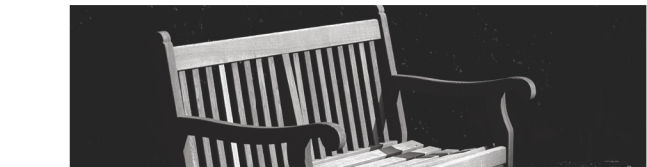

# The College of

The first honorary degree from the College, a Master of Arts, was conferred upon Benjamin Franklin on April 2, 1756.

# William & Mary

Four Presidents of the United States benefited from educational programs offered by the College: George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

Chartered in 1693, the College was founded nearly four decades before Georgia, the last of the original 13 American colonies, was chartered by King George II in 1732.

## Facts About The College

- W&M was founded in 1693 and is the second-oldest educational institution in the United States.
- W&M was the highest ranked small public university in the country according to U.S. News and World Report.
- W&M ranked 16th in graduation rates for national universities.
- W&M was given the highest rating of academics, five stars, by the Fiske Guide to Colleges.
- W&M has a student/faculty ratio of 12/1.
- More W&M graduates go on to earn doctorates than any other university in Virginia.
- W&M students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in American, in 1776.
- In the inaugural NCAA Academic Progress Report, W&M boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

The Sunken Gardens' design was based on the gardens behind Chelsea Hospital in London, England. During the Revolutionary War, Patrick Henry selected the site as a place for the encampment of militia destined to join Washington's Continental Army in the North and later served as a bivouac area for many soldiers preparing to fight the British at Yorktown.

Constructed between 1695 and 1699, the Wren Building is the oldest academic building in the United States. The building was originally designed to be the whole college, including a dining hall, dorm rooms and classrooms.

The "F.H.C." society was formed at the College on November 11, 1750. This was the first student secret society in America and the forerunner of the American fraternity system.

When the capitol of Virginia was moved from Jamestown to Williamsburg in 1699, the Wren Building served as temporary headquarters of the colonial government from 1700 until 1704.

The Crim Dell was a gift from the class of 1964 to preserve the natural beauty of the area and is a memorial to John W.H. Crim, a nationally known attorney who was a benefactor to the College of William and Mary.

# Season Outlook

Despite early struggles in close matches against tough competition, last season ended as one of the most successful in head coach **Peter Daub's** William and Mary career. The Tribe won its first Colonial Athletic Association championship since 1990, knocking off nine-time defending champion Virginia Commonwealth in the finals. Having won seven of its last eight matches, the Green and Gold entered its first NCAA tournament since 1999, where the Tribe nearly pulled off what would have been the biggest upset in the postseason, before suffering a loss to a top 25 opponent.

Individually, the Tribe also performed well, led by 2005 graduate Jeff Kader. Proving a maxim that held true for the entire team—good things come to those who wait—Kader knocked off both of the CAA's Co-Players of the Year with straight-set singles wins in the last two rounds of the conference tournament. He went 3-0 in

both singles and doubles at the event, leading the College to the league title and earning a selection as the most outstanding performer of the tournament. Just the second player in W&M to history to compete for the NCAA singles title, he became the first to make two appearances with his selection in 2005. Including CAA Co-Rookie of the Year Alex Cojanu, who earned second team all-league honors in doubles, the Tribe totaled five entries on the All-CAA teams.

This season the Tribe will look to build on last year's accomplishments while attempting to replace one of the most successful senior classes in school history. Daub and second-year assistant coach **Marcos Asse** believe that the five returning players, along with a very good three-player freshman class, have the potential to meet and exceed the standard set last season.

## Returning Players

The only senior on the team is **Stephen Ward**, who enters the 2005-06 season fourth in school history with a .653 singles winning percentage. After a rough start in the spring season, when he was hampered by injuries and missed nearly all of the month of February, he came on strong when it mattered at the end of the year. He won 10 of 13 singles matches after returning to the lineup, ending the year by winning seven of eight. Included in the late-season comeback were wins in both of his completed matches at the Blue-Gray Classic, along with a win against Texas A&M-Corpus Christi in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Most important, though, was his straight-set win against VCU in the conference tournament, which put the Tribe just one point away from its eventual championship. Also a strong doubles player, Ward teamed up with 2005 graduate Sean Kelleher to win all-league honors for the third straight season, earning a pick as the CAA doubles team of the week after upsetting 16th-ranked Dias Doskarayev/Clinton Jacobs to clinch the doubles point

in W&M's win over No. 36 South Alabama.

