Directions to William and Mary

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234A (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until the Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through three stoplights, and continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers). There may not be a street sign! The road is heavily wooded on both sides. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. William and Mary Hall will be on your left.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrop Way. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrop Way while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left.

Former Tribe standout Kathy Newberry assumed the role of head coach for both the women's track and field and cross country programs in March 2005 after serving the previous two years as a volunteer assistant coach to the Tribe's men's cross country and track programs. Showing no drop-off in the tradition of excellence built over the past decade and a half, Newberry has already directed the program to four Colonial Athletic Association titles and was named CAA Coach of the Year in both cross country and track in 2005-06.

The 2006 cross country season was a solid entry into the College annals, as the team won its fourth-straight CAA title and placed a program-best second at the ECAC Championships. Meghan Bishop became the Tribe's seventh harrier to earn four All-CAA honors by placing second at the CAA Championships, and was fourth at the ECAC Championships to earn All-East accolades. Junior Emily Gousen made huge strides last season, winning the Tribe Open by over 40 seconds and also earning All-CAA and All-East honors. Freshman Anna Brousell appeared in a team-high seven races, earning all-conference and All-East acclaim as well as running at the NCAA Southeast Regional.

The Tribe followed up in the spring by posting its first qualifier to the NCAA Championships since 2004, as Bonnie Meekins competed in the heptathlon and placed 16th. The College also produced six CAA champions and one ECAC titlist. The distance corps was in full force at the CAA Championships, taking every race 1,500m and longer at the conference meet. Freshman Emily Anderson was the CAA Champion at 1,500m, marking the fourth time in the past five years that a W&M athlete had won the event, and the third time in that span the winner had been a freshman. Senior Kate Willever won the 3,000m steeplechase for her first conference title, and Bishop won the 5,000m for her third crown. Gousen completed the sweep by winning the 10,000m in a meet-record time of 36:04.05. Gousen also earned All-East both indoors and outdoors at 5,000m, finishing second at the outdoor ECAC Championships in 16:58.90.

In Newberry's first season at the helm of the cross country program, her athletes far out-stripped the expectations of most observers, culminating in an upset of 24th-ranked North Carolina for fifth at the Southeast Region Championships, gaining the team its first at-large berth to the NCAA Championship since 2002. Under her tutelage, the Tribe recorded four team victories in 11 attempts, including a third-consecutive CAA crown. Led by the efforts of juniors Meghan Bishop and Julia Cathcart, who finished one-two for the College in every race they ran, William and Mary's return to the NCAA Championships was a success as the school placed 23rd and narrowly missed upsetting the Tar Heels again. The duo, who were the CAA Co-Rookies of the Year in 2003, finished 76th and 86th, respectively, and also earned allconference and all-region honors.

Freshmen played a big role in the success of the harrier's season as well, as three ran in the CAA Championships and one, Kelsey Snowden, also participated at the Southeast Regional. Fellow freshman Emily Schroeder not only counted an appearance at the CAAs in her season's accomplishments, but also earned her first individual collegiate title at the Tribe Open. The team was also a hit in the classroom, earning Academic All-America honors from the women's cross country coaches association (WICCCA) for the seventh consecutive season, and Bishop was honored by the CAA as Scholar-Athlete of the Year and by WICCCA as an All-Academic team member.

The 2006 track season also proved to be a smashing success, as the women won their sixth-straight CAA crown and sent numerous individuals to the NCAA Regional. Bishop earned All-East honors indoors and outdoors at 3,000m, and set huge personal records in both the 3,000m and 5,000m. She

took fourth in the 3,000m indoors at ECACs, qualifying provisionally for the NCAA Championships and ranking fourth all-time at W&M with a time of 9:31.25. Outdoors, she ran a stunning 40 seconds below her previous best in the 5,000m at Stanford, timing 16:18.49 to qualify for the NCAA Regionals. The mark also ranks fourth in the school record books. Kristyn Shiring took second in the CAA 5,000m for the second year in a row, and was also a double All-East honoree at 5,000m, qualifying for the NCAA Regional with her runner-up performance at the outdoor ECACs.

