### First and 10

William and Mary will begin its 2008 campaign when it squares off against North Carolina State in Raleigh on Saturday at 6 p.m. The contest will mark the teams' first meeting since the 1999 season when the Wolfpack earned a 38-9 victory in Raleigh. Although NCSU controls the all-time series, 11-8, the Tribe rattled off six consecutive wins from 1948-53. W&M returns 19 starters (nine offensive/nine defensive) from last season's team that posted a 4-7 overall record and a 2-6 mark in conference action. The College is led offensively by senior all-conference quarterback Jake Phillips, who enters the season ranked among W&M's career top 10 in passing yards, total offense, passing attempts and touchdown passes. Fellow all-conference selection senior wide receiver Elliott Mack also returns this season after registering a team-high 46 catches for 849 yards in '07. The Irvington, N.J., native needs 555 more receiving yards to become just the 11th Tribe player to reach the 2,000-yard mark. On the other side of the ball, senior all-conference cornerback Derek Cox will help lead the defensive unit after recording a team-high three interceptions a year ago. Saturday's contest will be N.C. State's home opener after falling at South Carolina, 34-0, last Thursday.

## Press Parking

Parking for members of the working press is available just southeast of Zable Stadium in front of the University Center. Parking is limited and media members are encouraged to arrive early.

## Press Box Services

Located atop the East grandstand of Zable Stadium at Cary field, the press box officially opens two hours prior to kickoff. Pregame notes, flip cards and programs will be available prior to the start. Complete halftime statistics, as well as final team and individual statistics, are available immediately following the game.

## Radio

Visiting radio lines may be rented by non-conference opponents through the Sports Information Office at a cost of \$75 per line. The radio booth for the visiting team is located at the south end of the press box on the lower level. Radio stations should make arrangements with the Sports Information Office at least a month in advance. Requests for the line will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

## Visiting Film Crews

Space will be allotted in the West Press Box for film and video crews of visiting teams' coaches' shows. We will provide two spots per team.

## Post-Game Procedures

Head coach Jimmie Laycock and the visiting coach will be available about 10 minutes after the game in an interview area located in the Laycock Football Center. Individual W&M players' names should be given to Pete Clawson during the fourth quarter and they will be made available in the interview room.

## The William and Mary Football Radio Network

The W&M Athletics Department is in its third year of a partnership for the Tribe Radio Network with local stations, 92.3 FM "The Tide" and 107.9 FM "WBACH", as the network's Co-Flagships.

The partnership provides the College with solid coverage of the peninsula, as the station's combined footprint reaches from eastern areas of Richmond to the western parts of Norfolk. Tribe fans in Richmond will also be able to catch the action on 1450AM WCLM, which returns for its fourth season as an affiliate. ## N.C. State Series Notes

A Win vs. N.C. State Would ...

- Be the Tribe's first win against the Wolfpack since Oct. 18, 1958
- Be the Tribe's first win in Raleigh since Nov. 9, 1957
- Mark the Tribe's first win versus a FBS team since 1998 (Temple, 45-38)
- Be W&M's first win versus an ACC opponent since 1986 (Virginia, 41-37)
- Be W&M's first win in a season-opener since 2001 (UMass, 31-10)
- Snap a four-game losing streak dating back to last season
- Be W&M's first road win since Oct. 13, 2007 (Maine, 21-20)

## Looking Back

After falling to N.C. State in its first seven meetings (and getting outscored 213-8), the Tribe rattled off six consecutive wins in the series from 1948-53. NCSU is averaging 21.4 ppg in the all-time series, while W&M is averaging 12.3. Additionally, the Wolfpack has posted seven shutouts versus the College, while W&M has held N.C. State scoreless once.

## The Last Meeting

RALEIGH, N.C. (9/11/99) -- North Carolina State scored on its first five possessions to build a commanding 31-point lead and cruised past William and Mary, 38-9.

