Former head coach **Al Albert** led the Tribe to 401 victories during his career and ranks ninth all-time on the Division I victories list.

Forty years ago, soccer was in its first year at William and Mary. It was for men only and the Tribe did not experience many winning moments. Times have changed. In 1967, the team's third year of existence, and first as a varsity sport, W&M defeated George Washington, 2-1, for the first victory in school history. That win was the first of more than 400 to come for a school that was destined to be a hotbed of college soccer.

The groundwork was laid in the early 1970s when Al Albert, a 1969 graduate of the College, returned to his alma mater to teach and coach soccer. The program began to take off in 1975, Albert's fifth year at the helm. That season the Tribe went 9-4-1, beginning a streak of 30 consecutive winning seasons, the sixth-longest streak in NCAA Division I history. Just one year later, in 1976, the Tribe won 10 matches for the first time, a feat that was repeated for the next 27 years. Albert retired following the 2003 season as just the eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to compile 400 victories. As head coach, he led William and Mary to 401 of the program's 436 wins. Albert currently ranks 18th all-time in NCAA career victories, while ranking ninth on the Division I career victories list.

Wins alone do not give a school national prominence. That came in 1980 when W&M advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Since then, the Tribe has gone to 11 more NCAA tournaments, including nine trips in the last 14 seasons (1992-93, 1995-2000 and 2002). The Tribe also advanced to the NCAA during both the 1983 and 1987 seasons. W&M won the ECAC-South title in 1983, the CAA tournament in 1987, 1995, 1996, 1999 and 2000 and the CAA regular season crown in 1987, 1992, 1995, 1996 and 2002.

In 2004, W&M soccer took another step forward with the construction of a new grass facility, Al-

bert-Daly Field. Initiated with a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop, the new field was crucial in improving the Tribe's chances to host top-quality teams and NCAA Tournament games in Williamsburg. Despite the tremendous success of Tribe soccer, the men had been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site because of the lack of an inclosing grass field on campus.

Besides having strong team records, many W&M individuals have been standouts on the pitch. Eight players have been named All-Americans on 12 occasions, 12 have international playing experience with various national teams and numerous others have received conference, state and regional honors. In the summer of 1994, goalkeeper Paul Grafer started for the U.S. Olympic Team on its tour of Chile. In 1997, W&M alum Wade Barrett played with the U.S. under-20 team. All-American goalkeeper Adin Brown joined the list of W&M to garner international experience, playing on the U.S. under-23 squad and with the U.S. Olympic and Pan American Games teams.

Brown played a key role in helping the US Under-23 national team to a bronze medal at the 1999 Pan American Games. He started three matches during the tournament, and posted a shutout. Although he was the starting goalkeeper throughout qualifying for the 2000 Olympics, Brown missed the final competition due to injury.

Barrett also earned his first International cap with the U.S. Senior National Team on Nov. 17, 2002. He played the entire 90 minutes at left back against El Salvador at RFK Stadium in Washington, D.C. Barrett made a return to the National Team roster in 2005. He was on the roster for an Oct. 8, 2005 World Cup Qualifier against Costa Rica, but did not see action.

Since 1978, a total of 27 Tribe players have gone on to play professionally, whether it be in the U.S. or overseas. Five players (Barrett, Brown, Scott Budnick, Grafer and Steve Jolley) enjoyed playing careers in Major League Soccer (MLS). Barrett, Brown and Jolley were all taken in the first round of the MLS Draft, with Brown being drafted the highest at No. 3 in 2000. Jolley is currently a 10-year MLS veteran, while Barrett is a seven-year league vet.

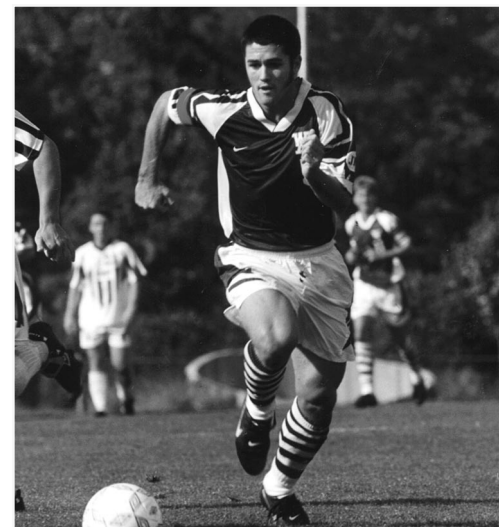
Jolley, who currently plays for Red Bull New York, entered the 2006 season with 211 games, 17,787 minutes and 12 goals over his career. He earned an All-Star nod during the 2001 season, while playing for the New York-New Jersey Metrostars. Barrett, who spent two years playing in the top leagues in Denmark and Norway, plays for the Houston Dynamo. In 2002, he won an MLS Championship with the San Jose Earthquakes, while also earning league All-Star and MLS Best XI honors. Brown played five seasons with the MLS, totaling 93 games and 20 shutouts, including the playoffs over his career. He has spent the two seasons with Aalesunds FK in Norway's Tippeligaen (First Division).

Along with Brown and Barrett, former Tribe players Jeff Dominguez, Khary Stockton and Gabe Valencia enjoyed International playing careers. Dominguez spent three seasons with B.V. Cloppenburg in Germany. He started a club record 68 consecutive games as a defensive central midfielder and helped his club earn a promotion to Germany's Third Division. Valencia also spent time in Germany playing with SV Leipzig along with playing in the U.S. in the A-League. Stockton signed a six-month contract with A.E. Velo Clube Rio Clarence of the Brazilian Second Division in May of 1994. At the time, he was believed to be just the second American player to sign with a professional soccer club in Brazil. He also played with Athletico Sorocabam in the Brazilian Third Division.

Carlos Garcia, a 2003 graduate, has enjoyed success in the indoor soccer leagues in the U.S. Garcia spent the 2003-06 seasons with the Baltimore Blast and helped his team to the 2005-06 Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) Championship. He enjoyed his best season in 2005-06, playing in 30 games, while finishing with 19 points on 12 goals and seven assists. Garcia was selected by the Detroit Ignition in the 2006-07 MISL Expansion Draft. The Blast originally chose him in the 2002 Amateur Draft in the fourth round.

Soccer is not just a seasonal event in Williamsburg, it is a year-long tradition. The W&M soccer programs receive strong support from the student body and the residents of the Tidewater area, and these fans are rewarded with a great product.

The success enjoyed by Tribe student-athletes and the high-level of community involvement in the soccer program combine to make William and Mary a truly unique place in the soccer world.

Chris Norris enters his third season at the helm of the William and Mary men's soccer program. Despite an overall record of 13-16-9, the Tribe has reached new heights, including the program's first ever victory over a No. 1-ranked opponent. Norris took over the post as head coach at the College following the retirement of long-time, legendary coach Al Albert. Norris spent nine seasons as a Tribe assistant and four years as a standout defender for the Green and Gold before being named head coach on Jan. 23, 2004.

"Chris was an exceptional student-athlete at William and Mary and continued as an outstanding assistant coach for nine seasons," said W&M's director of athletics Terry Driscoll at the time of Norris' hiring. "His knowledge, experience and understanding of intercollegiate soccer and the College clearly made him the obvious choice for the position."

