BUSCH FIELD

Tribe



Busch Field has been the permanent home of the William and Mary field hockey program since the 1990 season. The facility opened in 1989, and the field hockey program played three contests on it during the 1989 season. The Tribe has enjoyed a distinct home-field advantage over the last 17 seasons, amassing a 112-49-2 record (.693) at Busch Field.

The facility was made possible by a generous grant from Anheuser-Busch Brewing Corporation. Busch Field opened in June of 1989 with the Busch Gardens-William and Mary Soccer Tournament, and was dedicated on Nov. 1, prior to the men's soccer game against East Carolina. The first field hockey competition on the turf was Sept. 30, 1989, a 7-0 victory for the College over American. In its initial season at Busch Field, the Tribe went 3-0, outscoring opponents, 16-1.

The facility has been a difficult one for Tribe opponents, as William and Mary has outscored its opponents 405-243 through the 2006 season. W&M has scored an average nearly 2.5 goals per contest at Busch Field, while holding opponents to less than 1.5 tallies.

With a seating capacity of 2,271, the facility features a computerized lighting system that makes night games possible. The 120 x 75-yard playing surface combines a two-inch poured pad with As-

troturf grass that is tacked down, rather than cemented, making the mini-stadium unique in the United States. When the facility opened, it was nominated as one of Athletic Business Magazine's top-10 national designs. Busch Field is also located next to an irrigated natural grass area that is used for recreational sports.

At one time, Busch Field was home to William and Mary field hockey, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. With the completion of Albert-Daly Field in 2003, Busch Field has become the exclusive home of W&M field hockey.

In its 18 seasons, the Tribe has only had one losing season at home. Combined with its impressive overall mark, the College also has had success in conference play at Busch Field. The Tribe is 43-20 (.683) in conference affairs, both regular season and post season, at Busch Field. The facility has played host to a trio of Colonial Athletic Association Field Hockey Championships (1993, 1998 and 2004).

DIRECTIONS TO BUSCH FIELD

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234 (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). After the light at Ironbound Road, continue straight for about half a mile and take the first right onto Compton Drive. Turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. Busch Field will be on your right.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrops Way. Turn left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrops Way while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left. Busch Field is behind the Hall.



2007 TRIBE FIELD HOCKEY

The 2007 season for William and Mary field hockey brings the usual challenges of blending new faces with experienced veterans. While uncertainty may appear, it is far outweighed by the excitement. Head coach Peel Hawthorne enters her 21st season at the helm of the Tribe program with perhaps her youngest, but at the same time, most versatile group.

A glimpse at the Tribe roster will show only six upperclassmen and a contingent of 10 true freshmen. What doesn't appear on paper is the versatility and team chemistry, both of which hold exciting possibility for Hawthorne.

"We have a pretty versatile group," Hawthorne said. "Our team chemistry has been excellent. I think this freshman class will gel very quickly with the returning players. We have great leadership, and our upperclassmen have made a conscious effort to include the incoming freshmen in their preseason plans. They have already created a good relationship with them through camp. Although it is a large group (of freshman), I think they have a really strong understanding of who we are and what we are about."

The number of players on the Tribe roster who have the ability to play multiple positions gives W&M the opportunity to play various styles. It will also allow the Tribe to throw different approaches at its opponents to keep them on their heels.

"My goal is to have players who are comfortable in several positions and who are comfortable switching between roles on the fly," Hawthorne said. "The better they are able to understand our system of play and feel comfortable overlapping in attack and coming back to help on defense, the stronger we will be."

Despite its youth, the Tribe has an experienced quartet of seniors who will anchor the squad. Seniors **Kim Hedley**, **Gwen Hunter**, **Jes Kacerek** and **Laura Kastelic** will provide a sturdy foundation that will benefit the younger players as they grow and mature. All four seniors started every game last season and give the College an important core of leadership within every position on the field. The leadership from the four seniors along with the other returners will help in guiding the younger contingent as W&M looks to improve every day.

"Our biggest catch phrase from this past year is that we want to commit to being better every day and do everything with that in mind," Hawthorne said. "In terms of work ethic, coachability and commitment to team, I could not have been happier with our group of players. They really stepped it up last season, and I think they will do a great job in passing that along to the freshmen."

FORWARD

The Tribe's top returning scorer headlines the forward position. Senior **Kim Hedley** ranked second on the team with 20 points on nine goals and two assists last season. Her nine goals led the Tribe and ranked eighth in the CAA. For her efforts, Hedley earned Second-Team All-CAA honors during the 2006 campaign. Hedley started every game last season in the College's three-forward attack.

