

First and 10

The Tribe hosts state-rival Liberty on Saturday night at Zable Stadium. The teams have met in each of the last three seasons with W&M winning each time, including a 14-13 decision over the Flames in Lynchburg last season. Liberty will be making its second visit to Williamsburg, having dropped its only other contest in Zable Stadium, 56-0, in 2005. W&M is coming off a 63-16 victory at VMI and looking to win back-to-back games for the first time since the 2005 season. Liberty is unbeaten with a pair of victories over Division II teams Tusculum and Shippensburg to open the season. The Tribe has won five consecutive regular season non-conference home games and is 8-0 all-time against the Big South Conference. W&M features one of the CAA's top offenses, as the Tribe ranks first in scoring (47.0), first in passing (354.0), second in total offense (533.0) and fifth in rushing (179.0) through two weeks of the season. Junior guarterback Jake Phillips leads the league in passing efficiency (200.4) and is second in passing yards per game (337.5) and total offense (350.0). Liberty counters with a defense allowing 147.0 passing yards per game that has intercepted five passes in two games and scored two defensive touchdowns. The Flames have also already scored two special teams touchdowns on a pair of punt returns.

Press Box Services

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

Liberty Series Notes

Tribe Looks To Remain Perfect in Series

Saturday's game with Liberty will be the last of the four game series contract that began in the 2004 season. The two teams have met in each of the last three years, and the series has provided a blowout and a nailbiter, with the College winning all three games.

Last year, the College went down to the wire with the revamped Flames program, as the Tribe escaped Lynchburg with a hard-fought 14-13 win. The difference in the game proved to be a blocked extra point attempt by defensive tackle C.J. Herbert after Liberty's first score of the contest. The College was able to pull out the victory, despite the Flames' posting 315 yards rushing and outgaining the College by over 100 yards overall (386-272).

A match up to watch will be the Liberty pass defense against what is currently a red hot Tribe passing attack. Last season, the Flames aerial defense limited the College to a season low 95 passing yards, allowing just seven completions in 17 attempts.

Liberty's first, and only previous, visit to Williamsburg was one it would probably soon forget, as the College was dominant from start to finish in winning 56-0 in 2005. In that contest, the Tribe defense allowed a net rushing mark of minus-6 yards, the fourth-best single-game mark in school history.

Familiar Face

Liberty's defensive coordinator, Tom Clark, spent three years in the same role with the College. Clark played a large part in helping the Tribe earn a share of the league title in his first season in Williamsburg (2001). He remained on campus through the 2003 season, before leaving to resume the head coaching position at Catholic University for 2004.

The Last Meeting - William and Mary 14, Liberty 13

LYNCHBURG, Va. (10/14/06) -- Elijah Brooks rushed for 101 yards and two touchdowns, and the Tribe hung on for a 14-13 victory over Liberty at Williams Stadium.

Brooks eclipsed the 2,000-yard career rushing mark en route to his seventh-career 100-yard game, and W&M snapped a two-game losing streak. Brooks' second touchdown with 5:50 remaining in the third proved to be the difference, but the outcome wasn't certain until Liberty kicker Ben Beasley missed a 37-yard field goal with 2:07 remaining, the Flames' third failed field goal attempt of the contest.

Liberty, which rushed for 315 yards and held a 386-285 advantage in total yards, took a 13-7 lead on Zach Terrell's 6-yard touchdown run, his second, and Beasley's extra point with 10:57 remaining in the third quarter, but the advantage was only six points because the Tribe's C.J. Herbert blocked a point-after attempt in the first half.

Mike Potts, who split time at quarterback with Jake Phillips, finished 5-for-8 for 77 yards and connected with R.J. Archer on a 46-yard completion that set up Brooks' game-winning, 5-yard run. Phillips completed two passes and contributed to a solid Tribe rushing attack with 42 yards on seven attempts, including a key first down run that enable W&M to run out the clock.

The Flames also had an opportunity to retake the lead in the third, but Travis McLaurin blocked a 35-yard field goal attempt by Beasley with 1:32 on the clock.

