## Directions to William and Mary

**From the North/West:** Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234A (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until the Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through three stoplights, and continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers). There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. William and Mary Hall will be on your left.

**From the South/East:** Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrop Way. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrop Way while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left.

The Golden Horseshoe is located in the heart of the Colonial district, and offers players a choice of two world-renowned 18-hole courses and one 9-hole course. Robert Trent Jones, Sr. opened the The Gold Course in 1963, calling it "my finest design." His son, Rees Jones, designed and built The Green Course from 1989-91. At right is the iconic 16th hole on the Gold Course, looking from the tee down onto the green.

College golf history has been made on the course as well: only five college golfers have ever shot 60 in a round, and two of those rounds happened at the Golden Horseshoe in 2006-07. One of those performances came courtesy of Michael Schachner of Duke, who set the NCAA Championship record with his second-round 60 (-10) during the 2007 NCAA Division I Men's Championship.

In 2008, the CAA Championships return to the Golden Horseshoe, with the men battling on the par-71 Gold Course, while the women will challenge the Green Course's par-72 layout. The women's championship has never been contested in Williamsburg before, while the men haven't played in the city since the inaugural tournament in 1984.

# Coaches



Jay Albaugh has spent five years at the helm of Tribe Golf, and in 2007-08 has led both the men's and women's teams to seasons that rank among the very best in school history.

In 2006-07, the men's team enjoyed a string of six-consecutive top-five finishes in the fall, and only had two tournament finishes under .500 for the entire year. Doug Hurson suffered no sophomore slump, leading the team with a 74.00 stroke average that at the time placed him fifth all-time in school history. He collected seven top-20 finishes through 10 events, and was named second-team

All-CAA. Brent Paladino had the tournament of the year at the CAA Championships, placing fifth to earn a spot on the all-tournament team.

The women's team in 2006-07 had to find its way with youth in the fall, and was able to use that experience along with the return of Erika Oldenkamp and Marissa Sprick from semesters abroad to forge through the spring and cap the year with a fifth-place finish at the CAA Championships. At the Bobcat Desert Classic, the team had two rounds where every player shot 79 or better, the first two times that had ever happened at W&M.

In 2005-06, Albaugh mentored the women's golf team to a program renaissance. In the fall, the squad won its first team championship since 1992 at its own Tribe Classic, setting a school record for lowest team score in a round with 299 strokes (+11). Senior Sayde Murray captured her first individual medal, and the program's first since 2001, winning the Tribe Classic on the third playoff hole. In the spring, Murray continued her strong play to lead the team and finish fifth at the CAA Championships, and then-sophomore Erika Oldenkamp tied the school record for the lowest round (70, -2) and posted the second-best 36-hole score (147, +3) at the Bonnie Hoover Invitational. For her steady play throughout the season, Oldenkamp named second-team All-CAA.

The men's team had its share of hardships to start the 2005-06 season, but the emergence of a trio of players gave the program a renewed vitality at the end of the spring. Then-junior Matt Brantingham improved his career average from ninth to sixth in the school charts, and qualified for the U.S. Amateur Public Links in the summer. Freshman Doug Hurson led the team in six of 10 tournaments and Brent Paladino led in five of the 10. Hurson had a season-average of 75.04, second on the team and second-best for any freshman in school history. Paladino led the team with an average of 74.64, setting the school record for best freshman average, and tied for the lowest score at the W&M Invitational with 69. In the summer, he qualified for both the U.S. Amateur and the Amateur Public Links, advancing to the third round of match play at the APL.

In his second year, the men's team had a year for the ages, just missing out on a bid to the NCAA Regional. Gary Barton and classmate Tim Pemberton were both named to the all-region team, with Pemberton also earning first-team All-CAA and second-team all-state honors as he set the school record for lowest career average in Tribe history. Barton garnered second-team all-conference and first-team all-state acclaim after leading the team throughout the year, and capped his career by winning the Cavalier Classic in a one-hole playoff, his second individual medal in four years.

As a team, the men captured two tournament titles, an outstanding accomplishment for a squad that was composed primarily of underclassmen. In March the Tribe defended its home course, winning a three-team playoff

to triumph in the W&M Invitational. In April, the College followed Barton's charge to win the Cavalier Classic by a stroke over a 12-team field that included many Atlantic Coast Conference and CAA rivals. In recognition of his accomplishments, Albaugh was named the Men's Coach of the Year by the Virginia Golf Coaches Association.

