Quick Facts/Media Info

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Directions to W&M

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Light-foot Exit 234 (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through first stoplight (at Ironbound Road). After the light, continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers) There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. William and Mary Hall will be on your left.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Campus Drive. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Campus Drive while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left.

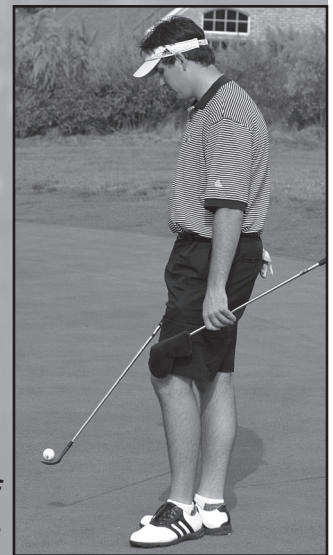

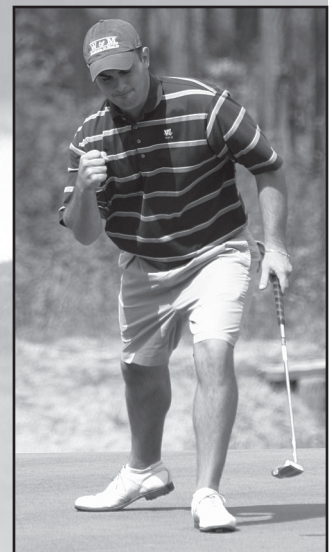

Jay Albaugh Director of Golf

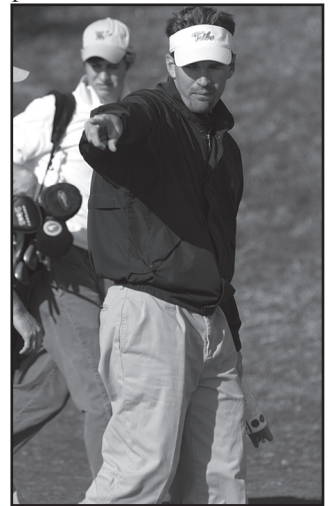
Jay Albaugh is in his second year as Director of Golf and leads both the men's and women's programs for the Tribe. In his first season, Albaugh saw the women repeat their third place finish at the CAA Championship with Ann Schnell earning first-team All-CAA acclaim, the only player not on the CAA title-winning team to earn such honors. Schnell was also honored as the CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year under Albaugh's guidance. On the men's side Albaugh led senior Gary Barton to second-team all-conference and all-state accolades as Barton claimed two runner-up finishes on the season.

Albaugh has shown an ability for molding young players into consistent contributors to the team score. In his first season, his work with then-freshmen Matt Brantingham, Ryan Price and Hunter Watts was evident through the spring season as the trio broke out with a number of solid top-10 and top-20 showings and started playing consistently in the No. 2 and 3 positions and even in the No. 1 spot at times. The three's progression continued this fall as they have become a consistent force on the travel squad and are shooting at or near par on a consistent basis while threatening for medalist honors.

Albaugh came to the Tribe from Eastern Illinois University where he served as the head coach for both the men's and women's golf teams. In his five years at Eastern Illinois, Albaugh saw both squads achieve its best finishes ever at the Ohio Valley Conference Championship, including a runner-up result for the women in 2003. The 2002-03 season also saw Albaugh lead each team to a victory, with the men taking the 11-team Harris Invitational while the women won the Butler Invitational. Overall, Albaugh took his teams to four wins during his tenure, which included the first win ever for the women's team. He also led each team to its lowest stroke average in history while at Eastern Illinois.

Previously, Albaugh served as head golf coach at Mount St. Mary's College for three years. While there, he oversaw the creation of a women's golf program and also led the men's team to their best-ever conference finish, fourth. Albaugh, a 1996 graduate of Mount St. Mary's, was a four-year letterwinner in golf and was named first team All-NEC his junior and senior seasons. The Mountaineers' number one golfer for three years, Albaugh won the American University Invitational in 1994 and was a two-time selection to the NEC Scholar-Athlete team.

