Directions to W&M

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234 (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through first stoplight (at Ironbound Road). After the light, continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers) There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. William and Mary Hall will be on your left.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Campus Drive. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Campus Drive while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left.

2003-04 Outlook

Despite a change at the top, William and Mary golf enters the 2003-04 campaign aiming to continue its success and reach the highest levels of the Colonial Athletic Association. Director of Golf Jay Albaugh comes to the College with a proven history of taking teams to their highest conference finishes. While most recently at Eastern Illinois, he guided both the men's and women's programs to victories while seeing record stroke averages set. He promises to bring the same constant improvement to the Tribe, which is coming off strong performances at conferences in 2003, as the women captured third in the inaugural CAA Championship while the men took a solid fifth.

Tribe Men's Golf

The Tribe men are coming off a challenging fall campaign where the team was battling the weather in addition to the other teams on the course. The entire season was plagued by rainy conditions which not only hindered practice but also interrupted three of the five scheduled tournaments, robbing

the team of chances to gain more playing experience under Albaugh and move up the leaderboard in the final rounds after acclimating to the course.

Nevertheless, the Green and Gold posted a number of strong showings, coming out firing in their first tournament at Navy, tying for seventh in the field of 14 on the strength of **Gary Barton's** fifth place finish. The College closed the fall on the upswing as well, taking sixth at the Hoya Invitational as Barton and **Robert Himel** tied for 15th after rain forced the tournament to be official after the conclusion of one round.

Barton, a junior, fronts the team as one of its co-captains after orchestrating a stellar 2002-03 campaign and continuing his strong play into the fall. Barton earned second-team All-CAA honors last season after taking ninth at the conference championship and also won the individual medal at the ODU Seascope Invitational. Consistently firing the lowest rounds on the squad, Barton aims to challenge again for an individual title as well as improving his strong showing at the CAA. The only member of the team to post a

score lower than 70 in the fall (with a 69 that put him in the running for the win at Navy), Barton provides veteran leadership both on and off the course.

Joining Barton with co-captain's duties is Himel, the only senior on the squad. Showing continual improvement, Himel capped his fall by firing a 74 (+2) at the Hoya Invitational to tie for 15th in the rain-shortened event. A diligent worker, Himel sets a strong example for the underclassmen with his industrious practice routine and has ably filled the leadership role expected of him. With the ability to go low, after posting a 73 (+1) at 2003's El Diablo Intercollegiate and a 74 (+1) at 2003's Big Red Classic, Himel aims to better his consistency to post low rounds throughout tournaments. His confidence was boosted as the only Tribe player to win in match play, 2-up, in the College's February match against St. Andrews (Scotland).

Robby McKetta, a junior, played in two tournaments during the fall and at each bettered his first round total in each subsequent round. That solid play earned him the third-lowest fall stroke average on the team. He ended the fall with a solid round of 75 to close the Xavier Invitational. Fellow junior **Tom McGinn** spent the fall studying abroad but is ready to return after a solid sophomore year where he proved he could go low after firing a 72 at the W&M Invitational

Two sophomores, **Trevor Brannon** and **Jeff Steckmest**, aim to reach the next level after solid freshman campaigns. Brannon showed his promise early last season, firing rounds of 71-73 to tie for 10th in his first collegiate tournament, the Navy Fall Invitational. He aims to recapture that touch with a strong short game. Steckmest came on strong in the second round of this fall's Xavier Invitational, carding a 72 and looking to improve before rain washed out the final 18. He was the squad's high finisher at the tournament, along with Barton. He continued his strong play at Georgetown, finishing at 4-over with the second-lowest total on the team. A tireless worker and aggressive player, Steckmest brings great imagination in shot making.

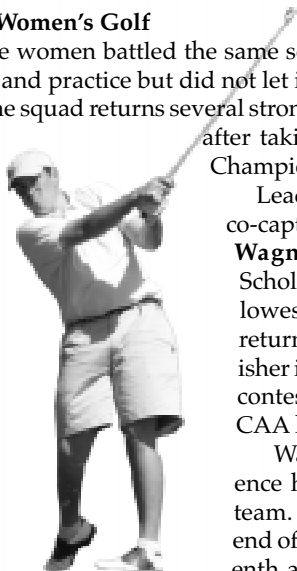
Freshmen **Hunter Watts** and **Ryan Price** each played one tournament during the fall season. Watts brings a wealth of potential to the team with solid swing fundamentals which can serve as the foundation of a strong career. Price is currently changing his swing and has made great strides. Fellow newcomer **Matt Brantingham** has a unique swing but solid short game and strong mental approach to the game which will allow him to flourish.

Tribe Women's Golf

The women battled the same soggy fall that disrupted tournaments and practice but did not let it deter them from a solid showing. The squad returns several strong golfers, including five seniors, after taking third at the inaugural CAA Championship last season.