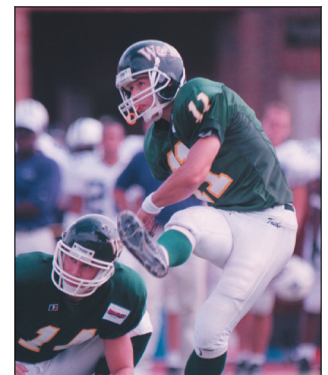
NCSU started quickly when cornerback Tony Scott intercepted W&M quarterback Daron Pope on the Tribe's third play from scrimmage. Seven plays and 31 yards later, Andy Vanderveer took a two-yard pass from Jamie Barnette to give the Wolfpack a quick 7-0 lead. State tacked on two more scores in the first quarter on time-consuming drives. A 30-yard field goal ended a seven-play, 52-yard drive that took 3:14, and a Ray Robinson 7-yard run finished off an 81-yard drive that took 3:31. All told, the Wolfpack held the ball for more than 10 minutes in the first quarter and limited W&M to just 11 yards and one first down.

The Wolfpack continued its domination in the second quarter with touchdown runs by D. Roberts (5 yards) and Jamie Barnette (15 yards) to take a 31-0 lead with 5:35 left in the first half. W&M finally got on the scoreboard just before halftime as Brett Sterba nailed a 44-yard field goal as time expired. It was the longest field goal of Sterba's career, a feat he matched in the third quarter of the contest. Sterba ended the evening with three field goals in four attempts, also connecting on a 35-yarder in the third quarter.

W&M had several chances to make the score closer in the fourth quarter, but the Tribe's final four drives all ended on downs within the Wolfpack 30-yard line. W&M's last three drives all ended within the NCSU 20-yard line. After scoring on five straight possessions to open the game and on six of its first eight touches, the Wolfpack reserves managed only two first downs and 45 yards of offense on NCSU's last five drives.

Three Tribe quarterbacks combined for 284 passing yards on a school-record tying 52 attempts, with 25 completions. Pope was 15-of-29 for 134 yards and one interception. The Tribe ground game managed only 32 rushing yards on 27 attempts. Pope ended the night as W&M's leading ground gainer with 15 yards on 10 carries. W&M running backs combined for just 10 yards on 11 rushes.

## The Laycock Era Began in Raleigh

Jimmy Laycock's first game as a head coach at William and Mary came against N.C. State in Raleigh exactly 28 years ago (Sept. 6, 1980). Although the Wolfpack defeated the Tribe 42-0 on that afternoon, Laycock has gone on to become one of the most successful head coaches in college football history. In addition to being far and away the program's all-time winningest coach, Laycock entered the 2008 season ranked sixth among active FCS coaches in career victories.

## Heading Home

Saturday's game at N.C. State will be a homecoming of sorts for five Tribe players who are natives of the Tar Heel state. While none of group is from Raleigh, senior captain Derek Cox is from Winterville, which is located approximately 85 miles southeast of the capital city. W&M's other North Carolina natives are Robert Livingston (Hendersonville), Wes Steinman (Wilmington), Josh Thompson (Charlotte) and Rob Varno (Wilmington).

## W&M vs. The Atlantic Coast Conference

Since the league was formed in 1953, W&M has gone 10-33 (.233) against opponents from the ACC. Last season, the Tribe lost at No. 17 Virginia Tech, 44-3, while it fell at Maryland, 27-14, in the 2006 season opener. If games against current ACC members Virginia Tech, Florida State and Miami, before they joined the league are taken into account, the Tribe's all-time record against current ACC teams is 17-62-1 (.213). The last ACC team the College defeated was state-rival Virginia, 41-37, in Charlottesville in 1986.

## Did You Know?

The last time the College hosted an ACC opponent in Williamsburg was in 1980, when the Demon Deacons of Wake Forest made a visit to Zable Stadium and defeated the Tribe, 27-7.