Albaugh has also served as an assistant golf professional for three years and is a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America and National Golf Coaches Association. Albaugh holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Mount St. Mary's and a master's degree in athletic administration from Eastern Illinois. In September 2004 he was named to the NCAA Men's Golf Mid-Atlantic Regional Advisory Committee.



Lisa Francisco Head Women's Coach

Lisa Francisco started as an assistant coach with the Tribe in 2003 and was named the head women's coach beginning with the 2004-05 season. In this capacity she assumed responsibility for the day to day operations of the women's team, including running practices and leading the teams at tournaments. Francisco made an immediate impact upon joining the Tribe, guiding the development of then-freshman Melissa DePuy, who racked up five top-35 finishes in the spring of 2004, including an impressive 13th at the CAA Championship and a 10th at the TPC Virginia Beach Invitational. She was also instrumental in W&M's strong performance at its home tournament as the Tribe was only one shot off the team lead after 18 holes.

She has continued to mold young golfers this season, coaching freshman Misha Harvey to a 10th-place showing in her first collegiate tournament and a team-leading fall stroke average.

Francisco came to the College after already having spent a year on the Williamsburg golf scene. As an assistant golf professional at the Kingsmill Resort and Spa in nearby James City, Francisco provided individual golf lessons and group clinics and also directed locker room operations for the 2003 LPGA Michelob Light Open. Francisco has held LPGA Teaching and Club Professional Membership since 2002.

Before coming to Williamsburg, Francisco was an assistant golf pro for two years, first in Suffolk, VA, then in State College, PA. She also served as a volunteer assistant coach at her alma mater, Penn State, during the fall of 2000.

A 2000 graduate of Penn State, with a major in Recreation and Park Management, Francisco was a four-year letterwinner for the Nittany Lions' golf squad. An ECAC all-conference honoree in 1997, Francisco competed for the squad at the 1999 NCAA East Regional. Always a long hitter in college, she had exceptional ball striking and in tournaments would get on rolls thanks to that powerful combination. As a coach, she emphasizes the short game, especially putting, as a sure means to chop strokes off her players' games.



In his second season at the helm, Director of Golf Jay Albaugh has positioned Tribe men's program for its first NCAA Regional qualification since 2002 thanks to the leadership of two dynamic seniors and the emergence of several underclassmen. With two medalists fronting a talented squad, the Tribe has all the ingredients to turn in under par team scores and challenge for team and individual titles. A fantastic fall has left the squad poised for even greater success.

Senior **Tim Pemberton's** return to the team from a redshirt season immediately elevates the Tribe's play and provides veteran leadership for the underclassmen. A former individual medalist and All-CAA, all-state and all-region honoree, the senior brings a wealth of national-level tournament experience to the team. A qualifier for two U. S. Amateurs and competitor at the 2004 Players Amateur, Pemberton is one of the team's leaders between and outside the ropes, and the knowledge he can impart to the Tribe's younger players is just as valuable as the low numbers he consistently posts. His return gives the Green and Gold a steady anchor who can dip into the 60s at the No. 1 position and close tournaments for the team. With a phenomenal short game and aggressive style of play, Pemberton provides a spark in competition, but his enthusiasm in teaching his younger teammates has made the bigger difference this season.

Fellow senior co-captain **Gary Barton** has steadily improved each season and has solidified his role as a team leader. Another former individual medalist (winning the Old Dominion Seascape Invitational in 2002), Barton played 23 rounds last season and provides valuable experience and wisdom on course setups. A player who can dip into the 60s, Barton has been a leader for the team at CAAs each of the past three seasons, earning all-conference honors each time. He carried a young team on his shoulders last year and, after showing the underclassmen the ropes, is ready to reap the rewards of that investment. An incredibly even-keeled golfer, Barton's scores counted 91.7% of the time in the fall and he is able to mix the ability to go low while playing smartly to avoid mistakes and big numbers.