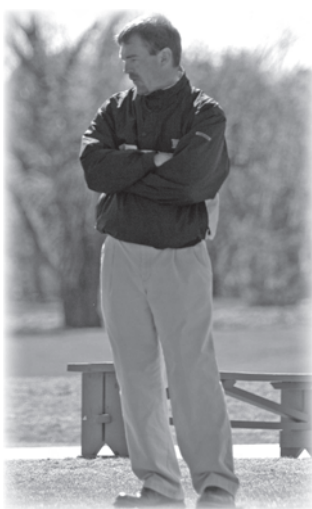
His inaugural campaign in 2003-04 saw 2004 graduate Ann Schnell earn first-team All-Colonial Athletic Association and CAA Women's Golf Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards, and 2005 graduate Gary Barton earn second-team All-CAA and all-state honors.

Albaugh came to the Tribe from Eastern Illinois University where he served as the head coach for both the men's and women's golf teams. In his five years at Eastern Illinois, Albaugh saw both squads achieve their best finishes at the Ohio Valley Conference Championships, including a runner-up result for the women in 2003. Overall, Albaugh coached his teams to four wins during his tenure, which included the women's first win as a program. He also led each team to its lowest stroke average in history.

Previously, Albaugh served three years as the head golf coach at Mount St. Mary's College. While there, he oversaw the creation of the women's golf program and also led the men's team to its best conference finish (fourth).

Albaugh, a 1996 graduate of Mount St. Mary's, was a four-year letterwinner in golf and was named first team All-Northeast Conference his junior and senior seasons. The Mountaineers' number one golfer for three years, Albaugh won the American University Invitational in 1994 and was a two-time selection to the NEC Scholar-Athlete team.

Albaugh has also served as an assistant golf professional for three years and is a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America and the National Golf Coaches Association. Albaugh holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Mount St. Mary's and a master's degree in athletic administration from Eastern Illinois. A member of the NCAA Men's Golf Mid-Atlantic Regional Advisory Committee, Albaugh was married in the summer of 2006 to Leighann Rastede.



## Pete Gyscek

Assistant Coach

Pete Gyscek is in his third season in the collegiate coaching ranks as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs at William and Mary.

A long-time Williamsburg resident, Gyscek is the owner of the Dynamic Golf Studio, a Williamsburg-area teaching center, and the skills he employs have been a large part of the Tribe's success during his tenure with the team.

Gyscek is a Class "A" member of the Professional Golfers Association of America, and has competed as a professional on several mini-tours and in the Mid-Atlantic PGA. He is also an associate member of the National Golf Coaches Association, and is a Certified Golf Instructor as well as being a Master Clubfitter and Equipment Specialist.

Gyscek graduated from Niagara University in 1985 with a bachelor's in business management. A four-year letterwinner as a member of the varsity golf team, he was also captain for three years. He lives in Williamsburg with his wife, Michele, and son, Noah.

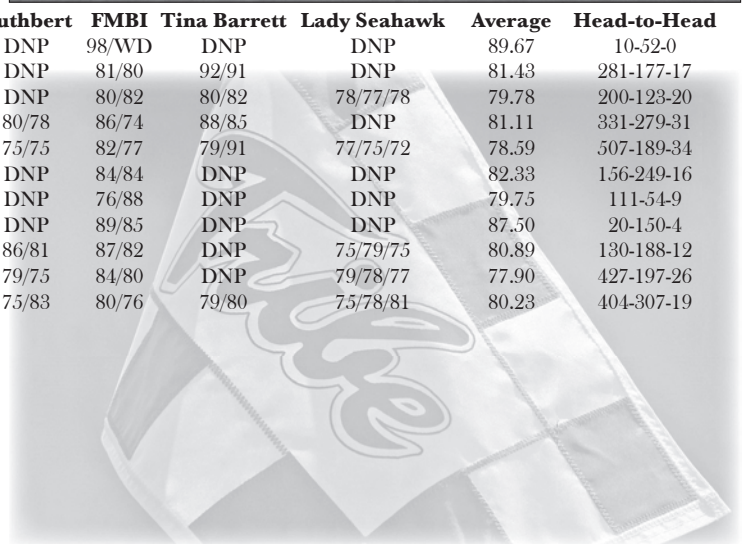

# Women's Outlook

William and Mary coach **Jay Albaugh** has put together an incredibly talented team of golfers in 2007-08, and is poised to make a run at the program's first conference title since 1985 after having one of the best seasons in school history.