At the CAA Championships, Newberry's athletes won four titles, the 800m, 5,000m, discus, and heptathlon. They also earned second-place showings at 1,500m, 3,000m steeplechase, 10,000m, shot-put, and hammer throw. Senior Lydia Malley had a breakout season, winning the CAA 800m and earning All-East honors individually at 800m and as part of the 4x800m relay team that took second, along with sophomore Allie Lewis and freshmen Schroeder and Rebecca Ward. Cathcart was the CAA 5,000m champion in meet-record time and was named All-East outdoors. At the conclusion of the season, the CAA named Bishop as its Scholar-Athlete of the Year for women's track, giving her an unprecedented third such honor. Also, the coaches voted Newberry as Coach of the Year, giving her the sweep of the year's awards.

In 2005, the team took the conference track championships by storm, winning four titles and garnering 20 All-CAA nods. Senior Jackie Kosakowski was the runner-up in the CAA 3,000m steeplechase and followed up a month later with the ECAC crown in the same event. Bishop won her second 1,500m title at the CAA Championships, and was on pace for All-East honors in the event before she was knocked to the track in the finals. Shiring exploded at the indoor ECAC championships, running 41 seconds below her previous best at 5,000m to qualify provisionally for the NCAA Championships. She also hit the provisional mark outdoors for 10,000m, winning the Raleigh Relays in 34:46.60. In all, Newberry's inaugural season yielded four CAA champions, one ECAC champion, 20 all-conference citations, three indoor and five outdoor All-East nods, four NCAA Provisional marks, 11 bids to the indoor ECAC meet, 26 bids to the outdoor ECAC meet, and five NCAA Regional berths (four individual, one relay).

Still an active competitor at the national level, competing regularly both on the track and in road races, Newberry qualified for the 2004 Olympic Trials finals in both the 5,000m and 10,000m, finishing 13th and 14th, respectively. She also ended 2004 ranked 10th nationally in the 10,000m. A three-time qualifier for the U.S. National Cross Country Team, Newberry finished 25th at the 2004 World Cross Country Championships as the second-fastest American in the 8,000m race. She again competed at the 2005 Worlds, finishing in 38th as the third-fastest American, after qualifying with a fourth-place finish at the 2005 USA Cross Country Championships. In 2003, she was ranked 17th in the nation in the 5,000m and placed 11th in that distance at the 2003 USAT&F Championships. Newberry also raced to third in the 2003 USAT&F Fall Cross Country Championships and also competed at the 2005 USAT&F Championships in the 5,000m.

An ace for the Tribe from 1996 to 2000, Newberry claimed two CAA titles (3,000m and 5,000m) and earned multiple All-East designations. She was All-CAA and all-region in cross country every season and was the top finisher on the 1998 Tribe cross country squad that finished a best-ever 10th at the NCAA Championships, just missing All-America honors in 43rd place. She still holds the College records in the indoor distance medley relay (11:39.85) and outdoor 4x1,500m relay (18:08.88). She also boasts the Tribe's fourth-fastest 1,500m time (4:28.37), fifth-fastest 3,000m time (9:38.13) and ninth-fastest 5,000m time (16:49.29). In her postcollegiate career she has dropped her times further, running 15:45.32 for 5,000m and 32:45.78 for 10,000m.

She has previous coaching experience at Stephen F. Austin State University where she served as a volunteer assistant, helping the Lumberjacks sweep the conference titles in both men's and women's cross country and mentoring several conference titlists and a national qualifier. A resident of Williamsburg, Newberry was married in the summer of 2005 to the Tribe's head men's track and cross country coach, Alex Gibby.

DAN STIMSON



In his 22nd year as Director of Track and Field at William and Mary, Dan Stimson oversees a program that has demonstrated success both in the classroom and on the track, and has served as an exemplary model for what collegiate athletics should be all about. In recognition of his years of service, the College honored Coach Stimson in 2007 by naming the new throwing facility in his honor, the Stimson Throwing Events Area. Made possible through a generous donation from Mr. And Mrs. Joe Showker, the facility includes an Olympic throwing cage with circles for both the hammer and discus, two shot put circles, and javelin runway.

The men's and women's programs have

combined for 15 Colonial Athletic Association titles out of 20 possible since the 2002-03 school year, and have garnered numerous CAA Athlete and Rookie of the Year awards. The 2006-07 season was another banner year for the squads, as Stimson's program captured both CAA cross country titles: the seventh consecutive conference title for the men's team and fourth in a row for the women's squad. Punctuating the season was the

10th-straight NCAA team qualification for men's cross country, an achievement only four other schools can claim. To date, Stimson's programs have produced 54 All-Americans and one Olympian.