Derek Cox paced the defense with a career-high 14 tackles, including nine unassisted, and Chris Ndubueze had a season-high 11 stops, including a key unassisted sack in the fourth quarter. Alan Wheeling finished with 11 tackles and had a 33-yard interception return that set up Brooks' first score.

A Win Over Liberty Would:

- Extend the Tribe's win streak in the series to four games (3-0).
- Snap the Tribe's four-game losing streak at Zable Stadium.
- Give W&M its second win in a Zable Stadium night game (1-4).
- Extend W&M's record against Big South teams to a perfect 9-0.
- Give the Tribe back-to-back wins for the first time since 2005.

• Extend W&M's winning streak in regular season non-conference games to six. The last regular season, non-conference loss at Zable Stadium came at the hands of Furman (52-6) in 1999.

Great Interest in Tribe Football

For the third consecutive season, the College established record sales for season tickets. Last season, the Tribe broke the 3,000 barrier for the first time and ended with over 3,100. This year, the College increased its season ticket base to 3,247. These numbers are made even more impressive when taken into prospective that coming into the 2004 season, the College had just under 2,000 season ticket holders.

Certainly, the addition of night football has helped the College

at the turnstiles, as the team has averaged 11,203 fans (44,812) over the four regular season night contests it has played since installing the permanent lighting system in 2005, including attracting a near sell-out crowd of 11,639 for this season's home opener with Delaware. The figure of 11,203 represents just over 91 percent of Zable's capacity (12,259).

Overall, five of the last six home crowds have been over the five-figure mark with the lone exception being the 2006 season finale against Richmond, which drew 9,423.

Along with the increased interest among season ticket buyers, the student body showed in record numbers for the season opener with Delaware, as over 3,400 students came through the gates. The highest previous student figure the ticket office had on record was the 2,800-plus that paid its own way to the sold-out 2004 National Semifinal contest with James Madison.

Playing At Home and Early

The Liberty game marks the second of three early home games for the Tribe, as W&M will play three times at Zable Stadium prior to Oct. 1 for the second-straight season. Last year, the Tribe entertained three opponents in consecutive weeks in September, marking the first time since 1993 that W&M played three home games in the month of September.

Additionally, with the August opener against Delaware, and the bye week not occurring until Oct. 20, the Tribe will play five total games before Oct. 1. The last time W&M played as many games prior to Oct. 1 was in 1997.

Wave that Flag

After being flagged seven times for 67 yards in the season opener against Delaware, the Tribe returned to a more familiar form at VMI, as W&M did not commit a single infraction. The last time the Tribe was not penalized in a game was in 1995. Coincidently, that flag-free afternoon also took place in Lexington, as the College defeated VMI, 27-7.

Tribe Trio Makes First Starts at VMI

Three Tribe players earned their first career starts on Saturday: seniors Graham Falbo (fullback) and Ryan Horvath (linebacker) and redshirt freshman wide receiver Cameron Dohse. Falbo and Horvath are each in their fifth seasons in the program and have worked their way from walk-ons to starters.

Falbo began his career as an offensive lineman before converting to fullback as a sophomore. He was on course to see significant playing time last season before a fall-camp knee injury cost him the season.

Horvath followed a similar path to the starting 11, as he came to campus as a linebacker, made a quick change to fullback as a sophomore, before returning to his current position in the spring of his junior year. The Midlothian, Va. native stepped into the starting line up against the Keydets to fill the void left when fellow senior, T.J. O'Neill, was unable to play due to illness. Horvath responded with a strong effort, collecting six tackles (three solo).

An injury also created an opportunity for Dohse, as he stepped into the starting role opposite Elliott Mack when junior D.J. McAulay was lost for the season (knee) in the week one loss to Delaware. McAulay is the second projected starting wide receiver to miss playing time for the Tribe this season, as veteran senior Nicholas (knee) has missed the first two contests of the season. He was a member of the travel party this weekend, but did not see game action.

One of the more interesting facts from Saturday's game with VMI is that the Tribe coaching staff managed to insert 56 of the 58 members of the travel party into game action.

Jake Phillips leads the CAA Football conference in passing efficiency (200.4) and is second in passing yards (337.5).

