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The College of William and Mary's 1946-47 men's tennis team posted the finest record in Tribe history when it claimed the team title at the National Intercollegiate Tournament in Los Angeles, in June of 1947. The netters, coached by Dr. Sharvey G. Umbeck, tallied 10 points to clinch first-place honors. Leading the way for the Tribe was Gardner Larned, who won the national singles title that same year by defeating Vic Seixas of North Carolina 6-3, 9-11, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1. Other members of the 1947 team included Tut Bartzen, Fred Kovaleski, Bob Doll, Bren Macken, Howe Atwater, Lyman Chennault, Dick Randell, Jim Macken, George Fricke, Bill Ozenberger and Bob Galloway.

In 1948, Kovelski and team captain Bartzen, returning as the nation's fourth- and fifth-ranked players, guided the Tribe to its second-straight national team title. In addition, the duo captured the national doubles championship, a feat that has yet to be repeated in William and Mary men's tennis history.

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BUSCH TENNIS COURTS

One of the newest athletics venues at the College of William and Mary, the Busch Courts tennis complex opened in September of 2001. It is the outdoor home of the Tribe tennis squads.

The complex features eight individual hard court surfaces. Each court features California Corners, a unique design that includes quarter fences that run along the sidelines to allow for uninterrupted play.

There is stadium seating for approximately 500 people at Busch Courts, and there is also a state-of-the-art lighting system to accommodate night matches.



McCORMACK-NAGELSEN TENNIS CENTER

Dedicated to excellence in academics and athletics, the College of William and Mary in historic Colonial Williamsburg is proud to offer one of the finest athletic facilities in the country—the McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center. Located on South Henry Street adjacent to the graduate housing complex, the McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, which opened in 1995, boasts impeccable tennis facilities and houses the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Women's Tennis Hall of Fame.

The facility was made possible through a generous gift from Mark H. McCormack, a 1951 graduate of William and Mary, and his wife, former world-class tennis professional Betsy Nagelsen. As the former chairman, president and chief executive officer of International Management Group, McCormack was widely recognized as the founder of the sports marketing industry.

The McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center features six indoor tennis courts using the GreenSet GrandPrix Surface (rubberized base under color coat), air conditioning and indirect lighting at a competitive level. The facility also includes member and team locker rooms, several spacious lobbies and spectator viewing that boasts 362 stadium seats as well as a mezzanine seating area. In addition, the ITA and Rolex generously donated a state-of-the-art electronic scoreboard.

The Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Women's Tennis Hall of Fame contains a collection of artifacts and records pertaining to collegiate women's tennis, and enshrines former players, coaches and contributors that have impacted the sport. The Hall of Fame also functions as a library, archive and research center for intercollegiate women's tennis.

Over the last two seasons, the William and Mary men's tennis program has enjoyed a large amount of success. In 2005, the Tribe won its third CAA crown and earned its ninth trip to the NCAA Tournament.

During the fall of 2006, Colin O'Brien and Alex Cojanu won the ITA Mid-East Region Championship and earned a spot in the most exclusive collegiate national championship event, the ITA Indoor Nationals, which features a 16-team doubles tournament. The pair also finished the fall ranked No. 1 in the Mideast Region.

The Tribe will look to regain the form that produced the 2005 Colonial Athletic Association Championship with a solid combination of experience and youth in 2006-07. W&M returns six letterwinners from the 2005-06 season, including its top two players in senior Colin O'Brien and junior Alex Cojanu. W&M has 66.9 percent of its overall singles victories from last season returning, including 70.7 percent of its dual match wins. The Tribe also adds a two-member freshman class, which ranked eighth in the Mid-major top-25 according to the Tennis Recruiting Network.

"My only expectations for the spring are the growth and development of each player," head coach Peter Daub said. "We have some experience, and we have some youth and enthusiasm. However, matches basically come down to the mindset of players during competition. To borrow a phrase from undefeated Georgia, 'Counting on everyone, waiting on no one,' expresses the confidence I have in the players to prepare themselves for each match."

