Directions to William and Mary

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234A (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until the Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through three stoplights, and continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers). There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. William and Mary Hall will be on your left.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrop Way. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrop Way while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left.

The Golden Horseshoe is located in the heart of the Colonial district, and offers players a choice of two world-renowned 18-hole courses and one 9-hole course. Robert Trent Jones, Sr. opened the The Gold Course in 1963, calling it "my finest design." His son, Rees Jones, designed and built The Green Course from 1989-91. At left is the iconic 16th hole on the Gold Course, looking from the tee down onto the green.

College golf history has been made on the course as well: only five college golfers have ever shot 60 in a round, and two of those rounds happened at the Golden Horseshoe in 2006-07. One of those performances came courtesy of Michael Schachner of Duke, who set the NCAA Championship record with his second-round 60 (-10) during the 2007 NCAA Division I Men's Championship.

In 2008, the CAA Championships returned to the Golden Horseshoe, with the men battling on the par-71 Gold Course, while the women challenged the Green Course's par-72 layout. W&M's women took third place behind senior Erica Oldenkamp's ninth-place 226 (+10), and the men's team finished fourth as Brent Paladino earned runner-up honors.

Jay Albaugh

Director of Golf

In his sixth season at the helm of Tribe Golf, Jay Albaugh looks to lead the 2008-09 men's and women's teams to heights unparalleled in the history of the program.

In 2007-08, the men's team season was highlighted by its fourth-place finish at the CAA Championship. Junior Brent Paladino led the Tribe during the season,

claiming 12 school records over the course of the year. His season culminated with a runner-up finish at the CAA Championship with a school record-tying three-day total of 207 (-6). His second-place finish is the best finish at the conference championship since John McHenry in 1986. Freshman Brandon Parker took great strides over the course of the season for the Tribe. He was named CAA Men's Golf co-Player of the week on March 26 after carding a 143 (+1) at the William and Mary home tournament at Kingsmill. His rounds of 72 and 71 were both new collegiate-lows for the rookie.

The 2007-08 women's team played solidly all season, but saved its best golf for the last two tournaments of the year. At the Lady Seahawk Invitational, all five Tribe golfers shot in the 70's for two consecutive rounds, highlighted by senior Erika Oldenkamp's school-record 54-hole total of 224 (+8) that earned her a tie for eighth. At the CAA Championship, the Tribe shot a school-record 299 (+11) in the final round to cement its third-place finish. The team also set the school-record for a 54-hole tournament, carding 914 strokes (+50) as Oldenkamp finished ninth with a three-day total of 226 (+10). On an individual note, sophomore Morgan Stepanek was named to the All-CAA second team for her outstanding play during the season, which included the second-best season scoring average in school history of 77.90.

In 2006-07, the men's team enjoyed a string of six-consecutive top-five finishes in the fall, and only had two tournament finishes under .500 for the entire year. Doug Hurson suffered no sophomore slump, leading the team with a 74.00 stroke average that at the time placed him fifth all-time in school history. He collected seven top-20 finishes through 10 events, and was named second-team All-CAA. Brent Paladino had the tournament of the year at the CAA Championships, placing fifth to earn a spot on the all-tournament team.

The women's team in 2006-07 had to find its way with youth in the fall, and was able to use that experience along with the return of Erika Oldenkamp and Marissa Sprick from semesters abroad to forge through the spring and cap the year with a fifth-place finish at the CAA Championships. At the Bobcat Desert Classic, the team had two rounds where every player shot 79 or better, the first two times that had ever happened at W&M.

In 2005-06, Albaugh mentored the women's golf team to a program renaissance. In the fall, the squad won its first team championship since 1992 at its own Tribe Classic, setting a school record for lowest team score in a round with 299 strokes (+11). Senior Sayde Murray captured her first individual medal, and the program's first since 2001, winning the Tribe Classic on the third playoff hole. In the spring, Murray continued her strong play to lead the team and finish fifth at the CAA Championships, and then-sophomore Erika Oldenkamp tied the school record for the lowest round (70, -2) and posted the second-best 36-hole score (147, +3) at the Bonnie Hoover Invitational. For her steady play throughout the season, Oldenkamp named second-team All-CAA.

