The I-64 Trophy is on the line Saturday at UR Stadium, as William and Mary and Richmond meet for the 117th time. The Tribe owns a 59-52-5 advantage in the series, which began in 1898, but the Spiders have won back-to-back games in the rivalry for the first time since winning three-straight from 1971-73. In terms of games played, the W&M-UR rivalry ranks fourth in the history of college football on the Division I or I-AA level, tying the Minnesota-Wisconsin series and trailing only Lafayette-Lehigh (142), Yale-Princeton (130) and Harvard-Yale (123). W&M is 9-5 against Richmond since the two became league opponents in 1993, and the College is 19-8 against the Spiders under Jimmye Laycock. W&M enters Saturday's game having dropped three-straight, all against ranked opponents, including a 55-34 loss to James Madison in the Tribe's home finale. Richmond claimed the CAA Southern Division title last weekend with a 62-56 victory in five overtimes at Delaware, and the Spiders are the league's hottest team having won five consecutive games since a 23-21 loss at Towson on Oct. 6. Richmond can earn at least a share of the overall CAA title with a victory, and the Spiders would be the league's outright champion and earn an automatic bid to the NCAA FCS Championship with a win and a Massachusetts loss at Hofstra on Saturday.

Press Parking

Parking for members of the working press is available just southeast of Zable Stadium in front of the University Center. Parking is limited and media members are encouraged to arrive early.

Photographers

Please observe the NCAA rules, which prohibit photographers between the 25 yard lines.

Press Box Services

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

Visiting Film Crews

Space will be allotted in the West Press Box for film and video crews of visiting teams' coaches' shows. We will provide two spots per team.

Post-Game Procedures

Head coach Jimmye Laycock and the visiting coach will be available about 10 minutes after the game in an interview area located directly below the press box. Individual W&M players' names should be given to Pete Clawson during the fourth quarter and they will be made available in the interview room.

Saturday's game between William and Mary and Richmond will mark the 117th meeting between the two schools in the "Oldest Rivalry in the South." The Tribe leads the all-time series 59-52-5. The teams first met in 1898, when Richmond shut out W&M, 15-0.

Over the last two years, the Spiders have outscored the College 72-21, winning last year's meeting, 31-14, in Williamsburg. Richmond's 41-7 win in 2005 stands as the most lopsided victory by Richmond in the series since 1916, when the Spiders defeated W&M, 48-0.

The last time UR won three consecutive games over the Tribe was from 1971 to 1973. Prior to last season, that stretch also marked the last time Richmond has won back-to-back games.

Storied Rivalry

Only three other Division I-AA series have a longer history than that of William and Mary vs. Richmond. In fact, the Tribe and Spiders have met just as many times as the longest I-A series, Minnesota vs. Wisconsin. Saturday's game will be the 117th meeting between the schools.

The Last Meeting - Richmond 31, William and Mary 14

WILLIAMSBURG (11/18/06) -- Richmond quarterback Eric Ward passed for two touchdowns, and Tim Hightower rushed and passed for a score to lead the Spiders to a 31-14 victory over William and Mary at Zable Stadium.

In the 116th meeting, Richmond won its second-straight in the series for the first time since 1973.

Ward completed 21 of 31 attempts for 174 yards. Hightower rushed for 46 yards on 15 carries, after providing the first points of the game on a 24-yard pass to Arman Shields.


Hightower's run gave the Spiders a 14-0 lead, before Ward's scoring pass to Desriveaux extended the advantage to 21-0. Andrew Harris' interception set up a Andrew Howard's 24-yard field goal as time expired in the half, giving Richmond a 24-0 lead.

Richmond tallied 228 yards of total offense in the opening half and held W&M to just 29 total yards and two first downs.

Ward's 3-yard scoring pass to Stewart at the 10:31 mark of the fourth pushed the lead to 31-0, before Tribe quarterback Jake Phillips accounted for two scores in the final seven minutes.

Phillips, who entered the game in the third guarter, threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to Joe Nicholas, and after the Tribe recovered an onside kick, Phillips scored on a 1-yard run.

Phillips finished with 107 yards on 9-of-12 passing and was the Tribe's leading rusher with 24 yards on seven attempts. Nicholas had four catches for 61 yards.

UR Series Notes Continued

A Win over Richmond Would ...

