The Tribe continues conference play this weekend on the road, visiting 20th-ranked Hofstra. Saturday's game will mark the first trip to Shuart Stadium for W&M since 2002, when the Tribe won 16-3, and just the second visit overall. The all-time series with the Pride is tied, 2-2. Hofstra edged the Tribe, 16-14, at Zable Stadium last year for its only conference win. This season, the Pride won its first six games to equal its best start since 1999, including running out to a 3-0 CAA record, but have dropped two-straight league games, including a 35-31 loss at Villanova on Saturday. W&M will attempt to get back to .500 in conference play, after dropping a 48-34 decision to fourth-ranked UMass on Saturday. The Tribe has not lost consecutive games this season. Hofstra brings the league's top defense, in terms of total yards allowed per game (284.0), into the match-up, while W&M counters with an offense that ranks second in passing (290.8), fourth in total offense (413.9) and sixth in scoring (31.4). The Pride also feature the league's top rush defense (99.5) behind preseason All-CAA linebacker Gian Villante, who ranks second in the conference in tackles per game (10.0). Hofstra is also third in the CAA in total offense (424.2) behind quarterback Bryan Savage and wide receiver Charles Sullivan. Savage ranks third among CAA quarterbacks in passing average (291.5), while Sullivan leads the conference in receptions per game (8.12) and receiving yards per game (102.4).

Hofstra Series Notes

Unfamiliar Territory

The Tribe is making only its second trip to Long Island this Saturday. Since Hofstra joined the league in 2001, the College has played the Pride a total of four times, with three of those contests coming in Williamsburg.

The Tribe's last visit to Hempstead was 2002, meaning that none of the current players on the Tribe roster have ever visited Shuart Stadium.

A Win Over Hofstra Would ...

- Prevent W&M from losing back-to-back games for the first time this season.
- Stand as the team's second-straight road win in conference play and the third in the last five CAA road games.
- Be the Tribe's second win at Hofstra in as many appearances. The College's first, and only, visit to Hempstead was a 16-3 Tribe win in 2002.
- Improve the Tribe's all-time record vs. Hofstra to 3-2.
- Mark the team's third win in five road games on the season.
- Be the Tribe's first win over a ranked opponent since defeating a 21st-ranked Towson team 29-28 last season.

• Move the College's record to 5-4 on the season, which would be a two-win improvement over last season's 3-8 final mark. A win would also improve the program's league mark to 3-3, which would also stand as a two-win improvement over last year's 1-7 league slate.

• Mark Tribe Head Coach Jimmye Laycock's 72nd career league victory (vs. 48 losses) and 183rd all-time win.

The Last Meeting - Hofstra 16, William and Mary 14

WILLIAMSBURG (9/30/06) -- Rob Zarrilli's third field goal, a 47-yarder with 7:20 remaining in the fourth quarter, lifted Hofstra to a 16-14 victory over William and Mary in Atlantic 10 Football action at soldout Zable Stadium.

Hofstra earned its first conference victory under first-year head coach Dave Cohen.

Anton Clarkson passed for 212 yards and a first-half touchdown, an 8-yard strike to R.C. Scarpa, and Zarrilli booted two field goals to give the Pride a 13-7 lead at halftime.

The Tribe rallied to take a 14-13 lead on Jake Phillips' 46-yard flea-flicker touchdown pass to Joe Nicholas with 4:40 remaining in the third quarter, but W&M was held scoreless the rest of the way.

Phillips was 9-for-22 on the day for 189 yards and two touchdowns, including a 10-yard scoring pass to tight end Drew Atchison in the first quarter. Elijah Brooks rushed for 79 yards on 15 attempts, and Nicholas finished with three grabs for 70 yards, his 22nd-straight game with at least one reception.

Tribe defensive tackle C.J. Herbert blocked a 33-yard field goal attempt, preserving the 14-13 lead early in the fourth, before Zarrilli booted the gamewinner.

Adrian Tracy and Herbert led a solid second-half effort for the Tribe defense, which allowed only the fourth quarter field goal, while limiting the Pride to 17 yards rushing and 132 total yards over the final 30 minutes. Herbert had a solo sack in the second half, in addition to his blocked field goal, while Tracy shared the team lead with sophomore linebacker Michael Pigram with 10 total tackles.

Tough Sledding

The College is currently playing the nation's third-toughest schedule, in terms of overall combined opponent's winning percentage (.618). The winning percentage of the squad's remaining opposition is an impressive .750 (18-6), which also ranks third nationally.

Point(s) of Interest

By putting up 34 points in the loss to UMass, the College has now scored 21, or more, points in seven of its eight games this season with the only exception being the team's 41-3 loss at Virginia Tech.

The College has scored 31, or more, points in four of its seven FCS contests. Last season, the College breached the 20-point mark just three times in 11 games.

But, the 2006 season was an aberration, as in the 168 games since the College first started conference play, the team has scored 20plus points an amazing 123 times, or 73 percent of its total games.

