# The College of

# William & Mary

The first honorary degree from the College, a Master of Arts, was conferred upon Benjamin Franklin on April 2, 1756.

Chartered in 1693, the College was founded nearly four decades before Georgia, the last of the original 13 American colonies, was chartered by King George II in 1732.

## Facts About The College

- W&M was founded in 1693 and is the second-oldest educational institution in the United States.
- W&M was the highest ranked small public university in the country according to U.S. News and World Report.
- W&M ranked 16th in graduation rates for national universities.
- W&M was given the highest rating of academics, five stars, by the Fiske Guide to Colleges.
- W&M has a student/faculty ratio of 12/1.
- More W&M graduates go on to earn doctorates than any other university in Virginia.
- W&M students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in American, in 1776.
- In the inaugural NCAA Academic Progress Report, W&M boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

The Sunken Gardens' design was based on the gardens behind Chelsea Hospital in London, England. During the Revolutionary War, Patrick Henry selected the site as a place for the encampment of militia destined to join Washington's Continental Army in the North and later served as a bivouac area for many soldiers preparing to fight the British at Yorktown.

The "F.H.C." society was formed at the College on November 11, 1750. This was the first student secret society in America and the forerunner of the American fraternity system.

When the capitol of Virginia was moved from Jamestown to Williamsburg in 1699, the Wren Building served as temporary headquarters of the colonial government from 1700 until 1704.

Constructed between 1695 and 1699, the Wren Building is the oldest academic building in the United States. The building was originally designed to be the whole college, including a dining hall, dorm rooms and classrooms.

The Crim Dell was a gift from the class of 1964 to preserve the natural beauty of the area and is a memorial to John W.H. Crim, a nationally known attorney who was a benefactor to the College of William and Mary.

# 2005 Season Outlook

One of the best senior classes in recent memory, coupled with an outstanding incoming freshman class and a solid corps of juniors and sophomores, have the 2005 William and Mary field hockey team expecting to meet and even exceed the standard of excellence set by the program in recent years. In 2004 the Tribe was a perfect 7-0 against Colonial Athletic Association opponents, capturing the first outright regular season league title in school history. The team is on a run of seven consecutive winning seasons against what is always one of the toughest schedules in the nation, winning at least 65 percent of its games in three of the last four seasons. W&M enters the 2005 campaign on a 13-game winning streak in the regular season against conference opponents and has ended the year in third place or higher each of the last seven seasons in the CAA, one of the top three field hockey leagues in the nation.

Leading the way for the Tribe will be a group of five players, who make up what is likely one of the most experienced senior classes in the nation. These five—forward Kelly Giles, midfielder Shannon Karl, and defenders Anna Davis, Diana Esposito and Carly Falgowski—have played in a combined 269 games, including 217 starts, in their careers.

“I think this is one of the strongest senior classes we’ve had in years,” said Tribe head coach **Peel Hawthorne**, who was named the CAA and state coach of the year last season. “They’re all experienced players and they’ve all been starters for a long time. They play so well together—they know what each other is thinking when they’re out on the field.

“We have a lot of experience in the backfield and I think that’s going to be the key to our success. Our defenders will run the field and set up our attacking plays. We have a finisher in Kelly [Giles] and we have a lot of creativity in the midfield that can help generate the attack as well. But the heart and soul of our team is going to be in the defense.

“The potential of this team is very high,” continued Hawthorne. “The freshmen coming in are capable of impacting the program right away, but some of them might have to wait a while, because they’re coming in to relieve the most experienced players we’ve had in years.”

## Forwards

Without a doubt, most opposing defenses will first look to stop senior **Kelly Giles**, the 2004 CAA and state of Virginia Player of the Year. The first Tribe player to win either of those awards, Giles led the team and finished third in the CAA with 14 goals and 34 points last season.

Five of her goals were game-winners, the most in the conference and tied for third-best in W&M history.

“The more attention Kelly gets, the more she’s having to work for her goals,” said Hawthorne. “She’s got a bull’s-eye on her back now, but she’s responding well to that. She’s looking forward to her senior year and is working hard to arrive in shape and healthy. Kelly’s explosively fast and her stick work just keeps getting better. She’s just a natural—I still feel like she hasn’t scratched the surface of what she’s capable of accomplishing in this sport.”

