Take I-64 to Lightfoot exit #234 (Rt. 199 East). Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue. Exit on Monticello and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light crossing Ironbound Road and continue about a half mile. Take first right onto Compton Dr. (before light at hospital and shopping centers-Caution-There may not be a street sign!). The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton until first stop sign (intersection of Brooks Rd.). Make right at stop sign onto Brooks Rd. The large building on the left is William and Mary Hall with the coaches' offices on the second floor (Rm. 205).

The College of William and Mary

W&M: Into The Fourth Century

For more than 300 years, the College of William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the 21st century's leaders.

The College of William and Mary was chartered February 8, 1693, by King William III and Queen Mary II of England to bring education to a growing number of British colonists and Christianity to the Native Americans. Today, William and Mary is a public, four-year, co-educational residential university, with a nationally recognized liberal arts program. Although it has retained the college name in its title, William and Mary is now a modern university.

Many of America's early leaders were educated at William and Mary, including U.S. Presidents Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, and renowned U.S. Chief Justice John Marshall. George Washington served as the college's first American chancellor from 1788 until his death in 1799.

William and Mary students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in America, in 1776. The College was the first to offer elective courses and to use the honor code system of conduct. The first chair of law in America was established at William and Mary in 1779. In addition, the College awarded the first degree in law in 1793.

The College's historic campus includes the Sir Christopher Wren Building (1695), the oldest college building in the nation where classes are still conducted. This and other 18th-century structures of W&M were restored to their original appearance through grants from philanthropist John D. Rockefeller during the restoration of Colonial Williamsburg in the late 1920s.

Although polls, rankings and guidebooks cannot fully capture the character of any educational institution, they do provide useful indications of the quality that students can expect. For years, the academic excellence of the College of William and Mary has been widely recognized by the growing raft of magazines and guidebooks that annually rank American colleges and universities. From *U.S. News and World Report* to *The Princeton Review*, William and Mary and its programs are listed among the nation's strongest.

- A recent study shows that only William and Mary and Stanford University reported student-athlete SAT scores of at least 1,000 in eight categories based on gender and sport.
- More than 90 percent of all undergraduate courses are taught by full-time faculty.
- W&M's 12-1 student-faculty ratio is among the lowest of national public universities.
- The Campus is located approximately 150 miles south of Washington, D.C., midway between Norfolk and Richmond, Virginia.
- There are 7,560 students enrolled in the College (5,560 are undergraduates) who populate a 1,200 acres scenic campus setting that includes picturesque Lake Matoaka and the College Woods.





Over the last 300 years, William and Mary has developed a sterling national reputation for its academic standard of success. And for the last century, the Tribe athletics program has been working just as diligently to maintain its position as one of the top athletics departments in the nation ...

When the College's stringent academic standards are taken into consideration, the accomplishments of W&M's athletic programs are even more amazing. Over 500 student-athletes participate in 23 intercollegiate sports, and last year, those teams won over 57 percent of their competitions en route to a combined record of 205-154-2.

The 2001-02 athletic year was a typically strong one for the Tribe. Five Colonial Athletic Association titles, one East Coast Athletic Conference championship, a share of the Atlantic 10 football crown and a first place showing at the USA Collegiate Gymnastics meet are examples of William and Mary's strong season.

The women's tennis team captured its 16th CAA Championship, while the women's soccer squad qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the 10th straight season. Perennial powerhouses like the cross country and track and field squads didn't disappoint, either, challenging for conference titles yet again in 2001.

The success isn't limited to just those programs. The volleyball and men's gymnastics teams earned their first berths in NCAA postseason action, while the men's golf team earned a bid to the NCAA East Regional, showing that improvement is occurring across the board.

Since the merger of the men's and women's athletics departments in 1986, William and Mary has seen more than its fair share of success on and off the field. With graduates of the program running major corporations or running down the opposition in a National Football League game, a degree from W&M has proven to be a stepping-stone to a successful future.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Two-time GCAA All-America Scholar Justin Hoagland is the second Tribe alum to turn pro in as many years, joining former teammate Mark Urbanek ('01) on the Times-Union Allstar (FL) Golf Tour. Both have won on the tour and are looking to move on to larger events this summer.

