This is William and Mary Soccer



Thirty-nine years ago, soccer was in its first year at William and Mary. It was for men only and the Tribe did not experience many winning moments. Times have changed. In 1967, the team's third year of existence, and first as a varsity sport, W&M defeated George Washington, 2-1, for the first victory in school history. That win was the first of more than 400 to come for a school that was destined to be a hotbed of soccer.

The groundwork was laid in the early 1970s when Al Albert, a 1969 graduate of the College, returned to his alma mater to teach and coach soccer. The program began to take off in 1975, Albert's fifth year at the helm. That season the Tribe went 9-4-1, beginning the current streak of 29 consecutive winning seasons, the fifth-longest streak in NCAA Division I history. Just one year later, in 1976, the Tribe won 10 matches for the first time, a feat which was repeated for the next 27 years. Albert retired following the 2003 season as just the eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to compile 400 victories. As head coach, he led William and Mary to 401 of the program's 423 wins.



Al Albert graduated from W&M in 1969 and coached the College's men's soccer team for 33 years before retiring after the 2003 season.

Wins alone do not give a school national prominence. That came in 1980 when W&M advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Since then, the Tribe has gone to 11 more NCAA tourneys, including seven trips in the last nine seasons (1995-2000 and 2002) as well as in 1992 and 1993. W&M won the ECAC-South title in 1983; the CAA tournament in 1987, 1995, 1996, 1999 and 2000 and the CAA regular season crown in 1987, 1992, 1995, 1996 and 2002, when it tied Virginia Commonwealth for first place in the league.

This year W&M soccer will take another

step forward with the construction of a new grass facility, Albert-Daly Field. Initiated with a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop, the new field will be crucial in improving the Tribe's chances to host top-quality teams and NCAA Tournament games in Williamsburg. Despite the tremendous success of Tribe soccer, the men have been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site. That is expected to change with the beginning of play at Albert-Daly Field.

Besides having strong team records, many W&M individuals have been standouts on the pitch. Eight players have been named All-Americans, 12 have international playing experience with various national teams and numerous others have received conference, state and regional honors. In the summer of 1994, goalkeeper Paul Grafer started for the U.S. Olympic team on its tour of Chile. In 1997 W&M alum Wade Barrett played with the U.S. under-20 team. All-American goalkeeper Adin Brown is the latest name to join this group, playing on the U.S. under-23 squad and with the U.S. Olympic Team.

The William and Mary women's soccer program has enjoyed a similar ascent to the upper echelon of the sport. Starting as a varsity sport in 1981 under original head coach John Charles and continuing under current head coach John Daly, the women's team has enjoyed winning seasons in all 23 years and has played in the NCAA tournament 19 of the past 20 seasons.

The women's team has also enjoyed its share of individual honors. Eleven Tribe players have been named All-America in the last 16 years. The women's team also has a history of sending players to various national teams. Former W&M All-American and National Player of the Year Megan McCarthy was a member of the national team, which is the current world champion. Nine years ago, Natalie Neaton earned the distinction of ISAA National Player of the Year.

What makes William and Mary unique in the soccer world is its combination of top-notch collegiate soccer and a variety of soccer-related activities throughout the year.

Traditionally, in September the year kicks off with the Tribe Soccer Classic, which features the W&M men's team and a regional rival facing off against top competition from around the country. Virginia, Duke, North Carolina, Davidson, Boston University, Rutgers and Portland are all traditionally strong teams that have come to Williamsburg for this early season tourney. In the 19 years of the Classic, the Tribe has won the title 10 times and has finished second seven times. The Classic will be resumed in 2004 with the opening of the new home for Tribe soccer, Albert-Daly Field.

The spring finds the Busch Field turf occupied by teams of seven. W&M hosts a seven-a-side tournament for both college men's and women's

teams in early April. The tournaments give top teams from around the region the opportunity to gauge their progress in spring practice against top-notch competition. Collegiate players are not the only ones enjoying the turf in the spring. In late April, a seven-a-side tournament for men's and co-ed teams draws many participants from Tidewater, Richmond and Washington, D.C.

In the summer, the fields of William and Mary are filled by thousands of youngsters taking part in the Tidewater Soccer Camp and John Daly's Soccer Camp. The camps are run by the William and Mary head coaches and the counselors are mainly current and former W&M players.

Beginning in the summer of 2002, Busch Field became the home turf for the Williamsburg Legacy, the Premier Development League (PDL) team owned by the Williamsburg Soccer Club. Each season, the Legacy roster features as many as five W&M players, while also adding individuals from a number of other local nationally-ranked colleges, including Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth, Old Dominion and Maryland.

Soccer is not just a seasonal event in Williamsburg, it is a year-long tradition. Both the men's and women's teams receive strong support from the student body and the residents of the Tidewater area, and these fans are rewarded with a great product.

The success enjoyed by Tribe student-athletes and the high-level of community involvement in the soccer program combine to make William and Mary a truly unique place in the soccer world.

Chris Norris was named the head coach of the William and Mary men's soccer team on January 23, 2004, after nine years as a Tribe assistant and four years as a standout defender for the Green and Gold.

Norris joined the Tribe soccer staff in 1995 after a solid playing career at the College. He made the transition from the field to the sideline and played a major role in helping former head coach Al Albert develop one of the premier soccer programs in America.