In addition to Giles, the Tribe also returns junior **Gina Cimarelli**, who played in all 20 games, including 19 starts. After seeing action in just seven games as a rookie, Cimarelli came on strong last season with seven goals (third on the team), along with the first two assists of her career.

“Next to Kelly, Gina is our most experienced forward,” said Hawthorne. “She has good stick speed and is getting more confident with her shooting. She’s also a very reliable stick-stopper on corners.”

After a strong spring season, junior **Maggie Long** is moving up to forward from the midfield line, where most of her playing time came last year. Long scored two goals in her 10 games last season.

“Maggie has a good variety of shots and probably has the most powerful shot on the team,” said Hawthorne. “We think forward is where she is going to have the most success in our lineup.”

Also returning at the forward position is a pair of sophomores in **Kim Hedley** and **Ida Henley**. Although neither saw much playing time as freshmen, they both showed marked improvement in spring practice and could contribute this season. The two incoming freshman forwards are **Katie Broaddus** and **Lauren Giles**. Broaddus was a first team all-state player at Centreville High School, while Lauren, the younger sister of Tribe senior Kelly Giles, was a second team all-state pick at Jamestown High School.

## Midfielders

Leading the way at midfield is senior tri-captain **Shannon Karl**, a tough player who extended her team-high consecutive games started streak to 57 after starting all 20 contests last season, despite nagging injuries that persisted throughout the campaign. Karl led the Tribe with seven assists in 2004, to go with six goals, for a total of 19 points, tied for second on the team. She is expected to continue to play an important role for W&M this season.

“Shannon is our most experienced midfielder and is one of the smartest players on the field,” said Hawthorne. “Staying healthy will be the key to her having a successful senior year.”

After Karl, the only midfielder with significant game experience is junior **Becky Van Zee**, one of the best athletes on the team with the ability to play anywhere on the field. She was selected as the team’s most improved player after ending last season with two goals in 19 games, including three starts.

While the remaining players listed at the position have little experience at the college level, the group arguably also has the most untapped potential of any spot on the team. A prime example is fourth-year junior tri-captain **JJ Kubicek**, who has been limited to just 20 games in her career due to a chronic injury. As a senior at Jamestown High School with current Tribe player Kelly Giles, Kubicek was named the state’s co-player of the year.

Another player with a chance to enter the lineup is sophomore **Jessica Kacerek**, who played in just eight games last year, but impressed the W&M coaching staff with a terrific spring season as a defensive midfielder.

“Jessica is very unpredictable, you don’t really know what she’s thinking until the ball is released off her stick,” said Hawthorne. “She did a very nice job of distributing the ball this spring.”

Third-year sophomore **Julienne Palbusa** will also push for time at midfielder after sitting out last year as she recovered from an ACL injury suffered in the middle of her rookie season.

# 2005 Season Outlook

Two freshman midfielders will join the team this season, led by 2004 Virginia Player of the Year **Heather Winn**, who played for Princess Anne High School in Virginia Beach. Also new to the team is **Holly Niro**, an all-conference pick from Warrington, Pennsylvania.

## Defenders

The Tribe's defense should be very solid, as W&M returns all four starters from last season. Anchoring the back line is fifth-year senior tri-captain **Anna Davis**, a second team all-region and first team all-conference and all-state pick in 2004. She has started 53 of W&M's 59 games since her redshirt freshman year, including every game over the last two seasons. Davis made seven defensive saves last year, tied for the fourth-most in Division I and enters her senior year with 13 in her career, third in W&M history. In addition to her defensive efforts, Davis recorded her first career point last season, assisting the Tribe's game-winning goal against seventh-ranked Old Dominion.

"Anna just gets better and more confident every year," said Hawthorne. "As she has increased her confidence and skill, she's been able to contribute to the attack more. She's incredibly steady on defense and is willing to make the sacrifices necessary to stop a ball."

Senior **Diana Esposito** also started every game last season for the second straight year, making two defensive saves. An all-state selection and voted to the all-region and all-league second teams, she sparked W&M's second-half comeback at No. 12 Virginia with an interception at midfield that she carried the length of the field and put home for her first career goal.

"Diana is a rock-solid, with her quickness, her ability to get out of trouble in the deep cor-

ner and her field vision," said Hawthorne. "Now she is showing the ability to overlap into the attack as well."

