State-rivals William and Mary and the Virginia Military Institute meet Saturday for the 62nd consecutive season and the 83rd time overall in Lexington. The Tribe, ranked 11th in the latest Sports Network Top 25, will be looking for its 20th-straight victory over the Keydets in the ninth-longest annual series in the I-AA ranks. W&M holds a 47-33-2 all-time advantage over the Institute, and the Tribe has not lost at Alumni Memorial Field since 1985. The College will also be looking for its first victory of the young 2005 season, after falling in its season-opener, 36-24, last Thursday night at Marshall. Saturday's game is W&M's second of three consecutive road contests to open the season, as the Tribe will open Atlantic 10 play next weekend at Rhode Island. VMI enters Saturday's date with a 1-0 ledger after downing Davidson, 33-0, this past weekend in Lexington. The victory was VMI's first shutout since blanking Richmond 14-0 on October 23, 1982.

A returning All-American, Greg Kuehn started the 2005 season off in mid-season form, drilling a 47-yard field goal in the season-opener Thursday night at Marshall ... The kick surpassed his season-long of 46 yards a year ago and brought his career total to 47 ... With 47 career field goals, Kuehn now stands one shy of second-place Brian Shallcross (1994-97) on the W&M all-time list and the Atlantic 10 career chart ... Steve Christie (1986-89) holds the W&M career record with 57, while former Hofstra kick Chris Onorato holds the A10 record with 50 ... Kuehn also nailed three extra points against Marshall, bringing his career total to 126, two shy of the

W&M career record of 128, held by Shallcross ... 2004: Named A10 Special Teams Player of the Year and a Second Team All-America pick by the Sports Network ... Also a third team AP All-American and First Team All-A10 selection... Named to first team honors by both the Atlantic 10 and VaSID ... Led all of I-AA with 19 field goals ... Established a school record with 99 consecutive successful extrapoint attempts, a streak that dated back to 2002, before missing in the playoffs against Delaware ... Shattered previous mark of 50 consecutive made PATs held by Brett Sterba ... Tied for the league lead and ranked fourth nationally with an average of 1.36 field goals per game ... Converted 57 of 58 PAT tries overall Potomac Falls High School: Three-year letterwinner at kicker for coach Wes Driskill ... Named honorable mention all-state in his senior season ... Selected first-team All-Loudon County by the Washington Post ... Set school records for field goals in a season (7), field goals in a career (13), extra points in a career (75) and touchbacks in a season (39) ... Lettered four times in soccer ... Adam O'Connor

Returning All-American defensive end Adam O'Connor recorded three total tackles in the season-opening loss at Marshall Thursday and was credited with two quarterback hurries ... Team quad-captain and a preseason all-league selection ... 2004: Asserted himself as one of the league's dominant pass rushers, gaining Third Team AP All-America and Second Team All-A10 status ... Tied for second in the league with 8.0 sacks and ranked fifth with 15.5 TFL ... Finished the year with 53 total tackles and added nine quarterback hurries and a fumble recovery ... Recorded at least 1.0 TFL 10 of 14 games, including the final six ... Earned A10 De-

fensive Player of the Week honors after registering 3.0 sacks against Villanova ... Three sacks against the Wildcats were just 0.5 shy of the W&M single-game record held by Luke Cullinane (3.5) ... Had five total tackles, including a sack and 1.5 TFL, and forced a fumble against VMI ... Tallied eight tackles in the win over Northeastern, including a critical sack on the first play of overtime to earn defensive player of the week honors from the coaching staff ... Made a season-high nine total tackles, 1.5 TFL, in a win at James Madison ... Ragsdale High School: Two-year letterwinner at defensive end and offensive line for coach Tommy Norwood ... Twice named all-conference at both offensive and defensive line ... Recorded 105 tackles and five sacks in his senior year ... Also lettered in baseball, basketball and track ... Personal: Son of Janice and Bob O'Connor ... Enjoys working out, playing golf and watching movies in his spare time ... Majoring in history ... Born January 27, 1983.

Comments from Monday's Atlantic 10 football coaches conference call.

Comments on Thursday's 36-24 loss at Division I-A Marshall.

I thought we played hard, and I thought we competed. Obviously, we made too many mistakes that kept us from winning the ball

game, but I think there were a lot of positives that came out of the game. We can see a lot of things we need to work on. But, we competed, we played hard, and we gave ourselves a chance to win.