## Seniors

**Erika Oldenkamp** has had a career-type year in her senior campaign, establishing herself not only as one of the team's top golfers but also as a serious candidate for all-conference honors. Appearing in every round this season, Oldenkamp will finish the year ranking in the College's all-time top-five in seven single-season categories, including the school record for best 36-hole average against par. She earned five top-20 finishes throughout the regular season, including tying for fifth at the Nittany Lion Invitational and tying for eighth at the Lady Seahawk Invitational, where she became only the sixth golfer in school history to surpass 1,510 career head-to-head wins. Oldenkamp's three-round effort of 224 (+8) at the Lady Seahawk Invitational to close the regular season ranks as the fourth-best score in school history, and is the best 54-hole showing ever in a par-72 tournament.

**Marissa Sprick** has catapulted herself through a strong spring to head into the conference championships as one of the team's hottest players. Appearing in three of the team's four spring tournaments, she has fashioned a stroke average of 80.89 through nine events, fifth-best on the team among players with nine or more rounds and just behind the 80.13 average she recorded in eight rounds last spring as the best season of her career. While 10 rounds are needed to qualify for records purposes, Sprick's average through nine rounds would rank as the 10th-best season ever by a senior at the College. At the Lady Seahawk Invitational, she opened the tournament with a career-low round of 75 (+3), a performance she matched in the third round to finish in a tie for 25th.

**Misha Harvey** opened her senior year with a very strong fall, posting top-20 finishes at the Colonial Intercollegiate and the Spider Invitational and competing in each of the final four events to finish 2007. Always in contention for the travel team, Harvey has proven to be a game competitor on the links with the third-best head-to-head percentage on the team, and the second-best of her career (.609).

While only seeing action as an individual in the College's two home tournaments, **Kara Siford** has made the utmost of her chances, posting a pair of career-best rounds and a top-20 finish. At the Colonial Intercollegiate, she shot 78-77 to finish tied for 20th with second round score tying her career-best to that point. At the First Market Bank Intercollegiate, Siford led every Tribe player in the first round with her 76. A strong possibility to make the College's team for the CAA Championships, Siford carries a season average of 79.75 and a record of 111-54-9 (.664)

## Juniors

A strong and steady reserve for the squad, **Ellie Costello** carded a very respectable 85-86 at the Colonial Intercollegiate and will provide valuable senior leadership to the team next year after paying her dues as a sophomore and junior. Long-time Tribe fans will note a marked similarity of play to former Tribe greats Kim Oviatt and Mary Ellen Fedor when watching Costello on the course, which should only grow stronger with increased appearances on the travel team.

## Sophomores

**Morgan Stepanek** opened the season with a prolonged stretch of hot play, reaching the semester break with what was at that point the best single-season average in school history. Despite a minor adjustment period to start the spring, Stepanek has again been hitting the ball extremely well lately, making her a strong candidate to earn all-conference honors and challenge for the CAA title. At the season-opening Chip-N Invitational, she tied for runner-up honors after closing the tournament with a career-low 71 (E); however, that mark would fall in the team's next round when Stepanek tied the school record with a 2-under 70 to open the Colonial Intercollegiate. Heading into the conference championships, Stepanek stands atop the school record books in nine categories, and is well within striking distance of Tiffany Maurycy's single-season stroke average, which has gone untouched since 1989.

A mainstay for the Tribe as a freshman in 2006-07, **Brielle Paolini** has kept herself in the mix for the travel squad throughout the year, appearing in five tournaments. At the Colonial Intercollegiate, Paolini opened with a career-best 75 (+3) and closed in 79 to tie for 15th, the first top-20 finish of her career. Although she has appeared in only one tournament this spring, she is consistently in the fight during qualifying and possesses the ball-striking ability to place highly at the conference championships.

## Freshmen

This year's senior class showed that good things come in four, and this year's freshman class has proved that adage beyond a shadow of a doubt, providing 54 of the team's 139 rounds, more than any other class.

**Sarah Whitney** is the only golfer besides Oldenkamp to play every round this season, ranking third on the team with an 80.23 stroke average, the fifth-best rookie season in school history. She has been on a tear recently, leading the Tribe at the First Market Bank Intercollegiate in a tie for eighth and at the Tina Barrett Invitational by placing 12th. Eight of her ten rounds in the 70s have come in the last 12 rounds (dating back to the fall's final tournament), including career-low rounds of 75 at the Cuthbert Cup and the Lady Seahawk Invitational.