The third senior on the back line is **Carly Falgowski**, another outstanding defender who is showing the ability to add to the attack when the situation dictates. She has played in all of the Tribe's games over the last two seasons, starting all but one, and also scored her first career goal in 2004, knocking in the game-winner against Drexel.

"Carly is a very smart, very experienced player with a high skill level," said Hawthorne. "She's similar to Anna and Diana in also becoming an offensive threat. Those three have been playing together on defense for three years already and they all are capable of setting the tempo of the game."

The fourth returning starter on defense is junior **Jaime Fitzgerald**, who played every game last season, starting 11 of the last 12. She made defensive saves in a pair of one-goal wins against CAA opponents, scoring her first career goal and assist in two other conference victories.

"Jamie continued to improve throughout the season," said Hawthorne. "She's one of the fastest players on the team. To have someone with speed like that as a side back is a real asset."

The only other returning defender on the team is sophomore **Laura Kastelic**, a CAA all-rookie selection last season. She played in 14 contests with three starts, earning an assist in a 2-1 win over James Madison.

"Laura would be the first person to step in if we needed someone else on defense," said Hawthorne. "She's physically strong and knows the game very well. Laura could win a starting spot on the back line or in the midfield."

A pair of newcomers in **Kaitlin Johnson** and **Sarah Salmon** round out the defense. Both have high-level experience at National Futures and National Indoors and each earned first team all-state honors last season, Johnson in New York and Salmon at Kempsville High School in Virginia Beach.

## Goalkeepers

W&M has developed a reputation for outstanding goalkeepers over the last few years, with the Tribe's netminder having earned first or second team All-CAA honors in each of the last six seasons. That tradition is expected to continue this season, when sophomore **Gwen Hunter** takes over full-time starting duties in the cage for the Green and Gold. She recorded a 2.27 GAA with 26 saves last season in what was primarily a backup role, making nine appearances, including one start.

"Gwen is an excellent goalkeeper," said Hawthorne. "She has a year of experience under her belt now and she should be able to gel pretty quickly with the defense in front of her."

W&M's backup goalkeeper will be redshirt freshman **Kristen Gillis**. Injured for much of the spring season, it may take some time before she is ready to see game action in the fall. Also joining the team for the first time this season is senior netminder **Mary Teeter**.

## Schedule

As is the case every season, W&M will take on one of the most difficult schedules in the nation. Hawthorne and assistants **Quan Nim Anderson**, **Kelly McQuade** and **Tess Ellis** will prepare the Tribe to face half of last year's NCAA Tournament field and nine teams that ended the year in the top 20.

"It's a great schedule," said Hawthorne. "It's strong enough that if we play well we should be considered for an NCAA Tournament berth. It will be very challenging."

Included in the non-conference portion of the schedule are six games against teams that ended the year in the top 20, with four coming against top 10 opponents North Carolina (No. 1), Duke (No. 4), American (No. 7) and Richmond (No. 10). With the CAA ranked as the third-best field hockey league in the nation for the second straight season, according to the NCAA RPI report, the conference portion of the schedule doesn't get any easier. Making conference play even more difficult is this season's addition of Northeastern, which ended 2004 ranked ninth in the country.

"There are no easy weekends in the conference schedule," said Hawthorne. "Northeastern is a very strong addition to what was already one of the best leagues in the country. We will certainly have our work cut out for us."

# Head Coach Peel Hawthorne

The 2004 Colonial Athletic Association and Virginia Sports Information Directors Coach of the Year, Peel Hawthorne enters her 19th season as head coach of the William and Mary field hockey team. During her tenure she has led the Tribe to a record of 212-145-2 (.593), including at-large berths into the 16-team NCAA Tournament in two of the last five seasons. Including four seasons as the head coach at Connecticut College, Hawthorne has a career record of 243-162-5 (.599), placing her seven wins away from 30th on the national coaching victories list, while her 410 games coached ranks 28th in the history of collegiate field hockey.

Previously voted the CAA Coach of the Year in 1995 and 2001, Hawthorne won the award for a third time in 2004, also earning her first state coach of the year honor, after leading the Tribe to a 7-0

CAA record. It was the first time in school history that W&M had gone undefeated in conference play and was the first outright regular season league title in school history. In 2003 Hawthorne helped the Tribe to a 6-1 league record and the Green and Gold's first-ever share of the regular season CAA title. She has mentored 31 players to a total of 47 all-region honors and has coached four players (Kelli Duggan, Ann Ekberg, Kelly Giles and Claire Miller) to All-America accolades in the last three seasons. Hawthorne was also selected as the W&M Society of the Alumni Coach of the Year following the 2001-02 academic year.