During Norris' 15 seasons as a player, assistant and head coach with the Tribe, William and Mary has compiled a 197-98-36 record (.650), including a Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) mark of 69-31-19 (.660). Norris has been a part of nine of the Tribe's 12 all-time NCAA Tournament appearances, four CAA tournament crowns and five CAA regular-season titles.

While the Tribe's record during 2005 was 4-9-5, first appearances can be deceiving, as the College was only a few bounces away from a better mark. During the 2005 campaign, W&M lost five matches to teams ranked in the top 20, including four by a single goal. In all, eight of the team's nine defeats were by a single tally, including a trio of overtime setbacks.

During Norris' first season leading the Tribe, the team extended its streak of consecutive winning seasons to 30, which ranks sixth in NCAA Division I history. W&M went 5-1-3 in its first year at Albert-Daly Field. In just the program's second game at the facility, Norris guided the Tribe to a 1-0 victory over then-No. 1 and eventual College Cup semifinalist Maryland on Sept. 22. The shutout was one of only two Maryland suffered during the 2004 season that saw the Terps finish the year ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense.

After dropping the season opener in Norris' first year at the helm, the Tribe went unbeaten over its next seven contests (5-0-2), including the victory over Maryland. The unbeaten streak was the longest for the College since the 1999 squad won eight straight contests from Oct. 23 through Nov. 14.

The Green and Gold allowed opponents to score just 21 goals in 2004, the fewest since 1999, resulting in a 0.99 goals against average for the team. Five W&M players earned All-Colonial Athletic Association honors, including first-team selection Pat Scherder, who also earned all-state and second-team all-region accolades.

In total during his two years at the helm of the Tribe, Norris has coached four All-Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) honorees and two CAA All-Rookie team selections.

Norris joined the Tribe soccer staff in 1995 after a solid playing career at the College. He made the transition from the field to the sideline and played a major role in helping former head coach Al Albert develop one of the premier soccer programs in America.

During his time as an assistant, the Tribe compiled a 128-62-116 (.660) record with seven NCAA Tournament appearances, four CAA tournament championships and three CAA regular season crowns. Norris also saw 32 players earn All-CAA honors, 30 earn all-state accolades, seven All-America honors, two CAA Players of the Year, one CAA Defensive Player of the Year, one CAA Rookie of the Year and five Major League Soccer draft picks. Of those five players selected to play at the highest level in the United States, three were first round selections, including

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Steve Jolley, Wade Barrett and Adin Brown, all of which have gone on to long and distinguished professional careers.

A captain his senior year, Norris was the team's defensive leader, starting all four seasons (1991-94). During his career, W&M compiled an impressive 1.04 goals against average, including two seasons (1992 and 1994) with a team GAA of less than 1.00. During both the 1992 and 1994 seasons, Norris led the Tribe to the top of the CAA regular season standings.

He was a two-time All-CAA performer and was also selected to the VaSID All-State squad and the All-South Atlantic second team in 1994. The team's Most Valuable Player as a junior, Norris received the Coaches' Award in 1992 and earned W&M Rookie of the Year honors in 1991. Norris also earned the team's Freshman Academic Achievement Award in 1991 and graduated from the College with a degree in kinesiology.

Prior to his return to William and Mary, Norris served as junior varsity boys' soccer coach at Lafayette High School in Williamsburg. Along with his coaching duties for the Tribe, Norris is involved in coaching with the Williamsburg Soccer Club and serves as the co-director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp. He holds a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) advanced national diploma and serves as an associate staff member for the NSCAA.

Chuck Connelly enters his seventh season on the William and Mary staff. He has worked primarily with the Tribe's goalkeepers and was promoted to a full-time assistant in January of 2004. During his six seasons, the Tribe has compiled an overall record of 50-48-17 (.509) with a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances in 2000 and 2002. In Colonial Athletic Association action, the Tribe has a mark of 24-17-10 (.567), including a conference championship during his first campaign in 2000.

The Tribe goalkeepers have combined for a goals against average of 1.27 with 34 shutouts during Connelly's tenure. In 2004, the Tribe allowed only 21 goals, the fewest allowed by a W&M squad since the 1999 season. W&M goalkeepers also turned in the lowest goals against average since 1999 during the 2004 slate with a GAA of 0.99. Connelly watched the Tribe blank then-No. 1 Maryland, 1-0, in double overtime at Albert Daly Field on Sept. 22, 2004. It marked the first time in school history the College had knocked off the nation's No. 1 team.

Connelly graduated in 2000 from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va., where he was the team's starting goalkeeper as a junior and senior. While at ODU, he recorded a career 1.50 goals against average with 17 shutouts and was regarded as one of the top goalkeepers in the conference. In 1999, he started all 19 matches for ODU and his 0.79 GAA was tops in the league and 17th in the nation. He earned second team All-CAA honors as a senior for the Monarchs.

A native of Rockville, Md., Connelly has coached at numerous camps along the East Coast, including a position as the assistant director of the Adin Brown Goalkeeping Academy. He currently coaches a youth traveling team for the Williamsburg Soccer Club. Connelly also serves as director of the Williamsburg Summer Soccer League and assistant director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp.

Conference playoffs. Prior to coming to Williamsburg, Butler was a four year starter at UAB. He was team captain and a two-year Sun Belt All-Conference selection. Following his graduation, he served as an assistant coach for the Blazers.

A native of London, Butler was an England Independent Schools player at both the U-16 and U-19 levels. Upon graduation from high school, he played one year in the Hong Kong professional league where he represented Hong Kong at the full-Amateur level. After leaving UAB and residing in Williamsburg he played in the USISL for the Richmond Kickers ending his competitive career in 1994.

Butler holds a Premier Diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), and was one of only 36 candidates selected in the program's inaugural year of 1998. He also holds National and Advanced National Diplomas from the NSCAA. Butler is an associate staff member for the NSCAA, qualified to teach state and regional-level coaching courses. At the 1999 NSCAA Convention, he was a featured clinician as the WSC and its programs were touted as a model club in the USA.



TOM DUFFY

**ASSISTANT COACH
EIGHTH SEASON
LE MOYNE (1965)**

Tom Duffy starts his eighth season with the Tribe staff. Prior to helping with the coaching duties at William and Mary, Duffy spent six seasons on the staff at Hartwick.

During his eight seasons with W&M, the Tribe has an overall record of 64-55-20 (.532), including a 29-20-10 (.576) Colonial Athletic Association mark. The College has advanced to a trio of NCAA Tournament and won back-to-back CAA Championships in 1999 and 2000.

A 1965 graduate of Le Moyne College, Duffy played and coached soccer in England after completing his undergraduate work. Duffy's first coaching experience was with the Royal Air Force Upper Heyford team for three years.

Duffy also spent four seasons as the head coach at Oneonta State in New York where he compiled a 39-33-3 record. He coached at Oneonta High School from 1972 to 1987, putting together a 226-71-25 mark and sending over 60 of his players on to play at the collegiate level.

Duffy was also involved with New York's Empire State Games where he coached three Central Region teams, claiming one silver and two bronze medals. He also served for four years as the soccer chairman for the Games. In 2001 Duffy was selected to the New York State Section IV Hall of Fame for his years of service at the high school level.

