CHAMPIONSHIP-CALIBER PROGRAM

Over the last several seasons, the William and Mary men's tennis program has enjoyed a large amount of success. In 2005, the Tribe won its third CAA crown.

During the fall of 2006, Colin O'Brien and Alex Cojanu won the ITA Mideast Region Doubles Championship. The College went on to enjoy one of the best seasons in school history during the 2007 spring season. The Tribe earned its highest ITA Ranking in school history at No. 31 and garnered an at-large spot in the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

Following its at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament in 2007, the Tribe has participated in the post-season 10 times in school history.

The 2008 campaign saw the Tribe defeat No. 34-ranked Notre Dame for the first time in 30 years and advance to the CAA Championship match for the sixth time since 1999. The College also posted its second straight 16-win dual match season. Alex Cojanu became the first Tribe player to be named the AEF Tribe Club Male Senior Athlete of the Year for the College.

Each of the last two years, the Tribe has sent players to the NCAA Individual Championships. In 2007, Alex Cojanu and Colin O'Brien advanced to the second round of the doubles championship. A year later, W&M sent a singles player and a doubles team to the championships for the first time in over 60 years. Cojanu competed in the singles championship, while both he and Juneau played in the doubles event.

TRIBE OFF THE COURT

- During their careers, W&M men's tennis players travel extensively throughout the country for individual tournaments and team matches.

- In 2008-09, the Tribe will have trips to Athens, Georgia; La Jolla, California; Malibu, California; and Montgomery, Alabama.

- In just the past four years, the Tribe has had extended stays in Hawaii, the Boston area, Florida, California, Tennessee, Kentucky, Texas and Idaho.

- In the spring of 2004, W&M spent nearly a week in sunny Hawaii and California, followed by three days in the snow-capped mountains of Idaho.

MCCORMACK-NAGELSEN TENNIS CENTER



Dedicated to excellence in academics and athletics, the College of William and Mary in historic Colonial Williamsburg is proud to offer one of the finest athletic facilities in the country—the McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center. Located on South Henry Street adjacent to the graduate housing complex, the McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, which opened in 1995, boasts impeccable tennis facilities and houses the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Women's Tennis Hall of Fame. Recently, the courts at the Tennis Center were resurfaced during the summer of 2007.

The facility was made possible through a generous gift from Mark H. McCormack, a 1951 graduate of William and Mary, and his wife, former world-class tennis professional Betsy Nagelsen. As the former chairman, president and chief executive officer of International Management Group, McCormack was widely recognized as the founder of the sports marketing industry.

The McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center features six indoor tennis courts using the GreenSet GrandPrix Surface (rubberized base under color coat), air conditioning and indirect lighting at a competitive level. The facility also includes member and team locker rooms, several spacious lobbies and spectator viewing that boasts 362 stadium seats as well as a mezzanine seating area. In addition, the ITA and Rolex generously donated a state-of-the-art electronic scoreboard.

The Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Women's Tennis Hall of Fame contains a collection of artifacts and records pertaining to collegiate women's tennis, and enshrines former players, coaches and contributors that have impacted the sport. The Hall of Fame also functions as a library, archive and research center for intercollegiate women's tennis.

DIRECTIONS TO BUSCH COURTS

From All Directions: Take I-64 to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). At second stoplight turn right on South Henry Street (Route 132 North). After passing the cemetery, turn right into the first driveway. Follow the street around to the right.



BUSCH TENNIS COURTS



One of the newest athletics venues at the College of William and Mary, the Busch Courts tennis complex opened in September of 2001. It is the outdoor home of the Tribe tennis squads.

The complex features eight individual hard court surfaces. Each court features California Corners, a unique design that includes quarter fences that run along the sidelines to allow for uninterrupted play.

There is stadium seating for approximately 500 people at Busch Courts, and there is also a state-of-the-art lighting system to accommodate night matches.

The facility received an upgrade in 2007. During the summer months, the courts at the complex were resurfaced along with the courts at the McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center.

DIRECTIONS TO BUSCH COURTS

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234 (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through first stoplight (at Ironbound Road). After the light, continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers) There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. Busch Courts will be on your right.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrop Drive. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrop Drive while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left. Busch Courts are behind the Hall.

