FIRST AND 10

The 17th-ranked Tribe hosts top-ranked New Hampshire this Saturday in an Atlantic 10 showdown at Zable Stadium. The Wildcats' visit will be W&M's first game against a No. 1 team since 1997, when top-ranked Villanova escaped Williamsburg with a 20-13 victory. The Tribe is coming off its bye week after downing Liberty, 56-0, on Sept. 24. It was W&M's first shutout victory since blanking VMI, 34-0, in 2001. Under Laycock, the College is 13-3 in the last 16 seasons following a bye week, including 8-2 at Zable Stadium. W&M is 8-2 all-time against UNH, 5-1 against the Wildcats at Zable with the only loss coming in 1998 (31-19). Last season, the Tribe edged then 10th-ranked UNH, 9-7, in Durham, after the Wildcats had rung up road victories over defending national champion and top-ranked Delaware and Division I-A Rutgers. UNH brings a pair of Payton Award hopefuls into Saturday's contest in sophomore quarterback Ricky Santos (107-145, 1396 yds, 12 TD, 5 INT) and junior wide receiver David Ball (25 rec., 481 yds, 7 TD). The duo steers the league's top offense (531.5 yds/g) and top passing offense (350.2 yds/g).

JIMMYE LAYCOCK



Comments from Monday's Atlantic 10 football coaches conference call.

What did the program look to accomplish during the bye week?

A few guys needed to get their legs back so we rested some. We needed to improve some depth in some

areas so we gave some of the younger, or less experienced, players a lot more repetitions than maybe some of our starters saw. We also had to look at some areas, offensively and defensively, that had slipped or we had put off for a while. We gave everyone a couple of days off and it was a chance for both the student-athletes and coaches to get a break.

Without giving any big secrets away, what needed to be tweaked?

There are always things you can do better. You get to this point, where you maybe have a better feel for your team. You learn what your players can do, or maybe cannot do, and try and find ways to take advantage of the strengths.

What is your feel for this team four games into the season?

I think we work hard and we come to ready to play hard every Saturday. That last ball game [a 56-0 win over Liberty] we came together and we played really well. But it's a fine line, if we get off a little bit, or we're not quite hitting right, we have shown that we can also play poorly. So we've got to work hard to be at optimum at all times.

Is there a bright spot? If so, what would it be?

They're a lot of bright spots. They're a lot of good things. I think our quarterback play is getting better every week. I think our running game is very good. Defensively, we've seen signs of playing very well. We're taking games a little better than what we anticipated. Yes, there are good things.

Evaluate New Hampshire's offense and what they do?

I'm amazed at New Hampshire offensively; they must have a slower clock up there because they get a whole lot more things practiced and done than I ever do. I don't know how they get to practice all the things they do, run all the things they do and execute all the things they do. I think they do a tremendous job offensively. They take diversified to a whole other level. I think [quarterback Ricky] Santos is a heck of a player. He's really a fine quarterback. They've got good skilled players; the receivers are great with [David] Ball. I think it revolves around all the different things they do. They get good match-ups, get different looks and they do a good job when their offense changes from week to week.

You guys held them down a lot during the rain [in Durham] last year. Can you take a lot from that game?

It's a whole different set of circumstances. We're a new

team, they're a new team. I think it would be difficult to take a whole lot out of that ball game because of the conditions. I don't think either team was well-suited for those type of conditions. We made the best of it and our kicker [All-American Greg Kuehn] was a little better and that's how we won it [Kuehn accounted for all the Tribe's points on hitting on all three field goal attempts in a 9-7 win]. That game was very different with the field conditions and I think we will see a different team.

You talked about New Hampshire QB Ricky Santos and WR David Ball a little bit. Talk about the things you've seen on film that you think they do well.

I think it is a lot of things. It goes back to the diversification they have on offense. They have so many different ways to attack you and have so many different looks it makes preparing for them difficult. Santos can make all the throws; whether he's standing or on the move, he has a great ability to keep a play alive. He's got a great vision down the field. That's something you're always looking for in a quarterback, the ability to look down field and not get locked in on the rush. Ideally, you want them to see the whole field and not get locked in on one receiver and I think he does a great job of keeping his options open. Ball is a great receiver that makes all the catches. He can beat you deep and on the short stuff. He is going to catch everything near him.

