This is William and Mary Soccer

Thirty-eight years ago, soccer was in its first year at William and Mary. It was for men only and the Tribe did not experience many winning moments. Times have changed. In 1967, the team's third year of existence, and first as a varsity sport, W&M defeated George Washington, 2-1, for the first victory in school history. That win was the first of more than 400 to come for a school that was destined to be a hotbed of soccer.

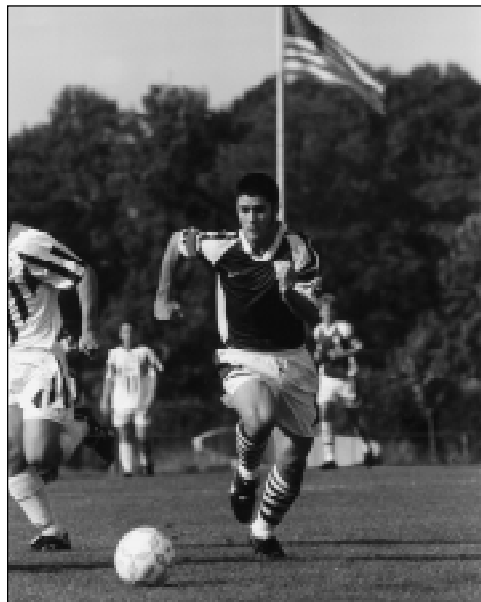
The groundwork was laid in the early 1970s when Al Albert, a 1969 graduate of the College, returned to his alma mater to teach and coach soccer. The program began to take off in 1975, Albert's fifth year at the helm. That season the Tribe went 9-4-1, beginning the current streak of 28 consecutive winning seasons, the fifth-longest streak in NCAA Division I history. Just one year later, in 1976, the Tribe won 10 matches for the first time, a feat which has been repeated for the past 27 years. Albert is the true dean of William and Mary soccer with 392 of the school's 414 all-time wins coming under his direction.

Wins alone do not give a school national prominence. That came in 1980 when W&M advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Since then, the Tribe has gone to 11 more NCAA tournaments, including seven trips in the last eight seasons (1995-2000 and 2002) as well as in 1992 and 1993. W&M won the ECAC-South title in 1983; the CAA tournament in 1995, 1996, 1999 and 2000 and the CAA regular season crown in 1987, 1992, 1995, 1996 and 2002, when it tied Virginia Commonwealth for first place in the league.

This year W&M's soccer programs will take another step forward with the construction of a new grass facility, Albert-Daly Field. Initiated with a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop, the new field will be crucial in improving the Tribe's chances to host top-quality teams and NCAA Tournaments in Williamsburg. Despite the tremendous success of Tribe soccer, the men have been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site. However, that will change with the beginning of play at Albert-Daly Field this season.

Besides having strong team records, many W&M individuals have been standouts on the pitch. Seven players have been named All-Americans, 11 have inter-

national playing experience with various national teams, and numerous others have received conference, state and regional honors. In the summer of 1994, goalkeeper Paul Grafer started for the U.S. Olympic team on its tour of Chile. In 1997 W&M alum Wade Barrett played with the U.S. under-20 team. All-American goalkeeper Adin Brown is the latest name to join this group, playing on the U.S. under-23 squad and with the U.S. Olympic Team.

The William and Mary women's soccer program has enjoyed a similar ascent to the upper echelon of the sport. Starting as a varsity sport in 1981 under original head coach John Charles and continuing under current head coach John Daly, the women's team has enjoyed winning seasons in all 22 years and has played in the NCAA tournament 18 of the past 19 seasons.

The women's team has also enjoyed its share of individual honors. Eleven Tribe players have been named All-America in the last 15 years. The women's team also has a history of sending players to various national teams. Former W&M All-America and National Player of the Year Megan McCarthy was a member of the national team, which is the current world champion. Eight years ago, Natalie Neaton earned the distinction of ISAA National Player of the

Year.

What makes William and Mary unique in the soccer world is its combination of top-notch collegiate soccer and a variety of soccer-related activities throughout the year.

Traditionally, in September the year kicks off with the Tribe Soccer Classic, which features the W&M men's team and a regional rival facing off against top competition from around the country. Virginia, Duke, North Carolina, Davidson, Boston University, Rutgers and Portland are all traditionally strong teams that have come to Williamsburg for this early season tourney. In the 19 years of the Classic, the Tribe has won the title 10 times and has finished second seven times. The Classic will be resumed in 2003 for the opening of the new home for Tribe soccer, Albert-Daly Field.

The women's team also plays host to a nationally competitive schedule that offers an excellent chance for local fans to see some of the best women's teams in the country.