Second True Freshman Sees Action

Due to depth issues along the Tribe's defensive front, true freshman Mike Stover saw his first game action against VMI. With the playing time, he joined Terrell Wells (cornerback) as members of the 2007 recruiting class to see the field.

Stover, who became the first Tribe true freshman defensive lineman to see game action since Brian Williamson in 2003, contributed three assisted tackles on the afternoon.

Offensive Notes

Offensive Awakening

Nine days after rolling up 542 total yards of offense and 24 of the team's 31 points, with no turnovers, in the season opener against Delaware, the unit was near flawless in putting together a 63-point performance in the win over VMI. The 542-yard effort stands as the most total yardage a William and Mary team has produced in a season opener during the 28-year Laycock era.

After yielding the first turnover of the season on the second snap of the game on a Jake Phillips' fumble, the Tribe attack was nearly unstoppable, amassing 524 yards of total offense and scoring

touchdowns on nine of its 11 ensuing possessions. After the initial miscue, W&M ran a total of 34 offensive plays over its next seven possessions for the remainder of the first half and faced a third down situation just three times, converting twice. The team finished averaging nearly eight yards per play (7.7 yards on 68 plays).

The 63-point total is the most for any Laycock coached team and is the school's highest single-game performance since the 1932 season, when W&M hung a 77-0 defeat on Bridgewater College. The 46-point margin of victory is the biggest since the Tribe defeated another Big South Conference member, Liberty, 56-0 in 2005. W&M has scored 95 points and produced 1,066 yards of total offense over the first two games of the season. Currently, the College is leading the CAA in both scoring offense (47.0) and passing offense (354.0) and is second to Delaware in total offense (533.0).

One of the unit's goals of the offseason was to improve from a 2006 season which saw the offense produce uncharacteristically low numbers, as the team averaged 19 points and 339.4 yards per game. The team's opening two performances would rank as the second and third best efforts over the previous 22 games prior the 2007 season.

Just once prior to the start of 2007, dating back to the 2005 season opener, had the College recorded more total yardage, a 630-yard production in the win at Towson last season. In fact, last season the College reached the 400-yard mark of total offense just twice, which included a 472-yard effort vs. VMI.

Did You Know?

The Tribe offense has had 22 total possessions in the first two games and has produced points on 13 of those possessions with 12 touchdowns and one field goal.

A Healthy Dohse

As previously mentioned, redshirt freshman Cameron Dohse made his first career start at VMI. His steady play and sure hands allowed the Tribe passing attack to not skip a beat, as he brought down four spirals for a team-high 77 yards, including a 22-yard touchdown. He averaged 19.3 yards per reception and had a long of 28 yards. All four of his catches moved the chains for the College and several were of the acrobatic variety.

His play Saturday was a continuation of the productivity he showed throughout the spring and into the fall, especially in scrimmage situations. With the absence of McAulay, Dohse's continued improvements and contributions will be crucial to the team's success.

The Good Hands People

While on the subject of the Tribe's receiving corps, the unit came was one of the specific offensive areas challenged for improvement in the off-season. Despite the absence of projected senior starter Joe Nicholas, who has missed the first two games with an injured knee, and the loss of its fastest wide out (McAulay) for the season, the Tribe's receiving corps continues to make an early impact.

If you removed Joe Nicholas' team high 41 receptions for 597 yards and eight scores from last season's 11-game total, all the remaining receivers on the roster combined for 75 catches for 1,083 yards and five scores. Through just two games this season, the current receiving rotation has already amassed 28 catches for 480 yards and three scores. The expected injection of Nicholas back into the line up should further bolster what has already proven to be a productive unit.

Phillips On Target

When it comes to hot starts, few can lay claim to being any more dialed in than junior quarterback Jake Phillips. One game removed from setting the school single-game passing record (433 yards) in the season opener against Delaware, Phillips came out against VMI and was razor sharp, completing 13 of his 15 attempts for 242 yards and three touchdowns in just one half of action.

The performance raised his quarterback efficiency rating to an eye-catching 200.36, as he has completed 39 of his 56 attempts (.696) for 675 yards and five touchdowns over the first two games of 2007.

