Coach Daub Resume

Boasting a wealth of coaching and playing experience, two-time CAA Coach of the Year Peter Daub brings an impeccable list of credentials to William and Mary. As he enters his 12th season with the College, his knowledge, work ethic and enthusiasm will continue to lead the program towards a bright future.

Under his tutelage, the Tribe continues to improve, with the team reaching the finals of the CAA Championship in four of the past six seasons. Last season, W&M achieved a number of milestones in its quest for national prominence. The Tribe upset Tennessee on the road, 4-3, in the program's first win over an SEC team in more than 30 years. W&M also stunned Virginia Commonwealth with a 4-3 win in Richmond, handing the seventh-ranked Rams their first-ever loss in CAA play, as the Tribe earned its first win over a top 10 team since the inception of the current ranking system.

Individually, the Tribe excelled as well. Jeff Kader led the way by becoming the first W&M player to compete at the ITA National Indoor Championship, where he upset Alex Vlaski (Washington), the nation's fourth-ranked player. Kader also defeated No. 6 Bo Hodge (Georgia) on the road in the regular season and went on to compete at the NCAA Singles Championship. In all, five players were named to All-CAA honors, including Kader, who earned first team honors in singles and Steven Kane and Geoff Russell picked to the first team in doubles.

Daub's Expertise — "Wild and Crazy Doubles"

As successful as the entire William and Mary program has been under Coach Daub, the quality of doubles has been highly productive on the pro and college level. If Coach Daub has a specialty within his coaching skills, it is in the area of doubles, where he has coached players to the round of 16 at Wimbledon twice. He has also coached the United States doubles team to a gold medal at the World Games in Japan.

In the 2001 spring season, he guided W&M in capturing an incredible 20 of 25 doubles points in team competition. Also that year the 26th-ranked team of Patrick Brown and Trevor Spracklin combined for an impressive 17-3 record at No. 1 doubles and defeated Texas in the first round of the NCAAs. Daub's slogan of "Wild and Crazy Doubles" revolves around constant movement and motion in a very aggressive, structured atmosphere.



In 2003, three singles players and two doubles teams received all-league honors, and in 2001, the Tribe doubles team of Patrick Brown and Trevor Spracklin advanced to the second round of the NCAA Individual Tournament, the first for a W&M duo under the current structure. In 1999 when Daub won his first CAA Coach of the Year award, he also led the team to its eighth NCAA Tournament appearance.

Prior to his arrival at W&M, Daub spent two years as the assistant coach at the University of Georgia, where he helped the Bulldogs achieve No. 4 and No. 2 national rankings and a showing at the 1993 NCAA Championship finals. In 1995, he coached the United States to a gold medal at the World University

Temple University. Daub coached at Redlands College for two seasons, and was the men's head coach at Temple from 1982 through 1989, also leading the women's team starting in 1985. His players on the combined teams won the "Highest Student-Athlete GPA Award" for averaging over a 3.0 GPA for eight semesters.

Daub has been the featured speaker at various national clinics, seminars and college showcases, including the USTA and USPTA national conventions and the ITA Coaches Convention. At the 1997 and 2000 U.S. Opens, Daub gave two clinics at the USTA Tennis Teachers Conference. He also has served as the coach of the Mid-Atlantic section at the Junior Davis Cup. A former coach and captain of varsity tennis at Findlay, Daub competed internationally on various professional circuits, winning titles in Australia and New Zealand.

Daub lives in Williamsburg with his wife Ruth, a former touring professional, who in 2001 won the Virginia state 45 and over singles championship. The couple has a daughter, Kate, and son, Doug, who won the 2000 high school state doubles title.

This season, Marcos Asse begins his first year as the assistant men's tennis coach at William and Mary.

Asse graduated from the University of Florida in 2003 with a degree in finance and played four years on the men's tennis team, helping to lead the Gators to a Southeastern Conference championship in 2000. He had served as the head tennis professional at the Westside Tennis Park in Gainesville, Florida since the fall of 2001 and was also the head girls' tennis coach at Oak Hall High School last spring. Asse was the No. 1 singles player in the state of Florida for most of 2002 in the United States Tennis Association men's open rankings.