The spring finds the Busch Field turf occupied by teams of seven. W&M hosts a seven-a-side tournament for both college men's and women's teams in early April. The tournaments give top teams from around the region the opportunity to gauge their progress in spring practice against top-notch competition. Collegiate players are not the only ones enjoying the turf in the spring. In late April, a seven-a-side tournament for men's and co-ed teams draws many participants from Tidewater, Richmond and Washington, D.C.

In the summer, the fields of William and Mary are filled by thousands of youngsters taking part in the Tidewater Soccer Camp and John Daly's Soccer Camp. The camps are run by the William and Mary head coaches and the counselors are mainly current and former W&M players.

Soccer is not just a seasonal event in Williamsburg, it is a year-long tradition. Both the men's and women's teams receive strong support from the student body and the residents of the Tidewater area, and these fans are rewarded with a great product.

The success enjoyed by Tribe student-athletes and the high-level of community involvement in the soccer program combine to make William and Mary a truly unique place in the soccer world.

Head Coach Al Albert



Al Albert
William and Mary (1969)
33rd Season

For more than three decades, Al Albert's name has been synonymous with William and Mary soccer. Now entering his 33rd year as the Tribe's head coach, Albert also played for the Green and Gold before graduating from W&M in 1969, making him a part of 36 of the College's 37 varsity seasons.

During his time at W&M, he has led the team to six Colonial Athletic Association championships, 12 NCAA Tournament appearances, and a stunning 28 consecutive winning seasons, tied for the fourth-longest active streak in Division I men's soccer. Albert's career record stands at 392-181-60 (.667), tying him for the third-most wins among all active Division I coaches and tied for the seventh-most victories in Division I history. He needs



just eight more wins to become one of fewer than 10 Division I men's soccer coaches ever to have reached the 400-victory plateau.

Last season, Albert led W&M to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament for the sixth time, as the Tribe defeated Duke and Virginia on the road in the first two rounds of the postseason, before losing in overtime at Penn State in the third round. The College's postseason run capped off an impressive 2002 campaign, which saw the Tribe end the year ranked 16th in the nation with a record of 15-8-1.

For his efforts, Albert was honored as the NSCAA South Atlantic Region Coach of the Year for the third time in his career, having also won the award in 1992 and 1998. Also a three-time Virginia Coach of the Year (1992, 1994 and 1996), he has been named the CAA's Coach of the Year a league-record four times (1987, 1992, 1994 and 1996).

Albert solidified the Tribe's position as one of the top men's soccer programs in the nation in the 1990s, a decade in which W&M advanced to seven NCAA Tournaments, while ranking eighth in the country in wins (149) and 13th in winning percentage (.708). The Tribe's most successful season came during that stretch, when in 1996 the team advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament, falling in overtime to eventual national champions St. John's. The College ended that season ranked fourth in the nation, setting school records for wins in a season with a 20-3-1 mark, and for best conference record, as the Tribe went 8-0-0 in CAA matches before winning its second-straight league title.

Along with W&M's six CAA championships (1983, 1987, 1995, 1996, 1999 and 2000), Albert also led the team to the Southern Conference title in 1976. The College was named state champions in 1978, 1979 and in 1980, when the Green and Gold won a regional title.

Albert also has a reputation for being a strong developer of individual talent, having coached seven All-Americans and four players drafted by Major League Soccer teams. Goalkeeper Adin Brown became the highest drafted Tribe player in any sport, when the Colorado Rapids picked him third overall in the 2000 draft. Making a name for himself as one of the top keepers in America, in 2002 Brown led the New England Revolution to the MLS championship game. Last season Wade Barrett was one of three finalists for MLS Defender of the Year and played in the 2002 MLS All-Star game, before moving to Denmark, where he currently plays for AGF Aarhus of the Danish First Division. Other Tribe players with MLS experience include current NY-NJ MetroStars teammates Steve Jolley and Paul Grafer. All told, 18 players coached by Albert have gone on to play professional soccer.

Albert's soccer success carries over into the Williamsburg community, where, in addi-

tion to his collegiate coaching, he serves as director of the highly successful Tidewater Soccer Camp and the Williamsburg Soccer Club. On the international level, Albert served as head coach for the United States soccer team in the Maccabiah Games, or "Jewish Olympics," in 1985 and in 1981, when his team won a silver medal. Albert is also a veteran of many international soccer tours, including trips to Belgium, Bermuda, England, France, Greece, Holland, Israel, Jamaica and Wales.

The Baltimore native laid the groundwork for his career as a student-athlete for the Tribe, playing goalkeeper and fullback for the team during its transition from club level to varsity status. Also a talented lacrosse player, he first used fall soccer as training for spring lacrosse, but before he earned his sociology degree in 1969, he had decided to pursue a career in soccer.