**Colin O'Brien** is the lone junior on the team and is poised to have a breakout season. A two-time Intercollegiate Tennis Association Scholar-Athlete selection, O'Brien was a second team all-conference pick in singles. He won two of his three matches against nationally ranked opponents, upsetting No. 68 Brett Ross (Wake Forest) and No. 92 Phil Sheng (Stanford), both on the road. O'Brien also had success in doubles, as he and Alex Fish teamed up to nearly upset

two-time NCAA final four participants KC Corkery/Sam Warburg (Stanford), ranked No. 2 in the nation at the time. They clinched the crucial doubles point in all three CAA Tournament victories, including a marathon 16-14 tie-break victory in the championship match against VCU.

Leading the three-player sophomore class is **Alex Cojanu**, the conference's co-rookie of the year in 2005. Cojanu led the team with 25 wins each in singles and doubles, ranking among the top 10 freshmen in school history. He won 10 of 12 singles matches near the end of the fall, reaching the finals of his flight in two tournaments. In the spring he picked up his first career singles win over a ranked opponent, defeating No. 70 Brian Hung (Michigan) in straight sets. Cojanu went on to win seven of his last eight singles matches in the spring including a straight-set win over No. 98 Sergi Arumi (VCU) in the regular season. He came from behind to clinch W&M's

league tournament semifinal win against Old Dominion and also posted a straight-set win in the NCAA Tournament.

Cojanu's doubles play was also outstanding, earning all-league honors with Kader, as the pair posted a 17-4 record. They won eight of their first nine matches in the fall, advancing to the quarterfinals of the ITA Mideast region championship with a win over 10th-ranked Jeff Gros-limond/Chris Westerhof (Florida State). After dropping their first two matches in the spring, the pair ran off an eight-match winning streak to end the season. They beat teams from Louisville, South Alabama and Virginia Commonwealth (twice) during that stretch, which ended with a win in the NCAA Tournament.

An outstanding athlete, **Matt Rubenstein** won eight singles matches in the spring, including victories over players from Boise State, Harvard and Notre Dame. He posted two wins over Old Dominion's Juliano Cirimbelli, including a important victory in the conference tournament semifinals. He won five doubles matches in the fall with O'Brien and the two advanced to the finals of the top flight at the Hampton Roads Collegiate Invitational.

Also looking to see more time in the lineup is sophomore **Kavi Sud**, one of the hardest workers on the team. Sud opened his college career by winning three straight matches at Notre Dame's Tom Fallon Invitational and also posted wins over Wake Forest and Winthrop in spring dual matches. He joined Cojanu in winning three of their four doubles matches at the Hampton Roads Collegiate Invitational and also went 3-1 with Kelleher in the spring.

## Freshmen

Daub and Asse have brought in three very good freshmen to join the team's five returning players. **Billy Mulligan** won two Florida state championships in high school. Earlier this year, he reached the singles quarterfinals at the Florida Open Championships and upset the nation's second-seeded player on his way to a 5-2 record at the USTA Spring National Championships.

**Dominic Pagon** is a native of Jamaica, who has been ranked as high as 180th in the ITA World Junior rankings. The highest ranked junior in the Caribbean and Central America region at one point this spring, he was consistently the No. 1 ranked junior in Jamaica. Pagon was selected to be on the Jamaican Davis Cup team and played on the ITF team in 2004 and 2005 in Europe and Africa. With experience playing in tournaments around the world, he has reached the finals of events in Costa Rica, Panama and Tunisia.

Rounding out the freshman class is **Alexander Zuck**. A four-time first team all-state selection in New Jersey, he reached at least the round of 16 in singles at two USTA National Opens, losing to top-seven players in each. Zuck went 6-2 at the 2004 Bush Florida Open and won five singles matches at the November 2004 USTA National Open.

## Schedule

Daub believes that in order for players and teams to improve, they must match up against the best in the nation. Once again, the Tribe will have the opportunity to do that as the Green and Gold will take on one of the toughest schedules in Division I.

W&M is scheduled to face 10 teams that competed in the 2005 NCAA Tournament, with 15 of the Tribe's opponents ending last season nationally ranked. In addition, the Green and Gold will compete at the 16-team Blue-Gray Classic in March, which attracts many of the top men's tennis programs in the nation.

The Tribe will host 14 home matches in 2006, including contests against Harvard, Louisville, Maryland, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Virginia and Wake Forest. W&M will travel to face some of the nation's top teams, including

road matches against Arizona, Boise State, Georgia, Michigan, Michigan State, Notre Dame and Oregon.