- Snap the Tribe's three-game losing streak and end a two-game slide against the Spiders.
- Prevent the Spiders from winning three consecutive games in the series for the first time since 1971-73. The previous two years marked the first time head coach Jimmye Laycock had lost back-to-back games in the series. In fact, prior to last year's loss, the last time W&M had lost more than three games to Richmond in the same decade was the 1980s. The Tribe has now lost four times this decade to UR, after losing only once in the 90s.
- Improve Laycock's record against Richmond to 20-8. Laycock's 19 total wins over Richmond are the most he has recorded against any league opponent. The only program Laycock has authored more wins against is Virginia Military Institute (25).
- End the Tribe's season with a win for the first time since 2003 and for only the second time since 1999, as the 2001 and 2004 seasons each ended with regular season wins over Richmond, before ending with playoff losses.
- Potentially prevent Richmond from winning the outright CAA title.
- •Stand as the highest ranked opponent the College has beaten since dropping then No. 1 ranked New Hampshire, 42-10, at Zable Stadium in 2005. The last time the College beat a ranked
- opponent came last season, when the Tribe traveled to Towson, Md. and downed the then-No. 21 Tigers, 29-28.
- Move W&M's record to 5-6, a two-win improvement over last season's 3-8 final mark.
- Improve W&M's league mark to 3-5, which would also be a two-win improvement over last year's 1-7 league slate.
- Mark Laycock's 72nd career league victory (vs. 50 losses) and 183rd all-time win.

Some History

Since the two teams started meeting as conference opponents in 1993, the Tribe holds a solid 9-5 overall record vs. Richmond. W&M has won four of the seven conference games played at Zable Stadium and is 5-2 in UR Stadium. In the 14 total games the two have played as conference foes, the College has never scored less than seven points, while scoring more than 21 on eight occasions. Conversely, the Spiders have failed to score 21 points eight times, and have been held to less than 10 in two contests.

Playing the Spoiler

W&M has the potential to throw a dent in Richmond's hopes to claim the outright CAA Football title. The Spiders come into the contest tied with UMass for the best conference record (6-1). A Richmond win, coupled with a UMass loss would give UR the title. Should both UMass and Richmond claim victories on Saturday, both would be recognized as Co-Champions, but only one can receive the conference's automatic bid. Since the two teams did not meet during the regular season, the league's "Out of Conference" tiebreaker comes into effect. Making a long story short, the two team's records vs. common opponents would be identical; both non-conference records would be the same; so the automatic bid would be decided in a conference call among the league's athletics directors, excluding UMass' and Richmond's — with input from the head coaches.

If both UMass and Richmond were to lose, then UMass would get the automatic bid, as its record vs. common opponents would be better, as UMass defeated W&M and Richmond would not have.

Direct Connections

Having met 116 times previously, one would expect the two programs to have a good familiarity with each other. This year's rendition of the age-old rivalry is no different, as the two staffs have many close ties. Starting with Richmond Head Coach Dave Clawson, who spent a season sharing a staff room with current Tribe Defensive Coordinator Bob Shoop at Villanova. Shoop and Clawson were the defensive and offensive coordinators, respectively, for a Wildcat squad that captured the 1997 A-10 Title and made a run deep into the NCAA Playoffs.

Richmond defensive coordinator Russ Huesman spent 13 years as an assistant coach at the College (1985-97), spending the last two as the team's defensive coordinator. Huesman authored some of the most effective Tribe defenses in school history, as his 1996 unit finished the season second in the country in total defense and helped power the College to a league title and quarterfinal appearance in the NCAA Playoffs.

Spider defensive line coach David Legg also spent time on Laycock's staff, as he worked four years at the College as the defensive assistant between the 1991-94 seasons.

Perhaps the most familiar face to the current Tribe faithful would be Richmond Offensive Assistant, Josh Lustig, who was a four-year letterman for the College between 2001-05. As a wide receiver, Lustig was a member of two W&M league championship squads (2001, 2004) and was elected a team captain for the 2005 season.

Grounded

W&M has fallen three times in the last five meetings with the Spiders and the one area, statistically, that jumps off the page is in the ground game. In the Tribe's three losses, it has rushed for a combined 96 yards on 75 attempts, an average of 1.3 yards per attempt. Conversely, Richmond has run for a combined 634 yards on 147 attempts, an average of 4.3 yards per attempt over the same span of games.

The Tribe's pair of wins (2003 and 2004) saw the ground game average 188 yards between the two games and average nearly 5.5 yards a carry.

Richmond brings the league's second-ranked rushing offense into this week's contest, as the Spiders are averaging 245.2 yards per game on the ground.

Tribe Team Notes

Tribe On Television Next Weekend

If you can't make it to the season finale at Richmond, which will be the 117th all-time meeting in a series that began in 1898, the game will be broadcast live by Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic at Noon. The Spiders, ranked seventh in this week's FCS Top-25, and Tribe will stage the annual battle for the I-64 Trophy at UR Stadium.