## Lou Holtz Connection

Legendary head coach Lou Holtz earned his first head coaching job at William and Mary at the age of 32 in 1969. After leading the Tribe to three successful seasons, which included a Southern Conference championship and an appearance in the 1970 Tangerine Bowl, Holtz accepted the head coaching position at N.C. State in 1972. Holtz spent four seasons leading the Wolfpack and helped the program claim an ACC championship in 1973.

## Team Notes

### For Starters

The Tribe offense returns the services of senior all-conference quarterback Jake Phillips to lead an attack that averaged 29 points and nearly 400-yards of total offense (396.2) a contest in 2007. The team hopes to continue the upward trend started last season, which saw the squad improve radically over the 2006 unit (which produced 'just' 19.0 points and 339.4 yds/contest).

The Tribe faithful have reason for continued optimism, as eight other players return with Phillips from last season's unit, including fellow senior and returning all-conference performer, wide receiver Elliott Mack (Irvington, NJ). Including Mack, the unit returns six of its top seven receivers from a year ago. Though not available for this Saturday's contest, sophomore tailback Courtland Marriner is the top rusher from a season ago (518 yards on 115 attempts) and leads a ground game that returns all but 207 yards of the 1,299 total rushing yards from 2007.

With the wealth of skill positions coming back to the fold, much of the attention will fall on the team's offensive front to provide the power behind what promises to be an electric Tribe attack. A solid, experienced foundation is in place between the tackles, as both guards (Michael Grant and CJ Muse) and the center (Luke Hitesheiw) return from last season. The team will turn to youth on the bookends, as it will see talented redshirt freshman Jake Marcey and rising sophomore Keith Hill making their first and second career starts, respectively, against the Wolfpack.

### What a Difference ...

... A year makes. Last season, the College's final two-deep of its top 44 players showed more than half (24) as either freshmen or sophomores. The defense had 12 first or second year players, while the offense also had the same amount, including a pair of freshman tailbacks and five first-year players filling the top six wide receiver positions. Defensively, only three seniors even took a snap during the entire season. By contrast, this year, the College will open with nine returning starters on both sides of the ball. Of these 18 returning starters, 14 are either juniors or seniors.

### That Being Said ...

Coming into this weekend's action against North Carolina State, the top two tailbacks on the Tribe's current two-deep (sophomore Terrence Riggins and redshirt freshman Ryan Woolfolk) bring a combined 19 career carries into the contest (all by Riggins). With the preseason camp injuries to both last season's leading rusher (sophomore Courtland Marriner; 518 yards on 115 attempts) and the squad's most experienced back (senior DeBrien Holmes; 740 career yards on 149 attempts), the College will be forced to rely on the young talent.

At 6-1, 234-pounds, Riggins has all the potential to be a punishing back, as he possesses the strength and size that is ideal for short-yardage situations and also has a burst to finish runs. A similar rash of injuries at the position last season led him to seeing playing time as a true freshman (during the final three games of the schedule). Woolfolk brings speed and quickness to the

position, and also has solid ball skills. He will likely see his first collegiate game action against the Wolfpack.

Another player likely to contribute at the position is sophomore Thomas Schonder, who saw action in 10 games last season and collected 143 yards on 35 attempts. Schonder battled minor injuries throughout the fall camp, but is expected to be available Saturday.

## Freshman Connection

Last season, Riggins joined cornerback Terrell Wells and defensive tackle Michael Stover as the only true freshmen to see playing time. In 2006, the Tribe played only two first-year players, including David Caldwell. The same was true for 2005, as only a pair of true freshmen saw playing time (linebacker Michael Pigram and wide receiver D.J. McAulay). This season, the potential is there for at least a couple true freshmen to see action on opening day. The most likely candidates are cornerback/return specialist B.W. Webb and tailback Jonathan Grimes, but tight end Robbie Gumbita, wide receiver Ryan Moody and linebackers Jabrel Mines and Donte Cook are among the many others in the class who have been impressive and will push for playing time as the season progresses.