W&M will defend its CAA title at the conference tournament, which will be held at nearby Huntington Park Tennis Center in Newport News, from April 20-23. The first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament will be hosted by 16 schools around the nation in the middle of May, with the remainder of the team tournament and the entirety of the individual championships to be hosted by Stanford.

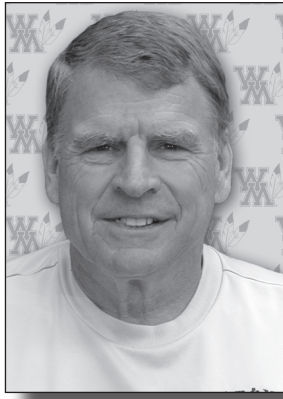

# Head Coach Peter Daub



**Peter Daub**  
Head Coach (13th season)  
Findlay College (1970)

Boasting a wealth of coaching and playing experience, two-time Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year Peter Daub brings an impeccable list of credentials to William and Mary. As he enters his 13th season with the College, his knowledge, work ethic and enthusiasm will continue to lead the program towards a bright future.

Under his tutelage, the Tribe continues to improve, winning the CAA title in 2005 with a victory over nine-time champion Virginia Commonwealth. With the Green and Gold reaching the finals of the conference tournament for the fifth time in seven seasons, the Tribe became the first team to beat VCU in the CAA Tournament since the Rams joined the league in the 1996 season. Despite a tough start to a season that was fraught with injuries, W&M won seven of its last eight matches, culminating with the team's first conference title since 1990 and first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1999.

In 2004, W&M achieved a number of milestones in its quest for national prominence. The

Tribe upset Tennessee on the road, 4-3, in the program's first win over an SEC team in more than 30 years. W&M also stunned VCU with a win in Richmond, handing the seventh-ranked Rams their first-ever loss in CAA play, as the Tribe earned its first win over a top 10 team since the inception of the current ranking system.

Individually, the Tribe has excelled as well. 2005 graduate Jeff Kader led the way by competing in the NCAA Singles Tournament for the second straight season, the first W&M player to participate in the event since Gardner Larned won the event in 1947. In the fall of 2003, Kader became the first W&M player to compete at the ITA National Indoor Championship, where he upset the nation's fourth-ranked player. Voted the most outstanding performer of the 2005 CAA Tournament, Kader went 3-0 in both singles and doubles at the event, upsetting the CAA's 2005 Co-Players of the Year in straight sets at No. 1

## Daub's Expertise — "Wild and Crazy Doubles"

As successful as the entire W&M program has been under Daub, the quality of doubles has been highly productive on the pro and college level. If Daub has a specialty within his coaching skills, it is in doubles, where he has coached players to the round of 16 at Wimbledon twice. He has also coached the United States doubles team to a gold medal at the World Games in Japan.

In the 2001 spring season, he guided W&M in capturing an incredible 20 of 25 doubles points in team competition. Also that year the 26th-ranked team of Patrick Brown and Trevor Spracklin combined for an impressive 17-3 record at No. 1 doubles and defeated Texas in the first round of the NCAAs. Daub's slogan of "Wild and Crazy Doubles" revolves around constant movement and motion in a very aggressive, structured atmosphere.

singles in the final two rounds. Alex Cojanu was named the CAA's Co-Rookie of the Year last season, as the College had three singles players and two doubles teams earn all-conference honors.

In 2001, the Tribe doubles team of Patrick Brown and Trevor Spracklin advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, the first for a W&M duo under the current structure. In 1999 when Daub won his first CAA Coach of the Year award, he also led the team to its eighth NCAA Tournament appearance.

Prior to his arrival at W&M, Daub spent two years as the assistant coach at Georgia, where he helped the Bulldogs achieve No. 4 and No. 2 national rankings and a showing at the 1993 NCAA Championship finals. In 1995, he coached the United States to a gold medal at the World University Games in Japan. In past years, Daub has also coached at the Australian Open, Wimbledon and the U.S. Open.

A graduate of Findlay College, Daub received his master's degree in education (sports administration) at Temple University. Daub coached at Redlands College for two seasons, and was the men's head coach at Temple from 1982 through 1989, also leading the women's team starting in 1985. His players on the combined teams won

the "Highest Student-Athlete GPA Award" for averaging over a 3.0 GPA for eight semesters.

Daub has been a featured speaker at various events, including the USTA and USPTA national conventions and the ITA Coaches Convention. At the 1997 and 2000 U.S. Opens, Daub gave clinics at the USTA Tennis Teachers Conference. He also has served as the coach of the Mid-Atlantic section at the Junior Davis Cup. A former coach and captain of varsity tennis at Findlay, Daub competed internationally on various pro-

fessional circuits, winning titles in Australia and New Zealand.