The 200.36 QB rating currently leads the CAA and ranks third nationally, while his average of 337.5 passing yards per game ranks second in the league.

Phillips, who is coming off an '06 season that saw him battle injuries and inconsistency, has had complete command of the Tribe attack, as his two-game total of 675 yards is the most for a Tribe quarterback since former All-American Lang Campbell passed for 746 in consecutive games (378 vs. Northeastern, 368 vs. Liberty) during his Payton Award winning 2004 campaign. The Warm Springs, Va. native has already equaled his entire touchdown production of a year ago with five passing and one rushing.

3,000 and Counting

With the 242-yard effort vs. VMI, Phillips pushed his career total to 3,002 passing yards and sits just 86 away from breaking into the College's all-time top 10. Dave Murphy, 1980-83, currently holds the 10th position in the Tribe's record books with 3,087 yards.

Down Field

What makes Phillips' early season surge even more impressive is the fact he is completing nearly 70 percent of his passes while still averaging more than 17 yards per completion. On the year, 16 of his 39 completions have gone for 20 yards, or more.

Close, but not Quite

In case you were wondering, as impressive as Phillips' 242 passing yards and three touchdowns were for one half's worth of work, it stands as only his second-best career single-half effort. Phillips threw for 256 yards and four scores in just over a quarter of action in leading the Tribe to the improbable 21-point, fourth quarter comeback at Northeastern in 2005. That afternoon, he came in right at the start of the fourth quarter, with the College trailing 31-10 and led the team to a 44-41 double overtime win.

Ground Gains

Traditionally, much of the attention the Tribe offense receives is centered on its intricate passing attack. But, as the old football adage goes, you've got to run the ball to win and run the Tribe did against VMI, as the College racked up an impressive 281 yards on the ground, averaging 5.3 yards per carry over 47 attempts.

The last time the Tribe rushed for more yards in game was the 56-0 win over Liberty in 2005. That afternoon saw the Tribe roll to 335 yards on 64 carries (5.2 yards/attempt).

Through the first two games, W&M has rushed a total of 80 times for 358 yards, averaging 4.5 yards per carry and 179.0 yards rushing per game with and seven touchdowns. Last season, the College scored a total of just 11 rushing touchdowns.

Did You Know? II

Since joining the league in 1993, the College has rushed for 200, or more, yards 46 times in 163 total games. The Tribe's record in those contests is a gaudy 45-1, with its only loss coming during the 2001 season, when it fell 34-31 at Rhode Island.

Odds and Ends

Speaking of the rushing game, the Tribe tailback tandem of DeBrian Holmes and Courtland Marriner each turned in notable performances vs. the Keydets.

Holmes, who is in his first season as the starting tailback, had 42 yards on just nine carries. Included on his afternoon was a career high three rushing touchdowns. In fact, the three rushing tallies surpassed his entire career total (two) entering the game. Through two games, Holmes has rushed 26 times for 95 yards.

Marriner ended the game with 107 rushing yards on just 13 carries, an average of 8.2 yards per attempt. His performance made him the first redshirt freshman to rush for over 100-yards since Delmus Coley turned the trick four-straight games during the 2003 season.

Game Notes

Great Ending

The coaching staff has made a point of concentrating some schemes that take more advantage of the impressive physical skills that 6-7, 250-plus pound tight end Andrew Atchison brings to the table, especially in the passing game. The plan was made a reality in the season opener vs. Delaware, as the senior from Charlottesville was one of the team's most effective offensive weapons. He brought down six passes for 139 receiving yards, including a 50-yard touchdown catch and run. Atchison's 139-yard effort stands as the best single-game performance for a Tribe tight end since Glenn Bodnar set the school's position record with a 183-yard performance vs. Colgate in 1983. Atchison's six-receptions against the Blue Hens are the most for a Tribe tight end since the 1999 season, when current Denver Bronco, Mike Leach, brought down seven spirals for 64 yards in a 30-20 loss to James Madison.

While Atchison saw just a half of action at VMI, and was mainly used in the running game blocking, he did record one reception for a 2-yard touchdown.