Currently on a streak of seven consecutive winning seasons, Hawthorne has consistently improved W&M's national reputation. In 2000 she led the Tribe to a 12-8 record as the College earned one of just eight at-large berths into the NCAA Tournament. W&M proved it was worthy of its selection, taking No. 5 Michigan to two overtimes in the first round, before falling, 3-2. The game marked the first time that W&M had competed in the national postseason in 20 years, with the College's last appearance coming in the 1980 AIAW Nationals.

In 2002, W&M returned to the NCAAs after reaching the CAA championship game for the first time, before falling to No. 1 Old Dominion. Again the Tribe validated its appearance in the national postseason, this time taking No. 5 Maryland to the wire, before losing in overtime, 2-1.

Far and away the winningest coach in school history, Hawthorne's 212 career victories at the College are more than twice as many as the 86 recorded by her former mentor, Nancy Porter, who coached at the College from 1974-80. Hawthorne set the school record in 1993, as the Tribe shut out Villanova, 2-0, on October 9. Including her four years as a player from 1976 through 1979, she has either coached or played in 264 (75.6 percent) of the W&M field hockey program's 349 victories since the start of the 1973 season.

The head field hockey and lacrosse coach at Connecticut College for four years before returning to W&M, Hawthorne produced three All-Americans, 15 All-New England players and six USFHA Northeast players while posting a 31-17-3 (.637) record. As lacrosse coach, she led her teams to a 35-15-1 (.696) record and four postseason bids.

A member of many professional organizations, Hawthorne recently ended her term as the Division I representative for the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, has served as the South Region Chair for the NCAA Division I Field Hockey Committee and as a member of the South Region All-America Selection Committee. Last season she was a member of the W&M Athletics Task Force and was part of the NCAA Recertification Subcommittee on Equity and Welfare. In 2003, she served as head coach for the South team at the NFHCA Senior All-Star Game. Hawthorne holds a U.S. Field Hockey Association coaching certification,

was site director and head coach of several USFHA Development Camps and the Head Futures Coach for eastern Virginia. She also served as a USFHA summer league volunteer coach in 1999 and is the director of the Colonial Field Hockey Camp held each June at W&M. She has experience as a field hockey clinician at many levels, hosting the NFHCA Coaches Clinic at W&M, as well as participating in VHSLCA and NCAA Youth Education through Sports (YES) clinics.

Hawthorne also served for nine years on the Executive Committee of the U.S. Women's Lacrosse Association and is past chair of that organization's Sports Medicine committee. As a member of the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) subcommittee on Eye Safety in Sports, Hawthorne chaired the organization's task force on women's lacrosse. She was instrumental in establishing an ASTM manufacturing standard for protective eyewear for the sport.

A field hockey and lacrosse standout at W&M, Hawthorne graduated with a B.S. in physical education in 1980. In her career, the Tribe field hockey team posted a record of 52-13-7 and made two trips to the AIAW Nationals, finishing fifth in 1979. A defender, she helped the team allow just 0.92 goals per game during her career, while still scoring five goals. The Tribe totaled 37 shutouts in her career, more than half the total number of games played in the span and the most in any four-year period in school history. Hawthorne was an NATA certified athletic trainer for six years and has an M.Ed. in the field from Virginia. She enjoys water skiing and has been an instrumentalist and vocalist for a contemporary Christian band for the last nine years.

Quan Nim Anderson begins her fifth season as the top assistant at William and Mary. A 1999 graduate of the University of Iowa with a B.A. in psychology and a minor in social work, she came to the Tribe after serving as the assistant coach at Davidson for one year.

Anderson brings a wealth of playing experience to the sidelines for the College. Playing for the Hawkeyes, she was one of the most well-known forwards in the country. As a senior in 1999, she received second team NFHCA All-America honors and was named to the All-Big Ten and all-region first teams and the NCAA All-Tournament squad. She also earned all-region honors in 1995 and 1998 and was a second team All-Big Ten pick in 1998. Anderson played in 86 games in her Iowa career, scoring 29 goals and 10 assists for a total of 68 points.