Daub lives in Williamsburg with his wife Ruth, a former touring professional, who in 2001 won the Virginia state 45 and over singles championship. The couple has a daughter, Kate, and son, Doug, who won the 2000 high school state doubles title.

Marcos Asse enters his second season as the assistant men's tennis coach at William and Mary, after starting with the team in the summer of 2004.

Asse graduated from the University of Florida in 2003 with a degree in finance and played four years on the men's tennis team, helping the Gators win the Southeastern Conference championship in 2000. Prior to coming to W&M, he had served as the head tennis professional at the Westside Tennis Park in Gainesville, Florida since the fall of 2001 and was also the head girls' tennis coach at Oak Hill High School in the spring of 2004. Asse was the No. 1 singles player in the state of Florida for most of 2002 in the United States Tennis Association men's open rankings.

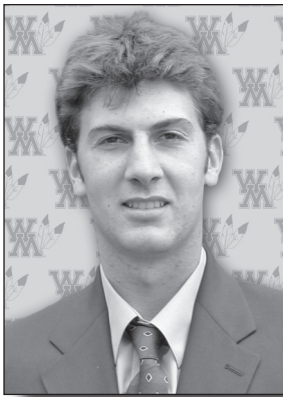

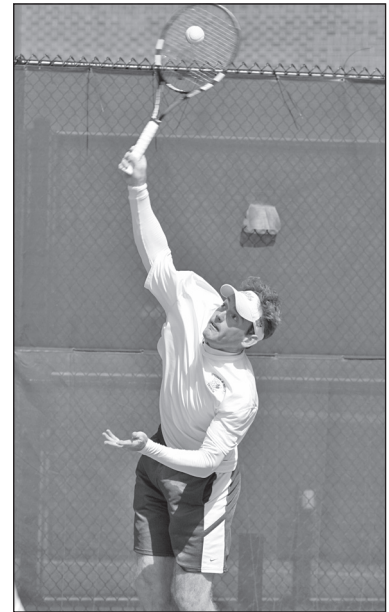

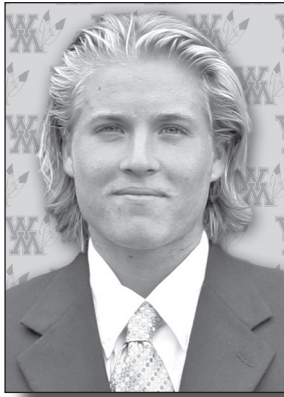

# Tribe in the Pros



## Trevor Spracklin

The 1999 Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Year and a four-time first team all-conference selection, **Trevor Spracklin** has been playing professional tennis since graduating from W&M. He has been ranked as high as 734th in in singles and 319th in doubles in the ATP World Rankings. Spracklin has won more than 10 doubles titles in his career, including events in the United States, Ecuador, Israel, Thailand, Portugal and Jamaica.

*"There is no better training ground [for playing in the pros] than college, where everything is taken care of for you and you can focus solely on playing tennis and academics. Even now on the professional tour, I would kill for the kind of treatment I received in college, in terms of meals, travel and care for injuries.*

*"Playing against one of the toughest schedules in the country at W&M, I played against some of the best players in the nation and grew exponentially, more than I ever thought I could. Because of the strong schedule, I played against some of the toughest players in the country, guys who turn out to be tough in the pros, or who are already established in the college ranks.*

*"My weaknesses were exposed in college, where I was able to fix them and become an even better player. Coach Daub was never satisfied with my game and, in turn, neither was I. He was always trying to build me so that I could compete in college and become better in the pros."*

## Jeff Kader

**Jeff Kader** is one of just two W&M players to advance to the NCAA singles tournament and the only Tribe player to compete in the event more than once. Voted the most outstanding performer of the 2005 Colonial Athletic Association Tournament, he ended his career ranked 52nd in the nation in singles. Kader began his pro career immediately after graduation, playing tournaments in eastern France, near Switzerland.