Passing Interests

fumble recovery vs. UMass. The College has remained at, or near, the top of the league in

passing offense the entire season. Currently, the Tribe's average of 290.8 yards passing per game is the CAA's second-best figure. Led by junior all-conference candidate, quarterback Jake Phillips, the College's offense is averaging 31.4 points per contest, which ranks sixth in the league

Hofstra will counter with the league's top defense, in terms of total yards allowed, as it has yielding a paltry 284.0 total yards per contest. The Pride also boasts the league's top rush defense, as it has allowed just 99.5 rushing yards a game and a league low seven rushing touchdowns.

Crazy Afternoon

While the final score showed the College on the short side of a 48-34 loss to fourth-ranked UMass last Saturday, the game did see W&M rally from three different deficits to either take the lead, or tie the score. The last, and largest, deficit the Tribe rebounded from was a 10-point, fourth-guarter hole.

The following are some other notes from the afternoon:

• The two team's combined for 13 scoring drives in the game. Of those 13, six required less than five plays. Additionally, the game featured a one, two, three, four (twice), five, six (twice), eight, nine, 10 and 11-play scoring drives.

• Five of the 13 scoring drives covered 22-yards, or less, with the Tribe fashioning one of negative yardage, a minus-1 yard drive that led to its final points, a 20-yard field Pate field goal.

• The two team's combined for 38 fourth-quarter points, including 28 by UMass. Interestingly, the total was only the Tribe's second-highest combined scoring guarter of the season, behind the 42 in the first guarter at Villanova.

• UMass came into the game with just six total fumbles in its first seven contests, then put the ball on the ground on consecutive offensive snaps in the fourth quarter. The first was scooped and scored (62 yards) by Tribe linebacker Mike Pigram, the second was recovered and advanced 22 yards to the Minutemen's 2-yard line by linebacker Josh Rutter and eventually led to a short field goal. Remarkably, the College did the Minutemen one better, as it fumbled on consecutive touches in the third quarter (fumbled on reception, then, after UMass cashed the turnover into TD, the Tribe fumbled on the ensuing kick return).

• The Tribe had four possessions in the third quarter and held the ball for a remarkable 11:14. But, only one of those four possessions resulted in a score, a 1-yard run by Phillips. W&M missed a pair of field goals and fumbled on the other two possessions.

 Speaking of field goals, W&M attempted six total on the afternoon, which matched the second-highest single-game total in the FCS this season. The single-game high for 2007 is seven by Western Illinois vs. South Dakota State.

Good Discipline

The College is currently the least penalized team in the CAA and it's average of just 38.8 penalty vards per game ranks sixth nationally.

Who Cares?

William and Mary's average game time for the season (3:08) is currently the highest figure in the Colonial Athletic Association. Who has the fastest average game time in the league? Northeastern (2:45).

Last Road Trip

The Tribe's last road game was a 21-20 win at Maine (Oct. 13) and snapped a three-game losing skid against the CAA's Northern Division. The College bounced back from a 14-point first-half deficit to score 21-straight points against the Black Bears. The young defense turned in a spirited effort in holding Maine to only two fourth-guarter field goals.

The Tribe's defensive unit yielded just two conversions on 10 Black Bear third down attempts. It was the team's second best effort on third downs this season with the top coming in the team's 63-16 win in Lexington when it limited VMI to just two conversions in 12 attempts.

Crowded

By attracting 10,187 fans for Homecoming, eight of the school's last 10 home games have gone over the five-figure mark in attendance.

Of the Tribe's top 10 crowds since 1997, when the College readjusted its capacity figure for Zable from 15,000 to 13,279 – then reduced further to its current 12,259, six have occurred over the past two seasons.

Currently, the Tribe's average attendance of 10,310 over its first four home contests ranks second, only to last year's average of 10,645, since the 1997 season.

In terms of percentage of capacity, the College's average of .841 ranks it in the top 25 among all FCS schools, according to the NCAA website.

Hard Road

Including Saturday's game against at #20 Hofstra, the College is in the midst of a four-game stretch against ranked opponents to end the season. The Tribe's three remaining opponents have a combined

record of 18-6. Each are currently ranked in the FCS' top-15 (No. 20

Hofstra, No. 12 James Madison, No. 11 Richmond.

The Last Time

One has to go back to the 2001 season to find the last time W&M has won the last five games of a regular season. That year, the season-ending surge propelled the squad to a share of the Atlantic 10 Title and an NCAA postseason bid.

That year, a dominant Homecoming performance over an 18th-ranked Maine squad set the stage for what turned out to be an exciting final three-game stretch. The 42-10 win vs. the Black Bears was the second of the five wins in the final stretch.

Big Start

The 42 combined first quarter points Villanova and W&M scored was a school-record for the Laycock era. The previous record was 37, set in 1985 when Temple ran out to a 28-9 lead after the opening stanza.

The single quarter record for the Laycock era came in the 1988 season, when the College combined with Georgia to score 45 points in the second quarter. The Bulldogs accounted for 35 of those points in what became an eventual 59-24 win over the Tribe.

The NCAA record for first quarter points is 49, set between Portland State and Delaware State in 1990. The record for points in any quarter is 50, set between Alabama State and Prairie View in 1991.

Did You Know?