People always talk about New Hampshire's offense, but this past weekend against Villanova when it got down to crunch time they made a lot of big stops.

I think that [New Hampshire Head Coach] Sean Mc-Donnell and his staff do a great job with the program. Sometimes when you have such a powerful offense you're not as physical of defense. But they have maintained the physical aspect of their defense. They hit extremely hard and they are extremely physical on that side of the ball.

Many may consider you, Mr. Quarterback, when it comes to developing young quarterbacks. What has made Ricky Santos?

I think he's better because he's a very good talent and they've done a very good job working with him. They done an excellent job of teaching him the offensive and how to play quarterback. Kip Kelly, the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire, does a great job working with him. He's a talent obviously. He just shows up and I think he has worked at being a quarterback and it shows he has a lot of skill, and does a lot of the little things that you like to see. As I mentioned before, his ability to keep his eyes down the field and react to what the defense is doing and make all the throws, he can make them all.

You mentioned the word diversity a few times, how do you prepare for this diverse offense?

One of the things we have wanted to do since opening day is to take care of ourselves. You have got to be sound on what you're doing and you have got to be sound on the fundamental things. You cannot try and stop one particular play or person because there are so many things they can do. Basically, you have got to be sound and solid in what you do.

TEAM NOTES

For Starters: The crowd of 11,741 was the largest crowd for a William and Mary home opener since 13,871 was announced in the 1995 season opener (vs. James Madison). In terms of capacity, the '05 crowd was much closer, as the capacity of Zable Stadium has shrunk significantly since the 1995 season (it was 15,000 and now is 12,174). When doing the division, The fans filled to .964 capacity Saturday vs. Liberty, while the crowd in '95 was only sitting in .925 of the seats.

Other than '95, the only crowd into five figures over the span of 11 games was the 1997 opener vs. Hampton (10,667).

Bye Week: William and Mary Head Coach Jimmye Laycock has been a particularly difficult draw for opponents when his teams have had an extra week of preparation. Over the last 16 seasons, his teams are a sparkling 13-3 coming off a bye-week. This number improves even a little more when these games are played in Zable Stadium, where his record is 8-2 after the extra-week of practice.

Did You Know?: New Hampshire has been the Tribe's next opponent after an open week for the past two seasons. Both games have resulted in wins for the College. The 2004 contest saw the Tribe scratch out a 9-7 win in the mud at Durham, while in 2003, the Tribe played one of its most complete games of that campaign in downing the Wildcats, 38-28.

Laycock Honored: The College of William and Mary's Alumni Association presented Jimmye Laycock with the 2004-2005 Coach of the Year Award at the Association's Fall Awards Banquet held recently on the Williamsburg campus.

Laycock, a 1970 graduate of the College, had what could be considered his finest of his 25 years at the helm of the program in 2004. The team compiled an overall record of 11-3, advanced to the semi-finals of the NCAA I-AA playoffs and finished with a No. 3

national ranking. Quarterback Lang Campbell was honored with the Payton Award, as the nation's top offensive player, while three other players were named to All-American teams. The team maintained great balance in the classroom as well, with a 100 percent graduation rate among players receiving athletic aid in the form of grants or scholarships.

The Alumni Coach of the Year Award was established in 1996 to recognize outstanding coaches who serve as unique motivators and teachers of athletics. Since 2000, Carol Achenbach Wright (Class of 1949) and her husband, the late Melvin R. Wright (Class of 1947) have generously provided support through donations and the establishment of a trust that will ensure the perpetuation of the award, which carries a \$500 honorarium for each recipient.

Honored Guest: The University of New Hampshire comes into Zable Stadium with the No. 1 national ranking, looking to gain its first win in Williamsburg since raining on the Tribe's Homecoming Parade in October of 1998 (a 31-19 win powered by eventual Payton Award Winning tailback Jerry Azumah, currently of the Chicago Bears, who ran for 235 yards on 33 carries that afternoon). This Saturday, the Wildcats bring a pair of Payton hopefuls to the field in quarterback Ricky Santos and wide receiver David Ball. Santos is the league's leading passer (averaging better than 350 yds/gm), while Ball is tops in receiving yds/gm (117.1). Revenge may be on the minds of the group from Durham, as the Tribe snatched a hard-fought, 9-7, victory on a rain-soaked field at New Hampshire last year, holding Santos to just 103-passing yards and the usually explosive Ball to just one catch for nine yards.