Stimson, who works primarily with the throwers, jumpers, and multi-eventers, has mentored many W&M athletes to national prominence in his tenure. Due to the absence of the javelin or the hammer throw at the high school level in Virginia and other nearby states, Stimson has earned a reputation for his ability to develop young talent.

His coaching credits include W&M hammer throw record-holder Mike Howell, who started with the hammer in his rookie season at W&M, and progressed through the ranks until his senior year, when he posted the eighth-best mark by an American collegian (206'1"). Decathlon record-holder Todd Doughty (7,240 points) benefited from his time with

Stimson as well, working his way from a walk-on to one of the top 20 decathletes in the country over the course of his career at W&M.

On the women's side, Stimson coached All-America high jumper Lisa Rayner to an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championships and a school-record mark of 5'11.25" in 1994. Wendy Warren, the school record-holder in the javelin (153'6"), was discovered in a physical education class and went on to earn All-East honors and place sixth at the ECAC Championships. Stimson coached pole vaulter Charlotte LaRoche to second place in the ECAC Championships and a school record of 13'1" in her freshman season. He then guided steady improvement throughout her career, culminating in 2004 with her second conference title and double All-East honors. Stimson has had numerous All-East performers in all of the field events.

A recent example of Stimson's coaching ability can be seen in 2004 graduate Chris Parsons. As a freshman, Parsons made a powerful debut, winning CAA titles in both the shot put and the javelin, enabling him to be selected for the United States Junior National

Team. He followed up his impressive freshman season with a sophomore campaign that featured top CAA finishes in the discus (fourth), javelin (third), hammer (second) and a second straight firstplace showing in the shot put. Parsons went on to garner All-East honors in the hammer at the

IC4A meet. In 2003 Parsons was named CAA Scholar-Athlete of the year, after earning a pair of all-conference honors by finishing second in both the shot and the hammer at the CAA Championships. Parsons capped his career in style, winning the 2004 CAA title in the shot and hammer and breaking the NCAA Regional mark in both events.

More Stimson-guided athletes litter the W&M and CAA record books. In 2005, Ayanna Jones claimed her second shot put title at the CAA Championships, the fifthconsecutive year a Tribe woman had won the event. She would go one to shatter the 23-year old school record in the event, putting the shot 48' 6" in the ECAC Championships. 2006 graduate Andy Smith became one of only two athletes in school history to claim four CAA crowns in one event (joining Tyler Steel, winner of the hammer throw from 1997-2000) after winning the javelin for the fourth time at the 2006 conference meet.

Perhaps no event in recent years shows the effect of Stimson's tutelage more than the women's heptathlon, where four athletes in the Green and Gold have won the last five CAA titles, and six of the seven ever contested, along with the last two ECAC crowns. Alarice Cesareo earned a pair of titles in 2001 and 2003, and Phi Beta Kappa-graduate Sarah McHale won in 2004. In 2005, Bonnie Meekins won her first title with a thenrecord score of 4,763 points, before giving way to classmate Brenna Blevins in 2006, who scored 4,806 points. In 2007, Meekins came back again with another meet record, 5,192 points. Similarly, Blevins won the 2006 ECAC crown with a then-school record total of 5,229, the highest point total not invited to the NCAA Championships that year. Meekins provided the breakthrough this past spring, powering to a score of 5,457 to claim

the Eastern title, and a trip to the NCAA meet, where she would place 16th.

In the 2006 CAA hammer throw, Liz Hager capped her career in heroic fashion. Cleared to throw only an hour before the event started because of a back injury, Hager threw 151' 9" with her only attempt, good for second place and the third-best throw in school history. Freshman Abby Lemon took her lead from Hager, setting a personal record with each of her six throws and finishing with a toss of 149' 2" to take third place in her first conference championships.

The 2007 throwing corps provided another feather in Stimson's cap, providing a school record and numerous top-10 marks despite having a grand total of two upperclassmen. Sophomore Alex Heacock captured his first CAA title in the javelin, throwing 25 feet farther than anyone else in the meet.