A resident of Williamsburg with his wife Peggy, the couple has three daughters: Brigid, who is married to Doug Prevelige; Jenn, who is married to current Hartwick College men's soccer coach Ian McIntyre; and Kate. Duffy holds an advanced coaching diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

RICHARD BUTLER

**ASSISTANT COACH
FIRST SEASON
UAB (1992)**

Richard Butler enters his first season as an assistant coach after serving as the Director of Coaching for the Williamsburg Soccer Club since the fall of 1992. Butler was the head coach of the Williamsburg Legacy (PDL), guiding the squad to an 8-4-4 record and a berth in the Eastern

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The William and Mary men's soccer program received a major facility upgrade in 2004 with the completion of Albert-Daly Field, an all grass complex that gives the Tribe program the possibility of hosting NCAA Tournament games. Named for William and Mary's long-time men's and women's soccer coaches, Al Albert and John Daly, the field is used by both soccer teams, as well as by the College's lacrosse team. In just two seasons, Albert-Daly Field has become a home field advantage for the William and Mary men's soccer program. Competition began at the complex in 2004 and over the past two seasons, the Tribe has enjoyed a 6-4-7 (.559) home record.

"The new facility has enabled us to bring in the kind of teams we would play in the postseason-type environment, like UNC, Virginia and Maryland," head coach Chris Norris said. "It has allowed us to get top level programs to agree to play us in Williamsburg. It is a beautiful setting and I know it feels like home for the guys. It is a great situation. In terms of the field and the lighting, I feel like it stacks up against any field in our area."

The previous home of the Tribe soccer teams was Busch Field, which features an artificial playing surface that prohibited the College from hosting NCAA tournament games over the past several years. W&M's men were forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site. The completion of Albert-Daly Field, one of the top soccer venues in the region, has nullified the circumstances that prevented the Tribe from hosting in the past.

"The College has done a fantastic thing for our programs, because not only can we host NCAA games, we have also enhanced our ability to schedule quality opponents," said Albert. "Just the overall perception of our program in recruiting and talking to people will be enhanced. It's a great thing. The College took a great step when we got a home at Busch Field and now they're taking another great step with this new facility. It's one of the final pieces that we need to go all the way."

The new field paid immediate dividends in 2004, as W&M hosted two Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) opponents (Maryland and Virginia Tech), the first ACC teams to play W&M in Williamsburg since 1996. In just the second match played at the facility, the Tribe earned the first win in school history over the nation's top ranked team with a 1-0 victory over No. 1 Maryland on Sept. 22. W&M not only notched the victory, but shutout the nation's top scoring offense at the time and an eventual College Cup semifinalist. The Tribe ended the year with a 5-1-3 home record in its first season at the facility. While the facility has been an added coup for the Tribe men's soccer program, it is also one for the Williamsburg and W&M community.

"For the longest time, we were getting into the NCAA Tournament, but apart from the 1992 season, we were never in consideration to host an NCAA Tournament game," Norris said. "Not only is that a difficult route to win when you have to go on the road and play people, but it also took away from the excitement here on campus. We had some really good teams that were very well supported by the campus and community, but yet didn't have the opportunity to play the biggest games of the year at home. With the new facility, that changes, and it is a benefit to not only our program, but the community as a whole."

The project began in the spring of 2001, when William and Mary received a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop of Richmond, Va., to build a natural grass field adjacent to W&M's baseball stadium, Plumeri Park, located at the College's Dillard complex.

As graduates of William and Mary, Jim and Bobbie Ukrop have long been generous supporters of the College and have touched the lives of thousands of students, both in the

athletics department and general college community, with their philanthropy.

"The challenge grant provides us the opportunity to enhance the competitiveness of three of our very successful programs, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse," said William and Mary Athletics Director Terry Driscoll. "At the request by Mr. and Mrs. Ukrop, the facility would be named in the honor of those two coaches recognizing their long service and the success of their programs here at the College of William and Mary."

Al Albert led the Tribe men's soccer team as head coach for 33 seasons before retiring from coaching in January of 2004. He amassed a record of 401-187-64 (.664) during his tenure and became just the eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach 400 wins, and just the third to have earned all those wins at just one school. Throughout the 1990s, the Tribe ranked as one of the top programs in the nation, placing eighth in wins (149) and 13th in winning percentage (.708).

A 1969 graduate of William and Mary, Albert's teams put together 29 consecutive winning seasons (a W&M record) and 26 straight campaigns of 10 wins or more. W&M made its 12th appearance in the NCAA tournament in 2002, when the Tribe advanced to the round of 16 with wins at Duke and Virginia. Albert was named CAA Coach of the Year a conference-record four times (1987, 1992, 1994 and 1996), and earned the South Atlantic Region's top honor in 1992, 1998 and 2002.

John Daly reigns among the most successful coaches in America, leading the Tribe's women's soccer program over the last 18 years. Daly ranks among the top 10 in victories (262) among his Division I peers. He has also directed W&M to the NCAA postseason 17 times, including 13 seasons in a row from 1992-2004. Overall, the College has sponsored women's soccer for 24 years with the team advancing to the NCAA Tournament 20 times.

"I'm very, very happy," said Daly. "I think it's badly needed for both the men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. Jim and Bobbie Ukrop's gift gesture is just tremendous. It's going to help in every way from scheduling and recruiting to the perception of the program."

On the field, during Daly's tutelage, 12 W&M soccer players have garnered a total of 25 All-America honors, including two National Players of the Year in Megan McCarthy (1987) and four-time All-American Natalie Neaton (1995). Daly has been named CAA Coach of the Year three times (1993, 1994, 1999) and Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year four times (1989, 1990, 1992, 1997).

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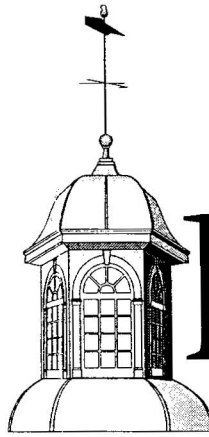
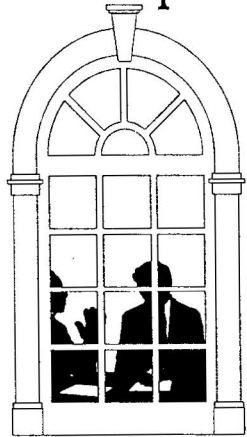
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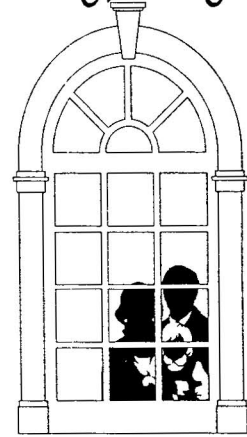
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2006 SEASON PREVIEW

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With the tradition of winning and postseason invitations well in tow, the William and Mary soccer program will enter the 2006 season out to prove that the 2005 version was nothing more than an anomaly. While the program's consecutive winning seasons streak of 30 came to a close, the facts support that the Tribe were only a few bounces away from possibly finding themselves in postseason position.