The Tribe reached some impressive heights during the 2006 fall season. O'Brien and Cojanu knocked off six straight ACC foes on their way to claiming the ITA Mid-east Region Championship. The victory garnered the Tribe duo a spot in the most exclusive of the three national championship events during the season. As one of 16 teams competing in the ITA National Indoor Championship in Columbus, Ohio, O'Brien and Cojanu went 2-2 at the event, including a victory over the No. 15 nationally ranked team. The pair advanced to the consolation finals of the event.

As a result of O'Brien and Cojanu playing at the National Indoor Championships, the other Tribe players had the chance to move up and play some stiffer competition at the Crowne Plaza Tribe Invitational. In its first home fall event in four years, W&M battled players the likes of ACC foes North Carolina State and Maryland as

well a top-20 foe in Notre Dame.

"This fall has presented me with a picture of our team that has been unselfish, hard-working and committed to a structured and demanding conditioning program as well as each player's personal on-court development," Daub said. "This team has embodied the phrase 'Love the process' rather than complaining or not accepting the coaching demands put on them. They have seen results from their efforts, and that has pushed them even harder. I am exceptionally proud of their feedback and relationship with me during these demanding times."

O'Brien was a First-Team All-CAA and VaSID All-State selection as a junior. He finished with a 19-17 record, playing almost exclusively at the No. 1 slot. In fact, 12 of its 17 defeats came to players ranked among the top 80 in the country.

Cojanu finished with 19 wins playing primarily at the No. 2 and No. 3 positions. He moved into the No. 2 slot and finished the fall season with an 8-2 mark at the position. The Hallandale, Fla., native was 19-14 in singles and 24-12 in doubles. Cojanu was a Third-Team All-CAA selection in singles and a second-team honoree in doubles. He finished the 2006 fall season with seven victories, including a pair of ranked opponents.

Junior Kavi Sud also returns as upperclassmen for the Tribe in 2007. Sud finished last season with a 15-8 overall singles mark. He moved up to the No. 3 slot against George Mason and defeated Jay Friedman in straight sets, 6-2, 6-1. Sud went 5-3 playing at the No. 6 position. During the fall of 2006, Sud tallied five wins.

The sophomore trio of Dominic Pagon, Marwan Ramadan and Alex Zuck return for their second season with the Tribe. Pagon put together a 7-4 singles mark during the 2006 fall season after finishing with 11 wins as a rookie playing at the No. 4, No. 5 and No. 6 positions. He also won 16 doubles matches during his freshman campaign.

Ramadan joined the Tribe prior to the 2006 spring season and finished the year with a 4-2 mark. The Alexandria, Va., native continued his solid play during the 2006 fall season. Ramadan finished with a 5-1 mark, including victories in his final four matches. Three of those final four wins came at the Crowne Plaza Tribe Invite.

Zuck put together a solid rookie campaign, finishing as one of two Tribe players with 20-plus victories. He competed in 25 dual matches, racking up a 13-12 mark.

Freshmen Richard Wardell and Keziel Juneau are the Tribe's pair of newcomers. Wardell was ranked No. 74 nationally by the Tennis Recruiting Network. The Fort Myers, Fla., native won five singles and six doubles matches during the 2006 fall season. Juneau was one of the top-ranked junior players in Canada in both singles and doubles. During the 2006 fall campaign, he finished with five singles victories.

The Tribe will continue to face some stiff competition in 2007 as the spring dual match season includes 13 teams that finished last season ranked among the ITA top 75. Included in that number are eight teams who were in the top 30. The list of 2006 ranked foes the Tribe will be facing in 2007 include: No. 2 Georgia, No. 8 Virginia, No. 14 VCU, No. 17 Notre Dame, No. 26 Louisville, No. 27 Boise State, No. 28 Wake Forest, No. 29 Rice, No. 33 Middle Tennessee State, No. 38 Michigan, No. 57 Old Dominion, No. 60 Oklahoma and No. 63

Brown, Richmond, Michigan, Notre Dame, Wake Forest, Georgia, Boise State, Virginia, Rice, Middle Tennessee State, Brown, Louisville and VCU were the 12 teams to advance to the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

"The direction I have taken with our program is to give our student-athletes the most challenging schedule possible," Daub said. "We have the attitude of playing anybody, any place, anytime. Over my 14 years, I have never focused on our win-loss record. My only ambition is to put us in a position to play in the NCAA Tournament at the end of the year, regardless of our record, and for us to be ready for that level of play. In order for us to do that, we must grow from each match, and overachieve when it comes to the learning process of playing opponents who may be more skilled."

