2006 SEASON PREVIEW

Head coach **Peel Hawthorne** and her staff welcome the 2006 edition of Tribe field hockey with eager anticipation. While the departing senior class left some holes to fill, Hawthorne is confident her young squad is up to the task. The graduating losses include a pair of All-Americans, the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Player of the Year in 2004, the CAA Defensive Player of the Year in 2005 and a combined 321 starts over the last four years. Despite the losses, the Tribe saw a successful spring coupled with an impressive recruiting class of seven. The Tribe returns six starters and 12 letterwinners from the 2005 squad.

"The returning players are a tight knit group," Hawthorne said. "They had a very productive and successful spring season, and I was thrilled with their progress. Although we graduated a very experienced senior class, I am eager to see this new group come together and prove itself. While the unknowns may make us a little anxious, the possibilities are exciting. We have the talent, the competitiveness and the team chemistry, now we just need to bring all of that together to form a great field hockey team."

GOALKEEPING

The Tribe returns a pair of goalkeepers that have been in the program for two seasons. Both junior **Gwen Hunter** and redshirt sophomore **Kristen Gillis** return for the 2006 season after impressive spring seasons. Hunter was a defensive leader during the spring campaign, while Gillis returned to action after missing most of 2005 rehabilitating from an injury.

"From the fall to the spring, we had to reinvent the wheel in terms of defense. Gwen was very helpful in orchestrating the new lineup in front of her," Hawthorne said. "She has a year of starting experience under her belt and had to take a leadership role during the spring to get that new defensive unit into place. Gwen is one of the best athletes on the team. Her fitness level, reactions and head for the game are terrific."

"Kristen Gillis, who spent most of last season rehabilitating, started to step it up during spring training," Hawthorne said. "As she returned to full activity, she became more involved in directing and organizing the defense in front of her. Kristen redshirted her freshman year and was injured her sophomore year, so she is eager to get into games."

Hunter garnered Second-Team VaSID All-State honors during her sophomore season. She played every minute in net for the Tribe, finishing with a 1.58 goals against average, 108 saves and seven shutouts. Hunter topped the CAA in shutouts, while ranking second in save percentage (.755).

Hawthorne added another goalkeeper in the 2006 class in **Carrie Thompson**. She guided her high school team to a perfect 24-0 mark and the Virginia state championship in 2005. Thompson garnered honorable-mention all-state honors as she allowed only five goals in 24 games, including 19 shutouts.

DEFENSE

In the defensive backfield, W&M must replace a trio of four-year starters, including 2005 All-American, CAA Defensive Player of the Year and W&M Female Athlete of the Year Anna Davis. The lone starter to return on the back line is senior two-sport stand-out **Jamie Fitzgerald**. During her first three years, Fitzgerald has started 32 matches for the Tribe.

"Jamie Fitzgerald is our most experienced returning defender," Hawthorne said. "She has exceptional speed and is very poised. Jamie will be a key player for us in the backfield."

Fitzgerald was a starter for the W&M lacrosse team in the spring, leaving the field hockey team without a returning starter on the backline. Redshirt junior **Julienne Palbusa**, junior **Laura Kastelic**, sophomore **Katie Broaddus** and redshirt freshman **Kaitlin Johnson** stepped in to fill the void.

"Starting over in defense will benefit us in the long run as there are now several more players prepared to step into a starting position," Hawthorne said. "Laura and Julienne are experienced midfielders and defenders who were already seeing playing time in the back. They were leaders from the start of the spring season, and both should be very comfortable with their decision-making. When they play with confidence, they are very difficult to beat."

Kastelic has played in 35 games over the last two seasons, including 18 starts. She played in every

match in 2005, finishing tied for third on the team with four goals and tied for fifth with eight points. Palbusa garnered the teams most improved player award in 2005, while appearing in nine matches.

Johnson also will be in the mix on the back line in 2006. She redshirted in 2005 after coming to the College from Ward Melville High School in East Setauket, N.Y.