Outside of college, Anderson participated in the 1995 U.S. Olympic Festival and the 1993 and 1994 Junior Olympics. She is currently the site director and head coach of the under-19 team for the USFHA Futures Regional site at W&M and has coached regional teams at National Futures tournaments since 2002. Last season Anderson was a member of the NFHCA Regional All-America selection committee and in 2003 she was the assistant coach for the South team in the USFHA North/South Senior All-Star game. She gained leadership experience in her two seasons as captain of the

Hawkeye team and received the Dr. Patricia Hicks Award given for overcoming adversity and showing perseverance and great strength of character.

Anderson is married to Jeff Anderson. The couple have a daughter, Dakota, who was born in March.



**Kelly McQuade**  
Assistant Coach (Second season)  
William and Mary (2004)

Following her graduation with a degree in kinesiology from William and Mary in 2004, Kelly McQuade is in her second season as an assistant coach for the Tribe.

McQuade culminated her outstanding college field hockey career in 2003, earning first team All-Colonial Athletic Association and all-state honors, while also securing a spot on the All-South Region second team. A participant in the 2003 NFHCA North/South Senior All-Star game, McQuade finished second on the team in scoring with 12 goals and four assists for 28 points. The five game-winning goals she recorded led the team and is tied for the third-most in one season in school history.

McQuade ended 2003 ranked sixth in the CAA with 1.56 points per game and was fourth in the league with 0.67 goals per contest. The two-

year starter finished her career with 38 points on 16 goals and six assists.

A two-sport athlete at the College, McQuade also played lacrosse for four years, starting every game her last three seasons. She scored 21 goals with six assists in 2004 finishing tied for third on the team with 42 ground balls. For her career, she totaled 55 goals, 14 assists and 110 ground balls.

Prior to W&M, McQuade earned first team all-state and all-league honors at Central Bucks West High School in Doylestown, Pennsylvania. Her team's captain and most valuable player, she ended her career with 31 goals and 17 assists. McQuade also lettered in diving and lacrosse, graduating as the school's all-time leading goal scorer in that sport.



**Tess Ellis**

Previously the U.S. Field Hockey Association's Under-21 head coach and national team assistant coach, Tess Ellis is in her second season as a volunteer assistant coach at W&M. Ellis previously served as an assistant coach for the Tribe for eight seasons, from 1993 through 2000.

An internationally experienced player, coach and clinician, field hockey has afforded Ellis many opportunities to travel the globe. She served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team at the 1999 Sydney International Hockey Challenge in Australia and at the 2000 Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Milton Keynes, England. Ellis also served as an instructor at U.S. Field Hockey's selection camps and Futures Program. In the fall of 1992, Tess volunteered as a part-time coach at Salisbury State University in Maryland, which reached

the final four of the NCAA Division III Tournament. From 1986-90 she was the head coach of Pymble Ladies College in Sydney, Australia, and in 1991 spent time as the head hockey coach at The American School in London, England. She has also served as head coach of the under-18 West team at the Olympic Sports Festival in St. Louis, traveled back to Australia with the USA National squad and toured Canada with the under-18 USA national squad.

Ellis played as a member of the Australian National Indoor team and Australia's National Under-21 National team. She was a player/coach of several New South Wales championship teams. Ellis founded the Peninsula (now Colonial) Field Hockey Club and co-founded the Colonial Field Hockey Camp at W&M.

# 2004 Season Review

## Tribe Undefeated Against CAA Opponents in Regular Season

For the first time in school history, William and Mary won a regular season league championship outright, posting a 7-0 record against Colonial Athletic Association opponents ... The Tribe completed its first-ever undefeated conference season with a 2-1 win over Old Dominion ... It was the Green and Gold's first win over the Monarchs since 1980 and extended the Tribe's regular season winning streak against conference teams to a school-record 13 games ... In 2003, W&M tied ODU for first place in the CAA, with each ending the regular season with a 6-1 record in league play ... The Tribe has finished in third place or better in the CAA in each of the last seven seasons ... W&M ended the season ranked 13th in the nation and had a 13-7 record, the third time in the last four seasons that the College has won at least 65 percent of its games.