At first look, do you get the same sense you did last year against North Carolina [49-38 loss in 2004 season-opener], in terms of a confidence boost?

It's a different team this year with a different makeup. And, Marshall was a different setting, obviously. We felt good about some of the things that came out of the game. I was pleased we were able to run the football as well as we did, and I think that is something we really need to do this year. Defensively, I thought we played the run pretty well. I thought our kicking game was pretty good. We covered kicks well, and we did a nice job overall. Those are the kinds of things that maybe you don't expect when you're going in against a 1-A team. To come out and feel pretty good about those areas is good. There are a few things we didn't take advantage of, in [Marshall turnover and missed field goal]. We had turnovers, but we made it worse by turning it over [in the red zone]. That is really disappointing, and preventing the mistakes that led to the turnovers are what we have to get better at.

Updates on injury situations.

- Sophomore wide receiver Joe Nicholas We will find out if he gets clearance from the doctor on Tuesday. If he gets clearance from the doctor, he will be back.
- Senior linebacker Thad Wheeler Same situation as Nicholas. We're still waiting on the doctors to finish tests and evaluate the situation. I do not know if he'll be ready or not.
- Sophomore quarterback Mike Potts Potts had a minor ankle injury in the game, but I anticipate him being ready to play.
- Senior guard Ryan Lumm Ryan Lumm is out for the season. He underwent surgery on his ankle.

Comments on sophomore quarterback Mike Potts' first-career start.

I thought he was good in some areas, and I think he has some areas he needs to improve in. He needs to protect the football a little better, but he made some good throws. We also had some drops that we can't have. I thought he handled himself very well. He made some very good decisions and some good throws, but he was a little inconsistent. That is something we're go-

ing to continue to work on. For a first game, though, I thought it was fine.

You mentioned you were surprised at the effectiveness of your running game. What was the surprise, and who shined there?

When you're going against a I-A team that is physical and athletic like Marshall, we weren't sure how well we could run it. I thought the offensive line did a very good job the entire game. [Senior] Patrick Mulloy, at center, had an excellent game. Overall, I thought the offensive line played very well, not only in the running game but in pass protection as well. I thought [junior running back] Elijah Brooks, at the tailback position, really stepped it up [career-high 149 rushing yards]. Elijah had a very good preseason, and we were anticipating him playing a lot, but he carried it more and played more than we thought he would [against Marshall]. We planned to divide the carries with the other backs, but Elijah was running so well and making cuts, we stuck with him. I think it was a solid combination of the offensive line's play and Elijah running very well.

Do you see something different with Brooks this year? Has he improved significantly?

I think he's healthier. He had a nagging knee injury most of last year, but he has recovered. He probably lost a little weight as well. He's got himself in great shape, and that combination is paying off for him. Plus, he has a year of experience in our program. I think all those things together, and the noticeable preseason he had are paying off. He's a little quicker, and he's seeing things well. He's holding up well, and he is running hard.

Comments on Saturday's opponent, VMI.

Well, it's always a big game with VMI because of the interstate rivalry. VMI is a tough place to play with the corps of cadets and the excitement they bring. But, this VMI team is the most-experienced I think I've ever seen. They have just about everybody back, and they have a quarterback [Sophomore Jonathan Wilson], who missed last year but is back in their lineup. VMI has a very experienced, veteran team with an outstanding quarterback. They were very impressive in the opening win against Davidson. They completely dominated that game, so we better improve upon what we did Thursday night.

Where do you need the most improvement?

I think consistency on both sides of the ball. Defensively, we need to improve on our pass rush and our pass coverage. That is somewhere we really have to get better. Offensively, we need to get more consistent in our passing game, and I think we need to catch better. We need to be more decisive with our routes. The quarterbacks have to make reads a little bit better, and we have to take care of the football better.

WILLIAM AND MARY GAME NOTES

Game 2 - at VMI - Sept. 10, 2005

THE W&M-VMI SERIES

Serious History: Few schools can boast such long and storied histories as the College of William and Mary (founded in 1693) and the Virginia Military Institute (founded in 1839). This same history can be applied to the football programs, as each has sponsored a team for the better part of the last century. The two schools have met on the gridiron 82 times, including at least once a year for the last 62 seasons, including 2005.