The College will have 14 dual matches in Williamsburg, including the first four dual-match contests of the season against Virginia (Jan. 24), Notre Dame (Jan. 27), Richmond (Jan. 28) and East Carolina (Jan. 28). W&M's slated away matches are at Wake Forest (Feb. 3), at Georgia (Feb. 4), at Maryland (March 3) and at Louisville (March 11).

Along with the scheduled dual match affairs, the Tribe will compete in a pair of spring tournament during the latter weekends of March. W&M will play in the Blue-Gray Classic in Montgomery, Ala., March 15-18. The Tribe will also travel to the 46th annual Rice Invitational in Houston, Texas. William and Mary will play in the four-team round robin event and face Rice, Oklahoma and Middle Tennessee State.

"With the concept of personal growth that will lead to an NCAA bid, the foundation of this program is built on each person striving for excellence through a tremendous work ethic," Daub said. "The win-loss record will be what it is, but it will not define us."

DAUB'S EXPERTISE — "WILD AND CRAZY DOUBLES"

As successful as the entire W&M program has been under Daub, the quality of doubles has been highly productive on the pro and college level. If Daub has a specialty within his coaching skills, it is in doubles, where he has coached players to the round of 16 at Wimbledon twice. He has also coached the United States doubles team to a gold medal at the World Games in Japan.

In the 2001 spring season, he guided W&M in capturing an incredible 20 of 25 doubles points in team competition. Also that year the 26th-ranked team of Patrick Brown and Trevor Spracklin combined for an impressive 17-3 record at No. 1 doubles and defeated Texas in the first round of the NCAAs. This past fall, the Tribe doubles team of Alex Cojanu and Colin O'Brien captured the ITA Mid-East Region title and earned a spot in the ITA Indoor National Championship as one of only 16 teams in the country at the event. Daub's slogan of "Wild and Crazy Doubles" revolves around constant movement and motion in a very aggressive, structured atmosphere.

Boasting a wealth of coaching and playing experience, two-time Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year Peter Daub brings an impeccable list of credentials to William and Mary. As he enters his 14th season with the College, his knowledge, work ethic and enthusiasm will continue to lead the program towards a bright future.

In his 21st season of coaching during the 2006 season, Daub reached a career milestone, recording victory No. 400 in the Tribe's 4-3 win over Georgia State on April 9, 2006. He has spent 21 years as a head men's coach and another seven as a head women's coach. In his 13 years with W&M, Daub's teams have posted a 190-157 record.

Under his tutelage, the Tribe continues to improve, winning the CAA title in 2005 with a victory over nine-time champion Virginia Commonwealth. With the Green and Gold reaching the finals of the conference tournament for the fifth time in the last eight seasons, the Tribe became the first team to beat VCU in the CAA Tournament since the Rams joined the league in the 1996 season. The Tribe knocked off the Rams, 4-2, in the CAA Championship match on April 24, 2005.

Despite a tough start to a season that was fraught with injuries, W&M won seven of its last eight matches, culminating with the team's first conference title since 1990 and first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1999. Daub was named the United States Professional Tennis Association Mid-Atlantic College Coach of the Year after guiding the Tribe to the CAA title and the NCAA Tournament in 2005.

In 2004, W&M achieved a number of milestones in its quest for national prominence. The Tribe upset Tennessee on the road, 4-3, in the program's first win over a top-10 SEC team in more than 30 years. W&M also stunned VCU with a win in Richmond, handing the seventh-ranked Rams its first loss in CAA play, as the Tribe earned another win over a top 10 opponent.