The Last Time: The last No. 1 to venture into Zable was the 1997 edition of the Villanova Wildcats. Villanova sat at the top of the I-AA world when it paid a visit as the Homecoming opponent that season and sent the Tribe alumni home empty handed as it laid a tough 20-13 loss on the College. Coincidently, that Villanova team featured a Payton Award winning tandem of receiver Brian Finneran (the 1997 recipient and current member of the NFL's Falcons) and 2001 Payton Award winner, running back Brian Westbrook (currently with the Philadelphia Eagles).

We Know You're Wondering: What was the highest ranked team the Tribe has ever defeated? It would be a No. 2 ranked Hampton University team. The College traveled to Hampton and defeated the then-second Pirates, 41-34, in 1998. That game featured 999 combined yards of total offense and four

fourth quarter lead changes.

Long Time Coming: The current No. 1 ranking is a first for the Wildcat's long and storied football program. While traditionally top 25 fodder, the Tribe has never reached the top spot in the national polls. Its highest ranking was the No. 2 position it held after the third game of the 1997 season (on the September 15th, 1997 Sports Network poll).

The Tribe held this position just one week, when none other than the University of New Hampshire handed the College a heartwrenching, 24-22, setback in Durham. This game was an especially difficult loss for William and Mary, as the team had rallied behind then-redshirt freshman quarterback Daron Pope, who was making his first start in place of injured All-American Mike Cook, to move over 60 yards in the closing minutes. With the team positioned inside the Wildcat fiveyard line and just under :30 seconds to play, the College handed the ball to two-time allconference senior tailback Alvin Porch to either score, or at least position the ball in the middle of the field for a chip shot field goal (as eventual first team all-league placekicker Brian Shallcross was at the ready).

But, it was not to be the Tribe's day, as UNH managed to rip the ball clear of the usually sure-handed Porch to force a decisive turnover that protected the slim lead and sparked celebration on the home sidelines and stands of Cowell Stadium.

In Case You're Counting: The Tribe has won eight-straight regular season home games dating back to last season. The last team to defeat the College on its home turf during the regular season was James Madison in 2003 (24-17).

Stat of the Week: While the Tribe has received solid and steady punt returns from sure-handed and hard-running senior team captain Josh Lustig, the Erie, Pa. native just hasn't had too many return opportunities through the first four games. Lustig has a total of just six returns for 61 yards (10.2 yds/ret.). In contrast (and not coincidently), the Tribe has recorded more returns (eight) and yards (115) on interceptions through the first quarter of the season.

History Lesson: William and Mary's last loss at Rhode Island, a 34-31 setback in 2001, spurred a five-game conference-winning streak that culminated with a thrilling 47-44 win against Villanova. The streak powered the College to a share of the conference crown and a place in the NCAA Playoffs.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

Match Up of the Week: Heading into Saturday's action, the College's offensive red zone efficiency is amongst the league's finest, as the Tribe has converted 18 of its 20 ventures for scores, including 15 touchdowns. This production will be tested, as the Wildcats

THE LAST MEETING

William and Mary 9, #10 New Hampshire 7

DURHAM, NH (9/18/04) - All-American place-kicker Greg Kuehn connected on field goals of 27, 35 and 21 yards, and the Tribe defense held the Wildcats' high-powered offense in check, as W&M won its conference-opener, 9-7, over 10th-ranked New Hampshire at rained-soaked Cowell Stadium.

Playing in heavy rains from the remnants of Hurricane Ivan, W&M held the Wildcats to 226 offensive yards, nearly 150 below its average, after yielding 575 yard to North Carolina two weeks prior. It was the fewest yards allowed by a W&M defense since yielding 141 to Massachusetts in the 2001 season-opener.