The men's team had its share of hardships to start the 2005-06 season, but the emergence of a trio of players gave the program a renewed vitality at the end of the spring. Then-junior Matt Brantingham improved his career average from ninth to sixth in the school charts, and qualified for the U.S. Amateur Public Links in the summer. Freshman Doug Hurson led the team in six of 10 tournaments and Brent Paladino led in five of the 10. Hurson had a season-average of 75.04, second on the team and second-best for any freshman in school history. Paladino led the team with an average of 74.64, setting the school record for best freshman average, and tied for the lowest score at the W&M Invitational with 69. In the summer, he qualified for both the U.S. Amateur and the Amateur Public Links, advancing to the third round of match play at the APL.

In his second year, the men's team had a year for the ages, just missing out on a bid to the NCAA Regional. Gary Barton and classmate Tim Pemberton were both named

to the all-region team, with Pemberton also earning first-team All-CAA and second-team all-state honors as he set the school record for lowest career average in Tribe history. Barton garnered second-team all-conference and first-team all-state acclaim after leading the team throughout the year. He capped his career by winning the Cavalier Classic in a one-hole playoff, his second individual medal in four years.

As a team, the men captured two tournament titles, an outstanding accomplishment for a squad that was composed primarily of underclassmen. In March the Tribe defended its home course, winning a three-team playoff to triumph in the W&M Invitational. In April, the College followed Barton's charge to win the Cavalier Classic by a stroke over a 12-team field that included many Atlantic Coast Conference and CAA rivals. In recognition of his accomplishments, Albaugh was named the Men's Coach of the Year by the Virginia Golf Coaches Association.

His inaugural campaign in 2003-04 saw 2004 graduate Ann Schnell earn first-team All-CAA and CAA Women's Golf Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards, and 2005 graduate Gary Barton earn second-team All-CAA and all-state honors.

Albaugh came to the Tribe from Eastern Illinois University where he served as the head coach for both the men's and women's golf teams. In his five years at Eastern Illinois, Albaugh saw both squads achieve their best finishes at the Ohio Valley Conference Championships, including a runner-up result for the women in 2003. Overall, Albaugh coached his teams to four wins during his tenure, which included the women's first win as a program. He also led each team to its lowest stroke average in history.

Previously, Albaugh served three years as the head golf coach at Mount St. Mary's College. While there, he oversaw the creation of the women's golf program and also led the men's team to its best conference finish (fourth).

Albaugh, a 1996 graduate of Mount St. Mary's, was a four-year letterwinner in golf and was named first team All-Northeast Conference his junior and senior seasons. The Mountaineers' number one golfer for three years, Albaugh won the American University Invitational in 1994 and was a two-time selection to the NEC Scholar-Athlete team.

Active on the national level within his profession, Albaugh is a member of the NCAA Mid-Atlantic Regional Advisory Committee, and currently serves as the CAA representative to the Golf Coaches Association of America Congress. He is also a member of the National Golf Coaches Association. Albaugh holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Mount St. Mary's and a master's degree in athletic administration from Eastern Illinois. He lives in Richmond with his wife, Leighann.



Pete Gyscek

Assistant Coach

Pete Gyscek is in his fourth season in the collegiate coaching ranks as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs at William and Mary.

A long-time Williamsburg resident, Gyscek is the owner of the Dynamic Golf Studio, a Williamsburg-area teaching center, and the skills he employs have been a large part of the Tribe's success during his

tenure with the team.

Gyscek is a Class "A" member of the Professional Golfers Association of America, and has competed as a professional on several mini-tours and in the Mid-Atlantic PGA. He is also an associate member of the National Golf Coaches Association, and is a Certified Golf Instructor as well as being a Master Clubfitter and Equipment Specialist.

Gyscek graduated from Niagara University in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in business management. A four-year letterwinner as a member of the varsity golf team, he was also captain for three years. He lives in Williamsburg with his wife, Michele, and son, Noah.

2007-08 TEAM REVIEWS



Coming off the best team performance in the school's history, the women's golf team looks to improve on its third-place finish at the CAA Championships and break the school's 18 and 54-hole records that were set at the conference championship last season.

Leading the Tribe this season will be junior **Morgan Stepanek** and sophomore **Sarah Whitney**. Both Stepanek and Whitney had great showings at the CAA Championships, tying for 10th with scores of 229 (+10).