Hawthorne has a wealth of talented newcomers. Freshman **Maura Checchio** and **Courtney Farino** join the Tribe, and will vie for time in the defensive backfield. Both Checchio and Farino are local student-athletes hailing from the Virginia Beach area. Checchio competed in the Futures Program, and is an athletic player with an elite background in gymnastics. Farino led her high school squad to the state championship game during her final three seasons, including a championship in 2004. She earned first-team all-region and all-state honors as a senior in 2005.

MIDFIELD

Senior co-captain **Becky Van Zee** will likely anchor the W&M midfield. She started the final 10 matches of the 2005 season and played in all 21 games. Van Zee finished her junior campaign with five points on two goals and one assist and over the last two seasons, has totaled 40 appearances and four goals.

"Becky Van Zee showed great improvement over the second half of the season and into the spring season," Hawthorne said.

"Becky, **Jess Kacerek** and Katie Broaddus are all talented midfielders," Hawthorne said. "Jes will give us some added flexibility as she can also contribute on the forward line. **Lauren Giles** could also see time at either position."

Kacerek moved to forward during the spring after starting 17 matches in the middle of the park in 2005. Broaddus appeared in 19 matches in the midfield as a freshman, scoring two goals, including the game-winner in her first collegiate start against Virginia Commonwealth.

The Tribe also will look to a deep freshman class for help in the midfield. **Wesley Drew**, Farino, **Alexis Gerber**, **Kelsey Jackson** and **Sarah Louie** will have the opportunity to make an immediate impact in the midfield.

"We are counting on our incoming freshmen to be ready to go," Hawthorne said. "Depending on where the lineup shakes out, we could have any number of freshmen step in at any time given the opportunity."

Drew brings an impressive prep resume to the Tribe. She was selected as the South Region Player of the Year and a National Field Hockey Coaches Association Second-Team All-American in her senior season. Drew also received first-team all-state, all-region and All-Beach District selection in 2004 and 2005. Gerber was a First-Team All-Central League and All-Main Line selection as a senior. Jackson earned the title "Miss Maine Field Hockey" after leading her team to a perfect 36-0 record and back-to-back state

Class B Championships in her final two seasons. She was a three-time all-state selection and finished her high school career with 18 goals and 33 assists. Louie was a two-sport star at Hempfield High School. She participated in the USFHA "Futures" Olympic Development Program in 2004, 2005 and 2006.

FORWARD

Despite the loss of second-leading scorer and 2004 CAA and VaSID State Player of the Year Kelly Giles, W&M returns a number of players with starting experience at the forward position. Seniors **Gina Cimarelli** and **Maggie Long**, along with junior **Kim Hedley**, return a combination of 10 goals and 38 starts from last season.

"I expect a lot of our attack to be generated off counter attacks," Hawthorne said. "Learning to shift and move together as a unit throughout the field is going to be a key to our success. We have to be tuned into each others movements whether we have the ball or not. Speed on the front line also will be a critical factor for us."

Cimarelli led the College in scoring a season ago with 14 points on six goals and two assists. She registered a season-high five points on two goals and an assist in the season opener against Ball State. Cimarelli also tallied goals against ranked foes Northeastern and Old Dominion. Long started 12 matches and finished with two goals, two assists and six points. Hedley played in all 21 matches for the Tribe with a pair of goals.

The Tribe could also receive a boost on the forward line from Kacerek, who worked out at the position during the spring season. She tied for second on the team with 12 points on four goals and four assists during her sophomore campaign. She opened the season with a goal and an assist against Ball State, before recording a two-goal game in the Tribe's victory over Yale.

Giles is another option for the Tribe at the forward position. She saw action in five games during her rookie campaign after coming to the College with all-state honors out of Jamestown High School in Williamsburg. W&M also can turn to the freshman class with Drew, Jackson and Louie playing forward during their prep careers.

SCHEDULE

The Tribe will play a balanced schedule which includes five teams that finished the season ranked in the top 20 and three other teams that were receiving votes for the top-20 poll. The slate also includes five match-ups with teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Two W&M foes made it to the semifinals and one was the national runner up. The schedule will also be road/neutral site heavy as only seven of the Tribe's 18 matches will be at the friendly confines of Busch Field.