Coming into this season, in 11 total victories since the beginning of the 2005 season only one had come with the Tribe scoring fewer than 27 points, a 14-13 win at Liberty in 2006.

This season, the College has doubled that number in just seven games, as it has won 21-20 at Maine and 27-22 against Towson.

Taking that one step further, the College has won and scored fewer than 27 points only four times in its last 34 victories, dating back to the 2002 season.

Offensive Notes

Quality Quarterback

Junior all-conference candidate, quarterback Jake Phillips was limited to a season-low 170 passing yards by the talented UMass defensive unit. But, what production he didn't get from his arm, he made up for by making plays with his legs, as he turned in a season-high 72 rushing yards gained and caught his first career pass, a 25-yard completion. While his rushing total was diminished by 23 yards due to losses on sacks, Phillips turned in a total of 244 all-purpose yards. He also accounted for a pair of touchdowns, one rushing and one passing.

- The following are some bullet points, highlighting his achievements to this point:
- He has thrown for 240-yards, or more, six times in eight starts.
- He has now thrown for two, or more, touchdowns in six of the eight games.
- Overall his 2,148 passing yards is the second highest figure in the CAA and is eighth nationally.
- His 15 touchdown passes are third in the league and ties him for 15th nationally.
- Phillips average of 284.0 yds/gm of total offense is fourth in the league and 15th nationally.
- He established the school's single-game record for passing yards by throwing for 433 yards in the loss to Delaware.

• On the season, just 41 of his 141 total completions have gone for less than 10 yards. Phillips' average of 15.23 yds/ completion is the top figure among FCS quarterbacks who have connected on 100, or more, passes on the season and the fourth-highest figure among all QBs ranked in the top 100 in total passing yards.

• He reached the 1,000-yard mark in just three games, making him the quickest to the figure in school history. The previous record was four (done many times).

Productive

With the pair of touchdowns vs. UMass, Phillips has now accounted for 19 total touchdowns (15 passing and four rushing) on the season and his average of 14.25 points responsible for a contest ranks 15th nationally.

For his career, he has produced a total of 45 total scores (32 passing, 13 rushing) in just 25 appearances, an average of 1.8 per game.

Protective

Through eight games and 247 attempts, Phillips has thrown just five interceptions. The numbers are even more impressive when looking at games against fellow FCS competition, as three of his picks came at Virginia Tech. Against FCS teams, Phillips has yielded just two interception in 214 attempts with 15 touchdown passes.

Chart Climbing

Phillips' 170-yard effort on Saturday moved his career total to 4,475 passing yards, the eighth highest figure in school history. He now rests 64 yards from passing Chris Garrity and his seventh place total of 4,536 yards set between 1979-81.

His touchdown pass against the Minutemen moved his career total to 32, which keeps him in the No. 8 position on the Tribe's all-time listing.

His 219 yards of total offense against UMass moved his career total to 4,849 yards, which also is the eighth highest total on the all-time listing.

He also ranks eighth and ninth in the school's pass completions (334) and passing attempts (578) all-time listings, respectively. (See complete listing on page 10)

Crystal Ball

If Phillips were to maintain his current average of 268.5 passing yards per game, he would become just the fourth quarterback in school history to eclipse the 3,000-yard passing mark in a season. Only two Tribe quarterbacks, former All-Americans Mike Cook (1995-98) and Lang Campbell (2002-04), have accomplished the feat during an 11-game regular season. Campbell holds the school's 11-game standard, as he threw for 3,037 yards during the 2004 regular season, on his way to winning the Payton Award. Cook's 1998 total of 3,028 passing yards sits second on the school's 11-game record books. Phillips' current average would put him at 3,109 yards.

Courtland Marriner Continues To Impress

The 5-9, 181-pound native of Chesapeake, Va. had what could have been his finest game running the ball of his young career against UMass. Marriner toted the ball a career high 21 times for 86 yards, averaging 4.1 yards per attempt. Marriner included his two longest career carries (25 and 21 yards) as he was able to use his excellent speed to get to, and around, the edge of what is a very fast UMass defense.

His performance was especially encouraging in light of the fact that his performance alone significantly improved the entire team's rushing output from a season ago, as UMass had limited the Tribe to a '06 season-low 30 rushing yards on 21 carries.

The afternoon's efforts also made him the team's leading rusher, as he has 348 yards on 80 attempts, which is also a team-high. He is averaging 4.3 yards an attempt for the season and has rushed for 80-plus yards in two of the last three games, including an 81-yard effort at Villanova. His career high came in the second game of the year when he gained 107 yards on just 13 carries at VMI.

Elite Atchison

After a series of relatively quiet games, senior tight end Drew Atchison led the team with six receptions for 65 yards and one score in front of the Homecoming crowd. The afternoon was his fourth of the season with five, or more, catches.

While this 6-7, 255-pound frame and good hands have attracted the attention of NFL scouts, the senior has also attracted the attention of opposing defenses. Over the last three games prior to UMass, Atchison had been limited to just four receptions for a total of 38 yards. At Maine, Atchison had two receptions for 14 yards, a week after being held to one catch for 21 yards at Villanova.

Currently, he is tied for the team lead for receptions (28) and his four touchdown catches rank second on the squad. His 428 receiving yards is currently the team's third highest total.