After a year of teaching, Albert, who holds a NSCAA Premier Diploma and an "A" USSF full badge from the Football Association of England, returned to campus as a lacrosse and soccer assistant and physical education instructor. He was named the Tribe's head coach prior to the 1971 season, and in 1977, he began to concentrate solely on soccer.

Al and his wife, Gail, reside in Williamsburg and are the parents of a daughter, Allison, and a son, Graham, who is a currently a senior and all-conference starting midfielder for the Tribe.

Assistant Coaches



Chris Norris
William and Mary (1995)

Chris Norris enters his ninth season as an assistant coach and his 13th with the Tribe soccer program.

Norris joined the Tribe soccer staff in 1995 after a solid playing career at the College. He made the transition from the field to the sideline successfully eight falls ago and has played a major role in helping Al Albert develop one of the premier soccer programs in America.

A captain his senior year, Norris was the team's defensive leader, earning All-South Atlantic honors. He was a two-time All-CAA performer and was also selected to the VaSID All-State squad in 1994. The team's Most Valuable Player as a junior,

Norris received the Coaches' Award in 1992 and earned W&M Rookie of the Year honors in 1991. Norris also earned the team's Freshman Academic Achievement Award in 1991 and graduated from the College with a degree in kinesiology.

Prior to his return to William and Mary, Norris served as junior varsity boys' soccer coach at Lafayette High School in Williamsburg. Along with his coaching duties for the Tribe, Norris is involved in coaching with the Williamsburg Soccer Club. Norris also serves as the co-director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp and is the director of the Williamsburg Summer Soccer League.



Chuck Connelly
Old Dominion (2000)

Starting his fourth season on Al Albert's staff is Chuck Connelly. He will work primarily with the Tribe's goalkeepers.

Connelly graduated in 2000 from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia, where he was the team's starting goalkeeper as a junior and senior. While at ODU he recorded a career 1.5 goals against average with 17 shutouts and was regarded as one of the top goalkeepers in the conference. In 1999 he started all 19 matches for ODU and his 0.79 GAA was tops in the league and 17th in the nation.

He earned second team All-CAA honors as a senior for the Monarchs.

A native of Rockville, Maryland, Connelly has coached at numerous camps along the East Coast. He currently coaches a youth traveling team for the Williamsburg Soccer Club and assists the Virginia ODP Program. He also serves as assistant director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp and the Williamsburg Summer Soccer League.

Connelly's younger brother, John, is a goalkeeper on the Old Dominion soccer team.



Tom Duffy
Le Moyne (1965)

Starting his fifth season with the Tribe's staff is Tom Duffy.

Prior to helping with the coaching duties at William and Mary, Duffy spent six seasons on the staff at Hartwick.

A 1965 graduate of Le Moyne College, Duffy played and coached soccer in England after completing his undergraduate work. Duffy's first coaching experience was with the Royal Air Force Upper Heyford team for three years.

Duffy also spent four seasons as the head coach at Oneonta State in New York where he compiled a 39-33-3 record. He coached at Oneonta High School from 1972 to 1987, putting together a 226-71-25 mark and sent over 60 of his players on to play at the collegiate level.

Duffy was also involved with New York's Empire State Games where he coached three Central Region teams, claiming one silver and two bronze medals. He also served for four years as the soccer chairman for the Games. In 2001 Duffy was selected to the New York State Section IV Hall of Fame for his years of service at the high school level.

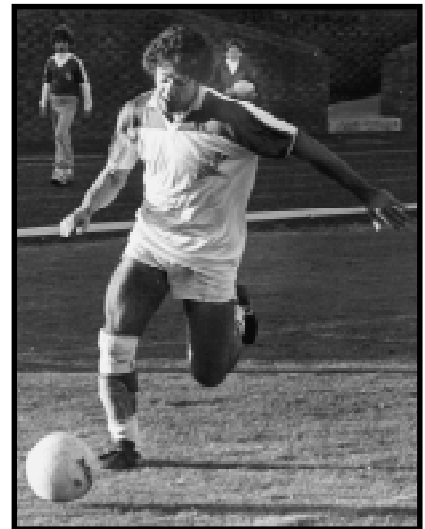

2003 Outlook

In 2002 the William and Mary men's soccer team further established itself as one of the top programs in the nation, defeating Duke and Virginia on the road to advance to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament and ending the year ranked 16th in the nation. Four players earned all-conference accolades and the team had three representatives each on the all-state and all-region teams. The team's top two scorers last year, Ralph Bean and Carlos Garcia, ended their senior seasons honored by all three organizations.

