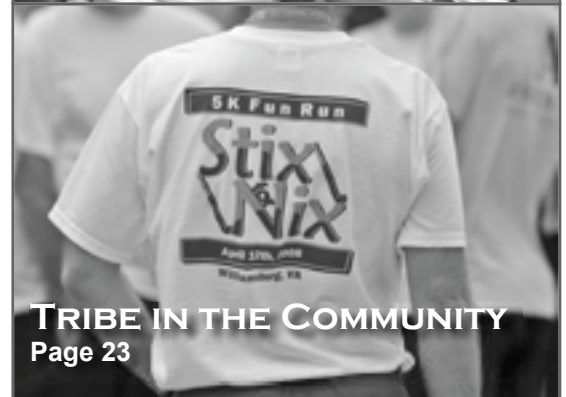

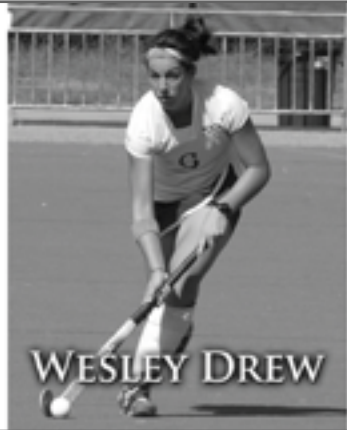

A youthful exuberance abounds in the Tribe field hockey program as W&M returns 18 players from a season ago, including only three seniors. While the College will look to seniors **Katie Broaddus**, **Lauren Giles** and **Kaitlin Johnson** for leadership, the Green and Gold will also rely heavily on a strong contingent of underclassmen, who garnered valuable experience during the 2007-08 campaign.

"It will be a wide open slate in terms of who is going to be where," head coach **Peel Hawthorne** remarked. "Last year, we subbed freely with a pretty young group. With only three seniors this season, we will be drawing on the experience of our sophomore and junior classes."

Hawthorne, who enters her 22nd season at the helm of the Tribe program, is excited about the mix of players on the Tribe roster for 2008. While there remains some unanswered questions due to the graduation of players and injuries, Hawthorne is confident the Tribe has the components for a successful season.

"The good thing about this team is that they have a lot respect for one another and they work hard for each other," Hawthorne said. "They appreciate the work that each puts into making the program successful. They are good at sharing the load, encouraging and challenging one another to get better. As a group, they really want to be as good as they can be and they will hold each other accountable. It's so satisfying to coach them because you know they share your vision and they truly dedicate themselves to reaching their goals. We want to live out our top-two team rules everyday: 'Strive for excellence' and 'Be a good teammate.' I am looking forward to this season and training to win everyday."

The Tribe roster continues to be loaded with youth as 17 of the 24 players will have sophomore or freshman eligibility in 2008. The program saw development not only during the 2007 campaign from its younger charges, but also during the off-season and spring season.

"The spring season was instrumental in helping us get over the hump as far as inexperience goes," Hawthorne said. "We played a lot of tournaments and utilized two teams in most, so that our players got a great deal of playing time in game-like conditions. The spring pre-season was a fantastic opportunity to gain valuable game experience."

MIDFIELD

The most experienced positions on the field for the Tribe in 2008 will be on the offensive end in the midfield and at forward. The College returns a pair of midfield starters from a season ago as well as a number of players who have either contributed significant minutes or started over the last two seasons. Junior **Wesley Drew** and sophomore **Jenna Cinalli** return as starters in the midfield and will be looked upon as offensive catalysts.

"Wes is one of our captains and can play anywhere on the field," Hawthorne said. "Last spring, she worked on increasing her shot production, and she met her goal. Wes has a very powerful strike and will be a scoring threat regardless of whether she is playing midfield, forward or back. She will have a leadership roll on the field no matter where she ends up, but she is most experienced as a midfielder and creative."

In 2007, Drew started every game, splitting time between the midfield and defensive backfield. She is one of the Tribe's top returning scorers, having finished with eight points on two goals and four assists in 2007. The four assists ranked fourth on the squad and are tied for the most of any W&M returner.

Cinalli garnered CAA All-Rookie team honors in 2007 after starting the final 12 matches of the season in the midfield. The Fredericksburg, Va., native is the College's top returning goal scorer from a season ago as she finished her rookie campaign with five tallies. She ranked among the CAA's best with three game-winning goals.

"Jenna is a very effective midfielder, who cannot only create a play, but finish it as well," Hawthorne said. "As such, she could spend some time at forward if necessary. She is a very coachable player and could become a key playmaker for us. She improved in every game last year."

Junior **Kelsey Jackson** and sophomores **Erica Eng** and **Liz Loudy** return having garnered significant minutes in the midfield for the College. Jackson has appeared in 24 matches over her first two seasons for W&M and, last season, scored her first two collegiate goals.