EARN "IT" EVERYDAY

Individual Growth and Team Goals

After advancing to the CAA Championship match for the sixth time in nine years last season and winning 16 dual matches for the second straight year, the Tribe men's tennis program is poised to continue on the winning path and further cement itself as a contender on both the conference and national scenes. W&M enters the 2008-09 season with a simple slogan to develop and enhance a talented youthful roster. The Tribe's mantra is, "Earn 'IT' Everyday: Individual Growth and Team Goals." The I standing for Individual Growth as the College strives to individually develop the talent of its players, while the T stands for Team Goals as it tries to combine those individual talents in the hope of reaching its team goals. Quite simply, the Tribe wants to remain in the CAA title hunt and earn another trip to the NCAA Tournament.

The milestones for the W&M program recently have been plentiful. In 2007, the Green and Gold reached its highest point in the in the ITA National Rankings at No. 31 and also earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament. A year later, head coach Peter Daub continued to develop the national reputation of the W&M program as the College notched its second-straight 16-win season. The Tribe also took a huge step on an individual level as W&M advanced both a singles player and a doubles team in the NCAA Individual Championships for the first time in over 60 years. Alex Cojanu (2008 graduate) competed in the NCAA Singles Championship, while playing alongside junior Keziel Juneau in the doubles championship. Cojanu went on to become the first W&M men's tennis player to be named the AEF Tribe Club Senior Male Athlete of the Year. In dual-match competition, the Tribe recorded its first win over then-No. 34 Notre Dame in 30 years.

Leading the way for the Tribe in 2009 will be its senior duo of Marwan Ramadan and Dominic Pagon. The pair combined for over 40 singles wins last season, while playing at the top of the lineup. Ramadan won a team-best 22 matches and played as high as No. 2 in the singles lineup.

After missing the majority of his first two seasons with injury, Pagon became a fixture

at the top of the lineup as a junior. He finished with 19 singles wins, which equaled the total he amassed in his first two injury-plagued years. He notched an impressive win over the No. 91-ranked player from Wake Forest. Pagon also came through in the clutch against Notre Dame, winning the clinching match at the No. 3 slot.

The junior class of Juneau and Richard Wardell has made its presence felt. Juneau garnered a significant amount of experience on the national scene last season, playing in both the All-American Championships and the NCAA Doubles Championship. During the dual match campaign, Juneau showed his ability to compete with the best in the country, knocking off the highest ranked opponent of his career. He defeated the No. 45-ranked player from Rice during the teams' dual match contest. Juneau won his final three matches of the season to finish with 16 singles wins. He was ranked No. 124 nationally in the ITA preseason singles rankings.

Wardell is a fiery competitor who has impressive strength in his 5-9 frame. After struggling a bit during the 2007 fall while making a change to his game, the Fort Myers, Fla., native tallied nine of his 12 wins on the year during the dual-match season. He also was in the Tribe singles lineup during both the CAA semifinal and championship matches.

The makeup of the Green and Gold roster includes a large contingent of talented underclassmen. Five sophomores, including two transfers, are the nucleus of the underclassmen lineup. Both Jacob Braig and William Lang join the Tribe as transfers from Christopher Newport and Tennessee, respectively. Braig was an ITA Scholar-Athlete selection at Christopher Newport during his rookie season, while helping CNU to the NCAA Division III Tournament. Lang comes to W&M from Tennessee after earning five-star credentials from the Tennis Recruiting Network prior to entering the college game. In limited action with the Volunteers, Lang turned in a six singles wins and seven doubles victories during his rookie season.

Sophomores Sebastien Vidal, Ben Wirth and Varun Pandit return for their second sea-

sons. Vidal possesses a very mature game for his youthful age. He quickly became a permanent part of the Tribe rotation, and as the season wore on, he became more confident to the point where he provided valuable wins. Vidal capped his impressive rookie season by coming back to clinch W&M's CAA semifinal win over Old Dominion.

Wirth and Pandit spent the majority of their first seasons refining their untapped talents. Wirth showed the ability to develop into a solid part of the lineup by winning his second collegiate tournament after advancing to the finals in his first. He won his flight of the Virginia State Open after earning a berth in the finals of the Brown bracket of the Virginia Invite. After getting off to a slow start, Pandit went on to win his final four matches of the dual-match season.