Michael Reghi and Ray Brown (color) will have the call on the broadcast, which can be seen in the Williamsburg area on Cox Cable Channel 35, or throughout the Mid-Atlantic region on DirectTV Channel 629.

Consistent Success

The W&M Athletics Department showed a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 96% among its student-athletes who entered school on athletics scholarships in the 2000-01 athletics year in data recently released by the NCAA.

The national average among all Division I schools was 77%. W&M's average of 96% ranked seventh in the nation, with four departments tied for the top spot with an average of 98%. The Tribe's average was the top in both the CAA and among all Division I Virginia schools.

The Tribe's football program showed a 96% GSR, which puts it well above the national average for the Football Championship Series (FCS) of 65%.

Crowded

W&M sold out its final home contest vs. James Madison, announcing a crowd of 12,259. It was the fourth time in five games W&M attracted a five figure audience. The only exception was the Liberty (9,329).

Large crowds have been the norm at Zable over the past three seasons and with Saturday's sellout, nine of the school's last 11 home games have gone over the 10,000 mark in attendance.

Of the Tribe's top 10 crowds since 1997 (when the College readjusted its capacity figure for Zable from 15,000 to 13,279 – then reduced further to its current 12,259), seven have occurred over the past two seasons.

The Tribe's average attendance of 10,699 for the 2007 season is the highest yearly average since the 1997 season, edging last year's average of 10,645.

In terms of percentage of capacity, the College's average of .873 ranks in the top 25 amongst all FCS schools.

Tough Stretch

The Spiders are the fourth of what was a brutal stretch of four-straight ranked opponents W&M faced to end the season. The Tribe has not played four-straight ranked opponents at any point since first joining its current league affiliation in 1993. The College is currently playing the nation's third-toughest schedule, in terms of overall combined opponent's winning percentage (.604).

30-Something

If the Tribe offense can produce 31 points against the Spiders, it will make the 2007 squad just the eighth team in head coach Jimmye Laycock's 28-year tenure to average 30 points, or better, for a season.

Currently, the College is averaging 29.9 points per contest, which is a significant improvement over the 2006 unit that managed just 209 points for the entire season (19 points per game).

By scoring 34 points vs. JMU, W&M has scored 21, or more, points in eight of its 10 games this season with the only exceptions being the 14-point wind-hindered effort at Hofstra and the team's three-point game at Virginia Tech.

The College has scored 31, or more, points in five of its nine FCS contests. Last season, the College breached the 20-point mark just three times in 11 games.

But, traditionally, the 2006 season was an aberration, as in the 170 games since the College first started conference play, the team has scored 20-plus points an amazing 124 times, or 73% of its total games.

With Saturday's 55-34 loss to JMU, W&M was saddled with what will be a losing mark in league play for the third consecutive season. Prior to 2005, W&M hadn't posted a single sub-.500 record in league competition in the first 12 seasons as a conference member. In 2005, the Tribe finished the season with four consecutive league losses, a feat W&M can avoid a repeat of this season with a win at Richmond.



Fresh Legs

W&M has a talented pair of freshman, in Courtland Marriner and Terrence Riggins, listed 1-2 on its depth chart at tailback. The Tribe hasn't featured a pair of freshman ball carriers since 1992. W&M faithful can be encouraged if history repeats itself in this instance, as the 1992 tandem of Derek Fitzgerald and Troy Keen turned out to be two of the most prolific rushers in school history Fitzgerald and Keen finished one and three, respectively, on the College's all-time rushing yardage list.

What makes the comparisons even more striking, are the relative similarities in the physical stature of the two tandems. Fitzgerald, like Marriner, was a compact runner, with guickness to make cuts in the open field and the speed to finish runs, while Keen, like Riggins, was a large back, with the combination of speed and power that proved to be devastating in short yardage situations.

Marriner, a red shirt freshman, entered the season in the mix at the tailback position as the primary back up to junior DeBrian Holmes, while Riggins, a true freshman, made his first career appearance just two weeks ago, at Hofstra, carrying the ball five

times for 11 yards. At 6-1, 225 pounds, Riggins found the end zone a second time in as many weeks against JMU and was the team's leading rusher with 39 yards on eight carries, including a 21-yard run.