After last year's outstanding season, the team enters the 2003 campaign preparing to face a number of changes. Most obvious will be the new home of W&M soccer, Albert-Daly Field. Both the men's and women's soccer teams (as well as the women's lacrosse program) will begin play this fall on the new grass facility, which has immediately paid dividends in improving the caliber of opponents that will be visiting Williamsburg this year.

Another area of change will be the number of new faces on the team this season, as 12 of the 25 players on the preseason roster have never seen a minute of collegiate action. On a positive note, the team brings back seven starters, giving most of the freshmen a chance to gradually adjust to the college game. However, among the list of newcomers are all four of W&M's goalkeepers, requiring the team to start a freshman in goal for the first time since 1996.

One thing that will not change, and hasn't for more than 30 years, will be the presence of head coach **Al Albert**. The team's leader since 1971, he enters his 33rd season at W&M with 392 career victories, tied for the seventh-most in Division I history, and just eight away from his 400th career win.

Forwards

Projected to start at the two forward positions are junior **Brannon Thomas** and sophomore **Patrick Scherder**. In his fourth year overall at W&M, Thomas received a medical redshirt last year when a knee injury ended his season after playing in just three games. The tallest member of the team at 6-4, he is a versatile player with good possession skills, who can present himself as a big target for his teammates. One of the fastest players on the team, Scherder will complement Thomas' abilities on the front line. A tough, hard-working player, Scherder was the only true freshman to play for W&M last season, scoring one goal in 17 matches. He followed up his solid rookie campaign with a very impressive spring and is poised for a standout year in 2003.

Also expected to enter into the mix at forward will be sophomore **Andreas Nydal**, who is not expected to be available until midseason due to a spring ACL injury. Nydal was a spark off the bench last season, scoring eight goals, the third-highest total on the team. Three true

freshman forwards will add depth at the position next season: **Brendan McCurdy**, **Ryan Sells** and **Jarrett Thomas**.

Midfielders

A pair of all-conference players in seniors **Graham Albert** and **Phil Hucles** will anchor the middle of the field for W&M. The two will pair up at the center midfield spots, with Hucles taking an attacking role and Albert holding more of a defensive position behind him. Both have the ability to break down the opposing defenses, using a combination of Hucles' speed and Albert's runs forward and heading ability.

Last year Hucles began the season as a starting midfielder, but was moved to the back

early on to help solidify the defense, leading the team to a 0.98 goals against average and eight shutouts in the final 20 matches. Despite his defensive role, he still proved to be a valuable offensive threat, finishing fourth on the team with five goals, while also adding an assist. Already he has moved into W&M's career top-10 lists in points (70) and game-winning goals (nine).

Albert finished fifth on the team last year with 10 points on four goals and two assists. Included in that total was one of the team's biggest scores of the season, when he recorded the game-tying goal with less than nine minutes left in regulation, in the College's shootout win at Virginia in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Expected to start at left midfield, sophomore **Clayton Voss** came on strong at the end of the 2002 season, scoring the first goal of his career in the Colonial Athletic Association championship game. Another tall player who is good in the air, he also has the speed to get behind opposing defenses. Battling for the starting nod on the right side of the midfield

will be juniors **Brian Hinkle** and **Andrew Terry**, both of whom have significant experience. A pair of freshman midfielders will join the team this year, in **Ryan Overdevest** and **Chris Rodd**.

Backs

The back line will feature three players who started nearly every game last season, led by seniors **Alex Brown** and **Kris Feldmann**. The pair have been fixtures in the lineup throughout their careers, and give the Tribe two of the better defenders in the league. Junior **Colin Young** was a full-time starter last year, and also started the final two games of his rookie season after recovering from an injury earlier that year. Those three will likely be joined by redshirt freshman **Jeff Marklin**, who had a terrific spring training season that solidified his spot in the lineup.

Already a very strong group, Coach Albert may decide to move Hucles, who still may be the best defender on the team, to the back line in certain situations. Coming off the bench at the position will be senior **Lucas Salcedo** and sophomore **Craig Myers**, while incoming freshmen **John Lee** and **Michael Yakovac** also have the potential for game action.

Goalkeepers

Without a doubt, the biggest question mark of this season will be at the very back of the field, as the Tribe enters the year with four goalkeepers who have never played a minute of college soccer. Two redshirt freshmen, **Kris Rake** and **Stephen Hughes**, sat out last year and are the front-runners for the starting position. Rake is a fearless player with a great work ethic who currently is the favorite to start, although Hughes, who is also a very good shot stopper, could easily be the one in goal for the Tribe this fall. **Scott Kelsey**, who practiced with the team last year as a freshman, was asked to return and could see some time, while rookie **Brennan Wergley**, who was a very good keeper on one of the top high school teams in Northern Virginia, will likely redshirt this season if he isn't starting.