**Katie Murphy** has also established herself high on the College's depth chart, ap-

pearing in every tournament except the Lady Seahawk Invitational. Her average of 81.11 is fourth on the team and ranks eighth in school history on the freshman lists. Not just consistent throughout the year, Murphy has played well recently, shooting a career-low 74 to lead all 113 golfers on the final day of the First Market Bank Intercollegiate and earn her first top-20 finish, tying for 17th.

Perhaps the hottest member of the class recently has been **Avi Hockfield**, a product of Harrington High School in Pennsylvania. Her only appearance in the fall was at the Colonial Intercollegiate, but she has played in each of the team's last three tournaments. At the Tina Barrett Invitational, she earned her first career top-20 finish, and broke through the 80s barrier at the Lady Seahawk Invitational with rounds of 78-77-78. Though one round short of qualifying for the record books, Hockfield's average of 79.78 through nine rounds would rank her with Lindsey Sims and Ann Schnell as the only freshman golfers in school history to average less than 80 strokes per round in a season.

**Megan Smith** rounds out the talented freshman class with an extremely gifted short game. A three-time MVP at the Westminster Schools in Georgia, Smith is one of only two team members to have shot better than 70 (Misha Harvey is the other) after carding 69 for runner-up honors at the state championships as a senior. This season, Smith has played in both of the Tribe's home tournaments, with a low-round of 85 in the final heat of the First Market Bank Intercollegiate.

## The Schedule

The Tribe heads into the CAA Championships looking to extend what has been one of the most successful seasons in school history. Through nine tournaments-worth of action, this year's team has set school records for the best season-average against par for a single round, for all first rounds all second rounds, all 36-hole scores, and all 54-hole scores. In the one category that the 2007-08 doesn't own the school record, that of third round against par, the team ranks second by only one-quarter of a stroke.

William and Mary also had 26 rounds, 36-hole scores, and 54-hole scores place among the all-time top-10 lists for team efforts, including six school records. The parade started at the Chip-N Invitational in early September, where Morgan Stepanek's second-place showing led the Tribe to finish seventh overall with a score of 930 (+78). That was good for the school record for par-71 tournaments, while the team's third-round of 306 (+22) also set the school record for best par-71 round.

Stepanek led the College in the first home tournament of the year, tying for eighth at the Colonial Intercollegiate with her school-record tying 70 (-2) in the first round. As a team, the Tribe finished sixth. Erika Oldenkamp claimed top billing at the Penn State Invitational, tying for fifth and leading W&M to eighth place at 966 (+102), one of two instances in the fall where the Tribe would finish with that exact score.

At the Spider Invitational in Richmond, William and Mary tied for fifth with 629 (+53) behind Oldenkamp's 12th-place effort. The fall closed at the Ross Resorts Invitational, where the Tribe again shot 966 (+102), this time placing ninth. Stepanek retook the team lead by tying for 14th.

To open the spring, the Green and Gold traveled to Kiawah Island, South Carolina for the inaugural Cuthbert Cup. Although the final round, which would have paired men's and women's teams, was rained out, the College shot a school-record 618 (+42), led by Erika Oldenkamp's twinned 75s which secured her a tie for 17th. At the annual spring tournament at Ford's Colony, now called the First Market Bank Intercollegiate, William and Mary persevered through the first day and carded the second day's best round at 313 (+25) to finish in a tie for sixth out of 20 teams. On that second day, Sarah Whitney began her run at the front of the pack with a tie for eighth made possible by her second-round 76, which was tied for the second-best round of the day. The best round of the day belonged to classmate Katie Murphy, who shot 74 (+2) to leap up the leader board to a tie for 17th.

Wind and rain awaited at the Tina Barrett Invitational, leaving the Tribe seventh at 664 (+88) while Whitney toiled her way to 12th place. Conditions were much improved the next week at the Lady Seahawk Invitational, where school records for 36 holes (613, +37) and 54 holes (915, +51) placed William and Mary ninth and all-but guaranteed a winning season for the seventh time since 1989. Oldenkamp returned to the forefront with her eighth-place 224 (+8), which included an even-par 72 in the third round and set the school record for best 54-hole score in a par-72 tournament. In the first two rounds of the tournament, every Tribe golfer shot 79 or better for only the third and fourth times in school history, joining the 2007 Bobcat Desert Invitational team which also achieved the feat twice. Appearing in both tournaments were Oldenkamp, Stepanek, and Marissa Sprick.