Riggins had an impressive showing in the team's fall camp and was likely to compete for playing time before an ankle injury limited him for the first month of the season. Upon his healthy return, the staff split his time between the scout team and travel squad, where he continued to be impressive in workouts. His opportunity to play came when the team's second leading rusher, and primary short yardage back, senior Tony Viola went down with a season-ending

Riggins became the third true freshman to see action this year, joining cornerback Terrell Wells and defensive tackle Michael Stover. Last season, the Tribe played only two first-year players in defensive backs Max Harris and David Caldwell. In 2005, two true freshman also saw playing time in linebacker Michael Pigram and wide receiver D.J. McAulay.

Numbers Game

While much has been made of the youth on the Tribe's roster this season, with the most recent rash of injuries, the College has become even younger. Currently, half of the College's top 44 players in its current two-deep are either freshman or sophomores. The defense has 12 first or second year players, while the offense also has 12, including the two freshman starting at tailback and a five of the top six wide receivers.

Injury Update

Much of the reason for the recent youthful influx comes due to the fact the squad has lost four starting upperclassmen to injury. The bug started at wide out, where the team's top returning receiver, Joe Nicholas, was injured in the preseason camp. While he did return to play in parts of five games, he was limited to the point where the decision was made for him to shut down after the Maine contest in what was the season's seventh contest. Speedy junior wide receiver D.J. McAulay was lost for the year in the fourth quarter of the season's first game against Delaware, after he caught seven passes for 162 yards and a score. Then, junior tailback DeBrian Holmes, who entered the year as a starter, went down with a broken ankle in the fourth quarter of the third game of the season vs. Liberty. Then, as previously mentioned, senior tailback Tony Viola was lost for year when he was diagnosed with a season ending illness after the team's loss to UMass. As of Monday afternoon, offensive tackle and team co-captain Brad Stewart was doubtful for Saturday's game at Richmond after sustaining a lower leg injury against JMU.

The defense has also been hit the last two games, as junior linebacker Mike Pigram was unable to make the trip to Hofstra and held out against JMU. The Tribe has also been without reserve linebackers Wes Steinman and Nick Dewispeleare.

Head Start

James Madison's average starting field position Saturday was its own 48-yard line, while the Tribe's was its own 31. This marked the sixth time in 10 games that an opponent has averaged its own 40, or better, for an entire contest in starting field position (Villanova – 46; Liberty – 44; Va Tech – 42; UMass – 40).

Well Schooled

One area the Tribe is consistently solid in, year-after-year, is avoiding penalties. Despite drawing an uncharacteristic six-flags vs. JMU for 65 yards, W&M is still second in the conference and 10th in the nation with an

Efficient

Despite holding the ball for a season low 24:18 vs. James Madison, the Tribe still produced 355 yards of total offense and averaged 6.3 yards per play on 59 offensive snaps.

W&M had no turnovers, which marks the third time this season the Tribe ended the game turnover free. W&M has had an additional three games which have seen it turn the ball over just once.

Who Cares?

The College has run a total of 700 offensive plays this season, while its opponents have combined to run 699. The Tribe's 700 offensive plays have yielded a total of 3,929 yards, while its opponents have accumulated just 11 more total yards (3,940).

Offensive Notes

Quality Quarterback

For the third consecutive week, quarterback Jake Phillips faced one of the league's top defenses and was under tremendous pressure, but he still produced a solid performance, completing 14 of 24 attempts for 219 yards and three touchdowns. Phillips also tied for the team's lead in rushing yards, as he gained 40 on just seven attempts, but ended the game with 22 after yards lost on three sacks were subtracted.

The following are some bullet points, highlighting a few of his achievements to this point:

- He has thrown for 200-yards, seven times in 10 starts with six games of 240-yards, or more.
- He has thrown two, or more, touchdowns in seven of 10 games. The only two games in which he hasn't thrown a touchdown pass are at Virginia Tech and Hofstra.
- Phillips' total of 2,459 passing yards is third in the CAA and ninth nationally.
- His total of 18 touchdown passes is tied for second in the league and tied for 15th nationally.
- Phillips' average of 265.9 yards per game of total offense is fourth in the league and 18th nationally.
- He established the school's single-game record for passing yards, by throwing for 433 yards against Delaware.
- Phillips average of 14.74 yards per completion is the top figure among FCS quarterbacks who have connected on 140, or more, passes and the fourth-highest figure among all quarterbacks in the top 100 in total passing yards.
- He reached the 1,000-yard mark in just three games, making him the quickest to the figure in school history. The previous record was four and done many times.

Productive

Phillips has now accounted for 22 total touchdowns (18 passing/four rushing) on the season and his average of 13.20 points responsible for a contest ranks 21st nationally.