"The schedule is pretty well balanced," Hawthorne said. "Our very first weekend is a long road trip, and I am very happy about that. I think that is going to be very helpful in getting to know each other early on."

The opening weekend of the season will be a Midwestern trip to Ball State and Miami of Ohio on Aug. 25 and 27. The College is a combined 3-0 against the pair of Mid-American Conference teams, including a 4-1 win over Ball State in Williamsburg last season.

"We have another long trip up to Rutgers and Princeton, then we face Richmond and Virginia before getting into our conference. I think the schedule is challenging enough to get us where we need to be. It will have a great mix of opponents that are going to stretch us. It is going to be an away season, but in some ways that is a good thing."

Three Tribe opponents finished the 2005 season ranked in the top five nationally, including No. 3 Old Dominion, No. 4 Duke and No. 5 North Carolina. ODU was a semifinalist in the NCAA Tournament and Duke capped the year as the national runner up to Maryland. Northeastern (No. 16) and Richmond (No. 19) also finished the year in the top 20, while James Madison, Hofstra and Princeton received votes for the final top-20 poll of the season.

Peel Hawthorne enters her 20th season as head coach of the William and Mary field hockey team. During her tenure, she has led the Tribe to a record of 222-156-2 (.587), including at-large berths into the 16-team NCAA Tournament in 2000 and 2002. Including four seasons as the head coach at Connecticut College, Hawthorne has a career record of 253-173-5 (.593), placing her 33rd on the national coaching victories list (all divisions). The 253 wins ranks her 23rd among active head coaches. Hawthorne's 431 career games coached ranks 26th in collegiate field hockey coaching history annals and is 18th among active head coaches.

Previously voted the CAA Coach of the Year in 1995 and 2001, Hawthorne won the award for a third time in 2004, also earning her first state coach of the year honor, after leading the Tribe to a 7-0 CAA record. It was the first time in school history that W&M had gone undefeated in conference play and was the first outright regular season league title in school history. In 2003, Hawthorne helped the Tribe to a 6-1 league record and the Green and Gold's first-ever share of the regular season CAA title.

She has mentored 32 players to a total of 50 all-region honors and has coached seven All-Americans, including five (Anna Davis, Kelli Duggan, Ann Ekberg, Kelly Giles and Claire Miller) in the last four seasons. In 2005, Davis became the first W&M player since Pixie Hamilton in 1979 to earn First-Team All-America honors, claiming the honor from womensfieldhockey.com. Hawthorne also was selected as the W&M Society of the Alumni Coach of the Year following the 2001-02 academic year.

In each of the last two seasons, W&M players have garnered the conference's top honor both offensively and defensively. During the 2004 campaign, Giles became the first Tribe player to win Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Player of the Year honors. Along with that distinction, Giles garnered the VaSID State Player of the Year, also becoming the first W&M player to be bestowed that honor. This past season, Davis notched the CAA Defensive Player of the Year award. She not only led the CAA, but ranked second nationally in defensive saves with 11.

Since W&M joined the CAA in 1991, Hawthorne has coached 61 All-CAA players, including a program high seven in 2000 and 2001. Coupled with the nine All-South Atlantic Conference selections during Hawthorne's first four seasons, the 19-year Tribe head coach has guided 70 all-conference performers. Since VaSID began honoring a field hockey All-State team in 2000, 17 of Hawthorne's players have garnered the distinction, including five this past season.

Hawthorne's players have also enjoyed success in the classroom. In total, 28 players have received National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) National Academic Squad honors since 1994. Over the last four years, 24 players have achieved the CAA Commissioner's Award. Five Tribe players earned both distinctions in 2005.