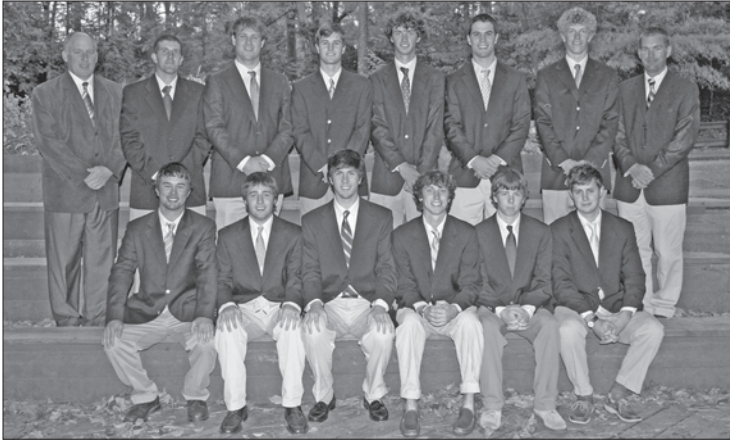

# Men's Outlook

## Seniors

**Jonas Miller** has had the best year of his career as a senior, appearing in more rounds than his first three years combined and ranking among the team leaders in stroke average. He started the year very strongly, tying his then-career-low with a round of 71 at the Mid-Pines Intercollegiate before rattling off three consecutive rounds of 70 (-2) to tie for eighth at the Sea Trail Intercollegiate. His 54-hole score of 6-under (210) tied the school record set only one week before. Since then, Miller has appeared in all but one of the team's tournaments, and is a strong candidate to compete at the conference championships.

**Jimmy Femino** has had his share of ups and downs this season, but is playing his best golf of the year heading into the CAA Championships. At the Marshall Invitational, he shot a career-low 68 (-3) to close the tournament at 7-over, only three shots behind the team leader. At the Sea Trail Intercollegiate, he posted career-best 36-hole and 54-hole scores of four-over while helping the Tribe to school-record team scores in the same categories. In only three years of competition, Femino has ensconced himself among the College's all-time top-20 golfers, one of only seven golfers ever to do so in less than four seasons.

Despite appearing in only one tournament, **Joel St. Laurent** has been one of the Tribe's most consistent contributors in the oft-overlooked practice rounds, where his hard work and effort has both set an example for the rest of the team and pushed them to be better golfers. At the First Market Bank Intercollegiate, he improved across the tournament with rounds of 82-81, and he ranks among the College's all-time 40-best golfers in stroke average.

**Jay Sutton** has been a vocal and inspirational leader for the Green and Gold this year despite being hampered by injuries. As a junior, Sutton appeared in both of William and Mary's home tournaments, shooting a season-best 74 in the second round of the Joe Agee Invitational. As with his classmate St. Laurent, Sutton ranks among the 40 best golfers in school history in stroke average.

## Juniors

**Brent Paladino** has established himself as one of the players to beat in the Colonial Athletic Association, piecing together one of the greatest seasons in school history to enter the conference championships with the best season average in school history by nearly a full stroke (72.27). Within the first three tournaments of the fall, he had shot two of the top eight rounds ever at the College, including his second-round 67 (-5) during the season-opening Mid-Pines Intercollegiate, tied for second all-time. His 36-hole score at that tournament set the school record by three strokes (8-under). He also broke the 54-hole school record at Mid-Pines by three strokes, carding 210 (-6), a feat he nearly matched the following week at the Sea Trail Intercollegiate, shooting 211 (-5), the third-best tournament in school history after Jonas Miller shot 210 at that same event. If Paladino can finish the remainder of the season without shooting worse than 79, he'll become only the third golfer in school history to go an entire season without shooting 80 or higher.

One of the team's two leaders ever since he stepped on campus three years ago, **Doug Hurson** has had a solid season for the Tribe in 2007-08. Playing every round of the year, he ranks second on the team in stroke average (74.88) and led the team at the Hoya Invitational, carding rounds of 73-72-76 (+8) to tie for 19th. His best round of the season came in Williamsburg, when he defied the wind and cold in the second round of the First Market Bank Intercollegiate to shoot 69 (-2).