## First Start

If the current two-deep holds for the remainder of the week, the Tribe will have as many as seven players making their first collegiate starts on Saturday evening. On the offensive side of the ball, junior tight end Rob Varno joins redshirt freshman left tackle Jake Marcey and sophomore tailback Terrence Riggins as first-time starters. Redshirt freshmen Harold Robertson (DT) and Jake Trantin (LB) will see the field for the first time as collegians, while sophomore defensive backs Ben Cottingham (CB) and Michael Alvarado (S) will each get the starting nod for the first time.

As was previously stated, Riggins received significant playing time during the final three games of the 2007 season (after injuries depleted the backfield of both its first and second-string tailbacks). While Saturday will be Varno's first start, he was the top reserve at TE a year ago and saw action in all 11 games (making 11 grabs for 115 yards). Cottingham, a walk-on to the program in 2006, worked his way into a key reserve role at cornerback last season and finished the year with a pair of interceptions against conference rival Richmond.

## Tough Sledding

Last season the College faced a total of six ranked opponents in its 11-game regular season, including ending the season playing against four-straight. The brutal finish was the first time W&M squared off against four-straight ranked opponents since first joining its current league affiliation in 1993. The College played on of the most-difficult schedules, in terms of overall combined opponent's winning percentage (.604).

## Rare

By finishing with a 2-6 mark in the CAA, W&M was saddled with a losing mark in league play for the third consecutive season. Prior to 2005, W&M hadn't posted a single sub-.500 record in league competition in the first 12 seasons as a conference member.

## Consistent Success

The W&M Athletics Department showed a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 96% among its student-athletes who entered school on athletics scholarships in the 2000-01 athletics year in data recently released by the NCAA.

The national average among all Division I schools was 77%. W&M's average of 96% ranked seventh in the nation, with four departments tied for the top spot with an average of 98%. The Tribe's average was the top in both the CAA and among all Division I Virginia schools.

The Tribe's football program showed a 96% GSR, which puts it well above the national average for the Football Championship Series (FCS) of 65%.

## Top-Notch Competition

The game with N.C. State will mark the 11th-consecutive year the College has faced an opponent from the FBS (formerly Division I-A), which is the longest current streak in the CAA. In the last 22 years, the Tribe has faced more than 25 I-A opponents, including 23 from the current BCS conferences. The last W&M win over an FBS opponent was in 1998, when the Tribe downed Temple, 45-38. Here is a quick look at W&M's last 11 games against a FBS opponent:

## Leveled Playing Field

Historically, W&M teams have rebounded well from game's against FBS opponents, as the College is 10-4 in games following contests with team's from the NCAA's bowl subdivision since 1993.

## Take A Closer Look

In the Tribe's five previous games at FBS opponents, the offense averaged a respectable 20.6 points per contest. The defense has had its hands full, though, allowing an average of 42.4 points over the five games.

In three of the previous six games vs. FBS opponents, the Tribe has either been in the lead, or tied, in the third quarter with the only exceptions being against Western Michigan in 2003, Maryland in 2006 and Virginia Tech in 2007. In the first game of 2005 at Marshall, the Tribe led the Herd, 24-23, late in the third quarter and were threatening to extend the lead before a 70-yard fumble return for touchdown by Marshall. The Herd tacked on another scored on in its next possession and pulled out the 36-24 win.

In 2004, behind Payton Award winning quarterback Lang Campbell, W&M led North Carolina, 31-28, entering the fourth quarter of the season-opener, before the Tar Heels used a deep bench and powerful offensive line to outscore the Tribe, 21-7, in the fourth quarter and post a 49-38 victory.

## One Tough Conference

The Colonial Athletic Association Football Conference had six teams ranked among the 2008 Sports Network Preseason Football Championship Subdivision Poll released on Aug. 19. Additionally, four of the league's teams were ranked among the nation's top 10.