The Tribe has amassed a winning record in 15 of Hawthorne's 19 seasons at the helm, including 16 seasons of 10 or more victories, and Hawthorne has consistently improved W&M's national reputation. In 2000, she led the Tribe to a 12-8 record as the College earned one of just eight at-large berths into the NCAA Tournament. W&M proved it was worthy of its selection, taking No. 5 Michigan to two overtimes in the first round, before falling, 3-2. The game marked the first time W&M had competed in the national field hockey postseason in 20 years,

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with the College's last appearance coming in the 1980 AIAW Nationals.

In 2002, W&M returned to the NCAAs after reaching the CAA championship game for the first time, before falling to No. 1 Old Dominion. Again, the Tribe validated its appearance in the tournament, this time taking No. 5 Maryland to the wire, before losing in double overtime, 2-1.

Far and away the winningest coach in school history, Hawthorne's 222 career victories at the College are more than twice as many as the 86 recorded by her former mentor, Nancy Porter, who coached at the College from 1974-80. Hawthorne set the school record in 1993, as the Tribe shut out Villanova, 2-0, on Oct. 9. Including her four years as a player from 1976 through 1979, she has either coached or played in 274 (76.3 percent) of the W&M field hockey program's 359 victories since the start of the 1973 season.

The head field hockey and lacrosse coach at Connecticut College for four years before returning to W&M, Hawthorne produced three All-Americans, 15 All-New England players and six USFHA Northeast players while posting a 31-17-3 (.637) record. As lacrosse coach, she led her teams to a 35-15-1 (.696) record and four postseason bids.

A member of many professional organizations, Hawthorne recently ended her term as the Division I representative for the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, has served as the South Region Chair for the NCAA Division I Field Hockey Committee and as a member of the South Region All-America Selection Committee. Last season she was a member of the W&M Athletics Task Force and was part of the NCAA Recertification Subcommittee on Equity and Welfare. In 2003, she served as head coach for the South team at the NFHCA Senior All-Star Game. Hawthorne holds a U.S. Field Hockey Association coaching certification, was site director and head coach of several USFHA Development Camps and the Head Futures Coach for eastern Virginia. She also served as a USFHA summer league volunteer coach in 1999 and is the director of the Colonial Field Hockey

Camp held each June at W&M. She has experience as a field hockey clinician at many levels, hosting the NFHCA Coaches Clinic at W&M, as well as participating in VHSLCA and NCAA Youth Education through Sports (YES) clinics.

Hawthorne also served for nine years on the Executive Committee of the U.S. Women's Lacrosse Association and is past chair of that organization's Sports Medicine committee. As a member of the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) subcommittee on Eye Safety in Sports, Hawthorne chaired the organization's task force on women's lacrosse. She was instrumental in establishing an ASTM manufacturing standard for protective eye wear for the sport.

A field hockey and lacrosse standout at W&M, Hawthorne graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1980. In her career, the Tribe field hockey team posted a record of 52-13-7 and made two trips to the AIAW Nationals, finishing fifth in 1979. A defender, she helped the team allow just 0.92 goals per game during her career, while scoring five goals. The Tribe totaled 37 shutouts in her career, more than half the total number of games played in the span and the most in any four-year period in school history. Hawthorne was an NATA certified athletic trainer for six years and has an M.Ed. in the field from Virginia. She enjoys water skiing and has been an instrumentalist and vocalist for a contemporary Christian band for the last 10 years.

Quan Nim Anderson begins her sixth season as the top assistant at William and Mary. A 1999 graduate of the University of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in social work, she came to the Tribe after serving as the assistant coach at Davidson for one year.


During her five years with the Tribe, the College has posted an overall record of 61-38 (.616), including a 24-8 (.750) ledger in Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) action. Anderson helped guide the Tribe to its first-ever perfect conference record, as W&M went 7-0 in CAA play in 2004. Over the last four years, five W&M players have earned All-America accolades, including Anna Davis, who in 2005 became the first Tribe player to earn first-team honors since 1979. Over Anderson's five-year career at W&M, 16 players have earned all-region and VaSID All-State honors, while 22 players have garnered All-CAA accolades.