For his career, he has produced a total of 48 total scores (35 passing, 13 rushing) in just 27 appearances, an average of 1.8 per game.

Chart Climbing

Phillips' 219-yard passing effort vs. JMU moved his career total to 4,789 passing yards, the seventh-highest mark in school history. He is 919 yards shy of Shawn Knight's seventh-place career total of 5,705 yards (1991-94).

With three touchdown passes, Phillips has amassed 35 for his career, which is good for the No. 8 position on the Tribe's all-time list. He is two from moving past Buddy Lex (36, 1946-49) for seventh place.

His 241 yards of total offense against JMU moved his career total to 5,236 yards, which is the eighth-highest total in school history. He is presently 150 yards from passing Tom Rozantz (5,385 yards, 1975-78) for seventh.

He also ranks eighth on both the school's all-time pass completions (360) and passing attempts (626) listings. (See Phillips' progress on the career chart listings on page 10)

Courtland Marriner Continues To Impress

Redshirt freshman tailback Courtland Marriner is putting a solid finish on what has been an impressive debut as the team's featured tailback. By running for 32 yards on just 10 attempts vs. JMU, Marriner extended his team-leading rushing total to 440 yards. Marriner is going to finish the year as the first freshman to lead the team in rushing since Delmus Coley in 2003 (488 yards).

If Marriner were to run for 49, or more yards, at Richmond, he will finish with the most rushing yards for a Tribe freshman back since 1992, when Derek Fitzgerald set the school record for freshman with 835 yards on 175 carries.

Marriner has become more of a factor in the passing game the last two weeks, as he turned a screen pass into his first career touchdown reception at Hofstra, and then made a highlight reel grab against James Madison, using his remarkable speed on a diving 23-yard grab in the end zone.

His finest game rushing was a career-high 21 carry, 86-yard effort against UMass on Oct. 27. He followed that performance by slashing out 60 yards on 14 attempts against a Hofstra defense that entered the afternoon as the league's top rated unit. His career-high came in the second game of the year when he gained 107 yards on just 13 carries at VMI.



Elliott Mack Also Enjoying Breakout Season

Speedy junior wide out Elliott Mack continues to provide the spectacular for the Tribe's attack, as he turned in a five-catch, 128-yard effort vs. James Madison. A 52-yard catch and run for a touchdown on the team's first drive highlighted his effort.

Mack leads the Tribe in receiving yards (648), catches (36) and touchdowns (5). His average of 64.8 yards receiving per game ranks seventh in the CAA, while his average of 18.0 yards per reception is the second highest figure in the league among receivers listed in the top 10 for either receptions or receiving yards per game.

On Oct. 6 at Villanova, Mack went over the 100-yard receiving mark, with a three-catch, 105-yard effort. His evening against the Wildcats was highlighted by an impressive 73-yard touchdown catch and run.

With the aforementioned injury to McAulay, Mack is now the team's most dangerous deep threat. He has turned in scoring plays of 73 and 61 yards already on the year, making him the first Tribe player since All-American Dominique Thompson (2004) to score on three 58-plus yard touchdown plays in the same season.

Steady Archer

Sophomore wide out R.J. Archer has been a steady presence for the Tribe offense this season. Saturday evening against JMU, he led the team in receptions, with a career-high tying six, for 74 yards. But, the highlight of his game came in the fourth-quarter, when he hauled in a 24-yard touchdown from Mike Potts.

What made the play especially remarkable was, despite being one of the team's most productive players over the past two seasons playing in all 21 games, was the fact it was Archer's first career touchdown. Prior to the score, which came on his last catch of the game, Archer had 64 career receptions for 878 yards without reaching pay dirt.

With 98 receiving yards at Richmond, Archer will breach the 1,000-yard career mark. He has now caught at least one pass in all 21 of his career appearances.

Elite Atchison

While senior tight end Drew Atchison had a relatively quiet game against JMU, he did pull down one impressive 18-yard scoring pass from Phillips. The grab moved him into a tie for the team lead with Mack and Cameron Dohse. Atchison is third on the team with 33 receptions for 471 yards, which is the team's second-best total.

He could become only the second tight end in Laycock's 28-year tenure to lead the team in either receptions or receiving yards. Glenn Bodnar (1982-84) did both in 1984, establishing team position records for both single-season receptions (69) and receiving yards (757). The position record for single-season touchdowns is held by Mike Leach (1998-99), who had six touchdowns to go along with 58 catches for 653 yards in 1998.