While the Tribe's record during 2005 was 4-9-5, first appearances can be deceiving. During the campaign, W&M lost five matches to teams ranked in the top 20, including four by a single goal. In all, eight of the team's nine defeats were by a single tally, including a trio of overtime setbacks. Couple those statistics with the fact that just three games into the season, the squad lost its top offensive threat in all-conference and all-region forward **Pat Scherder**.

William and Mary returns seven starters and 16 letterwinners from the 2005 squad. Included in those returners is 72.4 percent (21-of-29) of the Tribe's scoring offense from last season. That number also is boosted by Scherder, who scored 15 goals in his first three seasons with the Green and Gold. Add to the mix seven dynamic freshmen, the Tribe will have an outstanding blend of experience and youth to build upon the program's storied past.

GOALKEEPER

The Tribe returns both of its starting goalkeepers from a season ago, and third-year head coach Chris Norris expects a battle for the starting honors throughout the pre-season. Fifth-year senior **Kris Rake** has started 51 games in his first three seasons in net, while junior **Brennan Wergley** started the final six games of the 2005 season, finishing with three shutouts.

"Goalkeeper is a position where we have a lot of depth and experience," Norris said. "Kris has started a number of games for us over the last three years. Brennan Wergley came on and did a good job in the final six games of last season. I expect it to be a real battle during the pre-season."

Rake enters the 2006 campaign ranked fifth in W&M history in saves and sixth in shutouts and career goals against average (1.30). The Flower Mound, Texas native has 22 career victories between the pipes for the Tribe. During the summer of 2006, Rake posted three shutouts in his first four games with the Williamsburg Legacy of the PDL. He finished the PDL season with a GAA of 0.86.

Wergley came on during the final six games of his junior tilt. He became the first W&M player to record three straight overtime shutouts (all 0-0 games) against JMU (Oct. 21), VCU (Oct. 23) and Towson (Oct. 28). Wergley recorded a total of 41 saves over the six games, including six or more in every contest, to go along with a 1.20 GAA.

The Tribe has another veteran backup in fifth-year senior **Scott Kelsey**. Kelsey performed well during the spring season, and has the experience if called upon. W&M also added a goalkeeper in the class of 2006. Freshman **Andrew McAdams** earned all-state honors at Berkeley Prep in Florida. He was a member of the ODP program in the state and led his team to the 2004 Florida state championship.

BACK

The W&M backline sports a quartet of returning players with starting experience, but will also benefit from the influx from both young and experienced talent. Fifth-year senior **Jeff Marklin** returns as a three-year starter at back for the Tribe, while juniors **Mike Yakovac**, **Ryan Sells** and **Chris Wayne** have started during their first two seasons in the Green and Gold.

"We feel good about our defense," Norris said. "If we can get off to a good start with our experience at back and in goal, we feel like we should be able to defend well against anyone we play."

Senior **Brendan McCurdy** moved to the back position during the spring season after playing 51 games and scoring eight goals at the forward spot for the Tribe. The Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla., native garnered rave reviews from the coaching staff during the spring and enjoyed success in helping guide the Williamsburg Legacy to the PDL Eastern Conference playoffs. McCurdy started 16 of the 17 games for the Legacy at center back.

McCurdy will combine with Marklin, who has started 48 games over his W&M career on the backline. The pair combined and garnered valuable experience together in the middle of the defense for the Legacy. Mark-

lin played in 11 games and started seven. With the duo anchoring the Legacy defense, Williamsburg finished with five shutouts and only allowed 20 regular-season goals, which ranked 14th in the 59-team PDL.

"We try to play with four in the back to start," Norris said. "Our back four has a lot of experience. We moved Brendan McCurdy from a wide midfielder/forward to a center back during the spring, and he adapted very well. He has continued that with a strong summer playing with the Legacy. We expect him and Jeff Marklin, who is a fifth-year and returning captain, to be our two starters at the center back positions."

Sells has started 26 games over the last two seasons at back. As a redshirt freshman in 2004, he was named the team's Co-Rookie of the Year along with Yakovac. Wayne and Yakovac have started 17 and 13 games, respectively, over the last two seasons. Wayne started 16 games as a sophomore and earned valuable experience over the summer with the Mid-Atlantic Division champion Virginia Beach Submariners of the PDL. Yakovac earned CAA All-Rookie Team honors as a redshirt freshman in 2004.

Another new face to the Tribe backline that will push for playing time is freshman **Roger Bothe**. The Chester, Va., native enjoyed a sterling prep career that included back-to-back state championships and perfect seasons. Bothe was named the 2005-06 Gatorade Virginia High School Player of the Year. He also garnered the Virginia High School Coaches Association (VHSL) Group AAA Male Athlete of the Year as a senior.

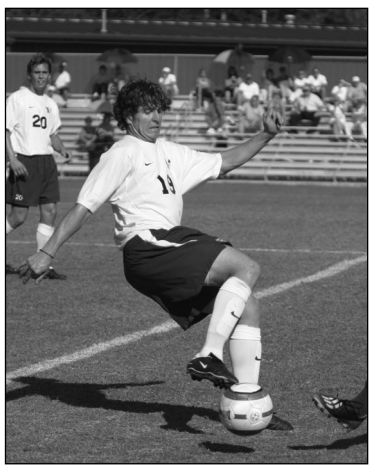
"We add a talented young player to the mix in Roger Bothe, whose credentials speak for themselves," Norris said. "Roger has gained some great experience late in the summer with the Richmond Kickers of the PDL. We expected him to challenge at either center back or left back."

MIDFIELD

The most uncertain of the Tribe positions lies in the midfield, but those unknowns are not due to a lack of experience. W&M has a wealth of returning experience in the midfield. In fact, four players on the roster have starting experience in the middle of the park, including 93 total games over the last three seasons.

Sophomore **Doug McBride** will anchor the four-man Tribe midfield from the holding midfield position. In his rookie campaign, he was one of three players to earn the team's best rookie award. McBride started 17 matches in the midfield for the College as a redshirt freshman.

"When I think of our midfield, the first thing that comes to mind is Doug McBride, who barring injury will play as our holding midfielder," Norris said. "He has really become a rock for us playing deep in the midfield and trying to dictate our pos-

session, while trying to break up the other team's attack. He is an incredibly hard-working and honest player, who does not make very many mistakes."

The coaching staff has big expectations for a pair of midfielders in junior **Doug Ernst** and freshman **Price Thomas**. Ernst played in every match as a sophomore, including nine starts. He finished with three assists on the campaign. Though he has yet to display the skills in a Tribe uniform, Ernst had a prolific goal-scoring career in prep and club soccer. In fact, he set his high school record for goals in a season with 15 as a senior, and goals in a career with 33.

"Doug is a guy who we have big expectations for this year," Norris said. "He really started to come on during the spring and finally scored a couple of goals, which we expect him to do. It is time for him to accept responsibility for scoring out of midfield."

Thomas finished his four-year prep career at Albermarle with 25 goals and 20 assists. He garnered First-Team Commonwealth District as well as All-Northwest Region and All-Central Virginia nods as a junior and senior.

"We knew that one of the priorities in recruiting needed to be finding an attacking midfielder," Norris said. "Somebody with some flare, creativity, athleticism and that has the ability to break down the other team's defense with and without the ball. The first guy we found was Price, and we were fortunate enough to get him."