Continuity is emphasized in the W&M athletics department. As the shaded box below shows, William and Mary has a history of stability with its head coaches. The current head coaches at W&M have been with the program for an average of 12.5 years. This retention rate leads to better performances on the field and a better overall experience for the student-athlete.

From the administration to the training staff to the coaches, the Tribe sports family is committed to providing each student-athlete at the College with the best possible experience, both academically and athletically, for his or her collegiate career.

Student-Athlete Support

Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned a faculty academic advisor through the Academic Advising Office, directed by Dr. Randolph Coleman. Students remain with this advisor until they declare a major at which time they select a faculty advisor in their major field of concentration. The Academic Advising Office provides support and guidance to students as they plan their academic progress to graduation.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center

Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with

stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, six fulltime certified athletic trainers, graduate and undergraduate student trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The College is also in the process of evaluating and pursuing CAAHEP accreditation of its entry-level athletic training education program. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



The William and Mary men's and women's golf programs, coming off of a breakthrough 2001-02 season, give the College much reason for optimism going into the 2002-03 season. The Tribe is led by Director of Golf Scott King, who was rewarded for last season's triumphs by receiving the Colonial Athletic Association Men's Coach of the Year, the Virginia State Coach of the Year and the Mid-Atlantic Region's Men's Coach of the Year awards. Assisted by Associate Head Coach Jerry Morelli and assistant coach Vickie Linkous, the Tribe looks to be well prepared for the season.

Tribe Men's Golf

The 2001-02 season culminated with a trip to the NCAA East Regionals, where the Tribe finished in 22nd place. Additionally, the team captured third at the CAA Championships and earned team titles at the Charleston Southern Fall Invitational and the El Diablo Intercollegiate. The squad returns six golfers, including three with experience at the NCAA Tournament. Aspirations to finish at the top of the conference and to finish higher in the NCAA seem quite realistic. Led by captains **Justin Ragognetti** and **Ryan Roberts**, the team looks to combine accomplished rookie golfers with the talented returnees.

This fall, William and Mary finished in the top-six in two tournaments, including a fourth-place finish at the Navy Fall Invitational. Earning the individual medal after the only round of the rainy ODU Seascape Invitational, **Gary Barton** led the team to a sixth-place finish, while **Tim Pemberton** finished ninth in the event. Barton also recorded a top-10 finish in the 17-team Wolverine Invitational, while freshman **Trevor Branon** began his collegiate career with a 10th-place finish at the Navy Fall Invitational.

Ragognetti, a senior, was one of the top golfers on last year's squad, achieving the second-best scoring average in both the fall and spring. He tied for ninth in the conference tournament and competed in the NCAA Southeast Regionals. He won the individual title at the El Diablo Intercollegiate, leading the team to its second title of the year, and finished in the top-15 individually twice in the spring. He completed the fall season with a 74.4 stroke average, with his best finish (13th) coming at the Navy Fall Invitational.

Roberts, a graduate student, was part of the Tribe's top finish at the Old Dominion Seascape Collegiate last year and shot his best round of 73 at the James Madison Invitational. Competing three times this fall, Roberts shot a season-best round of 71 at the River Landing Intercollegiate and ended the season with a 76.0 stroke average. The leadership skills and golfing talent of the senior duo of Ragognetti and Roberts should provide the foundation of a strong 2002-03 squad.

Pemberton, a junior who turned in the lowest scoring average on the team last year, is another key returner. He finished in the top-15 individually in every tournament in which he competed except one. Highlights from his impressive season include a fifth-place finish at the conference championships, a 47th-place finish at the NCAA Southeast Regionals, and a first-place finish at the Charleston Southern Invitational, leading the squad to a team title. Pemberton competed five times this fall, with his top finish of ninth at ODU and a final stroke average of 73.8.