In 2002, the Tribe amassed a 12-9 overall mark and received one of eight at-large bids in the NCAA Tournament. Despite putting a scare in the No. 5 Maryland Terrapins, the Tribe fell, 2-1, in double overtime. In the last five years, William and Mary owns 12 wins over teams ranked in the top 20, including five over top 10 competition.

As a senior at Iowa in 1999, she received Second-Team NFHCA All-America honors and was named to the All-Big Ten and all-region first teams and the NCAA All-Tournament squad. She also earned all-region honors in 1995 and 1998 and was a Second-Team All-Big Ten pick in 1998. Anderson played in 86 games at Iowa and finished with 69 points on 29 goals and 10 assists. She was a two-year captain and received the Dr. Patricia Hicks Award given for overcoming adversity and showing perseverance and great strength of character.

Anderson is currently the site director and head coach of the under-19 team for the USFHA Futures Regional site at W&M and has coached regional teams at National Futures tournaments since 2002. In 2004, Anderson was a member of the NFHCA Regional All-America selection committee, and in 2003, she was the assistant coach for the South team in the USFHA North/South Senior All-Star game.

Anderson is married to Jeff Anderson. The couple has a daughter, Dakota, who was born in March of 2005.

Julie Lambi enters her first season as an assistant coach with William and Mary Field Hockey. Lambi joined the Tribe after serving in a similar position at Dickinson College during the 2005-06 season.

Lambi also served as the interim head coach for Dickinson during her time at the college. Prior to her time at Dickinson, Lambi served as a volunteer assistant coach at UMBC. She also has had numerous other field hockey related involvements. She was a National Field Hockey Festival and an Elite Performance Training Center participant in 2005-06. In 2006, she was a Futures Goalkeeper Coach, North American Premier League and a Club Cup participant.

Lambi was a standout player during her four-year career at Towson. She graduated as the school's all-time leader in points (111), goals (44) and assists (23), and is the only player in school history to register over 100 points. Lambi garnered All-Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) honors during her final three seasons, including first-team accolades in 2004. She was a First-Team All-Mid Atlantic Regional Team choice in 2003 and 2004 after being a second-team selection in 2002.

She also succeeded in the classroom earning National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Division I National All-Academic Team honors during her final three seasons at Towson. Lambi was awarded the Outstanding Senior Sport Management Award in 2005.

Lambi graduated *Magna Cum Laude* from Towson in 2005 after majoring in sport management with a minor in business administration.



TESS ELLIS

Previously the U.S. Field Hockey Association's Under-21 head coach and national team assistant coach, Tess Ellis is in her third season as a volunteer assistant coach at W&M. Ellis previously served as an assistant coach for the Tribe for eight seasons from 1993 through 2000.

During her 11 total years with W&M, the Tribe has amassed an overall record of 117-102 (.534), including a 42-25 (.627) mark in the Colonial Athletic Association. Ellis was an assistant in 2000, when the Tribe earned its first NCAA Tournament bid as an at-large selection.

An internationally experienced player, coach and clinician, field hockey has afforded Ellis many opportunities to travel the globe. She served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team at the 1999 Sydney International Hockey Challenge in Australia and at the 2000 Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Milton Keynes, England. Ellis also served as an instructor at U.S. Field Hockey's selection camps and Futures Program. In the fall of 1992, Ellis volunteered as a part-time coach at Salisbury State University in Maryland, which reached the final four of the NCAA Division III Tournament. From 1986-90 she was the head coach of Pymble Ladies College in Sydney, Australia, and spent time as the head hockey coach at The American School in London, England. She has also served as head coach of the under-18 West team at the Olympic Sports Festival in St. Louis, traveled back to Australia with the USA National squad and toured Canada with the under-18 USA national squad.

Ellis played as a member of the Australian National Indoor team and Australia's National Under-21 National team. She was a player/coach of several New South Wales championship teams. Ellis founded the Peninsula (now Colonial) Field Hockey Club and co-founded the Colonial Field Hockey Camp at W&M.

BUSCH FIELD

Busch Field has been the permanent home of the William and Mary field hockey program since the 1990 season. The facility opened in 1989, and the field hockey program played three contests on it during the 1989 season. The Tribe has enjoyed a distinct home-field advantage over the last 17 seasons, amassing a 106-48-2 record (.686) at Busch Field.