Atchison could become only the second tight end in Laycock's 28-year tenure to lead the team in either receptions or receiving yards. Glenn Bodnar (1982-84) did both in 1984, establishing team position records for both single-season receptions (69) and receiving yards (757). The position record for single-season touchdowns is held by Mike Leach (1998-99), who had six touchdowns to go along with 58 catches for 653 yards in 1998.

Atchison has two 100-yard receiving games against Delaware (139) and Liberty (103). He contributed several big plays in the team's double overtime win vs. Liberty, but none bigger than his 15-yard, diving touchdown catch in the first overtime period. In fact, five of his six catches against the Flames were for 15-yards, or more. He also had one of the team's biggest offensive plays in the season opener with Delaware, as he brought down a 50-yard touchdown catch and run. His 139-yard effort stands as the best single-game performance for a Tribe tight end since Glenn Bodnar set the school's position record with a 183-yard performance vs. Colgate in 1983. Atchison's six-receptions against the Blue Hens are the most for a Tribe tight end since 1999, when current Denver Bronco, Mike Leach, had seven receptions for 64 yards in a 30-20 loss to James Madison.

Atchison has now caught a pass in 13 straight contests for the College. His last game without a reception came in the sixth game of last season at Liberty.

Dohse's Debut Impressive

After two weeks of red-hot play, red-shirt freshman wide out Cameron Dohse was limited to just one catch for 15 yards vs. UMass. The Clifton, Va. native was coming off an outing where he established career highs in both receptions (7), receiving yards (123) and touchdowns (2) against Maine. The performance earned him the CAA's Rookie of the Week honors.

It was the second consecutive outing that Dohse breached the 100-yard receiving mark, as he set short-lived career highs in catches (6) and receiving yards (117) at Villanova on Oct. 6. Also included in his evening was a slick 24-yard touchdown grab.

Few could have predicted that the 6-0, 186-pound product of Centreville High (Clifton, Va.) would have much of an opportunity to make an impact coming into the season, as the College appeared to be loaded at the position. But, a preseason injury to one incumbent starter, senior Joe Nicholas, and then a season ending injury to another featured receiver (D.J. McAulay) in the team's first game provided an opportunity that Dohse grabbed with both hands.

Dohse is averaging an impressive 19.8 yards per catch over his 22 receptions on the season for a total of 435 yards and has a team-high five touchdown receptions. Each of his scoring grabs has been over 20 yards (22, 24, 27, 31 and 33).

While Joe Nicholas' freshman school records for receptions (66) and receiving yards (799) seem to be slightly out of reach with just four games remaining, Dohse does have an outside chance of making a run at former Tribe great Dave Conklin's freshman record of nine touchdown receptions.

Perspective

The last Tribe player to record back-to-back 100-yard receiving games was All-American wide receiver Dominique Thompson, who went for 118 and 185 yards in back to back games against Hampton and Delaware in the first and second rounds of the 2004 NCAA Playoffs.

Multiple-time All-American Rich Musinski was the last Tribe player to record three-straight 100-yard receiving games, as he put up four consecutive 100-yard efforts between the sixth and ninth games of the 2002 season.

Elliott Mack Also Enjoying Breakout Season

While Dohse has been a steady presence in the receiving corps, speedy junior Elliott Mack has the ability to provide the spectacular for the Tribe's attack. He currently leads the Tribe in receiving yards (472) and his 27 catches and four touchdowns rank third and tied for second, respectively.

On Oct. 6 at Villanova, Mack went over the 100-yard receiving mark, with a three-catch, 105-yard effort. His evening against the Wildcats was highlighted by an impressive 73-yard touchdown catch and run.

With the aforementioned injury to McAulay, Mack is now the team's most dangerous deep threat. He has turned in scoring plays of 73 and 61 yards already on the year, making him the first Tribe player since All-American Dominique Thompson (2004) to score on a pair of 60-plus yard touchdown plays in the same season.

Steady Archer

Sophomore wide receiver R.J. Archer continues to make plays for the Tribe offense. Archer hauled in three receptions for 24 yards against UMass and also completed his first career pass, a 25-yard strike to quarterback Jake Phillips. At Maine, Archer had four receptions for 29 yards, one game after he brought down five receptions for 57 yards at Villanova. Archer is tied with Atchison for the team lead with 28 receptions, which have gone for 428 yards. Archer extended his streak of consecutive games with at least one catch to 19, which accounts for every career appearance. He has caught at least two passes in 15-straight appearances, including three, or more, in the last four games. Against Towson, Archer recorded three receptions for 30 yards, and at Virginia Tech, Archer recorded three receptions as well for 39 yards.

After seeing action in all 11 games of the 2006 season as a wide receiver, Archer concentrated his entire spring, summer and the great majority of his fall camp work outs competing for the starting quarterback position. But, Archer stepped back into the starting line-up at receiver in the season opener due to injuries at the position and didn't miss a beat, contributing five receptions for 58 yards in the season opener.