Fellow junior **Robert Himel** looks to challenge for playing time this season after competing in two tournaments last year. Although he did not compete this fall, Himel continues to show improvement.

Two sophomores return for the Tribe in Barton and **Robby McKetta**. Barton competed in five tournaments for the Tribe last spring, including the CAA Championship and the NCAA Southeast Regional. Barton finished fifth at CAAs after an impressive third day score at three-under par. Barton competed four times this fall and concluded the season by taking the individual medal at the

ODU Seascape Invitational. His score of 68 led all golfers in the only round. Barton also finished 10th in the Wolverine Invitational. His stroke average of 72.4 was the best in the fall.

McKetta will look for more playing time this year after playing twice last season. His impressive 12th-place finish at the William and Mary Intercollegiate indicates that he has the potential to become one of the Tribe's starting five. This fall, he competed twice, scoring a season-best round of 72 at the Wolverine Invitational.

The Tribe boasts four newcomers in sophomore **Tim McGinn** and freshmen Branon, **Nick Dunkle** and **Jeff Steckmest**. The rookies fared well in the first tournament of the fall, as Branon, Steckmest and Dunkle finished 10th, 19th and 32nd, respectively. Branon competed twice more and concluded the fall season with a stroke average of 76.0. Steckmest competed in the James Madison Invitational, carding a second round score of 74. The Navy Invitational was Dunkle's only tournament of the fall, while McGinn competed once at the River Landing Intercollegiate, finishing 73rd.

Tribe Women's Golf

The lady golfers look to emerge on the national scene this season with eight returning golfers. The women turned in a strong 2001-02 season, finishing in the top-three twice in the spring and placing fourth at the Eastern College Athletic Conference Championships in the fall. With the addition of the CAA tournament this spring, the squad aims to finish in the top of the conference at the tournament.

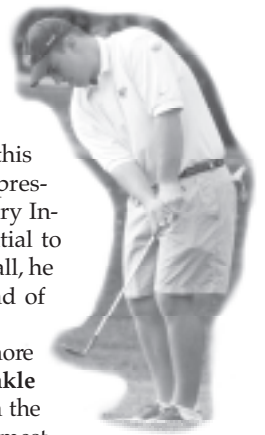
This fall, the women's squad finished in the top-six in three tournaments. In the second competition of the season, the Tribe finished fifth in the Memphis Intercollegiate, followed by a third-place finish in the Princeton Invitational. W&M concluded the season with a sixth-place showing in the Lady Pirate Invitational. The Tribe had three individual top-10 finishes, as **Lindsey Sims** and **Gwen Brink** finished fourth and eighth, respectively in the Princeton Invitational, while Sims also placed fourth in the Lady Pirate Invitational.

The Tribe's three captains, senior Sims and juniors **Ann Schnell** and **Lindsey Wagner**, are expected to lead the squad this year both on and off of the golf course. Sims was a consistent starter for the squad last year, finishing in the top-10 three times, including a fourth-place finish in last year's Princeton Invitational after shooting 77-79—156. Carding two top-10 individual finishes this fall, Sims has shown even further improvement, ending the fall tournaments with a team-best stroke average of 78.36.

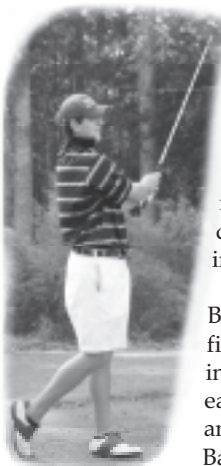
Schnell was the top golfer for the team in the 2001-02 season, finishing the spring with an impressive stroke average of 79.1 and five top-10 individual finishes. Her ninth-place showing in the 23-team ECAC Championship tournament helped lead the women's squad to a fourth-place team finish, while her third-place effort at the NIU Springlake Invitational helped the women to second-place team finish. Schnell concluded the fall of 2002 with a stroke average of 79.79, and placed in the top-25 in four tournaments.