Schedule

Despite last year's schedule being ranked as one of the 15 toughest in the nation, this season will be no easier, as the Tribe will again face a number of the top teams in the nation. One of the benefits of Albert-Daly Field is the ability to attract some of those opponents to W&M's campus. This season the College will play traditional national powers St. John's, Wake Forest and Rutgers in Williamsburg and will travel to face Virginia and Duke on the road, locations where the Tribe won postseason matches last year. The CAA continues to improve, with Old Dominion and 2002 league champion Virginia Commonwealth joining W&M in last season's NCAA Tournament.

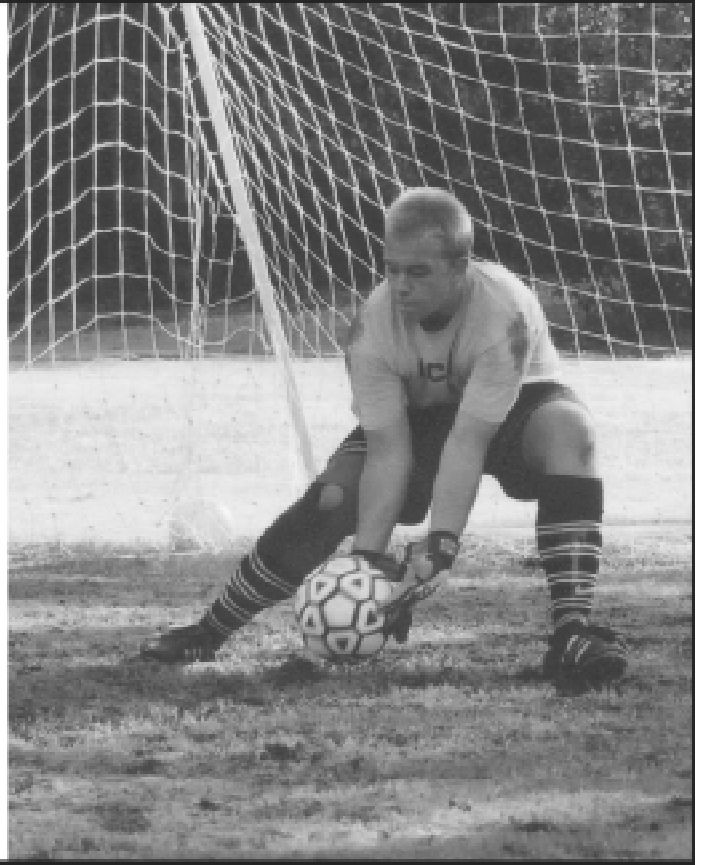

TIDEWATER SOCCER CAMP

For the last 30 years, William and Mary's head men's soccer coach Al Albert has conducted the Tidewater Soccer Camp. Designed for boy's ages 7-18, the week-long sessions are based on the principle of one ball for one boy. Campers receive technical instruction in small groups and have the chance to practice the skills immediately in competitive scrimmages and in league play. The aim of the camp is to develop in each camper not only skill, but an understanding and love for the game of soccer.

All phases of soccer are covered in the camp with an emphasis placed on the development of skill and technique and an understanding of the game. The camp has ample facilities and all instructors are certified USSF & FA coaches or similarly qualified individuals.



All fields used in the program are on the campus of the College of William and Mary. The signature facility is Busch Soccer Stadium, a lighted astroturf field which holds 2,271 fans and is the former home of the W&M men's soccer team.

In addition to this camp, a special high school camp is offered at the Christchurch School. This advanced camp is limited to 120 high school players who are coached by college head coaches and top assistants.

There are also younger and older team camps in which teams are coached in training sessions in the mornings and play matches in the afternoon and evenings.

As an example of the popularity of the Tidewater Soccer Camps, Tribe alums Wade Barrett and Steve Jolley were campers as youngsters.

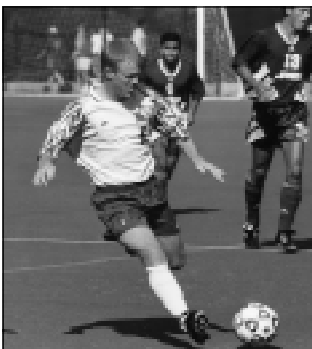

Former Tribe midfielder Wade Barrett was the 12th selection in the first round of the 1998 MLS Draft by the San Jose Clash (now the Earthquakes). After a successful four-year stint in the MLS, Barrett recently moved to Denmark, where he now plays for AGF

Aarhus of the Danish First Division. Last season he became the first W&M men's soccer player to receive a cap for an international team when he played for the United States National Team. Barrett is a 1997 All-American and CAA Player of the Year, and was the second player in league history to be a four-time first team All-CAA selection.