Defensive Notes

Tribe Forces Season-High Four Turnovers vs. UMass

Despite the loss and 48 points surrendered to UMass, the Tribe defense turned in an overall encouraging performance, which included a season-high four turnovers gained. W&M got interceptions from linebacker Michael Pigram and defensive end Adrian Tracy and fumble recoveries by Pigram and linebacker Josh Rutter. Both interceptions were the first for Pigram and Tracy. Pigram also returned his fumble recovery 62 yards for a touchdown, his first-career score, while Rutter returned his 22 yards to the 2-yard line to set up Brian Pate's 20-yard field goal.

The last time the Tribe forced four turnovers in a game was the 2006 season-opener at Maryland, where W&M recovered three fumbles and had one interception. The Tribe's previous season-high for forced turnovers was three against Towson, which all came on interceptions. W&M now has seven picks, one shy of last season's 11-game total, and five fumble recoveries for a total of 12 forced turnovers through eight games.

W&M Records Second Defensive Touchdown

Another highlight for the defense was its second touchdown of the season on Pigram's aforementioned 62-yard fumble return. The first came on Terrell Wells' 38-yard fumble return in the season-opener vs. Delaware. W&M did not score a defensive touchdown last season and last had two, or more, in the same season in 2005. That year, the Tribe actually scored two defensive touchdowns in the same game on a pair of interception returns at Villanova.




Pigram's Performance Worth Noting

Junior linebacker Michael Pigram led the defensive effort vs. UMass with an individual performance that ranks among the best in recent years for a Tribe defender. Pigram recorded a career-high 14 total tackles, including 10 unassisted stops, recovered a fumble and returned it 62 yards for a touchdown, recorded his first-career interception and also had his first career quarterback sack.

Pigram's 62-yard fumble return for a touchdown was the longest fumble return for a touchdown since Mike Beverly's 46-yard return for a score against VMI in 1998. The last player to have a fumble recovery and an interception in the same game was Jon Shaw in 2005 against Richmond. The last player to score a defensive touchdown and have a quarterback sack in the same game was Ryan Nickell against Towson, also in 2005. Nickell returned an interception 72 yards for a touchdown.

On the strength of Saturday's game, Pigram brought his season total for tackles to 66, which is just three shy of his career-high, 11game total of 69 last season. He ranks second on the squad with 66 total stops and is 15th in the CAA in tackles per game (8.2).

Strong Second Half Helps Tribe Win at Maine

The defensive effort in the second half played a huge role in the

Tribe's 21-20 win at Maine on Oct. 13. Despite a tough first half, the defense buckled down in the second half and allowed only a pair of late Black Bear field goals to secure the victory. Taking into account Maine had first downs inside the Tribe 25-yard line on both field goal drives, the defensive stands were even more critical.

After W&M took the lead 21-14 in the fourth, Maine reached the red zone on its next possession and had a first down at the Tribe 16. A key sack by Adrian Tracy on third down though left the Black Bears with only a 32-yard field goal. On the Tribe's next possession, a fumbled punt snap gave it right back to Maine at the W&M 24-yard line. Maine managed only five yards on three plays, thanks in part to a key pass break-up by Derek Cox on second down, and again settled for a field goal, before the Tribe ran out the clock on offense.

W&M allowed only 132 total yards in the second half, and the Black Bears were just 1-for-5 on third down conversions after halftime. Also, only 51 of Maine's 125 yards passing came in the second half.

Maine was also denied on a fourth-down conversion attempt early in the third quarter, a stop that helped swing the momentum in the Tribe's favor. Facing a fourth-and-one at the W&M 11-yard line leading 14-7, Maine running back Jamal Fluellen was stacked up for no gain by linebackers Josh Rutter and Wes Steinman, resulting in a turnover on downs. W&M went on to tie the game on its ensuing possession.

Third Down Success A Winning Trend

Maine's lone successful third-down conversion in the second half matched its total from the first half, as the Black Bears were just 2-for-10 on third-down tries against the Tribe in the game. In the Tribe's four victories this season, opponents have converted 30.2% of their third-down attempts (16-for-53). Conversely, in the Tribe's four losses, opponents have had a 48.2% success rate on third downs (27-for-56).

Pass Defense Second in the Conference

Despite allowing an opponent season-high 218 yards passing to UMass, the Tribe's pass defense was still ranked second in this week's CAA stats report. W&M is allowing 175.5 passing yards per game, which is less than a full yard per game behind JMU (173.3). On the strength of holding Maine to 125 yards passing, W&M had its season average to a league-low 169.4 yards passing per game last week. The Tribe's total of seven interceptions is the fourth-best total in the CAA.

Youth Movement on Defense

A look at the Tribe's roster reveals only three seniors on the defensive side of the ball, while a glance at the two deep shows nine redshirt or true freshmen and an additional eight redshirt or true sophomores. This season, seven defensive players have made their first career start, including most recently true freshman tackle Michael Stover who started at Maine. An additional 10 players have seen the playing field for the first time this season. Six sophomores have started, and the 10 players to see their first collegiate snaps this season are redshirt freshmen Evan Francks (LB), Michael Alvarado (DB), Bryan Jean-Pierre (DL), Derek Toon (DL), Carl Watts (DL), Nick Dewispelaere (LB), Wes Steinman (LB) and Ben Cottingham (DB) and true freshmen Terrell Wells (DB) and Stover.