Individually, the Tribe has excelled as well. Jeff Kader (a 2005 graduate) led the way by competing in the NCAA Singles Tournament for the second straight season, the first W&M player to participate in the event since Gardner Larned won the event in 1947. In the fall of 2003, Kader became the first W&M player to compete at the ITA National Indoor Championship, where he upset the nation's fourth-ranked player. Voted the most outstanding performer of the

2005 CAA Tournament, Kader went 3-0 in both singles and doubles at the event, upsetting the CAA's 2005 Co-Players of the Year in straight sets at No. 1 singles in the final two rounds. Alex Cojanu was named the CAA's Co-Rookie of the Year last season, as the College had three singles players and two doubles teams earn all-conference honors.

In 2001, the Tribe doubles team of Patrick Brown and Trevor Spracklin advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, the first for a W&M duo under the current structure. In 1999, when Daub won his first CAA Coach of the Year award, he also led the team to its eighth NCAA Tournament appearance.

Prior to his arrival at W&M, Daub spent two years as the assistant coach at Georgia, where he helped the Bulldogs achieve No. 4 and No. 2 national rankings and a showing at the 1993 NCAA Championship finals. In 1995, he coached the United States to a gold medal at the World University Games in Japan. In past years, Daub has also coached at the Australian Open, Wimbledon and the U.S. Open.

A graduate of Findlay College, Daub received his master's degree in education (sports administration) at Temple University. Daub coached at Redlands College for two seasons, and was the men's head coach at Temple from 1982 through 1989, he also led the women's team from 1985 to 1989. His players on the combined teams won the "Highest Student-Athlete GPA Award" for averaging over a 3.0 GPA for eight semesters.

Daub has been a featured speaker at various events, including the USTA and USPTA national conventions and the ITA Coaches Convention. At the 1997 and 2000 U.S. Opens, Daub gave clinics at the USTA Tennis Teachers Conference. He also has served as the coach of the Mid-Atlantic section at the Junior Davis Cup. A former coach and captain of varsity tennis at Findlay, Daub competed internationally on various professional circuits, winning titles in Australia and New Zealand.

Daub lives in Williamsburg with his wife Ruth, a former touring professional, who in 2001 won the Virginia state 45 and over singles championship. The couple has a daughter, Kate, and son, Doug, who won the 2000 high school state doubles title.

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The William and Mary men's tennis program has not only produced successful student-athletes in the business world, but in the professional tennis ranks as well. Jeff Kader, a 2005 graduate, played professionally in France upon graduation from the college, but has since moved into the assistant men's tennis coach position at North Carolina State. Currently, two former W&M players in Trevor Spracklin (a 2001 graduate of the college) and Stephen Ward (a 2006 graduate) are playing on the professional circuit.

"The conditioning, technique development and on-court strategy that we employ at William and Mary allows our players to grow to the pace and quickness of college tennis, and sets them on a path, if they desire, to play at the professional level after graduation. (Assistant Coach Marcos) Asse and myself spend a tremendous amount of time each week with private lessons and personal enhancement of each player's game. Our structure and demanding conditioning program helps players understand what is required of their bodies and minds to help them adjust to the pace and quickness of the highest level of tennis."

The 1999 Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Year and a four-time first team all-conference selection, **Trevor Spracklin** has been playing professional tennis since graduating from W&M. He has been ranked as high as 734th in in singles and 319th in doubles in the ATP World Rankings. Spracklin has won more than 10 doubles titles in his career, including events in the United States, Ecuador, Israel, Thailand, Portugal and Jamaica. In 2006, he won the Mid-Atlantic Clay Court doubles championship, while advancing to the finals in singles and mixed doubles as well.

"There is no better training ground [for playing in the pros] than college, where everything is taken care of for you and you can focus solely on playing tennis and academics. Even now on the professional tour, I would kill for the kind of treatment I received in college, in terms of meals, travel and care for injuries.

"Playing against one of the toughest schedules in the country at W&M, I played against some of the best players in the nation and grew exponentially, more than I ever thought I could. Because of the strong schedule, I played against some of the toughest players in the country, guys who turn out to be tough in the pros, or who are already established in the college ranks.

"My weaknesses were exposed in college, where I was able to fix them and become an even better player. Coach Daub was never satisfied with my game and, in turn, neither was I. He was always trying to build me so that I could compete in college and become better in the pros."