"Our goal for Kelsey last year was for her to release the ball sooner, and she worked on it all year," Hawthorne said. "Kelsey has a powerful shot and is very deceptive. She can ma-

neuver in tight spaces and has very good stick work."

Eng and Loudy both made an impact in the midfield as rookies in 2007. Eng appeared in 18 matches, making five starts, while Loudy, despite being hampered by injuries, made three starts and appeared in 13 contests.

"Erica is capable of playing anywhere on the field," Hawthorne said. "She has great game sense, good vision and is a technically skilled player."

"Liz was a nice surprise last year as a freshman," Hawthorne said. "I thought she might be a redshirt, but she has such a great competitive edge to her game. She does not like to lose the ball and is aggressive. She worked her way into the lineup. Liz has the ability to blossom into a scoring threat."

While the Tribe midfield may have a number of experienced players returning, it will also include a solid group of both incoming and red-shirt freshmen. Hawthorne will have the options of true freshmen **Lynsey Clyburn**, **Caitlyn Davies** and **Leah Zamesnik** at her disposal.

Davies, Zamesnik and Clyburn each earned all-state honors during their final two seasons of high school. Davies finished her high school career with 45 goals and 27 assists for Moravian Academy in Pennsylvania. Clyburn and Zamesnik were high school team at Granby in Norfolk, Va. Zamesnik finished her career with 66 goals, 43 assists and 10 defensive saves. Clyburn capped her high school tenure with 10 goals, 17 assists and five defensive saves as a senior in 2007. She took part in Futures, Futures Elite and the National Futures Championship during her career as well.

FORWARD

Another experienced group for the College resides at the forward position, where the Tribe will have the opportunity to use four players who started at the position in 2007. Senior **Lauren Giles** will be the leader of the group having appeared in 42 games over her collegiate career, including starts in every contest a season ago.

"Lauren comes back with a great deal of experience both at forward and midfield," Hawthorne said. "She is quick, persistent and has incredible stamina. She never gives up on a play and is very good at creating counter attacks. Lauren should figure into our attack significantly."

SEASON PREVIEW

Giles started 18 games at forward last season and registered a two-goal performance in the College's win over Radford. She is tied as the leading scorer among Tribe returnees with 10 points a season ago on three goals and four assists.

Junior **Sarah Louie** along with sophomores **Michelle Krewinghaus** and **Rebecca Wagner** garnered significant minutes and experience in the attacking third last season. Louie appeared in 15 matches, including six starts. She scored a pair of goals on the season and started each of the College's final four games at the forward slot.

"Sarah has become a more complete player each season," Hawthorne said. "I expect her to be a leader on our forward line."

Wagner made a splash as a rookie in 2007. She earned CAA and national Rookie of the Week honors during the first week of the regular season, scoring three goals, including both game-winners, in a pair of W&M wins. The Virginia Beach, Va., native appeared in 18 matches, including five starts.

"Rebecca is one of our most skilled forwards," Hawthorne said. "She has the stick work and poise to get through traffic, she sees the field well and is good at setting up teammates."

Krewinghaus came on late in the season and finished with 11 appearances to go along with a pair of starts. She started back-to-back games against national champion North Carolina and Appalachian State. Krewinghaus scored her first collegiate goal off a rebound in the Tribe's 3-0 win over VCU on Oct. 20.

"Michelle is very handy around the goal," Hawthorne said. "She has a good touch on the ball and can sneak around the corner on the weak side. She knows where to be and scores a lot of goals in practice off deflections."

A pair of freshmen, **Mikala Savvides** (redshirt) and **Ashley Kintzing** (true), could also figure into the attack at forward.

"A former softball player, Mikala is a very quick athlete and is extremely competitive," Hawthorne said. "Her hockey skills improved a great deal during her redshirt season. She is a determined individual and is unafraid to take risks."

Kintzing earned all-district honors during each of her four seasons in high school, before receiving all-region accolades as a senior. Af-

ter playing mainly midfield and defense in high school, Hawthorne feels that Kintzing's position at the collegiate level could be at forward.

DEFENSE

The Tribe back-line returns three starters from a season ago. The W&M defense limited opponents to a goals against average of 1.74 and shut out the competition on six occasions. Senior **Katie Broaddus** headlines the group as a two-year returning starter and co-captain in 2008. Broaddus and fellow returning starter **Maura Checchio** have been limited by injuries throughout their careers, and following off-season surgery, Hawthorne hopes for a speedy recovery of both players who figure to be key components to the Tribe back-line.

"If (Katie and Maura) remain healthy, we could have a very mobile defensive line," Hawthorne said. "As a team, we need to be able to possess the ball with confidence in the back field."

Broaddus has started every game over the last two seasons and 40 games over her three-year career. She is one of only three returning players to start all 19 games in 2007. The Clifton, Va., native finished last season with a pair of goals and topped the College in defensive saves with three. Checchio appeared in 17 games as a redshirt freshman in 2007, including 14 starts at the halfback position.