Abby Lemon was only four inches shy of her own conference title in the hammer throw, but did claim the Colonial Relays title with a then-school record throw of 161' 9", a mark she bettered at the ECAC Championships with a prodigious heave of 163' 11". Senior Jen Showker capped her career with lifetime-best marks in the shot put, discus (144' 9"), and hammer (142' 0"). Her put of 45' 0.5" at the CAA Championships guaranteed her third and berth at the ECAC meet, and makes her one of only four women to ever best 45 feet in the shot put.

Stimson began his career at perennial national powerhouse Tennessee, where he helped Volunteer athletes finish in the nation's top 10 on seven occasions and collect 12 Southeastern Conference titles. His coaching career started at Tennessee as a graduate assistant, helping the Vols win the 1972 NCAA cross country championship. From Knoxville, he moved to J.E.B. Stuart High School in Falls Church, Virginia for one year, then on to Miami University (Ohio) for nine years before coming to Williamsburg.

A native of Falconer, New York, Stimson graduated with honors from Ohio University in 1971 and holds a master's degree from Miami (Ohio). As an undergraduate, he was the All-Ohio and Central Collegiate shot put champion, as well as a two-time MAC shot put champion. He concluded his athletic career by competing in both the NCAA and AAU national championships in the shot put.

Dan and his wife Rosemary, also a Falconer native, have two children. Their son, Clare, is a local college student. Daughter Krista Crider graduated from W&M in 1996 with a B.S. in biology and earned her master's degree at the College in 1998. She earned a Ph.D. in the field of genetics and molecular biology at Emory University, and works for the Centers for Disease Control. Krista is a former W&M record holder in the hammer throw, and recently welcomed the newest addition to the Stimson family, when Samuel Daniel Crider was born in April of 2006.



ASSISTANT COACHES

Ed Moran

Ed Moran is in his third season on the William and Mary staff after a spectacular collegiate career that saw him earn four All-America honors in the 5,000m outdoors (2003, 2005) and in cross country (2000, 2002) for the College. In addition to assisting with both the men's and women's running programs, the 2003 graduate has continued to race under the tutelage of head men's coach Alex Gibby, achieving the Olympic "A" qualifying standard at 5,000m and 10,000m in 2007 and winning the 5,000m gold medal at the Pan-American Games.

A professionally-sponsored runner with Nike, Moran raced unsponsored at the 2005 USAT&F Track and Field Championships

shortly after earning his fourth All-America nod. He boasted an impressive debut, running well below his previous personal record in the 5,000m (13:39.70, second-best in school history, set a scant month-and-a-half earlier) to finish in 13:25.87. This time placed him only 49 hundredths of a second shy of the school record, running as the fastest amateur in the field of 24 runners. In 2007, he won the gold medal at the Pan-American Games with a meet-record time of 13:25.60, and will compete for a spot at the Beijing Olympics in the 2008 U.S. Olympic Trials.

In his six-year collegiate career, Moran racked up three all-conference and All-Southeast honors (never finishing worse than third), and was twice conference champion and Athlete of the Year in cross country. On the track, he earned multiple all-conference nods, was named the 2003 CAA Male Athlete of the Year and was the 2005 IC4A and CAA champion in the 5,000m.

Tribe

As a senior, Anastasia-Murphy was the College's top finisher at the CAA cross country championships, leading the team to the conference title with his fourth-place showing. He was also a part of the program's eighth-place showing at the NCAA Championships, finishing as the sixth Tribe harrier across the line. He also ran at the national meet in 2005, finishing 135th overall, and totaled three All-CAA, two All-East, and one All-Southeast honor in cross country.

Anastasia-Murphy, a native of Gloucester, Massachusetts, was also a standout on the track. In 2005 he ran 8:59.26 in the 3,000m steeplechase, the first time a Tribe runner had run under nine minutes since 1996. His most complete season came in 2007, and it started indoors with a 4:09.97 mile at the IC4A Championships. That placed him into the finals of the event, where he would eventually finish third for All-East honors. At the same meet, he won his first conference crown by running the lead-off leg of the distance medley relay which won the IC4A title. He would go on to win the Colonial Relays 3,000m steeplechase and the Penn Relays 4x800m outdoors, and ran at the NCAA Regional in the steeplechase for the third year in a row. He finished his career with five All-East accolades and a single All-CAA citation on the track.