Tribe Among CAA Statistical Leaders

Taking a look at this week's CAA stats, sophomore strong safety David Caldwell is 12th in tackles per game, averaging 9.0 stops per game. Caldwell leads the team with 72 total tackles and has the league's third-best total for an underclassmen. Junior linebackers Josh Rutter and Michael Pigram were tied for 15th, averaging 8.2 tackles per game. With three interceptions, Derek Cox is second in the league lead in total interceptions and second in passes defended (1.00). In conference games only, Pigram is seventh in tackles per game (9.8), as the junior has recorded 49 of 72 stops in CAA games.

Caldwell Leads Tribe In Tackles

Sophomore strong safety David Caldwell is building a case for postseason honors, turning in another strong performance in the win over Massachusetts with seven unassisted tackles. At Maine, Caldwell shared the team lead against the Black Bears with nine total tackles.

This season, Caldwell leads the Tribe with 72 tackles, including a team-best 42 unassisted stops. He has 4.5 stops behind the line of scrimmage, one forced fumble and an interception.

He recorded a career-high 15 total tackles, including 1.5 for loss, earlier this season in the win at VMI, surpassing his previous career mark of 10 set last year against Richmond. Caldwell's 15 stops were the highest single-game tackle total since former safety James Miller ('06) recorded 16 at Villanova in 2005. Caldwell also forced a fumble against the Keydets and broke up a pass.

Tracy Gets Back on Track

Sophomore defensive end Adrian Tracy continued his recent strong play with a seven-tackle effort in the win at Maine and followed with his first-career interception in the loss to UMass. It was the second interception by a Tribe defensive lineman this season with Sean Lissemore having the other vs. Towson. At Maine, Tracy Included his second solo quarterback sack of the season, a key play in the fourth quarter that came on a third down situation. For his effort, Tracy was named the coaching staff's defensive player of the week.

Tracy turned in an impressive effort at Virginia Tech on Sept. 22, collecting a game and season-high 3.0 tackles for loss and finishing with six total tackles in all, including five unassisted stops. He continued the resurgence the following week against Towson with six unassisted tackles, including a solo TFL, and then led team in tackles at Villanova on Oct. 6 with nine total stops. Tracy, who led the Tribe and all league rookies in 2006 in tackles for loss (15.5) and quarterback sacks (6.0), grabbed his first passer sack of the season against the Hokies and brought his TFL total to 6.5 against Maine.

Cox's Performance Gains League Award

Junior Derek Cox was named the CAA Defensive Player of the Week for his effort in the Tribe's win over Towson, becoming the first Tribe player to earn the award since Stephen Cason (2001-05) in 2005. Cox recorded a pair of interceptions against the Tigers, becoming the first Tribe defender to accomplish the feat since 2005 and added an additional three pass break-ups.

With opponent's offensives often directing their attack away from Cox, the junior was putting together a solid, but rather quiet season, up until the Towson game. Since then, Cox was credited with four solo stops at Villanova and followed with a game-high eight unassisted tackles in the victory at Maine. Against UMass, Cox collected seven total tackles, including six unassisted stops and a tackle behind the line of scrimmage. Cox is second in the CAA in total interceptions with three and is also tied for second in passes defended per game (1.00).

Rutter Continues Solid Play

Junior linebacker Josh Rutter has been a key leader and consistent contributor for the young Tribe defense this season, ranking among the team leaders in nearly every statistical category. His return to form this season, after missing eight games in 2006 due to a knee injury, has been a welcome boost. He continued his strong play in the loss to UMass with eight total tackles, including five solo. He also forced a fumble he then recovered and returned 22 yards to set up a field goal. It was the third fumble recovery of the season for him. At Maine, Rutter shared the team lead with nine total tackles in the victory and broke up a pass. He is third on the squad with 65 stops and has four pass break-ups and one sack.

Rutter led all league rookies as a redshirt freshman in 2005 with 109 total tackles and tallied 6.5 tackles for loss that season. He has seven career double-digit tackle games, including two this season. After missing the final eight games of 2006, Rutter came back strong this fall with 11 total tackles in the season opener against Delaware. At Virginia Tech, Rutter accomplished a first, recording a quarterback sack against the Hokies. It was one of a season-high four sacks for the Tribe. In the win over Liberty, Rutter recorded 15 stops, one shy of his career-mark set in 2005 against Marshall.

Rutter is averaging 8.2 tackles per game, which is 15th in the CAA.

Defensive Quick Hits

• Sophomore Adrian Tracy recorded his first career interception against UMass and the second for a defensive lineman this season (Sean Lissemore, vs. Towson).

• Senior T.J. O'Neill made his first start at defensive end this season, while sophomore C.J. Herbert made his first at tackle after starting the first seven at defensive end.

• Junior Michael Pigram recorded the first interception, touchdown and sack of his career against UMass.

• Senior Ryan Horvath made his first start at linebacker since the Virginia Tech game after missing the last three with a concussion.

• Sophomore Sean Lissemore returned to the starting line-up at tackle after missing the Maine game with a shoulder injury.