"Katie will anchor our backfield as our most experienced defender," Hawthorne said. "She is a good communicator and decision maker and has excellent vision. Successful surgery and rehab will enable her to play a more attacking game. Both she and Maura can take more risks if they have confidence in their recovery runs. The exciting thing is that both of these players have had very productive seasons in the past, yet we have never seen them play at full strength pain free. We are looking forward to their best seasons yet."

Junior **Courtney Farino** is the third Tribe starter along the back-line returning in 2008. She garnered the team's Most Improved Player award after starting 18 games during her sophomore campaign. The College can also lean on sophomore **Danielle Scissom** for help along the back-line. Scissom appeared in 12 games and started a contest as a rookie in 2007.

"We have a lot of options in our back field with our younger players gaining experience

last season," Hawthorne said. "Courtney was a workhorse last year playing solid defense every contest. She reads the play well and can get us out of a jam with strong stick skills. Danielle is our single best communicator on the field. She is very vocal and picks things up very quickly. Danielle has improved in every aspect of her play."

Senior **Kaitlin Johnson** brings a wealth of experience to the defensive back field, but she will be limited following surgery in August. Johnson has appeared in 29 matches over the last two seasons and started 18 contests in 2006. Redshirt freshmen **Jennifer Harr** and **Kelsey Nawalinski** also figure to contribute after soaking up the Tribe defensive system a season ago. Nawalinski was named the Tribe's unsung hero last season.

GOALKEEPER

A key position for the Tribe in 2008 will be between the pipes at goalkeeper. The College graduated four-year starter Gwen Hunter, who started the most games in school history for a goalkeeper, after last season. A trio of underclassmen will battle it out for starting honors. Both redshirt freshman **Camilla Hill** and sophomore **Carrie Thompson** had the opportunity to learn under Hunter for a season, while freshman **Elizabeth Frey** joins the Tribe after helping Frank W. Cox to back-to-back state championships.

"Camilla and Carrie both trained well during the year and gained valuable game experience during the spring season," Hawthorne said. "Both will have the chance to run the defense and earn their time in the cage. They have different strengths and are eager to prove themselves. They have had a good role model in Gwen and how it is time to settle in and claim their share of play."

Thompson saw action in five games last season as a redshirt freshman and did not allow a goal in nearly 50 minutes of action. She recorded her first collegiate save against Fairfield on Aug. 26, and notched a career-best three stops in the College's win over Radford on Sept. 23. Hill sat out last season as a redshirt and came into W&M as a first-team all-state goalkeeper in high school.

Peel Hawthorne enters her 22nd season as head coach of the William and Mary field hockey team. During her tenure, she has led the Tribe to a record of 241-175-2 (.579), including at-large berths into the 16-team NCAA Tournament in 2000 and 2002. Including four seasons as the head coach at Connecticut College, Hawthorne has a career record of 272-192-5 (.585), placing her 31st on the national coaching victories list (all divisions). The 272 wins rank her 11th among active Division I head coaches. Hawthorne's 469 career games coached ranks 22nd in collegiate field hockey coaching history annals (all divisions) and eighth among active Division I head coaches.

Previously voted the CAA Coach of the Year in 1995 and 2001, Hawthorne won the award for a third time in 2004, also earning her first state coach of the year honor, after leading the Tribe to a 7-0 CAA record. It was the first time in school history that W&M had gone undefeated in conference play and was the first outright regular season league title in school history. In 2003, Hawthorne helped the Tribe to a 6-1 league record and the Green and Gold's first-ever share of the regular season CAA title.

She has mentored 34 players to a total of 52 all-region honors and has coached seven All-Americans, including five (Anna Davis, Kelli Duggan, Ann Ekberg, Kelly Giles and Claire Miller) in the last five seasons. Hawthorne also was selected as the W&M Society of the Alumni Coach of the Year following the 2001-02 academic year.

In 2004 and 2005, W&M players garnered the conference's top honor both, offensively and defensively. During the 2004 campaign, Giles became the first Tribe player to win Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Player of the Year honors. Along with that distinction, Giles garnered the VaSID State Player of the Year, also becoming the first W&M player to be bestowed that honor. In 2005, Davis notched the CAA Defensive Player of the Year award. She not only led the CAA, but ranked second nationally in defensive saves with 11.

Since W&M joined the CAA in 1991, Hawthorne has coached 63 All-CAA players, including a program-high seven in 2000 and 2001.

HEAD COACH PEEL HAWTHORNE

Coupled with the nine All-South Atlantic Conference selections during Hawthorne's first four seasons, the 21-year Tribe head coach has guided 72 all-conference performers. Since VaSID began honoring a field hockey All-State team in 2000, 18 of Hawthorne's players have garnered the distinction, including five in 2005.