2006 RESULTS

2007 ОUTLOOK

Even if a return trip to the NCAA Championships was not in the cards for the women's cross country team, the 2006 season cannot be counted as anything but a success. In addition to its fourth consecutive Colonial Athletic Association title, the Tribe posted its best finish ever at the ECAC Championships, finishing second by a mere four points. The challenge for coach **Kathy Newberry** this year will be replicating or bettering that run, and trying to return to the NCAA Championships for the third time in the past six years.

Despite the loss of Julia Cathcart and Meghan Bishop, who had seven All-CAA honors between them, the Tribe is the hands-down favorite to claim its 15th CAA title this October. Leading the charge will be fifth-year seniors **Anna Parker** and **Kate Willever**. Parker earned an all-conference nod last season by placing eighth, and also saw action at the Southeast Regional and ECAC Championships. Willever did not see much action last fall, but came on strong in the spring to win the 3,000m steeplechase at the CAA Track Championships and race at the NCAA Regional.

Between them, the three members of the class of 2008 include both of the College's NCAA veterans and the team's top returning distance runner. **Emily Gousen** won the Tribe Open last fall going away with a 44-second margin of victory, before finishing ninth at both the CAA Championships and the ECAC meet. On the track, she won the 10,000m CAA title with a meet-record time of 36:04.05, and earned All-East honors both indoors and outdoors at 5,000m, finishing second at the outdoor ECAC Championships.

Erin Prillaman was the third Tribe finisher at the 2005 NCAA Championships, and just missed All-CAA honors last year when she finished 13th at the conference meet. After redshirting during the outdoor track season, she returns to competition this fall looking to make her second appearance at the Southeast Regional. **Abby Booker** ran seventh for the Tribe at the NCAA Championships as a sophomore, and will look to move up the finish order this season. Booker's big moment last year came on the track, where she took second in the CAA 10,000m race.

Figuring to round out the Tribe's varsity seven is a mixed bag of juniors and sopho-

mores. **Emily Schroeder** is the top returning finisher from the CAA Championships, finishing fifth there in 2006. She also ran well at the ECAC Championships, placing 29th, and broke through on the track by setting personal-best marks in every event she ran, including 4:34.44 for 1,500m to place second at the CAA Championships. Fellow junior **Kelsey Snowden** redshirted last fall, but was 15th at the CAA Championships and ran at the Southeast Regional as a freshman in 2005.

Anna Brousell, along with Schroeder, appeared in more races than anyone else on the team last fall, finishing six races in her freshman season. She was also quite successful while doing so, earning All-CAA and All-East honors in addition to appearances at the Pre-National Invitational and the Southeast Regional. Classmate **Kayley Byrne** won the Cavalier Open in November, and also ran at the ECAC Championships. In the spring, the prep All-American was an ECAC and Junior Nationals qualifier at 5,000m.

Juniors **Lynn Morelli** and **Rebecca Ward** round out the probable candidates for the travel squad. Morelli was 15th at the CAA Championships last fall, and qualified for both the indoor and outdoor ECAC track championships. She earned All-East honors outdoors in the 3,000m, and was fourth in the 5,000m at the CAA Championships. Ward is tied for the team lead as one of several athletes with two appearances at the CAA Championships, and will look to continue that streak after finishing 18th last year. She was a double-finalist at the CAA track championships, placing in the top five in both the 800m and 1,500m, and ran 4:32.85 in the 1,500m at Duke, the team's second-fastest effort of the season.

Several harriers will be looking to make a major break-through and challenge for spots on the top squad. Junior **Emily Arena** ran for the Tribe at the ECAC Championships as a freshman, and classmate **Katie Endres** made major strides last spring in her first full year of competition, taking sixth in the CAA 10,000m and winning a pair of 3,000m races. Junior **Ellen Childress** is returning from injury, but ran at the ECAC Championships as a redshirtfreshman in 2005, and qualified for the ECAC track championships in the spring of 2006.

Sophomore **Emily Anderson** found her stride on the track, winning the CAA 1,500m title and qualifying for the NCAA Regional with her 4:31.26 performance at the Colonial Relays. **Keely Murphy** ran for the Tribe last fall at the CAA Championships, and was All-East indoors as a member of the 4x800m relay. Sophomore **Meghan Burns** was fifth at the Tribe Open in 2006, and qualified for the 1,500m finals at the CAA Championships last spring.