"Marcos played at the University of Florida when they were ranked No. 2 in the country, and was coached by one of the all-time great college coaches in Ian Duvenhage. Marcos will bring that experience and coaching style to the W&M program, as well as the ability to instill the mental confidence, composure and poise that this team requires to have a great season."

7. What is the environmental quality of the school and surrounding area?

Season Outlook



The 2003-04 season was a positive one in many ways for the William and Mary men's tennis program in terms of both individual and team accomplishments. Ending the season ranked 44th in the nation, the highest final national ranking for the Tribe since the current system began in 1977, W&M posted a 12-12 record on the year against a schedule loaded with some of the top teams in the nation. The Green and Gold made a strong statement early in the season, recording the first win over a Southeastern Conference team in more than 30 years, with a 4-3 win at Tennessee. The best was yet to come, however, as the College produced one of the biggest upsets in the nation to close out the regular season. Again on the road, W&M defeated seventh-ranked Virginia Commonwealth, 4-3, the first time the Rams had lost to a Colonial Athletic Association opponent since joining the league in 1996—a stretch of 60 straight matches. The win also gave the Tribe its first win over a top 10 opponent under the current ITA ranking structure. In March, the Tribe was picked as the recipient of the ITA National Team Sportsmanship Award, which is awarded to just one of the more than 1,200 college tennis teams in the nation each month.

W&M also had impressive individual accomplishments, led by the efforts of current senior Jeff Kader, who reached the finals of the ITA Mideast Region Championship, earning him a spot in the ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships. There, he produced what was likely the biggest singles upset in the nation in 2004, as Kader, ranked 96th in the nation at the time, defeated the country's fourth-ranked player, Alex Vlaski of Washington, in straight sets in the first round. Kader also upset No. 6 Bo Hodge (Georgia) in a dual match on the road and became the first W&M player to earn a berth in the NCAA Singles Tournament in more than 50 years. In all, the College had five players earn All-CAA honors at the end of the season, while pulling in two league singles player of the week and an incredible four of the seven CAA Doubles Team of the Week honors that were handed out.

By most standards, the Tribe's 2004 season would have been labeled a terrific success. However, neither W&M head coach Peter Daub, nor any of the team's five returning players, are satisfied with last season's achievements.

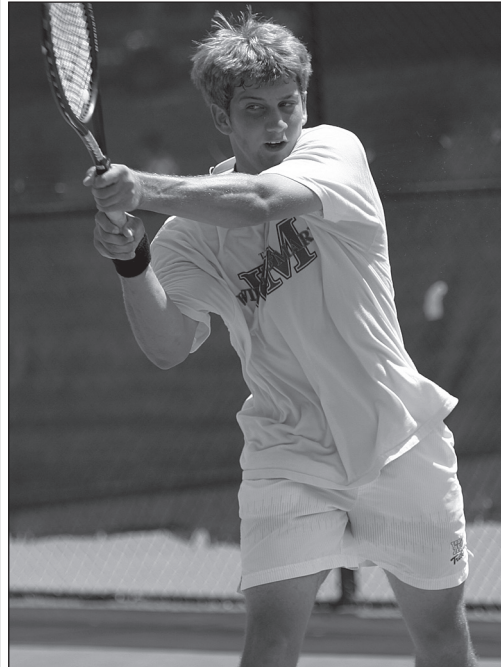
"I want us to go from good to great," said Daub, entering his 12th season at the College. "I want us to have a vision of climbing tough mountains and overcoming challenges. I want us to have the passion to get to the top and to be focused on improving in each and every practice."

Leading the way for the Tribe will be its tremendous three-member senior class of Kader, Alex Fish and Sean Kelleher. The trio have already combined for 185 singles wins, 184 doubles victories and 10 All-CAA awards, cementing a legacy as the most successful class of players in Daub's W&M career. The three will undoubtedly be instrumental in leading the Tribe to greatness this season.

"Our seniors need to empower themselves to rely on the experience they have gained in their three

years and to use that to help lead this team towards new heights in our program," said Daub.