## Kelly Giles and Head Coach Peel Hawthorne Take Home Top Honors

Forward **Kelly Giles** was voted the Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Year by the league's head coaches and was selected as the state's player of the year by the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) ... The first W&M player ever to earn either honor, she ended the season leading the team with 34 points, 14 goals and five game-winning goals ... Head coach **Peel Hawthorne** was named coach of the year by both the CAA and VaSID ... She had previously been voted CAA Coach of the Year in 1995 and 2001, but this was the first time she had been voted as the top coach in Virginia ... By far the winningest field hockey coach in school history, Hawthorne earned her 200th W&M victory when the Tribe opened the 2004 season with a 3-1 win at Ohio ... She will enter the 2005 campaign with 212 wins with the Green and Gold and a total of 243 victories in her college coaching career.

## Six W&M Players Earn All-CAA Honors

Six W&M players earned all-conference accolades in 2004, with two players on the league's first team, three on the second team and one on the all-rookie team ... Along with CAA Player of the Year **Kelly Giles**, defender **Anna Davis** was also named to the conference's first team ... Forward **Ginny Sutton**, goalkeeper **Heather Kibbee** and defender **Diana Esposito** were picked to the league's second team ... Defender **Laura Kastelic** was named to the first-ever CAA All-Rookie Team.

## Giles Earns All-America Honors; Three Players Picked to All-Region Teams

For the third straight season a Tribe player earned All-America honors from the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, as forward **Kelly Giles** was selected to the third team ... A first team NFHCA All-South Region selection, Giles was named to the womensfieldhockey.com All-America second team ... Tribe defenders **Anna Davis** and **Diana Esposito** were selected to the NFHCA all-region second team.

## Anna Davis Ranked Fourth in the Nation With Seven Defensive Saves

Defender **Anna Davis** made seven defensive saves in 2004, tied with two other players for the fourth-most in Division I ... Her total also ranked first in the CAA and is tied for the seventh-most in a season in W&M history ... Included in that total were two saves each in consecutive CAA victories over No. 19 Hofstra and No. 14 Delaware ... Davis will enter her senior season with 13 defensive saves in her career, third in school history and one away from tying for second on W&M's all-time list.

## Two Players Selected to NFHCA North/South Senior All-Star Game

Midfielder **Kate Baird** and forward **Ginny Sutton** were selected to compete in the NFHCA North/South Senior All-Star Game, which was played November 20 in Winston-Salem, North Carolina on the day before the NCAA championship game ... It was the third time in the last four seasons that W&M had the maximum two players selected to compete in the event.

## Seven Players Earn Academic Accolades

A total of seven Tribe players earned recognition for the academic success in 2004 ... Leading the way were **Diana Esposito**, **Jessica Kacerek** and **JJ Kubicek**, who were selected to the NFHCA National Academic Squad ... They were joined by **Kate Baird**, **Gina Cimarelli**, **Anna Davis** and **Jill Hocutt** as recipients of the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award.

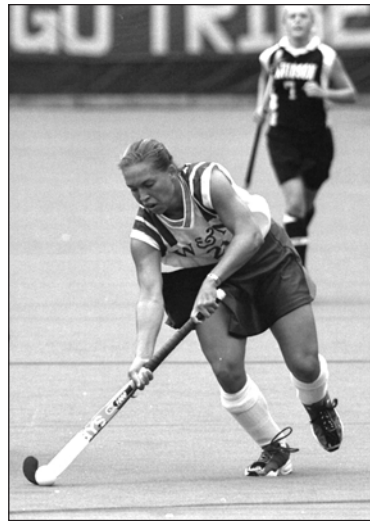

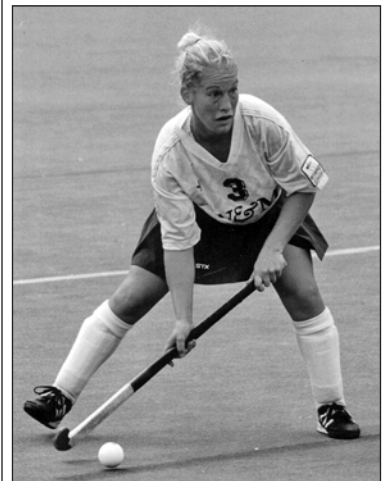

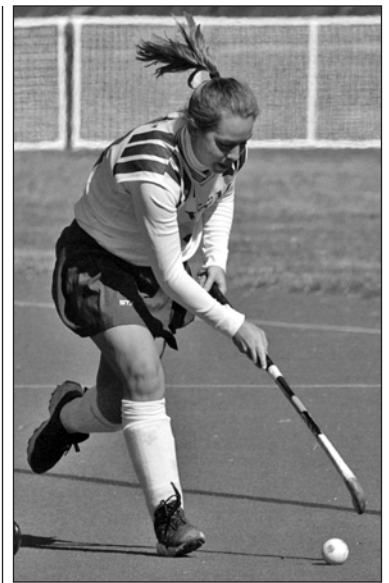

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy"; and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