## Sophomores

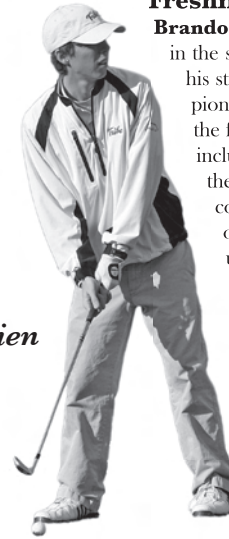
**Conor O'Brien** has stepped into a spot on the travel squad in his second year with the Tribe, consistently ranking among the team's top-three golfers while playing every round of the season. His 75.71 stroke average this season has sent him shooting up the career charts, and he ranks sixth heading into the CAA Championships. His career-best round of 70 (-2) came at the Sea Trail Intercollegiate, and he was the travel team's top finisher in a tie for 25th at the First Market Bank Intercollegiate (second overall for W&M).

**Andy Roach** has continued to improve in his second year with the Tribe, and will challenge for appearances with the travel squad next season. As a freshman, he opened his career with two rounds of 80 at the Joe Agee Invitational, career-lows to this point. Coach Albaugh is confident in his ability to contribute, though, as he was a *Wash-*

*ington Post* All-Met selection in high school and is a strong competitor each week in qualifying.

## Freshmen

**Brandon Parker** has come on very strong for the Tribe in the second half of the season, and looks to continue his streak with a strong effort at the conference championships. After appearing in only one tournament in the fall, Parker has played every round of the spring, including leading the Tribe with a top-five finish at the First Market Bank Intercollegiate. Out playing cold and blustery conditions, he shot 72-71 (+1) on the River Course to tie for fifth. He continued to play well at Marshall, tying for second on the team, and his stroke average of 77.25 ranks among the Tribe's all-time top-10 for freshmen.



Conor O'Brien

**Scott Saal** joined the Tribe in the fall after a stellar career at Cape Henry Collegiate, and has proven a valuable contributor in practice who will still have four years of eligibility remaining after redshirting this season. Deadly on the greens, Saal was a four-time all-conference performer and four-time MVP for Cape Henry, and earned conference Player of the Year honors as a junior. He also won

the 2005 Virginia State Junior Championships. As a senior, he carried a 70.1 stroke average, and his career-low round was a very-impressive 63 (-7) at Broad Bay Country Club.

## The Schedule

William and Mary had one of the best seasons in school history, in terms of stroke averages and round and tournament scores. The 2007-08 squad ranked among the top four in school history (dating back to 1969-70) in every season average category, and placed three team rounds, two 36 hole scores, and two 54-hole scores among the all-time top-10 lists.

At the Mid-Pines Intercollegiate, the team shot 581 (+5) through two rounds and 880 (+16) for all three rounds, both scores that ranked among the top-five performances in school history, and finished ninth in the field. Brent Paladino shot a school-record 136 (-8) through two rounds and a record-low 210 (-6) for the entire tournament to lead the Tribe, placing fifth.

The low scores continued at the Sea Trail Intercollegiate, as every round ran among the College's all-time top-10, and the team broke school records for best round (282, -6, second), best 36-hole score (570, -6), and best 54 hole score (856, -8) en route to a fourth-place finish. Senior Jonas Miller shot 70 (-2) in every round, tying the school record for 54 holes set the week before and finishing tied for eighth.

At the Belmont Invitational, Paladino had the second of his team-leading for top-10 finishes with his 2-over (218) as the team finished tenth at 42-over (906). The Tribe shot 42-over again at the Georgetown Hoya Invitational (894 raw score) for fifth place, as Doug Hurson tied for 19th after rounds of 73-72-76 (8-over). W&M finished the fall at the Landfall Tradition, placing 12th behind Paladino's eighth-place 217 (+1).

The spring opened in Texas with the Rice Intercollegiate, with the College shooting 901 (+37) for ninth place. Paladino again led the team, tying for 18th at 7-over (223). Paladino was the Tribe's top golfer for the third straight tournament at the rain-shortened Cuthbert Cup, leading the team to a 10th-place finish while shooting 74-69 to finish tied for sixth individually.

Youth was the order of the day at the First Market Bank Intercollegiate, as freshman Brandon Parker shot 72-71 on the famed River Course at Kingsmill and tied for fifth while playing as an individual. Conor O'Brien was the top golfer for the travel squad, tying for 25th with paired rounds of 74, and led the team to finish 13th.