The emergence of three sophomores has truly solidified W&M's threat at the regional level. **Hunter Watts, Ryan Price** and **Matt Brantingham** all clicked to end the fall, helping the Green and Gold end the season with four-straight top-three finishes. Watts has blossomed in his sophomore campaign, firing a career-low 70 to open the Hoya Invitational and hold the clubhouse lead through most of the first round. Watts, playing in No. 1 position to close the tournament, showed maturity beyond his years under pressure, coming home at level par (72) to claim runner-up honors at the tournament, his best collegiate finish. Watts also led the team at the Big Five Classic by carding a 72 to close the tournament. He rode a hot putter through the fall and also is a great iron player with solid course management. Ryan Price has developed into one of the team's most consistent golfers and has also added the ability to go low. A gritty player, when his ball striking is off he still manages his game, indicated by his scores counting 90% of the time. A strong driver, Price twice hit 73 during the fall, and broke out at last year's Kingsmill/W&M Invitational, where he claimed seventh (73-75). His steady play led to the third-best fall stroke average (75.10), behind only co-captains Pemberton and Barton. Brantingham provides the team with a strong force at the No. 5 position, as, atypical for the five-spot, he possesses the game

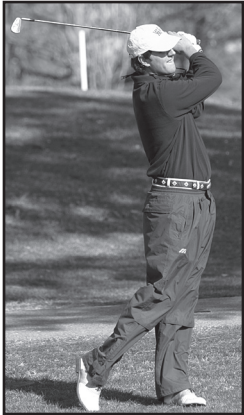
to break into the 60s. He posted strong scores during the summer and aims to reproduce those totals in tournament play, although he has already carded a collegiate career-low of 72 and fired 73 twice during the fall. With a strong short game, he can play more aggressively in the five-spot and help push W&M to the top of the leaderboard.

Three consistent upperclassmen who can be relied upon to come home with solid rounds bolster the Tribe's lineup. Senior **Tom McGinn** shot 72-74 to open the Joe Agee Invitational this fall and also competed at the Navy Invitational where both of his rounds counted towards the team total. With a career high of seventh coming last spring in the Treasure Coast Classic, McGinn can be relied upon to shoot a steady number for the Tribe when called upon. Junior **Jeff Steckmest** is one of the longest hitters on the team and boasts a career-low of 70. Already a strong wedge player, he is working on developing a variety of shots, and with greater imagination in his short game he can chop strokes off his average to break into the 60s. Senior **Robby McKetta** is one of the squad's most physically gifted players whose fall was highlighted with an opening 74 at the Joe Agee Invitational. With a strong game off the tee and a career low of 72, he can be a valuable contributor with greater consistency.

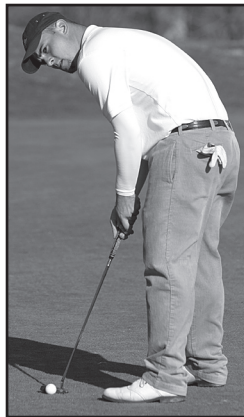
The Tribe welcomes three talented freshmen who have already shown promise in limited competition during the fall. **Joel St. Laurent** started for the squad at the Navy Invitational, shooting 78-79 in his first collegiate tournament with both rounds counting towards the team score. Tested in a wealth of premier amateur tournaments, St. Laurent was the 2003 New Hampshire Junior Am runner-up and advanced to the round of 16 at the state Am. He also just missed qualifying for the U. S. Junior Am, losing in a playoff at sectionals after carding 71-78. Strong off the tee and possessing a good iron game, he should adapt well to the longer layout of college golf. **Jay Sutton** has recorded the lowest round of the fall by the freshmen with a sterling 73 coming in the second round of Joe Agee Invitational. The 2001 Kentucky state championship runner-up, he earned regional player of the year honors in 2001 and boasts numerous all-state and all-region selections. A strong putter with a solid mid-irons game he should be able to shave strokes off his game after learning collegiate golf. **Jonas Miller**, ranked the No. 2 golfer among Texas private schools, was a conference champion as a junior and won twice on the Northern Texas PGA Tour. A veteran of the Future College World Tour, he shot 75 in his first collegiate round at the Joe Agee Invitational. A great scrambler with good iron play, he can avoid big numbers and be a consistent contributor.