Stephen Ward began playing professionally in the French Federation of Tennis (FFT) upon his graduation from the college. An All-CAA selection during his four years at W&M, Ward won his first USTA Pro Circuit championship, taking home the doubles title at the Laguna Niguel Pro Futures Classic. It was just his third event playing on the USTA Futures circuit. Based on his performance during 10 tournaments with the FFT, he was invited back to play for a regional team in La Baule, France in May of 2007.

"The College of William and Mary was a great preparatory platform for my goal to play on the professional tennis circuit. I came into the program with a lot of athletic potential but through my four-year career I was able to channel that ability into production and results. Many factors contributed to this success including an extremely hard working, but more importantly, caring coaching staff, world class facilities and a great medical treatment staff. Futhermore, the schedule my teammates and I were facing was the creme of the crop. Coach Daub was always trying to put us up against the best players and teams he could in order for us to challenge ourselves and see where we had room to improve.

The concepts and mentalities I learned to develop at the collegiate level were a great start to what is expected of you on tour. The players at the next level are extremely talented and hard working where tennis is always on the mind. Fotunately for me I was able to carry with me the strategies I learned from my college coaches and bring home a professional doubles title in my first attempt. The tennis tour is extremely demanding, but I am glad I have my William and Mary background as a base."

Marcos Asse enters his third season as the assistant men's tennis coach at William and Mary, after starting with the team in the summer of 2004.

During his time at W&M, Asse has helped to guide the Tribe to a Colonial Athletic Association Championship in 2005 and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. During the fall of 2006, Asse saw Alex Cojanu and Colin O'Brien to the ITA Mideast Region championship in doubles.

Asse's responsibilities with the Tribe include

Asse graduated from the University of Florida in 2003 with a degree in finance and played four years on the men's tennis team, helping the Gators win the Southeastern Conference championship in 2000. Florida advanced to the NCAA semifinals and was ranked No. 2 nationally during the 2000 season.

Prior to coming to W&M, he had served as the head tennis professional at the Westside Tennis Park in Gainesville, Fla., since the fall of 2001 and was also the head girls' tennis coach at Oak Hill High School in the spring of 2004. Asse was the No. 1 singles player in the state of Florida for most of 2002 in the United States Tennis Association men's open rankings.

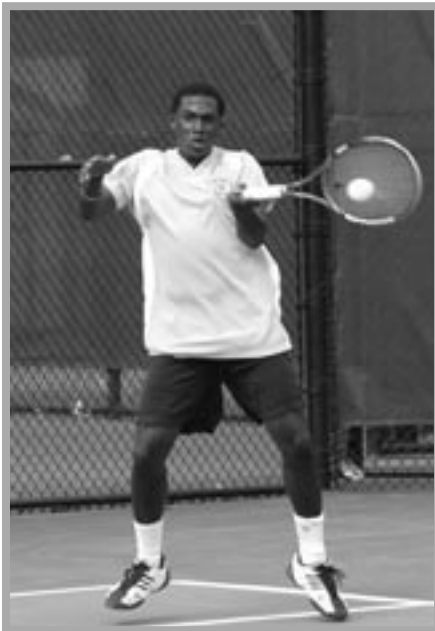

2005-06 SEASON IN REVIEW



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DAUB NOTCHES WIN NO. 400

Tribe head coach Peter Daub earned his 400th career coaching victory as W&M came from behind to defeat Georgia State, 4-3, on April 9, 2006 at the Busch Tennis Courts. In his 21-years college coaching career, Daub has an overall record of 401-279.

GSU opened the match by winning the top and bottom doubles matches to take the team point. W&M bounced back in singles, winning the first four completed matches to earn the win. Alex Zuck, Alex Cojanu, Stephen Ward and Colin O'Brien claimed wins to clinch the Tribe victory.

DOUBLES TEAM FINISHED SEASON RANKED NO. 54

The W&M team of Alex Cojanu and Billy Mulligan ended the season ranked 54th in the nation in the FILA Collegiate Men's Tennis Rankings, released by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association on June 2, 2006.

