## TRIBE FACES STIFF COMPETITION AT WAKE FOREST ADIDAS CLASSIC

The William and Mary men's soccer team will open the 2006 season in difficult fashion with a pair of contests against top-20 foes at the Wake Forest adidas Classic on Aug. 25-27. The Tribe begins the classic against preseason No. 1 (Soccer America) North Carolina at 5 p.m., on Friday, Aug. 25, at Spry Field in Winston-Salem, N.C. The College will close the classic against host and No. 16 (NSCAA) Wake Forest on Sunday, Aug. 27, at 2:30 p.m. Both contests can be followed live over the Web with Gametracker at WakeForestSports.com.

#### Scouting No. 1 North Carolina

UNC enters the 2006 season as one of the top teams in America, garnering top-five rankings in every major poll. The Tarheels are No. 1 according to *Soccer America*, No. 2 by *Soccer Times*, No. 3 in the *College Soccer News* poll and No. 5 by the NSCAA. In 2005, North Carolina advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament and finished with a 17-4-3 record.

The Tarheels return 10 starters and 16 letterwinners from a season ago, including leading goal scorer Ben Hunter, who finished with 13 goals. UNC is one of three schools with two players named to the Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Trophy watch list for 2006. Senior goal-keeper Justin Hughes and fellow classmate Michael Harrington appear on the 25-player list for the award presented annually to the top player in college soccer.

North Carolina also has three preseason All-Americans. Defender Andre Sherard and Harrington were second and third-team honorees according to *College Soccer News*, while Hunter was a *Soccer America* Preseason All-American. The Tarheels were voted by the ACC coaches as the preseason favorite to win the league title.

W&M and UNC have met on 10 occasions with the Tarheels holding a 9-1 advantage. It will mark only the second time the two teams have met at a neutral site. UNC won in Virginia Beach, Va., on Oct. 2, 2001. Last season, the Tarheels traveled to Williamsburg and walked away with a 3-2 victory. Senior Brendan McCurdy scored one of the two Tribe goals, while junior goalkeeper Brennan Wergley recorded six saves in his first career start.

The Tarheels finished the exhibition season with two ties. UNC played to a 1-1 draw with Davidson on Aug. 13 thanks to a second-half goal from senior defender David Boole. North Carolina also tied Gardner-Webb, 1-1, on Aug. 19. Senior midfielder Corey Ashe notched the Tarheels lone tally against the Bulldogs.

# SCOUTING No. 16 WAKE FOREST

The Demon Deacons return 10 starters from a squad that advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament in 2005. Wake Forest finished the 2005 campaign at 13-8-2. The Demon Deacons have wasted little time getting off to a roaring start in 2006 with a perfect 2-0 ledger during the exhibition portion of their schedule. Wake Forest also is ranked among the top 20 according to every major national poll. Wake Forest is ranked the highest in the NSCAA poll at No. 16, followed by a No. 17



ranking from Soccer Times, a No. 18 spot from Soccer America and a No. 19 ranking from College Soccer News.

Wake Forest opened the exhibition season with a 3-0 victory over CAA foe UNC Wilmington. Freshman Austin da Luz and sophomores Jamie Franks and Marcus Tracy scored in the victory for the Demon Deacons. They made it back-to-back shutouts in their exhibition contests with a 1-0 victory over Furman. Sophomore midfielder Michael Lahoud provided the cushion Wake Forest would need with a goal only 27 seconds into the match.

The Demon Deacons are led by a pair of preseason All-American backs. Junior Julian Valentin earned All-America accolades from *Soccer America*, while senior Ryan Solle was a second-team choice of *College Soccer News*.

The meeting between Wake Forest and W&M will be only the third between the two schools. The Demon Deacons have won the previous two meetings, including a 2-0 victory in Winston-Salem, N.C., during the 2002 campaign.

#### WELCOME BACK

W&M gets a welcomed return for the 2006 season in the form of fifth-year senior forward Pat Scherder. The Vienna, Va., native missed the final 15 games of the 2005 season with an injury after earning first-team all-conference and second-team all-region accolades as a junior in 2004. The speedy forward leads all current Tribe players in career goals with 17.

After enjoying a successful return to the pitch over the summer with the Williamsburg Legacy of the PDL, Scherder wasted little time finding his scoring touch. In the Tribe's lone exhibition of the season, Scherder found the back of the net in the 37th minute against Navy, giving the Tribe a 1-0 cushion.

#### RETURNING THE SCORING PUNCH

The Tribe returns 72.4 percent (21-of-29) of its goals from a season ago. Included in the number are four of the top-five goal scorers and players with the top-three point totals on the team from a season ago. Senior Jarrett Thomas topped the squad in both goals (7) and points (16) a season ago, while sophomores Brock Jones and Andrew Hoxie finished tied for second on the team with five goals apiece. The pair rounded out the top-three point scorers for the Tribe with 12 and 11 points, respectively. Senior Brendan McCurdy ranked fifth on the team a season ago with three goals.