Sophomore **Brock Jones** returns as the top midfield scorer in 2005. The Ridgefield, Conn., native finished with 12 points on five goals and two assists. He also notched the game-winner against Delaware on his way to sharing the team's best rookie honor.

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Sophomore midfielder **Doug McBride** started 17 matches in 2005 and will solidify the Tribe middle as the holding midfielder.

"Brock was second on the team in goals and points as a freshman," Norris said. "He had a difficult spring missing time after having surgery, but we feel like he could have a breakout season for us this year. Although he is extremely versatile, we expect him to start out as a wide midfield option."

Junior **Ryan Overdeest** has experience both wide and in the attacking midfield position. He played in 25 games, including four starts wide in the midfield for the Tribe, but moved to the attacking position during the spring.

"Ryan is tireless with great work rate and stamina," Norris said. "He is a very honest player, who shoots the ball well from distance and reads the game and arrives in the box from midfield well."

Redshirt freshman **Jeremy Harris** along with freshmen **Rob Godwin**, **Steve Renner** and **Preston Whitlock** could see time in the midfield. Harris missed his rookie season with the Tribe due to injury after earning Eastern Virginia Group AAA Player of the Year honors at Frank W. Cox High school.

Godwin was a first-team all-state selection in Maryland with an exceptional high school career that included 220 points on 79 goals and 62 assists.

FORWARDS

After only scoring 20 and 29 goals in each of the last two seasons, the Tribe will look for an offensive explosion of sorts given the returning depth and scoring power at the striker position. Along with returning starters and two of the teams leading scorers in senior **Jarrett Thomas** and sophomore **Andrew Hoxie**, W&M will welcome back All-CAA and all-region performer, fifth-year senior **Pat Scherder**, who missed most of the

2005 season with an injury, but received a medical redshirt from the NCAA.

"Getting Patrick back is better than getting a top recruit because you get not only the productivity, but the leadership and intangibles from a fifth-year senior," Norris said. "We expect a big season from Patrick, and I know he expects one from himself as well. His pace, which is almost unmatched at our level of college soccer, is irreplaceable. I know if Patrick stays healthy he will score a number of goals, but also draw attention and create chances for his teammates."

Scherder has scored 16 career goals over his W&M career, while starting 39 games at the forward position. After suffering a season-ending injury early in the 2005 campaign, Scherder returned to game action with the Williamsburg Legacy of the PDL during the summer of 2006. He excelled, especially toward the end of the year as his fitness improved. He ranked second on the team with 11 points and five goals. He notched a pair of two-goal games over the final month of the season and helped the Legacy to the Eastern Conference Playoffs.

Hoxie stepped into the void left by Scherder as a freshman and filled in admirably. The 6-4, 188-pounder earned CAA All-Rookie Team accolades as he scored five goals and finished with 11 points in his first season. Hoxie started for the Legacy during the summer and earned PDL Team of the Week honors in the final week of the season after helping his team clinch a playoff berth with five points on two goals and an assist in a 6-2 win over Richmond.

"Last year, Andrew led the forwards in terms of minutes played," Norris said. "He is a big target forward. We put a lot of pressure on him when we lost Patrick Scherder to injury. Andrew did a good job of carrying the load and being dangerous against a very tough schedule."

Thomas won the Tribe's golden boot, leading the team in scoring with 16 points and seven goals. He notched a pair of two-goal games and added a pair of game-winning strikes against VMI and Drexel. He ranked ninth in the CAA in points, 10th in goals.

"Jarrett is incredibly quick and probably one of the best pure finishers we have ever had at William and Mary," Norris said. "He is lethal around the box. He has worked hard to improve his play from 18-to-18 and his defensive integrity as a front player. We think, given enough opportunities, he will be a scoring threat for us again in 2006."

The Tribe will also have the liberty of allowing freshman **Alan Koger** to develop under the wealth of experience at forward. Koger garnered Region IV and Piedmont District Player of the Year honors as a senior at Magna Vista High School in Spencer, Va. He also was a three-year all-state honoree.

SCHEDULE

The College will waste little time, starting the season with a bang. W&M travels to the Wake Forest adidas Classic to battle a pair of ACC teams in Wake Forest and North Carolina. The Tribe will open with the preseason No. 3 (College Soccer News) Tarheels on Aug. 25, before facing the host and preseason No. 19 (CSN) Demon Deacons on Aug. 27.

"Our philosophy has always been to play as tough a schedule as we can," Norris said. "Not only does it prepare our team well, if you are a good enough team to have a shot and make a run at postseason play, but it also gives you the best chance if you win the right games and win enough of them, to get an at large bid to the NCAA Tournament. Historically, we have been pretty successful, at least over the last 15 years, of getting at-large bids."

Following the classic, W&M will return home to face another pair of NCAA Tournament teams in Stony Brook (Aug. 30) and South Carolina (Sept. 2). The Gamecocks are ranked 29th in the CSN preseason poll, while the Seawolves won the America East Championship in 2005. The game between Stony Brook and W&M will be the first between the two schools. It also will be the first time South Carolina has ventured to play in Williamsburg.

W&M has two other marquee non-conference affairs against preseason No. 18 (CSN) UNC-Greensboro and preseason No. 25 (CSN) Virginia Tech. Both teams qualified for the NCAA Tournament in 2005 and the Hokies were the No. 12 national seed. The Tribe will battle the Spartans as part of the Old Dominion Stihl Soccer Classic on Sept. 15. The College will also face Loyola (Md.) on Sept. 17 at the classic. The Tribe will face a tough test traveling to Blacksburg, Va., to face Virginia Tech on Sept. 5.

The only other non-conference affair for W&M will be at home against VMI on Sept. 8. The Tribe is 14-1 all-time against the Keydets, including a perfect 7-0 in Williamsburg.

The 12-team Colonial Athletic Association will once again be a gauntlet of tough contests. Three teams from the CAA (Old Dominion, Hofstra and James Madison) earned bids to the NCAA Tournament in 2005.

The Tribe will have home contests against Drexel (Sept. 22), Delaware (Sept. 24), Towson (Oct. 13), George Mason (Oct. 15) and Georgia State (Oct. 20). The road conference slate is a bit tougher in that it includes all three NCAA Tournament teams from a season ago and a four-game road trip from Sept. 29 through Oct. 8.

During the four-game road swing, the Tribe will face Hofstra (Sept. 29), Northeastern (Oct. 1), James Madison (Oct. 6) and VCU (Oct. 8). Both Hofstra and James

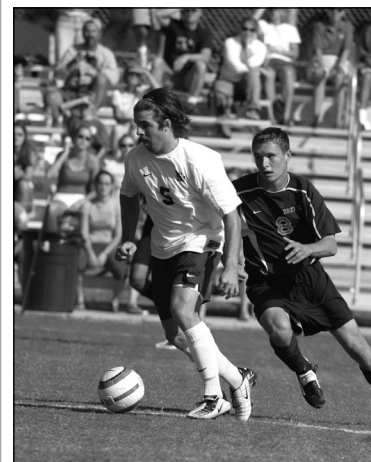
Madison were among 15 teams in the also receiving votes category in the CSN preseason top 30.