Kader will be expected to improve on his breakout junior year, which saw him end the season ranked 60th in the nation and ninth in the Mideast Region in singles. He won a total of seven matches against ranked opponents, including his two victories over top-10 opponents, Vlaski and Hodge, earning berths in two of the three national singles events, the ITA National Indoor Championship and the NCAA Tournament. Third on the club with 21 singles wins,

Kader was no slouch in doubles either, leading the Tribe with 21 doubles wins.

The Tribe's emotional leader is Fish, a steady presence throughout his career. He currently leads all active players and is ninth in school history with 62 career doubles wins, earning second team all-league honors in 2003. Fish won three singles matches and teamed with Kader for three doubles victories in the qualifying round of the ITA Regionals. The pair opened the fall by winning their first seven doubles contests, as they won their flight of the Virginia Invitational.

A first or second team All-CAA selection in both singles and doubles every season of his career, Kelleher led W&M with 24 singles victories, while also adding 18 doubles victories. He ended the 2004 season on an incredible hot streak, winning 14 of his last 17 singles matches, all at the No. 2 position. The 2002 CAA Co-Rookie of the Year, Kelleher had a 15-8 singles record and a 15-9 doubles mark in dual matches last year.

Stephen Ward, the only junior on the team, has also been a valuable asset during his time at the College and currently is fourth in school history

with a .662 career singles winning percentage. Winning at least 20 singles matches in each of his first two seasons, he was second on the team with 22 in 2004, as he ended the year by winning his last five singles contests. Also a good doubles player, Ward earned second team all-conference doubles honors with Kelleher, as the two were 9-3 in dual matches.

Rounding out the list of returning players is sophomore Colin O'Brien, a left-handed player with a big serve who is also an outstanding student, earning ITA Scholar-Athlete recognition as a rookie. O'Brien won his first four, and seven of his first eight singles matches in the fall. He saw limited action in spring matches, but performed well when the call came, as he filled in for an injured Ward in the middle of the spring to record a 4-3 doubles record with Kelleher at the No. 2 position.

The five returning players will be immediately pressured for spots in the starting lineup by an outstanding four-player freshman class, one of the best groups of rookies in Daub's tenure. A four-year No. 1 player from Hallandale, Florida, Alexandru Cojanu was a state champion and was named his high school's all-sports MVP, while compiling a 45-3 record. Matt Rubenstein comes to Williamsburg from East Hampton, New York, where he was ranked 212th in the nation in boys' 18s and earned all-state honors while going undefeated in dual matches as a junior. Kavi Sud is from Allentown, Pennsylvania, where he was ranked 131st in the nation and earned Boys' Tennis Player and Athlete of the Year accolades from the Morning Call. Completing the list of impressive rookies is local player Peter Szweczyk, from Yorktown, Virginia, who was undefeated in district play throughout his career.

As is always the case, Daub has set up a formidable lineup of opponents for the Tribe to face in 2005. Never one to shy away from tough competition, he has created a schedule in which 19 of the 21 scheduled opponents, including all 17 of W&M's non-conference foes, either ended the year nationally-ranked or competed in the NCAA Tournament, not counting the teams that the College will face in the prestigious Blue-Gray Classic.

"We probably have one of the toughest schedules in the country," commented Daub. "We're playing perennially good teams, including Stanford and Georgia. My goal each year is to put together the toughest teams in the country, yet still keep our academic integrity with a small number of missed classes. The nice thing about our schedule this year is that we'll be loaded with 15 home matches."

Although Daub believes that his team can compete and flourish against the challenging lineup, he knows that it will require every member of the program to constantly focus on achieving their goals.

"I want the challenge of climbing mountains to be paramount in our minds," said Daub. "Nothing will be easy—we're going to have to earn our success. I believe that with this attitude, we will improve on our 2004 season, which we ended with the highest national ranking since I came to W&M. Last year we were good, but this year, we can be great."

The pair opened the season with seven straight victories, winning the second flight of the Virginia Invitational and taking three matches to advance to the main draw of the ITA Mideast Region Championships ... They teamed up to win their first three dual matches, defeating opponents from Hawaii, San Diego State and Boise State ... Won his 50th career doubles match, as he and Kader defeated Duke's Chris Brown and Ryan Heinberg, 8-3, in the first round of the ITA Regional Tournament Qualifying Draw on October 22 ... With Kader, clinched the doubles point in close wins over Middle Tennessee (3/13) and Brown (3/31).