The Green and Gold also add a pair of true freshmen in Daniel Mihalov and Ilja Orre. Mihalov was rated the 12th-best player in the state of Illinois by the Tennis Recruiting Network and was a two-time Illinois State Championships qualifier. Orre comes to the Tribe from Helsinki, Finland, where he advanced to the third round of the European Junior Individual Championships in 2006.

As is the norm with Daub-coached teams, the Tribe will have a slew of options in the doubles lineup, providing for a deep tandem's rotation. W&M lives by the pairs' motto of "Wild and Crazy Doubles." Vidal, Pagon and Juneau all earned All-CAA honors in doubles last season with Pagon and Juneau earning first-team accolades. Pagon and Juneau were also VaSID all-state honorees. Vidal turned in an exceptional rookie season in doubles, winning 28 matches. The total ranked as the second-most ever for a W&M rookie and his 77.8 winning percentage in doubles was the third best. Vidal and Juneau were ranked No. 38 in the ITA Preseason doubles rankings. Pagon ended last year with 18 doubles wins and capped the season playing at the No. 1 doubles slot. Wardell also has the ability to play high in the doubles lineup and earlier this fall advanced to the quarterfinals of the ITA Mideast Regional along with Vidal.

TRIBE PLAYERS IN THE PROFESSIONAL RANKS

The Tribe men's tennis program has not only produced successful student-athletes in the business world, but in the professional tennis ranks as well. Currently, two former W&M players in Colin O'Brien (a 2007 graduate) and Alex Cojanu (a 2008 graduate) are playing on the professional circuit.

Over the last year, three former Tribe student-athletes have spent time ranked in the ATP World Doubles Rankings. O'Brien has been ranked as high as No. 670 in doubles and No. 736 in singles, while Cojanu has been as high as No. 723 in doubles and No. 1049 in singles. Stephen Ward (a 2006 graduate) was ranked as high as No. 874 in doubles during his professional career in 2007. Ward won his first USTA Pro Circuit championship, taking home the doubles title at the Laguna Niguel Pro Futures Classic in 2006.

Former Tribe players Trevor Spracklin (a 2001 graduate) and Jeff Kader (a 2005 graduate) played professionally following their days at W&M. Kader is currently the assistant men's tennis coach at N.C. State, while Spracklin retired from the circuit following a career that included ATP World Rankings as high as No. 734 in singles and No. 319 in doubles. He won more than 10 doubles titles in his career.

Over the last year, O'Brien and Cojanu have enjoyed success on the pro circuit. In 2008, Cojanu won a trio of ATP Doubles Futures events in Greece, Egypt and Syria. O'Brien has been impressive as well advancing to the finals of an ATP Singles Futures event in Ireland, while qualifying for the finals in three Doubles Futures tournaments. Also during the 2008 season, O'Brien played for his native Ireland in the Davis Cup.

THE TRIBE TENNIS PROGRAM HAD THREE FORMER PLAYERS RANKED AMONG THE TOP 850 IN THE WORLD IN DOUBLES DURING THE 2007-08. THE COLLEGE CURRENTLY HAS TWO FORMER PLAYERS RANKED AMONG THE TOP 750 IN THE WORLD IN DOUBLES AND THE TOP 1050 IN SINGLES.

The Tribe men's tennis team capped a successful run during the 2008 season with its sixth CAA Championship match appearance since 1999. Despite falling to No. 26 VCU in the title match, the Tribe finished with a 16-12 record on the year, while playing 18 nationally ranked foes. It marked the eighth time in school history the Tribe won 16 or more matches, including the second in a row.

Individually, the Tribe sent both a singles player and a doubles team to the NCAA Individual Championships for the first time in more than 60 years. Senior Alex Cojanu became the first Tribe player over the same time frame to compete in both the singles and doubles championships as well. He garnered a spot in the singles event as the highest nationally ranked singles player in the CAA, while he and sophomore Keziel Juneau were the highest ranked doubles team in the league to earn a spot at NCAAs. Cojanu finished the year ranked No. 109 nationally and No. 19 in the Mideast Region. The doubles tandem capped the campaign at No. 34 nationally and No. 7 in the region. For his efforts Cojanu went on to be named the AEF Tribe Club co-Senior Male Athlete of the Year for the College in 2007-08.

W&M garnered a spot in the CAA Championship match thanks to a 4-1 victory over rival Old Dominion in the semifinals. After clinching the doubles point, senior Alex Cojanu and sophomore Keziel Juneau pulled the College within a singles victory of the team triumph with wins at the No. 1 and No. 4 positions. Freshman Sebastien Vidal rallied from a set deficit to ice the match with a win at the No. 5 singles slot.