The conference road schedule concludes against UNC Wilmington (Oct. 22) and Old Dominion (Oct. 26). The Monarchs are ranked No. 20 in the preseason CSN rankings and were the No. 10 national seed in the 2005 NCAA Tournament.

The game with ODU will not only be marked on the calendar because it is against one of the program's fiercest rivals, but because the contest will be aired live on television. The contest will be part of The Fox Soccer Channel and NSCAA College Soccer Game of the Week television package for the 2006 season.

"The Fox Soccer Channel and NSCAA television package is exciting for college soccer, William and Mary and certainly for the Colonial Athletic Association," Norris said. "The game against ODU is typically, since the conference expanded, been our last regular-season game, and there always seems to be a lot of emotion in the game. Typically, there is a lot riding on the game with conference seedings and the conference tournament. To have it as our last regular-season game and on television is a great opportunity for our players and the program."

The CAA Tournament will be Oct. 31, Nov. 4 and Nov. 5. The top six teams make the tournament field. The quarterfinals between the No. 3 and No. 6 seeds and the No. 4 and No. 5 seeds will be on Oct. 31 at the highest seed. The final four teams will come together for the semifinals and finals at the Virginia Beach Sportsplex.

Fit To Be Tied

The Tribe equaled a school record for ties in a season with five during the 2005 campaign. In those five ties, four came by a score of 0-0. The total eclipsed the previous national record of scoreless ties, but were the second-most during the 2005 season in which San Diego State tied six times, including five scoreless draws. All five ties for the Tribe came during the Colonial Athletic Association portion of the schedule.

Hoxie Earns CAA Honor

Rookie Andrew Hoxie garnered CAA All-Rookie Team honors during the 2005 slate. The Newport News, Va., native ranked third on a team with 11 points, while tying for second in goals with five. The 6-4 striker started all 18 matches on the front line for the Tribe and notched the game-winning goal in the College's season-opening victory over Saint Joseph's.

Academic Success

The W&M soccer program continued to demonstrate the College's commitment to student-athletes during the 2005 season. Eight men's soccer athletes earned CAA Commissioner's Awards. Scott Kelsey, Jeff Marklin, Doug McBride, Andreas Nydal, Ryan Overdeest, Patrick Scherder, Ryan Sells and Clayton Voss were all recognized for their accomplishments on the field and in the classroom. Marklin and Overdeest took home 2005-06 W&M Provost Academic Awards. The honor is earned based on cumulative grade point average, with upper-classman needing a 3.50 GPA, or above, in their college career and freshmen needing a 3.75 GPA through their first semester. For the second straight year, Overdeest also garnered the team's Alumni Award, given annually to the player with the highest grade point average.

By the Narrowest of Margins

In 2005, W&M played some of the top teams in the country tight, only to fall by a single goal. The Tribe fell to five teams ranked among the nation's top 20, including four by one goal. In fact, of the Tribe's nine losses on the 2005 campaign, eight came by a single tally, including three in overtime.

Offensive Outburst

The Tribe opened the 2005 season with an offensive bonanza of goals in an 8-0 victory over Saint Joseph's. The eight-goal performance was the first for the College since the 2000 season. The last time W&M scored more than eight goals in a game was Sept. 8, 2000, when it defeated Delaware, 9-0. In the victory over Saint Joseph's, Andrew Hoxie, Andreas Nydal and Jarrett Thomas each recorded a pair of goals. It marked the first time since Sept. 6, 1997 that three W&M players had multi-goal performances in the same game. On that date against Robert Morris, Wade Barrett recorded a hat trick, while Dan Zickefoose and Adam Schultz added two goals in the 7-0 win.

Blanking the Opposition

Junior Brennan Wergley became the first W&M goalkeeper to record three-straight overtime shutouts. After making his first career start against No. 10 North Carolina, Wergley recorded shutouts against JMU (Oct. 21), VCU (Oct. 23) and Towson (Oct. 28). All three games ended in scoreless draws. During the stretch, Wergley's shutout streak reached 426:09. He stopped six or more shots in all six of his starts during the 2005 season, including a career-high nine saves against JMU. Following his shutout performances against VCU and Towson, Wergley earned the CAA Rookie of the Week honor on Oct. 24.

Leading Scorer

Jarrett Thomas won the Tribe's Golden Boot Award in 2005, topping the team in goals and points. The McLean, Va., native finished his junior campaign with 16 points on seven goals and two assists. Thomas had a pair of two-goal games for the Tribe. He notched two tallies in the season-opener against Saint Joseph's, before knocking in both W&M goals in a 2-1 victory at VMI. For the season, he ranked ninth in the CAA in points and 10th in goals.

Team Honors

Clayton Voss was named the Tribe's Most Valuable Player for the 2005 season. He was one of just two players to start all 18 matches in 2005 and also received W&M's Pipeline Award by virtue of his team-leading four assists. Earning the Golden Boot award with a team-leading seven goals was junior forward Jarrett Thomas. Three players—Brock Jones, Doug McBride and Andrew Hoxie—shared the team's Best Rookie Award. Brennan Wergley was named the team's most improved player after starting the final six games of the season and posting a 1.20 goals against average. Ryan Overdeest earned the team's Alumni Award with the Tribe's highest grade point average. Jeff Marklin took home the Coaches Award, while the Competition Award went to Voss. Rookie Jeremy Harris was honored with the Freshman Academic Achievement Award. McBride and Hoxie each garnered their second team awards with the Unsung Hero Award and Leibo Award, respectively.

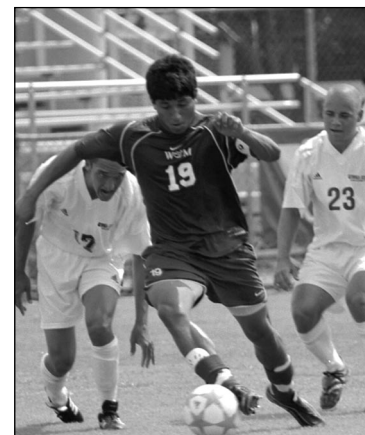

A three-year starter on the men's soccer team, 1984 William and Mary graduate Jon Stewart is the program's most famous and well-known alum. Currently the host, executive producer and writer of the Emmy Award-winning "The Daily Show with Jon Stewart" on Comedy Central, he received the National Soccer Coaches Association of American (NSCAA) Honorary All-American Award for 2005. The organization presented Stewart with the honor at the Jan. 21 NSCAA All-America Luncheon in Philadelphia, held in conjunction with the annual NSCAA Convention.

The NSCAA Honorary All-America award is presented to those who have brought particular distinction to the sport of soccer through their efforts within and beyond the boundaries of the sport. Past recipients include astronaut Sonny Carter, actor Andrew Shue and Lamar Hunt, owner of the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs and the Major League Soccer franchises in Columbus, Dallas and Kansas City.