Second team All-CAA in doubles with Geoff Russell ... Led the team with 27 doubles wins, the fifth-best total in school history ... Won his singles and doubles matches in W&M's 4-3 win against Yale ... 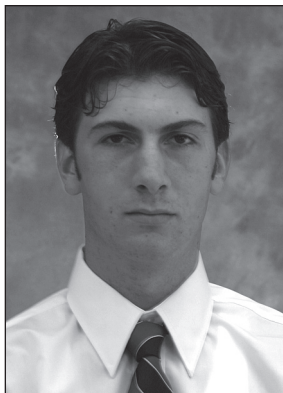

2003-04 Season Review



Tribe Ends 2004 With Highest Final National Ranking

The William and Mary men's tennis team was ranked 44th in the final 2004 ITA National Rankings. The ranking is the Tribe's best finish under the current system, which has been in place since the 1977 season. The College's previous high was 50th in 1999, when the team ended with a record of 17-11 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. W&M was nationally ranked all season, reaching a high of 38th on April 20.

Jeff Kader Upsets Two Top-10 Opponents, Earns Berth in NCAA Tournament

Senior **Jeff Kader** earned the program's first spot in the NCAA Singles Tournament under the current structure after an outstanding season in which he defeated seven nationally-ranked opponents, including two in the top 10. Ranked 96th in the nation at the time, Kader entered the ITA Mideast Championships as the tournament's No. 9 seed. He won his first two matches, before advancing to the quarterfinals, where he upset the tournament's No. 1 seed, 22nd ranked Mat Cloer (Florida State). The following day he upset No. 80 Clayton Almeida (Winthrop), before eventually advancing to the finals. By reaching the regional finals, Kader earned an automatic berth into the ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships, the first W&M men's player to be selected for the national tournament. There, he became just the fourth player in the history of the event to knock off the tournament's top seed in the first round, defeating fourth-ranked Alex Vlaski (Washington) in straight sets. Kader was ranked as high as 26th in the country in the spring season, when he defeated three more nationally-ranked opponents, including No. 6 Bo Hodge (Georgia) on the road.

W&M Ends VCU's 60-Match CAA Winning Streak

In the Green and Gold's final match of the regular season, the Tribe defeated No. 7 Virginia Commonwealth, 4-3, on the road. The loss was the Rams' first against a Colonial Athletic Association opponent since joining the league in 1996, ending a streak of 60 consecutive victories. The win was also W&M's first over a top-10 team since the inception of the current ITA ranking system. The 2004 season also saw the College record its first victory over a Southeastern Conference opponent in more than 30 years, with a 4-3 decision on the road against No. 54 Tennessee.

Green and Gold Win National Sportsmanship Award

In March of 2004, the ITA announced that W&M was the recipient of the ITA National Team Sportsmanship Award for that month. The Tribe was nominated for the honor by Greg Patton, the head coach at Boise State. Each month during the spring season, more than 1,200 ITA member institutions (NCAA Divisions I, II and III, NAIA and Junior College) are eligible for the single award that is handed out.

W&M Dominate CAA Doubles Honors

This season the CAA began issuing weekly awards for the singles player and doubles team of the week during the spring. In the seven weeks that the league handed out the award, W&M won four times, with **Steven Kane** and **Geoff Russell** winning three times and **Sean Kelleher** and **Stephen Ward** winning once. Kane and Russell earned first team All-CAA honors and ended the year ranked 55th in the nation with a record of 16-12, including a victory over No. 3 Zoltan Csanadi/Izak van der Merwe (Old Dominion) in the top flight finals of the 2003 Virginia Invitational.