Sophomores **Ariel Burbey** and **Kelly McElroy** join Childress in making returns from injury, but with full summers of training will be counted on to step up for the team in the early part of the season. Also looking to

provide depth will be junior **Karin Ohman**, who was seventh in the Tribe Open last fall and set personal-records at 1,500m and 3,000m in the spring. Sophomores **Sallie Ford** and **Rachel Ohm** will look to make a bigger impact this fall, after competing for the Tribe at the CAA Track Championships in the 10,000m. Finally, sophomores **Morgan Stumb** and **Robin Vanneman** will be making their first appearances on the trails this year, after Stumb redshirted last fall and Vanneman walked onto the team during the outdoor track season.

The seven members of the freshman class bring a wealth of experience to the College, combining to earn 17 all-state honors and lead their teams to five state titles. **Sarrah Hadiji** earned All-America honors this summer at the Nike Outdoor Nationals, finishing eighth in the 3,200m and has run run 10:27.73 at that distance. She was also a three-time state champion at 3,200m for Woodson High in Virginia, and placed second at the state AAA cross country championships in 2005. **Kelsey Budd** led Paul VI to back-to-back state titles at both the Virginia Independent School cross country championships and the Virginia Catholic School championships, earning all-state honors in all four appearances.

Liz Milewski earned all-state distinction as a senior while leading Radnor to the Pennsylvania AAA state title, and earned All-Main Line honors for 10-consecutive seasons between cross country, indoor, and outdoor track. Milewski has run 5:04.45 in the 1,600m, and 10:20.76 for 3,000m. **Betsy Graney** traveled the farthest distance to come to the College, and enters as a three-time all-state runner for Grosse Pointe North in Michigan. Also a fourtime region champion with a personal-best time of 5:00.45 for 1,600m, Graney led Grosse Pointe North in the classroom to the Academic State Champions crown in 2005 while earning three academic all-state distinctions individually.

Meredith Tighe earned all-state honors in the 1,600m run both indoors and outdoors as a senior for Oakton, after helping the school take second at the 2005 Virginia AAA cross country championships. **Elizabeth Fortenberry** led George Mason High in Virginia to top-three finishes at the district, region, and state championships in both her junior and senior years. **Shannon Ralston** holds every distance record at Virginia Beach's Landstown High, and was the school's first female state qualifier.

GENE R. NICHOL PRESIDENT

Gene R. Nichol became the 26th president of the College of William and Mary on July 1, 2005.

Before returning to Williamsburg, where he taught two decades ago, Nichol was Burton Craige Professor and Dean of the law school at the University of North Carolina. He served as Law Dean at the University of Colorado from 1988 to 1995, and as James Gould Cutler Professor and Director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law at William and Mary

from 1985 to 1988. Nichol was also a faculty member at the University of Florida and West Virginia University. He founded the Byron R. White Center for the Study of American Constitutional Law at the University of Colorado (1990) and the Center for Civil Rights at the University of North Carolina (2001).

Nichol teaches courses in constitutional law and civil rights. He is the co-author of Federal Courts: Cases, Comments, and Questions (West, 2000) and a contributor to Where We Stand: Voices of Southern Dissent (NewSouth Books, 2004). Nichol has published articles and essays in the Harvard Law Review, the Yale Law Journal, the University of Chicago Law Review, the University of Pennsylvania Law Review, the Michigan Law Review, the California Law Review, the Virginia Law Review and an array of other leading legal journals. From 1998 to 1999, he was a political columnist for the Rocky Mountain News and the Colorado Daily. From 1999 to 2005, he was a regular op-ed writer for the Raleigh News & Observer. He has also written for The Nation and other periodicals.

Nichol has been significantly involved in public affairs. He has testified before a number of committees of the United States Congress and various state legislatures. In 1991, he was appointed special master by a three-judge federal court in Colorado to mediate a redistricting dispute between the governor and the legislature. The accord was ratified by statute. A year later he helped head the Colorado Reapportionment Commission. In 2004, Nichol led the North Carolina Bi-Partisan Commission on Lobbying Reform; legislation was passed enacting commission recommendations. He ran unsuccessfully for national political office while in Colorado. He has been elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

In 2003, Nichol won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day address. Two years later, Governor Michael Easley inducted Nichol into the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the state of North Carolina's highest civilian honor, and the national judicial access organization, Equal Justice Works, named him outstanding law school dean of the year.