"Chris was an exceptional student-athlete at William and Mary and continued as an outstanding assistant coach for nine seasons," said W&M's director of athletics Terry Driscoll at the time of Norris' hiring. "His knowledge, experience and understanding of intercollegiate soccer and the College clearly made him the obvious choice for the position."

A captain his senior year, Norris was the team's defensive leader, starting all four seasons (1991-94). During his career, W&M compiled an impressive 1.04 goals against average, including two seasons (1992 and 1994) with a team GAA of less than 1.00. He was a two-time All-CAA performer and was also selected to the VaSID All-State squad and the All-South Atlantic second team in 1994. The team's Most Valuable Player as a junior, Norris received the Coaches' Award in 1992 and earned W&M Rookie of the Year honors in 1991. Norris also earned the team's Freshman Academic Achievement Award in 1991 and graduated from the College with a degree in kinesiology.

Prior to his return to William and Mary, Norris served as junior varsity boys' soccer coach at Lafayette High School in Williamsburg. Along with his coaching duties for the Tribe, Norris is involved in coaching with the Williamsburg Soccer Club and serves as the co-director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp. He holds a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) advanced national diploma and serves as an associate staff member for the NSCAA.

Assistant Coaches



CHUCK CONNELLY **ASSISTANT COACH (FIFTH SEASON) • OLD DOMINION (2000)**

Now in his fifth season on W&M's staff is Chuck Connelly. He has worked primarily with the Tribe's goalkeepers and was promoted to a full-time assistant in January.

Connelly graduated in 2000 from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia, where he was the team's starting goalkeeper as a junior and senior. While at ODU, he recorded a career 1.50 goals against average with 17 shutouts and was regarded as one of the top goalkeepers in the conference. In 1999, he started all 19 matches for ODU and his 0.79 GAA was tops in the league and 17th in the nation. He earned second team All-CAA honors as a senior for the Monarchs.

A native of Rockville, Maryland, Connelly has coached at numerous camps along the East Coast, including a position as the assistant director of the Adin Brown Goalkeeping Academy. He currently coaches a youth traveling team for the Williamsburg Soccer Club. Connelly also serves as director of the Williamsburg Summer Soccer League and assistant director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp.

Connelly's younger brother, John, is a goalkeeper on the ODU soccer team.



JEFF DOMINGUEZ **ASSISTANT COACH (FIRST SEASON) • WILLIAM AND MARY (1999)**

Entering his first season on the W&M coaching staff is Jeff Dominguez, who returns to the College after a successful professional playing career in Europe.

Most recently a starting defensive central midfielder for BV Cloppenburg in Germany, Dominguez set the club record with 68 consecutive starts and helped the team earn a promotion to Germany's third division in 2004. He has also played with the Virginia Beach Mariners and Nashville Metros of the A-League, prior to spending time in Europe.

A three-year starter for W&M, Dominguez graduated from the College in 1999 with a degree in economics. A crucial member of the Tribe during the most successful four-year period in the program's history, he helped the Green and Gold win two Colonial Athletic Association titles and advance to the NCAA Tournament four times, including a quarterfinal appearance in 1996, as the Tribe went 67-23-5 (.732) from 1995 through 1998. Dominguez holds the school record with eight NCAA Tournament game appearances.



TOM DUFFY **ASSISTANT COACH (SIXTH SEASON) • LE MOYNE (1965)**

In his sixth season with the Tribe's staff is Tom Duffy. Prior to helping with the coaching duties at William and Mary, Duffy spent six seasons on the staff at Hartwick.

A 1965 graduate of Le Moyne College, Duffy played and coached soccer in England after completing his undergraduate work. Duffy's first coaching experience was with the Royal Air Force Upper Heyford team for three years.

Duffy also spent four seasons as the head coach at Oneonta State in New York where he compiled a 39-33-3 record. He coached at Oneonta High School from 1972 to 1987, putting together a 226-71-25 mark and sent over 60 of his players on to play at the collegiate level.

Duffy was also involved with New York's Empire State Games where he coached three Central Region teams, claiming one silver and two bronze medals. He also served for four years as the soccer chairman for the Games. In 2001 Duffy was selected to the New York State Section IV Hall of Fame for his years of service at the high school level.

A resident of Williamsburg with his wife Peggy, the couple has three daughters; Brigid, who is married to Doug Prevelige, Jenn, who is married to current Hartwick College men's soccer coach Ian McIntyre, and Kate. Duffy holds an advanced coaching diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

2004 Season Outlook



Despite losing four players to graduation who each started every game they played in the last two years for the Tribe, the most noticeable change for the William and Mary men's soccer team in 2004 is at the head coaching position. In January, W&M's legendary mentor Al Albert announced his retirement after his 33rd season with the Green and Gold. **Chris Norris**, a nine-year assistant and four-year starter for the Tribe under Albert, will take over the team this season and is excited at the team's potential.

"We had a very good spring and posted some good results [5-0 against NCAA opponents]," said Norris. "I think that our guys are very aware of the history and tradition of this program. It is a goal of ours every year to compete for the Colonial Athletic Association Championship, get an NCAA bid and advance in the NCAA Tournament. We didn't achieve any of those last fall and there's been a great team spirit since then to try and right that in 2004."