Stepanek, an All-CAA second-team selection, led the Tribe at the season-opening Chip-N Invitational with a personal-best score in each round, shooting 75-74-71 to earn runner-up honors. At the College's fall home tournament she tied the school record with her first round 70 (-2), and finished the year with the second-lowest average in school history (77.70).

Whitney had a great rookie campaign, playing in every round of the season and ranking third on the team in scoring average with a 79.76. Whitney used the momentum from her fantastic season and qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur during the summer, becoming the first Tribe golfer to qualify as an undergraduate.

Two sophomores who always work hard and have the potential to lower their scores this year are **Avi Hockfield** and **Katie Murphy**. Hockfield came on strong at the end of the year, playing in the team's final three regular-season tournaments, and earned the first top-20 finish of her career at the Tina Barrett Invitational. Murphy, who played all but one tournament in her rookie campaign, shot a 235 (+19) at the CAA Championship to tie for 18th place.

Senior **Ellie Costello** looks to crack the travel squad this year and provide veteran leadership, while junior **Brielle Paolini** looks to build on a solid sophomore season that saw her finish in a tie for 15th at the Colonial Intercollegiate. Sophomore **Megan Smith** looks to improve and contribute this year after shooting a collegiate-best 85 last season at the Tribe's home tournament in the spring.

The Tribe will also have four freshmen this season that will look to make immediate contributions. **Caroline Sweet** was the 2008 Maryland Women's Amateur champion, the state high school champion, and was named the *Washington Post* All-Met Golfer of the Year for both boys and girls in the spring of 2008. **Kristine Rohrbaugh** was the Richmond City Amateur Champion last year and also the medalist at the VGCA Amateur. **Kelsey Conway** is a two-time Tri-Valley League Individual Champion in California, while **Kristen Hamel** finished in the top-15 of the Missouri state meet on three separate occasions.

Schedule

During the 2008-09 fall season, the William and Mary Tribe women's golf team saw both individual and team school records broken.

The Tribe started off the fall season with a record-breaking performance in its first tournament of the year, winning the Nittany Lion Invitational by 12 strokes over host Penn State en route to claiming its first team victory since 2005. Stepanek and Sweet led the Tribe effort, finishing in a tie for third with scores of 225 (+9).

With its performance, numerous new entries were written into the school's record book. The Green and Gold finished the tournament with a team total of 909 (+45), which shattered the previous school-record for 54-holes by 13 strokes, after setting the school-record for 36-holes (602 +26) the previous day. Stepanek became the first woman to ever break 70 in the history of the College with her first-round score of 69 (-3). Stepanek, along with Sweet, then tied the school-record for best 54-hole total on a par-72 course with their scores of 225 (+9). This performance came only a day after Stepanek set the school record for 36-holes with her total of 144 (E).

In its second tournament of the year, the Green and Gold battled through tough, soggy conditions to place fourth at the Yale Intercollegiate. Stepanek paced the Tribe, finishing in a tie for fourth after carding a 73 (+2) in the shortened 18-hole tournament.

In the third tournament of the fall season, Hamel shot a school-record tying 69 (-3) in the final round of the ECAC Championship, propelling her up the leader board to finish in fourth place. The host Tribe finished in seventh place with a score of 642 (+66).

At the Spider Invitational, the fourth tournament of the season, the Tribe ended the 36-hole event in sixth place, firing a team-total of 618 (+42). Whitney led the way for the Tribe, earning her second top-10 of the season by finishing in a tie for sixth with a score of 150 (+6). Finishing in a tie for 13th was Stepanek, who carded a 152 (+8).

The Tribe concluded its fall season at the Lady Pirate Intercollegiate. The Green and Gold shot its best team-round of the tournament, a 308 (+24), to end the 54-hole event in 10th place with a score of 930 (+78).

The spring season gets underway for the Tribe on February 22-24 in Kiawah Island, South Carolina as it competes in the Kiawah Island Invitational. The team will then travel to Dublin, Ireland and spend the week of March 7-14 playing various courses and seeing the sights Ireland has to offer.

The Tribe returns home to host its second tournament of the season, the First Market Bank Intercollegiate, at Ford's Colony Country Club on March 21-22 in Williamsburg. The team's regular season ends with the Hoya Invitational on March 31-April 1 in Beallsville, Maryland.