At the College of William and Mary, Nichol has markedly increased access for students of color. He also created the Gateway William and Mary program, an innovative financial aid program that puts a quality education within the reach of all Virginians, regardless of their ability to pay.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played varsity football. He obtained his J.D. from the University of Texas, graduating Order of the Coif in 1976. He is married to Glenn George, a scholar of employment and labor law and a member of the faculty at the William and Mary's Marshall-Wythe School of Law. They have three daughters: Jesse (19), Jenny (18), and Soren (14).

SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR CHANCELLOR

Sandra Day O'Connor, one of the most distinguished jurists in the history of the United States Supreme Courtand its first female justice-addressed the most profound legal issues of her age with wisdom, courage, and skill. After a long career in public service, including nearly a quarter century on the nation's highest court, she retired in 2006.

Justice O'Connor spent her childhood on an isolated cattle ranch in southeastern Arizona tending to a variety of ranch chores, raising farm animals, and reading voraciously. After completing school in El Paso, Texas, she

journeyed west to continue her education at Stanford University, where her professors inspired and challenged her to make a difference in her nation and the world.

Justice O'Connor earned a B.A. in economics (magna cum laude) from Stanford University and a LL.B. from Stanford Law School. She was an editor of the law review and graduated third in her law class-two spots behind her friend and future colleague, the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist.

After being admitted to the bar, Justice O'Connor served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the U.S. Army Quartermaster Market Center in Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms, during which she served as Majority Leader. In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She succeeded the Honorable Henry A. Kissinger as Chancellor of the College of William and Mary in 2005. In the year since her investiture, she has visited the College several times, visiting classes, talking with students, and addressing two academic conferences.

She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, whom she met in law school. They have three sons: Scott, Brian, and Jay.

TERRY DRISCOLL ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

■ Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 12th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that William and Mary President Gene Nichol proclaimed "The nation's gold standard" when it came to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last four years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 19 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Swimming and Women's Tennis). In 2004-05, the Tribe captured five CAA championships and an Atlantic 10 Football title. As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no team in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 88 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has twice posted a 100 percent graduation rate, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 22 individuals receive the honor.

Despite the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). The total increased significantly when Driscoll announced plans to build the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmye Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium, which is scheduled to open in time for the 2008 season. This impressive structure follows closely on the heels of the installation of a \$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006) and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006) inside the stadium. Yet another significant upgrade will be unveiled inside the venerable structure for 2007, as the department will install an \$800,000-plus brand new video scoreboard by the season opener.

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associ-

ates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children -Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



BARB BLOSSER SENIOR EXECUTIVE ASSOCIATE AD/SWA

Few names in the William and Mary Athletics Department are as familiar, or respected, as that of Senior Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser. Since first arriving on campus in 1978, Blosser has touched the lives of thousands of Tribe studentathletes.

She has held her current title since April of 2004, after spending the previous 12 years as the associate atheletics director. In each role, Blosser has served as an integral part of nearly every facet of the department's daily operations.

Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a then school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the assistant to the associate athletics director. Over the past 17 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OAISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

The 2006-07 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 88.

The men's cross country squad won its seventh consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fourth straight. The women's swimming team won its first CAA Championship, while the women's tennis team added its 19th all-time CAA crown in the spring.

Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic reached the title match of the NCAA Doubles Championship, earning All-America honors. Katie Radloff became the first female swimmer to advance to the NCAA's since 1983. Additionally, Keith Bechtol raced to a 14thplace finish in the 10,000m, while Bonnie Meekins placed 16th in the heptathlon at the NCAA Track and Field Championships.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities.

This year, the NCAA honored 13 W&M teams as recipients of its public recognition award. The Tribe teams recognized are baseball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field

Additionally, in the latest NCAA graduation rate reports, three Tribe teams posted 100% graduation rates, including football, women's basketball and women's cross country/track.

Since 1992, 39 student-athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including three in the past academic year. Keith Bechtol (men's track) was a First-Team selec-tion, Ryan Overdevest (men's soccer) was a Second-Team selection and Anna Young (women's soccer) was a Third-Team selection.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in Scholar-Athlete of the year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 22 winners. Bechtol was the CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in both cross country and track and field, bringing his career award total to five. Meghan Bishop (women's cross country) earned her fourth CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year award in the fall in cross

In addition, four of W&M's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.





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THE COLLEGE

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public lvy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).



Sports Psychology

Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

Compliance, Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to ensure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength, Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.


Sports Medicine