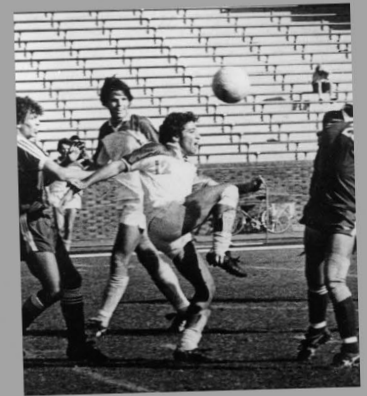
Stewart ended his playing career at W&M with 10 goals and 12 assists, helping the Tribe to a 40-15-9 (.695) record in his three seasons. In an interview with Soccer News, he said that soccer was the thing he enjoyed most about his time at W&M. Stewart recalled that his most exciting memory from his playing days was scoring the only goal in a 1-0 win over Connecticut in the 1983 ECAC Championship, giving the Tribe just its second league title and the first since 1976. In May of 2004, Stewart returned to the College to deliver W&M's Commencement address, the first Tribe soccer player ever to be selected for that honor.

Stewart began his professional career at some of the top comedy clubs in New York City, eventually earning appearances on "Late Show with David Letterman" and HBO's "Young Comedians Special." That led to hosting "The Jon Stewart Show" on MTV in 1994 and 1995. From there, he starred on "The Larry Sanders Show" before taking over "The Daily Show" in January 1999. Stewart wrote the best-selling Naked Pictures of Famous People and starred in a number of feature films, including Death to Smoochy and Big Daddy.

"The Daily Show" has won five Emmy Awards, including beating out "Late Show with David Letterman" for the 2003 and 2004 awards for outstanding variety, music or comedy series. The program was recently nominated for that honor and three others in the 2004-05 Emmy competition. In March, Stewart signed a deal to extend his contract to host "The Daily Show" through 2008.

Recently ranked second on Entertainment Weekly's list of funniest Americans, Stewart was awarded an honorary doctorate of arts at W&M's 2004 graduation ceremonies after delivering the Commencement address.

"I am honored to be here and receive this honorary doctorate," said Stewart. "When I think back to the people that have been in this position before me, from Benjamin Franklin to Queen Noor of Jordan, I can't help but wonder what has happened to this place. As a person, I am honored to get it; as an alumnus, I have to say I believe we can do better."

NCAA BYLAW

30.7 FOREIGN TOURS AND COMPETITION

A member institution may participate in a foreign tour in any sport (see Bylaw 17.32), provided the conditions specified below are met. (Revised: 1/11/89)

30.7.1 Certification of Tour. The institution must certify in writing that the conditions set forth in this section are met and must maintain the certification on file in the athletics department. (Revised: 1/11/89)

30.7.4 Time Lapse between Tours. An institution shall not engage in a foreign tour in each sport more than once every four years. (Revised: 1/11/89)

The William and Mary men's soccer program has taken full advantage of the NCAA Bylaw (30.7) allowing for international trips and competition for an athletic team once every four years. The W&M Once-Every-Four Tour has traveled to Bermuda, Jamaica, England and most recently Greece. The Tribe will make the venture back to Athens, Greece for a second time during the spring of 2007.

"We have tried to take full advantage over the years of the NCAA rule that allows an overseas trip every four years," head coach Chris Norris said. "Our trip, this time falls over Spring Break of 2007. We are going to go to Athens, Greece where we took our last trip four years ago. Through contacts we have always been able to get good games with the pro clubs in whatever country we go to, and Greece the last time around was no exception. We played Panathinaikos and Olympiakos, who are the top teams in Greece and both play in Athens."

Taking the trip over spring break instead of during the preseason allows for time to be spent taking in the culture of the various countries and cities visited. The trip allows for the team to not only gain a different perspective on the soccer field, but also from a cultural standpoint.

"We have traditionally taken our trips during spring break as opposed to preseason," Norris said. "We want our focus to be a little different during preseason. We want our international trip to be a good team-bonding experience as well as a good social and cultural experience for the guys. Doing the trip during the spring provides a great opportunity for the guys to see a different culture in terms of soccer, but also a different culture in general."

The Tribe has enjoyed some great success on the field during the international trips. In 2003, W&M went undefeated in its four matches, including wins over Markopoulo, Panathinaikos and Olympiakos. In 1995, the College went undefeated against six first division teams in Bermuda. Charly Franks, a 1981 alumn of the College, hosted the team during its trip to Bermuda.

During the program's second international experience in 1987, the Tribe went 3-0-1 against four of the teams in Jamaica. In fact, the draw came against Seba, Jamaica's top team at the time, in front an estimated 3,500 fans. During that trip, W&M notched wins over Volvo (1-0), Star Cosmos (4-1) and Windsor (3-1).

During W&M's 1999 foreign tour trip, Crystal Palace FC hosted the Tribe. Former Tribe player Mark Goldberg was the Chair of the Football Club during the time. W&M played five matches against professional youth and reserve players from Crystal Palace, Fulham, Millwall and Bristol City.

Athletic Success

A charter member of the CAA in 1986, W&M has been the CAA's most successful program over the past two decades. The 2005-06 year was another banner season for the College, as it added three more conference titles. The Tribe has now captured 84 total CAA Championships since 1986, over 30 more than the closest rival.

Individually, women's tennis standout Megan Moulton-Levy earned All-America honors after advancing to the "Final Four" of the NCAA Singles Tournament.

Academic Excellence

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any scholarship-granting school and of any public university, in the nation among institutions with two or more Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in March of 2005.

This year, the NCAA specifically listed 18 W&M athletic squads as recipients of its public recognition award for 2005-06.

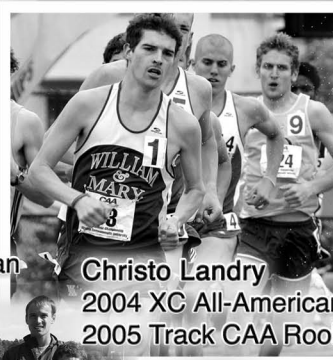
Since 1992, 36 Tribe athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including Keith Bechtol, who was a third team selection in the spring, and since 1996, 39 student-athletes have been members of Phi Beta Kappa.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its 21 sports, and not surprisingly, William and Mary has set the pace with 18.

In addition, three of William and Mary's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a “Public Ivy”; and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).