Gardner Larned Inducted into ITA Hall of Fame

W&M's season was so good that even players from more than 50 years ago earned national recognition. 1950 graduate and long-time Tribe tennis supporter **Gardner Larned** was inducted posthumously into the ITA Men's Tennis Hall of Fame in May of 2004. Larned helped the Tribe win the 1947 NCAA Championship, while also winning the national singles championship and the Southern Conference singles and doubles (with **Bernard "Tut" Bartzen**) that year. Bartzen was previously inducted into the ITA Hall of Fame in 1985.

1947 and 1948 Men's Tennis National Champions

The College of William and Mary's 1946-47 men's tennis team posted the finest record in Tribe history when it claimed the team title at the National Intercollegiate Tournament in Los Angeles, in June of 1947. The netters, coached by Dr. Sharvy G. Umbeck, tallied 10 points to clinch first-place honors. Leading the way for the Tribe was Gardner Larned, who won the national singles title that same year by defeating Vic Seixas of North Carolina 6-3, 9-11, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1. Other members of the 1947 team included Tut Bartzten, Fred Kovaleski, Bob Doll, Bren Macken, Howe Atwater, Lyman Chennault, Dick Randell, Jim Macken, George Fricke, Bill Ozenberger and Bob Galloway.

In 1948, Kovelski and team captain Bartzten, returning as the nation's fourth- and fifth-ranked players, guided the Tribe to its second-straight national team title. In addition, the duo captured the national doubles championship, a feat that has yet to be repeated in William and Mary men's tennis history.

The College of William and Mary - The Best Small Public University in the United States

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler. The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

Tribe Athletics

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2003-04 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe captured six CAA titles to push its total to a dominant 76, 26 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Tournaments, highlighted by Ramon Jackson's national championship on the parallel bars. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top 100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. Punctuating this run is the College's 58th-place ranking for the 2002-03 campaign, marking the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or second in the

Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. 83% of all athletes earn a degree while a formidable 36 athletes have been selected Academic All-America since 1992.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor, more than any other school. The College continued to set the standard in 2003-04 with another five athletes claiming the honor: Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Otstot (men's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf).



The 2002 CAA Co-Rookie of the Year, **Sean Kelleher** is a four-time All-CAA selection in his career. Last season he was named CAA Singles Player of the Week on March 30 and, along with Stephen Ward, was selected as the league's doubles team of the week on April 6.

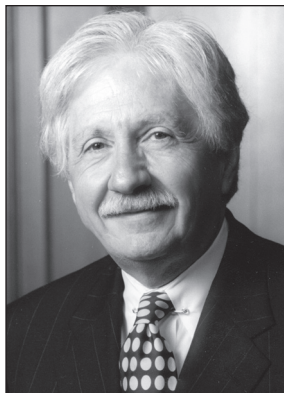

Timothy Sullivan
President

Timothy J. Sullivan first came to William and Mary as a freshman in 1962. He left four years later with a bachelor's degree in government, a Phi Beta Kappa key and membership in Omicron Delta Kappa.

Sullivan was elected president of the College on April 9, 1992 by the Board of Visitors and was sworn in as president on June 1, just eight months before the College began its 300th anniversary celebration.

Sullivan's life has been intimately linked with William and Mary. His wife, Anne Doubet Klare, was a fellow member of the class of 1966. Like other William and Mary alumni, they were married in the chapel of the Sir Christopher Wren Building.

After receiving a law degree from Harvard University in 1969, Sullivan went on to serve in the Army Signal Corps in Vietnam, where he received the Army Commendation Medal, First Oak Leaf Cluster and Bronze Star.

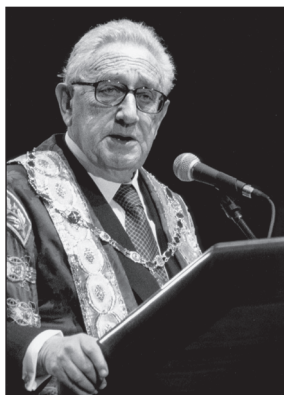
Sullivan came back to William and Mary in 1972 as an assistant professor at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law where he specialized in teaching contract law. He rose quickly, becoming an associate law professor in 1974, then full professor and associate dean in 1977.