The 62 consecutive games are the ninth longest, uninterrupted series currently being contested in the I-AA ranks. The Tribe has won 19-consecutive games in the series, which stands as the second longest winning streak in an active uninterrupted series in the I-AA rank (the longest being Grambling's 28-straight wins over Prairie View).

Laycock and McCombs: Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock and VMI's Cal McCombs will be leading their teams into battle on Saturday, but in 1973-74, they were on the same sideline as coaches at The Citadel. McCombs was the team's wide receivers coach, while Laycock coached the offensive backfield at the time. The 1973 team finished 3-8 under future NFL coach Bobby Ross, while the 1974 squad went 4-7. Coincidentally, both seasons featured a loss to William and Mary and a loss to VMI.

VMI Connections: First-year Tribe assistant coach Brent Barth is a 2003 graduate of VMI, where he was as three-time All-Southern conference punter and a two-time All-American at the position for the Keydets.

Current assistant head coach and offensive line coach Bob Solderitch had a two-year stint as an assistant at VMI (1994-95), overseeing both the offensive and defensive lines.

VMI assistant Greg Shockley is in first season in Lexington, after spending the 2004 season as tight ends and special teams coach at W&M

Sophomore running back Tony Viola's brother, Andy, is in his redshirt freshman season at VMI.

TEAM NOTES

Give Me Five: With five wins this season, the Tribe can reach the 500-win mark in total victories for the program. William and Mary enters the VMI game with an all-time record of 495-485-11 (in 110 previous seasons of football).

Big South Battles: The Keydets are in their third season of play in the five-team Big South Conference, after ending their long-time run in the Southern Conference. Saturday's game is the first of two Big-South battles for the Tribe this season, as Liberty will visit Williamsburg for Family Weekend on Sept. 24, which is also W&M's home opener. W&M defeated both VMI and Liberty last season, bringing the Tribe's record to a perfect 3-0 against teams from the

Big South.

Frequently Asked Question: If a general poll of the most commonly asked question that comes into the W&M Sports Information Department were taken, one that would surely emerge in the top three would be:

"What is next year's Division I-A game?"

Well, for those inquiring minds, here for the first time is the College's tentative I-A slate going out for the next six seasons:

2006 – Maryland 2007 – Virginia Tech 2008 – NC State 2009 – Virginia 2010 – North Carolina 2011 – Virginia

Familiar Faces, New Places: During spring workouts, linebackers coach Matt McLeod was promoted to defensive coordinator. Also, Scott Boone, an offensive assistant in 2004, has taken over the secondary. Together, the pair brings more than 29 years of coaching experience to the Tribe's defense.

In the offseason, Laycock welcomed three new assistants to the program in **Chris Willetts** ('02), who handles tight ends and special teams, **Brent Barth**, an offensive and special teams assistant, and **Wes Dodson**, a defensive assistant. Also, Mike Bonfiglio joined the defensive staff as a volunteer assistant at the start of fall camp.

Road Warriors: Saturday's contest at VMI marks the Tribe's second road game of the season, after falling at Marshall, 36-24 last week. Also, in a scheduling quirk, the College's conference opener at Rhode Island next weekend is the 10th consecutive year W&M has opened its conference play on the road.

And while no one is counting, 2005 will mark the 11th-straight season (since 1993) that the Tribe has more road games (six) than home games (five) on its schedule.

Did You Know?: William and Mary's game at Virginia Military marks the second of three road games to start the season for the College. Amazingly, the Tribe has started three of the last five season with three road games (also in 2001 and 2003). Perhaps even harder to believe is the fact that since joining the Atlantic 10 in 1993, the Tribe has only had one season (1998) in which it didn't play two of its first three games on the road.

Back for More: This fall head coach Jimmye Lay-cock returned four players who earned all-conference honors in 2004, which is one less than New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Hofstra for the most returning all-league performers from 2004. Leading the way for the Tribe is first team place kicker Greg Kuehn, who is one of eight offensive first teamers around the league back in 2005. Joining Kuehn for the Tribe are junior offensive guard Cody Morris (Second Team), senior defensive end Adam O'Connor (Second Team) and senior defensive back Stephen Cason (Second Team). The College had nine total all-league citations in 2004, which trailed only James Madison and New Hampshire, both with

In fact, since 1993 when W&M joined the Yankee Conference, which later became the Atlantic 10, no school has had more all-conference selections than the Tribe's 117. For comparison's sake, only Delaware is in the same ballpark with 106 all-league award winners in that same span, while James Madison has had 89 and Massachusetts has had 79.