FORWARDS

Expected to start at the two forward positions this year are senior **Brannon Thomas** and junior **Pat Scherder**. Thomas played in just the final two games of last season, after undergoing brain surgery last summer to remove a non-cancerous brain tumor. He made the most of his chances in his first game back, a 1-1 tie against sixth-ranked Old Dominion in the final match

of the regular season. In that contest, played the day after he was medically cleared to resume full-contact soccer, he assisted the Tribe's only goal, less than a minute after entering the game for the first time.

"Brannon is a big target player with great feet and good tactical awareness," said Norris. "Having him back and in the lineup enables us to be a much better possession team."

An extremely fast player, Scherder led the team and finished fourth in the CAA with 11 goals last season, including four game-winners, to go with his three assists. A second team all-state and all-conference pick, he scored a goal or an assist in the first four matches of the year, with his first career game-winning score coming on the road against No. 15 Duke.

"We expect Pat to be an important player for us this year after leading the team in goals last season" said Norris. "His pace and intensity allow us to get behind defenses and that will be critical to our attack."

Pushing those two for playing time will be junior **Andreas Nydal**, who spent the spring semester studying overseas in Norway, and sophomore **Jarrett Thomas**. Nydal had an outstanding rookie campaign with eight goals in 2002, before an ACL injury in the spring of 2003 left him unable to train until just before the start of last season. Even still, he scored four goals and added an assist in 2003, and is expected to be a significant scoring threat this year.

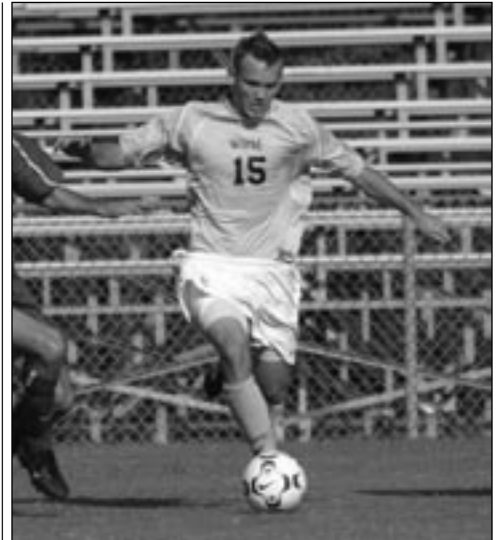
Jarrett Thomas is a speedy player who quickly made an impact last year in his true freshman season, scoring a goal against Rutgers in the first game of the year. He went on to score four goals and record an assist in his 12 games played, which included five starts.

Also figuring into the mix will be freshmen **Martin Brady** and **Doug Ernst**. Brady comes in with significant high-level experience in his native Scotland, while Ernst is a first team all-state selection who set his high school records with 15 goals as a senior and 33 in his career.

MIDFIELDERS

Senior captain **Bryan Hinkle**, a second team all-conference and all-state selection, will likely be the starter at the attacking midfield position. A starter in each of his three previous seasons at W&M, Hinkle led the CAA with nine assists last season and also had five goals to finish second on the club with 19 points. Two of his scores were game-winners last season, including a decisive strike in the 99th minute on the road against seventh-ranked Virginia.

"Bryan is one of the best soccer players we have on the team," praised Norris. "We rely on him to dictate the tempo for us with his ability in possession and also expect him, as the captain, to fulfill a leadership role for us this season."



Junior forward **Pat Scherder** led W&M and was fourth in the CAA with 11 goals last season.

Playing behind Hinkle in the defensive midfielder position will be senior **Andrew Terry**. Another experienced player for the Tribe, with at least 13 games and six starts in each of his first three seasons, Terry's versatility has been a valuable asset throughout his career.

"We've used Andrew in a number of different roles throughout his career," stated Norris. "He is probably the most professional player that we have on our team and he won the defensive central midfield role during the spring. Playing behind Bryan, it was a very good combination that we hope will continue to mature in the fall."

Expected to start at one of the two outside midfield positions will be junior **Clayton Voss**. Voss played 17 matches with 10 starts last year, scoring a goal and two assists, after also starting much of his rookie season.

"Clayton can play wide on either side of the midfield and we expect him to be in the starting lineup on opening day," said Norris. "He is a big, physically-imposing player and has the ability to run by people on the flanks and create opportunities to serve or cut inside and shoot."

The other outside starting position is wide open and will be decided after preseason practices. Junior **Craig Myers** is the only other returning midfielder with collegiate experience, having played in 15 games with three starts last season. Primarily a back, he will likely be used at the defensive midfield position, although he could also see time at outside back again this year. Myers missed the spring practice season as he studied overseas at Moscow State University.

Three freshmen midfielders, **Brock Jones**, **Doug McBride** and **Ryan Overdeest**, will also be fighting for playing time. A versatile and quick player, Jones could see action at a variety of positions, although he will mostly play as a wide midfielder. A true defensive central midfielder,

McBride has a good understanding of the game and good possession skills. Overdeest performed very well in the spring season after redshirting last fall. His hard work in the offseason to improve his strength and conditioning, along with his knack for getting into scoring positions, will lead to him making a contribution this year.

BACKS

The back position was the hardest hit by graduation, as three of last year's seniors, including MLS draft pick and second team All-American Phil Hucles, had significant starting experience at the position. The defense this year will be built around returning starters **Colin Young** and **Jeff Marklin**.