In 1981 and 1982, he was visiting law professor at the University of Virginia School of Law. He served for nearly three years as executive assistant for policy for then-Governor Charles S. Robb. Sullivan returned to Marshall-Wythe in 1984, as the John Stewart Bryan Professor of Jurisprudence. He became dean of the law school in July 1985. He is a member of the Virginia

State Bar and the Ohio State Bar and a Fellow of the Virginia Bar Foundation and the American Bar Foundation, and he currently serves on the Board of Directors of the American Arbitration Association.

Sullivan was given the Freedom of the Drapers' Company in London in November 1992. In April 1993 he received an LLD (hon.) from the University of Aberdeen. He received the Outstanding Virginian Award from the Virginia 4-H Foundation in 1999.

Active in public service, Sullivan has been executive director of the Governor's Commission on Virginia's Future, counsel for the Commission on the Future of the Virginia Judicial System, a member of the Virginia Board of Education and the Governor's Task Force on Substance Abuse and Sexual Assault on Campus. In addition, he was appointed by Governor L. Douglas Wilder as chair of the Governor's Task Force on Intercollegiate and Interscholastic Athletics. President Sullivan served as chair of the Council of Presidents for 1998 and 1999.



Henry Kissinger
Chancellor

Soldier, statesman, academician, author, peacemaker Henry A. Kissinger was installed February 10, 2001, as the 22nd Chancellor of the College of William and Mary. The former U.S. Secretary of State and Nobel Peace Prize winner also delivered the Charter Day address. Mr. Kissinger,

who succeeded Margaret, The Lady Thatcher, as chancellor was selected by the Board of Visitors to a seven-year term that began July 1, 2000. Mr. Kissinger will officiate at ceremonies such as the spring commencement and future Charter Day celebrations, which commemorate the College's founding in 1693. He will also help the College extend its international reach by guiding the establishment of relationships with institutions and people around the globe.

The College's charter established the position of chancellor, stating that the role should go to "one eminent and discreet person," who would serve as the College's representative to the English crown. During the pre-Revolutionary war era, either the Bishop of London or the Archbishop of Canterbury held the position. The first American chancellor was George Washington, who served from 1788 until his death in 1799.

Born in 1923 in Furth, Germany, Mr. Kissinger immigrated to the United States in 1938 to escape Nazi persecution. After studying accounting at the

City College of New York, he served in the U.S. Army and the military government of the defeated Germany after World War II.

In 1969, President Richard M. Nixon appointed him Assistant for National Security Affairs, and subsequently head of the National Security Council and Secretary of State, a post he held until 1976.

During his time with the government, Mr. Kissinger led efforts to establish detente with the former Soviet Union, opened the People's Republic of China to the outside world for the first time since Mao Tse Tung came to power in 1949, helped limit the spread of nuclear weapons, helped resolve some of the differences between the Arabs and Israelis, and played a vital role in bringing an end to the war in Vietnam.

For his efforts to end the war in Vietnam, Mr. Kissinger and his North Vietnamese counterpart, Le Duc Tho, were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Today Kissinger is an international consultant and author.

Athletics Administration



Terry Driscoll Director of Athletics

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his eighth year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$6 million in facilities, including the new Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 76 CAA Championships coming into the 2003-04 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 28, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 24, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



Barbara Blosser Sr. Executive Associate AD

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior executive associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head

women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the

John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASIS Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978. In 1993, she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.



Student-Athlete Support



Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.



Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



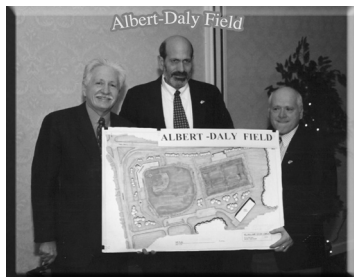
Facilities

William and Mary lost a favorite son on May 16, 2003, with the death of **Mark Hume McCormack**, a 1951 graduate of the College. McCormack had been in coma since January after suffering a heart attack. Named by ESPN as one of the century’s most influential people in the business of sport, he revolutionized the world of sports marketing with the founding of International Management Group (IMG).