Wagner finished the spring season with a stroke average among the best on the squad. She earned five top-20 finishes throughout the year, including a 10th-place finish at the NIU Springlake Invitational. She competed three times this fall, with her best finish (20th) in the Princeton Invitational.

Juniors **Farr Prickett** and **Nicole Rheaume** look to contribute more this season. Prickett and Rheaume finished 51st and 77th, respectively in the William and Mary Invitational last season. Prickett shot an impressive round of 81 during the first

day of the tournament, while Rheaume finished with a two-round total of 187. Prickett competed in the first two tournaments this fall, finishing 42nd in the Memphis Intercollegiate. Rheaume saw action in the Lady Pirate Fall Invitational, finishing 52nd overall.

The sophomore class returns two strong golfers in **Allison Bourne-Vanneck** and **Alex Hill**. Bourne-Vanneck came on late in the season last spring, playing in the last three competitions. Her best finish came at the William and Mary Invitational, where she finished 17th after shooting a round of 74. She did not compete this fall.

Hill participated in four tournaments last spring, earning a spot in the top-25 twice. However, Hill played her best golf this fall, competing in all five tournaments and finishing with the second-lowest stroke average, 79.0. Hill, a very consistent golfer, had three top-20 finishes, including a 16th-place showing in the Memphis Intercollegiate.

The Tribe freshmen are expected to complement the ever-improving upperclassmen. Brink saw action in five tournaments this fall, finishing 13th at the Memphis Intercollegiate and eighth at the Princeton

Invitational. **Sayde Murray** competed twice, finishing 30th in the Princeton Invitational after carding a 81-87—168. **Deborah Petracca** played in the Memphis Intercollegiate, placing 37th. **Pantipa Jinhphadhana** did not compete this fall but has shown improvement since her arrival at the College.

Coach King is very optimistic about the upcoming season. The combination of talented and experienced upperclassmen with the accomplished newcomers should prove to be an exciting formula for success.

Scott King Director of Golf

After a breakthrough 2001-02 season, William and Mary's Director of Golf Scott King could not be more optimistic about the future of Tribe Golf. After coaching the program full to unparalleled accomplishments and post-season

awards in 2002, the forthcoming season looks even brighter for both the men's and women's squads. Entering his fourth season as Director of Golf at the College, King looks to lead his student-athletes to excel on the golf course and in the classroom.

Since King's arrival at the College, the Tribe's golf programs have risen to a new level, as was demonstrated by the successes of the 2001-02 season. On the men's side, the team earned a bid to the NCAA East Regional Championships, placing 22nd at the event while also capturing third at the CAA Championships and taking two team titles at the Charleston Southern Fall Invitational and the El Diablo Intercollegiate. The women's program looks to be taking a similar path, after two top-three finishes in the spring and a fourth-place finish at the Eastern College Athletic Conference Championships last fall. For such accomplishments, King has been rewarded as the Colonial Athletic Association's Men's Coach of the Year

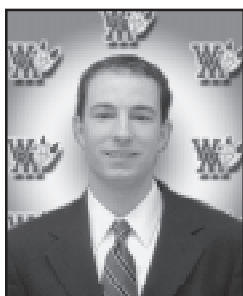
and the Mid-Atlantic Region's Men's Coach of the Year in 2002. King anticipates both the men's and women's programs to continue to improve and compete at the national level.

In the fall of 2002, the Tribe achieved three top-10 finishes, 10 top-20 finishes and one individual medalist on the men's side and four top-10 finishes and 12 top-20 finishes on the women's side. With improving returning golfers and several freshman proven to make an immediate impact on the program, the prognosis for the golf squads looks promising.

King began helping the Tribe as an assistant coach in 1997 while also serving as an assistant golf professional at the Kingsmill Resort in Williamsburg. He is also the director of the Nike Junior Golf Camps in the Williamsburg area.