Sophomore back **Jeff Marklin** started 14 of his 16 games played as a rookie last season.

Now in his fifth year at W&M, Young earned his bachelors degree in accounting in 2003 and will be enrolled in W&M's business school this year as he pursues an MBA. The most veteran defender on the team, he has started 43 of W&M's last 44 games over the last three seasons and will start again at left back this year.

"Colin brings an incredible level of professionalism and maturity to the team," said Norris. "He will continue to bring the toughness and consistency that we've come to expect from him."

At one of the center back positions will be Marklin, a sophomore. He gained valuable experience as a redshirt-freshman last season, playing 16 matches, including 14 starts.

"With the departure of three seniors last year at the position, we've come to rely on Jeff for leadership and experience at the back," said Norris. "He had a great spring and we expect him to basically be the rock that we build our defense around."

At the other center back position will be sophomore **Chris Rodd**. Primarily a midfielder who earned 12 starts in 17 games last year, Rodd

has been moved to the back for this season.

"We converted Chris to center back in the spring," said Norris. "He adapted very well and started to show some leadership and the ability to organize back there. Combined with his physical presence, we feel like we can have a very good back four with Chris in the middle."

Sophomore **Brendan McCurdy** is another player who has been moved to the defense this season, after playing 17 games with one start as a forward last year. His one goal last season was an important one, as he scored the game-winner in the 98th minute at Drexel.

"Because of his toughness and athleticism, we tried Brendan in the back during the spring, and he showed the ability to play right back for us," said Norris. "He's very strong in the tackle and is tremendous in the air defensively."

None of the four reserves at the back position have any game experience, although three of them were with W&M last year and redshirted in 2003. An athletic player who is quick and good in the air, **John Lee** could see time as either a center or right back, or potentially as a defensive midfielder. **Ryan Sells** is a tough, athletic defender who can play a variety of positions, but will likely see most of his action come at right back. One of the only true left-sided players on the team, **Mike Yakovac** is a very fast player who improved greatly during the spring. Incoming freshman **Chris Wayne** will also immediately compete for playing time at defense, or possibly at midfield, as a big, physical player who can play at any spot on the back line.

GOALKEEPERS

Sophomore **Kris Rake** played almost every minute of the season for W&M last year and is expected to start in goal again this year. A two-time CAA Rookie of the Week in 2003, he became the first freshman keeper to start for the Green and Gold since MLS standout Adin Brown in 1996. He recorded two shutouts last season and made 66 saves, including stopping 10 shots in a 1-1 tie against fifth-ranked St. John's.

"Kris is a big, tough goalkeeper who had a pretty good year for us as a freshman," said Norris. "We expect him to continue to develop and improve this fall."

Three other keepers will pressure Rake for the starting position this year, led by the rapidly improving **Scott Kelsey**, a sophomore who has yet to see game action, but made tremendous improvement in spring practices. Sophomore **Stephen Hughes** is the only current player other than Rake to see action in goal, playing the final 30 minutes in a shutout of Longwood last season. The fourth keeper is redshirt-freshman **Brennan Wergley**, who has good feet with a strong knowledge and understanding of the game.

SCHEDULE

Once again, W&M will face a very challenging slate of teams, both in and out of conference. With the debut of the Tribe's new natural grass facility, Albert-Daly Field, the College will finally be able to host some of the nation's top teams in Williamsburg.

"Once again, we have managed to put together a very competitive schedule," said Norris. "In addition to our CAA matches, we have a very tough non-conference schedule and it will be important that our guys are prepared to compete on a nightly basis."

W&M opens the year at South Carolina, before hosting Virginia Military Institute in a Saturday evening matchup. The Tribe takes on Rutgers and Navy in a tournament at Old Dominion and then travels north for a game at Loyola. National semifinalist Maryland will come to Williamsburg for a mid-week game, two days before the Tribe hosts Hartwick and American in the Nike Tribe Soccer Classic. A game the following Friday at two-time defending league champion Virginia Commonwealth opens four straight weekends of CAA competition for the Green and Gold. The Tribe will travel to North Carolina for a Wednesday evening match and will host Virginia Tech in the final home contest of

the regular season on the following Wednesday night. W&M will end the regular season at local rival Old Dominion on Saturday, November 6. The top six teams in the league will advance to the CAA tournament, with the top two clubs receiving byes to the semifinal round. The regular season conference champion will host the CAA Final Four on Friday, November 12 and Sunday November 14.

TIDEWATER SOCCER CAMP

For the last 31 years, former William and Mary soccer coach Al Albert has conducted the Tidewater Soccer Camp. Designed for boys ages 7-18, the week-long sessions are based on the principle of one ball for one boy. Campers receive technical instruction in small groups and have the chance to practice the skills immediately in competitive scrimmages and in league play. The aim of the camp is to develop in each camper not only skill, but an understanding and love for the game of soccer.

All phases of soccer are covered in the camp with an emphasis placed on the development of skill and technique and an understanding of the game. The camp has ample facilities and all instructors are certified USSF & FA coaches or similarly qualified individuals.

All fields used in the program are on the campus of the College of William and Mary. The signature facility is Busch Soccer Stadium, a lighted astroturf field which holds 2,271 fans and is the former home of the W&M men's soccer team.