W&M will have to replace a pair of starters up top with the graduation of Maggie Long and Gina Cimarelli. The Tribe will look toward its youth to fill in the gap. Junior **Lauren Giles** and sophomore **Sarah Louie** headline the list of returners who could make an impact at the forward position. Giles appeared in 18 games during her sophomore campaign and scored her first collegiate goal in the College's 4-2 victory over CAA foe VCU. Louie played in 12 games during her true freshman season, gaining experience behind the veteran frontrunners. She recorded an assist in the College's 2-0 win over Radford in Williamsburg.

The influx of youth brings a lot of excitement to the Tribe program and it is no more evident than at the forward position. A trio of true freshmen could make an impact at the position. **Jenna Cinalli**, **Rebecca Wagner** and **Michelle Krewinghaus** joined the Tribe after stellar prep careers in the state of Virginia. All three earned all-state honors in high school.

Cinalli was a prolific scorer during her prep career, setting numerous school records at Chancellor and led the institution to a state title in 2006. She was the Virginia State Player of the Year in 2005 and earned NFCA All-Region accolades during her senior campaign. Krewinghaus established school records with 43 points and 16 goals as a senior. She went on to earn the *Daily Press* and Bay Rivers District Players of the Year honors at Tabb. Wagner showed her versatility also playing midfield at Princess Anne in Virginia Beach. She finished her career with 47 goals and 56 assists.

W&M can also turn to redshirt freshman **Alexis Gerber** and sophomore **Kelsey Jackson** at the forward spot. Gerber spent her freshman season learning from the experienced front line. Prior to joining the College, she enjoyed a stellar prep career at Conestoga in Pennsylvania. She was a three-time all-league and All-Main Line choice. Jackson played in nine games as a freshman for the Tribe, splitting time between the midfield and forward spots. She could also see time in the midfielder in 2007 for the Tribe. Jackson was "Miss Maine" in field hockey prior to joining W&M.

MIDFIELD

Senior **Jes Kacerek** leads the pack for W&M in the midfield. Over the last two seasons, Kacerek has started 36 of the Tribe's 40 games, scoring five goals and dishing out five assists. Kacerek is a skilled and intelligent player who will lead the Tribe in the center of the park. She received the W&M Martha Barksdale Award, given annually to a rising senior female athlete who has excelled in the classroom and on the field, prior to her senior campaign.

"Jes Kacerek will anchor our center midfield," Hawthorne said. "She is our chief playmaker."

Junior **Katie Broaddus** is another experienced Tribe returner who could see time in the midfield. Broaddus started all 19 games for the Tribe in 2006 and could find time in both the midfield and back positions in 2007. The Clifton, Va., native has been slowed by off-season surgery, so her time on the field will be dictated by how fast she recovers. In her first two seasons with W&M, Broaddus has started 21 games and has 10 points on four goals and two assists.

"Katie is a little bit of an unknown," Hawthorne said. "She could fill either a defensive or midfield role. Katie could easily be one of our strongest players, but we will have to wait and see how she responds."

W&M also returns CAA All-Rookie team selection from a season ago, **Wesley Drew**, in the midfield. Drew appeared in 18 contests for the College and recorded one start. The former prep All-American finished the year with three goals and recorded the most points by a true freshman since the 2000 season. W&M will also have other returning options at the midfield slot including Giles, Gerber, Jackson and sophomore **Courtney Farino**.

A quartet of true freshman could find time in the Tribe midfield dur-

ing their rookie campaigns. **Erica Eng** was an all-state choice in New Jersey, finishing her senior season with 24 goals and 13 assists. During her four-year career, Eng helped Madison to an 87-7 record and a Group 2 championship in 2003. The College could also turn to newcomers **Elizabeth Loudy**, **Kelsey Nawlinski** and **Mikala Savaides**.

Loudy was an honorable mention all-state choice as a senior after earning all-district, all-region and all-metro honors. Nawlinski was a first-team all-state choice in Pennsylvania at Villa Maria Academy. Savaides also earned all-state accolades as a senior at Lake Braddock High School. She was named the AAA Patriot District Player of the Year as a senior as well.