No Flags on the Play: One of the trademarks of Laycock's program over the years has been discipline, both off the field and on it, and the 2004 season was no different, as W&M once again was the least penalized team in the A10. In fact, despite playing 14 total games, the Tribe was penalized only 64 times last season, the lowest mark in the league. W&M's average of 39.2 penalty yards per game was the lowest in the conference, a full 10 yards fewer than the

next closest opponent (Richmond, 49.5).

The 2005 campaign has started no different, as the Tribe drew only four flags on Thursday night at Marshal for a total of 18 yards.

Play It Again, Sam: William and Mary will play host to 2004 playoff opponents James Madison and Delaware on consecutive weekends (Nov. 5 and 12th) this season. The Dukes have never played back-to-back games in Williamsburg since the two starting meeting as conference opponents in 1993. In fact, one has to go back to the 1978-1979 seasons to find the last time JMU made consecutive appearances in Zable. The Blue Hens last played consecutive games in Zable over the 1986-87 seasons, when it faced the same scenario, as it made a playoff appearance in Williamsburg, then returned the next season for a regular season contest.

After W&M ran the table at Zable during the 2004 regular season, and won its first two playoff games at the friendly confines of Cary Field, the Dukes, with their memorable semifinal win, remain the last team to defeat the College in Zable. JMU's 24-17 win on 10/18/2003 was the last home loss for the Tribe, before the College ripped off nine-straight victories leading up to last season's semifinal.

Light It Up: Speaking of the Nov. 5 contest with James Madison, the W&M Athletics Department officially released on Tuesday that the game will start at 7 p.m. Construction on permanent lights at Zable Stadium is expected to begin soon, and the Nov. 5 game will be the first-ever regular season night game played at Zable Stadium.

THE LAST MEETING

William and Mary 42, VMI 6

WILLIAMSBURG (9/25/04) - All-American candidate Lang Campbell threw for 137 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the first half to surpass the 3,000-yard mark for his career, as W&M used four second-quarter touchdowns and another outstanding defensive effort to knock off state-rival VMI, 42-6, in front of 8,101 fans at Zable Stadium.

Playing on his 23rd birthday, Campbell went over the 3,000-yard plateau in the first quarter and went on to complete 11-of-15 passes for 160 yards to move into ninth place (3,136) on the College's career passing yardage list. With two TD passes, Campbell also moved into eighth place (28) on the career list at W&M.

The Tribe defense forced four turnovers for the second time this season (UNC) and held the Keydets to 197 total yards, the first time a W&M defense surrendered fewer than 200 total yards since a season-opening win at UMass in 2001 (146). Dating back to a 9-7 win at UNH on Sept. 18, W&M has not allowed a touchdown for over seven consecutive quarters, a feat that has not been accomplished since 1995.

Sophomore linebacker Ryan Nickell recorded interceptions on consecutive VMI offensive plays from scrimmage, while all-conference linebacker Travis McLaurin and Chris Ndubueze each had six tackles and defensive end Adam O'Connor recorded five stops, a sack and three quarterback hurries.

Senior tailback Jon Smith led the Tribe ground game with 52 yards and two TDs, as he inched closer to 2,000 rushing yards for his career (1,899).

TEAM OFFENSIVE NOTES

Did You Know?: William and Mary has not had a running back record back-to-back 100-yard afternoons since the ninth and 10th games of the 2003 season, when then-freshman tailback Delmus Coley sprinted to 100-plus outings vs. Hofstra and New Hampshire, respectively. Coley is also the last Tribe player to record 20+ carries on consecutive weeks, as well (same two games).

William and Mary had only two individual 100-yard rushing performances during the entire 2004 season, as Jon Smith gained 113 yards at Towson, while Brooks went for 120 vs. Hampton in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs.

