TRIBE OPEN 2006 SEASON ON THE ROAD

The William and Mary field hockey team will open the 2006 campaign on the road with a Midwest swing against a pair of Mid-American Conference foes, Aug. 26-27. The Tribe will travel to Muncie, Ind., to battle the Ball State Cardinals on Saturday, Aug. 26, at 11 a.m., before taking on Miami (Ohio) in Oxford on Sunday, Aug. 27, at noon.

OPENING WITH SUCCESS

Since 1973, the Tribe has enjoyed a successful record in regular-season openers. W&M has amassed a record of 24-6-3 (.773) in regular-season openers. The College posted a victory in its previous three season openers, including a 4-2 win over Ball State last season. When the Tribe opens the season on the road, they are 7-4 (.636) since 1973, including victories in their last opener on the road at Ohio, 3-1, in 2004. Under head coach Peel Hawthorne, W&M is 14-5 (.737) in season opening contests.

SCOUTING BALL STATE

Ball State returns eight starters and 11 letterwinners from a season ago. In 2005, the Cardinals finished the year with a 4-14 record, including a 3-7 ledger in the Mid-American Conference.

The Cardinals return a pair of All-MAC performers from a season ago in senior forward Lindsay Quay and junior forward Lauren Cruz. Quay was a first-team selection, while Cruz was a second-team honoree. Quay led the Cardinals in goals with 10 and points with 23 a season ago. Cruz started 17 of 18 contests in 2005 and notched three assists.

W&M is 2-0 all-time against Ball State, having played the Cardinals each of the last two seasons. In 2004, the College defeated BSU, 2-1, in Athens, Ohio, before picking up a 4-1 win in Williamsburg last season. Senior Gina Cimarelli and juniors Jessica Kacerek and Laura Kastelic each scored for the Tribe in the 4-1 victory a season ago. Kacerek finished the game with four points adding two assists to her goal.

SCOUTING MIAMI (OHIO)

Miami (Ohio) enters the 2006 season receiving votes in the preseason STX/NFHCA Top-20 Poll. A season ago, the Redhawks finished 10-12 overall and advanced to the program's first Mid-American Conference Championship game. In total, the Redhawks return 10 starters and 13 letterwinners from 2005.

The Redhawks return their top three scorers from a season ago in juniors Alyssa Nye and Taylor Florence and sophomore Courtney Fretz. Nye finished 2005 with 20 points on six goals and eight assists, while Florence had 15 points (6g, 3a) and Fretz had 12 (5g, 2a). Nye earned First-Team All-Mid-American Conference honors for her efforts a season ago, while senior Danielle Perrecone and Florence were second-team choices.

The Tribe and Redhawks have met on one previous occasion. W&M notched a 3-0 victory over Miami (Ohio) in Athen, Ohio during the 1999 season.



OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN

Seniors Becky Van Zee and Maggie Long were voted team captains for the Tribe in 2006. Van Zee started the final 10 matches of the 2005 season and played in all 21 games. She finished her junior campaign with five points on two goals and one assist. Long started 12 matches and finished with two goals, two assists and six points a season ago.

SENIOR LEADERSHIP

Along with the senior captains Becky Van Zee and Maggie Long, the Tribe will lean on the senior leadership of Jamie Fitzgerald, Julienne Palbusa and Gina Cimarelli. Fitzgerald, who is a two-sport standout also playing for the W&M lacrosse team, is the lone returning starter on the back line for W&M. Over the last two years, she started 32 matches in the defense. Palbusa has battled injuries during her W&M career, but came into her own during the 2006 spring season. She will help fill in on the back line for the College after earning the team's most improved award in 2005. Cimarelli led the College in scoring a season ago with 14 points on six goals and two assists. Over the last two season, she has notched 13 goals.

PICKED FOURTH IN CAA

The Tribe was picked fourth in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Pre-season Coaches Poll. The Tribe garnered 42 total points to come in behind conference favorite Old Dominion, Northeastern and James Madison. The Tribe finished the 2005 season at 10-11 overall, including a 4-4 ledger in the CAA. The College advanced to the CAA tournament semifinals before falling to eventual champion and NCAA Semifinalist Old Dominion.

The voting system for the rankings consisted of each head coach submitting a ranked order of finish. The coaches were not allowed to vote for their own squad, and the points system started at eight for a first-place vote, down to one for an eighth-place vote. The CAA has traditionally been among the top field hockey conferences in the nation, ranking third in the 2005 conference RPI rankings.

LEADING RETURNING SCORERS

W&M returns two of its top three point producers and three of its top four goal scorers from a season ago in the form of senior Gina Cimarelli and juniors Jessica Kacerek and Laura Kastelic. Cimarelli topped the Tribe in both points and goals a season ago with 14 and six, respectively. Kacerek and Kastellic both tied for third on the squad in goals with four tallies apiece.