A native of Springfield, Virginia, King graduated from North Carolina Wesleyan College and played two years of varsity golf for the Battling Bishops. He then attended graduate school at Appalachian State. King has been working in the golf industry since 1986 and gained membership to the PGA in 1994.

King served as an assistant coach at George Mason during the 1995-96 season while working as an assistant golf professional at the Country Club of Fairfax in Fairfax, Virginia. Prior to his stint in Northern Virginia, King worked as a professional at Sparrows Point Country Club in Baltimore and at the Hound Ears Lodge and Club in Blowing Rock, North Carolina.



Jerry Morelli Associate Head Coach

Jerry Morelli joins the William and Mary golf program this year as associate head coach. Morelli, a native of Holbrook, Massachusetts and a 2000 Wake Forest graduate, will provide valuable assistance to both programs with his PGA teaching background and American

Junior Golf Association intern experience. A PGA certified teaching professional since October of 2001, Morelli has worked with, and instructed, accomplished golfers and performed administrative duties related to the advancement of golfers under his care. Drawing from experience with the AJGA and as an assistant professional at a golf club, Morelli's knowledge of the sport should contribute to the success of the program.

"Jerry will provide the versatility this type of program needs," states King. "His teaching background will prove beneficial in practice, and the relationships he formed in the AJGA will provide a larger recruiting base for us. He also has vast tournament administration experience which can only improve both tournaments we host each spring."



Vickie Linkous Assistant Coach

Vickie Linkous returns to the Tribe for her third season on the staff, but this time in a different capacity. She has stepped down as associate head coach to pursue a career playing professionally and will now assist the teams in the areas of tournament play and preparation, fund-raising and communications. Her insight and experience will continue to prove beneficial for both teams.

Linkous, a 1992 William and Mary graduate and former three-year starter, knows what it takes to be a successful student-athlete at William and Mary. A double-major in psychology and kinesiology, Linkous won the Winthrop Tournaments in both 1991 and 1992.

After graduating from the College, Linkous spent time working in the executive search and contract staffing industry and served as vice president of the Lee Group, a professional employee management firm.

The William and Mary men's golf program topped off a banner 2001-02 season with a trip to the NCAA East Regional, where the Tribe finished 22nd. The tournament, hosted by Georgia Tech, was held at the Ansley Golf Club's Settindown Creek Course in Roswell, Georgia. Rewarded for two team tournament victories and three individual medallists from the fall and spring, the Tribe competed in the tournament for the first time since 1994.

The Tribe returns three golfers who competed in last year's tournament. Tim Pemberton was the highest finisher for W&M, finishing 47th overall. Tied for 72nd after two rounds of play, Pemberton carded a 73 in the final round of the tournament to move up 25 spots. He finished at 10-over par, carding a 76-77-73—226 through the three rounds.

Barton concluded his rookie season with a 101st-place finish at the NCAA East Regional tournament. Hitting three birdie shots in the second round, Barton handed in an impressive score of 73. With an 83-73-81—237, Barton finished at 21-over par.

Justin Ragognetti completed the regional tournament at 28-over par, carding a 80-86-78—244 through the three rounds of play. Ragognetti bounced back from a tough outing on the second day to shoot three birdies in the final round, finishing in 127th place.

Playing a role in providing individual attention and instruction to the youngsters is greatly rewarded as the young golfers learn more about the sport.

Giving back to the community by participating in the junior clinics at the PGA Michelob Championships and at the Colonial Athletic Association Conference Championships has become an important part of the Tribe golf tradition.

Important Information for Prospective Student-Athletes

The following information regarding recruiting was taken from the 2002-03 NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. More information about NCAA rules and regulations can be viewed online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net or www.ncaa.org, or can be obtained by contacting the William and Mary Compliance Office at (757) 221-3360.

What is a Prospective Student-Athlete?