All-American quarterback Lang Campbell and the Tribe offense were efficient in the treacherous conditions, as Campbell threw for 148 yards on 11 for 23 passing and ran for 42 yards on 14 attempts. Senior Jon Smith churned out 63 yards on 23 carries.

Kuehn kicked three field goals for the fourth time in his career, with the last coming in a win over Rhode Island on Oct. 25, 2003.

Chris Ndubueze paced the defense with a career-high 16 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Junior Larry Pendleton tallied seven tackles and a sack, while sophomore Josh Wright, who made his first career start, also recorded a sack.

The win gave W&M its first victory over a ranked opponent since knocking off 15th-ranked Northeastern in Williamsburg on Oct. 26, 2002.

boast the A10's best red zone defense, having turned opponents away empty handed seven times in 15 (53.3%) trips inside their 20-yard line.

More Fun With Numbers: The College has earned a national reputation for offensive productivity. Last season's squad set a school record for points in a season, by averaging better than 34 points over the 14-game schedule; the 1990 team lead the nation in scoring by collecting 467 points over 13 games. But, coming off the 56-point explosion against Liberty, the 2005 Tribe squad has now amassed 150 points through the first four games, which is the most ever for the College under Laycock.

The Tribe's average of 37.50 ranks 13th in the nation, but showing the depth of the Atlantic 10, the figure is only fourth-best in the league.

Did You Know?: That one has to go back to the 1946 season to find that last time the College has scored more than 150 points over the first four games of the season. That season legendary Tribe All-Americans 'Flyin' Jack Cloud (FB) and Knox Ramsey (G) led the school to an amazing 164 total points through the first four weeks, and went onto produce a sterling 8-2 mark.

Time is On The Tribe's Side: After holding the ball for 40:57 seconds against Liberty in its last action, the Tribe currently leads the A10 in time of possession, averaging 32:51 minutes per game. Helped by a reinvigorated running game, the Tribe has yet to be held to less than 30 minutes in any game this season.

Did You Know?: The last time the College had collected more time of possession in a single game came during the 2001 season, when the Tribe held the ball for an amazing 42:17 vs. East Carolina. Perhaps even more amazing is the fact that the Tribe lost the game, 38-23, to the Division I-A Pirates.

Serious Repetition: The College's offense ran a total of 92 offensive snaps against Liberty, which is the highest single game total since the team took 98 in a 48-41 overtime win at Villanova in 2000. That afternoon the Tribe ran the ball 60 times and threw it 38.

Serious Production: The College made good use of all the repetitions on offense to roll up 635 total yards of offense against the Flames, including a season-high 300 passing yards. This total stands as the largest single-game effort in over a decade, as you would have to go back to the 1993 season when the College powered out 651 total yards in a 49-6 win over VMI.

The effort against Liberty also stands as the only the fourth time since that date in

1993 that the College has breached the 600-yard barrier.

Ground Gains: Led by a punishing performance by senior team-captain and starting center Pat Mulloy and the Tribe offensive front five, the College rolled to 335 rushing yards against the Flames. The 335 yards on the ground is the highest single-game total for the Tribe since the program churned out 353 against VMI during the 1999 season.

Well Grounded: Junior tailback Elijah Brooks has been a picture of steadiness in the Tribe backfield. He currently is third in the A10 rushing yards (113.8 yds/gm) and fourth in rushing touchdowns (5). In his last action against Liberty, Brooks continued his current trend of 100-plus yard afternoons by rushing for 102 yards on 22 attempts against the Flames. His average of 4.6 yards per carry on the afternoon was hurt some by the fact he kept finding the end zone, as three of his carries were 1-yard touchdown runs.

The hard-running 5-9, 210-pound back has used a deliberate style to rumble to a total of 455 rushing yards through the first four games. This total stands as the most rushing yards by a Tribe back through the first four games since Troy Keen (1992-95) used a style very similar to Brooks' to battle his way to 495 yards through the first four contests of the 1994 season.

Brooks is also a sure-handed option in the passing game, as he brought down three catches for 43 yards and one TD vs. Liberty. This brings his season total to 10 grabs for 109 yards and two touchdowns. His average of 141.0 all-purpose yards per game ranks second overall in the Atlantic 10.