Notable Firsts: The following are some interesting firsts that took place in the Tribe's season opener at Marshall:

- Sophomore QB Mike Potts made his first collegiate start.
- Redshirt freshman WR Joe Marianacci made his first career catch (nine-yard reception in the third guarter)
- True freshmen D.J. McAulay (WR) and Mike Pigram (LB) saw action making them the first true freshman to see game action for the College since current all-conference guard Cody Morris played in the first game of the 2003 season (at Western Michigan).
- Redshirt freshman Josh Rutter (linebacker) and Marianacci (WR) each made starts in their first game of collegiate action. The last Tribe player to start in the first game he played was current corner Richard Riley, opened the 2003 season as the first-team corner vs. Western Michigan.
- Redshirt freshman safety Kevin Allen recorded the first interception of his career in the second quarter. The turnover led to a Tribe touchdown.
- Sophomore tailback Tony Viola scored his first collegiate touchdown on his first collegiate reception. His catch put the Tribe up by a point midway through the third quarter (24-23). Fullback Matt Otey and wide receiver John Taylor each accomplished the feat last season.
- Sophomore punter Blair Pritchard did a solid job in his first action as a punter, averaging 40.0 yds/att on his four efforts at Marshall. Junior Corey Davis also attempted his first two career punts and averaged 32.0.

Holding Their Own: In the last 12 games against I-A opponents, W&M has posted some impressive offensive numbers, including Thursday night's contest at Marshall. W&M gained 174 yards on the ground against the Herd, but wound up with a net of 155. Leading the way was junior tailback Elijah Brooks, who ran for a career-high 149 yards on 28 attempts. The Tribe also gained 204 yards through the air, led by sophomore Mike Potts who tossed for 164 yards and two scores on 16-of-30 passing. Figuring in the numbers from Marshall, the Tribe has averaged 306.4 yards per game against I-A opponents, including 215.1 yards a game through the air, and

A Tradition of Quarterbacks: Longevity isn't the only measure of success for the Tribe's QBs, as since joining the Atlantic 10 Football conference in 1993, a William and Mary quarterback has earned some variety of all-conference honor in nine of the 12 seasons, including each the last seven-straight campaigns.

Going hand-in-hand with the postseason honors is the fact that in seven of the 12 seasons in league play, a Tribe QB has turned in the conference's top QB efficiency rating.

TEAM DEFENSIVE NOTES

Stepping Up: Although the result was another painful loss to a Division I-A opponent on Thursday at Marshall, the Tribe faithful certainly witnessed an improved defensive operation, compared to the 2004 season-opener at North Carolina. Perhaps the most telling sign came on third-down situations, where the Herd converted just three of 11 third-down chances. In 2004, UNC gained a new set of downs on 10 of its 12 third-down chances.

In the second half, the Tribe defense al-


lowed only one Marshall offensive touchdown a sack on the play as well. and 110 total offensive yards. In fact, in the third quarter alone, the Tribe yielded just eight total yards of offense, as W&M rallied from a 23-10 halftime deficit to take a 24-23 lead. The Herd had two possessions in the third quarter, one ending with a punt after a three-and-out, the other ending when senior defensive end Jonas Watson forced a fumble that was recovered by iunior linebacker Rvan Nickell.

Another big improvement came in the Tribe's rush defense, as W&M allowed 103 total rushing yards at Marshall, an average of 3.4 yards per attempt, compared to 341 total rushing yards for the Tar Heels last season, an average of 7.6 yards per attempt. Take it Away: Another positive for the defense to take away from Thursday's loss at Marshall was the two turnovers the Tribe caused. Redshirt freshman safety Kevin Allen stepped in front of a pass in the second quarter and recorded his first career interception. The turnover gave W&M possession at the Herd 27-yard line and led to Matt Otey's fumble recovery in the end zone for a touchdown, which knotted the score at 10-10.

The Tribe's second forced turnover came in the third quarter, when senior defensive end Jonas Watson hit MU quarterback Bernie Morris behind the line of scrimmage, jarring the ball loose and into the hands of junior linebacker Ryan Nickell. Watson was credited with

Getting Fresh: In addition to Rutter, three other redshirt freshmen and one true freshman saw the field for the first time on Thursday at Marshall, while a Tribe veteran, junior defensive lineman Brian Neely, assumed his new role on the defensive side for the first time.

The other two redshirt freshmen to see action were cornerback Derek Cox and safety Kevin Allen. Cox recorded a solo tackle, while Allen, as mentioned, registered the first interception of his career and added an assisted tackle

True freshman linebacker Michael Pigram, an all-state selection at Hopewell High School last fall, saw snaps on Thursday as well and was credited with three total tackles.