Hawthorne's players have also enjoyed success in the classroom. In total, 30 players have received National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) National Academic Squad honors since 1994. Over the last five years, 35 players have achieved the CAA Commissioner's Award. In 2007, the Tribe received the NFHCA National Academic Team Award.

The Tribe has amassed a winning record in 16 of Hawthorne's 21 seasons at the helm, including 17 seasons of 10 or more victories, and Hawthorne has consistently improved W&M's national reputation. In 2000, she led the Tribe to a 12-8 regular season record as the College earned one of just eight at-large berths into the NCAA Tournament. W&M proved it was worthy of its selection, taking No. 5 Michigan to two overtimes in the first round, before falling, 3-2. The game marked the first time W&M had competed in the national field hockey postseason in 20 years, with the College's last appearance coming in the 1980 AIAW Nationals.

In 2002, W&M returned to the NCAAs after reaching the CAA championship game for the first time, before falling to No. 1 Old Dominion. Again, the Tribe validated its appearance in the tournament, this time taking No. 5 Maryland to the wire, before losing in double overtime, 2-1.

Far and away the winningest coach in school history, Hawthorne's 241 career victories at the College are nearly three times as many as the 86 recorded by her former mentor, Nancy Porter, who coached at the College from 1974-80. Hawthorne set the school record in 1993, as the Tribe shut out Villanova, 2-0, on Oct. 9. Including her four years as a player from 1976 through 1979, she has either coached or played in 284 (77 percent) of the W&M field hockey program's 369 victories since the start of the 1973 season.

The head field hockey and lacrosse coach at Connecticut College for four years before returning to W&M, Hawthorne produced three All-Americans, 15 All-New England players and six USFHA Northeast players while posting a 31-17-3 (.637) record. As lacrosse coach, she led her teams to a 35-15-1 (.696) record and four postseason bids.

In 2005, she was a member of the W&M Athletics Task Force and was part of the NCAA Recertification Subcommittee on Equity and Welfare. A member of many professional organizations, Hawthorne recently ended her term as the Division I representative for the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, has served as the South Region Chair for the NCAA Division I Field Hockey Committee and as a member of the South Region All-America Selection Committee. 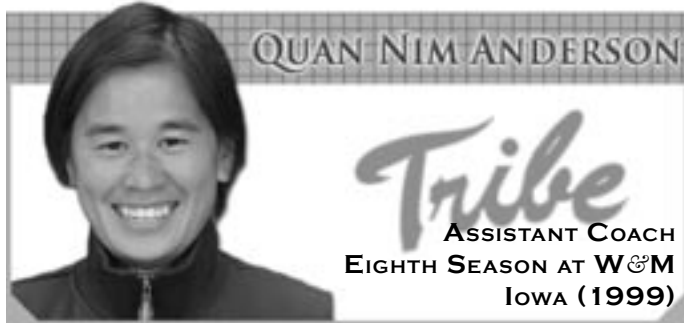
as head coach for the South team at the NFHCA Senior All-Star Game. Hawthorne holds a U.S. Field Hockey Association coaching certification, was site director and head coach of several USFHA Development Camps and the Head Futures Coach for eastern Virginia. She also served as a USFHA summer league volunteer coach and is the director of the Colonial Field Hockey Camp held each June at W&M. She has experience as a field hockey clinician at many levels, hosting the NFHCA Coaches Clinic at W&M, as well as participating in VHSLCA and NCAA Youth Education through Sports (YES) clinics.

Hawthorne also served for nine years on the Executive Committee of the U.S. Women's Lacrosse Association and is past chair of that organization's Sports Medicine committee. As a member of the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) subcommittee on Eye Safety in Sports, Hawthorne chaired the organization's task force on women's lacrosse. She was instrumental in establishing an ASTM manufacturing standard for protective eye wear for the sport.

A field hockey and lacrosse standout at W&M, Hawthorne graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1980. In her career, the Tribe field hockey team posted a record of 52-13-7 and made two trips to the AIAW Nationals, finishing fifth in 1979. A defender, she helped the team allow just 0.92 goals per game during her career, while scoring five goals. The Tribe totaled 37 shutouts in her career, more than half the total number of games played in the span and the most in any four-year period in school history. Hawthorne was an NATA certified athletic trainer for six years and has an M.Ed. in the field from Virginia. She enjoys water skiing and has been an instrumentalist and vocalist for a contemporary Christian band for 12 years.



ASSISTANT COACHES



Quan Nim Anderson is beginning her eighth season as the top assistant at William and Mary. A 1999 graduate of the University of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in social work, she came to the Tribe after serving as the assistant coach at Davidson for one year.

During her seven years with the Tribe, the College has posted an overall record of 80-57 (.584), including a 30-18 (.625) ledger in Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) action. Anderson helped guide the Tribe to its first perfect conference record, as W&M went 7-0 in CAA play in 2004. Over the last five years, five W&M players have earned All-America accolades, including Anna Davis, who in 2005 became the first Tribe player to earn first-team honors since 1979. Over Anderson's seven-year career at W&M, 18 players have earned all-region and VaSID All-State honors, while 25 players have garnered All-CAA accolades.