The CAA Championships will be on April 17-19 in Pine Mountain, Georgia at the Callaway Gardens Resort, where the women's team will look to improve on last season's third-place finish.

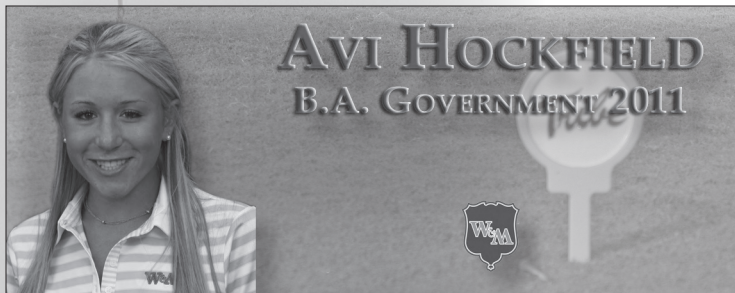

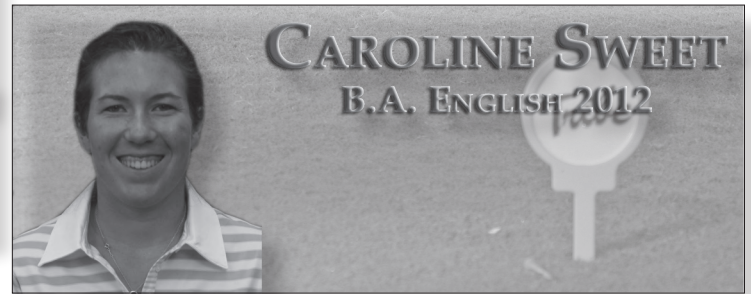

After finishing fourth at the CAA Championships last season, the men's golf team, headed by Director of Golf **Jay Albaugh**, look to surprise many observers and crack the national Top 100 rankings this season.

Senior **Brent Paladino**, who looks to capture his first CAA crown, will lead the Tribe into the spring season. Paladino had a great spring, highlighted by his runner-up finish at the conference tournament. His three-round total of 207 (-6) tied the school record for 54 holes that he set in the season's first tournament, and his second-round effort of 65 (-6) tied the 28-year old school record set by Billy Musto. Paladino was rewarded for his great year by being named to the 2008 PING/GCAA All-Mid Atlantic Region team, All-CAA first-team, and all-state first-team by the Virginia Golf Coaches' Association. Paladino's season average of 71.88 ranks first all-time at the College, and he enters his senior year atop the career average listing (73.82).

Looking to close out his career on a high note is **Doug Hurson**. Hurson looks to fulfill the potential he has long shown at the College and improve on a year that saw him shoot a 69 in the final round of the CAA Championships that moved him up 14 spots to finish in a tie for 13th place. In 2006-07, Hurson led the team with a 74.00 average and was named all-region and second-team All-CAA.

Junior **Conor O'Brien** and sophomore **Brandon Parker** hope to continue helping the Tribe by posting consistently low scores. O'Brien played in every round last year for the College and had a nice showing at the CAA Championship, carding a score of 226 (+13) that earned him a tie for 27th. Big things are expected of Parker in his second year after advancing to sectional qualifying this summer for the U.S. Open. Parker also played well at the conference tournament, finishing in a tie for 36th place.

Junior **Andy Roach** looks to have a solid season and compete for a spot on the travel team after playing in one tournament last year, while redshirt freshman **Scott Saal** looks to be at full strength after sitting out last season with an injury. Saal, a U.S. Amateur qualifier this summer, looks to make an immediate impact on the team, as he brings four years of eligibility into the spring season.

The Tribe will also have two freshmen this year who will look to contribute. **David Zhang** comes to the college as a three-time all-state honoree from Connecticut. Zhang won his high school conference championship last season and also won the Northwestern Mutual Financial Network-AJGA Blumberg Group Junior Classic in 2008. **Jason Chun** was named all-state twice while leading Cox High School to back-to-back Virginia AAA state championships, and was a Future Collegiate World Tour All-American in 2007.

Schedule

During the fall season, the William and Mary Tribe men's golf team saw two players earn their first collegiate victories and will have a great deal of momentum heading into the spring season in February.