William and Mary got back to building momentum at the Marshall Invitational, withstanding a 24-hour rain delay to finish seventh at 13-over (581) in the two-round event. Every golfer finished within four shots of each other, led by Brent Paladino's four-over (72-74) effort, but highlighted by Jimmy Femino's second round 68 (-3).

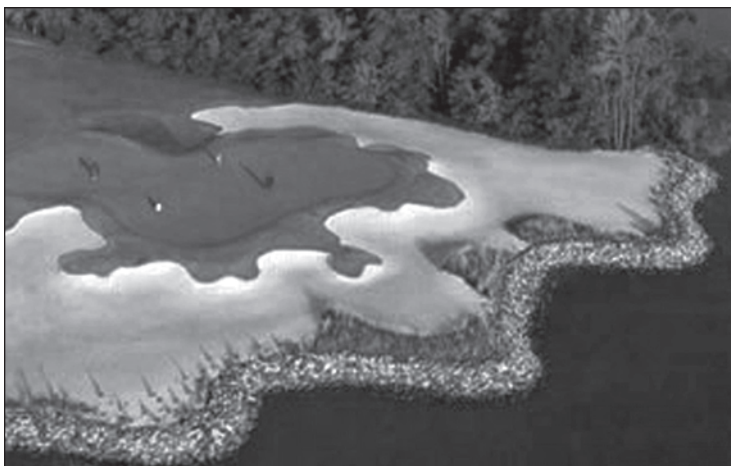

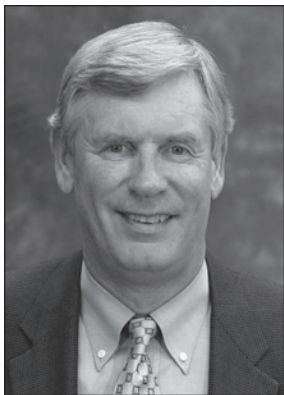

# Administration



**TERRY DRISCOLL**  
**ATHLETICS DIRECTOR**

Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 12th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that William and Mary President Gene Nichol proclaimed "The nation's gold standard" when it came to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last four years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 19 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Swimming and Women's Tennis). In 2004-05, the Tribe captured five CAA championships and an Atlantic 10 Football title. As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no team in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 88 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has twice posted a 100 percent graduation rate, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 22 individuals receive the honor.

Despite the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). The total increased significantly when Driscoll announced plans to build the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium, which is scheduled to open in time for the 2008 season. This impressive structure follows closely on the heels of the installation of a \$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006) and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006) inside the stadium. Yet another significant upgrade will be unveiled inside the venerable structure for 2007, as the department will install an \$800,000-plus brand new video scoreboard by the season opener.

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associ-

ates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



**BARB BLOSSER**  
**SENIOR EXECUTIVE**  
**ASSOCIATE AD/SWA**

Few names in the William and Mary Athletics Department are as familiar, or respected, as that of Senior Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser. Since first arriving on campus in 1978, Blosser has touched the lives of thousands of Tribe student-athletes.

She has held her current title since April of 2004, after spending the previous 12 years as the associate athletics director. In each role, Blosser has served as an integral part of nearly every facet of the department's daily operations.

Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a then school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the assistant to the associate athletics director. Over the past 17 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.



# TRIBE ATHLETICS



## ATHLETIC SUCCESS

The 2006-07 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 88.

The men's cross country squad won its seventh consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fourth straight. The women's swimming team won its first CAA Championship, while the women's tennis team added its 19th all-time CAA crown in the spring.

Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic reached the title match of the NCAA Doubles Championship, earning All-America honors. Katie Radloff became the first female swimmer to advance to the NCAA's since 1983. Additionally, Keith Bechtol raced to a 14th-place finish in the 10,000m, while Bonnie Meekins placed 16th in the heptathlon at the NCAA Track and Field Championships.

## ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities.

This year, the NCAA honored 13 W&M teams as recipients of its public recognition award. The Tribe teams recognized are baseball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Additionally, in the latest NCAA graduation rate reports, three Tribe teams posted 100% graduation rates, including football, women's basketball and women's cross country/track.

Since 1992, 39 student-athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including three in the past academic year. Keith Bechtol (men's track) was a First-Team selection, Ryan Overdevest (men's soccer) was a Second-Team selection and Anna Young (women's soccer) was a Third-Team selection.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 22 winners. Bechtol was the CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in both cross country and track and field, bringing his career award total to five. Meghan Bishop (women's cross country) earned her fourth CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year award in the fall in cross country.