In 2002, the Tribe amassed a 12-9 overall mark and received one of eight at-large bids in the NCAA Tournament. Despite putting a scare in the No. 5 Maryland Terrapins, the Tribe fell, 2-1, in double overtime. In the last six years, William and Mary owns 12 wins over teams ranked in the top 20, including five over top 10 competition.

As a senior at Iowa in 1999, Anderson received Second-Team NFHA All-America honors and was named to the All-Big Ten and all-region first teams and the NCAA All-Tournament squad. She also earned all-region honors in 1995 and 1998 and was a Second-Team All-Big Ten pick in 1998. Anderson played in 86 games at Iowa and finished with 69 points on 29 goals and 10 assists. She was a two-year captain and received the Dr. Patricia Hicks Award given for overcoming adversity and showing perseverance and great strength of character.

Anderson is currently the site director and head coach of the under-19 team for the USFHA Futures Regional site at W&M and has coached regional teams at National Futures tournaments since 2002. In 2004, Anderson was a member of the NFHA Regional All-America selection committee, and in 2003, she was the assistant coach for the South team in the USFHA North/South Senior All-Star game.

Anderson is married to Jeff Anderson. The couple has two daughters, Dakota (3), and Gabriella (1).



Kristen McCann enters her second season with the W&M field hockey program after joining the Tribe in the spring of 2007. McCann brings a wealth of experience to Williamsburg after earning All-America honors at North Carolina and playing on the U.S. National Team for five years. Prior to joining the W&M staff, McCann coached the Walsingham Academy team in Williamsburg.

McCann played with the U.S. National Team from 2000-04. During that stretch, she earned 74 International caps, while tallying 20 goals. She played in the 10th World Cup in Perth, Australia, helping the U.S. to a ninth place finish. McCann also earned a silver medal on the 2003 Pan American Games team.

During her career at North Carolina, McCann was a two-time All-American, earning first-team accolades as a senior in 2000. She guided UNC to a national runner up finish in 2000, while earning ACC Player of the Year honors. She also helped the Tar Heels to the 1997 National Championship, scoring 12 goals as a redshirt freshman. McCann was named to the ACC 50th Anniversary team in 2002 after scoring 59 career goals for UNC.

McCann earned her bachelor's degree in psychology from North Carolina in 2001. In May of 2007, she completed her master's from William and Mary in public policy.



Tess Ellis, an experienced coach on the international scene with the United States Field Hockey Association, is in her fifth season as a volunteer assistant coach at W&M. Ellis previously served as an assistant coach for the Tribe for eight seasons from 1993 through 2000. Ellis has a resume that includes of great deal of international experience after serving at the U.S. Field Hockey Under-21 National Team Coach and an assistant for the U.S. National Senior Team.

During her 13 total years with W&M, the Tribe has amassed an overall record of 136-121 (.529), including a 48-35 (.578) mark in the Colonial Athletic Association. Ellis was an assistant in 2000, when the Tribe earned its first NCAA Tournament bid as an at-large selection.

An internationally experienced player, coach and clinician, field hockey has afforded Ellis many opportunities to travel the globe. In 2002, she was an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team at the World Cup in Perth, Australia and served as the head coach of the U.S. Under-23 team that toured South Africa. Ellis was also the head coach of the U.S. Junior World Cup Team in Argentina in 2001. She served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team at the 1999 Sydney International Hockey Challenge in Australia and at the 2000 Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Milton Keynes, England. Ellis also served as an instructor at U.S. Field Hockey's selection camps and Futures Program.

In the fall of 1992, Ellis volunteered as a part-time coach at Salisbury State University in Maryland, which reached the final four of the NCAA Division III Tournament. From 1986-90 she was the head coach of Pymble Ladies College in Sydney, Australia, and spent time as the head hockey coach at The American School in London, England. She has also served as head coach of the under-18 West team at the Olympic Sports Festival in St. Louis, traveled back to Australia with the USA National squad and toured Canada with the under-18 USA national squad.

Ellis played as a member of the Australian National Indoor team and Australia's National Under-21 National team. She was a player/coach of several New South Wales championship teams. Ellis founded the Peninsula (now Colonial) Field Hockey Club and co-founded the Colonial Field Hockey Camp at W&M.

BUSCH FIELD



Busch Field has been the permanent home of the William and Mary field hockey program since the 1990 season. The facility opened in 1989, and the field hockey program played three contests on it during the 1989 season. The Tribe has enjoyed a distinct home-field advantage over the last 19 seasons, amassing a 119-53-2 record (.690) at Busch Field.