This confluence of senior leadership, emerging youth and raw talent has already produced results in one of the finest fall seasons for the Tribe. The squad's first tournament, the Navy Fall Invitational, immediately showcased the potential of the group, with Pemberton firing a even-par 71 to hold the 18-hole lead while Barton carded a 72 to sit just one stroke back. Pemberton went on to claim runner-up honors in the event at 1-over 143, just one stroke shy of the individual medal, while Barton tied for eighth at 145 (+3), three shots back. W&M tied for ninth place as a team, carding totals of 303 and 301 for each round.

More brilliant golf was witnessed at DePaul's John Dallio Memorial where the Tribe shot a tournament-best six-under 282 for round two as Barton, Pemberton, Watts and Price all went low. Through 36 holes, Barton and



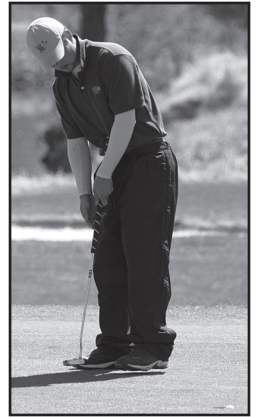

Pemberton were tied for fifth at 4-under 140 as Barton coupled a 68 (-4) in round two with a 72 (E) while Pemberton shot under par in both rounds, combining a second-round 69 (-3) with a 71 (-1) in round one. Watts and Price stepped up for the Tribe as Watts shot level-par 72 in round two with Price carding a 1-over 73 for both rounds, pushing W&M to its low team score of the fall season. Harsh conditions faced golfers in the final round but W&M still moved from fourth to third in the team standings by scoring low in relation to the rest of the field as Barton held on to claim 10th. It would be the start of four-straight top-three showings for the Green and Gold.

Pemberton and Barton were also in contention from the start at the Tribe's inaugural Joe Agee Invitational as the duo shot 36-hole totals of 141 (-3), two back of the lead, in a strong day for the Green and Gold. McGinn shot 146 for two rounds while Watts and Brantingham continued their consistent play with 150 as the College shot a solid 4-over 580 (291-289) to sit only three back from the lead entering the final round. W&M went head-to-head with Rutgers and Towson in what emerged as a three-team race and fell just short of taking the team title as Rutgers won the tournament ahead of the runner-up Tribe. Pemberton scored his second runner-up showing of the season, again missing medalist honors by a single stroke, while Barton claimed sixth. Brantingham closed by firing his low round of the fall, a 73, while McGinn and Watts both tied for 16th. Sutton also impressed by claiming 25th in his first collegiate tournament in an effort punctuated by a strong 1-over 73 in round two.

Penn's Big Five Classic witnessed a breakout performance by Watts, who closed with an even-par 72 to jump into fifth place at the tournament, his first collegiate top-five finish. Pemberton and Barton finished just one stroke behind Watts, tied for sixth, as on the strength of three top-10 finishes the Tribe claimed runner-up honors in the team standings for the second-consecutive tournament.

Watts continued to roll at Georgetown's Hoya Invitational, carding a career-low 2-under 70 in round one to hold the clubhouse lead for much of the day, before ending the day one stroke off the lead. Pemberton also mounted a charge in round one, firing a 73 to sit four shots back. Watts played admirably under the pressure of his first hunt for an individual medal, coming home at level par for a 2-under 142, which for a time, seemed to be the magic number for a playoff as scores continued to roll in with none of the other leaders going low. In the final group of the day, Korey Mahoney of Eastern Michigan closed with a 68 for a four-shot victory, but Watts snared runner-up honors in his best collegiate finish in terms of leaderboard position, total score and relation to par. Pemberton closed with a 72 to claim eighth as he again put himself in consideration for the win by going low on his front nine. All around, the final round saw one of W&M's best team efforts as three Tribe golfers carded even-par 72, and the other two shot 73, for a team total of 289 with a strong 73 being the high score thrown out in the top-four of five tally. Barton completed the trio of College golfers coming home in level par (along with Watts and Pemberton) while Brantingham and sophomore Price tied their best rounds of the fall to close the season, propelling W&M to its fourth-straight top-three finish of the season.

In addition to its three-two-two-three finish in the last four tournaments, the Tribe witnessed 10 individual top-10 performances during the fall, with half of those coming in the squad's final two tournaments, illustrating the momentum W&M created to end the season. Ending the fall season on such a high note, the Tribe should pick up right where it left off for the spring campaign, as it positions itself for the CAA Championship and a possible return to the NCAA Regionals.