BACK

Like it will at the forward and midfield positions, the College will be anchored in defense by a returning senior starter. Senior **Laura Kastelic** is no stranger to the Tribe lineup, having started 37 games over her first three seasons with W&M. Last season, she ranked fifth on the team in scoring (7 points) and third in assists (3), despite playing the back position. In W&M's 4-2 win over VCU, Kastelic equaled the school record with three assists.

While Broaddus could see time in the defensive third for the College, the Tribe also has options in sophomores **Kaitlin Johnson** and **Courtney Farino**. Johnson led W&M with three defensive saves during her red-shirt freshman campaign. Her defensive save total ranked fourth in the CAA. Johnson earned the Tribe's Most Improved Player award after starting 18 of 19 games in the back. Farino appeared in eight games as a rookie in 2006 and tallied her first collegiate goal in the Tribe's 4-0 blanking of Davidson.

Redshirt freshman **Maura Checchio** gained valuable experience during her rookie season learning from the Tribe's backline. With a year under her belt, Checchio will look to make an impact in the back after earning four letters for First Colonial in Virginia Beach, Va., as a prep.

The College adds a pair of true freshmen to the defensive fold. Rookies **Jennifer Harr** and **Danielle Scissom** have the ability to make an impact and see time as freshmen. Harr and Scissom will look to carry their high school success over to the collegiate level. The pair teamed to lead Cox High School to a VHSL State Championship in 2006. Harr participated in the National Futures Tournament U19 as a member of Team Norfolk last year, while Scissom is a two-time first-team all-state selection.

GOALKEEPER

Perhaps the Tribe's most experienced returner comes in arguably the most important position on the field at goalkeeper. Senior **Gwen Hunter** has started every game over the last two seasons in the cage for W&M and currently ranks among the school's all-time leaders in saves, goals against average and shutouts. She has a career goals against average of 1.69 to go along with 219 saves and 10 shutouts. In 2005, Hunter was a second-team all-state choice in goal.

"Gwen is an exceptional athlete with years of game experience and a tireless work ethic," Hawthorne said. "She has always been at the top of our fitness charts. Gwen has been instrumental in organizing our defense, and I expect her to maintain her starting role. At the same time Carrie Thompson must be prepared to step in at any moment. While Carrie does not have Gwen's game experience, she is agile, strong and very capable of running the defense. Camilla enters the program with a strong foundation in goaltending. She has had some great coaching and is very vocal in the cage. I think she will slip right in and feel comfortable in that."

Redshirt freshman **Carrie Thompson** and true freshman **Camilla Hill** will have the chance to learn under the tutelage of an experienced goalkeeper like Hunter. Thompson redshirted her rookie season with the Tribe after helping her Stafford team to a perfect 24-0 mark and a state title during her senior season in high school. Hill was a First-Team Virginia Group AA All-State choice as a senior.

SCHEDULE

The Tribe will face some stiff competition during the upcoming campaign as seven foes qualified for the 2006 NCAA Tournament, and a total of nine opponents were ranked among the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Top 20 or receiving votes.

The College will open the year with a pair of home matches on August 25 and 26 at Busch Field. In the season opener, W&M will battle defending Northeast Conference Champion Lock Haven at 11 a.m. on Aug. 25. It will mark the first time since the 1976 season that the Tribe and Lady Eagles have met. The Tribe will round out its opening weekend the following day against America East foe Fairfield.

W&M will then hit the road for a pair of tough matches against NCAA Tournament and nationally-ranked foes. The College travels to Durham, N.C., to face NCAA Final Four participant Duke on Sept. 1. The Blue Devils finished last season ranked No. 4 in the national polls and earned its fourth straight trip to the NCAA Final Four during the 2006 campaign.

The Tribe will face Big Ten foe Iowa on Sept. 3 in Durham as well. It will mark the first time the Tribe and Hawkeyes have met on the turf. It will also be a reunion of sorts for W&M assistant coach Quan Nim Anderson. Nim Anderson was an All-American and graduated from Iowa in 1999.

The College will face two other ACC foes on the year, battling Virginia on Sept. 14 in Charlottesville and North Carolina in Williamsburg on Oct. 12. Both teams finished last season ranked among the top 10 nationally. W&M's slate will also include a trio of teams from the NorPac Conference. The Tribe will host Longwood (Sept. 12), Radford (Sept. 26) and Appalachian State (Oct. 14) during the 2007 campaign.