Richmond, was the highest-ranked team at No. 4, while Massachusetts (No. 5), James Madison (No. 6) and Delaware (No. 9) also ranked among the top 10. New Hampshire garnered a No. 16 ranking, while Villanova was 21st.

While not ranked, Hofstra and Maine were among those teams receiving votes just outside the top 25.

Only the Missouri Valley equals the number of CAA Football teams (6) in the poll, but CAA Football's four among the Top-10 is two more than both the Valley and Big Sky can boast.

The conference also had six teams ranked in the Preseason FCS Coaches Top 25 Poll released on Aug. 21, including four teams among the top eight. Hofstra, Towson and Maine all received votes and finished just outside the top 25. Since the FCS Coaches Poll debuted prior to last season, CAA Football has had at least four squads ranked every week.

## Limiting the Penalties

W&M was the CAA's least-penalized team last year with only 49 infractions for 408 yards. The Tribe ranked sixth nationally with just 4.45 penalties per game and seventh in the country with just 37.09 penalty yards per game.

## Packing Zable Stadium

W&M established a modern-day single-season record for attendance in 2007 with 10,700 spectators per game. The mark broke the previous record that was set the previous season (10,645).

## Tribe Picked to Finish Fifth in CAA Preseason Poll

The Tribe was picked to finish fifth in the CAA South Division in the conference's preseason poll according to a vote of the league's 12 head coaches and selected media. Massachusetts, which returns 12 starters off last year's CAA Football Championship team, was picked to capture the overall league title. Richmond edged out James Madison for the top spot in the South Division.

## Offensive Notes

### At the Helm

The College returns one of the Football Championship Series' top signal callers to the fold for the 2008 season, as senior returning all-conference quarterback Jake Phillips will be making his 23rd career start (and 29th overall appearance) on Saturday vs. North Carolina State.

Phillips started all 11 games for the College in 2007 and led a Tribe offense that averaged 29.0 points and 396.2 yards of total a contest.

The following are a few brief bullet points of some of what Phillips achieved during the 2007 season:

- Earned his first all-conference honors (as a third team selection).
- Threw for 200-yards, or more, eight times in 11 starts on the season (with seven games of 240-plus yards; three of 300-plus yards).
- Jake accounted for two, or more, touchdowns in eight of the 11 games (the only game he didn't find the end zone was at Virginia Tech and at Hofstra).
- Overall his 2,801 passing yards ended the regular season as the third highest total in the CAA and was eighth nationally (among FCS programs).
- His 19 touchdown passes were third in the league and tied him for 15th nationally (FCS).
- Phillips average of 272.1 yds/gm of total offense ended the regular season third in the league and was 14th nationally (FCS).
- He established the school's single-game record for passing yards in the season's first contest, by throwing for 433 yards in the loss to Delaware.

• Phillips average of 14.74 yds/completion was the top figure among FCS quarterbacks who have connected on 150, or more, passes during the regular season and the sixth-highest figure among all QBs ranked in the top 100 in total passing yards.

• He reached the 1,000-yard mark in just three games, making him the quickest to the figure in school history. The previous record was four (done many times).

• Phillips ended the year with 24 total touchdowns (19 passing/five rushing) and his average of 13.09 points responsible for a contest ranked 20th nationally. For his career, he produced 50 total scores (36 passing, 14 rushing) in 28 appearances (or an average of nearly two touchdowns per appearance – 1.8, to be specific).

### Chart Climbing

Phillips enters Saturday's action against NC State with a career total of 5,128 passing yards, the seventh-highest mark in school history. He is 577 yards shy of Shawn Knight's seventh-place career total of 5,705 yards (1991-94).

Phillips has amassed 36 touchdown passes for his career, which is good for a share of the seventh position on the Tribe's all-time list. His next TD connection will move him out of his current tie with former Tribe legend Buddy Lex (36, 1946-49).

In terms of total offense, his 5,570 career yards ranks him seventh in school history. He needs 839 total yards to move into the No. 6 position (past Knight's total of 6,408 yards)

He also ranks seventh on the school's all-time pass completions (383) and eighth in passing attempts (669).