The facility was made possible by a generous grant from Anheuser-Busch Brewing Corporation. Busch Field opened in June of 1989 with the Busch Gardens-William and Mary Soccer Tournament, and was dedicated on Nov. 1, prior to the men's soccer game against East Carolina. The first field hockey competition on the turf was Sept. 30, 1989, a 7-0 victory for the College over American. In its initial season at Busch Field, the Tribe went 3-0, outscoring opponents, 16-1.

The facility has been a difficult one for Tribe opponents, as William and Mary has outscored its opponents, 386-237, through the 2005 season. W&M has scored an average nearly 2.5 goals per contest at Busch Field, while holding opponents to 1.52 tallies.

With a seating capacity of 2,271, the facility features a computerized lighting system that makes night games possible. The 120 x 75-yard playing surface combines a two-inch poured pad with Astroturf grass that is tacked down, rather than cemented, making the mini-stadium unique in the United States. When the facility opened, it was nominated as one of Athletic Business Magazine's top-10 national designs. Busch Field is also located next to an irrigated natural grass area that is used for recreational sports.

At one time, Busch Field was home to William and Mary field hockey, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. With the completion of Albert-Daly Field in 2003, Busch Field has become the exclusive home of W&M field hockey.

In its 17 seasons, the Tribe has only had one losing season at home. Combined with its impressive overall mark, the College also has had success in conference play at Busch Field. The Tribe is 40-19 (.678) in conference affairs, both regular season and post season, at Busch Field. The facility has played host to a trio of Colonial Athletic Association Field Hockey Championships (1993, 1998 and 2004).



DIRECTIONS TO BUSCH FIELD

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234 (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). Go straight through first two stoplights. After the light at Ironbound Road, continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive (before light at hospital and shopping centers) Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. Busch Field will be on your right.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Campus Drive. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Campus Drive while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left. Busch Field is behind the Hall.

ALL-AMERICAN PARADE CONTINUES

Defender Anna Davis capped off an impressive senior campaign at William and Mary, garnering First-Team All-America honors from womensfieldhockey.com. Davis became the first Tribe player since Pixie Hamilton in 1979 to receive first-team All-America accolades. With Davis' award, the College continued its string of All-Americans. In each of the last four seasons, a W&M player has earned All-America distinction, totaling five awards over the time span. The Richmond, Va., native also garnered First-Team NFHCA All-South Region honors. Fellow defenders Diana Esposito and Carly Falgowski received second-team all-region honors.

DAVIS WINS CAA'S TOP DEFENSIVE HONOR AND COLLEGE'S TOP FEMALE DISTINCTION

After W&M received its first Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Player of the Year in 2004, defender Anna Davis gave the Tribe another first. Davis took home not only First-Team All-CAA honors, but the league's top defensive honor, being named CAA Defensive Player of the Year. She topped the conference in defensive saves over each of her final two seasons. For her efforts, Davis also took home the W&M Female Athlete of the Year award. Diana Esposito earned Second-Team All-CAA accolades for a defense that topped the conference with seven shutouts during the season. Heather Winn rounded out the trio of conference honorees for the Tribe, taking home All-Rookie Team honors.

SECOND NATIONALLY

Defender Anna Davis ranked second nationally in defensive saves with 11 during the 2005 season. The total fell three short of Tiffany Deinzer's (UMBC) leading mark of 14. Davis' total also tied for the third highest total in school history. Davis recorded 24 defensive saves over her W&M career, ranking second all-time at the College.

MODELS OF CONSISTENCY

Over their four-year careers at W&M, one thing was a constant, Shannon Karl, Anna Davis, Diana Esposito and Carly Falgowski were going to be in the Tribe lineup. Karl, Davis and Esposito finished off their careers at the College in 2005, ranking second, third and fourth, respectively, in games started. Karl also tied for third in career games played, as she participated in 80 matches with 78 starts. Davis appeared in 78 contests over her career with 74 starts. Esposito rounded out the trio with 70 career starts for the Tribe. Falgowski started 59 of her 75 career contests with the Tribe.

