First and 10

William and Mary opens its 113th season of football Thursday night, hosting rival Delaware at Zable Stadium in the inaugural CAA Football contest. The game will be broadcast live to a regional television audience on CN8. Thursday's game will mark the first time since 1997 the Tribe has opened a season at home and will be the program's first regular season weekday night game. The Tribe is coming off a 3-8 season in 2006, which also included a 1-7 mark in league play. Delaware, ranked 19th in the Sports Network Preseason Top 25, was 5-6 overall last season, including 3-5 in conference action. The Blue Hens have not started a season on the road since 2000. W&M is looking to snap a two-game losing streak in the series, as Delaware has won four of the last five meetings. The Tribe is also looking to snap a three-game home losing streak. Tribe head coach Jimmye Laycock begins his 28th season and named junior quarterback Jake Phillips the starting signal caller for the opener last week. Phillips has started 11 career games and thrown 17 touchdowns, while rushing for an additional nine scores in 17 career appearances. Delaware counters with senior Joe Flacco, who completed 264 of 417 passes for 2,783 yards and 18 touchdowns against just 10 interceptions last season.

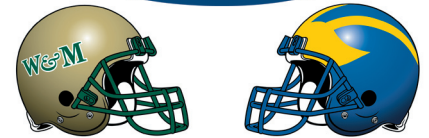

Press Parking

Parking for members of the working press is available just southeast of Zable Stadium in front of the University Center. Parking is limited and media members are encouraged to arrive early.

Photographers

Please observe the NCAA rules, which prohibit photographers between the 25 yard lines.

Press Box Services

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

Visiting Film Crews

Space will be allotted in the West Press Box for film and video crews of visiting teams' coaches' shows. We will provide two spots per team.

Post-Game Procedures

Head coach Jimmye Laycock and the visiting coach will be available about 10 minutes after the game in an interview area located directly below the press box. Individual W&M players' names should be given to Pete Clawson during the fourth quarter and they will be made available in the interview room.

Delaware Series Notes

Storied Rivalry

If history is any indication, the William and Mary-Delaware match-up should provide the appropriate fireworks for kicking off the inaugural CAA season, as the two teams bring both a rich tradition and a long history of competitive contests.

The two squads even have some experience opening the season under the lights, as the College traveled to Delaware for a Thursday night contest to start the 1999 season. That game produced a double overtime thriller with the Blue Hens prevailing, 34-27.

Since W&M joined the league, the two programs have combined to win five conference titles and make 11 playoff appearances.

Over the 15-game series as league opponents, close games have been common, as Delaware is averaging just over 27 points in those contests, while the Tribe has average more than 26 per game.

Delaware holds the edge in the all-time series, 19-12, and has won four of the last five meetings.

The Tribe, however, has won five of the last seven games of the series played in Williamsburg, which has been the sight of some of the more dramatic contests. Included in this span of games is the 1996 overtime thriller, in which the Tribe needed an overtime interception by senior team captain Mike McGowan to seal a 10-7 win.

Delaware's next appearance, in 1998, saw the College outscore a powerful Blue Hen attack led by Eddie Conti, 52-45, on the strength of a five-touchdown performance by quarterback Mike Cook.

The 2002 season brought more fireworks, as the Tribe used a late interception return by all-conference cornerback Billy Parker to prevail 45-42.

And, most recently, few current Tribe fans will forget the Blue Hens' trip to Zable in the 2004 I-AA Playoffs. Trailing 31-10 in the fourth quarter, Stephen Cason's interception return for a touchdown ignited a 21-point comeback, and Lang Campbell orchestrated a storybook double-overtime, 44-38 victory to defeat the Blue Hens and advance to the national semifinals.

For Openers

This evening's game against 19th-ranked Delaware will kick off the 113th season of William and Mary football. The Tribe has an all-time record of 57-52-3 (.522) in season openers, including an 11-16 mark under head coach Jimmye Laycock.

Made for TV

Thursday's game will be televised to a regional audience on CN8. In the Williamsburg area, the game will also be shown live on WCOX Channel 11. The broadcast team of long-time on-air personality Scott Graham (play-by-play) and former NFL fullback Jon Ritchie (color analyst) will handle the duties in the booth, while Gregg Murphy will work the sidelines. CN8's broadcast is carried to the majority of Comcast Cable customers, which has its footprint as far north as Maine and to Florida in the south.