## FRESHMAN TO WATCH

College Soccer News named freshman Roger Bothe as one of its top 100 freshmen to keep an eye on in 2006. The College was one of 59 institutions to have at least one player named to the watch list and one of only three in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA).

Bothe was one of four CAA players to be recognized by *College Soccer News*. Evan Newton of Old Dominion as well as Richard Edger and Sean Kelley of George Mason were also named to the list. Bothe was one of 24 defenders on the top 100 freshmen to watch list.

The 6-2, 170-pound back enjoyed a stellar prep career prior to joining the Tribe. He led his Thomas Dale High School team to back-to-back 24-0 records with a pair of Group AAA State Championships in 2004 and 2005. Bothe garnered the 2005-06 Gatorade Virginia High School Player of the Year award, along with

garnering the Virginia High School Coaches Association (VHSL) Group AAA Male Athlete of the Year honor. He also received Central Region Player of the Year honors and studentsportssoccer.com Second-Team All-America distinction in 2005.

#### ANOTHER ROOKIE TO KEEP AN EYE ON

Rookie Price Thomas earned the start at attacking midfield in the Tribe's lone exhibition against Navy. The Charlottesville, Va., native scored 25 goals and dished out 20 assists during his prep career at Albemarle. Thomas garnered First-Team Commonwealth District honors in 2005 and 2006, as well as All-Northwest Region and All-Central Virginia nods during his junior and senior years of high school. Head coach Chris Norris described Thomas as a player with "flare, creativity and athleticism that has the ability to break down an opponent's defense with and without the ball."

## MAKING THE MOVE

After playing 51 games and scoring eight goals for W&M as a forward, senior Brendan McCurdy moved to center back during the 2006 spring and summer seasons. McCurdy enjoyed success as one of the defensive backbones for the Williamsburg Legacy of the PDL, helping the squad to five shutouts during the regular season.

#### BATTLING No. 1

The Tribe will take on North Carolina for the 11th time on Aug. 25 at the Wake Forest adidas Classic. The Tarheels enter the season at the preseason No. 1 team in the country according to Soccer America. It marks the second time in the last three years that W&M will battle the No.1 team in the country. On Sept. 22, 2004, the Tribe knocked off another ACC foe in then-No. 1 Maryland, 1-0, in double overtime at Albert-Daly Field in Williamsburg.

#### TOUGH SCHEDULE

The schedule for the 2006 season will test the Tribe as half of opponents made an appearance in the 2005 NCAA Tournament. Six of those teams are ranked in the top 25 of either the Soccer America (SA), NSCAA, College Soccer News (CSN) or the Soccer Times (ST) polls, with two others receiving votes in the CSN poll. The ledger will be highlighted by matches against No. 1 (SA)

North Carolina, No. 12 UNC Greensboro (SA), No. 16 (NSCAA) Wake Forest, No. 19 (SA) Virginia Tech, No. 20 (CSN) Old Dominion and No. 24 (NSCAA) South Carolina. Along with the six, James Madison, Hofstra and Stony Brook are Tribe foes that made appearances in the 2005 NCAA Tournament.

#### **DIFFICULT WAY TO START**

The opening of the 2006 season will not be an easy one for the Tribe as each of its first five opponents appeared in the NCAA Tournament a season ago. North Carolina advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament, while Wake Forest made it to the Round of 16. Both Stony Brook and Virginia Tech made it to the second round of the tournament, while South Carolina made the field before falling in the opening round. It marks the first time in school history W&M will not only open the season, but play five-straight regular-season foes that advanced to the NCAA Tournament the previous season.

## BY THE NARROWEST OF MARGINS

With a new season beginning, the Tribe will hope to put the 2005 season far in the rearview due to an uncharacteristic 4-9-5 record during the campaign. While the program's consecutive winning seasons streak of 30 came to a close, the facts support that the Tribe were only a few bounces away from possibly finding themselves in postseason position. First appearances of the 2005 record can be deceiving. During the season, W&M lost five matches to teams ranked in the top 20, including four by a single goal. In all, eight of the team's nine defeats were by a single tally, including a trio of overtime setbacks. Couple those statistics with the fact that just three games into the season, the squad lost its top offensive threat in all-conference and all-region forward Pat Scherder.

#### **PDL Success**

Seven Tribe players played in the United Soccer League's (USL) Premier Development League (PDL) over the summer. Six of those players saw their teams earn a spot in a Eastern Conference playoffs with the Williamsburg Legacy and the Virginia Beach Submariners.