Atchison has two 100-yard receiving games against Delaware (139) and Liberty (103). He contributed several big plays in the team's double overtime win vs. Liberty, but none bigger than his 15-yard, diving touchdown catch in the first overtime period. In fact, five of his six catches against the Flames were for 15-yards, or more. He also had one of the team's biggest offensive plays in the season opener with Delaware, as he brought down a 50-yard touchdown catch and run. His 139-yard effort stands as the best single-game performance for a Tribe tight end since Glenn Bodnar set the school's position record with a 183-yard performance vs. Colgate in 1983. Atchison's six-receptions against the Blue Hens are the most for a Tribe tight end since 1999, when current Denver Bronco, Mike Leach, had seven receptions for 64 yards in a 30-20 loss to James Madison.

Atchison has now caught a pass in 14 straight contests for the College. His last game without a reception came in the sixth game of last season at Liberty.

Dohse's Debut Impressive

Despite just one catch for seven yards against JMU, red shirt freshman receiver Cameron Dohse has been one of the team's most pleasant surprises. Dohse's five touchdown receptions tie him for the team lead, while his total of 468 receiving yards is third and his 25 receptions rank fourth.

The Clifton, Va. native established career highs in both receptions (7), receiving yards (123) and touchdowns (2) against Maine prior. The performance earned him the CAA's Rookie of the Week honor.

It was the second consecutive outing that Dohse breached the 100-yard receiving mark, as he set short-lived career highs in catches (6) and receiving yards (117) at Villanova on Oct. 6 and included a 24-yard touchdown grab.

Few could have predicted that the 6-0, 186-pound product of Centreville High (Clifton, Va.) would have much of an opportunity to make an impact coming into the season, as the College appeared to be loaded at the position. But, a preseason injury to one incumbent starter, senior Joe Nicholas, and then a season ending injury to another featured receiver (D.J. McAulay) in the team's first game provided an opportunity that Dohse grabbed with both hands.

Dohse is averaging 18.7 yards/catch and each of his scoring grabs has been over 20 yards (22, 24, 27, 31, 33).

Perspective

The last Tribe player to record back-to-back 100-yard receiving games was All-American wide receiver Dominique Thompson, who went for 118 and 185 yards in back to back games against Hampton and Delaware in the first and second rounds of the 2004 NCAA Playoffs.

Multiple-time All-American Rich Musinski was the last Tribe player to record three-straight 100-yard receiving games, as he put up four consecutive 100-yard efforts between the sixth and ninth games of the 2002 season.

Defensive Notes

Short Handed

While the injury bug has made its biggest impact on the Tribe's offense this season, the defense has also taken a hit the past two games without the services of starting linebacker Michael Pigram. It was a particularly devastating blow to the squad in that Pigram was coming a career game against UMass on Oct. 28. The Tribe was also without the services of reserve linebacker Wes Steinman, who had started one game this season, at Hofstra, leaving redshirt freshman Evan Francks to make his first career start at linebacker. Francks again assumed the starting role against James Madison and turned in another solid outing with nine total tackles.

Big Games From New Names

With the general youth and inexperience on the defensive side of the ball heading into the season, the opportunity to step into new roles and make an impact has been present throughout the fall. With some injuries over the last two weeks, the games at Hofstra and against James Madison were no different, as a number of young players took advantage of increased playing time to contribute.

Starting in place of Pigram, redshirt freshman linebacker Evan Francks made his first career start and recorded a career-best 10 total tackles at Hofstra, including an assist on a TFL and two solos. Saturday against JMU, Francks was named the coaching staff's defensive player of the week after recording nine total tackles, including five unassisted.

Redshirt freshman corner Ben Cottingham saw extended time in the secondary at Hofstra, after primarily contributing on special teams, and responded with a career-high seven total tackles, including three unassisted.

Against JMU, reserve safety Sheldon Alexander stepped in for injured free safety Robert Livingston and recorded a career-best seven total tackles with four solo stops.

Statistically Speaking From JMU Game

As mentioned, sophomore safety Sheldon Alexander collected a career-best seven total tackles against the Dukes. Senior defensive lineman T.J. O'Neill was credited with a career-best 2.0 tackles for loss. Junior linebacker Josh Rutter matched his career-high with eight unassisted tackles. For the sixth time in 10 games, sophomore David Caldwell led, or shared the team lead, in tackles with 11.

Pigram's Performance Worth Noting

Junior linebacker Michael Pigram led the defensive effort vs. UMass with an individual performance that ranks among the best in recent years for a Tribe defender. Pigram recorded a career-high 14 total tackles, including 10 unassisted stops, recovered a fumble and returned it 62 yards for a touchdown, recorded his first-career interception and also had his first career quarterback sack.