• True freshman Michael Stover made his first career start at defensive tackle at Maine and recorded four total tackles.

- Stover is the seventh defensive player to make his first career star this season.
- Redshirt freshman tackle Derek Toon recorded a career-high four total tackles at Maine, including an unassisted TFL.

Comments From Monday's CAA Football Coaches Conference Call:

• Can you talk about the hard fought game against UMASS this past Saturday? JL: I thought we played very hard against an outstanding team. We played better on defense and got some turnovers; offensively we moved the ball well. We ended up missing four field goals and you'd like to be able to get points more often when you're [in scoring position].

[After falling behind 34-24, in the fourth quarter] We came back to tie it at 34 all,

but were not able to come up with a stop on a big third down. Then [UMass] kicked it in and scored. Really, [the game was] a one touchdown ballgame as you look at it. Our guys played hard, but not hard enough.

• You mentioned the defense, and even with 48 points allowed, it looked like a good effort by the unit. Why do you feel you were so effective and where are you seeing improvement with this unit right now?

JL: We've simplified it down and they understand the scheme better and they're playing hard. I thought [junior linebackers] Josh Rutter and Michael Pigram continued to play very, very well. They're around the football making things happen; They got a few turnovers [each recovered fourth quarter fumbles], as well. I think [sophomore lineman] C.J. Herbert has been a very solid consistent player and the team got [fellow sophomore defensive tackle Sean] Lissemore back and that helped us. But there are still plenty of areas we need to get better on. But, except for spots in the fourth quarter, I thought we played pretty well defensively.

• With the game on the road against Hofstra, do you sense that you'll have some work to do getting the guys back up because they were so high [for UMass]. Does that make it a more difficult motivational chore?

JL: I don't think so, they'll get ready to play. The problem will be with how good a team Hofstra is. With the little tape I've seen on them, they're a very good team. They run well, they've got some athletes on offense. I think that's more of a concern than worrying about possible motivation. I think our guys will be ready to play.

• What kind of challenge do you face against Hofstra's defense?

JL: They've stopped most everybody they've played. They've got one of the top defenses, if not the top in the conference, so that says it right there. They've got good linebackers, a good front seven who can play hard and run to the ball. They look very good on film.

• Your defense produced four turnovers against UMass. Can you talk a little bit about those and how they sparked your play?

JL: We got a couple plays. Michael Pigram picked up a fumble and took it in [for a 42-yard touchdown return], Josh Rutter [recovered a fumble] and took it down to the 2-yard line. We weren't able to knock it in and had to settle for a field goal on that possession. We'd like to have scored [seven points] on that one. On the other hand, we turned the ball over twice ourselves there in the fourth quarter. One on the kick off return and one after we completed a pass that would have been very close to a first down. So we gave them two that were big in the fourth quarter also. It just goes back and forth, you have to make some plays and we made some plays, but not enough. Again, credit UMass. They came back from some mistakes and when we tied it up at 34-34, they took the ball to drive it down the field and score and we were not able to stop them. And then we got the ball back and we were not able to take it down there.

• In reading some of the post-game comments one of your players referenced, "We played good for three quarters but didn't necessarily play great in the fourth." Is that something you talked to them about or is that something they know?

JL: Most of our players are pretty intelligent, they can figure things out and they don't need me to point out things like that. They can look at the tape and understand what they need to do better. And, again, it's not necessarily what we did bad, it's what the other team did well and I thought UMass did a lot very well.

• Mike had a monster afternoon with 14 tackles, an interception, a fumble recovery, a sack, and a touchdown on his fumble recovery. Can you talk about his season so far and what he's meant to the defense?

JL: Mike is just a great leader, plays very hard and very enthusiastically. He also practices that way. He isn't the biggest linebacker [at 5-10, 220] by any stretch, especially not in this league, but certainly plays hard. He really learns our defense and works hard at it and he's one that you never worry about how he's going to play. He's going to play his same way every game, he's very consistent about his preparation.

• What was your favorite non-sports activity?: I would say Student Government definitely. Being involved in a new school at Westfield, in Student

Government I could come back to the high school and point my finger and say there are a lot of things that I started or helped to start that are still there today.

• Give an example of one thing in particular.: In terms of a tangible thing, I had a direct hand in the mascot that currently sits by the football field. Actually a teammate and myself had to drive about an hour to Winchester and pick up this big clay Bulldog that still sits by the football field today. It was our class gift, and it's still standing there today. It was a little heavier than we thought it would be, but we got the job done.

• You are currently a fullback, but weren't you recruited to come to William and Mary as an offensive lineman?: I was not recruited ... I ended up walking on here. They had some interest in me as a long snapper and I played offensive line in high school, so that's what I tried to come in and play.

• I guess playing on the offensive line wouldn't be easy at 6-0, 240-pounds: Well, you can be a smaller guy at the offensive line in high school and still do a good job. I came here and I learned a lot about playing the position from [Tribe offensive line] coach [Bob] Solderitch --- he pounds it into your head in meetings. But, I got to the point where I wasn't able to get the necessary size on my frame. And being behind [former all-conference center] Pat Malloy was fun, I learned a lot, but I pretty much knew I wasn't going to be able to get any playing time with him at the position. I had to make a switch. Quick feet was the only thing I had going for me at offensive line, so I decided to shed some pounds and try my hand at fullback.