Adin Brown

Goalkeeper
New England Revolution

Selected with the third overall pick by the Colorado Rapids in the 2000 MLS SuperDraft, Adin Brown became the highest draft pick ever from William and Mary in any sport. He is the third William and Mary soccer player, joining Steve Jolley and Wade Barrett, to be a first round MLS draft pick. A three-time All-American for the Tribe, Brown holds almost every goalkeeping record in W&M history. This summer he became the second W&M player to compete with the U.S. National Team, when he was selected to the American team that competed for the Gold Cup. He was also a member of the U23 National Team and was a member of the 2000 U.S. Olympic Team until an injury forced him to miss the trip to Sydney. Brown was traded in the 2001 season to Tampa Bay and signed with the New England Revolution on Jan. 15, 2002. In 2002 he finished fifth in the MLS with a 1.23 GAA and he recorded four postseason shutouts as he led the Revolution to the 2002 MLS Finals.



Paul Grafer

Goalkeeper
NY-NJ MetroStars

Originally a second round pick by Colorado in 1995, Paul Grafer is one of two former Tribe players with the MetroStars, joining his W&M teammate Steve Jolley on the MLS team in 2001. After playing with Colorado in 1997 and 1998, he saw action in five games in 2001 with the MetroStars, including starting the team's three playoff games in which he had a 1.61 GAA. Through June of 2003, he had compiled a 2.93 career GAA with 86 saves in MLS games. Grafer was an All-American in 1995 as well as being a three-time All-CAA selection. He is third on the all-time list at William and Mary with a 0.96 career goals against average.



Steve Jolley

Midfielder
NY-NJ MetroStars

When his name was called by the Los Angeles Galaxy, Steve Jolley became the first W&M alum to be selected in the first round of any major sports draft. The first-round pick at number nine, Jolley completed his Tribe soccer career ranked fourth on the all-time scoring list with 109 points. A starter for the Galaxy, Jolley was making a strong case for the league's Rookie of the Year Award in 1997 until a knee injury ended his season prematurely. He was traded to the MetroStars during to the 2000 season. In 2001 he started and played every minute of every game, including the postseason, just the second player to accomplish that feat in franchise history. That season he was selected to his first MLS All-Star game and four times was named to the Soccer America Team of the Week. Through June of 2003, he has played in 157 games in his six-year professional career, accumulating eight goals and 10 assists. Last season he was named the U.S. Soccer Foundation Humanitarian of the Year.

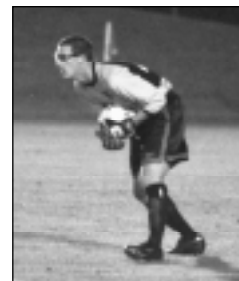

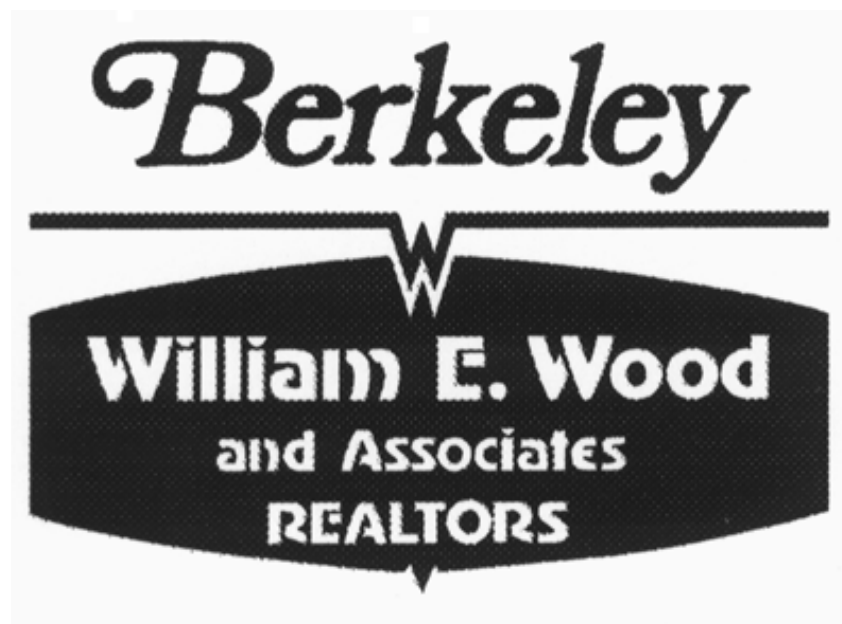

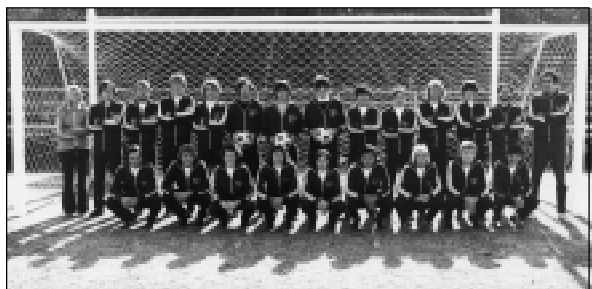

The College of William and Mary - The Best Small Public University in the United States