Pigram's 62-yard fumble return for a touchdown was the longest fumble return for a touchdown since Mike Beverly's 46-yard return for a score against VMI in 1998. The last player to have a fumble recovery and an interception in the same game was Jon Shaw in 2005 against Richmond. The last player to score a defensive touchdown and have a quarterback sack in the same game was Ryan Nickell against Towson, also in 2005.

On the strength of his performance against UMass, Pigram brought his season total for tackles to 66, which is just three shy of his career-high, 11-game total of 69 last season.

Third Down Success A Winning Trend

In the Tribe's four victories this season, opponents have converted 30.2% of their third-down attempts (16-for-53). Conversely, in the Tribe's six losses, opponents have had a 52.4% success rate on third downs (44-for-84), including a 9-for-15 effort by Hofstra and a 8-for-13 performance by JMU.

Youth Movement on Defense

A look at the Tribe's roster reveals only three seniors on the defensive side of the ball, while a glance at the two deep shows nine redshirt or true freshmen and an additional eight redshirt or true sophomores. This season, eight defensive players have made their first career start, including most recently redshirt freshman Evan Francks against Hofstra, and true freshman tackle Michael Stover who started at Maine. An additional 10 players have seen the playing field for the first time this season. Six sophomores have started, and the 10 players to see their first collegiate snaps are redshirt freshmen Francks, Michael Alvarado (DB), Bryan Jean-Pierre (DL), Derek Toon (DL), Carl Watts (DL), Nick Dewispelaere (LB), Wes Steinman (LB) and Ben Cottingham (DB) and true freshmen Terrell Wells (DB) and Stover.

Tribe Among CAA Statistical Leaders

Taking a look at this week's CAA stats, sophomore strong safety David Caldwell is seventh in tackles per game, averaging 9.5 stops per game. Caldwell leads the team with 95 total tackles and has the league's second-best total for an underclassmen, trailing only Richmond freshman Eric McBride (101). Junior linebacker Josh Rutter ranked 13th in tackles per game with an average of 8.8 stops per game. Michael Pigram was 17th, averaging 8.2 tackles per game. With three interceptions, Derek Cox is third in the league in total interceptions and tied for fourth in passes defended (.80). Rutter is tied for the league lead with three fumble recoveries.



Caldwell Leads Tribe In Tackles

Strong safety David Caldwell has built a strong case for postseason honors turning in an outstanding sophomore season to this point. Caldwell has led the team in tackles in six of 10 games, including the past two games. Saturday against JMU, Caldwell tallied a team-high 11 stops, which included eight unassisted. At Hofstra, he shared the team lead with Josh Rutter with 12. Against the Pride, Caldwell delivered another strong performance, collecting 12 total tackles with two solos and an assisted tackle for loss. In the previous game, Caldwell shined with seven unassisted tackles against then fourth-ranked UMass. At Maine, Caldwell shared the team lead with nine total tackles.

This season, Caldwell leads the Tribe with 95 tackles, including a team-best 52 unassisted stops. He has 5.0 stops behind the line of scrimmage, one forced fumble and an interception.

He recorded a career-high 15 total tackles, including 1.5 for loss, earlier this season in the win at VMI, surpassing his previous career mark of 10 set last year against Richmond. Caldwell's 15 stops were the highest single-game tackle total since former safety James Miller ('06) recorded 16 at Villanova in 2005. Caldwell also forced a fumble against the Keydets and broke up a pass.

Tracy Gets Back on Track

After a relatively slow start, sophomore defensive end Adrian Tracy has come on through the middle part of the season and put together a sound follow-up to an outstanding rookie season last year. Two weeks ago at Hofstra, Tracy collected eight total tackles, including two unassisted and a solo tackle for loss. That followed a seven-tackle effort in the win at Maine and his first-career interception in the loss to UMass. It was the second interception by a Tribe defensive lineman this season with Sean Lissemore having the other vs. Towson. At Maine, Tracy Included his second solo quarterback sack of the season, a key play in the fourth quarter that came on a third down situation.

Tracy turned in an impressive effort at Virginia Tech on Sept. 22, collecting a game and season-high 3.0 tackles for loss and finishing with six total tackles in all, including five unassisted stops. He continued the resurgence the following week against Towson with six unassisted tackles, including a solo TFL, and then led team in tackles at Villanova on Oct. 6 with nine total stops. Tracy, who led the Tribe and all league rookies in 2006 in tackles for loss (15.5) and quarterback sacks (6.0), grabbed his first passer sack of the season against the Hokies and brought his TFL total to 7.5 against Hofstra.