In addition to this camp, a special high school camp is offered at the Christchurch School. This advanced camp is limited to 120 high school players who are coached by college head coaches and top assistants.

There are also younger and older team camps in which teams are coached in training sessions in the mornings and play matches in the afternoon and evenings.

As an example of the popularity of the Tidewater Soccer Camps, Tribe alums Wade Barrett and Steve Jolley were campers as youngsters.

2003 Season Review



TRIBE RECORDS 29TH CONSECUTIVE WINNING SEASON

After posting a record of 9-6-4 in 2003, William and Mary extended its streak of consecutive winning seasons to 29. That ties the Tribe with SMU for the fourth-longest active streak in NCAA Division I. Only UCLA (37), Clemson (34) and Indiana (31) have longer active streaks. The Tribe's run of winning campaigns began in 1975, when W&M went 9-4-1 on the year. The College has had just four losing seasons since men's soccer became a varsity sport at W&M in 1967.

LEGENDARY MENTOR AL ALBERT REACHES 400 VICTORIES

With a 4-1 W&M win at Delaware on October 24, **Al Albert** became just the eighth head coach in NCAA Division I history to record 400 career victories. Just the third coach ever to win 400 games at one school, Albert retired after the 2003 season with a career record of 401-187-64 (.664).

HUCLES AND ALBERT SELECTED IN PRO DRAFTS

2004 graduates **Phil Hucles** and **Graham Albert** were each drafted by professional soccer teams in the offseason. Hucles became the seventh W&M player to be drafted by a Major League Soccer team when he was selected in the fourth round of the MLS SuperDraft by the Chicago Fire. He was also selected with the sixth overall pick in the A-League draft by the Virginia Beach Mariners. Albert was picked in the fourth round of the Major Indoor Soccer League amateur draft by the Baltimore Blast.

W&M UNDEFEATED IN 2003 AGAINST TOP 25 OPPONENTS

The Tribe went 2-0-2 in its four matches against nationally-ranked opponents in 2003. The impressive run began with a 2-1 win at No. 15 Duke in the second match of the regular season and was continued with a 3-2 win in overtime on the road against seventh-ranked Virginia. That win was the Tribe's third straight over the Cavaliers and improved the College's record to 5-1-1 in the last seven meetings with the in-state rivals. Together with a 2-1 win at Duke over NC State, W&M had the best record in the nation (3-0-0) against Atlantic Coast Conference opponents. In a game played in Norfolk, the Tribe tied No. 5 St. John's, 1-1, while the Green and Gold also took sixth-ranked Old Dominion to a 1-1 tie in the final game of the regular season.

WORKING OVERTIME

Seven of W&M's 19 matches last season went to overtime, the most in one season since 1998, when 10 matches were tied at the end of regulation. The Tribe also had four matches end in a draw in 2003, one short of the school record of five, which happened in the 1985 season.

HUCLES NAMED SECOND TEAM ALL-AMERICAN

Phil Hucles became the eighth player in school history to earn All-America accolades, when he was selected to the NSCAA second team after last season. Playing primarily as a defender in 2003, Hucles started all 19 matches, recording five goals and seven assists for a total of 17 points. He ended his college career ranked eighth in W&M history with 87 career points, tied for fifth with 36 career goals and tied for sixth with nine career game-winning goals.

THREE W&M PLAYERS EARN ACADEMIC HONORS

The Tribe men's soccer team was successful off the field, as well as on it, last season, with three student-athletes recognized for their combination of athletic and academic achievements. **Graham Albert** was named to the NSCAA Collegiate Scholar All-East Region first team and to the All-America third team. He and **Bryan Hinkle** were both voted by the area's sports information directors to the CoSIDA Academic All-District III second team. **Colin Young** was named an honorable mention NSCAA All-East Region Collegiate Scholar.

Former Tribe midfielder Wade Barrett was the 12th selection in the first round of the 1998 MLS Draft by the San Jose Clash (now the Earthquakes). After a successful four-year stint in the MLS, Barrett recently moved to Denmark, where he now plays for AGF Aarhus of the Danish First Division. In 2003, he became the

first W&M men's soccer player to receive a cap for an international team when he played for the United States National Team. Barrett is a 1997 All-American and CAA Player of the Year, and was the second player in league history to be a four-time first team All-CAA selection.

When his name was called by the Los Angeles Galaxy, Steve Jolley became the first W&M alum to be selected in the first round of any major sports draft. The first-round pick at number nine, Jolley completed his Tribe soccer career ranked fourth on the all-time scoring list with 109 points. A starter for the Galaxy, Jolley was making a strong case for the league's Rookie of the Year Award in 1997 until a knee injury ended his season prematurely. He was traded to the MetroStars during the 2000 season. In 2001 he started and played every minute of every game, including the postseason, just the second player to accomplish that feat in franchise history. That season he was selected to his first MLS All-Star game and four times was named to the Soccer America Team of the Week. Jolley was traded to the Dallas Burn prior to the start of the 2004 MLS season.