The highlight of the 2008 campaign for the Tribe was its 4-3 upset of No. 34 Notre Dame in South Bend on April 6, as the College defeated its highest ranked opponent of the year. It was also W&M's first win over the Irish in 30 years and the program's first ever win over Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind. W&M opened the match by taking the doubles point, before Juneau, Cojanu and junior Dominic Pagon ran off singles victories to tally the win. Cojanu defeated the No. 42-ranked player in the country, Brett Helgson, in his No. 1 tilt against the Irish.

Cojanu highlighted the postseason honors for the Tribe, garnering First-Team All-CAA and VaSID All-State honors in both singles and doubles for the second straight season. Juneau and Pagon both joined Cojanu on the All-CAA First Team in doubles, while the tandem of senior Kavi Sud and Vidal was a third-team doubles selection. Cojanu and Juneau were First-Team VaSID All-State doubles honorees, while Cojanu joined Pagon on the second team in doubles.

Junior Marwan Ramadan finished the year with the most singles victories for the Tribe, tallying 22. Pagon was second with 19 singles victories, while Cojanu finished his career with 17 singles wins. The Tribe senior finished his W&M career ranking ninth in career singles wins with 78 and second in career doubles wins with 97. In doubles, Vidal topped the squad with 28 wins, which were the second most by a Tribe rookie in school history. His doubles winning percentage of .778 was the third-best in the program's history.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

The College of William and Mary's 1946-47 men's tennis team posted the finest record in Tribe history when it claimed the team title at the National Intercollegiate Tournament in Los Angeles, in June of 1947. The netters, coached by Dr. Sharvey G. Umbeck, tallied 10 points to clinch first-place honors. Leading the way for the Tribe was Gardner Larned, who won the national singles title that same year by defeating Vic Seixas of North Carolina 6-3, 9-11, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1. Other members of the 1947 team included Tut Bartzen, Fred Kovaleski, Bob Doll, Bren Macken, Howe Atwater, Lyman Chenault, Dick Randell, Jim Macken, George Fricke, Bill Ozenberger and Bob Galloway.

In 1948, Kovaleski and team captain Bartzen, returning as the nation's fourth- and fifth-ranked players, guided the Tribe to its second-straight national team title. In addition, the duo captured the national doubles championship, a feat that has yet to be repeated in William and Mary men's tennis history.

A SUCCESSFUL BALANCE

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

• The 2007-08 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 92. W&M also had eight different programs represented at the NCAA Championship level in some capacity.

• The men's cross country squad won its eighth consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fifth straight. The women's track and field team won its seventh CAA Championship in the last eight years, while the women's tennis team added its 20th all-time CAA crown in the 23-year history of the league during the spring.

• In total, W&M had five conference players of the year, five conference scholar-athletes of the year, 18 All-Americans and 100 athletes earned all-conference honors in their respective sports during the 2007-08 season.

• Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic garnered All-America honors by advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. Moulton-Levy also became the first Tribe athlete and only the fourth in CAA history to win conference player of the year honors for a fourth time. Katie Radloff, who garnered CAA Swimmer of the Year and Swimmer of the Championships honors for the second straight season, earned a spot in the NCAA Swimming Championships for the second time in as many years. Christo Laundry earned All-America honors for the third time in cross country and also won the CAA Individual Championship. Women's soccer player Claire Zimmeck garnered CAA Player of the Year honors for the second straight season and was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy. Additionally, Emily Anderson earned All-America honors with a fifth-place finish in the 1,500m, marking the best Tribe finish in 14 years.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any athletic scholarship-granting school and of any public school, among the Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in 2005.
- In a recent NCAA survey on graduation rates, William and Mary athletic teams set the standard for academic excellence – 13 teams graduated 100 percent of their players. The overall graduation rate for our athletes is 96 percent (higher than 86 percent for the entire student body).
- There have been 45 student athletes elected to Phi Beta Kappa in the past ten years. Four Rhodes Scholars were W&M student-athletes.
- The William and Mary men's gymnastics program won named as the 2008 College Gymnastics Coaches Association National Academic Team Championship by virtue of having the highest team cumulative GPA of any men's program in the nation. Longtime Tribe head coach Cliff Gauthier has mentored the program to four National Academic Team titles.
- W&M topped the CAA and all Division I Virginia schools in the Graduation Success Rate (GSR) released by the NCAA in 2007.
- In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 25 winners in the six-year history of the award.