It Has Been a Long Time Coming

Tonight's game marks the first time since 1997 that the Tribe has opened the year at Zable Stadium. In 1997, the College defeated Hampton University, 31-6, en route to posting a 7-4 final record. The College has not opened a season at home with a conference opponent since 1993, which was the Tribe's first season in what is now the CAA Football Conference. In 1993, the College defeated New Hampshire, 27-14, in the Tribe's first league game as a member of what was then known as the Yankee Conference.

In fact, in the previous 27 years of Laycock's tenure, William and Mary has opened the year with a home game only seven times. Laycock's teams are a perfect 7-0 when opening the year within the friendly confines of Zable Stadium.

Making History

Tonight's contest is the first game being played under the Colonial Athletic Association Football banner. The CAA has long been home to the majority of the Tribe's 22 other programs, as W&M was one of six charter members when the CAA formed. Adding football to the league's list of sports is something conference officials hope will bring the league increased exposure in the fall and year round.

The College first returned to a conference affiliation for the 1993 season, as stated in the previous note. W&M played under the Yankee Football Conference flag, which had its roots dating back to 1951. Starting in 1997, the league head quarters moved to Philadelphia, as the Atlantic 10 Conference assumed operational control through the 2006 season.

While the league's name has changed, its members have remained steady. There are no new members, nor any fewer programs from last season's 12-team line-up. The conference will still be split between two divisions, north and south.

In the 14 years of the Tribe's membership, the league has lost two teams, Boston University, which discontinued its program, and Connecticut, which moved its program up to the FBS level and the Big East Conference. In that same time span, the A-10 added Towson, in 2005, and Hofstra, in 2001.

The Tribe has won conference titles under both previous banners, including the Yankee Championship in 1996 and a pair of A-10 titles in 2001 and 2004.

More History

While this evening will be the CAA Football Conference's coming out party, it will also stand as the first regular season, home night game, played on a weekday at Zable Stadium. Today is William and Mary's second day of classes for the fall semester.

A Win Over Delaware Would:

- Snap a two game losing streak in the series and halt a current six-game losing streak in conference home games.
- Also snap the Tribe's current three game home losing streak.
- Be the Tribe's first win in a season opener since the 2001 season, when W&M defeated Massachusetts, 31-0, on the road. The Tribe has opened the last five seasons at Football Bowl Subdivision schools.
- Give the Tribe a victory in its conference opener for the first time since 2004, when W&M defeated 10th-ranked New Hampshire, 9-7, on the road en route to the conference championship.
- Increase head coach Jimmye Laycock's career record to 8-0 in home openers.
- Move the Tribe's record to 9-8 all-time against the Blue Hens in Williamsburg.
- Move Laycock's career conference win total to 70. Laycock's career league mark stands at 69-45.

Game Notes



Hard Road Ahead

A look at the College's schedule shows Delaware is the first of three teams on the slate ranked in the Sports Network FCS Preseason Top 25.

Despite a 5-6 record in 2006, the Blue Hens were tabbed 19th in the poll, while Massachusetts, which advanced to the I-AA title game last season, is ranked third. James Madison, also a playoff team in 2006, is ranked seventh.

W&M will face another ranked opponent in 2007, which does not appear in the FCS preseason poll. On Sept. 22, the Tribe will travel to Virginia Tech, which is ranked ninth in the FBS preseason *USA Today* Coaches poll.

Early Returns

On the subject of conference openers, the College has averaged nearly nine wins (8.8) over the six seasons it has started the conference slate with a victory. W&M has never failed to win fewer than seven games in a season in which it starts conference play with a victory. All four NCAA playoff appearances since 1993 have come in seasons which have started with a victory in conference play.

Conversely, in the eight seasons W&M has lost its conference opener, the Tribe has averaged fewer than six wins (5.5) and has never won more than a total of seven games in any of those seasons.

Playing At Home and Early

For the second-straight season, the College will have three home games before Oct. 1. Last year, the Tribe entertained three opponents in consecutive weeks in September, marking the first time since 1993 that W&M played three home games in the month of September.

Additionally, with the early contest against Delaware, and the bye week not occurring until Oct. 20, the Tribe will play five total games before Oct. 1 this season. The last time W&M played as many games prior to Oct. 1 was in 1997.