### Mack Back for More

Speedy senior returning all-conference wide out Elliott Mack put together a sensational junior season that saw him lead the squad in receptions (46), receiving yards (849) and receiving TDs (five).

He will enter Saturday's game with a streak of two consecutive games with 100-plus receiving yards, including his career-best 10-catch, 201-yard performance in the season finale against Richmond.

Mack received his first career all-conference honors by averaging of 77.2 yards receiving per game, a mark that ranked seventh in the league, while his average of 18.5 yards per reception was the second highest figure in the league among receivers listed in the top 10 for either receptions or receiving yards per game.

Mack went over the 100-yard receiving mark three times in 2007, with the first coming against Villanova on a three-catch, 105-yard effort. His evening against the Wildcats was highlighted by a 73-yard touchdown catch and run. He also topped the century mark against James Madison (128 yards).

With one more 100-yard performance, Mack will move his career total to five, which would place him in the top-10 all-time in school history.

### Perspective

Prior to Mack, the last Tribe player to record back-to-back 100-yard receiving games was All-American wide receiver Dominique Thompson, who went for 118 and 185 yards in games against Hampton and Delaware in the first and second rounds of the 2004 NCAA Playoffs.

Multiple-time Tribe All-American Rich Musinski was the last Tribe player to record three-straight 100-yard receiving games, as he put up four consecutive 100-yard efforts between the sixth and ninth games of the 2002 season.

### Did You Know?

Mack was selected as one of the team's four quad-captains for the 2008 season. He has been rooming with fellow quad captain, cornerback Derek Cox since arriving on campus in 2004. The same is also true for the remaining pair of captains, as Phillips has lived with senior linebacker Josh Rutter for their entire collegiate careers.

### Streak Breaker

Junior R.J. Archer moved the team's interests ahead of his own this past spring and fall, by making the switch from wide out to quarterback. A fixture at the WR position for each of the past two seasons, Archer has accepted a move into the reserve role behind Phillips, as his versatile athleticism makes him an ideal fit should the Tribe need an emergency replacement.

While his steady play under center in both the spring and fall has earmarked him as the leading candidate for the starting quarterback duties in 2009, his string of seeing action in all 22-career games could be in jeopardy against the Wolfpack. He comes into Saturday's action with the longest active streak for receptions on the team, as he has caught at least one pass in every career appearance. He started 16 games at receiver over the past two years and has contributed 69 catches for 940 yards.

### A Healthy Dohse

Few could have predicted that Cameron Dohse, a 6-0, 177-pound product of Centreville High (Clifton, Va.) would have much of an opportunity to make an impact coming into his redshirt freshman season a year ago, as the College appeared to be loaded at the position. But, a preseason injury to one incumbent starter, senior Joe Nicholas, and then a season ending injury to another featured receiver (D.J. McAulay) in the team's first game provided an opportunity that Dohse grabbed with both hands.

While Mack McAulay are the two starting receivers entering 2008, Dohse will see significant action as the third man in the rotation.

A former walk-on, Dohse turned five touchdown receptions in 2007 which tied him for the team lead, while his total of 557 receiving yards was second and his 31 receptions ranked fourth.

He established career highs in receptions (7), receiving yards (123) and touchdowns (2) in the Tribe's win at Maine. The





performance earned him the CAA's Rookie of the Week honor.

It was the second consecutive outing that Dohse breached the 100-yard receiving mark, as he set short-lived career highs in catches (6) and receiving yards (117) at Villanova on Oct. 6, including a 24-yard touchdown grab.

Dohse ended the year averaging 18.0 yards/catch and each of his scoring grabs went for better than 20 yards (22, 24, 27, 31, 33).

### 30 Is A Magic Number

Since taking over the program in 1980, Laycock has coached a total of seven teams that have averaged 30, or more, points per game. Five of those seven teams participated in postseason play. The average number of victories among the seven teams is 8.6.