A devoted and dedicated supporter of Tribe athletics, he and his wife, Betsy Nagelsen founded W&M’s McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, endowed a tennis scholarship and were continuing sponsors of the ITA Women’s Tennis Hall of Fame. Also a member of W&M’s Board of Visitors, McCormack chaired the College’s fund-raising campaign in 1993 that raised \$153 million and was the honorary chair of the College’s current \$500 million campaign.

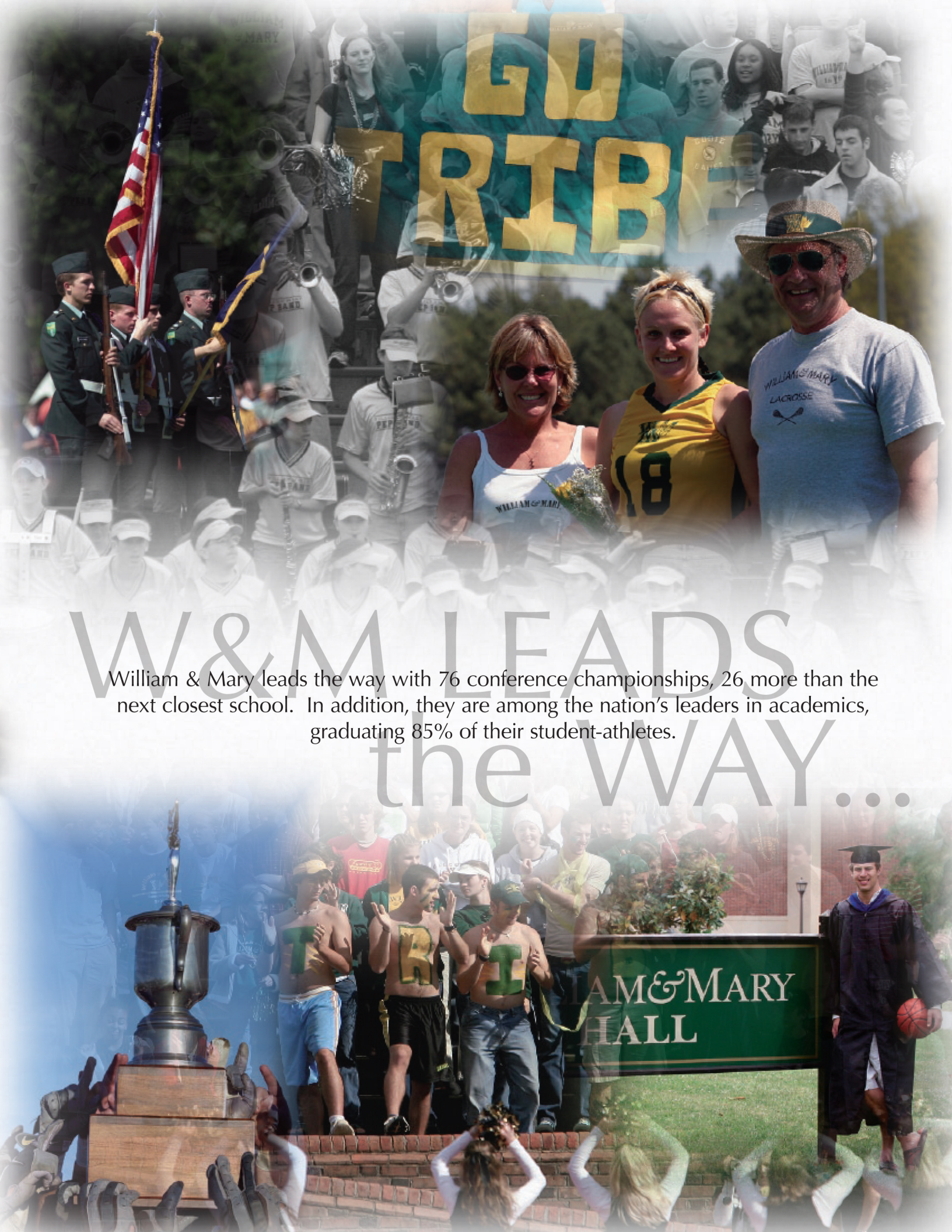


Mark McCormack with W&M’s Director of Special Projects Millie West and President Timothy J. Sullivan.