In addition, four of W&M's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.

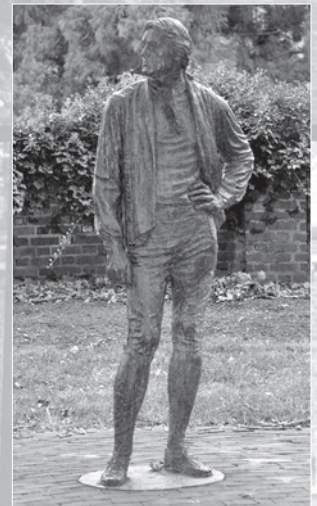
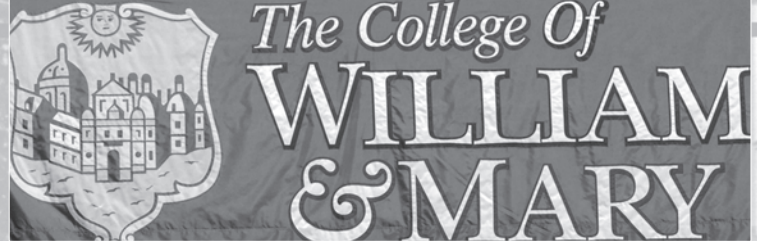
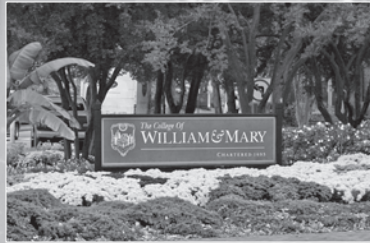
For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).

- The retention rate for freshmen who entered in the fall of 2005 was 95%.

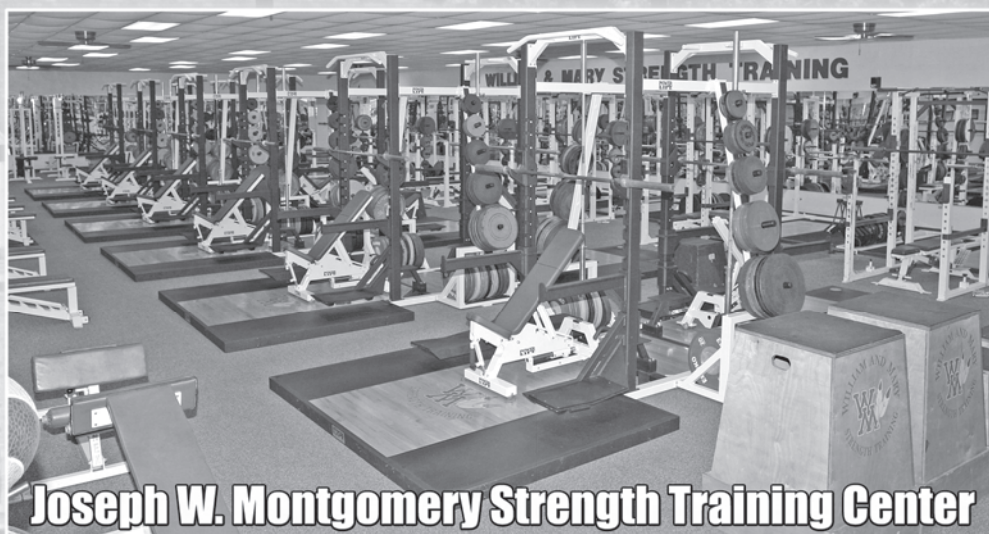




## Athletics Department Goals

### Sports Psychology

Deidre Connelly, Ph.D., is the College's full-time sport psychologist. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

### Compliance, Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to ensure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

### Speed, Strength, Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

### Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

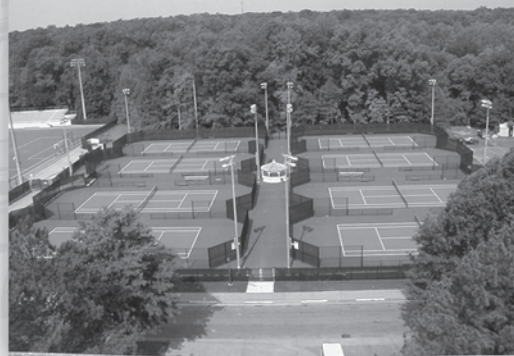