For the record, previous to Laycock's tenure on campus, the only other team in Tribe history that averaged better than 30 points per game was the 1946 squad, which produced 34.7 points a game.

## Defensive Notes

### Higher Expectations in 2008

With the return of nine starters on the defensive side, William and Mary will look to improve upon the number of points it surrendered a season ago. The '07 edition of the Tribe allowed a school-record 427 points (38.8 ppg), breaking the previous mark established 333 (30.3 ppg) during the 1982 season.

Leading W&M's group of veterans are senior captain all-conference cornerback Derek Cox and senior captain linebacker Josh Rutter. A third-team all-league selection in '07, Cox led the Tribe with three interceptions last year. Additionally, he ranked tied for sixth on the team with 51 total tackles.

After starting all 11 games and ranking seventh in the conference in tackles per game as a freshman, Rutter missed most of '06 with a knee injury he suffered in the VMI game. He returned last season to rank second on the team with 95 total tackles and led the squad with three recovered fumbles. His 8.7 tackles per game ranked 11th in the CAA.

Also expected to help anchor the College's defense is junior defensive back David Caldwell. The Montclair, N.J., native led W&M and ranked sixth in the conference with 9.7 tackles per game during the 2007 campaign. Caldwell also ranked second on the team with 5.5 tackles for a loss.

### Follow the Leader

In addition to being one of the Tribe's top defensive players, senior all-conference cornerback Derek Cox has been a tremendous leader for the College. Prior to the start of this season, he was elected as a team captain for the second straight year, making him just the fourth player in Laycock's 29-year tenure to earn the honor twice (the last being linebacker Mohammed Youssofi in 2001-02).

### Why to Watch Third Downs

In the Tribe's four victories last season, W&M limited its opponents to a 30.2 percent conversion percentage on third downs (16-for-53). Conversely, in the College's seven losses, opponents registered a 49.4 percent success rate on third downs (49-for-99).

### Nearly Unbeatable When Holding the Opposition to Less Than 21 Points

During the last seven seasons, W&M has been nearly unbeatable when limiting the opposition to 21 points or less, posting a 25-1 record. The lone loss during the span came against Hofstra during the 2006 season when the Pride defeated W&M, 16-14, in Williamsburg on Sept. 30.

During the last 10 seasons, the Tribe owns a 37-2 record when holding the opposition to 21 points or less.

### Strong Against the Pass

W&M's defense was effective against opposing teams' passing attacks last season, as it held six opponents to less than 200 yards through the air and surrendered a league-best 167.5 yards per game. Additionally, the Tribe limited two opponents (VMI - 22 yds) and (JMU - 89) to less than 100 yards passing. No opponent totaled more than 300 yards passing, and only Villanova was able to record more than 220 yards through the air (272).

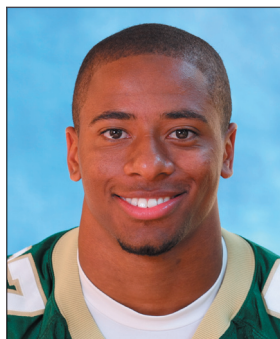

I spent my whole summer down here, didn't miss a single workout; I didn't miss a single practice in spring ball. I didn't miss a single conditioning or lifting session in winter conditioning. You and your teammates were conducting tours of the building and we able to interact with many of the over 500 alumni who came back for all the events. Talk about how you were influenced by our alumni this summer and them speaking about the history and tradition of the program.**

A: The experience is something that you couldn't explain to anyone. You'd have to experience it first hand to fully grasp what you're really a part of when you play for William and Mary. At times, when you're here as a player, it's easy to get caught up in your own individual self. But when you experience your place in a broader perspective and realize how many guys came through this program and how many of them still keep up with this program. You know, what they did to put this program in the position that it is today, and that experience is something that I'm glad to have gotten the opportunity to experience first-hand. When I'm here I shouldn't take [the opportunity to play at W&M] for granted.