## Gene R. Nichol President

Gene Nichol became the College of William and Mary's 26th president on July 1, 2005. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law and the law school

### Quoting President Gene Nichol

The College of William and Mary has struggled, endured and prospered, becoming a central part of our culture, because, at heart, it touches the deepest concerns of the human spirit. The need to examine, to explore, to probe, to question, to contribute. The challenge to understand—and to share the fruits of that understanding with our fellows. The powerful, unquenched belief in excellence, in the call to a better future, in the opened door, the extended hand, the brightened lamp. A recurring sense of both blessing and obligation; a belief in the marriage of knowledge and virtue; a determination to become, in Madison's words, beneficiary and benefactor of the commonwealth.

And, this College, distinct, perhaps, from the nation's other great public universities, is committed to pressing these values in the context of a small, life-changing liberal arts experience. Where academic rigor can actually apply as an overarching norm; where an ennobling faculty-student engagement is the hallmark of the institution; and where the most important questions of human existence are repeatedly presented center stage. Insisting that, in a viable democracy, the most powerful and uplifting structures of higher education cannot be relegated to the private sphere.

That is our legacy. It is our challenge as well.

at the University of Colorado. While at William and Mary, Nichol was the Cutler Professor of Law and director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law. He has also taught at Oxford, Exeter, and the law school of West Virginia University.

Nichol is the co-author of the text *Federal Courts* and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Review*, and the *University of Chicago Law Review*. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the *Encyclopedia of the American Constitution*, and one on the civil rights movement to the *Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court*. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters before committees of the U.S. Congress and various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.

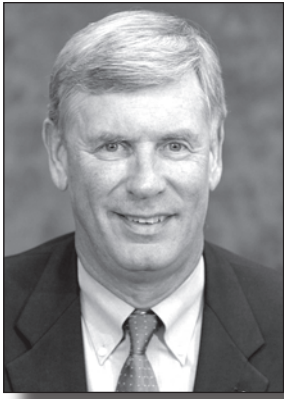

# Athletics Administration



**Terry Driscoll**  
Director of Athletics

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 10th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks

chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 29, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 25, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



**Barbara Blosser**  
Senior Executive Associate Athletics Director

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball

coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting

athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

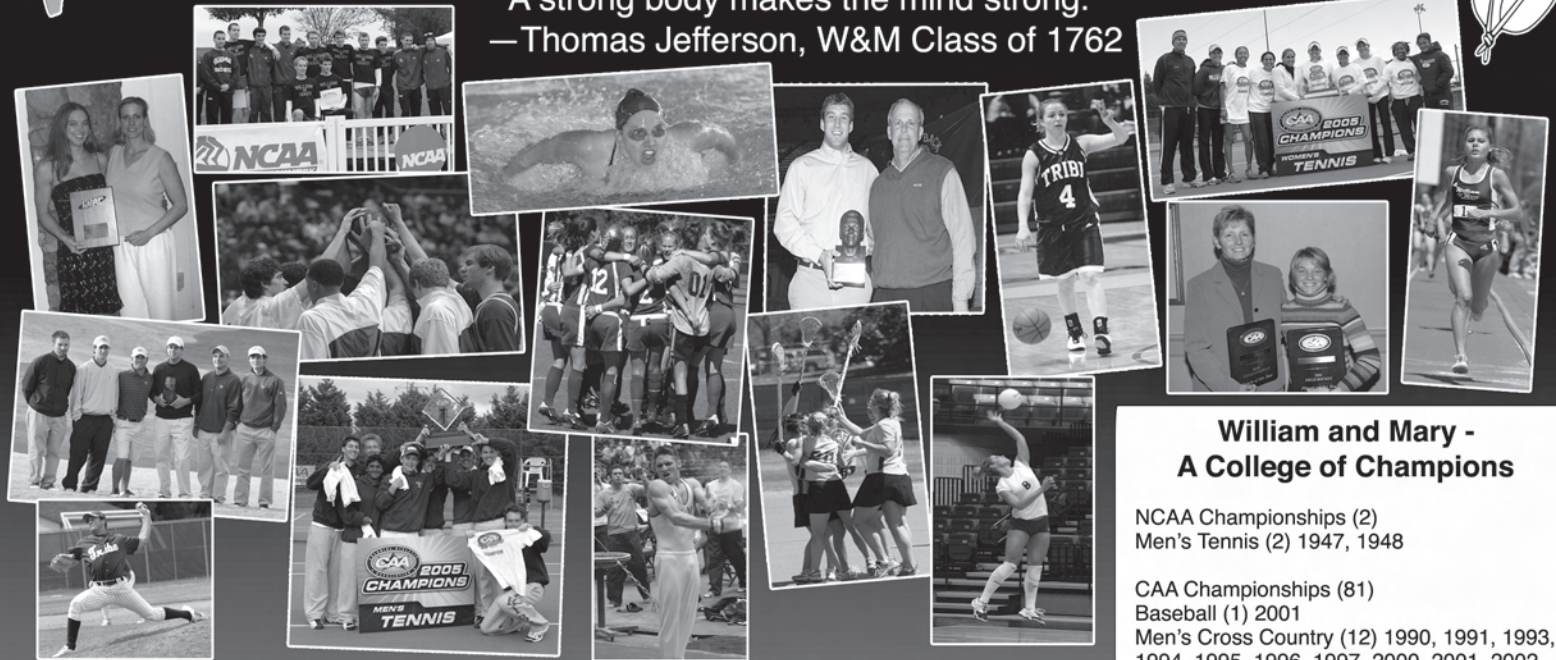
Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