The facility was made possible by a generous grant from Anheuser-Busch Brewing Corporation. Busch Field opened in June of 1989 with the Busch Gardens-William and Mary Soccer Tournament, and was dedicated on Nov. 1, prior to the men's soccer game against East Carolina. The first field hockey competition on the turf was Sept. 30, 1989, a 7-0 victory for the College over American. In its initial season at Busch Field, the Tribe went 3-0, outscoring opponents, 16-1.

The facility has been a difficult one for Tribe opponents, as William and Mary has outscored its opponents 432-260 through the 2007 season. W&M has scored an average nearly 2.5 goals per contest at Busch Field, while holding opponents to less than 1.5 tallies.

With a seating capacity of 2,271, the facility features a computerized lighting system that makes night games possible. The 120 x 75-yard playing surface combines a two-inch poured pad with Astroturf grass that is tacked down, rather than cemented, making the mini-stadium unique

DIRECTIONS TO BUSCH FIELD

From the North/West: Take I-64 East to Lightfoot Exit 234 (Route 199 East). At top of exit ramp, take a right onto Route 199 East. Stay on 199 East until Monticello Avenue exit. Exit at Monticello Avenue, and bear left on exit ramp. At bottom of ramp, turn left at light onto Monticello (pass under 199). After the light, continue straight and go through three more stop lights (the final one will be Ironbound Road and New Town will be on your left). Take the very next right (located just under 3/4 a mile) onto Compton Drive (before the stop light and lowered speed limit). The total distance from 199 to Compton Drive is one and a half miles. Continue on Compton Drive and turn right at the first stop sign onto Brooks Road. Busch Field will be on your right.

From the South/East: Take I-64 West to Exit 242A (Route 199 West). Follow 199 to fourth light. At the fourth light, take a right onto Jamestown Road. Follow Jamestown Road 1.1 miles (past Lake Matoaka on left), then take a left onto Ukrop Drive. Take a left at the next stop sign and continue to follow Ukrop Drive while bearing right until you reach William and Mary Hall up the hill on your left. Busch Field is behind the Hall.

in the United States. When the facility opened, it was nominated as one of Athletic Business Magazine's top-10 national designs. Busch Field is also located next to an irrigated natural grass area that is used for recreational sports.

At one time, Busch Field was home to William and Mary field hockey, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. With the completion of Albert-Daly Field in 2003, Busch Field has become the exclusive home of W&M field hockey.

In its 19 seasons, the Tribe has only had one losing season at home. Combined with its impressive overall mark, the College also has had success in conference play at Busch Field. The Tribe is 44-23 (.657) in conference affairs, both regular season and post season, at Busch Field. The facility has played host to a trio of Colonial Athletic Association Field Hockey Championships (1993, 1998 and 2004).

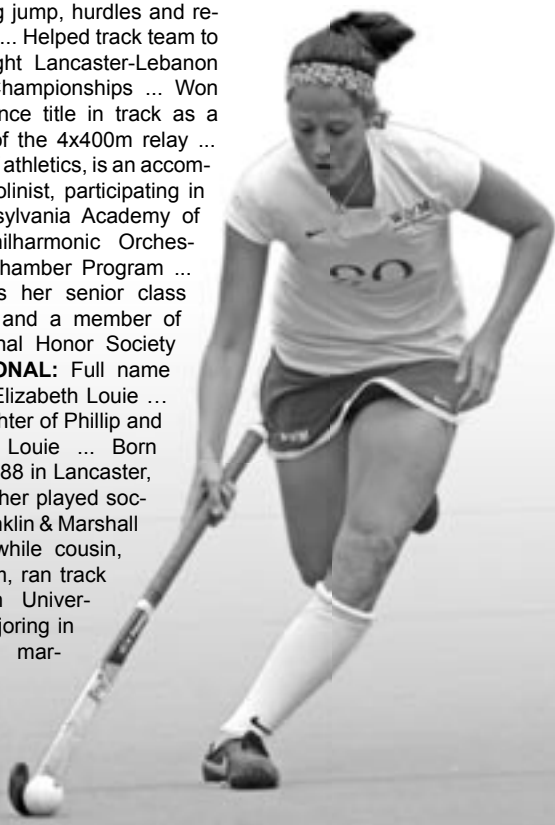

YOUTH IS SERVED

A glance at the Tribe roster would easily explain how young W&M was in 2007. The roster featured 24 players, 18 of which were listed as freshmen, redshirt freshmen and sophomores. While the College had to lean on its core of returning upperclassmen, it was inevitable that a lot would fall on the shoulders of younger players. The Tribe's youth was not only up to the task, but promoted a bright future for the College.

In its victories over Lock Haven and Fairfield, the Tribe used 19 and 20 players, respectively. Underclassmen composed 14 of those players, including six who made their first collegiate starts. Freshmen Danielle Scissom and Erica Eng along with redshirt freshmen Alexis Gerber and Maura Checchio started the first games of their collegiate careers in the opener against Lock Haven, while sophomore Courtney Farino and freshman Liz Loudy made their first starts against Fairfield.