The William and Mary men's golf team got its season underway in

Cambridge, Maryland at the Maryland Intercollegiate. Paladino paced the Tribe, finishing in a tie for 24th after carding a 144 (+2). The Tribe finished 14th out of the 18 participating squads after shooting a cumulative score of 595 (+27).

Not since the UVA Cavalier Classic in 2005 had a member of the Tribe men's golf team earned medalist honors, but Paladino changed all that at the Raines Development Intercollegiate, firing back-to-back rounds of 66 (-6) to vault up the leaderboard and capture his first collegiate victory. Behind strong overall play, the Tribe vaulted from 10th position after the first round to third place behind a school-record second round of 281 (-7). Paladino's 54-hole total of 202 (-14) was not only a CC of South Carolina course record, but it also shattered the previous school record by eight strokes. The senior also tied the school record for 18-hole total (66, -6) and the record for 36-hole total (136, -8).

At the third tournament of the year, the Hartford Invitational, the Tribe finished ninth behind the strong play of Paladino and Chun. Paladino led the Tribe, carding a 144 (E) to finish in a tie for ninth place. Chun also played well for the Green and Gold, shooting consecutive rounds of 73 to finish in a tie for 17th with a total of 146 (+2).

At the Big Five Invitational, the Green and Gold shot a final-round team score of 289 (+5) to rocket up the leader board and finish in third place with a total score of 589 (+21). Paladino led the Tribe's effort with his 146 (+4), finishing the tournament in a tie for ninth. Classmate Parker shot a final-round 70 (-1) to end the tournament with a total of 147 (+5) and finish in 11th place.

At the Georgetown Intercollegiate, Hurson notched his first collegiate victory, carding a 143 (+1) to earn medalist honors. The Tribe finished second in the team standings with a score of 595 (+27). Hurson became the second Tribe golfer to earn his first collegiate victory this season. Hurson fired a second-round 73 (+2) to overcome the one-stroke deficit he had after the first round.

The Tribe finished up its fall season at The Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, North Carolina, finishing in a tie for seventh with a score of 917 (+53). Hurson paced the Tribe at the tournament, carding a three-day total of 223 (+7), including a final-round 71 (-1), to place in eighth.

The team's spring season gets underway on February 16 and 17 in Houston, Texas with the Rice Intercollegiate at the Westwood Country Club. The Tribe then travels to Crestview, Florida to compete in the Troy Invitational that takes place from February 28 to March 1.

The Tribe will then return home to Williamsburg to host its only event of the season, the First Market Bank Intercollegiate at the Kingsmill Resort, March 23-24. After their home event, the Tribe will wrap up the regular season in Huntington, West Virginia on April 3-4 at the Marshall Invitational.

The CAA Championships will be held on April 17-19 in Pine Mountain, Georgia at the Callaway Gardens Resort, where the men's team will look to improve on last season's fourth-place finish.

A SUCCESSFUL BALANCE

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

• The 2007-08 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 92. W&M also had eight different programs represented at the NCAA Championship level in some capacity.

• The men's cross country squad won its eighth consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fifth straight. The women's track and field team won its seventh CAA Championship in the last eight years, while the women's tennis team added its 20th all-time CAA crown in the 23-year history of the league during the spring.

• In total, W&M had five conference players of the year, five conference scholar-athletes of the year, 18 All-Americans and 100 athletes earned all-conference honors in their respective sports during the 2007-08 season.

• Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic garnered All-America honors by advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. Moulton-Levy also became the first Tribe athlete and only the fourth in CAA history to win conference player of the year honors for a fourth time. Katie Radloff, who garnered CAA Swimmer of the Year and Swimmer of the Championships honors for the second straight season, earned a spot in the NCAA Swimming Championships for the second time in as many years. Christo Laundry earned All-America honors for the third time in cross country and also won the CAA Individual Championship. Women's soccer player Claire Zimmeck garnered CAA Player of the Year honors for the second straight season and was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy. Additionally, Emily Anderson earned All-America honors with a fifth-place finish in the 1,500m, marking the best Tribe finish in 14 years.