The College

THE COLLEGE OF WILLIAM AND MARY

The College of William and Mary is a public university located in Williamsburg, Va. Founded in 1693 by Royal Charter issued by King William III and Queen Mary II of England, William and Mary is the second oldest college in the country after Harvard. William and Mary has a long history of liberal arts education and a growing research and science curriculum that demonstrates a strong commitment to undergraduate research. The College, which became a state university in 1906, has been designated a "Public Ivy," and for nine straight years has been ranked by U.S. News & World Report as sixth-best public university in the country – and the nation's top small public university.

Also referred to as "the alma mater of a nation," the College has educated four U.S. Presidents – George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, which is the third most of any college in the country. William and Mary also claims several firsts, including the 1776 creation of Phi Beta Kappa – the country's first academic honor society – the first honor code of conduct for college students, and the first collegiate law school, established in 1779. William and Mary is also home to the Sir Christopher Wren Building – the country's oldest academic building still in use – and the President's House, the oldest home of a university president still in use.

WILLIAM AND MARY FACTS:

- In addition to four U.S. Presidents, William and Mary has educated a number of this country's key historical figures, including U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Marshall and 16 signers of the Declaration of Independence.
- More recent famous alumni from William and Mary include U.S. Secretary of Defense Robert Gates ('65), the late David Brown ('78) (astronaut on the Columbia Shuttle), actress Glenn Close ('74), comedian John Stewart ('84), fashion designer Perry Ellis ('61), actor Patton Oswalt ('91), the late Mark McCormack ('51) (founder of sports and celebrity agency IMG), actress Linda Lavin ('59), NASCAR and Gibbs Racing's J.D. Gibbs ('91), Minnesota Vikings star Darren Sharper ('97), and Pittsburgh Steelers Head Coach Mike Tomlin ('95).
- In 2008, William and Mary recognized as 5th-highest producer of Peace Corps volunteers among mid-sized schools (5,000-15,000 students). As of January 2008, 51 W&M alumni are serving. Since the Peace Corps' inception, 499 W&M alumni have volunteered with the Corps, making the university the 82nd-highest producer of volunteers of all time.
- For 2007-2008, the College had more Fulbright Scholars than any other college of university in Virginia, and it had the highest application-to-award rate among nation's top research institutions. In 2006-2007, 12 William and Mary students were named Fulbright Scholars. Eleven received the honor in 2007-08 and scholars are studying in countries such as Argentina, Hungary, Uganda, Sweden, Senegal, and Ecuador.
- In 2008, U.S. News ranked William and Mary sixth among all public colleges and universities and 33rd out of all universities – both public and private. The William & Mary Law School ranked tied for 30th in 2008 by U.S. News. The Mason School Business ranked 40th in nation (2008) by Financial Times and 71st in the world. William and Mary ranked 4th-best bargain in higher education by Kiplinger's in 2008. Newsweek magazine named W&M "hottest small state university" in 2006.
- In 2008, W&M received a record number of applications for undergraduate admission for the 3rd year in a row. More than 11,500 undergraduate applications were received.
- According to a recent survey, William and Mary students contribute 323,000 hours of community service per year. Seventy-five percent of undergraduates and 50 percent of graduate students report they volunteered during their time at the College. Ninety percent of undergraduates report they will volunteer in the community they reside in following graduation.

W. TAYLOR REVELEY III PRESIDENT

Taylor Reveley was named the 27th President of William and Mary on Sept. 5, 2008. He served as the interim president starting in February of 2008, before taking over the roll in a full capacity. Prior to becoming the President of the College, Reveley served as dean of William & Mary Law School for almost a decade, starting in August 1998. He is the John Stewart Bryan Professor of Jurisprudence.

Reveley received his A.B. from Princeton University's

Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs in 1965. At Princeton, he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and rowed on the lightweight crew for two years. Reveley went to law school at the University of Virginia, receiving his J.D. in 1968. During the United States Supreme Court's 1969 term, he clerked for Justice William J. Brennan, Jr.