Selected with the third overall pick by the Colorado Rapids in the 2000 MLS SuperDraft, Adin Brown became the highest draft pick ever from William and Mary in any sport. He is the third William and Mary soccer player, joining Steve Jolley and Wade Barrett, to be a first round MLS draft pick. A three-time All-American for the Tribe, Brown holds almost every goalkeeping record in W&M history. Last summer he became the second W&M player to compete with the U.S National Team, when he was selected to the American team that competed for the Gold Cup. He was also a member of the U23 National Team and was a member of the 2000 U.S. Olympic Team until an injury forced him to miss the trip to Sydney. Brown was traded in the 2001 season to Tampa Bay and signed with the New England Revolution on Jan. 15, 2002. In 2002, he finished fifth in the MLS with a 1.23 GAA and he recorded four postseason shutouts as he led the Revolution to the 2002 MLS Finals.

Jon Stewart



A three-year starter on the men's soccer team, 1984 William and Mary graduate Jon Stewart is the program's most famous and well-known alum. Currently the host, executive producer and writer of the Emmy Award-winning "The Daily Show with Jon Stewart" on Comedy Central, he returned to campus in the spring of 2004 to deliver the College's Commencement address, the first Tribe soccer player ever to be selected for that honor.

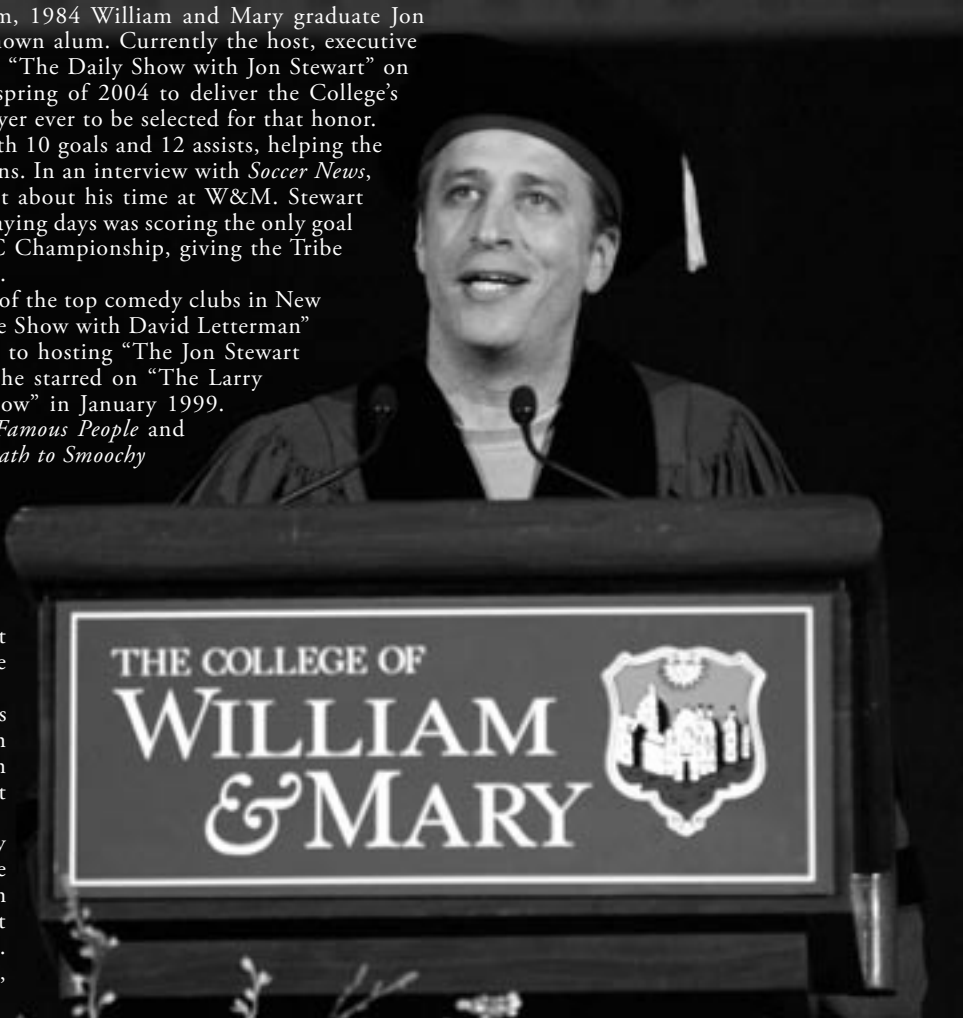
Stewart ended his playing career at W&M with 10 goals and 12 assists, helping the Tribe to a 40-15-9 (.695) record in his three seasons. In an interview with *Soccer News*, he said that soccer was the thing he enjoyed most about his time at W&M. Stewart recalled that his most exciting memory from his playing days was scoring the only goal in a 1-0 win over Connecticut in the 1983 ECAC Championship, giving the Tribe just its second league title and the first since 1976.

Stewart began his professional career at some of the top comedy clubs in New York City, eventually earning appearances on "Late Show with David Letterman" and HBO's "Young Comedians Special." That led to hosting "The Jon Stewart Show" on MTV in 1994 and 1995. From there, he starred on "The Larry Sanders Show" before taking over "The Daily Show" in January 1999. Stewart wrote the best-selling *Naked Pictures of Famous People* and starred in a number of feature films, including *Death to Smoochy* and *Big Daddy*.

"The Daily Show" has won three Emmy Awards, including beating out "Late Show with David Letterman" for the 2003 award for outstanding variety, music or comedy series. The program was recently nominated for that honor and two others in the 2003-04 Emmy competition. In March, Stewart signed a deal to extend his contract to host "The Daily Show" through 2008.