With Atchison mainly on the bench in the second half, sophomore tight end Rob Varno stepped up and made the most of the opportunity. He recorded his first two career catches for 53 yards. His first career reception came in the second quarter and went for 32 yards and helped set up a short touchdown run by Holmes.

Did You Know? III

With two catches for 46 yards against VMI, sophomore wide out R.J. Archer extended his streak of consecutive games with at least one catch to 13 (every career appearance). He has caught at least two passes in his last nine-straight games and is currently tied for second on the team with seven receptions for 104 yards.

Defensive Notes

Solid Performance at VMI For Young Defensive

After a tough start to the season against Delaware, the Tribe defensive showed a number of positives in the victory over VMI Saturday. Facing the Keydets' option-heavy ground attack, the Tribe forced a pair of turnovers, limited VMI to just two third-down conversions and recorded a pair of sacks and seven total tackles for loss. Additionally, the Tribe defense created two more turnovers on downs and allowed VMI to enter the red zone only twice. With VMI only attempting five passes on the afternoon, the Tribe handled the rushing attack well in limiting the Keydets to 249 yards rushing and 271 total yards overall.

Third Down Success Against VMI

One of the key's to the Tribe's success on Saturday against VMI was the defense's ability to come up with big thirddown stops. VMI was just 2-for-12 on third down conversions against the Tribe, a huge improvement over Delaware's success rate of 70% (7-10) against W&M in the season opener. The Tribe forced VMI into three three-and-out series', and the unit also did not allow a first down on another Keydet possession, which ended in a fumble recovery for W&M.

Youth Movement on Defense

A look at the Tribe's roster reveals only three seniors on the defensive side of the ball, while a glance at the two deep shows eight redshirt or true freshman and an additional eight redshirt or true sophomores. This season in just two games, four defensive players have made their first career start, while an additional 10 have seen the playing field for the first time. Six sophomores have started both games, and the 10 players to see their first collegiate snaps this season are redshirt freshmen Evan Francks (LB), Michael Alvarado (DB), Bryan Jean-Pierre (DL), Derek Toon (DL), Carl Watts (DL), Nick Dewispeleare (LB), Wes Steinman (LB) and Ben Cottingham (DB) and true freshmen Terrell Wells (DB) and Michael Stover (DL).

And, a number of the youngsters have made key contributions in the first two games. Dewispeleare collected eight total tackles in his first appearance, which came Saturday at VMI. Francks, who has seen action in both games, recorded five total tackles at VMI, including his first-career sack. Stover made his debut at VMI and collected three tackles, while Wells had one of the defensive highlights of the opener against Delaware, scoring on a 28-yard fumble recovery in the fourth quarter.

Safeties Step Up at VMI

The Tribe's two starting safeties, David Caldwell (Strong) and Robert Livingston (Free), each turned in strong performances at VMI. Caldwell made his second start at the position and recorded a career-high 15 total tackles, including 1.5 for loss, surpassing his previous career mark of 10 set last year against Richmond. Caldwell's 15 stops were the highest single-game tackle total since former safety James Miller ('06) recorded 16 at Villanova in 2005. Livingston tallied nine tackles against VMI, narrowly missing a second-straight double-digit tackle game after making 10 stops in the opener against Delaware. On the strength of Saturday's efforts, Caldwell leads the squad with 20 stops, and Livingston is tied for second with 19 tackles. Caldwell is also ninth in the CAA in tackles per game (10.0), while Livingston is just outside the top 10 at 11th (9.5). Caldwell also forced a fumble against the Keydets and broke up a pass. Livingston was one of three defenders with double-digit tackles against Delaware, finishing with 10.

Herbert Records Third Career Blocked Kick

Sophomore defensive end C.J. Herbert has already demonstrated an impressive proficiency in blocking placement kicks during his young career, picking up his third career blocked kick in the win over VMI. Herbert blocked an extra point try in the second half. Last year, Herbert blocked two placement kicks, including a key extra point attempt in the one-point win at Liberty.

Right Place, Right Time For Rutter

Junior linebacker Josh Rutter turned in another solid effort in his second game back, recording eight tackles and recovering a pair of VMI fumbles. The two fumble recoveries are the top mark in the CAA through two weeks. Rutter returned to the field against Delaware for the first time since missing the final eight games of 2006 with a knee injury. Against the Blue Hens, Rutter collected 11 total tackles and showed the hard hitting, play-making ability that enabled him to lead all league freshmen in tackles as a redshirt rookie in 2005 with 109.