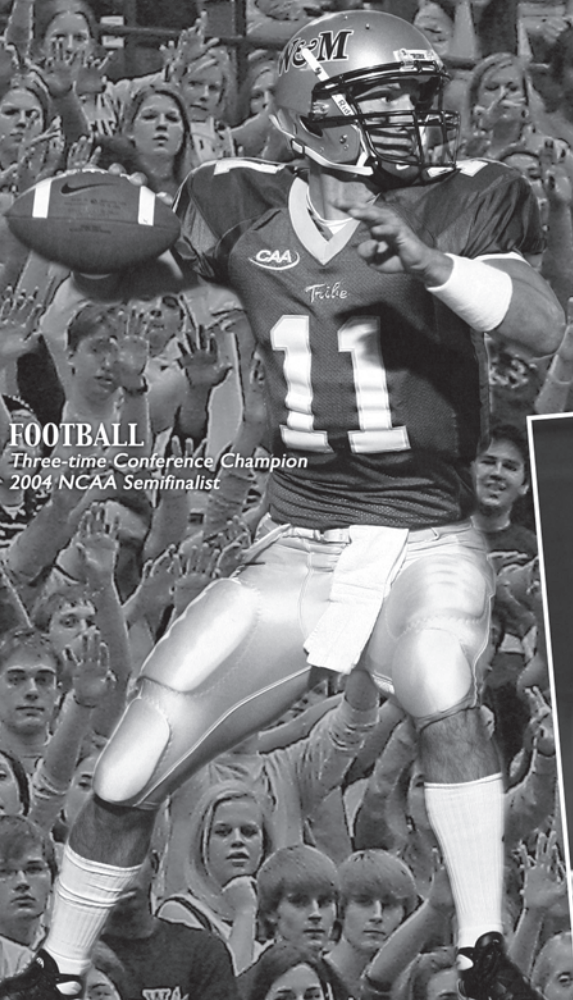

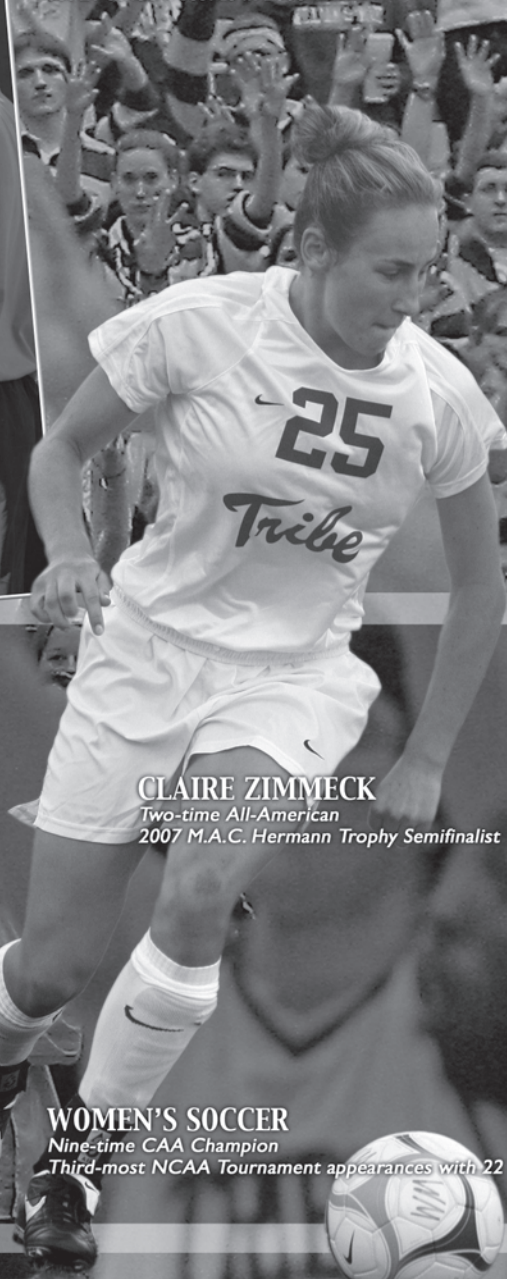

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any athletic scholarship-granting school and of any public school, among the Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in 2005.

- In a recent NCAA survey on graduation rates, William and Mary athletic teams set the standard for academic excellence – 13 teams graduated 100 percent of their players. The overall graduation rate for our athletes is 96 percent (higher than 86 percent for the entire student body).

- There have been 45 student athletes elected to Phi Beta Kappa in the past ten years. Four Rhodes Scholars were W&M student-athletes

- The College's Athletics Department showed a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 86 percent among its student-athletes who entered school on athletics scholarships in the 2000-01 athletics year in data released by the NCAA in 2007.