Tribe Talk

Local William and Mary fans will need to clear Wednesday nights on their calendars this fall, as the flagship stations of the Tribe Athletics Radio Network, 92.3 FM The Tide and 107.9 FM WBACH, will air the Prudential McCardle Coach's Show live from the Backfin Restaurant with head coach Jimmye Laycock. The show will air starting at 7 p.m. and fans and alumni are invited to attend the event, which will take place on the deck at the Backfin. The show, which is co-hosted by the radio voices of Tribe football, Jay Colley and Bob Sheeran, will consist of Q&A's with Laycock about upcoming opponents, current events with the program and a review of the previous week's action. Virginia Tech Ticket Information

Thursday's game breaks a streak of five consecutive years in which the Tribe has opened its schedule playing a FBS opponent. The Tribe's 31-10 win at UMass to start the 2001 season was the last time it opened at a fellow FCS opponent. However, the Tribe does have an FBS foe on the schedule, as it travels to Virginia Tech on September 22. Tribe fans interested in making the trek to Blacksburg are encouraged to call the Tribe ticket office (757.221.3340) and purchase tickets in the William and Mary section.

Speaking of tickets, sales continue to be brisk and the school is hopeful to see another year of record season ticket sales. Last year the College averaged better than 10,000 fans for its five home contests.

Offensive Notes

For Starters

The Tribe coaching staff entered game week with junior Jake Phillips as the starting quarterback. Phillips earned the nod, emerging from a three-player battle that began during the spring and ran through the fall.

Thursday evening's game will mark Phillips 12th career start, as he made five last season, including the first four contests. Phillips also started the last five games of the 2005 season, earning the starting job after orchestrating a miraculous 21-point fourth-quarter comeback win at Northeastern.

Phillips has made one career start against the Blue Hens, which came in the Tribe's 22-21 home loss in 2005. That afternoon saw Phillips complete 24 of his 34 attempts for 289 yards and a score and also rush for a pair of touchdowns.

Phillips comes into the contest with a career completion percentage of .580 (193-333) and has thrown 17 touchdowns, against 10 interceptions.

Target Numbers

Phillips will lead a Tribe offense that averaged 339.4 yards and 19.0 points a contest in 2006. The point total (209) was the lowest output for the College since the 1982 season. But the hopes for significant improvement come in the form of eight returning starters, including four of the five across the offensive front. The front five will be anchored by two senior tackles in team co-captain Brad Stewart and Brent Cochran. The pair has started a combined 42 contests coming into Thursday and both have the size, experience and talent to be all-conference caliber performers.

While Stewart, Cochran and their mate's efforts will be crucial to the team's offensive improvement, the wide receiving corps is another veteran area that will be heavily counted on to make an impact. The College returns all but 264 yards of its 2,334 receiving total from 2006. Senior Joe Nicholas has led the team in both receptions and receiving yards each of the past two seasons and will be counted on to set the tempo for the entire corps. Nicholas should continue his climb up the school's career receiving charts, which can be seen on page eight. His primary running mates will be the talented junior duo of DJ McAulay and Elliott Mack, as each are coming off solid spring practices and showing improvement after spending time on campus in the off-season conditioning program. McAulay turned in 21 catches for 307 yards and two touchdowns last season, while Mack contributed 20 for 225 and a pair of scores. While both have seen significant game action, neither has ever started more than three games in a season.

Fresh Start

While the Tribe returns the vast majority of its passing and receiving yards from a season ago, nearly the opposite is true with the graduation of tailback Elijah Brooks. A two-time all-conference selection, Brooks accounted for 1,906 rushing yards and 17 touchdowns over the last two seasons, which amounted to over 60 percent of the team's total rushing yardage during that span. The Tribe's most game-tested option is junior DeBrian Holmes, who had just 44 carries last season for 225 yards. But, he has been the primary back up to Brooks for each of the past two seasons and has seen action in all 22 previous games and has a career average of 5.3 yards a carry (on 100 attempts). Senior Tony Viola and redshirt freshman Courtland Marriner will also see significant duty. Viola is very experienced with the offense and, at 6-1, 216-pounds, is the team's biggest and strongest back, while Marriner has been clocked as fast as 10.30 seconds in the 100m and will be counted on to bring big play potential to the position.

Steady Hands

Junior receiver Joe Nicholas returns as the team's leader in receptions (52) receiving yards (731) and receiving touchdowns (5) from a season ago. This effort came on the heels of an outstanding freshman campaign that saw him contribute big play after big play down the final stretch of the season and into the playoffs.