*"It was tough [playing in France]. There was a lot of traveling and living out of a bag the whole time, but it was really cool to see a different part of the world and to experience how the people there treat tennis. Over there, it was more of a social sport. The whole community was out there watching you. Even people that don't really know a lot about tennis would come out to watch.*

*"The competition was really tough. I was playing against players from all over the world, including players from Argentina and Spain. Having already played against a lot of foreigners in college really helped, because I had seen their different styles of play before.*

*"The mentality of W&M tennis—being able to do the basic things well—coach Daub always focused on doing the basic things well, so that you could always go back to them if other parts of your game weren't working out. If you play college tennis, you'll work extremely hard with all the conditioning. You are always working very hard to stay in shape and to be able to stay out and play through long matches."*

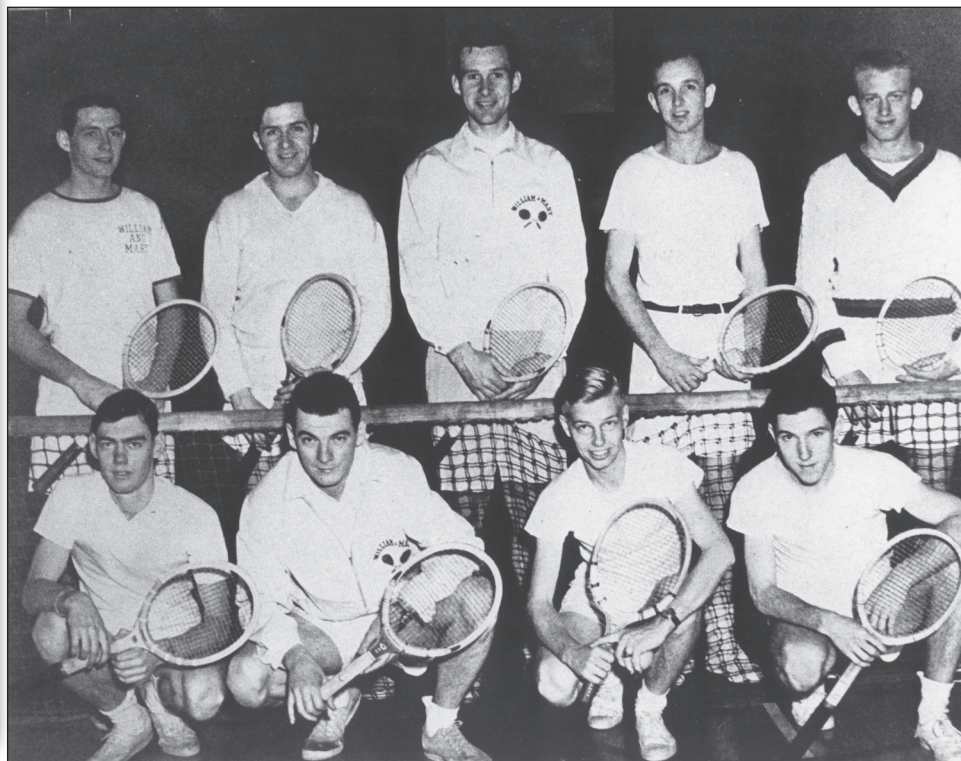
The College of William and Mary's 1946-47 men's tennis team posted the finest record in Tribe history when it claimed the team title at the National Intercollegiate Tournament in Los Angeles, in June of 1947. The netters, coached by Dr. Sharvey G. Umbeck, tallied 10 points to clinch first-place honors. Leading the way for the Tribe was Gardner Larned, who won the national singles title that same year by defeating Vic Seixas of North Carolina 6-3, 9-11, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1. Other members of the 1947 team included Tut Bartzen, Fred Kovaleski, Bob Doll, Bren Macken, Howe Atwater, Lyman Chennault, Dick Randell, Jim Macken, George Fricke, Bill Ozenberger and Bob Galloway.

In 1948, Kovaleski and team captain Bartzen, returning as the nation's fourth- and fifth-ranked players, guided the Tribe to its second-straight national team title. In addition, the duo captured the national doubles championship, a feat that has yet to be repeated in William and Mary men's tennis history.

# 2004-05 Season Highlights

## Tribe Upsets VCU to Win First CAA Title Since 1990

William and Mary defeated Virginia Commonwealth, 4-2, on April 24, to win the Tribe's first Colonial Athletic Association championship since 1990 ... VCU had won all nine conference titles since they joined the league for the 1996 season ... Coupled with a regular-season win over the Rams in 2004, the Tribe has handed VCU two of its three losses to CAA opponents since entering the conference ... W&M also won league championships in 1987 and 1990 ... The Tribe swept through the CAA Tournament largely on the momentum started by its doubles teams ... The Green and Gold won the doubles point in all three matches, clinching the point in the finals against VCU in a marathon 16-14 tiebreaker won by **Alex Fish** and **Colin O'Brien** ... W&M's women's tennis team also won the conference title in 2005, just the fourth time in CAA history that the same school has won both titles and the third time that the Tribe has accomplished the sweep.