Neely asserted his role in the defensive tackle rotation and was a key player in the Tribe's success in stopping the Marshall running attack (103 yards), as he recorded a pair of tackles.

INDIVIDUAL OFFENSIVE NOTES

Brooks A Baller: One of the first buzzes out of the College's preseason drills was the improved speed and quickness of junior tailback Elijah Brooks.

The one-time Kent State transfer made a positive impact on the team's successes in 2004 by contributing 661 rushing yards and an additional 211 receiving (on 26 catches) in his first season on campus.

But, if the early returns are any indication, the 5-9, 210-pounder out of Maryland's De-Matha High has only given a glimpse what's to come. After spending the off-season rehabbing a knee injury that had nagged at his effectiveness in 2004, Brooks came out at Marshall and ran with authority, slashing the Herd for 149 yards on a bruising 28 totes (an average of 5.3 yds/att). While the majority of his damage was done between the tackles, Brooks did find success bouncing plays to the outside and showed a good burst to find the edge of Marshall defense. Split equally between the first and second halves, Brooks remained strong the entire 60 minutes, as he carried 14 times before the break for 71 yards and came out after the intermission and ran for 79 yards on his final 14

The following are some notes on Brooks' opening day performance:

- · His 28 carries are the most for a Tribe back in a single game since Jon Smith hauled the ball 32 times vs. New Hampshire in 2002. For comparison's sake, the College's heaviest workload for a back last season was Smith's 23 rushes in the ankle deep mud at New Hampshire (for 63 yards).
- · His 149 rushing yards were the most for a W&M back since Smith gained 198 vs. UNH in
- His 149 rushing yards are the most for a Tribe back in a season opener since Robert Green gained 180 vs. the Citadel in 1990.
- His 149 rushing yards are the most for a Tribe back vs. an I-A opponent since Rob Green went for 181 yards (on 25 carries) vs. Navy in 1991.

- By grabbing three passes for 27 yards, including a 19-yard TD reception, Brooks has now caught at least one pass in every regular season game he has played at the College (12straight). The only career game Brooks has not recorded a reception in was the Tribe's national semi-final contest vs. JMU.
- · Brooks established career highs for rushing yards (149), total yards (176), carries (28) and caught his first TD pass.

Moving Company: One of the team's off-season focuses was on improving the running game. Outstanding William and Mary Offensive Line Coach Bob Solderitch and the staff challenged the front, which featured four returning veterans, to be more physical and effective in its run blocking. It certainly appears as if the men in the trenches responded to the task, as the College's offensive front was dominant at times vs. I-A Marshall. Even with the loss of two-year starter, senior guard Ryan Lumm, on the first play of the second half, the Tribe still powered out 155 rushing yards (on 37 total attempts) and produced 359 total yards.

Senior center and team quad-captain Pat Mulloy led the charges, as he could be spotted leveling defenders both at the line of scrimmage and down field. One defining two-play example came in the first series of the second half, as he hustled down field on a swing pass to WR Josh Lustig and de-cleated a defensive back which opened an alley for a 12-yard gain. The next snap saw Mulloy completely level a Herd linebacker with a peal back block on a broken reverse attempt, preventing a doubledigit loss in yards for the College.

Despite never having earned all-conference recognition, Mulloy has played at an elite level in each of the last three seasons and brings more than four-years of starting experience to his position. He enters the year completely healthy and should be a strong candidate for post-season honors in 2005.

Lumm suffered a broken leg on the first play of the second half, senior Matt Ridjaneck came off the bench and made a seamless transition from the reserve ranks to first-team performer. The Tribe's o-line didn't miss a beat and proceeded to power consecutive scoring drives of 80- and 62-yards.

Lumm's injury most likely spells the end of his playing career, but it does provide Ridjaneck, his close friend, the first opportunity to start at William and Mary. The 6-4, 285-pound product of Monaca, PA participated on 81 offensive snaps last season and has been one of the hardest workers in the team's off-season training regime.

Did You Know?: The College has not had an offensive lineman miss a start since center Pat Mulloy injured his ankle in preseason camp prior to the 2003 season. He missed the first three games of that season and then started the last seven. William and Mary had gone 21-straight games without an offensive lineman missing a start.