After spending his entire freshman season almost exclusively wide, injuries and youth moved him into the slot position more often during the '05 season. This trend will continue, at least in the short term for 2006, as he is slated to start in the slot position. He is one of the team's most experienced and tested players, combining a solid vertical (35-plus) with his tall frame (6-3 and 211-pounds) and great hands.

He enters 2006 on pace to shatter the school's career record for receptions (223) and is just three touchdown receptions shy of cracking the W&M career top 10. Nicholas also sits just 23 grabs short of entering the school's top 10 for catches and his 1,530 career receiving yards total is just 466 yards from placing him in the College's career top 10.

Team Defensive Notes

Shoop Takes Over as Defensive Coordinator

With the departure of the team's fourth defensive coordinator in the past five years at the end of the 2006 season, head coach Jimmy Laycock sought a proven commodity that would bring stability and leadership to the unit. Bob Shoop, a 19-year veteran, was brought on board with a proven track record of success and championship credentials.

Shoop comes to campus with an impressive resumé that spans nearly two decades as a Division I coach, including two separate stints as a defensive coordinator (Yale, 1994-96; Villanova, 1997) and three years of head coaching experience (Columbia, 2003-05).

Shoop's most recent position was at conference-rival Massachusetts, where he mentored the Minutemen's defensive backfield and helped the squad to an appearance in the NCAA Division I-AA Championship game last season. His season at UMass was successful on an individual basis as well, as three of his players were named to all-conference honors, including a pair being tabbed first-team.

Youth Movement on Defense

A look at the Tribe's depth chart for the season opener reveals only three seniors among the starters and immediate back-ups. Those three seniors, linebacker T.J. O'Neill, tackle Ryan Jones, and linebacker Ryan Horvath, are also the only three seniors on the entire defensive unit. The Tribe must replace six graduated seniors from the 2006 unit, and Shoop will turn to a number of underclassmen to fill those spots. Six sophomores are slated to start the season-opener, including David Caldwell, at strong safety, and Max Harris, at corner, who each saw action as true freshmen last season. The Tribe will list a pair of true freshman as back-ups to start the season, in defensive Ravi Pradhanang and corner Terrell Wells.

Game Notes

Secondary Overhaul

With Shoop also serving as the team's secondary coach, he has overseen a near total overhaul of the defensive backfield through spring and fall practice. The lone returning starter is junior co-captain Derek Cox, who led the squad with 41 solo tackles and nine pass break-ups in 2006. Cox, along with classmate David Houff, are the two most experienced, in terms of age, returning in the secondary. Houff made two starts at safety last season and figures to play a key role again this season. Sophomore transfer Robert Livingston (Western Michigan) earned the starting nod at free safety, and Caldwell has moved into the starting position at strong safety, after primarily seeing action at corner last year. Harris gets the call at the corner position opposite Cox in his second season in the program.

Individual Defensive Notes

The Return of Rutter

Junior linebacker Josh Rutter returns from a knee injury to quarterback the defense in the middle of the field this fall. After leading all league freshmen in tackles as a redshirt rookie in 2005 with 109, Rutter entered the 2006 season looking to challenge for postseason honors before sustaining a season-ending knee injury in the third game against VMI. After sitting out contact drills in the spring, Rutter returned to full-speed practice in camp and will look to regain his all-conference caliber form this fall.

Cox Ready To Lead Secondary

Junior Derek Cox was one of the team's most consistent contributors last season, recording 59 total tackles to rank fifth on the team. Cox led the squad with 41 unassisted stops and nine pass break-ups, while adding an interception.

Cox was named a team co-captain during spring practice and has been one of the key leaders for both defense and entire team through the offseason. As a junior, Cox is the most experienced player in the secondary, having played in 21 career contests.

Pair of Sophomores To Start At Each End of the Defensive Line

After a sensational redshirt freshman season, Adrian Tracy returns at one defensive end spot with all-conference potential, and he will be joined at the other end position by fellow sophomore C.J. Herbert, who slides outside from tackle this fall.

Tracy was second among all league rookies in 2006 with 70 total tackles and ranked in the league's overall top 10 in tackles for loss (15.5, Seventh) and sacks (6.0, Sixth). He was a two-time league rookie of the week selection and recorded at least an assisted tackle for loss in nine of 11 games. Tracy tallied a season-high 3.0 sacks and 4.0 total tackles for loss in the upset win over Towson. Tracy's total of 15.5 TFL was the most by a Tribe player since 2004, when Adam O'Connor recorded 1.5 en route to All-America honors.