You become a 'prospective student-athlete' when you start ninth grade classes. You become a 'recruited prospective student-athlete' at a particular college if any coach or representative of the college's athletics interests (booster or representative) approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at the college. Activities by coaches or boosters that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are:

- Providing you with an official visit
- Placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family
- Visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus

Telephone Calls

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are per-

mitted on or after July 1 after the completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week to you or your parents or guardians. You (or your parents) may telephone a coach at your expense as often as you wish.

Contacts

A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus only on or after July 1 after completion of your junior year. Any face-to-face meeting between a college coach and you or your parents, during which any of you say more than "hello" is a contact. Also, any face-to-face meeting that is pre-arranged or occurs at your high school or competition or practice site is a contact, regardless of the conversation.

Clearinghouse

If you intend to participate in Division I or II athletics as a freshman, you must register and be certified by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse. In order to be registered with the clearinghouse, you must complete the registration process found at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net (also available at www.ncaa.org). You may also request and complete the student-release form and mail or fax the top (white) copy of the form to the clearinghouse along with the \$30 registration fee.

Courses



Ford's Colony is home to three 18-hole courses designed by the legendary Dan Maples—a name synonymous with some of the most spectacular golf courses in the country. According to Maples, "The courses at Ford's Colony were built with championship qualities, capable of challenging the skills of any pro, but without taking away from an amateur's enjoyment."

Coach King says: "We are so fortunate to call Ford's Colony one of our 'homes.' The support of the staff and members is genuine, and their facilities are top notch. The 54-hole layout provide endless practice and playing options. The Blackheath Course is the host for our annual Women's Invitational."

KINGSMILL RESORT

The Kingsmill River Course was the site of the annual PGA Tour stop, the Michelob Classic, and is the future home of a LPGA Tour stop. Three holes feature play along the James River, and the layout has been saluted by most of the major golf publications. Arnold Palmer designed the adjacent Plantation course, which opened in 1986. The newest championship layout is the Woods Course, designed by Tom Clark and Curtis Strange.

Coach King says: "Having the Kingsmill Resort available to the teams is a tremendous asset to the program. Three very distinguished courses, plus the Bray Links par-three layout, offer diversity that go unmatched in the area. Playing where the pros play is a great challenge. The River Course is the host of our annual Men's Invitational."



The Golden Horseshoe

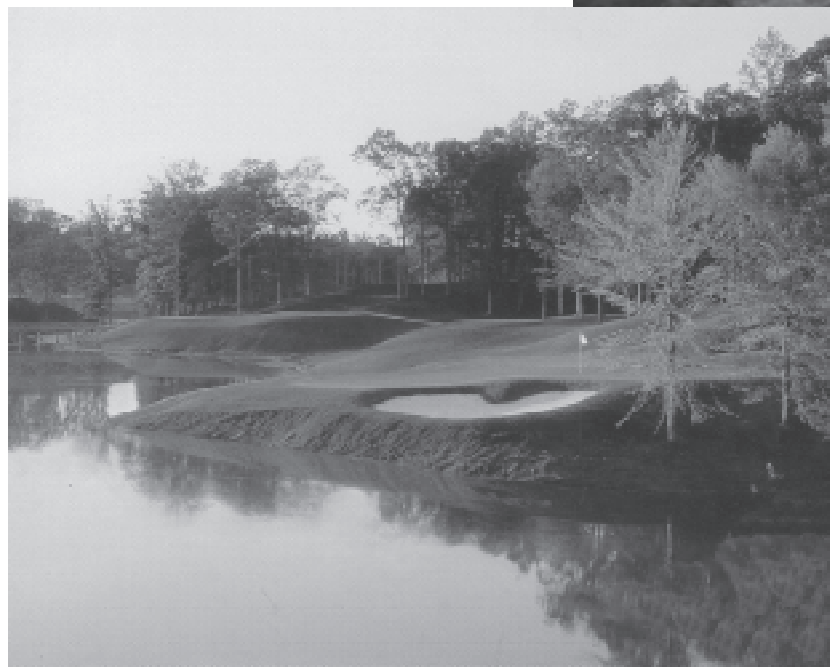
The only golf resort in Virginia that's boasted two top-10, nationally ranked courses, The Golden Horseshoe is becoming a favorite for USGA Championships. No other place perfectly blends the challenge of championship golf with the soul-stirring backdrop of the 18th century.