Under Center: Sophomore Mike Potts had a solid outing in his first career start for the College, but it was not without its bumps and bruises. The 6-4, 224 native of Middletown, DE had a difficult first half, completing just four of his 11 attempts for 42 yards. Also included in this half was a sprained ankle that forced him to miss the final two series before the break. But Potts shook off both the injury and the slow start to come out and lead a pair of crisp scoring drives to start the third quarter. Over the course of the two series, the Tribe offense and the hard running of Brooks had the Herd completely on its heels. Potts took advantage of the opportunity by hitting on nine of his 12 attempts for 92 yards. Included in this total were touchdown passes of 19- and 18-yards, respectively.

Potts ended the game with 164 passing yards, hitting on 16 of his 30 passing attempts. He offset his one interception of the afternoon with the two touchdown passes.

As expected, redshirt freshman Jake Phillips also saw his first collegiate game action. He turned a potential sack into a 22-yard connection with tight end Adam Bratton on his first snap from scrimmage and eventually helped move the team to the Marshall 32-yard line. Unfortunately, this drive was stalled when the Tribe fumbled at the MU 25-yard line. Phillips ended his afternoon with two completions in five attempts for 40 yards.

Good Ending: Senior tight end Adam Bratton got his season off to a strong start at Marshall by pulling down three spirals for a team-high 64 yards. His evening included plays of 34, 22 and 12 yards.

This continued what has been something of a hot-streak for the native of Williamsport, PA, as he ended last season recording catches in the last seven consecutive games. In this season ending spurt, Bratton gained 196 yards on 14 grabs and scored four TDs.

Bratton and fellow end, junior Matt Trinkle, were sure-handed targets who did an excellent job of finding room underneath the Herd

coverages. Trinkle matched Bratton's catch total, ending the game with three catches for 12 yards.

Familiar Face: With standout sophomore Joe Nicholas forced to miss the game with an internal injury, senior team quad-captain Josh Lustig was the only receiver on the roster who had started a collegiate game. Past Lustig, who missed all but two games of last season with an ankle injury, the only other Tribe wide out who had played a snap of college football was sure-handed junior John Taylor. Two redshirt freshman in Joe Marianacci and Elliott Mack and true freshman D.J. McAulay rounded out the five-man receiving rotation for the College.

Lustig ended the game with a team-high four catches for 44 yards and also contributed 49 yards on two kick returns.

Hard to Do: William and Mary sophomore fullback Matt Otey ended the game with no carries, catches, rushes, returns or total yards of any variety, yet managed to record a touchdown. With the Tribe facing a first a goal from the Marshall four-yard line, QB Mike Potts set to scrambling around the right end and was heading for the end zone when he was dealt a severe blow by a Herd defensive back just shy of the goal line. The hit knocked the football loose and it rolled into the end zone, where a hustling and alert Otey covered it to record the Tribe's first TD of the season.

Early Returns: Based on Thursday's seasonopener at Marshall, the Tribe will have two bigplay threats returning kickoffs this season. Senior wide receiver Josh Lustig is back in action after missing the final 12 games of the 2004 season with a leg injury and will handle the return duties alongside senior corner Stephen Cason. Lustig, who returned six kicks for a total of 135 yards (22.5 avg) in last year's opener at UNC, tallied 49 yards on two returns at Marshall with most of the damage coming on a 35-yard return in the second quarter. Cason returned two kicks against the Herd as well, totalling 51 yards, including a long of 28. After the first weekend of the season, Cason's average of 25.5 yards per kickoff return ranks fifth in the Atlantic 10, while Lustig is next in sixth (24.5).

INDIVIDUAL DEFENSIVE NOTES

A Tall Order: Undoubtedly, the main focus of opposing offensive line coaches this season will be to slow down All-American defensive end Adam O'Connor. Standing at 6-8, he will at the very least be the first Tribe defender noticed when the huddle breaks.

He is off to a good start in 2005, having recorded three total tackles and a pair of quarterback hurries in the season-opener against Marshall.

In 2004, O'Connor gained Third Team All-America honors from the *Associated Press* after racking up eight sacks, the second-best total in the Atlantic 10. A preseason all-league pick, the Greensboro, N.C. native finished the 2004 campaign with 53 total tackles, 15.5 TFLs, which ranked fifth in the A10, nine quarterback hurries, two pass breakups, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. His eight sacks are the most by a Tribe player since Luke Cullinane pulled down a school-record 12 quarterbacks in 1996.