• Did the staff really embrace that decision?: It was my own decision, [running backs] coach [Steven] Jerry had talked to me about swiching while I was still playing the line, but it was just kind of my own thing. I wanted to play and get on the field. The staff was very nice about it, they just kind of said "Hey, if that's where you want to play, if that's what you feel you're going to be able to help us as a team, then go ahead."

• What was your experience here, as a non-scholarship player trying to earn playing time?: One thing I could really say, coming in, I didn't exactly know who was or wasn't on scholarship. And that really still holds true to this day, I can't tell who's on scholarship and I credit that to the way they treat walk on's as fairly as everybody else. Now I've gotten on a scholarship and obviously I've benefited from having the money help out with tuition. I love the fact that they hold a few scholarships for walk ons who have done the work and improved enough to contribute and earn the money. Actually, I wasn't even really what they would call a 'preferred walk-on' initially [a player who gets invited to fall camp as a true freshman]. I was going to come in and start practicing when the school year started for the rest of the student body, but, at the last moment, someone must have quit the team and they invited me to down for the fall drills. I had to decide in a couple of hours to do it, then pack my car and drive down, more-or-less right away. I got [on campus] just hours before the first practice started and was able to participate in it.

• Your path from walk-on to starter was not an easy one. Talk about some of the set backs and injuries you've endured.: The big one was the first switch to fullback in the Spring of 2005, my red-shirt freshman year. My red-shirt sophomore year was the first season I actually played fullback. Toward the end of that I knew I had to change my body a little and by the spring I had put myself in good position to compete for playing time, both physically and mentally. Unfortunately, that's when I tore my ACL - in the last practice before the spring game [running practice ending wind sprints]. So, I worked back all last season, rehabbing for nearly an entire year. I really could not have done it without the support of our training staff.

• What do you think is behind your desire to play football?: I love everything about it. We always talk about how 11 people being on the same page at once is just really and amazing thing. And I've developed lifetime friendships with the guys on the team. Being a part of this team and program is something I'm going to miss – it was also that desire to be a part of it that drove me to get back out there.

• Was there ever a time when you doubted that you were going to make it onto the field?: Absolutely, it was after my true freshman season. I just opened my eyes and looked around the room one meeting. Seeing the other lineman and how big they were and thinking, what am I doing? I pretty much had taken myself off the team, saying I don't think I can play here I'm just going to concentrate on academics. Fortunately, after realizing it was a rash decision and that I love football, I knew I couldn't quit. Luckily they let me back on the team and it's been uphill ever since. It was tough when I blew out my knee to keep everything in focus, but Coach Laycock told me in a season-ending meeting to keep trucking and to not give up. To hear him say that to me, out of 100 players, meant a lot. But, I knew what I had achieved in the spring and I knew I could do make it back and contribute. I just wanted to make myself better for this year, and you know I'm stronger for it.

• How did it feel when you actually made the first start of your career against Delaware this season?: It was pretty intense. It is hard to say that I wasn't thinking about all the all the ups and downs that I've gone through, both individually and with my teammates. It was an amazing feeling for me to just be out there and being able to contribute. It is really a moment that I'll never forget.

• What do you think makes playing at W&M such a special thing?: You know, everybody knows [William and Mary] for being a very strong academic school. And it's really rigorous as a school. I think the student-athletes who come out of here not only competed on the field at the highest level, but also competed at a high level in the classroom. As I've come out with a degree already, it something I can hang my hat on and be proud.

• We have three games left in your senior year, how do you feel like your class is going to look at these remaining contests?: I go back to my true freshman year [2003] when we had a really rough [1-5] start and we rebounded to win the last four games. It was really amazing how winning those last four games can pull it together going into off-season training. I think that's something we need to mention when we talk to the younger guys. Remind them of that, that we came back next year and did something the school has never done by going 11-3 and winning a championship. We have a board in the locker room of the best teams in our history and to be on there you have to have seven wins, and if we win out we can get up there and make our mark as a senior class.


• How important is it for the seniors to leave their mark?: It's extremely important. We are in the middle of one of the hardest four game stretches ever. If we can go out on top, that's going to say a lot about our class and how we were able to bring everybody together – that we were a really great team.

• What is one thing about you that someone might not know?: I love to cook. My uncle is a cook and he has got me interested in watching the Food Channel. I really enjoy working with all the spices and using and experimenting with different recipes and ingredients.

• Several of the guys on the squad have also mentioned that cooking is one of their interests as well, have you ever sampled any teammates work?: Yes. [Fellow senior] Ryan Horvath and myself are kind of little a duo in our kitchen at home. We share ideas and have worked on several meals together.

• If there were an Iron Chef-style competition on the squad, who would win?: Me, no question. My favorite ingredient to use would be chicken.

• What could you do with Sea Urchin?: Well (laughing), I've never used it, but I would love to try it, once. I am very game for using new things.


Game 6 Villanova 63, William and Mary 24