Coach King says: "Golden Horseshoe is one of the nation's premier golf destinations. The Gold and Green courses, along with the nine hole Spotswood course, each have their own unique challenges. The Gold Course has hosted many national USGA events and is the host facility of the 2007 NCAA Men's Golf Championships."



From fairways lined with stately maples, cedars, and oaks to the raw beauty of the coastal woods, our meticulously maintained Nicklaus Design Associates course will take you through a changing landscape of challenge. This championship golf course was voted by *Golf Digest* as one of the top 10 places to play in Virginia, and by the *Washington Golf Monthly* as one of the 100 best places to play in the Mid-Atlantic from 1996 to 2001.

Coach King says: "Williamsburg National is a new member of the Tribe golf family. The playing and practice conditions are fantastic. The practice facility features two large practice greens, short game area, and an extremely large Bermuda grass tee. A challenging 18-hole venue with nine more in the works requires skilled and decisive shot making on this Nicklaus designed layout."



Set along the ridge of a natural bluff, Kiskiack offers golf for players of all levels. Many of the picturesque holes demand accurate shot making from tee to green, while others are more forgiving, with ample landing areas and gentle sloping greens.

Coach King says: "Another outstanding playing and practice facility, featuring the largest driving range in the area. Kiskiack generally has the best conditioned greens in the area, and our almost unlimited access allows us a practice facility that meets our ever changing schedules."



The Colonial Golf Course is a superbly conditioned, traditional layout in an unspoiled natural setting. The course has received significant recognition from national publications, including a *Golf Digest* "Top-10 Virginia Public Course" ranking, and a "Top-10 New Courses in the U.S." salute from *Golf Magazine*.

Coach King says: "The Colonial is the best-kept secret in the area. It's practice facilities are superb, including two putting greens, short game area, double ended Bermuda grass tees, and a three hole practice course surrounding the range. The 18-hole layout requires every shot in the bag and has hosted the CAA Conference Championships."

Below are a few of the highlights of the athletic facilities that the College has to offer:

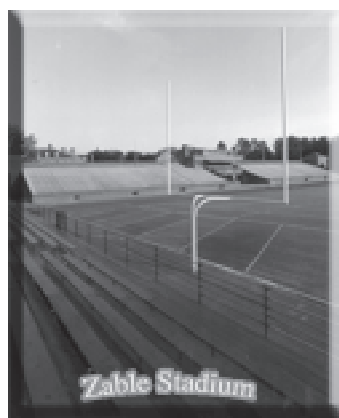

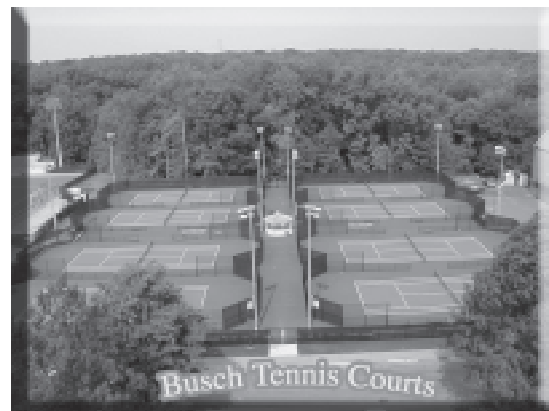

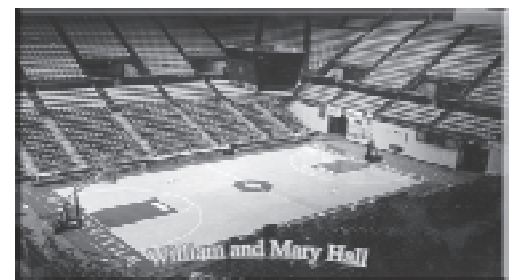