## Jeff Kader Makes Second Straight Appearance in NCAA Singles Championship

2005 graduate **Jeff Kader** earned his second straight appearance in the NCAA Singles Championship and finished the season ranked 52nd in the nation ... He is just the second singles player in school history to compete at the event and the only one to do it twice ... The only other Tribe player to appear in the national singles championship is **Gardner Larned**, who won the title in 1947 ... Kader was selected as the most outstanding performer of the 2005 CAA Championship ... He went 3-0 in both singles and doubles at the event, including back-to-back straight-set singles wins over the league's two co-players of the year.

## W&M Competes in NCAA Tournament for First Time Since 1999

After winning the conference title, the Tribe earned an automatic berth into the NCAA Tournament ... It was W&M's first appearance at the event since 1999 and its ninth trip overall to the national championship ... The Tribe, ranked 62nd in the nation at the time, nearly pulled off what would have been the biggest upset of the tournament, narrowly losing to No. 25 Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, 4-2.

## Colin O'Brien Earns ITA Scholar-Athlete Honors for Second Straight Year

In just his second year of college competition, business major **Colin O'Brien** earned ITA Scholar-Athlete accolades from the Intercollegiate Tennis Association for the second straight season ... A second team All-CAA pick in singles, O'Brien defeated two nationally ranked singles players, playing second or third singles most of the season ... To earn ITA Scholar-Athlete status, a player must be a varsity letterwinner and have earned a grade point average of 3.50 or higher for the academic year.

## Jeff Kader Receives Blue-Gray Classic Sportsmanship Award

Jeff Kader was selected ahead of more than 100 other players as the sole recipient of the Blue-Gray Classic Sportsmanship Award at the tournament in March ... Sixteen of the nation's top tennis teams competed at the tournament ... Kader was also selected as the CAA Men's Tennis Player of the Week following the tournament, where he won two of his three No. 1 singles matches ... It was the second sportsmanship award in less than a year for the Tribe, which was picked ahead of more than 1,200 other college-level men's teams as the recipient of the ITA National Team Sportsmanship Award in March of 2003.

## Alex Cojanu Named CAA Co-Rookie of the Year

Current sophomore **Alex Cojanu** was selected by a committee of coaches as the CAA's Co-Rookie of the Year, sharing the honors with Eidy Igarashi (Old Dominion) ... He is just the second W&M player to earn the honor, joining 2005 graduate **Sean Kelleher**, who was selected in 2002 ... Cojanu was also a second team all-league pick in doubles and led W&M with 25 wins each in singles and doubles ... He posted two wins over nationally ranked singles players and teamed up with **Jeff Kader** to upset the nation's 10th-ranked doubles team in the fall.

**Gene R. Nichol**  
President

Gene Nichol became the College of William and Mary's 26th president on July 1, 2005. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law

and the law school at the University of Colorado. While at William and Mary, Nichol was the Cutler Professor of Law and director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law. He has also taught at Oxford, Exeter, and the law school of West Virginia University.

Nichol is the co-author of the text *Federal Courts* and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Review*, and the *University of Chicago Law Review*. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the *Encyclopedia of the American Constitution*, and one on the civil rights movement to the *Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court*. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters before committees of the U.S. Congress and

various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.



**Sandra Day O'Connor**  
Chancellor

Sandra Day O'Connor, who in July of 2005 announced her intention to retire as Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, was named twenty-third Chancellor of the College by the College of William and Mary Board of Visitors on October 4, 2005. Justice O'Connor succeeds Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, former United States Secretary of State, who was appointed in 2000.

The post of Chancellor has been an important one since the College was chartered in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary

II of Great Britain. Until 1776, the Chancellor was an English subject—usually the Archbishop of Canterbury or the Bishop of London—who served as the College's advocate to the crown, while a colonial president oversaw the day-to-day activities of the Williamsburg campus. Following the Revolutionary War, George Washington was appointed as the first American chancellor; later President John Tyler held the post.

"Through her remarkable combination of wisdom, courage, judgment, and skill, Justice O'Connor has become one of the most influential and effective jurists in American history," said President Gene R. Nichol. "I am thrilled that she is willing to share her ability and rich experience with William and Mary students. As a former constitutional lawyer, I am also honored to welcome one of my heroes to the College community."

The first woman to serve on the United States Supreme Court, Justice O'Connor was born in El Paso, Texas, on March 26, 1930. She earned a B.A. in economics (magna cum laude) from Stanford University,

and went on to receive an LL.B. from Stanford Law School, where she graduated third in her class. Her classmate, the late Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, graduated first in the class.