On Sept. 21, the Tribe will open its CAA ledger against Northeastern at the friendly confines of Busch Field. The CAA slate includes home matches against Drexel (Oct. 5), Hofstra (Oct. 7) and Old Dominion (Oct. 28) and road affairs at Delaware (Sept. 28), Towson (Sept. 30), VCU (Oct. 20) and James Madison (Oct. 21). ODU and JMU both advanced to the NCAA Tournament a season ago. The Monarchs finished the year at 19-4 and ranked No. 3 nationally, while the Dukes won the CAA title and were ranked No. 13.

The College's non-conference schedule will also include matches against Miami (Ohio) and Richmond. The Tribe will host the Redhawks on Sept. 8. W&M and Miami (Ohio) will meet for the second straight season as the College collected an exciting 4-3 overtime win in Oxford last season. W&M will travel to meet the defending A-10 Champion Spiders on Oct. 25. W&M defeated then-No. 19 Richmond, 5-3, in Williamsburg last season.

The CAA Tournament will begin with the league quarterfinals on Nov. 1. The league's semifinals and championship game are slated for Nov. 3 and 4. The entire CAA Tournament will be played in Virginia Beach.

Peel Hawthorne enters her 21st season as head coach of the William and Mary field hockey team. During her tenure, she has led the Tribe to a record of 232-165-2 (.584), including at-large berths into the 16-team NCAA Tournament in 2000 and 2002. Including four seasons as the head coach at Connecticut College, Hawthorne has a career record of 263-182-5 (.590), placing her 33rd on the national coaching victories list (all divisions). The 263 wins rank her 23rd among active head coaches. Hawthorne's 450 career games coached ranks 26th in collegiate field hockey coaching history annals and is 18th among active head coaches.

Previously voted the CAA Coach of the Year in 1995 and 2001, Hawthorne won the award for a third time in 2004, also earning her first state coach of the year honor, after leading the Tribe to a 7-0 CAA record. It was the first time in school history that W&M had gone undefeated in conference play and was the first outright regular season league title in school history. In 2003, Hawthorne helped the Tribe to a 6-1 league record and the Green and Gold's first-ever share of the regular season CAA title.

She has mentored 33 players to a total of 51 all-region honors and has coached seven All-Americans, including five (Anna Davis, Kelli Duggan, Ann Ekberg, Kelly Giles and Claire Miller) in the last five

seasons. Hawthorne also was selected as the W&M Society of the Alumni Coach of the Year following the 2001-02 academic year.

In 2004 and 2005, W&M players have garnered the conference's top honor both offensively and defensively. During the 2004 campaign, Giles became the first Tribe player to win Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Player of the Year honors. Along with that distinction, Giles garnered the VaSID State Player of the Year, also becoming the first W&M player to be bestowed that honor. In 2005, Davis notched the CAA Defensive Player of the Year award. She not only led the CAA, but ranked second nationally in defensive saves with 11.

Since W&M joined the CAA in 1991, Hawthorne has coached 63 All-CAA players, including a program-high seven in 2000 and 2001. Coupled with the nine All-South Atlantic Conference selections during Hawthorne's first four seasons, the 20-year Tribe head coach has guided 72 all-conference performers. Since VaSID began honoring a field hockey All-State team in 2000, 18 of Hawthorne's players have garnered the distinction, including five in 2005.

Hawthorne's players have also enjoyed success in the classroom. In total, 30 players have received National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) National Academic Squad honors since 1994. Over the last four years, 24 players have achieved the CAA Commissioner's Award.

The Tribe has amassed a winning record in 16 of Hawthorne's 20 seasons at the helm, including 17 seasons of 10 or more victories, and Hawthorne has consistently improved W&M's national reputation. In 2000, she led the Tribe to a 12-8 record as the College earned one of just eight at-large berths into the NCAA Tournament. W&M proved it was worthy of its selection, taking No. 5 Michigan to two overtimes in the first round, before falling, 3-2.

PEEL HAWTHORNE

Tribe

The game marked the first time W&M had competed in the national field hockey postseason in 20 years, with the College's last appearance coming in the 1980 AIAW Nationals.

In 2002, W&M returned to the NCAAs after reaching the CAA championship game for the first time, before falling to No. 1 Old Dominion. Again, the Tribe validated its appearance in the tournament, this time taking No. 5 Maryland to the wire, before losing in double overtime, 2-1.

Far and away the winningest coach in school history, Hawthorne's 232 career victories at the College are more than twice as many as the 86 recorded by her former mentor, Nancy Porter, who coached at the College from 1974-80. Hawthorne set the school record in 1993, as the Tribe shut out Villanova, 2-0, on Oct. 9. Including her four years as a player from 1976 through 1979, she has either coached or played in 284 (77 percent) of the W&M field hockey program's 369 victories since the start of the 1973 season.