**Q: Maybe even more specifically you've heard a lot from the alumni who have expectations for you, correct?**

A: Yes. Many told me point blank how they felt about us as a team recently. I got drilled with that the whole time I was here for the players reunion, I took a beating verbally.

**Q: Could you see it as a motivation?**

### Comments From Monday's CAA Football Coaches Conference Call:

**Q:** How have your preparations come along for the challenges a team like NC State can present?

**A:** We're preparing for a very fast, physical football team. I know [NC State Head] Coach [Tom] O'Brien and I know how he will have his team very, very well prepared, I don't have any question. I know they played very well defensively [against Clemson] from what it sounded like and maybe they just ran out of gas, or whatever, late. But just playing teams like we have in the past in the ACC, we understand how big they are and how much faster they are and the depth factor that they have. Again, we're trying to take care of ourselves

and get ourselves better and improve as a football team and we'll see where we are by Saturday night.

### Q: Give an assessment of camp.

**A:** We're about where we were last week injury wise and physically right now. We've worked hard to get better, I don't know how much we've improved but I think we have improved defensively. We're still trying to find what we can do best offensively with the tailbacks [sophomore Courtland Marriner and senior DeBrian Holmes] out and, defensively, we're playing hard . . . I'll give us that; we're playing hard. We probably still made some mistakes the other night in the scrimmage and offensively we had some things that stopped ourselves but I think we're working to improve. The attitude is good, the work ethic is good and we have just got to continue to work on the execution.

### Q: With North Carolina State's starting quarterback, Russell Wilson, going down last week with and injury, who are you preparing to play against?

**A:** Well, again, I don't know who's going to be playing quarterback for them and really we don't know that much about their personnel in the first place, not having played them in so long. So really what we do in our opening game is try to take care of ourselves, try to be sound about what we are doing, try to cover as many possibilities as we can as to what might happen or what could happen. But really, then put in some contingencies and be ready to adjust as the game goes on. You don't want to put all your eggs in one basket so far as one area of preparation and then have something change for you right away as soon as you start the game. So basically we're taking care of ourselves, trying to get ourselves better and then get in there and play hard.

### Q: Were you happy with the way the offense played in final fall scrimmage?

**A:** Well, we're slowly coming along and getting better offensively, but I think we're really concerned not having Courtland Mariner in there at tailback. It also doesn't look like we're going to have DeBrian Holmes in there either, so there are a lot of other guys that are going to have to step up. I thought we improved over our previous scrimmage offensively, but still I thought we still made way too many mistakes.

### Q: Who will be starting at running back?

**A:** Right now it will be [sophomore] Terrence Riggins.

### Q: Can you give an update on the possible availability of junior safety Robert Livingston and Mariner?

**A:** I don't know. They're out with knee injuries and could be awhile, I would assume. I don't like to get into particulars about injuries because I don't know enough about either right now and I can't predict the future.

### Q: Essentially, as most of the league opened up this past weekend, you are going to have two bye weeks in 2008. Is this a bonus for your team?

**A:** I don't know. You look at an open date you say we opened up later but it's not like we started practice the same time everyone else did and then all of a sudden had an open date, that's not the case. We started practicing later, so really we're right on schedule for the opening this weekend as anybody would have that opened last weekend. So we do have the open date after our third game. I've had them at all kinds of different times throughout the year and you adjust and make due with the schedule the best way you can, what you feel like is right for the football team at that time. We haven't really had the luxury of being able to plan way ahead as to when we want to have an open date and when we don't. This type of thing just falls to the mercy of the conference schedule and with their opportunity to schedule outside opponents.

### Q: Who's starting in Livingston's spot at safety?

**A:** [Sophomore] Mike Alvarado will get the start.

### Q: Planning to start any freshmen?

**A:** No, we're not planning on starting any, we'll probably travel with, roughly three or four. Whether any of them play right now is up in the air.