Herbert started 11 games at tackle in 2006 and has the versatility to play any of the positions up front. He collected 30 total tackles as a redshirt freshman last year and also blocked two placement kicks, including a key extra-point attempt in the one-point win at Liberty.

Pigram Prepares For Second Season as Starter

Junior Michael Pigram started all 11 games at outside linebacker last season as a true sophomore and could challenge for postseason honors this fall with his demonstrated rate of progress. After collecting 14 tackles and a fumble recovery as a true freshman in 2005, Pigram was third on the team last year with 69 total stops, including 38 unassisted tackles and 4.5 stops behind the line of scrimmage. The hard-hitting backer also led the team with three forced fumbles in 2006.

True Sophomores Caldwell, Harris Slated to Start in Secondary

Just as Pigram did as a true sophomore last year, David Caldwell and Max Harris have earned starting nods in their second season in the program this fall. Caldwell moved to strong safety during spring practice and has shown the physical ability to play inside and athletic ability to cover in the secondary, having played mostly at corner last season. Harris earned the nod at the team's boundary corner position after a solid spring season. The two became the first Tribe defenders to see playing as true freshmen last season since Hasani Cameron in 1998.

- Jimmye Laycock enters his 28th season as the Tribe's head coach in 2007. The school's all-time winningest coach, Laycock has compiled a 178-127-2 career record at W&M.
- Among active Division I (FBS and FCS) head coaches, Laycock's 178 victories rank 11th. The total also ranks inside the top 20 of active coaches in all divisions. Among only active FCS head coaches, Laycock's total is seventh.

• Laycock ranks fourth on the all-time CAA Football career victories list with 69. Among active coaches, Laycock trails only Villanova's Andy Talley (88). Laycock's career CAA winning percentage of .605 is second among active league coaches.

• In 2004, W&M won a school-record 11 games and made its ninth postseason appearance under Laycock, advancing to the NCAA semifinals for the first time in school history and finishing with a school-record No. 3 final national ranking.

• The Tribe has posted winning ledgers in 18 of the past 24 seasons under Laycock.

• Laycock has guided the Tribe to a total of 51 career 40-plus point outings in his 307 games as the College's head coach, a number that represents more than 16 percent of his total games. By comparison, the College had seen only 12 total 40-plus point outings in the 30 seasons prior to Laycock taking the reigns of the program in 1980.

• Since joining what is now the CAA Football conference in 1993, a William and Mary quarterback has earned all-conference honors in nine of the 14 seasons, including seven-straight campaigns from 1998 to 2004. Going hand-in-hand with the postseason honors is the fact that in seven of the 14 seasons in league play, a Tribe quarterback has turned in the conference's top passer efficiency rating.

• The College has earned 131 total all-conference citations under Laycock.

• The Tribe has posted a 98-39-1 record (.714) at Zable Stadium under Laycock, which includes seven undefeated regular seasons in Williamsburg. In Laycock's 27 seasons, the College has failed to post a .500 or better record at home just three times (1980, 1999, 2006).

• Since joining the CAA Football Conference, W&M has gone 101-57 (.639) against FCS opponents.

• During Laycock's 27-year tenure, 20 Tribe players have gone on to sign with NFL teams, including three-time Pro Bowl selection Darren Sharper.

• Laycock has mentored 30 student-athletes to All-America honors at the College, including a career-high four in 2004 that earned either Sports Network or Associated Press All-America citations (Lang Campbell, Dominique Thompson, Greg Kuehn, Adam O'Connor). Campbell was a consensus First Team All-American (AFCA, Walter Camp, AP, Sports Network) and was also the winner of the 2004 Walter Payton Award.

• Since the NCAA began its academic reform with graduation rates surveys and APR rankings in 2004, the Tribe football program has twice posted a 100 percent graduation rate (2004, 2006).

• Under Laycock, 11 Tribe football players have been named Academic All-Americans, including the most recent selection of Bryce Lee in 2001.

• W&M has had 48 players earn academic all-conference honors since 1997 under Laycock, including a career-high tying seven in 2006, and one conference scholar athlete of the year (Lang Campbell, 2004).

In the Spotlight

John Sauer, Speed, Strength and Conditioning

Where are you from?: Libby, Montana

Name one thing that Libby, Montana is known for?: It's a big logging and mining town. In Northwest Montana.