David Caldwell recorded a career-high 15 total tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss, against VMI.

Through two games, Rutter is tied with teammate Robert Livingston for 11th in the CAA in tackles per game (9.5).

Horvath Starts Senior Season Strong

Senior linebacker Ryan Horvath challenged for a starting role through fall camp and his performance in the first two games has been impressive. Horvath started Saturday's game at VMI after T.J. O'Neill was unable to play.

Against VMI, the senior contributed to overall solid defensive effort with six total tackles, including three unassisted stops against the Keydets' option attack. Horvath, who has primarily seen playing time on special teams the past two seasons, also recorded six total tackles against Delaware in the opener, including four unassisted, with one emphatic stop behind the line of scrimmage. He also forced the fourth-quarter fumble that was recovered and returned for a touchdown by freshman Terrell Wells.

Pigram Tops in Tackles vs. Delaware

Junior linebacker Michael Pigram collected a game-high 13 total tackles in the loss to Delaware. Pigram, who started all 11 games at outside linebacker last season as a true sophomore, started the 2007 campaign strong with five solo tackles, including an unassisted tackle for loss. After collecting 14 tackles and a fumble recovery as a true freshman in 2005, Pigram was third on the team last year with 69 total stops, including 38 unassisted tackles and 4.5 stops behind the line of scrimmage. The hard-hitting backer also led the team with three forced fumbles in 2006.

Tribe Quick Hitters

• Sophomore David Caldwell collected a career-high 15 tackles in the win over VMI, surpassing his previous careermark of 10 set in last year's season finale against Richmond.

• Redshirt freshmen Nick Dewispeleare, Wes Steinman and Ben Cottingham and true freshman Michael Stover all made their collegiate debuts at VMI. Dewispeleare recorded eight tackles, including five unassisted.

• After connecting on his first career field goal attempt vs. Delaware, a 20-yarder, in the season opener, sophomore kicker Brian Pate set a single-game school record with nine successful point-after tries against VMI. Pate 13-for-13 on PATs through two games.

• Redshirt freshman David Miller punted only one time on Saturday at VMI, recording a 42-yarder. Miller's season average, on three attempts, is 42.0 and would be fourth in the CAA, though the rookie does not have enough attempts to qualify for the league rankings.

• Quarterback Jake Phillips set single-game records for passing yards (433) and total offense (462) against Delaware, surpassing the previous records of 426 passing yards and 454 yards of total offense held by David Corley in the same game against Northeastern in 2000.

• Wide receiver D.J. McAulay and tight end Drew Atchison each recorded career highs in receiving yards with 162 and 139, respectively, in the season opening loss to Delaware.

• True freshman Terrell Wells returned a fumble 28-yards for a touchdown in his collegiate debut, becoming the first Tribe true freshman to score a touchdown since Troy Keen in 1992.

Comments From Monday's CAA Football Coaches Conference Call:

Coming off a very big win, 63-16 over VMI last weekend, can you talk about the success your team had in Lexington?:

A: Well, we got off to a shaky start, fumbling on the second play from scrimmage [on own 34 yard line]. But, our defense did a heck of a job holding VMI to a field goal and from then on, I thought we executed very well offensively and were very efficient. Jake Phillips had a fine game. He was very much on target throwing the ball. I thought we executed well. In the second quarter, we got some breaks and good field position and we were able to take advantage of it. In the second half, we got to play a lot of people and it turned out to be a pretty good day. I think that VMI team is much better than what the score would

indicate.

What did you see better defensively from week one to week two, besides fewer points?:

A: I think we ran to the ball better, that's a very basic thing on defense. You can't just depend on one guy to make the play, and I thought we improved in that area. We had some miscues with defending the option, which is understandable because it's a hard offense to get ready for in a week. The point the staff made to the defense was that we needed to get around to the ball more and run better, and I thought we idd a nice job.