With seven total touchdowns in four

games, Brooks' average of 10.5 points per game ranks second in the conference.

Did You Know?: Troy Keen is also the last Tribe player to score more points than Brooks through the first four games of a season, as he accounted for eight TDs, all rushing, through the initial four games of the 1994 season.

Sweet Music: Sophomore tailback Tony Viola turned in a career afternoon against the Flames, as he ran 12 times for 85 yards. This effort surpassed his entire 2004-rushing total (76 yards on 12 carries).

This season, Viola is the second-leading rusher for the College, as he has amassed 153 yards on 23 carries.

Viola has a career average of 6.5 yds/carry (over 35 attempts) coming into this weekend's action.

Long Road Back: Junior tailback Delmus Coley's 18-yard afternoon on Saturday against Liberty (on six carries) did not resonate significantly on the stats sheet or have a large impact on the outcome (as all six carries came in the fourth quarter). But, numbers are often deceiving, as Coley's mere presence on the field was a victory of sorts and a reason for the Tribe's future opponents to take notice.

The last game action Coley had seen priot to Liberty came in the ninth game of the 2003 season, against the University of New Hampshire. His last carry of that afternoon saw him break free for a 40-plus yard gain on a fourth and inches late in the game that all but sealed the College's 38-28 win. But he paid a large cost for the yardage, as at the end of the run, he was pulled down from behind and seriously damaged his right knee. Several operations, and some 20 months of grueling

rehab later, Coley finally returned to game action. A tireless worker, Coley moved from the scout team to the travel squad the week prior to the Liberty contest.

While still a half-step short of the explosiveness he displayed in rushing for a team best 488 yards on just 101 carries in 2003, Coley has continued to make steady improvement and will look to make even more significant contributions in the coming months.

On Target: Coming off an efficient afternoon vs. Liberty, sophomore starting quarterback Mike Potts sports the fourth best completion percentage in the A10 (.659, 56 completions in 85 attempts).

While it is still very early, this figure currently ranks him third on the Tribe's all-time single-season completion percentage listing.

Potts seems to continue to grow more comfortable with each week of action and has seen his completion percentage increase over each of his three starts (.533 vs. Marshall; .700 vs. URI; .760 vs. Liberty). His passing yardage (164 vs. Marshall; 211 vs. URI; 226 vs. Liberty) has also followed the same tract. But, maybe the best indication of his improved decision making has been that he has thrown 74-straight passes without an interception. In fact, if you were to throw out the first half of the Marshall game, Potts would be sporting a completion percentage of .703 (52 of 74) with no interceptions and five TD passes.


Round Numbers: The Tribe quarterback combination of Potts and redshirt freshman Jack Phillips combined to throw for exactly 300 yards vs. Liberty (Potts – 226; Phillips – 74). This trend nearly continues when you look at the respective season numbers, as Potts has thrown for 601 yards, while Phillips is at an even 400 yards.

The combined numbers for Potts and Phillips would place them third in the A10 in QB efficiency (156.13), fourth in TDs (8) and fifth in yards (1,001). Their combined completion percentage of 68.9 would be the second best figure in the league, while their two interceptions would tie them for the lowest amongst league QBs with more than 100 attempts (six total).

The pair has combined to throw 79-straight passes without an interception.

Just Because We Looked it Up: For the few people who may be wondering, the last time William and Mary has had two different quarterbacks throw for three, or more, TDs in the same season came during the 1997 season, when Mike Cook collected 10 in just four starts on the year and Steve Fill contributed eight over in as many appearances.

History Lesson: Sophomore wide out Joe Nicholas is already in the Tribe's history books



With a season-best 110-yard afternoon vs. LU, sophomore receiver Joe Nicholas pushed his career receiving total to 1,092 yards in just 17 career games.

after his record-breaking 2004 season which saw him set the school's freshman record for catches (66) and yards (799). As he enters his sophomore season, though, the records will get significantly harder. Nicholas' eightcatch, 110-yard effort vs. Liberty moved his career total to 1,092 yards in 17 games. This makes Nicholas the second quickest to reach the 1,000 yard receiving plateau in school history, trailing only all-time leading receiver Rich Musinski, who passed the mark in just 14 career games.