Have you ever worked as a logger?: Yes, I have.

Briefly describe what your job was like: I used to work for my father, who was a self-employed logger. I did what was called setting the choker for him. After the trees were felled, I would run down the side of the mountain with a long cable. Then I would attach each log to this main cable and my father would then drag them up the side of the mountain. I would also hold onto the cable and pull myself up along side the logs.

What other schools have you've worked at before you came to William and Mary?: Prior to coming to William and Mary, I was an assistant at Clemson, Southern Methodist University, University of Utah, and Delta State University in Mississippi.

Was there any one thing that you drew from any of those other jobs that you brought with you? Every place is different, and every place has its own problems, there's no such thing as an ideal situation in what I do. That would be the main thing.

We are in the 20th year of your tenure here at William and Mary. What does that mean to you to have such an invested time in one place?: It's surprising to me that I've been here this long. In this profession you don't see that very often, really. At

this level, people move around quite a bit for whatever reason. After all these years, I've got a lot invested in this program. We're doing a lot of good things here. It's exciting to see what's going on and be a part of it.

Can you briefly describe how far our strength facilities were when you first arrived?: (Laughter) Yeah, when I first took this job, our facility was about 1800 square feet, and no equipment to speak of, no help, and I came in the middle of the football season, so it was a really difficult time if you're starting a new job. But you know we got in there and got things going and kept plugging away at it.

How big is the weight room today?: Our current facility, the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, is right at 5,000 square feet, and it's got top of the line free weight equipment, and we're able to set it up according to how I feel our athletes should be trained here. It's all top of the line equipment and it was made possible because a lot of alumni have put a lot of money into the Strength and Conditioning program.

What is your favorite part of training the William and Mary athletes?: The best part of my job would be seeing student athletes come in as freshmen and watching them progress over the four or five year period in their sport, the work that they put into it, and watching them improve every year. Also, when they are done here, getting the chance to see them in life when they come back five or 10 years down the road and see what they are doing with their lives.

What is the hardest part of your job?: Probably scheduling, and trying to fit all the teams, getting them a training time based around their practice schedules, class schedules, and things like that. That gets more and more difficult every year.

What has changed about your profession the most since you started?: Well, it's changed quite a bit. The perception used to be that Strength and Conditioning was just about lifting weights. But, it's more comprehensive than that; with weight training, conditioning, agility drills, flexibility, it's all one thing to try and help an individual improve in their sport and progress.

Has any one athlete come into your weight room and stood out as the greatest you've ever trained?: I could never pick just one. You're talking about 20 years and people from the beginning like Tyrone Shelton and Robert Green, to more recent guys like Brian Giamo, Pete Coyne, Sean McDermott and Dominique Thompson. We've had a number of individuals that have stood out to me.

What is the single greatest feat of strength you've witnessed in your weight-room?: (Laughter) Probably one of the most amazing things I've seen was when a 190-pound tailback (Kumi Loneragan - 1998-01) did a one-rep max on the bench press of 460-pounds. That was quite impressive.

What is your favorite TV show?: Well, I like to watch sitcoms, I really get a kick out of Everybody Loves Raymond.

What's the last book you've read?: I like to read murder mystery books. I really enjoy Robert Parker's series called "Spencer: for Hire."

What is your favorite meal?: Steak and potatoes. No question.

As a cook, do you have a specialty?: I make a pretty good omelet and have a very good chili recipe.

Do you share your recipes?: No.

What's one thing about John Sauer that somebody might not know?: I like to think I'm pretty easy going.

You've seen a lot of William and Mary football history here. Any one moment stick out in your mind as being special, in particular?: Yeah, when [junior quarterback] Jake Phillips ran me over on the sidelines against Liberty last year. He was pushed out of bounds and he cut my legs out from under me and I hit the turf there so hard, both my shoulders blew out. I had to have them surgically repaired this off-season.

What do you like to do in your spare time?: Well I would say cooking. It's my way to relax. Cooking and eating.

Then lifting?: Sure, I enjoy a little of that activity as well.

Is it true that you have a complete weight room in your house?: Yes.

How complete?: Pretty complete. I can do everything I want to do in my house.

How many pounds of weight do you think are in your house right now?: I am not sure how much I've got, I am pretty sure that I have at least one pound for every square foot, so maybe around 1,300.

What was one of the funniest moments you ever recall happening in your weight room?: We are not looking to have fun when we go into my weight room.