The head field hockey and lacrosse coach at Connecticut College for four years before returning to W&M, Hawthorne produced three All-Americans, 15 All-New England players and six USFHA Northeast players while posting a 31-17-3 (.637) record. As lacrosse coach, she led her teams to a 35-15-1 (.696) record and four postseason bids.

In 2005, she was a member of the W&M Athletics Task Force and was part of the NCAA Recertification Subcommittee on Equity and Welfare. Quan Nim Anderson is beginning her seventh season as the top assistant at William and Mary. A 1999 graduate of the University of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in social work, she came to the Tribe after serving as the assistant coach at Davidson for one year.

During her six years with the Tribe, the College has posted an overall record of 71-47 (.602), including a 28-12 (.700) ledger in Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) action. Anderson helped guide the Tribe to its first-ever perfect conference record, as W&M went 7-0 in CAA play in 2004. Over the last five years, five W&M players have earned All-America accolades, including Anna Davis, who in 2005 became the first Tribe player to earn first-team honors since 1979. Over Anderson's six-year career at W&M, 17 players have earned all-region and VaSID All-State honors, while 24 players have garnered All-CAA accolades.

In 2002, the Tribe amassed a 12-9 overall mark and received one of eight at-large bids in the NCAA Tournament. Despite putting a scare in the No. 5 Maryland Terrapins, the Tribe fell, 2-1, in double overtime. In the last five years, William and Mary owns 12 wins over teams ranked in the top 20, including five over top 10 competition.

As a senior at Iowa in 1999, Anderson received Second-Team NFHCA All-America honors and was named to the All-Big Ten and all-region first teams and the NCAA All-Tournament squad. She also earned all-region honors in 1995 and 1998 and was a Second-Team All-Big Ten pick in 1998. Anderson played in 86 games at Iowa and finished with 69 points on 29 goals and 10 assists. She was a two-year captain and received the Dr. Patricia Hicks Award given for overcoming adversity and showing perseverance and great strength of character.

Anderson is currently the site director and head coach of the under-19 team for the USFHA Futures Regional site at W&M and has coached regional teams at National Futures tournaments since 2002. In 2004, Anderson was a member of the NFHCA Regional All-America selection committee, and in 2003, she was the assistant coach for the South team in the USFHA North/South Senior All-Star game.

Ellis has a resume that includes a great deal of international experience after serving at the U.S. Field Hockey Under-21 National Team Coach and an assistant for the U.S. National Senior Team.

2007 TRIBE FIELD HOCKEY

2006 SEASON IN REVIEW

DOUBLE-DIGIT VICTORIES

With its 4-2 win over Towson on Oct. 27, the Tribe recorded its 10th victory of the season. It marked the ninth straight season in which the College equaled the 10-win plateau. In fact, during 17 of head coach Peel Hawthorne's 20 seasons at the helm, W&M has recorded 10 or more victories.

BEST START SINCE 2000

The Tribe started the season a perfect 5-0 before falling in its most recent affair with Princeton. The 5-0 start marked the first time since 2000 that W&M has won five straight to open the season. During the 2000 season, the College opened with seven-straight victories. The 5-0 start is only the fourth five-game winning streak to start a season in school history. Aside from 2000, the Tribe accomplished the feat in 1978 and 1979.

.500 OR BETTER

The Tribe finished the CAA regular season with a 4-4 mark, tying with Northeastern for fourth in the conference. Over the 16 years in which W&M has competed in the CAA, the Tribe has posted a .500 or better mark in 15 of those seasons. The lone season in which the Tribe did not post a .500 or better record in the league was 1994 when it finished 2-3. In 2006, W&M defeated VCU, Drexel, Hofstra and Towson during the league slate.

CAN I HELP YOU?

In the Tribe's 4-2 CAA-opening victory over VCU on Sept. 24, back Laura Kastelic assisted on the first three W&M goals to help propel the College to victory. Each of Kastelic's three assists came off penalty corners as she found Katie Broaddus in the 22nd minute, Wesley Drew in the 32nd minute and Maggie Long in the 49th minute. All four Tribe goals came via penalty corners.

Kastelic's three helpers were not only a career high, but equaled the W&M school mark, held by six other players. The last time a Tribe player notched three assists in a contest, Katie Silverthorne set the school mark with four against the Rams on Oct. 7, 2001.

FITZGERALD NAMED TO SENIOR ALL-STAR GAME

Senior back Jamie Fitzgerald was named to the 2006 National Field Hockey Coaches Association Division I Senior All-Star Game. She became the 16th player from W&M to be named to the NFHCA All-Star Game. It marked the 10th year in which the Tribe had a representative at the event.

During her senior campaign, Fitzgerald started all 19 matches at back for the Tribe. Her lone assist on the year came in a 5-3 victory over then-No. 19 Richmond. She anchored a Tribe defense that recorded five shutouts and a goals against average of 2.16. For her career, the Jenkintown, Pa., native appeared in 65 matches with 51 starts. She has six career points on one goal and four assists to go along with three defensive saves.

STRIKER CAREER YEARS

Forwards Gina Cimorelli, Maggie Long and Kim Hedley all recorded new career highs during the 2006 season. All three established new career bests for points in a season with Long and Hedley garnering career-best goal totals, while Cimorelli equaled her best season in the Tribe.

Cimorelli led the Tribe in scoring, while ranking ninth in the CAA in points (21). She also had seven goals, equaling her career high from 2004. The Oak Hill, Va., native also had a career and team-high seven assists during her senior campaign.

Hedley led the team in goals with nine tallies on the year. For the season, she had a career-best 20 points. She also tallied her first two career assists last season. Both her goal and point totals bettered her career-high marks from the 2005 season.

Long, like her fellow starting frontrunners, established career-bests in goals and points. After notching six points on two goals and two assists as a junior in 2005, the Ocean City, N.J., native finished 2006 with 15 points on seven goals and one assist.

IN MULTIPLES

During the 2006 season, the Tribe received two-goal games on seven different occasions from three different players. Senior forward Gina Cimorelli had three multi-goal games, while junior striker Kim Hedley and senior frontrunner Maggie Long recorded two apiece. The two-goal games were the first of Hedley and Long's careers, while Cimorelli's three multi-goal games gave her four in her career.

The last time W&M had more than seven multi-goal games came during the 2002 season when it had nine. During that season Ann Ekberg had seven multi-goal games to lead the way for the College. Ekberg's season marked the last time a single Tribe player had more than three multi-goal games in a season.

The Tribe also produced four, five-point games from the trio of forwards in 2006. Cimorelli pulled the trick against then-No. 19 Richmond and Miami (Ohio), while Hedley did it against the Redhawks as well and Long accomplished the feat against Ball State. The 2000 season was the last time W&M had more than four five-plus point games in a season. During that campaign, the College had five games of five or more points. In 2002, Ekberg had four games of five-plus points, making her the last W&M player to have more than two games with five or more points.

Student-athletes are often acclaimed for what they do on the field and in the classroom, but it is particularly heartwarming to see the fruits of their giving back to the community. That was never more evident than the William and Mary field hockey program's efforts toward helping their fellow state institution in the aftermath of the tragedy at Virginia Tech.

Led by senior Jes Kacerek and junior Katie Broaddus, the Tribe rallied around, designed t-shirts with the help of Colonial Sports, and sold them to faculty and students. While the gesture sent a message, the outpouring of support from both the campus and the Williamsburg community was overwhelming.

In just 15 minutes, the group sold out of the 150 shirts that Colonial Sports had produced, and by noon, the field hockey team had taken over 1,000 orders for additional shirts from students and staff. Colonial Sports also began selling the shirts at their location, and over 3,000 shirts have been sold.

"It still blows my mind how popular the shirts were," Broaddus said, "We were just hoping to sell the 150, and we ended up doing that in 15 minutes. The line was out the door of the University Center, we had four computers set up and four sheets of paper for sign ups. There were people ordering six shirts, and some ordering for friends at Virginia Tech."

Each shirt cost \$10 with all the proceeds going to benefit the Hokie Spirit Memorial Fund, which was used to cover the expenses that include assistance to the victims and their families, grief counseling, memorials, communications expenses and comfort expenses. The maroon T-shirts were emblazoned with the logos of the William and Mary and Virginia Tech. The back of the shirts read "Today we are all Hokies. April 16, 2007." The timing of the original sale coincided with "Orange and Maroon Effect" Day on April 20, and many of the shirts were visible during the ceremony at the Wren Building on the campus of William and Mary.