Francisco welcomes a decorated incoming class that provides a strong base for the future of the program but which has already been thrown into the fire during the fall. Freshmen **Misha Harvey** and **Erika Oldenkamp** played all five fall tournaments for the Green and Gold and became consistent fixtures in the traveling five. Landing Harvey, the best junior player in Virginia, was a great coup for the program and she responded by firing a 75 in her first collegiate round to tie for a team-leading 10th at the Draper Valley Invitational. Winning the Virginia state title and the Spencer-Wilkinson Award (awarded

by the VSGA to the state's top female golfer) capped a phenomenal high school and junior career that saw Harvey win numerous junior tournaments and shoot 67 in high school play and 69 in junior play. Francisco believes the freshman has all the tools, both physically and mentally, to not only become a great college player, but to find success after college. She's responded to the challenge of travel, as her rounds counted towards the team score 90.9% of the time. Oldenkamp, already one of the best ball-strikers on the team, is a tested player from the junior golf ranks where she learned to excel against fierce competition. She also brings championship credentials, having won a conference title and two sectional titles in high school. Francisco expects Oldenkamp to exploit the long par-4s and short par-5s as the freshman's length will allow her to fire 7-woods and even 5-irons at greens when other players will be striking 3- & 5-woods. An accurate player as well, Oldenkamp saw her rounds count towards the team total 90.9% of the time and ended the fall by carding a 76 in the second round of the Ross Resorts Invitational.

Freshman **Marissa Sprick** traveled to the first two tournaments of the fall with a low of 80. Termed a "sleeper" by Francisco, Sprick could break back into the starting lineup at any moment as she is poised to put it all together for a round. A long player for her size, she also brings a keen mental approach to the game. A golfer who can go low, with a junior tournament best of 73, she carded 78-77 to win 2003 IJGT ChampionsGate tournament. Freshman **Kara Siford** is one of the team's hardest workers and her inquisitive nature, always wanting to learn new shots and techniques, should lead to her contributing in the near future. She found success on the Titleist Junior Tour, winning the 2003 Spotswood Classic and qualifying for the Tour Championship four times in five years. Osbourn High School's first and only female golfer, she played at No. 1 her senior season and was a two-time team MVP. **Jen Jones** is another long player for her size, which will help her adjust to the collegiate game. An accomplished high school golfer, she was a five-time low medalist in her senior season and as a co-captain led her team to a 17-3 record and a sectional championship.

With this combination of pedigreed newcomers combined with the talented veterans, tested at the conference championship, William and Mary should not miss a beat. Under the watchful eye of Francisco, the Tribe will maximize potential and again challenge at the CAA Championship.

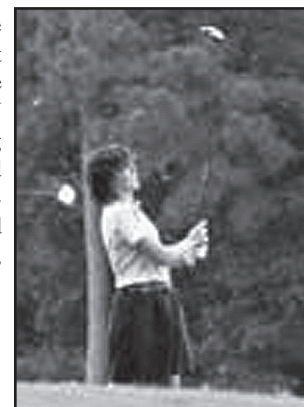

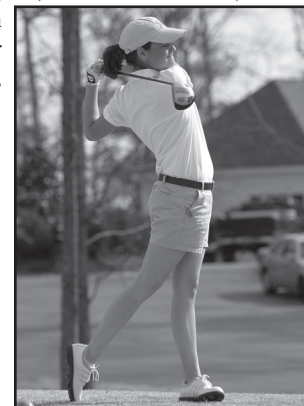

Athletic Administration



Terry Driscoll **Director of Athletics**

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his eighth year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director,

he has overseen the construction of more than \$6 million in facilities, including the new Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 76 CAA Championships coming into the 2003-04 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be

known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 28, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 24, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



Barbara Blosser **Senior Executive Associate AD**

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior executive associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins

(16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition

Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978. In 1993, she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2003-04 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe captured six CAA titles to push its total to a dominant 76, 26 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Tournaments, highlighted by Ramon Jackson's national championship on the parallel bars. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top-100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. Punctuating this run is the College's 58th-place ranking for the 2002-03 campaign, marking the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or second in the

Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. 83% of all athletes earn a degree while a formidable 36 athletes have been selected Academic All-America since 1992.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor, more than any other school. The College continued to set the standard in 2003-04 with another five athletes claiming the honor: Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Otstot (men's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf).