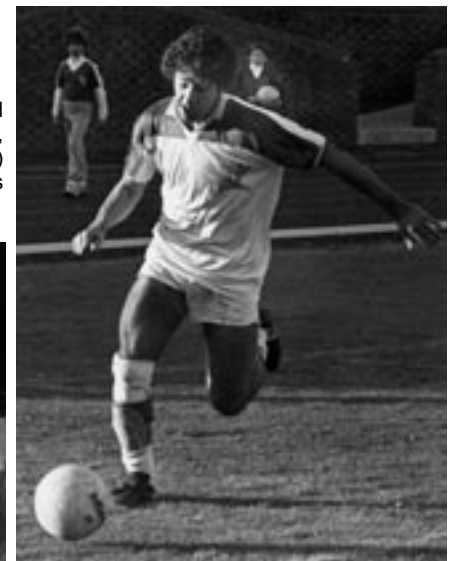
Recently ranked second on *Entertainment Weekly's* list of funniest Americans, Stewart was awarded an honorary doctorate of arts at W&M's 2004 graduation ceremonies after delivering the Commencement address.

"I am honored to be here and receive this honorary doctorate," said Stewart. "When I think back to the people that have been in this position before me, from Benjamin Franklin to Queen Noor of Jordan, I can't help but wonder what has happened to this place. As a person, I am honored to get it; as an alumnus, I have to say I believe we can do better."

The College of William and Mary - The Best Small Public University in the United States

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler. The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2003-04 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe captured six CAA titles to push its total to a dominant 76, 26 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Tournaments, highlighted by Ramon Jackson's national championship on the parallel bars. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top 100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. Punctuating this run is the College's 58th-place ranking for the 2002-03 campaign, marking the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or

second in the Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. 83% of all athletes earn a degree while a formidable 36 athletes have been selected Academic All-America since 1992.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor, more than any other school. The College continued to set the standard in 2003-04 with another five athletes claiming the honor: Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Otstot (men's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf).

TIMOTHY SULLIVAN PRESIDENT

Timothy J. Sullivan first came to William and Mary as a freshman in 1962. He left four years later with a bachelor's degree in government, a Phi Beta Kappa key and membership in Omicron Delta Kappa.

Sullivan was elected president of the College on April 9, 1992 by the Board of Visitors and was sworn in as president on June 1, just eight months before the College began its 300th anniversary celebration.

Sullivan's life has been intimately

linked with William and Mary. His wife, Anne Doubet Klare, was a fellow member of the class of 1966. Like other William and Mary alumni, they were married in the chapel of the Sir Christopher Wren Building.

After receiving a law degree from Harvard University in 1969, Sullivan went on to serve in the Army Signal Corps in Vietnam, where he received the Army Commendation Medal, First Oak Leaf Cluster and Bronze Star.

Sullivan came back to William and Mary in 1972 as an assistant professor at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law where he specialized in teaching contract law. He rose quickly, becoming an associate law professor in 1974, then full professor and associate dean in 1977.

In 1981 and 1982, he was visiting law professor at the University of Virginia School of Law. He served for nearly three years as executive assistant for policy for then-Governor Charles S. Robb. Sullivan returned to Marshall-Wythe in 1984, as the John Stewart Bryan Professor of Jurisprudence. He became dean of the law school in July 1985. He is

a member of the Virginia State Bar and the Ohio State Bar and a Fellow of the Virginia Bar Foundation and the American Bar Foundation, and he currently serves on the Board of Directors of the American Arbitration Association.

Sullivan was given the Freedom of the Drapers' Company in London in November 1992. In April 1993 he received an LLD (hon.) from the University of Aberdeen. He received the Outstanding Virginian Award from the Virginia 4-H Foundation in 1999.

Active in public service, Sullivan has been executive director of the Governor's Commission on Virginia's Future, counsel for the Commission on the Future of the Virginia Judicial System, a member of the Virginia Board of Education and the Governor's Task Force on Substance Abuse and Sexual Assault on Campus. In addition, he was appointed by Governor L. Douglas Wilder as chair of the Governor's Task Force on Intercollegiate and Interscholastic Athletics. President Sullivan served as chair of the Council of Presidents for 1998 and 1999.



HENRY KISSINGER CHANCELLOR

Soldier, statesman, academician, author, peacemaker Henry A. Kissinger was installed February 10, 2001, as the 22nd Chancellor of the College of William and Mary. The former U.S. Secretary of State and Nobel Peace Prize winner also delivered the Charter Day address. Mr. Kissinger, who succeeded Margaret, The Lady Thatcher, as chancellor was

selected by the Board of Visitors to a seven-year term that began July 1, 2000. Mr. Kissinger will officiate at ceremonies such as the spring commencement and future Charter Day celebrations, which commemorate the College's founding in 1693. He will also help the College extend its international reach by guiding the establishment of relationships with institutions and people around the globe.

The College's charter established the position of chancellor, stating that the role should go to "one eminent and discreet person," who would serve as the College's representative to the English crown. During the pre-Revolutionary war era, either the Bishop of London or the Archbishop of Canterbury held the position. The first American chancellor was George Washington, who served from 1788 until his death in 1799.