She served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the Quartermaster Market Center, Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms.

In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Ronald Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, and the couple has three sons: Scott, Brian and Jay.

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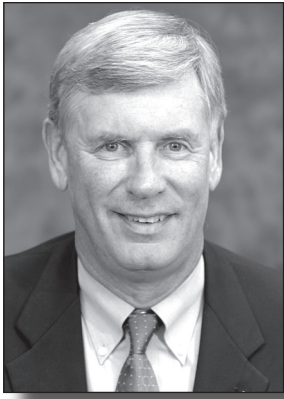

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# Athletics Administration



**Terry Driscoll**  
Director of Athletics

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 10th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks

chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 29, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 25, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



**Barbara Blosser**  
Senior Executive Associate Athletics Director

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball

coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting

athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy" and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

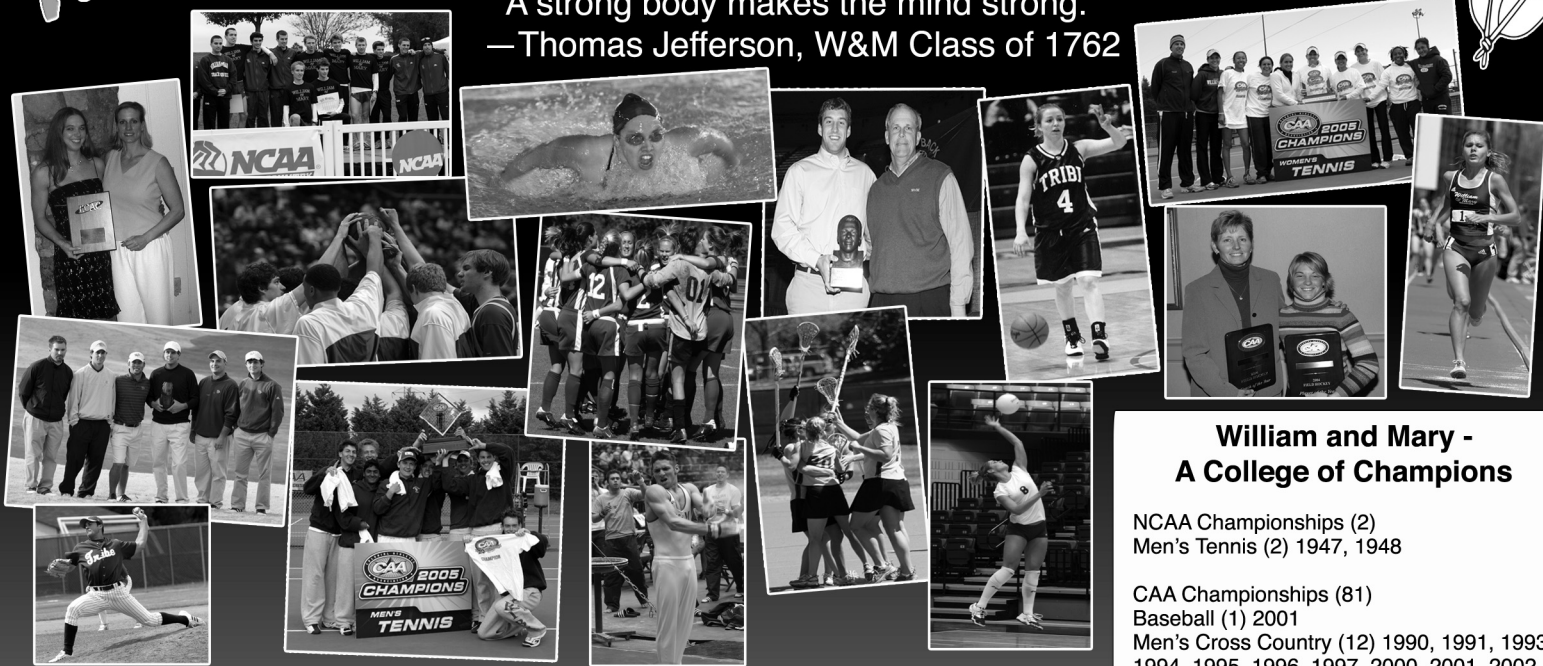


# WILLIAM AND MARY ATHLETICS

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

## Athletic Excellence

The 2004-05 season was another outstanding year for W&M athletics, as the Tribe added five CAA titles to push its conference-leading total to 81, 30 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Championships, highlighted by the football team's appearance in the I-AA semifinals. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Championship each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top 100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. In 2004-2005, the College finished 76th, and was the highest-ranked team in the CAA and was third among all schools in the state of Virginia, making this the ninth time in the 12-year history of the Directors' Cup that the College has finished both in the top four in the state of Virginia and first or second in the CAA.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

## Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities, as W&M has produced 36 Academic All-Americans since 1992.