Leading the Tribe's effort are senior co-captains **Ann Schnell** and **Lindsey Wagner**. Schnell, last year's CAA Scholar Athlete of the Year, posted the lowest spring stroke average among returners. She was the Tribe's top finisher in three of the four fall events she contested and earned first-team All-CAA honors last year.

Wagner, a second-team all conference honoree in 2003, also fronts the team. Wagner came on strong at the end of the spring season, claiming seventh at the CAA Championship after posting solid finishes of 19th and 26th at the previous two tournaments. Wagner, consistently among the team's

best finishers, posted a 75 at the Ross Resorts Invitational in the last tournament of the fall and aims to continue that momentum into the spring.

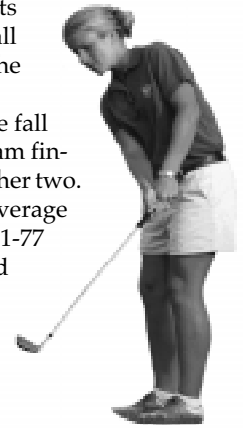
Senior **Kathy Wunder** was solid in three fall tournaments, where she was the highest team finisher in one and the second-highest in the other two. **Farr Prickett** led the team in fall scoring average with 78.00 after firing solid rounds of 76-81-77 at the Ross Resorts Invitational. Prickett tied for 17th at the tournament, the second highest finish on the squad. **Nicole Rheume** looks for more playing time after competing in the first two fall events which included posting the team's third-best score in the Bay Tree Classic.

Alex Hill, the lone junior on the squad, aims to make an impact after gaining experience by playing in all tournaments last spring and four of five of the fall events. She was the team's high finisher at the Lady Pirate Invitational where she fired three sub-80 rounds (77-78-76).

Four sophomores aim to contribute more after adjusting to collegiate competition for a season. **Gwen Brink** competed in five of the six 2003 spring events with a best of 32nd at the W&M Invite. A player with enormous potential, Brink aims to score lower more consistently. **Pantipa Jinphiphadhana** only competed twice last spring but shot a solid 81 in the W&M Invite for 32nd place. One of the hardest workers on the team, Jinphiphadhana practices every

day with the mindset of improving, and she has positioned herself to make an impact in tournaments this spring. **Sayde Murray** has become a solid contributor for the team, competing in the last three spring tournaments, including the CAA Championships, and in four of five this fall. A strong qualifier, she aims to bring that same play to her tournament finishes. **Debby Petracca** competed in two tournaments as a freshman and twice during the but will take some time off from golf to netmind for the Tribe's lacrosse team. As a two-sport athlete, Petracca is perhaps the most athletic person on the team and is very teachable because of her physical talents.

The squad welcomes two solid freshmen to the squad who come in with strong credentials. **Melissa DePuy**, a two-time school MVP, made the all-area team for four years and will be a big part of the Tribe's future. With a solid golf swing, DePuy just needs more collegiate experience before breaking out with high finishes. **Jackie Gallagher** comes to the team with a strong work ethic which she hopes to parlay into becoming a regular contributor at tournaments.

Jay Albaugh, in his first year as Director of Golf, came to the Tribe from Eastern Illinois University where he served as the head coach for both the men's and women's golf teams. In his five years at Eastern Illinois, Albaugh saw both squads achieve their best finishes ever at the Ohio Valley Conference Championship, including a runner-up result for the women in 2003. The 2002-03 season also saw Albaugh lead each team to a victory, with the men taking the 11-team Harris Invitational while the women won the Butler Invitational. Overall Albaugh took his teams to four wins during his tenure, which included the first win ever for the women's team. He also led each team to its lowest stroke average in history while at Eastern Illinois.

Previously, Albaugh served as head golf coach at Mount St. Mary's College for three years.

While there, he oversaw the creation of a women's golf program and also led the men's team to their best-ever conference finish, fourth. Albaugh, a 1996 graduate of Mount St. Mary's, was a four-year letterwinner in golf and was named first team All-NEC his junior and senior year. The Mountaineers' number one golfer for three years, Albaugh won the American University Invitational in 1994 and was a two-time selection to the NEC Scholar-Athlete team.

Albaugh has also served as an assistant golf professional for three years and is a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America and National Golf Coaches Association. Albaugh holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Mount St. Mary's and a master's degree in athletic administration from Eastern Illinois.



ASSISTANT COACH LISA FRANCISCO

Lisa Francisco came to the College for the 2003-04 season after having spent a year on the Williamsburg golf scene. As an assistant golf professional at the Kingsmill Resort and Spa in nearby James City, Francisco provided individual golf lessons and group clinics and also directed locker room operations for the 2003 LPGA Michelob Light Open. Francisco has held LPGA Teaching and Club Professional Membership since 2002.

Before coming to Williamsburg, Francisco was an assistant golf pro for two years, first in Suffolk, VA, then in State College, PA. She also served as a volunteer assistant coach at her alma mater, Penn State, during the fall of 2000.