The performance vs. Liberty marked Nicholas' fourth career 100-plus yard receiving afternoon (and second in three starts this season). Musinski is also the school's all-time leader in career 100-yard games, as he acquired 21 in four seasons (2000-03). But, when you look at them at identical points in their careers, Musinski had six by his 17th career game. What is in Nicholas' favor, though, is that fact that Musinski's 17th career contest came with just five games remaining in his sophomore season, while Nicholas could potentially still play at least seven more times in 2005.

In terms of yardage, Nicholas really has his hands full to match Musinski's record of 2,140 yards by the end of his sophomore year (as he rang up one of the nation's greatest receiving performances in his sophomore year of 2001, by posting 59 catches for 1,393 and 12 TDs – an average of nearly 24 yds/catch).

For the year, Nicholas is currently sixth in the league in catches with an average of 6.33/gm (19 total). He is fifth in yards with an average of 97.7 (293 overall).

Streaks and Such: With eight-catches vs. the Flames, Nicholas has extended his streak of game with four, or more, catches to 11. He has one, or more, in all but one of his 17 ap-

Big Mack Attack: Redshirt freshman wide out Elliot Mack's speed and elusiveness had him pegged as one of the several talented underclassmen poised to fill the big-play void left behind by the graduation of Dominique Thompson. Mack's potential is starting to show on the field, as his last two receptions have been scoring plays of 31- and 34-yards vs. URI and Liberty, respectively.

For the season, Mack is averaging over 20 yds/catch on his four receptions (for 83 total yards).

Did You Know?: That Greg Kuehn has the chance to become the first place-kicker in the history of the A10 Conference to earn all-conference recognition in all four seasons of his career.

Possible First?: In the 12 years the Tribe has been affiliated with the A10 Conference, no Tribe back as won the league's rushing title. William and Mary has had at least one player lead the league in passing, receiving, scoring, interceptions, punt returns and pass efficiency.

Did You Know?: William and Mary has had four different players score via the ground in the first three games of 2005. It went the entire 14 game 2004 schedule with only three players finding paydirt (graduated seniors Jon Smith, TB: 15; and Lang Campbell, QB: 8; and Brooks, 5) on the ground.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

Dominant Defensive Performance: W&M's 56-0 victory over Liberty on Sept. 24 was the Tribe's first shutout win since a 34-0 blanking of VMI in Lexington in 2001. It was the first shutout the W&M faithful experienced at Zable Stadium since 1998, when the College also blanked the Keydets, 49-0.

In one of the most dominant, at least statistically, performances under Laycock, the Tribe defense surrendered a total of 145 yards, which included a net rushing total of minus-6 yards, and only seven first downs on the afternoon, while the Tribe offense piled up 635 yards of total offense, 335 of which came on the ground, and 35 first downs, one shy of the school's single-game record.

The Flames punted on their first three possessions, before turning it over on downs on their fourth touch. In total, Liberty punted eight times, while two other drives ended on Tribe interceptions.

Liberty advanced into W&M territory only three times through the entire game, and only once in the second half. In the second quarter, the Flames advanced to the Tribe 22, but junior Ryan Nickell ended the threat with his

third career interception at the 17-yard line. In its only trek into Tribe territory in the second half, Liberty reached the W&M's 39, but senior Jonas Watson dropped Flames' quarterback Brock Farrell for a 15-yard loss on third-and-four, resulting in a Liberty punt.

After the break, the Tribe defense allowed only 44 total yards, with most of the damage coming on the previously mentioned drive.

Liberty's 145-yard output was the lowest W&M has yielded since the 2001 season opener, when 21st-ranked Massachusetts managed 141 total yards in a 31-10 Tribe victory. In fact, it was just the third time in the last five years that W&M held an opponent under 200 total yards. Here are the Tribe's top-five defensive efforts, in terms of total yards allowed, in the last five years:

Road Block: Other than the Flames' "0" in the score column on Sept. 24, the most glittering number from the Tribe defense's perspective was Liberty's aforementioned net rushing total of minus-6 yards. It was W&M's best effort against the run in nearly a decade, as the lowest previous rushing total the College had surrendered prior to the 24th was minus-39 yards in a 30-21 win over Villanova in 1996.