In the NCAA's inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores for all Division I institutions, William and Mary once again excelled in its mission of fostering true student-athletes. The College boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

Additionally, W&M had four student-athletes recognized as CAA Scholar-Athletes of the Year in 2004-2005: Pat Comstock (Men's Cross Country), Megan Bishop (Women's Cross Country), Keith Bechtol (Men's Track and Field) and Lena Sherbakov (Women's Tennis).

# STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

## Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

## Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

## Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

## Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.



## Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



# ATHLETIC FACILITIES

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

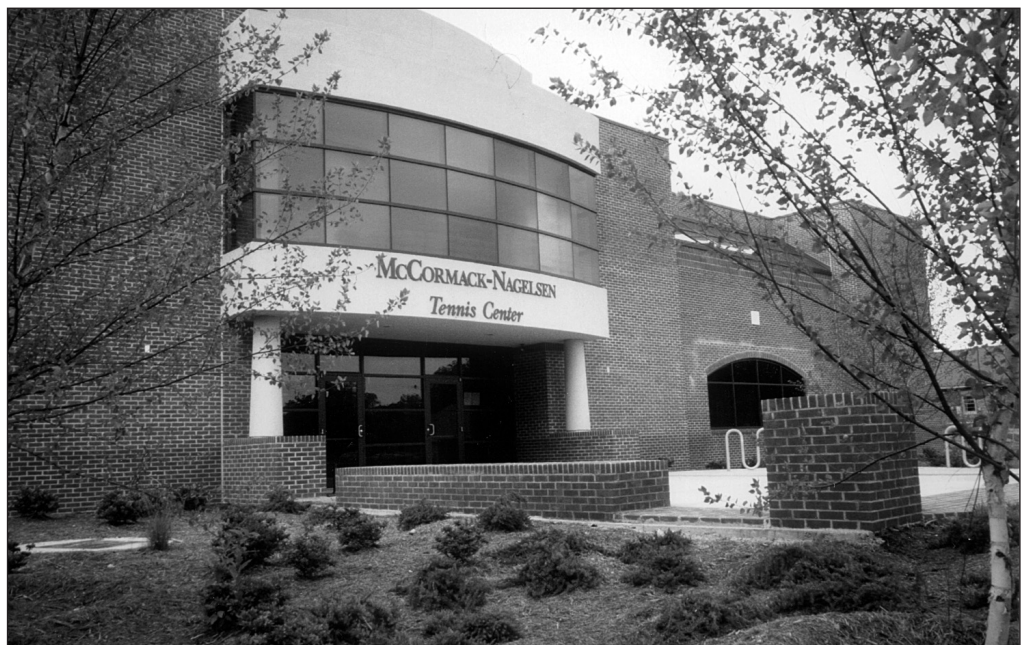

William and Mary lost a favorite son on May 16, 2003, with the death of **Mark Hume McCormack**, a 1951 graduate of the College. McCormack had been in coma since January after suffering a heart attack. Named by ESPN as one of the century’s most influential people in the business of sport, he revolutionized the world of sports marketing with the founding of International Management Group (IMG).

A devoted and dedicated supporter of Tribe athletics, he and his wife, Betsy Nagelsen founded W&M’s McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, endowed a tennis scholarship and were continuing sponsors of the ITA Women’s Tennis Hall of Fame. Also a member of W&M’s Board of Visitors, McCormack chaired the College’s fund-raising campaign in 1993 that raised \$153 million and was the honorary chair of the College’s current \$500 million campaign.

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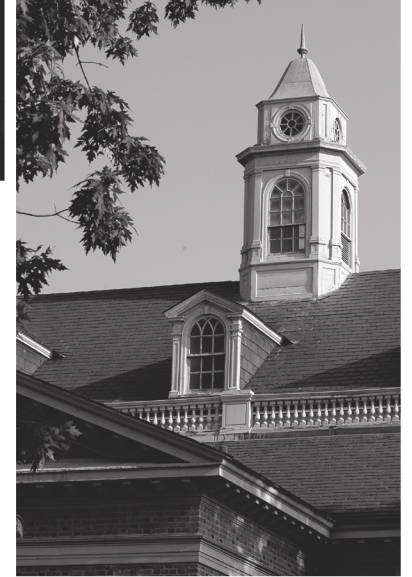