## Athletic Excellence

The 2004-05 season was another outstanding year for W&M athletics, as the Tribe added five CAA titles to push its conference-leading total to 81, 30 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Championships, highlighted by the football team's appearance in the I-AA semifinals. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Championship each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top 100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. In 2004-2005, the College finished 76th, and was the highest-ranked team in the CAA and was third among all schools in the state of Virginia, making this the ninth time in the 12-year history of the Directors' Cup that the College has finished both in the top four in the state of Virginia and first or second in the CAA.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

## Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities, as W&M has produced 36 Academic All-Americans since 1992.

In the NCAA's inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores for all Division I institutions, William and Mary once again excelled in its mission of fostering true student-athletes. The College boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

Additionally, W&M had four student-athletes recognized as CAA Scholar-Athletes of the Year in 2004-2005: Pat Comstock (Men's Cross Country), Megan Bishop (Women's Cross Country), Keith Bechtol (Men's Track and Field) and Lena Sherbakov (Women's Tennis).

The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

## Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

## Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.



## Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.

# ATHLETIC FACILITIES

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

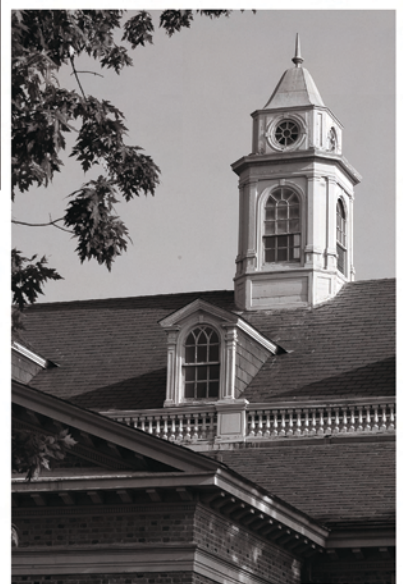
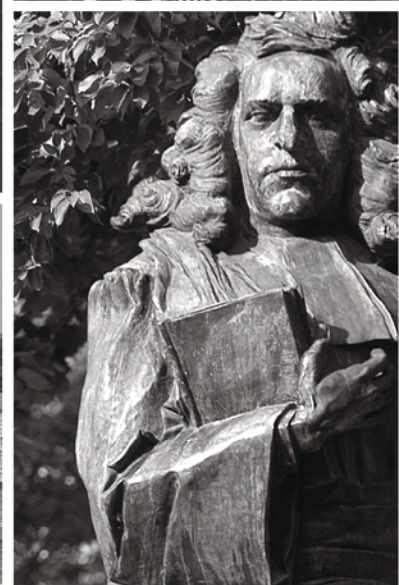