Student-Athlete Support

Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.



Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



W&M At A Glance

The College of William and Mary - The Best Small Public University in the United States

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler. The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

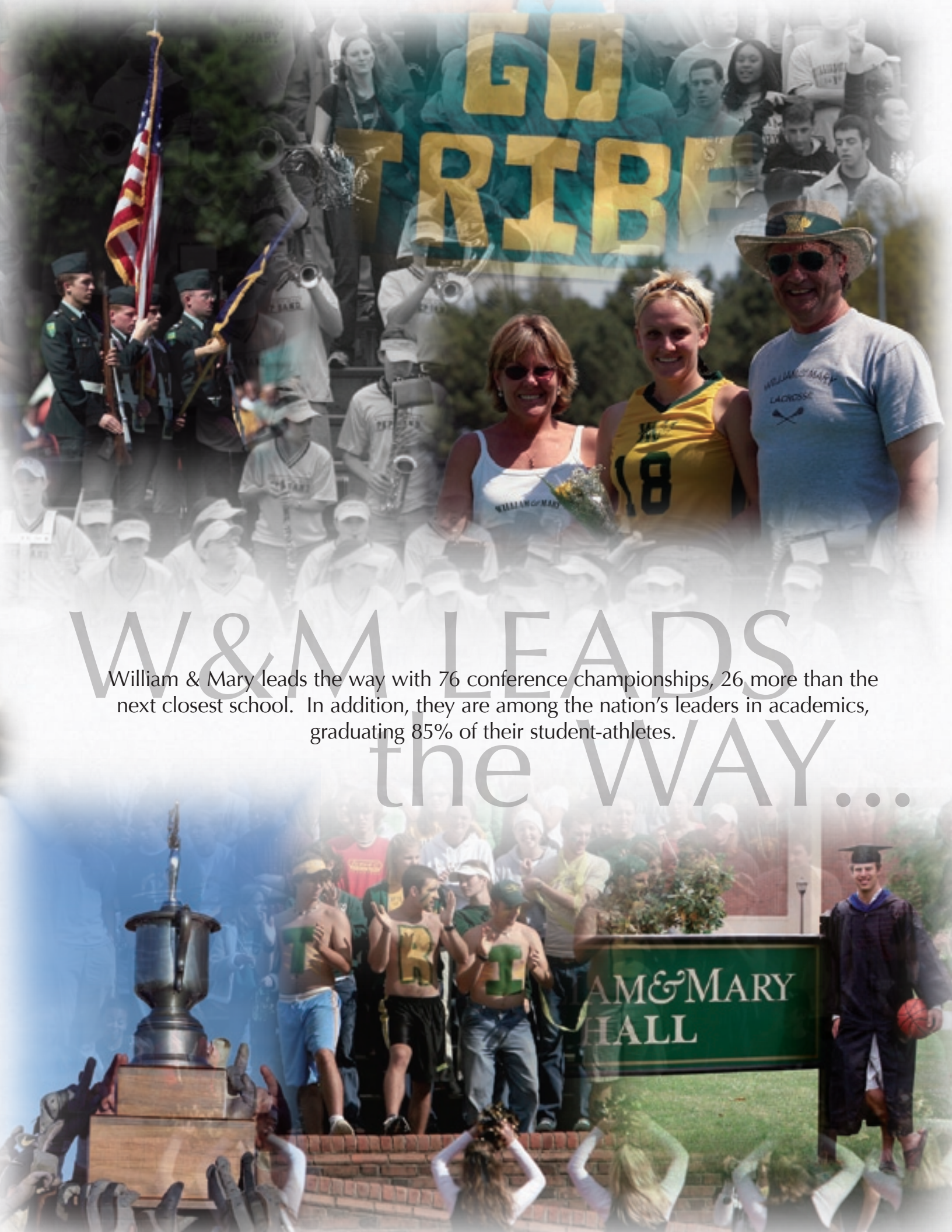