Born in 1923 in Furth, Germany, Mr. Kissinger immigrated to the United States in 1938 to escape Nazi persecution. After studying accounting at the City College of New

York, he served in the U.S. Army and the military government of the defeated Germany after World War II.

In 1969, President Richard M. Nixon appointed him Assistant for National Security Affairs, and subsequently head of the National Security Council and Secretary of State, a post he held until 1976.

During his time with the government, Mr. Kissinger led efforts to establish detente with the former Soviet Union, opened the People's Republic of China to the outside world for the first time since Mao Tse Tung came to power in 1949, helped limit the spread of nuclear weapons, helped resolve some of the differences between the Arabs and Israelis, and played a vital role in bringing an end to the war in Vietnam.

For his efforts to end the war in Vietnam, Mr. Kissinger and his North Vietnamese counterpart, Le Duc Tho, were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Today Kissinger is an international consultant and author.

Athletics Administration



TERRY DRISCOLL DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his eighth year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$6 million in facilities, including the new Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 76 CAA Championships coming into the 2003-04 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known

as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 28, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 24, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



BARBARA BLOSSER SR. EXECUTIVE ASSOCIATE AD

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior executive associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head

women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAAIW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAAIW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the

John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASIS Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978. In 1993, she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.



Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



Albert-Daly Field



This season will be the Tribe's first on its new grass facility, Albert-Daly Field. Named for William and Mary's long-time men's and women's soccer coaches, Al Albert and John Daly, the field will be used by both of their teams, as well as by the College's lacrosse team, beginning in the fall.

The project began in the spring of 2001, when William and Mary received a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop of Richmond, Virginia to build a natural grass field adjacent to W&M's baseball stadium, Plumeri Park, located at the College's Dillard complex.

As graduates of William and Mary, Jim and Bobbie Ukrop have long been generous supporters of the College and have touched the lives of thousands of students, both in the athletics department and general college community, with their philanthropy.

"The challenge grant provides us the opportunity to enhance the competitiveness of three of our very successful programs, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse," said William and Mary Athletics Director Terry Driscoll. "At the request by Mr. and Mrs. Ukrop, the facility would be named in the honor of those two coaches recognizing their

long service and the success of their programs here at the College of William and Mary."

Al Albert led the Tribe men's soccer team as head coach for 33 of the 37 seasons that the College has fielded a varsity team before retiring from coaching in January of 2004. He amassed a record of 401-187-64 (.664) during his tenure and became just the eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach 400 wins, and just the third to have earned all those wins at just one school. Throughout the 1990s, the Tribe ranked as one of the top programs in the nation, placing eighth in wins (149) and 13th in winning percentage (.708).

The previous home of the Tribe soccer teams was Busch Field, which features an artificial playing surface that prohibited the College from hosting NCAA tournament games over

the past several years. W&M's men have been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site.

"The College has done a fantastic thing for our programs, because not only will we have an opportunity to host NCAA games, we have also enhanced our ability to schedule quality opponents," said Albert. "Just the overall perception of our program in recruiting and talking to people will be enhanced. It's a great thing. The College took a great step when we got a

Daly ranks among the top 10 in victories (229) among his Division I peers. He has also directed W&M to the NCAA postseason 16 times, including the last 12 seasons in a row. Overall, the College has sponsored women's soccer for 22 years with the team advancing to the NCAA Tournament 19 times.

"I'm very, very happy," said Daly. "I think it's badly needed for both the men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. Jim and Bobbie Ukrop's gift gesture is just tremendous. It's going to help in every way from scheduling and recruiting to the perception of the program."

On the field, during Daly's tutelage, 12 W&M soccer players have garnered a total of 25 All-America honors, including two National Players of the Year in Megan McCarthy (1987) and four-time All-American Natalie Neaton (1995). Daly has been named CAA Coach of the Year three times (1993, 1994, 1999) and Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year four times (1989, 1990, 1992, 1997).

The women's lacrosse program has appeared in the NCAA Tournament six times since 1983 including three consecutive years (1996-98)

and has produced 34 All-American awardees. Since starting play in the Colonial Athletic Association Championships in 1992, the team advanced at least to the semifinal round in every year but one, winning the championship outright in 1992. The Tribe program posted double-digit wins 10 times in the 11 year span between 1987 and 1997 and has finished the season ranked in the top 20 in six of the last eight years.

"This is a great step forward for the program," said head lacrosse coach Tara Kelly. "It was a much needed facility that will benefit the team for years to come. The generous gift started by the Ukrops will not only allow the team to host NCAA and other championship events, but it will also play a vital role in attracting new recruits."

home at Busch Field and now they're taking another great step with this new facility. It's one of the final pieces that we need to go all the way."

A 1969 graduate of William and Mary, Albert's teams put together 29 consecutive winning seasons (a W&M record) and 26 straight campaigns of 10 wins or more. W&M made its 12th appearance in the NCAA tournament in 2002, when the Tribe advanced to the Sweet Sixteen with wins at Duke and Virginia. Albert was named CAA Coach of the Year a conference-record four times (1987, 1992, 1994 and 1996), and earned the South Atlantic Region's top honor in 1992, 1998 and 2002.

John Daly reigns among the most successful coaches in America, leading the Tribe's women's soccer program over the last 16 years.