Seniors Jeff Marklin, Brendan McCurdy, Kris Rake and Patrick Scherder along with sophomore Andrew Hoxie played for



the Legacy over the summer. Junior back Chris Wayne saw time with the Submariners, while freshman Roger Bothe played for the Richmond Future Kickers.

The Legacy claimed the lone wild-card spot in the Eastern Conference with 28 points and an 8-4-4 regular season record. The Virginia Beach Submariners earned a playoff bid by winning the Mid-Atlantic Division with 31 points and a 10-5-1 record.

Scherder finished the season second on the Legacy in points (11) and goals (5). He notched a pair of two-goal games for Williamsburg, including the final one against Raleigh Elite on July 21. In the game against Raleigh Elite, the Legacy overcame a threegoal first-half deficit to forge a tie. Scherder scored the final two Legacy goals in the 51st and 54th minutes with Hoxie assisting on the final goal. McCurdy also notched an assist in the comeback helping on the Legacy's first goal in the 36th minute. In total, Scherder started all 15 games in which he appeared, racking up 1074 minutes.

Hoxie played 12 games for the Legacy with eight starts. The 2005 CAA All-Rookie Team selection ranked third on the team with seven points and second with three assists. He earned PDL Team of the Week honors with five points on two goals and an assists against the Richmond Kickers on July 23. He scored the eventual game-winner in the 51st minute as the Legacy clinched a playoff berth.

Marklin, McCurdy and Rake were key contributors to the Legacy's defense. Overall, Williamsburg finished the regular season with a goals against average of 1.25 and five shutouts. During the 16-game slate, the Legacy only allowed 20 goals, which ranked 14th in the 59-team PDL and third in the Eastern Conference.

Marklin played in 11 matches with seven starts, totaling 701 minutes in the Legacy defense. McCurdy was a constant for the Williamsburg squad in the back as he started 16 matches and played the maximum 1440 minutes during those contests.

Rake started the first seven games of the season for the Legacy in goal. He amassed a 3-1-3 record with an impressive goals against average of 0.86. He notched 36 saves with three shutouts. Rake blanked three of the Legacy's first four opponents.

Wayne appeared in 10 matches with five starts for Virginia Beach. He totaled 387 minutes of action and notched a goal from his back position. His goal capped a 4-0 victory over the West Virginia Chaos on July 19.

Bothe started the final three games of the season for the Richmond Kickers Future. In total, Bothe played in four matches and 272 minutes at back.

#### RECAPPING THE NAVY EXHIBITION

The William and Mary men's soccer team played to a 1-1 tie with Navy in its lone exhibition tune up of 2006 on Aug. 19 thanks to a goal from fifth-year senior forward Pat Scherder. The Tribe used a relentless first-half attack to find the scoring column, before Navy forged the draw with an early second-half goal.

The Tribe controlled the majority of the action during the opening 45 minutes, outshooting the Midshipmen, 12-2. Junior midfielder Doug Ernst had four attempts for the Green and Gold in the opening half, including two shots on frame. In the 15th minute, Ernst saw his cut-back attempt clang off the near post from the left side.

Five minutes later, it appeared the Tribe would get on the scoreboard. Ernst ripped a shot from the left side of the 18 to the

far post. The Navy goalkeeper did well to parry the ball to the left, but the rebound ended up on the foot of sophomore midfielder Brock Jones, who lifted a shot high over the crossbar from eight yards out.

W&M finally broke through in the 37th minute on Scherder's goal. With space in the middle of the pitch, sophomore forward Andrew Hoxie led Scherder down the left side. Scherder cut back to the right and beat the Navy goalkeeper into the right side of the net.

The Tribe nearly took a 2-0 lead thanks to some sloppy Navy defense early in the second half. With the goalkeeper coming out to corral a loose ball, a Navy defender headed the ball toward the Midshipmen goal in an attempt to gain possession. The ball narrowly missed crossing the goal line before the Navy goal-keeper punched the ball from the mouth of the goal.

Navy pulled even with a long ball in the 51st minute. Back Chris Schneider sent a long pass down the middle of field. Forward Doug DeVuono settled the ball, cut to the left and found the back of the net past diving senior goalkeeper Kris Rake.

In the 87th minute, freshman midfielder Rob Godwin broke open down the right side. He centered the pass to Hoxie, who beat a defender to the left. The Newport News, Va., native lifted a shot over the onrushing goalkeeper, but the ball bounced off the crossbar, denying the scoring chance.

The Tribe finished the contest with a 17-4 shot advantage, including a 5-2 cushion in shots on goal. Junior Brennan Wergley played the opening 45 minutes in net for the Tribe without seeing an attempt on goal. Rake played the entire second half and made one save.