Talk about the difference with junior quarterback Jake Phillips between this year and last?:

A: Well for one thing, we're catching the ball better. Past that, Jake is improving with his decision making, he's throwing the ball on time and he can anticipate things better through experience. He's playing with a lot of confidence. He was 13 for 15 on Saturday [for 242 yards and three TDs] and one of his incompletions was an out and out drop, and the other one was a bad call on my part. He played really, really well and he had good help around him. Our offensive line is doing okay protecting and, like I said, the guys are catching the ball. Again, specifically, I think it's a matter of him playing with confidence and making good decisions and anticipating things and going ahead and not waiting for a receiver to come wide open or hoping that he'll come wide open. He is using his experience and putting the ball where [the receiver] is going to be and he is putting it in there accurately.

It looks like [redshirt freshman] Cameron Dohse really stepped up for you Saturday [with four receptions for 77 yards and one TD]. What makes him a good receiver?:

A. Well he's a tough, competitive young man. He's really worked at learning the offense, and he's still working at that part. But he's competitive, he works hard at practice, and I think he's got good ability and if you take good ability and you work hard at practice you've got a chance to get better and that's what he's done.

How is [senior wide out] Joe Nicholas coming along [with making his return from a preseason knee injury]?:

A: Joe is coming along well. We're going to practice [Monday] and see how it goes. If it that goes well, we'll practice him again [Tuesday] and see how that goes. If all that goes well, maybe he'll be ready to play some this weekend.

What do you expect from Liberty's run game this weekend with getting Rashad Jennings back? With Zach Terrell, they've got that one-two punch going again.:

A: Yeah, we had a heck of a time last year trying to slow them down and they look to be even better this year. And with Jennings back in, he's a heck of a back. Again, we had our difficulties in that first game against Delaware trying to slow down the running game and that's going to be a big challenge for our defense this week.

How much have you been able to tell just from watching the first few films with Liberty, how much they've improved or how much different they are as a team than last year?:

A: They look to be faster, they look to be stronger, and they seem to be executing better than they did last year. They're a very good football team from what I've seen. They look to be very good.

Is it difficult to switch gears and go from the VMI option to what Liberty runs on offense in preparing your defense?:

A: Well not so far as the recognition part, but the technique part and being able to handle the physical nature of the Liberty offense and its speed. Schemes are one thing, but the personnel is what makes the schemes very good and they've got very good personnel. They have good players on the offensive line and at running back, plus they have outstanding speed at the wide receiver position. It's a talented group from what we've seen and we're going to have our work cut out for us defensively, we really are.

Was it helpful to get a lot of numbers in and players in last week? Did it give you a little confidence in giving them some experience? :

A: Well it helped for morale. These guys have been practicing all pre-season and the payoff is when you get to play in a game. And these guys were excited about getting in and playing and you never know which one of those may have to step up and play a much more significant role as the season goes on.

Is R.J. Archer going to stay at wide receiver now or does his situation depend on Joe Nicholas coming back?:

A: He is going to stay a wide receiver. He has played very well in there and with Jake and [senior quarterback] Mike Potts playing very well, he would not get on the field as quarterback right now. He's a competitive young man who wants to play ball. I think we can say that one of the reasons that Jake is playing so well right now is because of R.J. and Mike Potts, because of the competition they've had [through the spring and fall]. I think that was a big factor in Jake's improvement. They've all improved, they boost each other and I think that's why our quarterback play is at a higher level right now than last year.

You mentioned Mike Potts, and he did get a little bit of action in last week's game, can you grade his performance?:

A: Mike played very well. He played the entire second half and did very well. We didn't throw much, I think it was five for six and the only one that was incomplete was caught just barely out of bounds. He ran the offense and handled things very well out there. He wasn't really put in a situation where he had to make a lot of things in a throwing game because we kept it pretty basic during the second half.

Can you talk a little bit about the running game? [Redshirt freshman] Courtland Marriner went over 100 yards for the afternoon.: A: Courtland had a great game. He is a very quick back and he made some plays just on his quickness and speed alone. I think he played well. I also thought [junior tailback] DeBrian Holmes played well, and I thought [senior tailback] Viola played well.


What was the best summer job you ever ad?:




