TRIBE HOSTS DAVIDSON, RADFORD IN HOME OPENING WEEKEND

The William and Mary field hockey team returns to the friendly confines of Busch Field with a pair of home affairs after opening the season with two victories over Mid-American Conference opponents. The Tribe will host Davidson in the home opener on Friday, Sept. 1, at 7 p.m., before Radford visits Williamsburg on Sunday, Sept. 3, at 1 p.m.

The College will look to open the season with four straight victories for the first time since the 2000 season when it won seven matches to start the year. W&M defeated Ball State (4-1) and Miami (Ohio) (4-3 in OT) to open the season on Aug. 26-27.

SUCCESS IN HOME OPENERS

The Tribe have been a tough team to beat in home openers since 1973. Overall, W&M is 28-3-3 in home openers over that time span, including a 14-2 mark at Busch Field. The last time W&M dropped a home opener was during the 1997 season when Northeastern knocked off the Tribe, 3-0. Under head coach Peel Hawthorne, the Tribe is 16-3 in the first game of the season at home.

TRIBE NEWS AND NOTES

- With its 4-1 victory over Ball State, W&M improved to 25-6-3 since 1973 and 15-5 under head coach Peel Hawthorne in season openers. The Tribe also improved to 8-4 in season-openers on the road.

- Senior forwards Gina Cimarelli and Maggie Long each notched a pair of goals in the Tribe's 4-1 win over Ball State. It marked the first time since the 2003 season that two W&M players recorded multi-goal games in the same contest. The last duo to do it was Kelli Dugan and Kelly Mc-Quade, who each notched a hat trick, in W&M's 8-3 win over James Madison on Oct. 26, 2003.

- Junior goalkeeper Gwen Hunter recorded eight saves in the Tribe's victory over Miami (Ohio). It marked the fifth time in her career she recorded eight or more saves in a contest. The last time she recorded eight or more saves in a game came against Northeastern on Oct. 23, 2005, when she stopped 10 shots.

- The Tribe received 44 votes in the STX/NFHCA Preseason Top 20.W&M was the fourth highest team listed in the also receiving votes category.

SCOUTING DAVIDSON

The Tribe will be the season-opener for Davidson. The Wildcats rolled past NorPac foe Appalachian State, 6-3, in the teams exhibition tune up. Eleanor Cowley led the way for Davidson with a hat trick in the victory. The Wildcats finished 2005 with a 5-12 record, including a 2-4 mark in the NorPac.

Kayli Maxwell returns as the Wildcats' top player from a season ago. She earned Second-Team All-NorPac honors, ranking second on the team in points with 17 on five goals and seven assists. Davidson also returns its third and fourth leading scorers from a season ago in the form



of Catherine Ransone (12 pts, 5g, 2a) and Britti Himelfarb (8 pts, 4g). The Wildcats also return both goalkeepers from 2005. Brittany Rollek posted a GAA of 2.97 with 21 saves in seven matches, while Rachel Kiselewich started 11 affairs and made 88 saves with a GAA of 3.13.

W&M and Davidson have met on six other occasions with the Tribe holding a 6-0 advantage. The Tribe is 3-0 all-time at Busch Field against the Wildcats and own a 28-3 scoring advantage in the six meetings. The last time the two teams met was Oct. 12, 2002 with W&M notching a 7-1 victory.

SCOUTING RADFORD

Radford enters its contest with W&M at 2-0 on the season. The Highlanders opened the year with a 1-0 victory over Siena before knocking off Colgate, 4-3, in overtime.

Tiffany Church leads the Highlanders with five points, two goals and one assist on the young season. Meredith Evans, Erica Lawrence and Kristen Griffith have also found the back of the net for Radford. Megan Stuke has played every minute in goal for the Highlanders. She has four saves on the year with a GAA of 1.90, including a shutout against Siena.

The Tribe is 21-2 all-time against Radford, including the last six against the Highlanders. The last time the two teams squared off was Sept. 26, 2003, which W&M won, 2-1, in Williamsburg. The College is 11-0 all-time against Radford at home and has outscored the Highlanders, 59-17, in their 23 meetings.

OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION

The Tribe tallied four goals in each of its two victories on the opening weekend of the season. It marked the first time since the 2004 season that W&M scored four or more goals in back-toback games. The last time, the Tribe scored four or more goals in three straight wins at Virginia (5-4) on Sept. 29, vs. Drexel (4-2) on Oct. 1 and vs. Hofstra (5-1) on Oct. 3. The back-to-back fourgoal performances also were the first time since 1988 that the Tribe notched four or more goals in back-to-back road victories. During that season, W&M defeated Loyola (Md.), 4-3, on Oct. 1, before disposing of American, 4-0, on Oct. 2.

Two Goals Around

In the Tribe's season-opening victories over Ball State and Miami (Ohio), W&M had three players record two-goal games. Senior forwards Gina Cimarelli and Maggie Long notched twogoal games against Ball State, while junior Kim Hedley recorded a pair of goals against Miami (Ohio). The total equaled the Tribe's multi-goal game total from 2005. The multi-goal game was the second of Cimarelli's career, while Long and Hedley recorded the first two-goal contests of their careers.

FIVE-POINT GAMES

Senior Maggie Long and junior Kim Hedley each registered five points a piece in Tribe wins over Ball State and Miami (Ohio). Long had two goals and an assist against Ball State, while Hedley pulled the trick against Miami (Ohio). Both totals were career highs for each player. In fact, Hedley bettered her point total from a season ago when she notched a pair of goals for four points. Long nearly surpassed her total from a season ago, as she finished 2005 with six points on two goals and two assists.

DOMINATING THE SHOT CHARTS

In its first two games of the season, W&M outshot its opponents by an average of 11.5 shots per contest. In the season opening victory over Ball State, the Tribe outshot the Cardinals, 21-4. The following day, the Green and Gold held a 20-14 shot cushion over Miami (Ohio). Even more impressive than the shot totals for the Tribe was the fact that 10 or more of those attempts were on cage. Against BSU, the College had 15 shots on goals, before finishing with 10 attempts on goal against Miami (Ohio).

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

Freshmen Wesley Drew, Kelsey Jackson, Courtney Farino, Kaitlin Johnson and Sarah Louie saw the first action of their W&M careers in the Tribe's two season-opening victories. All four players appeared in the Ball State contests, while Drew, Jackson, Farino and Johnson saw the turf against Miami (Ohio). Drew and Johnson earned the first starts of their careers. Johnson, a redshirt freshman, started the opener at Ball State, while Drew earned the nod against Miami (Ohio).

DEFENDING BUSCH FIELD

Busch Field has been the permanent home of the William and Mary field hockey program since the 1990 season. The facility opened in 1989, and the field hockey program played three contests on it during the 1989 season. The Tribe has enjoyed a distinct home-field advantage over the last 17 seasons, amassing a 106-48-2 record (.686) at Busch Field.

The facility was made possible by a generous grant from Anheuser-Busch Brewing Corporation. Busch Field opened in June of 1989 with the Busch Gardens-William and Mary Soccer Tournament, and was dedicated on Nov. 1, prior to the men's soccer game against East Carolina. The first field hockey competition on the turf was Sept. 30, 1989, a 7-0 victory for the College over American. In its initial season at Busch Field, the Tribe went 3-0, outscoring opponents, 16-1.

The facility has been a difficult one for Tribe opponents, as William and Mary has outscored its opponents, 386-237, through the 2005 season. W&M has scored an average nearly 2.5 goals per contest at Busch Field, while holding opponents to 1.52 tallies.

OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN

Seniors Becky Van Zee and Maggie Long were voted team captains for the Tribe in 2006. Van Zee started the final 10 match-

es of the 2005 season and played in all 21 games. She finished her junior campaign with five points on two goals and one assist. Long started 12 matches and finished with two goals, two assists and six points a season ago.

SENIOR LEADERSHIP

Along with the senior captains Becky Van Zee and Maggie Long, the Tribe will lean on the senior leadership of Jamie Fitzgerald, Julienne Palbusa and Gina Cimarelli. Fitzgerald, who is a two-sport standout also playing for the W&M lacrosse team,

is the lone returning starter on the back line for W&M. Over the last two years, she started 32 matches in the defense. Palbusa has battled injuries during her W&M career, but came into her own during the 2006 spring season. She will help fill in on the back line for the College after earning the team's most improved award in 2005. Cimarelli led the College in scoring a season ago with 14 points on six goals and two assists. Over the last two season, she has notched 13 goals.

PICKED FOURTH IN CAA

The Tribe was picked fourth in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Pre-season Coaches Poll. The Tribe garnered 42 total points to come in behind conference favorite Old Dominion, Northeastern and James Madison. The Tribe finished the 2005 season at 10-11 overall, including a 4-4 ledger in the CAA. The College advanced to the CAA tournament semifinals before falling to eventual champion and NCAA Semifinalist Old Dominion.

The voting system for the rankings consisted of each head coach submitting a ranked order of finish. The coaches were not allowed to vote for their own squad, and the points system started at eight for a first-place vote, down to one for an eighth-place vote. The CAA has traditionally been among the top field hockey conferences in the nation, ranking third in the 2005 conference RPI rankings.

TRIBE RECEIVES VOTES IN PRESEASON POLL

W&M received 44 votes in the 2006 STX/National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Division I Preseason Poll. The Tribe was the fourth highest team listed in the also receiving votes category for the poll and was one of eight Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) teams to at least receive votes in the preseason poll. The first regular-season poll will be released on Sept. 5.

Of the College's 18 opponents slated for the 2006 season, 13 appeared in the top 20 or in the also receiving votes category of the preseason poll. The Tribe opponents in the preseason rankings include No. 3 Duke, No. 4 Old Dominion, No. 5 North Carolina, No. 13 Northeastern, No. 18 James Madison, No. 19 Richmond and No. 19 Virginia. W&M will also face six foes in the also receiving votes list that includes Princeton, Hofstra, Delaware, Miami (Ohio), Drexel and Towson.