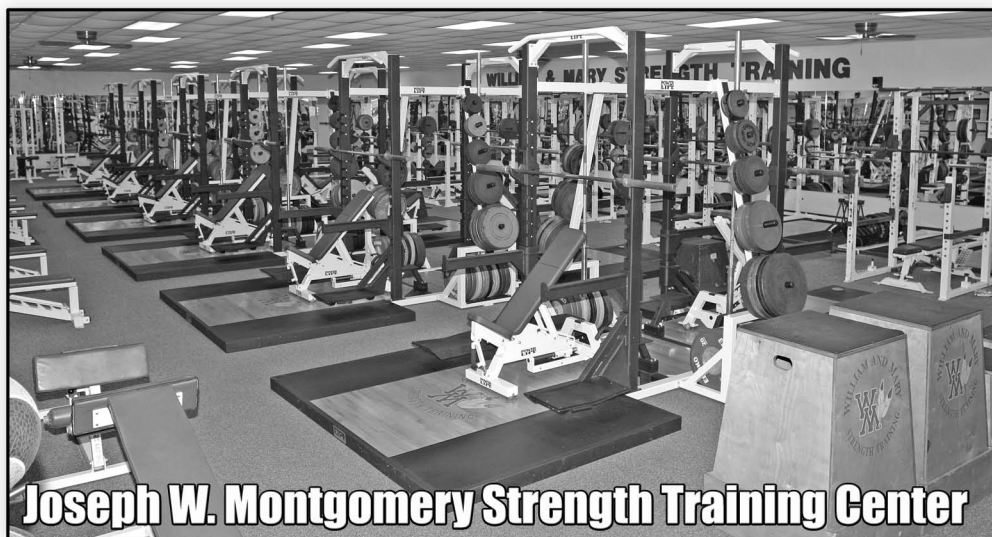

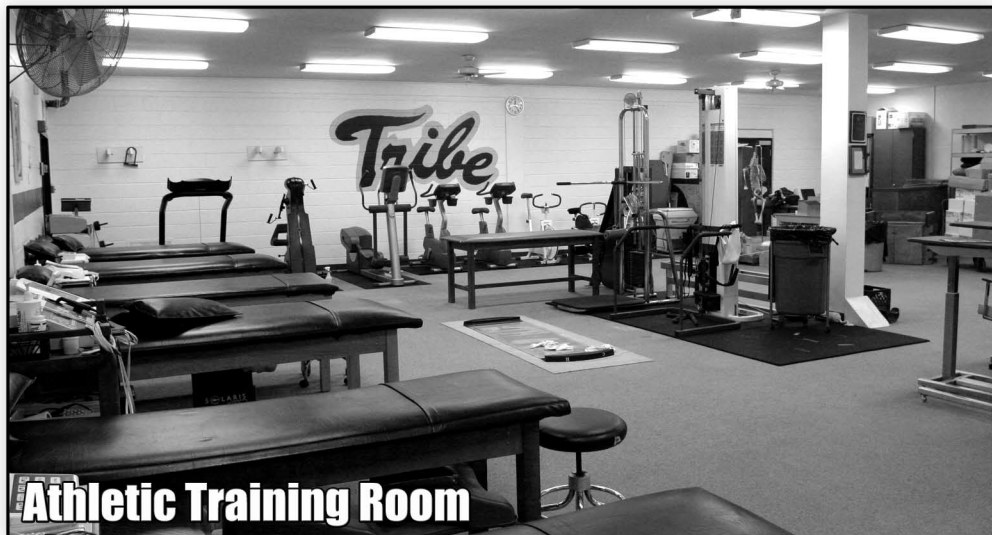
Athletics Department Goals

Sports Psychology

Deidre Connelly, Ph.D., is the College's full-time sports psychologist. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year, at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength and Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

The weight room was upgraded in the spring of 2006, primarily with new Power Lift and Sorinex equipment. The room now contains 16,000 pounds of free weights, over 7,000 pounds of dumbbells and 6,000 pounds of rubber bumper plates. In addition, it has 24 custom-built Olympic platforms, 18 multipurpose power racks and a fully-equipped plyometric area.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and ensure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists.

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

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Gene R. Nichol President

Gene Nichol became the College of William and Mary's 26th president on July 1, 2005. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law

from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law and the law school at the University of Colorado. While at William and Mary, Nichol was the Cutler Professor of Law and director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law. He has also taught at Oxford, Exeter, and the law school of West Virginia University.

Nichol is the co-author of the text *Federal Courts* and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Review*, and the *University of Chicago Law Review*. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the *Encyclopedia of the American Constitution*, and one on the civil rights movement to the *Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court*. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters

before committees of the U.S. Congress and various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.



Sandra Day O'Connor Chancellor

Sandra Day O'Connor, who in July of 2005 announced her intention to retire as Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, was named 23rd Chancellor of the College by the College of William and Mary Board of Visitors on October 4, 2005. Justice O'Connor succeeds Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, former United States Secretary of State, who was appointed in 2000.

The post of Chancellor has been an important one since the College was

chartered in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of Great Britain. Until 1776, the Chancellor was an English subject—usually the Archbishop of Canterbury or the Bishop of London—who served as the College's advocate to the crown, while a colonial president oversaw the day-to-day activities of the Williamsburg campus. Following the Revolutionary War, George Washington was appointed as the first American chancellor; later President John Tyler held the post.

"Through her remarkable combination of wisdom, courage, judgment, and skill, Justice O'Connor has become one of the most influential and effective jurists in American history," said President Gene R. Nichol. "I am thrilled that she is willing to share her ability and rich experience with William and Mary students. As a former constitutional lawyer, I am also honored to welcome one of my heroes to the College community."

The first woman to serve on the United States Supreme Court, Justice O'Connor was born in El Paso, Texas, on March 26, 1930. She earned a B.A. in economics (magna cum laude) from Stanford University, and went on to receive an LL.B. from Stanford Law

School, where she graduated third in her class. Her classmate, the late Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, graduated first in the class.

She served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the Quartermaster Market Center, Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms.

In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Ronald Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, and the couple has three sons: Scott, Brian and Jay.

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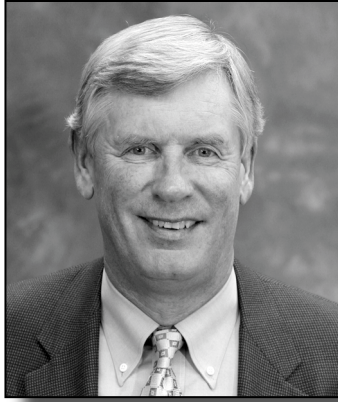
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Terry Driscoll Athletics Director

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 11th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new and refurbished facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe.

In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, former W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). That figure will continue to increase significantly in the future, as Driscoll announced plans last year to build the \$11 million Jimmye Laycock Football Complex at Zable Stadium (see page six). Already, the football program has seen the installation of permanent lighting, a \$650,000 project, and a new state-of-the-art artificial playing surface, Field Turf Pro, a \$840,000 project, at Zable Stadium in the last 10 months.

Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm.

After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host



Barbara Blosser Senior Associate Athletics Director

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed

third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

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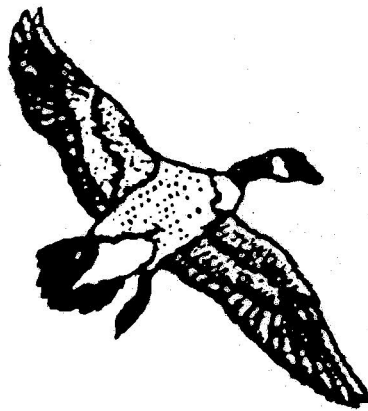
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Since 1988, the "12th Man Club," the fundraising effort of the Tribe Club for men's soccer, has been enhancing the Tribe men's soccer program. In 2005-06, the club raised over \$88,000 for men's soccer, the best year to date. The fundraising money is used by the program to enhance scholarships, halftime receptions, Internet broadcasts, the NSCAA/FSC TV game against Old Dominion in October, supporting the foreign tour, alumni reunions and more.

Over 200 individuals gave to the 12th Man Club in 2005-06, including one of the highest percentages of former players of any team at W&M. In 2004-2005, the percentage of former athletes giving back to the program was the highest of any team. The 12th Man Club's goal for 2006-07 is \$90,000.