Reveley has extensively studied and written about the constitutional division of the war powers between the President and Congress. In 1972-73, he spent 13 months studying the war powers while an International Affairs Fellow of the Council on Foreign Relations in New York City and a Fellow of the Woodrow Wilson Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C. He is the author of *War Powers of the President and Congress: Who Holds the Arrows and Olive Branch?* (University of Virginia Press, 1981).

Before joining William & Mary, Reveley practiced law for many years at Hunton &

Williams, where he specialized in energy matters, especially those involving commercial nuclear power. He was the managing partner of the firm for nine years.

Much of Reveley's extracurricular time over the years has gone to non-profit organizations. He has served on many educational and cultural boards, including those of Princeton University (where he is a trustee emeritus), Union Theological Seminary in Virginia, St. Christopher's School, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, JSTOR, the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, the Virginia Historical Society, the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities, the Richmond Symphony, and the Presbyterian Church (USA) Foundation.

Reveley and his wife Helen have four children—Taylor, Everett, Nelson, and Helen Lanier—and a daughter-in-law, Margaret Louise (Marlo, married to Taylor).



SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR CHANCELLOR

Justice O'Connor spent her childhood on an isolated cattle ranch in southeastern Arizona tending to a variety of ranch chores, raising farm animals, and reading voraciously. After completing school in El Paso, Texas, she journeyed west to continue her education at Stanford University, where her

professors inspired and challenged her to make a difference in her nation and the world.

Justice O'Connor earned a B.A. in economics (magna cum laude) from Stanford University and a LL.B. from Stanford Law School. She was an editor of the law review and graduated third in her law class—two spots behind her friend and future colleague, the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist.

After being admitted to the bar, Justice O'Connor served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the U.S. Army Quartermaster Market Center in Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Ari-

zona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms, during which she served as Majority Leader. In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She succeeded the Honorable Henry A. Kissinger as Chancellor of the College of William and Mary in 2005. In the year since her investiture, she has visited the College several times, visiting classes, talking with students, and addressing two academic conferences.

She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, whom she met in law school. They have three sons: Scott, Brian, and Jay.

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR TERRY DRISCOLL

Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 13th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also

maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that is committed to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last five years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 23 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Track & Field and Women's Tennis). As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no institution in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 92 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has posted a 100 percent graduation rate three times, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 26 individuals receive the honor.

In addition to the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, la-

crosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Most recently, the College dedicated a new \$11 million, 30,000 square-foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium in the summer of 2008. During the last three years, the venerable stadium has been enhanced with an \$800,000-plus video scoreboard (2007), the installation of a \$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006) and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006).

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fund-raising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

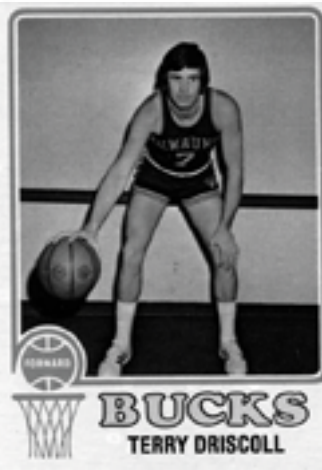
A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the venue executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organize the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



TRIBE FACILITIES

William and Mary is committed to building and maintaining outstanding facilities for all 21 of its varsity athletic teams. The College has demonstrated this commitment by investing approximately \$16 million toward the construction and upgrade of its athletics facilities during just the last five years. Among W&M's recent projects was the construction of the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center, which was dedicated this past June. In recent years, the College has hosted NCAA tournament events for football and women's tennis, while a number of other W&M programs have hosted conference championships at Tribe venues.

MARK MCCORMACK TRIBUTE

William and Mary lost a favorite son on May 16, 2003, with the death of **Mark Hume McCormack**, a 1951 graduate of the College. McCormack had been in coma since January after suffering a heart attack. Named by ESPN as one of the century's most influential people in the business of sport, he revolutionized the world of sports marketing with the founding of International Management Group (IMG).

A devoted and dedicated supporter of Tribe athletics, he and his wife, Betsy Nagelsen founded W&M's McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, endowed a tennis scholarship and were continuing sponsors of the ITA Women's Tennis Hall of Fame. Also a member of W&M's Board of Visitors, McCormack chaired the College's fund-raising campaign in 1993 that raised \$153 million and was the honorary chair of a campaign for William and Mary, which raised over \$500 million for the College.