The 1996 unit finished the season ranked second in the nation in total defense (231.8 yds/g) and led the Yankee Conference in rushing defense (83.3 yds/g) and scoring defense (15.5 pts/g). Villanova gained 20 yards on 12 rushes that afternoon, but the Tribe rang up nine sacks, including a school-record 3.5 by

Luke Cullinane, for 59 total yards, dropping the Wildcats' net to minus-39 on 21 total attempts.

Liberty gained a total of 27 yards on 18 rushes, but W&M's four sacks for 33 yards dropped the Flames' net to minus-6.

The only other negative rushing total the W&M defense posted under Laycock was in 1993, when, again, Villanova managed a net of minus-6 in a 51-17 W&M victory.

Getting Off the Field: One of the main reasons W&M was able to keep Liberty off the scoreboard, and stay rested on the sideline, was the Tribe's firm third-down defense. The Flames converted only 2 of their 12 third down opportunities, both of which came in the fourth quarter long after the contest was in hand. In fact, on third down conversions, Liberty was 0-for-3 in both the first and second quarters and 0-for-1 in the third quarter.

Liberty's two third-down conversions were the fewest W&M had surrendered, since Towson gained a new set of downs just twice on third-down opportunities in the Tribe's 41-16 victory at Johnny Unitas Stadium last season.

No-Fly Zone: With two more interceptions in the 56-0 victory over Liberty on Sept. 24, the Tribe defense continued its early season knack of disrupting opposing aerial attacks by way of turnovers.

The two picks brought the team's total to eight, which ranked fourth in all of Division I-AA and led the Atlantic 10 through games of Sept. 24. W&M's eight INT's trailed only Davidson (13), Western Carolina (10) and Stephen F. Austin (9) in I-AA through the 24th. The total now ranks 10th in I-AA, but is still tied for the A10 lead with this week's opponent, UNH.

With eight interceptions, W&M is on pace (2/game) to match the highest INT total under Laycock (22), which was set by that dominant 1996 squad in its Yankee Conference Championship season. The school record for interceptions in a season is 25, set in 1972.

Although there is plenty of football left to be played, the Tribe is already 3/4 of the way to its entire last season total of 12 interceptions, which was established over 14 games. Here is a quick look at the top-five INT totals during Laycock's tenure:

Trend Setter: Sorting through the box scores of each of the Tribe's four games, you might have noticed a trend on the defense page,

where redshirt freshman linebacker Josh Rutter's name has appeared in the top slot for four-straight games. In the 56-0 shutout of Liberty on Sept. 24, the 6-3, 228-pound Union Bridge, Md., product paced the Tribe with seven total tackles, including one tackle for loss.

At Rhode Island, Rutter recorded nine total tackles, including six solos and one TFL for a loss of a yard. At VMI on Sept. 10, Rutter made four solo tackles against the Keydets and was again credited with one TFL. He finished the contest with nine total tackles.

In his first career start at Marshall on Sept. 1, Rutter recorded a game-high 16 total tackles, four of which were solos. Rutter was also named the coaching staff's special teams player of the week for his work on kick coverage, which included four total tackles.

Through five weeks of the regular season, Rutter ranks fourth in the Atlantic 10 in tackles, averaging 10.2 per game, while Rutter's total of 41 tackles is also the fourth-best mark in the league.

Rutter's 41 total tackles are the most by a W&M freshman since current junior Ryan Nickell recorded 16 tackles through the first four games of 2003. Before Nickell, current senior Stephen Cason registered 16 total tackles through his first four games in 2002. Prior to Cason, the top mark was 14 stops by defensive tackle Marcus Washington in 1999.

Rutter is the first Tribe defender, of any class, to lead the squad in tackles in four consecutive games since Martin Magerko ('01) did it over the first four games of 2001 against UMass (13), VMI (11), ECU (11) and UNH (15).