- The national average among all Division I schools was 63 percent. W&M is tops in both the CAA and among all Division I Virginia schools.

- In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 25 winners in the six-year history of the award.

THE COLLEGE OF WILLIAM AND MARY

The College of William and Mary is a public university located in Williamsburg, Va. Founded in 1693 by Royal Charter issued by King William III and Queen Mary II of England, William and Mary is the second oldest college in the country after Harvard. William and Mary has a long history of liberal arts education and a growing research and science curriculum that demonstrates a strong commitment to undergraduate research. The College, which became a state university in 1906, has been designated a "Public Ivy," and for nine straight years has been ranked by U.S. News & World Report as sixth-best public university in the country – and the nation's top small public university.

Also referred to as "the alma mater of a nation," the College has educated four U.S. Presidents – George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, which is the third most of any college in the country. William and Mary also claims several firsts, including the 1776 creation of Phi Beta Kappa – the country's first academic honor society – the first honor code of conduct for college students, and the first collegiate law school, established in 1779. William and Mary is also home to the Sir Christopher Wren Building – the country's oldest academic building still in use – and the President's House, the oldest home of a university president still in use.

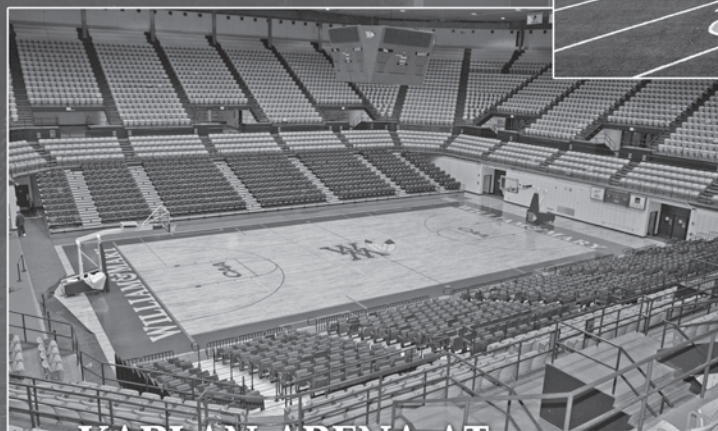
- In addition to four U.S. Presidents, William and Mary has educated a number of this country's key historical figures, including U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Marshall and 16 signers of the Declaration of Independence.
- More recent famous alumni from William and Mary include U.S. Secretary of Defense Robert Gates ('65), the late David Brown ('78) (astronaut on the Columbia Shuttle), actress Glenn Close ('74), comedian John Stewart ('84), fashion designer Perry Ellis ('61), actor Patton Oswalt ('91), the late Mark McCormack ('51) (founder of sports and celebrity agency IMG), actress Linda Lavin ('59), NASCAR and Gibbs Racing's J.D. Gibbs ('91), Minnesota Vikings star Darren Sharper ('97), and Pittsburgh Steelers Head Coach Mike Tomlin ('95).
- In 2008, William and Mary recognized as 5th-highest producer of Peace Corps volunteers among mid-sized schools (5,000-15,000 students). As of January 2008, 51 W&M alumni are serving. Since the Peace Corps' inception, 499 W&M alumni have volunteered with the Corps, making the university the 82nd-highest producer of volunteers of all time.
- For 2007-2008, the College had more Fulbright Scholars than any other college of university in Virginia, and it had the highest application-to-award rate among nation's top research institutions. In 2006-2007, 12 William and Mary students were named Fulbright Scholars. Eleven received the honor in 2007-08 and scholars are studying in countries such as Argentina, Hungary, Uganda, Sweden, Senegal, and Ecuador.
- In 2008, U.S. News ranked William and Mary sixth among all public colleges and universities and 33rd out of all universities – both public and private. The William & Mary Law School ranked tied for 30th in 2008 by U.S. News. The Mason School Business ranked 40th in nation (2008) by Financial Times and 71st in the world. William and Mary ranked 4th-best bargain in higher education by Kiplinger's in 2008. Newsweek magazine named W&M "hottest small state university" in 2006.
- In 2008, W&M received a record number of applications for undergraduate admission for the 3rd year in a row. More than 11,500 undergraduate applications were received.
- According to a recent survey, William and Mary students contribute 323,000 hours of community service per year. Seventy-five percent of undergraduates and 50 percent of graduate students report they volunteered during their time at the College. Ninety percent of undergraduates report they will volunteer in the community they reside in following graduation.