O'Connor was also named the Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Week on Nov. 7, for his efforts in the Tribe's crucial 37-29 victory over Villanova. O'Connor wreaked havoc in the Wildcats' backfield all afternoon, as he recorded three sacks in the contest, which was just a half-sack short of a W&M single-game record. The single-game record for sacks stands at 3.5, set by Cullinane in 1996, coincidentally against Villanova. O'Connor had five total tackles, all solo, and added another quarterback hurry against the Wildcats.

Dynamite Debut: In his first career start Thursday night, redshirt freshman linebacker Josh Rutter had an impressive debut, recording a game-high 16 total tackles. Four of Rutter's stops were solos. Rutter was also named the coaching staff's special teams player of the week for his work on kick coverage, which included four total tackles.

Good Debut x Two: Along with Rutter, redshirt freshman safety Kevin Allen made his collegiate debut Thursday at Marshall and wasted no time getting his name in the box score.

Already leading 10-3 midway through the second quarter, the Herd intercepted a Tribe pass in the end zone for a touchback, halting a six-play, 25-yard drive, which could have tied the game. On the second play of Marshall's ensuing possession, Allen dove in front of Herd quarterback Bernie Morris' pass to the left side at the MU 27-yard line and recorded his first career interception and the first forced turnover of the season for the Tribe defense.

W&M marched 27 yards on six plays on the resulting possession and knotted the score, 10-10, when Matt Otey recovered a fumble in the end zone.

Allen, who primarily played as part of the Tribe's nickel package, also recorded a tackle in the contest.

Back at it: Senior defensive end Jonas Watson had a big hand in the Tribe's defensive effort Thursday at Marshall. On a second-and-11 in the third quarter, Watson chased down Herd quarterback Bernie Morris from behind and forced a fumble that was recovered by Ryan Nickell at the Marshall 34-yard line. The hit occurred behind the line of scrimmage, so Watson was also credited with a sack and TFL, the unit's first of the season. For Watson, it was picking up right where he left off the 2004 season, when he registered 6.5 sacks which stood as the seventh-best total in the A10. Watson totalled 9.5 TLFs on the campaign, the thirdbest tally on the team, recovered a fumble and added four quarterback hurries.

Trial by fire: Over the last three seasons, the Tribe's punting duties were solidified by all-conference standout Mike Mesi ('04), but with the graduation of Mesi in the spring, the battle for the starting nod at punter has continued into the regular season. Junior Corey Davis, a converted wide receiver, and classmate Blair Pritchard are competing for the job. Davis handled the Tribe's first two punts Thursday at Marshall, averaging 32.0 yards per kick with a long of 38. Pritchard came on and took the Tribe's final four punts of the evening and averaged 40.0 yards per punt with a long of 46 yards. Pritchard also dropped one kick inside the Herd 20-yard line.



HUNTINGTON, WV (9/1/05) -- Junior tailback Elijah Brooks ran for a career-high 149 yards, but Marshall used a game-breaking 70-yard fumble return for a touchdown late in the third quarter to rally for a 36-24 victory over William and Mary at Edwards Stadium.

The Tribe led 24-23 after a pair of touchdown tosses from sophomore quarterback Mike Potts, who was making his first-career start, in the third period and was on the move again deep in MU territory, when Herd linebacker Matt Coach picked up a Potts fumble and raced 70 yards for a touchdown.

After W&M's next drive stalled, the Herd put it away with an 11-play, 84-yard drive capped by Bernie Morris' third touchdown pass of the contest, a 12-yard hook-up with Hiram Moore.

Brooks gained 149 yards on 28 carries, surpassing his previous career mark of 120 set last season at Towson and hauled in a 19-yard scoring reception from Potts that pulled W&M with 23-17 at the 10:29 mark of the third.

After junior linebacker Ryan Nickell recovered a fumble at the Herd 30-yard line that was forced by senior defensive end Jonas Watson, Potts connected with redshirt freshman Tony Viola for an 18-yard touchdown pass, the first of Viola's career, to give W&M its first lead of the game.

Redshirt freshman linebacker Josh Rutter, in his first career start, paced the defense with 16 total tackles, while classmate Kevin Allen recorded the first interception of his career in the first half.