Under the Radar: With much of the preseason attention surrounding returning All-American defensive end Adam O'Connor and the Tribe's other returning seven starters, senior defensive end Jonas Watson received little print in various preseason forecasts, but the 6-2, 228-pound speedster certainly is making a name for himself now. Watson leads the Tribe and ranks third in the A10 with four total sacks on the season, while his clip of one sack per game is tied for 18th in Division I-AA.

In the 56-0 rout of Liberty, Watson recorded 1.5 sacks, including a solo sack in the third quarter that dropped Flames' quarterback Brock Farrel for a 15-yard loss on third-and-four from the Tribe 39, which all but cemented the squad's first shutout since 2001. Watson finished the afternoon with five total tackles and added another quarterback pressure.

Watson leads all of the Tribe's defensive linemen with 16 total tackles on the season, while his four sacks lead the entire team in tackles for loss.

Stopped on a Nickell: As mentioned, junior linebacker Ryan Nickell had a hand in the 56-0 win over Liberty, recording his third career interception in the second quarter. The shutout

may have not been possible without the timing of Nickell's INT, as it came on the Tribe's 17-yard line after a 51-yard Liberty drive. It was the deepest the Flames advance throughout the entire game, reaching the W&M 22 before the turnover. Nickell tallied five total tackles against the Flames, including a game-high two TFLs. On the season, Nickell is tied for third on the team with 18 total stops, 12 of which were solos.

A Day Off, A Week Early: With W&M scoring on eight of its 10 possessions, and the other two touches ending in a missed field goal and a lost fumble, in the 56-0 thrashing of Liberty on Sept. 24, junior punter Blair Pritchard's received somewhat of his own bye week seven days before the Tribe's scheduled open date. It was the first time that W&M did not punt in a game since a 49-6 victory over VMI on Oct. 2, 1993 in the Oyster Bowl at Foreman Field in Norfolk

In his first season as a starter, Pritchard appeared to be rounding into shape before the Liberty game, after punting six times for a total of 230 yards, both career-highs, at URI on Sept. 17. Pritchard, who was named the coaching staff's special team's player of the week, recorded a career-long punt of 47 yards and downed one kick inside the URI 20-yard line. He also made a nice open-field solo tackle on punt coverage.

Through five weeks of the regular season, Pritchard ranks fifth in the A10 in punting, averaging 39.1 yards per kick.

HUNTINGTON, WV (9/1/05) -- Junior tailback Elijah Brooks ran for a career-high 149 yards, but Marshall used a game-breaking 70-yard fumble return for a touchdown late in the third quarter to rally for a 36-24 victory over William and Mary at Edwards Stadium.

The Tribe led 24-23 after a pair of touchdown tosses from sophomore quarterback Mike Potts, who was making his first-career start, in the third period and was on the move again deep in MU territory, when Herd linebacker Matt Coach picked up a Potts fumble and raced 70 yards for a touchdown.

After W&M's next drive stalled, the Herd put it away with an 11-play, 84-yard drive capped by Bernie Morris' third touchdown pass of the contest, a 12-yard hook-up with Hiram Moore.

Brooks gained 149 yards on 28 carries, surpassing his previous career mark of 120 set last season at Towson and hauled in a 19-yard scoring reception from Potts that pulled W&M with 23-17 at the 10:29 mark of the third.

After junior linebacker Ryan Nickell recovered a fumble at the Herd 30-yard line that was forced by senior defensive end Jonas Watson, Potts connected with redshirt freshman Tony Viola for an 18-yard touchdown pass, the first of Viola's career, to give W&M its first lead of the game.

Redshirt freshman linebacker Josh Rutter, in his first career start, paced the defense with 16 total tackles, while classmate Kevin Allen recorded the first interception of his career in the first half.

In his first-career start, Phillips completed 17 of 21 pass attempts and hit redshirt freshman tailback DeBrian Holmes for a 19-yard scoring play in the fourth quarter.

On the mark from the start, Phillips connected on all three of his throws for 33 yards on the Tribe's opening series, leading W&M on an 87-yard march that was capped by Phillips' 1-yard sneak on fourth-and-goal from the 1 to put W&M up 7-0.

Senior corner Stephen Cason pushed the lead to 17-0 in the second with a 57-yard interception return for a touchdown, his second pick of the contest.