TRIBE FACILITIES

William and Mary is committed to building and maintaining outstanding facilities for all 21 of its varsity athletic teams. The College has demonstrated this commitment by investing approximately \$16 million toward the construction and upgrade of its athletics facilities during just the last five years. Among W&M's recent projects was the construction of the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center, which was dedicated this past June. In recent years, the College has hosted NCAA tournament events for football and women's tennis, while a number of other W&M programs have hosted conference championships at Tribe venues.

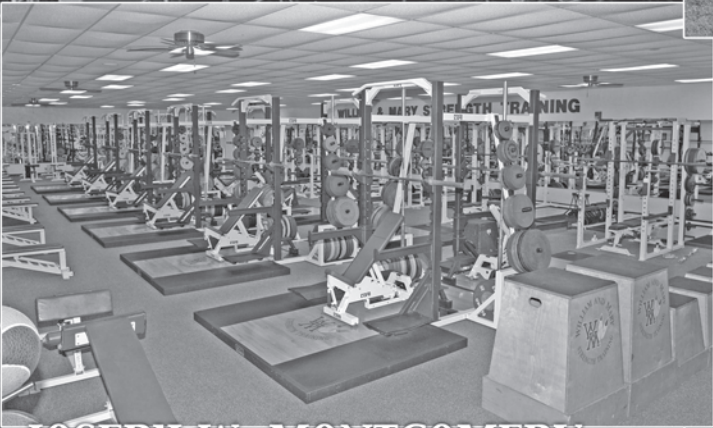

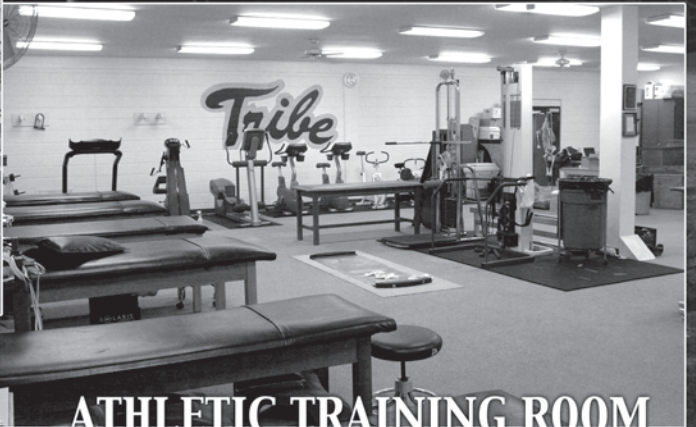

TERRY DRISCOLL

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 13th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that is committed to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last five years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 23 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Track & Field, and Women's Tennis). As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no institution in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 92 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has posted a 100 percent graduation rate three times, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 26 individuals receive the honor.

In addition to the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse), and the Busch Courts (tennis). Most recently, the College dedicated a new \$11 million, 30,000 square-foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium in the summer of 2008. During the last three years, the venerable stadium has been enhanced with an \$800,000-plus video scoreboard (2007), the installation of a

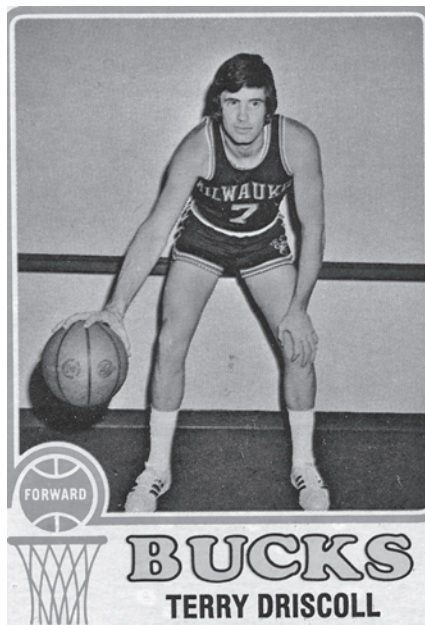
\$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006), and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006).

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fund-raising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in

the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets, and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then



coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the venue executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organize the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.