ACADEMIC HONORS

The Tribe not only showed off their skills on the field, but in the classroom as well. For the 2005-06 season, the field hockey team set program marks with eight Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Commissioner's Award honorees and five NFHCA National Academic Squad members. The quintet of Diana Esposito, Gwen Hunter, Jessica Kacerek, JJ Kubicek and Mary Teeter earned both honors, while Jamie Fitzgerald, Julienne Palbusa and Becky Van Zee each garnered the Commissioner's Award. Teeter also was elected to the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society.

NO. 250 IN THE BOOKS

With a 2-1 win over Delaware on Oct. 7, head coach Peel Hawthorne recorded her 250th career victory. Hawthorne finished the season with 253 career victories, which ranks 33rd on the all-time collegiate field hockey coaching victories list. She became just the 34th collegiate field hockey coach at any level to amass 250 victories. Hawthorne enters the 2006 season 13th among active Division I head coaches in career victories.

FIVE ALL-STATERS

William and Mary notched its most Virginia Sports Information Directors All-State honorees in 2005 with five Tribe members being named to the squad. Anna Davis and Kelly Giles garnered first-team accolades, while Carly Falgowski, Shannon Karl and Gwen Hunter received second-team nods. Giles capped her W&M career with her second all-state honor. She ranked second on the team in points with 12, on five goals and two assists, bringing her career totals to 57 points on 24 goals and seven assists. Falgowski ranked fourth on the team with 10 points on three goals and four assists to go along with two game-winning goals. Karl led the Tribe in assists for the second straight season, notching six helpers. The six assists brought her career total to 18, which tied for fourth in the College's annals. Hunter was a stalwart in net for the Tribe, finishing as the CAA leader in shutouts (7), while ranking second in save percentage (.753) and third in saves (108).

NFHCA NORTH/SOUTH SENIOR ALL-STAR GAME

Defender Anna Davis and midfielder Shannon Karl were selected to compete in the NFHCA North/South Senior All-Star Game, which was played Nov. 19 in Louisville, Ky., on the day before the NCAA championship game. It marked the fourth time, and third straight, in the last five seasons that W&M had the maximum two players selected to compete in the event.

Athletic Success

A charter member of the CAA 1986, W&M has been the CAA's most successful program over the past two decades. The 2005-06 year was another banner season for the College, as it added three more conference titles. The Tribe has now captured 84 total CAA Championships since 1986, over 30 more than the closest rival.

Individually, women's tennis standout Megan Moulton-Levy earned All-America honors after advancing to the "Final Four" of the NCAA Singles Tournament.

Academic Excellence

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any scholarship-granting school and of any public university, in the nation among institutions with two or more Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in March of 2005.

This year, the NCAA specifically listed 18 W&M athletic squads as recipients of its public recognition award for 2005-06.

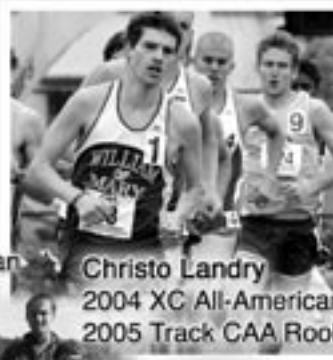
Since 1992, 36 Tribe athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including Keith Bechtol, who was a third team selection in the spring, and since 1996, 39 student-athletes have been members of Phi Beta Kappa.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award in each of its 21 sports, and not surprisingly, William and Mary has set the pace with 18.