In total, 19 of the Tribe's 37 goals on the year were scored by underclassmen, while 45 of the Tribe's 102 points were registered by freshmen, redshirt freshmen and sophomores. Eight freshmen and a total of 11 underclassmen started games at various points in 2007.

SCORING ON NO. 1

Goals were a hard commodity to come by against then-No. 1, and eventual national champion North Carolina in 2007, but the Tribe bucked the trend in its contest against the top-ranked Tar Heels. Coming into the contest with W&M on Oct. 12, UNC had a nine-game shutout streak that spanned 630-minutes. Included in those nine victories were five against teams ranked in the STX/NFHCA Top 20. The Tar Heels were also ranked No. 1 nationally in goals against average (0.50) and shutout percentage.

The Tribe would not be like UNC's previous nine foes, as W&M scored a pair of second half goals, closing to within 4-2 of the No. 1 Tar Heels. Senior Kim Hedley scored the Tribe's first goal of the game in the 52nd minute of play, following her own rebound. Fellow senior Jes Kacerek added the capper with no time on the clock as the Tribe converted on a penalty corner.

BALANCED ATTACK

The Tribe used depth to its advantage and in the process established one of the most balanced scoring offenses in the CAA. In 2007, 13 different Tribe players have found the back of the cage, including 11 players with two or more goals and seven with three goals.

Senior Kim Hedley led the Tribe attack with 19 points on six goals and seven assists. Freshman Jenna Cinalli ranked second on the Tribe in goals with five during her rookie campaign. Senior Jes Kacerek was third on the team with four goals. Freshman Rebecca Wagner joins senior Laura Kastelic and junior Lauren Giles in fourth on the team with three goals in 2007. W&M also had eight players with seven or more points on the season, including five in double digits. Kacerek and Kastelic follow Hedley on the point list with 13 (4g, 5a) and 11 (3g, 5a), respectively. Cinalli and Giles each finished with 10 points on the season, while Wagner and sophomore Wesley Drew had eight points apiece to go along with Gerber's seven.

DON'T CALL IT A COMEBACK

The Tribe overcame a 2-1 halftime deficit to defeat Miami (Ohio) thanks to second-half tallies from sophomore Wesley Drew and freshman Jenna Cinalli. It marked the first time W&M had overcome a halftime deficit since it pulled the trick against the same RedHawks in Oxford, Ohio, on Aug. 27, 2006. The Tribe trailed 2-1 at the half in that contest, before rebounding for a 4-3 overtime victory. The last time W&M overcame a halftime deficit at home to tally the victory came during the 1998 season. The Tribe trailed No. 16 American, 1-0, at the half, before rallying for a 3-2 overtime win on Sept. 16, 1998.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Student-athletes are often acclaimed for what they do on the field and in the classroom, but it is particularly heartwarming to see the fruits of their giving back to the community. Those sentiments are evident in the William and Mary field hockey program as they have donated their time and effort to the benefit of the community in various facets. Particularly, over the last two seasons, the Tribe has undertaken two community projects to benefit former Tribe player Jessica Nixon, who is battling cancer, during the spring of 2008 and in helping to raise money for the Hokie Spirit Memorial Fund in the aftermath of the tragic shooting on the Virginia Tech campus in 2007.

HOKIE SPIRIT MEMORIAL FUND

Following the tragic events at Virginia Tech during the spring of 2007, the William and Mary field hockey team designed and sold t-shirts to help raise money for the Hokie Spirit Memorial Fund. Led by 2008 graduate Jes Kacerek and current senior Katie Broaddus, the Tribe rallied around, designed t-shirts with the help of local sports apparel store Colonial Sports, and sold them to faculty and students. While the gesture sent a message, the outpouring of support from both the campus and the Williamsburg community was overwhelming.

In just 15 minutes, the group sold out of the 150 shirts that Colonial Sports had produced, and by noon, the team had taken over 1,000 orders for additional shirts from students and staff. Colonial Sports also began selling the shirts at its location, and more than 3,000 shirts were sold.

Each shirt cost \$10 with all the proceeds going to benefit the Hokie Spirit Memorial Fund, which was used to cover the expenses that include assistance to the victims and their families, grief counseling, memorials, communications expenses and comfort expenses. The maroon T-shirts were emblazoned with the logos of the William and Mary and Virginia Tech. The back of the shirts read "Today we are all Hokies. April 16, 2007." The timing of the original sale coincided with "Orange and Maroon Effect" Day on April 20, and many of the shirts were visible during the ceremony at the Wren Building on the campus of William and Mary.

The idea sprung from a text message between Broaddus and Kacerek. The original idea was to come up with something that everyone could wear to the "Orange and Maroon Effect" Day ceremony. The hope was to sell the remaining shirts and donate the money to the Hokie fund, and they far out-reached those expectations.