The idea sprang from a text message between Broaddus and

Kacerek. The original idea was to come up with something that everyone could wear to the "Orange and Maroon Effect" Day ceremony. The hope was to sell the remaining shirts and donate the money to the Hokie fund, and they far out reached those expectations.

"It still hasn't hit me yet how big of a deal it was," Broaddus said. "It hasn't set in how much it will benefit the people that need it the most."

On May 9, Broaddus and Kacerek made the four-hour trek to Blacksburg to meet with Virginia Tech President Charles W. Steger. The William and Mary students spent 30 minutes with the Hokie President and along with a check for the Hokie fund, they presented him with a shirt and a plaque that had the Virginia Tech and William and Mary logos with the slogan, "Today we are all Hokies. April 16, 2007," on it.

"It was really cool meeting the Virginia Tech president," Broaddus said. "We were in the building that overlooked DrillField and the memorial with all the candles and flowers. I am not sure how we got the chance to meet him. He was really busy, came out of a meeting and took the time to sit down a meet with us. We explained to him what we did, gave him the check, a t-shirt and the plaque from Colonial Sports."

The W&M students and President Steger talked about the plans for the memorial and the scholarships in the memory of the students and faculty, who were killed and various other things.

"He explained to us everything that was going on," Broaddus said. "He spent time with us and really got to know us. He is a great person and showed that he really cared. He expressed his gratitude and gave us fitted Virginia Tech hats."

The fundraising is not yet finished. Orders are still flowing in every day with all the proceeds going to the memorial fund. The Tribe students also plan to sell more shirts when the two Virginia schools meet in football during September in Blacksburg. The game scheduled for a 1:30 p.m. start time on Saturday, Sept. 22. Shirts can also still be ordered for \$10 by sending an e-mail to hokietribe@colonialsportscustom.com.

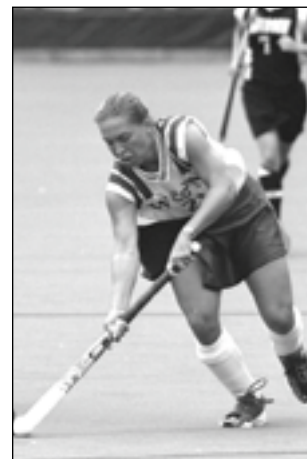

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

The 2006-07 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 88.

The men's cross country squad won its seventh consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fourth straight. The women's swimming team won its first CAA Championship, while the women's tennis team added its 19th all-time CAA crown in the spring.

Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoric reached the title match of the NCAA Doubles Championship, earning All-America honors. Katie Radloff became the first female swimmer to advance to the NCAA's since 1983. Additionally, Keith Bechtol raced to a 14th-place finish in the 10,000m, while Bonnie Meekins placed 16th in the heptathlon at the NCAA Track and Field Championships.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities.

This year, the NCAA honored 13 W&M teams as recipients of its public recognition award. The Tribe teams recognized are baseball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Additionally, in the latest NCAA graduation rate reports, three Tribe teams posted 100% graduation rates, including football, women's basketball and women's cross country/track.

Since 1992, 39 student-athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including three in the past academic year. Keith Bechtol (men's track) was a First-Team selection, Ryan Overdeest (men's soccer) was a Second-Team selection and Anna Young (women's soccer) was a Third-Team selection.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 22 winners. Bechtol was the CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in both cross country and track and field, bringing his career award total to five. Meghan Bishop (women's cross country) earned her fourth CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year award in the fall in cross country.

In addition, four of W&M's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.



Terry Driscoll Athletics Director

Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 12th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that William and Mary President Gene Nichol proclaimed "The nation's gold standard" when it came to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last four years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 19 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Swimming and Women's Tennis). In 2004-05, the Tribe captured five CAA championships and an Atlantic 10 Football title. As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no team in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 88 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has twice posted a 100 percent graduation rate, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 22 individuals receive the honor.

Despite the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). The total increased significantly when Driscoll announced plans to build the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmye Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium, which is scheduled to open in time for the 2008 season. This impressive structure follows closely on the heels of the installation of a \$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006) and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006) inside the stadium. Yet another significant upgrade will be unveiled inside the venerable structure for 2007, as the department will install an \$800,000-plus brand new video scoreboard by the season opener.

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



Barbara Blosser Senior Associate Athletics Director

Few names in the William and Mary Athletics Department are as familiar, or respected, as that of Senior Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser. Since first arriving on campus in 1978, Blosser has touched the lives of thousands of Tribe student-athletes.