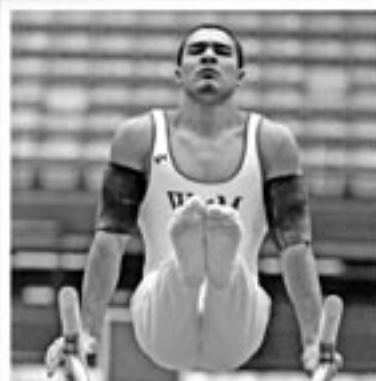

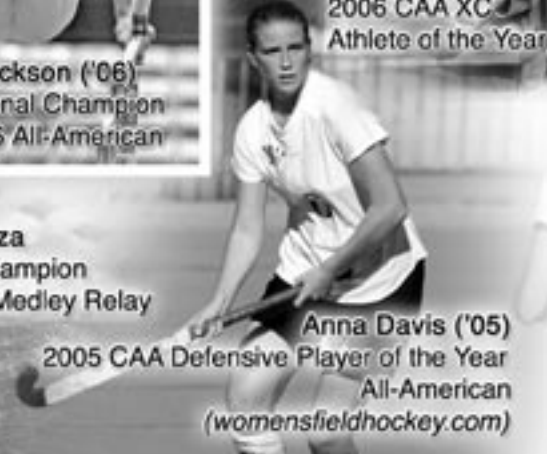

Terry Driscoll Athletics Director

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 11th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new and refurbished facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition,

the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, former W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). That figure will continue to increase significantly in the future, as Driscoll announced plans last year to build the \$11 million Jimmie Laycock Football Complex at Zable Stadium (see page six). Already, the football program has seen the installation of permanent lighting, a \$650,000 project, and a new state-of-the-art artificial playing surface, Field Turf Pro, a \$840,000 project, at Zable Stadium in the last 10 months.

Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm.

After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host



Barbara Blosser Senior Associate Athletics Director

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team

(11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.



Gene R. Nichol President

Gene Nichol became the College of William and Mary's 26th president on July 1, 2005. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law

from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law and the law school at the University of Colorado. While at William and Mary, Nichol was the Cutler Professor of Law and director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law. He has also taught at Oxford, Exeter, and the law school of West Virginia University.

Nichol is the co-author of the text *Federal Courts* and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Review*, and the *University of Chicago Law Review*. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the *Encyclopedia of the American Constitution*, and one on the civil rights movement to the *Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court*. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters

before committees of the U.S. Congress and various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.



Sandra Day O'Connor Chancellor

Sandra Day O'Connor, who in July of 2005 announced her intention to retire as Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, was named 23rd Chancellor of the College by the College of William and Mary Board of Visitors on October 4, 2005. Justice O'Connor succeeds Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, former United States Secretary of State, who was appointed in 2000.

The post of Chancellor has been an important one since the College was

chartered in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of Great Britain. Until 1776, the Chancellor was an English subject—usually the Archbishop of Canterbury or the Bishop of London—who served as the College's advocate to the crown, while a colonial president oversaw the day-to-day activities of the Williamsburg campus. Following the Revolutionary War, George Washington was appointed as the first American chancellor; later President John Tyler held the post.

"Through her remarkable combination of wisdom, courage, judgment, and skill, Justice O'Connor has become one of the most influential and effective jurists in American history," said President Gene R. Nichol. "I am thrilled that she is willing to share her ability and rich experience with William and Mary students. As a former constitutional lawyer, I am also honored to welcome one of my heroes to the College community."

The first woman to serve on the United States Supreme Court, Justice O'Connor was born in El Paso, Texas, on March 26, 1930. She earned a B.A. in economics (magna cum laude) from Stanford University, and went on to receive an LL.B. from Stanford Law

School, where she graduated third in her class. Her classmate, the late Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, graduated first in the class.

She served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the Quartermaster Market Center, Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms.

In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Ronald Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat Sept. 25, 1981. She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, and the couple has three sons: Scott, Brian and Jay.

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).

Sports Psychology

Deidre Connelly, Ph.D., is the College's full-time sports psychologist. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year, at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength and Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

The weight room was upgraded in the spring of 2006, primarily with new Power Lift and Sorinex equipment. The room now contains 16,000 pounds of free weights, over 7,000 pounds of dumbbells and 6,000 pounds of rubber bumper plates. In addition, it has 24 custom-built Olympic platforms, 18 multipurpose power racks and a fully-equipped plyometric area.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and ensure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists.

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.
