, but I'm going to say Introduction to Astronomy. Astronomy and physics, that's for the very few, the proud, that's who that's for.

Q: What was the last book you read?: The last book I read was Fast Food Nation. I read that and it was a little, it was about McDonald's and the fast food industry.

Q: What is the one movie or TV show that would make you from stop flipping channels?: If it were a TV show, it would be The Wire. If it were a movie, it would be Usual Suspects. Hands down, I close my textbook, and I won't watch any football if those two things are on TV.

Q: In your room right now, do you have anything that you've kept since you were a young kid?: I used to have a stuffed koala bear. I had it for a long time and then I ended up losing it in transition, moving from apartment to apartment, so who knows where it is at now. I was looking for him really hard, but I couldn't find him, so I sort of let go, I guess.

Q: What, between Travis and yourself, is most likely to cause a dispute?: Either DVD or CD, who's movies belong to whom, you know, who had it last, why did you have it in your room. DVD's are substantially important in our house. If a DVD goes missing, we're knocking on each other's door, "Have you seen my DVD?" because that's the first assumption, Travis or Trevor took it

Q: What would you consider your best non-athletic skill, besides cooking?: Doing laundry, my mother taught me well. When we started playing little league football, she said, "you can wash your own clothes".

Q: This is I guess the first time you've been able to line up with each other since high school?: Oh yeah, it's definitely been one of the most important things, especially both of us going through knee surgeries, and you know, the different set backs that we've both had. Our last year, I get to look to my right and my left and see my brother right there next to me; it's a wonderful feeling. Q: Over the course of the past senior interviews, we've established that senior cornerback Richard Riley is the best entertainer and that senior safety Zach Stout would make the best lawyer, now I'd like to know who would make the best philosopher?: That's a deep one, everybody has their moments... that's tough. I would have to go with Cody Morris, because he leads by example, he's a captain, but he doesn't really talk a lot. So when he talks, it's something worthwhile, it's something really meaningful.

Q: Five years from now, which of your teammates will have the most interesting job?

[Former linebacker] Ryan Nickell, because he left to go be in the Air Force and officer training for fighter pilot school, and in five years, I'm pretty sure there are going to be some things he can't tell me he does, because it's going to be classified information. Whatever planes he's flying and everything. Where he's been, what he's done, and what he can't tell me.

Q: This has been my biggest question for the two of you since you came to campus, who wins the wrestling match between you and your brother?: If it's a wrestling match, Travis would win, especially in a closed space, but if it's a boxing match with some space, I'm taking Travis out, hands down. Travis is brute strength, and wrestling that's his thing. But when it comes to the hands, I'm a little bit quicker, and I could take him out of there. That's all there is to it. And don't let Travis tell you differently.