A 2000 graduate of Penn State, with a major in Recreation and Park Management, Francisco was a four-year letterwinner for the Nittany Lions' golf team. An ECAC all-conference honoree in 1997, Francisco competed for the squad at the 1999 NCAA East Regional.

Important Information for Prospective Student-Athletes

The following information regarding recruiting was taken from the 2003-04 NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. More information about NCAA rules and regulations can be viewed online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net or www.ncaa.org, or can be obtained by contacting the William and Mary Compliance Office at (757) 221-3360.

What is a Prospective Student-Athlete?

You become a 'prospective student-athlete' when you start ninth grade classes. You become a 'recruited prospective student-athlete' at a particular college if any coach or representative of the college's athletics interests approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at the college. Activities by coaches that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are:

- Providing you with an official visit
- Placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family
- Visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus

Telephone Calls

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted on or after July 1 after the completion of your junior year. A

college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week to you or your parents or guardians. You (or your parents) may telephone a coach at your expense as often as you wish.

Contacts

A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus only on or after July 1 after completion of your junior year. Any face-to-face meeting between a college coach and you or your parents, during which any of you say more than "hello" is a contact. Also, any face-to-face meeting that is pre-arranged or occurs at your high school or competition or practice site is a contact, regardless of the conversation.

Clearinghouse

If you intend to participate in Division I or II athletics as a freshman, you must register and be certified by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse. In order to be registered with the clearinghouse, you must complete the registration process found at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net (also available at www.ncaa.org). You may also request and complete the student-release form and mail or fax the top (white) copy of the form to the clearinghouse along with the \$30 registration fee.

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2002-03 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference championships, while six teams ended the season nationally ranked in the top-25. Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top-100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and this season W&M far exceeded that standard, ending the 2002-03 campaign ranked 58th. It marked the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or second in the Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also

field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Overall, the College has proven dominant in the CAA, leading the league with 73 conference titles, 24 more than the next closest school. In recent years, it has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. In the 2002-03 season, W&M student-athletes, who make up close to 10% of the entire student body, compiled a 3.03 grade point average.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor—Tara Flint (women's soccer), Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf)—more than any other school.

The College of William and Mary - The Best Small Public University in the United States

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler. The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff



consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

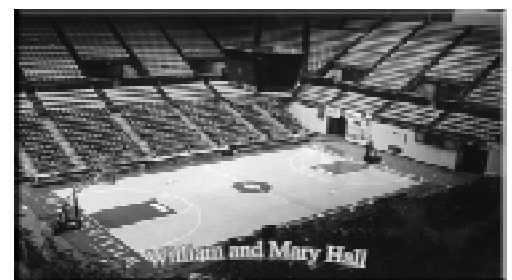

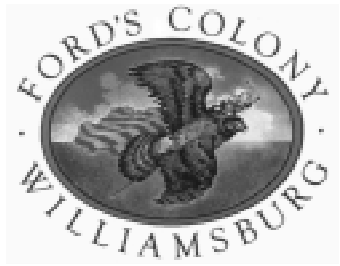

Ford's Colony is home to three 18-hole courses designed by the legendary Dan Maples—a name synonymous with some of the most spectacular golf courses in the country. According to Maples, "The courses at Ford's Colony were built with championship qualities, capable of challenging the skills of any pro, but without taking away from an amateur's enjoyment."

KINGSMILL RESORT

The Kingsmill River Course, former site of a PGA Tour event, currently hosts the LPGA Michelob Ultra Open. Three holes feature play along the James River, and the layout has been saluted by most of the major golf publications. Arnold Palmer designed the adjacent Plantation course, which opened in 1986. The newest championship layout is the Woods Course, designed by Tom Clark and Curtis Strange.



The Golden Horseshoe

The only golf resort in Virginia that's boasted two top-10, nationally-ranked courses, The Golden Horseshoe is becoming a favorite for USGA Championships. No other place perfectly blends the challenge of championship golf with the soul-stirring backdrop of the 18th century.



From fairways lined with stately maples, cedars, and oaks to the raw beauty of the coastal woods, the meticulously maintained Nicklaus Design Associates course will take you through a changing landscape of challenge. This championship golf course was voted by *Golf Digest* as one of the top 10 places to play in Virginia and by the *Washington Golf Monthly* as one of the 100 best places to play in the Mid-Atlantic from 1996 to 2001.



Set along the ridge of a natural bluff, Kiskiack offers golf for players of all levels. Many of the picturesque holes demand accurate shot making from tee to green, while others are more forgiving, with ample landing areas and gentle sloping greens.



The Colonial Golf Course is a superbly conditioned, traditional layout in an unspoiled natural setting. The course has received significant recognition from national publications, including a *Golf Digest* "Top-10 Virginia Public Course" ranking, and a "Top-10 New Courses in the U.S." salute from *Golf Magazine*.