Rutter Continues Solid Play

Junior linebacker Josh Rutter has been a key leader and consistent contributor for the young Tribe defense this season, ranking among the team leaders in nearly every statistical category. His return to form this season, after missing eight games in 2006 due to a knee injury, has been a welcome boost. He continued his strong play in the loss to JMU, collected 10 total tackles with eight unassisted stops. At Hofstra, Rutter shared the team lead with 12 total tackles, including eight unassisted stops. A week earlier against UMass, Rutter had eight total tackles, including five solo. He also forced a fumble he then recovered and returned 22 yards to set up a field goal. It was the third fumble recovery of the season for him. At Maine, Rutter shared the team lead with nine tackles and broke up a pass.

Rutter led all league rookies as a redshirt freshman in 2005 with 109 total tackles and tallied 6.5 tackles for loss that season. He has eight career double-digit tackle games, including three this season. After missing the final eight games of 2006, Rutter came back strong this fall with 11 total tackles in the season opener against Delaware. At Virginia Tech, Rutter accomplished a first, recording a quarterback sack against the Hokies. It was one of a season-high four sacks for the Tribe. In the win over Liberty, Rutter recorded 15 stops, one shy of his career-mark set in 2005 against Marshall.

Rutter ranks second on the team with 88 total tackles, which includes 43 solo tackles.

Comments From Monday's CAA Football Coaches Conference Call:

General Thoughts on 55-34 loss to James Madison:

It was pretty much a situation where JMU was running the ball very effectively against us, and we couldn't come up with stops. [JMU quarterback Rodney] Landers did a great job for them. He's a tough, hard-nosed competitor who really made plays and we weren't able to slow him down. Offensively, we did okay at times, but we

really struggled against [Landers] and then we struggled in some areas in the kicking game [gave up two blocked punts] that led to some scores. Overall, it wasn't a real good night for us.

• On the injury front, corner Derek Cox came off for a little bit. Defensive end Adrian Tracy, safety Robert Livingston and offensive tackle Brad Stewart all came off the field hurt at different times. How did that affect you, but also which of those guys is possibly going to be out this week?

It is really too early for me to say this [for this weekend]. I don't know. It affects you when you can't keep the same quys in there, but that's part of the game.

• Can you talk about as a player and a coach what the Richmond rivalry has meant for you?

I think it is always good to have the traditional rivalry at the end of the year. It gives the alumni and the former players a chance to get involved with all that [comes with a rivalry game]. But, I think it's been a real good rivalry and its all part of what makes college football very special.

• Does any game in the series stand out in particular for you?

I remember the 1988 contest, when Richmond put a wide receiver in at quarterback Curtis Evers, and then ran the option and beat us [24-19]. And, I remember the one in Williamsburg where our fans tore down the goalposts [after a 28-17 win in 1985] that was pretty cool. I didn't think [tearing down goalposts] would ever happen here. I quess other ones are where we won and went on to the playoffs and gone on to championships [after the 1996, 2001 and 2004 seasons]. Rivalries are good for college football, it's a big part of what college football is about - having a traditional rivalry game at the end of the year. I think it is really special.

• It seems like Richmond would have more incentive since they're going to the playoffs, but is this the kind of game where that kind of thing doesn't make much difference?

Well, I don't know, I can't figure all that out. I just know Richmond is a very, very good team. I don't know about [extra] incentives and that type of thing. I think they're extremely well coached and an extremely good team.

• How much of a concern is Richmond's offense, in particular with tailback Tim Hightower?

Since we're last in the league in rushing defense, and he's leading the league in rushing, I think that speaks for itself right there. It's a pretty big concern.

Richmond's guarterback [Eric Ward] has gotten better, so you can't just concentrate on Hightower.

No, we can't just concentrate on anything the way we've been playing on defense. We've got to concentrate on ourselves and get lined up and playing right. That's as much as anything. They're a very balanced offense, Dave [Clawson] does a very, very good job with his offense. He mixes it up, gives you a lot of different things and they're very sound and solid on both sides of the ball. I think they're very well coached, I think they're very sound in what they do, and they're not going to give you anything; you've got to earn anything you get against them.

• This season got off to a good start for you, but obviously the schedule towards the end of the year was really loaded with some of the best teams of the league and its been kind of a difficult road down the stretch.

Well we played some good teams lately, JMU, Hofstra, UMass. There is a reason why those teams are ranked. They are all pretty good, but they're in the league, so we have to find a way to compete with them.