Cojanu and Mulligan ended the year with a 12-6 record and earned second team All-Colonial Athletic Association honors. They defeated a pair of ranked opponents this season, including an 8-3 road win over then seventh-ranked Strahinja Bobusic and Colin Purcell (Georgia).

IN THE TRIBE RECORD BOOKS

Stephen Ward finished his Tribe career ranked fifth in school history with 84 career singles wins. He finished his senior season with a 22-14 mark. Ward's winning percentage of 64.1 is the eighth best career mark in the Tribe's record book. His 70 career doubles victories ranks ninth in W&M annals.

Alex Cojanu ranks sixth on the W&M career doubles winning percentage list. During his first two seasons with the Tribe, Cojanu has a 65.3 winning percentage on a 49-26 record.

PLAYING STIFF COMPETITION

A trademark of the Tribe through the years has been its difficulty of schedule and the 2006 season was no different. W&M played 18 of its 28 contests against teams ranked among the Fila ITA Collegiate Rankings. The Tribe knocked off its highest ranked foe of the season at the Blue-Gray Classic when it defeated No. 33 South Alabama, 4-2. After dropping the doubles point, W&M won four of the five complete singles matches. Billy Mulligan, Matt Rubenstein and Colin O'Brien tallied singles wins, before Alex Zuck clinched the team win with his victory at the No. 6 spot.

FOUR ALL-CAA SELECTIONS

Four W&M players received all-conference honors from the Colonial Athletic Association in 2006. Colin O'Brien was named to the CAA's first team in singles, Stephen Ward was named to the second team in singles and Alex Cojanu earned third team honors. The Tribe's doubles team of Cojanu and Billy Mulligan was selected to the second team.

O'Brien has an 18-16 singles record this season, including 20 matches at No. 1 this spring. He was named to the conference's second team in singles last season. Ward had a team-high 22 singles wins in 2005-06, and opened the spring ranked 57th in the nation. A three-time all-CAA honoree in doubles, the award marked his first all-conference selection in singles.

Cojanu had a 19-14 record, including a 14-7 mark in dual matches, playing primarily at the second and third positions. Two of his wins during the spring came against ranked opponents, as he defeated No. 35 Andrew Hamar (Wake Forest) and No. 91 Eidy Igarashi (Old Dominion). Last season's CAA Co-Rookie of the Year, Cojanu received his first all-conference singles honor.

The doubles team of Cojanu and Mulligan finished the year at 12-6 record, all in dual matches, and was ranked as high as 33rd in the nation. They opened the spring by winning nine of their first 11 matches, including an 8-3 victory on the road against then seventh-ranked Strahinja Bobusic and Colin Purcell (Georgia).

William and Mary lost a favorite son on May 16, 2003, with the death of **Mark Hume McCormack**, a 1951 graduate of the College. McCormack had been in coma since January after suffering a heart attack. Named by ESPN as one of the century's most influential people in the business of sport, he revolutionized the world of sports marketing with the founding of International Management Group (IMG).

A devoted and dedicated supporter of Tribe athletics, he and his wife, Betsy Nagelsen founded W&M's McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, endowed a tennis scholarship and were continuing sponsors of the ITA Women's Tennis Hall of Fame. Also a member of W&M's Board of Visitors, McCormack chaired the College's fund-raising campaign in 1993 that raised \$153 million and was the honorary chair of the College's current \$500 million campaign.

Athletic Success

A charter member of the CAA 1986, W&M has been the CAA's most successful program over the past two decades. The 2005-06 year was another banner season for the College, as it added three more conference titles. The Tribe has now captured 84 total CAA Championships since 1986, over 30 more than the closest rival.

Individually, women's tennis standout Megan Moulton-Levy earned All-America honors after advancing to the "Final Four" of the NCAA Singles Tournament.

Academic Excellence

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any scholarship-granting school and of any public university, in the nation among institutions with two or more Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in March of 2005.

This year, the NCAA specifically listed 18 W&M athletic squads as recipients of its public recognition award for 2005-06.