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler. The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2002-03 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference championships, while six teams ended the season nationally ranked in the top-25. Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top-100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and this season W&M far exceeded that standard, ending the 2002-03 campaign ranked 58th. It marked the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or second in the Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There

are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Overall, the College has proven dominant in the CAA, leading the league with 70 conference titles, 21 more than the next closest school. In recent years, it has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. In the 2002-03 season, W&M student-athletes, who make up close to 10% of the entire student body, compiled a 3.03 grade point average.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor—Tara Flint (women's soccer), Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf)—more than any other school.



A four-year starter for the Tribe (1996-99), goalkeeper **Adin Brown** holds the W&M single-season and career records in shutouts, saves and save percentage. Currently the starting goalkeeper for Major League Soccer's New England Revolution, he was also picked to the U.S. National Team roster for this summer's CONCACAF Gold Cup.

Athletics Administration



Terry Driscoll

Athletics Director

With a strong personal commitment to the concept of the scholar-athlete and to competitive success, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll, Jr. enters his eighth year as director of athletics at the College.

"In the athletic world, William and Mary is well recognized for a rare combination of two attributes: its academic strength in the classroom and its competitive strength on the field," said Driscoll. "I look forward to the challenge of con-

tinuing the tradition of academic and athletic achievement."

A basketball All-America selection and an Academic All-America honoree at Boston College, Driscoll is an exemplary leader. Since his collegiate days, Driscoll has filled a variety of executive posts in the sporting goods industry, as well as completing an 11-year stint as a player in the National Basketball Association and as a player and coach in the Italian professional basketball league.

Driscoll has supervised the marketing of athletic products in national and international markets, enhanced the television exposure of a variety of NCAA events (including the Final Four basketball tournament) and organized and directed such internationally recognized events as the World Cup soccer games in Boston and the women's World Volleyball Grand Prix in Hawaii.

The athletic program Driscoll directs fields a total of 23 men's and women's teams which boast strong records in NCAA, Colonial Athletic Association and Atlantic 10 competition. Last year was one of the most successful in W&M history, as a school-record 10 teams com-

peted in NCAA Tournaments. Four teams won conference championships and six squads ended the season nationally ranked in the top 25.

Driscoll, who graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from Boston College in 1969, began his postgraduate career as a first-round draft pick of the Detroit Pistons. Before joining the Pistons, however, Driscoll opted for a year of professional basketball in Italy where he fulfilled his dream of living abroad and learning a second language. He rejoined the Pistons in 1970 and played with the Bullets and Bucks before returning to Italy in the fall of 1975, where he was named Outstanding Foreign Player of the Year. He played three years before an injury forced his retirement in 1978. He then coached his former team to two Italian League Championships before returning to the United States.

Driscoll began his post-playing career as an athletic sales promotion agent in 1980 and quickly moved up the corporate ladder. With the purchase of Bike Athletic by Kazmaier Associates in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the Sporting Goods Industry. Driscoll was named president of KSG Inc. in 1987 and expanded the agency from 24 to 50 states by 1989. With the domestic sales agency in place, Driscoll expanded to international marketing and sales from 1989-93. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International. Also in 1993-94, Driscoll assisted with the 1994 World Cup Organizing Committee as Venue Executive Director, and his Boston venue was cited for its operational success. In September of 1994, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife Susan. The couple has two children, Keith, 28, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, 24, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



Barbara Blosser

Associate AD

Barbara Blosser comes into her 12th year as the College's associate athletics director. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when Will-

iam and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assis-

tant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASIS Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978. In 1993, she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned a faculty academic advisor through the Academic Advising Office, directed by Dr. Randolph Coleman. Students remain with this advisor until they declare a major at which time they select a faculty advisor in their major field of concentration. The Academic Advising Office provides support and guidance to students as they plan their academic progress to graduation.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experi-

ence. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.



Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, six fulltime certified athletic trainers, graduate and undergraduate student trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The College is also in the process of evaluating and pursuing CAAHEP accreditation of its entry-level athletic training education program. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



Facilities

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

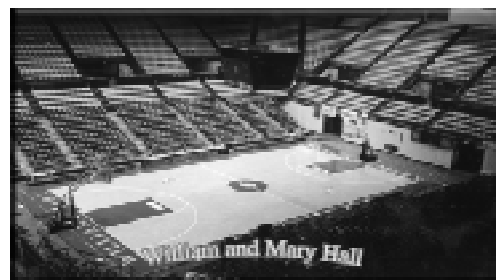
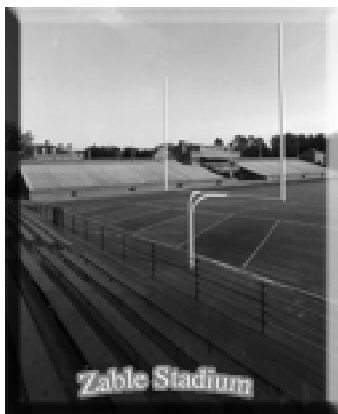

Albert-Daly Field

This season will be the Tribe's first on its new grass facility, Albert-Daly Field. Named for William and Mary's long-time men's and women's soccer coaches, Al Albert and John Daly, the field will be used by both of their teams, as well as by the College's lacrosse team, beginning in the fall.

The project began in the spring of 2001, when William and Mary received a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop of Richmond, Virginia to build a natural grass field adjacent to W&M's baseball stadium, Plumeri Park, located at the College's Dillard complex.

As graduates of William and Mary, Jim and Bobbie Ukrop have long been generous supporters of the College and have touched the lives of thousands of students, both in the athletics department and general college community, with their philanthropy.

"The challenge grant provides us the opportunity to enhance the competitiveness of three of our very successful programs, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse," said William and Mary Athletics Director Terry Driscoll. "At the request by Mr. and Mrs. Ukrop, the facility would be named in the honor of those two coaches recognizing their long service and the success of their programs here at the College of William and Mary."

Al Albert has led the Tribe men's soccer team as head coach for 33 of the 37 seasons that the College has fielded a varsity team. He has amassed a record of 392-181-60 during his tenure and needs just eight more victories to become one of the fewer than 10 coaches in Division I history to compile 400 career wins. Throughout the 1990s, the Tribe ranked as one of the top programs in the nation, placing eighth in wins (149) and 13th in winning percentage (.708).

The previous home of the Tribe soccer teams was Busch Field, which features an artificial playing surface that prohibited the College from hosting NCAA tournament games over the past

several years. W&M's men have been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site.

"The College has done a fantastic thing for our programs, because not only will we have an opportunity to host NCAA games, we have also enhanced our ability to schedule quality opponents," said Albert. "Just the overall perception of our program of recruiting and talking to people will be enhanced. It's a great thing. The College took a great step when we got a home at Busch Field and now they're taking another great step with this new facility. It's one of the final

the Tribe's women's soccer program over the last 16 years. Daly ranks among the top-10 in victories (229) among his Division I peers. He has also directed W&M to the NCAA post-season 15 times, including the last 11 seasons in a row. Overall, the College has sponsored women's soccer for 21 years with the team advancing to the NCAA Tournament 18 times.

"I'm very, very happy," said Daly. "I think it's badly needed for both the men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. "Jim and Bobbie Ukrop's gift gesture is just tremendous. It's going to help in every way from scheduling and recruiting to the perception of the program."

On the field, during Daly's tutelage, 12 W&M soccer players have garnered a total of 25 All-America honors, including two National Players of the Year in Megan McCarthy (1987) and four-time All-American Natalie Neaton (1995). Daly has been named CAA Coach of the Year three times (1993, 1994, 1999) and Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year four times (1989, 1990, 1992, 1997).

The women's lacrosse program has appeared in the NCAA Tournament six times since 1983 including three consecutive years (1996-98) and has produced 34 All-American awardees. Since starting play in the Colonial Athletic Association Championships in 1992, the team

advanced at least to the semi-final round in every year but one, winning the championship outright in 1992. The Tribe program posted double-digit wins 10 times in the 11 year span between 1987 and 1997 and has finished the season ranked in the top-20 in six of the last eight years.

"This is a great step forward for the program," said head lacrosse coach Tara Kelly. "It was a much needed facility that will benefit the team for years to come. The generous gift started by the Ukrops will not only allow the team to host NCAA and other championship events, but it will also play a vital role in attracting new recruits."

A 1969 graduate of William and Mary, Albert's teams have put together 28 consecutive winning seasons (a W&M record) and 26-straight campaigns of 10 wins or more. W&M made its 12th appearance in the NCAA tournament in 2002, when the Tribe advanced to the Sweet Sixteen with wins at Duke and Virginia. Albert has been named CAA Coach of the Year a conference-record four times (1987, 1992, 1994 and 1996), and earned the South Atlantic Region's top honor in 1992, 1998 and 2002.