She has held her current title since April of 2004, after spending the previous 12 years as the associate

athletics director. In each role, Blosser has served as an integral part of nearly every facet of the department's daily operations.

Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VALAW crown in her first season with a then school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VALAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the assistant to the associate athletics director. Over the past 17 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

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2007-2008 Faculty Representatives:

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Gene R. Nichol President

Gene R. Nichol became the 26th president of the College of William and Mary on July 1, 2005.

Before returning to Williamsburg, where he taught two decades ago, Nichol was Burton Craige Professor and Dean of the law school at the University of North Carolina. He served as Law Dean at the University of Colorado from 1988 to 1995, and as James Gould Cutler Professor and Director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law at William and Mary from 1985 to 1988. Nichol was also a faculty member at the University of Florida and West Virginia University. He founded the Byron R. White Center for the Study of American Constitutional Law at the University of Colorado (1990) and the Center for Civil Rights at

the University of North Carolina (2001).

Nichol teaches courses in constitutional law and civil rights. He is the co-author of *Federal Courts: Cases, Comments, and Questions* (West, 2000) and a contributor to *Where We Stand: Voices of Southern Dissent* (NewSouth Books, 2004). Nichol has published articles and essays in the *Harvard Law Review*, the *Yale Law Journal*, the *University of Chicago Law Review*, the *University of Pennsylvania Law Review*, the *Michigan Law Review*, the *California Law Review*, the *Virginia Law Review* and an array of other leading legal journals. From 1998 to 1999, he was a political columnist for the *Rocky Mountain News* and the *Colorado Daily*. From 1999 to 2005, he was a regular op-ed writer for the *Raleigh News & Observer*. He has also written for *The Nation* and other periodicals.

Nichol has been significantly involved in public affairs. He has testified before a number of committees of the United States Congress and various state legislatures. In 1991, he was appointed special master by a three-judge federal court in Colorado to mediate a redistricting dispute between the governor and the legislature. The accord was ratified by statute. A year later he helped head the Colorado Reapportionment Commission. In 2004, Nichol led the North Carolina Bi-Partisan Commission on Lobbying Reform; legislation was passed enacting com-



Sandra Day O'Connor Chancellor

Sandra Day O'Connor, one of the most distinguished jurists in the history of the United States Supreme Court—and its first female justice—addressed the most profound legal issues of her age with wisdom, courage, and skill. After a long career in public service, including nearly a quarter century on the nation's highest court, she retired in 2006.

Justice O'Connor spent her childhood on an isolated cattle ranch in southeastern Arizona tending to a variety of ranch chores, raising farm animals, and reading voraciously. After completing school in El Paso, Texas, she journeyed west to continue her education at Stanford University, where her professors inspired and challenged her to make a difference in her nation and the world.

Justice O'Connor earned a B.A. in economics (*magna cum laude*) from Stanford University and a LL.B. from Stanford Law School. She was an editor of the law review and graduated third in her law class—two spots behind her friend and future colleague, the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist.

After being admitted to the bar, Justice O'Connor served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the U.S. Army Quartermaster Market Center in Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to

1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms, during which she served as Majority Leader. In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She succeeded the Honorable Henry A. Kissinger as Chancellor of the College of William and Mary in 2005. In the year since her investiture, she has visited the College several times, visiting classes, talking with students, and addressing two academic conferences.

She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, whom she met in law school. They have three sons: Scott, Brian, and Jay.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played varsity football. He obtained his J.D. from the University of Texas, graduating Order of the Coif in 1976. He is married to Glenn George, a scholar of employment and labor law and a member of the faculty at the William and Mary's Marshall-Wythe School of Law. They have three daughters: Jesse (19), Jenny (18), and Soren (14).

mission recommendations. He ran unsuccessfully for national political office while in Colorado. He has been elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

In 2003, Nichol won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day address. Two years later, Governor Michael Easley inducted Nichol into the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the state of North Carolina's highest civilian honor, and the national judicial access organization, Equal Justice Works, named him outstanding law school dean of the year.

At the College of William and Mary, Nichol has markedly increased access for students of color. He also created the Gateway William and Mary program, an innovative financial aid program that puts a quality education within the reach of all Virginians, regardless of their ability to pay.

THE COLLEGE



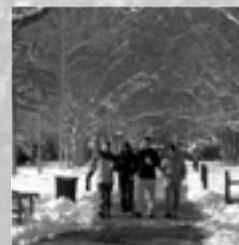
For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).

Compliance, Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to ensure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength, Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.