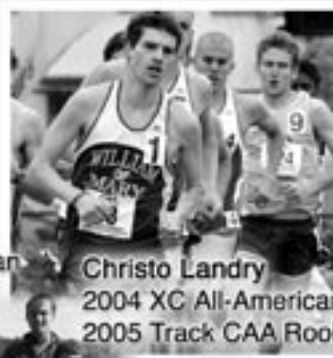
Since 1992, 36 Tribe athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including Keith Bechtol, who was a third team selection in the spring, and since 1996, 39 student-athletes have been members of Phi Beta Kappa.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award in each of its 21 sports, and not surprisingly, William and Mary has set the pace with 18.

In addition, three of William and Mary's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.

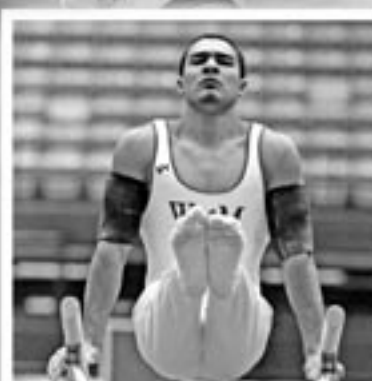

Terry Driscoll Athletics Director

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 11th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new and refurbished facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition,

the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, former W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). That figure will continue to increase significantly in the future, as Driscoll announced plans last year to build the \$11 million Jimmye Laycock Football Complex at Zable Stadium (see page six). Already, the football program has seen the installation of permanent lighting, a \$650,000 project, and a new state-of-the-art artificial playing surface, Field Turf Pro, a \$840,000 project, at Zable Stadium in the last 10 months.

Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm.

After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host



Barbara Blosser Senior Associate Athletics Director

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAI AW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team

(11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAI AW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.



Gene R. Nichol
President

Gene Nichol became the College of William and Mary's 26th president on July 1, 2005. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law

from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law and the law school at the University of Colorado. While at William and Mary, Nichol was the Cutler Professor of Law and director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law. He has also taught at Oxford, Exeter, and the law school of West Virginia University.

Nichol is the co-author of the text *Federal Courts* and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Review*, and the *University of Chicago Law Review*. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the *Encyclopedia of the American Constitution*, and one on the civil rights movement to the *Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court*. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters

before committees of the U.S. Congress and various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.



Sandra Day O'Connor
Chancellor

Sandra Day O'Connor, who in July of 2005 announced her intention to retire as Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, was named 23rd Chancellor of the College by the College of William and Mary Board of Visitors on October 4, 2005. Justice O'Connor succeeds Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, former United States Secretary of State, who was appointed in 2000.

The post of Chancellor has been an important one since the College was

chartered in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of Great Britain. Until 1776, the Chancellor was an English subject—usually the Archbishop of Canterbury or the Bishop of London—who served as the College's advocate to the crown, while a colonial president oversaw the day-to-day activities of the Williamsburg campus. Following the Revolutionary War, George Washington was appointed as the first American chancellor; later President John Tyler held the post.

"Through her remarkable combination of wisdom, courage, judgment, and skill, Justice O'Connor has become one of the most influential and effective jurists in American history," said President Gene R. Nichol. "I am thrilled that she is willing to share her ability and rich experience with William and Mary students. As a former constitutional lawyer, I am also honored to welcome one of my heroes to the College community."

The first woman to serve on the United States Supreme Court, Justice O'Connor was born in El Paso, Texas, on March 26, 1930. She earned a B.A. in economics (*magna cum laude*) from Stanford University, and went on to receive an LL.B. from Stanford Law

School, where she graduated third in her class. Her classmate, the late Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, graduated first in the class.

She served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the Quartermaster Market Center, Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms.

In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Ronald Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat Sept. 25, 1981. She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, and the couple has three sons: Scott, Brian and Jay.

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).

Sports Psychology

Deidre Connelly, Ph.D., is the College's full-time sports psychologist. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year, at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength and Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

The weight room was upgraded in the spring of 2006, primarily with new Power Lift and Sorinex equipment. The room now contains 16,000 pounds of free weights, over 7,000 pounds of dumbbells and 6,000 pounds of rubber bumper plates. In addition, it has 24 custom-built Olympic platforms, 18 multipurpose power racks and a fully-equipped plyometric area.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and ensure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists.

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.