On May 9, Broaddus and Kacerek made the four-hour trek to Blacksburg to meet with Virginia Tech President Charles W. Steger. The William and Mary students spent 30 minutes with the Hokie President. Along with a check for the Hokie fund, they presented him with a shirt and a plaque embroidered with the Virginia Tech and William and Mary logos with the slogan, "Today we are all Hokies. April 16, 2007."

STIX FOR NIX

During April of 2008, the Tribe held various fundraisers to help benefit former field hockey captain and 2003 graduate of the College Jessica Nixon, who is battling cancer.

"It was a remarkable weekend," head coach Peel Hawthorne said. "We had so much support from so many people. I have spent a lot of years coaching teams, but I have never felt more proud of the Tribe family. It was a moving experience to see the accomplishments of these young alumnae who have rallied around their lifelong friend and teammate. We even had the parents of alumnae come back to participate in the day. Jess' battle with colon cancer continues, but what an inspiration she is. All the qualities that made her an exceptional student-athlete are now being channeled into her fight with this disease. She is making great progress, and it was really something special to see her walk the 5k course and be cheered at the finish line by all the participants and organizers."

The weekend began with the Stix for Nix 5K Fun Run fundraiser, which was organized by Nixon's former teammates Jordan Steele Marrota (Class of 2003), Julie Zoolkoski (Class of 2003), Ann Ekberg (Class of 2003) and head coach Peel Hawthorne. Carl Zoolkoski, brother of Julie Zoolkoski, served as race director, and the Steele family of Williamsburg also lent a hand with Jordan's brother Joey, sister Jocelyn, mother and grandmother assisting with planning, publicity and registration. Sisters from Pi Beta Phi sorority also assisted with publicity and served as course marshalls, while Tribe field hockey players and SAAC reps assisted throughout the day as well.

The 5k was followed by a field hockey tournament featuring W&M, Davidson, VCU and Radford as well as a W&M Alumnae squad. Approximately 25 former players participated in the 5K and/or the tournament, including Davidson head coach Ginny Sutton (Class of 2005), VCU head coach Kelly McQuade (Class of 2005), VCU assistant coach Shannon Karl (Class of 2006), Monmouth University assistant coach Maggie Long (Class of 2007), Zoolkoski, who is the head coach of American International, and Steele, who is an assistant coach at Stanford University. The race raised approximately \$10,000 for the Stix for Nix organization, which was formed to benefit Nixon and Colon Cancer research and awareness.

On Sunday, April 13, W&M volunteer assistant Tess Ellis (RADathletics) organized a fundraiser hockey clinic at Busch field. Approximately 65 players from ages 8-17 participated. Alumnae coaches Sutton, McQuade, Karl, Long, Zoolkoski and Steele volunteered for the day as did W&M head coach Peel Hawthorne and assistant coach Quan Nim Anderson. Former Tribe players Jes Kacerek (Class of 2008) and Ann Ekberg (Class of 2003) as well as current freshman Camilla Hill (Class of 2011) assisted with the clinic which raised an additional \$3,600 for the Stix for Nix cause.

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

• The 2007-08 season was another strong year for the College, as Tribe teams added four more CAA titles to bring the school's all-time league-leading total to 92. W&M also had eight different program's represented at the NCAA Championship level in some capacity.

• The men's cross country squad won its eighth consecutive CAA crown in the fall, while the women's cross country team won its fifth straight. The women's track and field team won its seventh CAA Championship in the last eight years, while the women's tennis team added its 20th all-time CAA crown in the 23-year history of the league during the spring

• In total, W&M had five conference players of the year, five conference scholar-athletes of the year, 18 All-Americans and 100 athletes earned all-conference honors in their respective sports during the 2007-08 season.

• Individually, the women's tennis doubles team of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic garnered All-America honors by advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. Moulton-Levy also became the first Tribe athlete and only the fourth in CAA history to win conference player of the year honors for a fourth time. Katie Radloff, who garnered CAA Swimmer of the Year and Swimmer of the Championships honors for the second straight season, earned a spot in the NCAA Swimming Championships for the second time in as many years. Christo Laundry earned All-America honors for the third time in cross country and also won the CAA Individual Championship. Women's soccer player Claire Zimmeck garnered CAA Player of the Year honors for the second straight season and was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy. Additionally, Emily Anderson earned All-America honors with a fifth-place finish in the 1,500m, marking the best Tribe finish in 14 years.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

• The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student-athlete's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any athletic scholarship-granting school and of any public school, among the Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in 2005.

• In a recent NCAA survey on graduation rates, William and Mary athletic teams set the standard for academic excellence – 13 teams graduated 100 percent of their players. The overall graduation rate for our athletes is 96 percent (higher than 86 percent for the entire student body).

• There have been 45 student athletes elected to Phi Beta Kappa in the past ten years. Four Rhodes Scholars were W&M student-athletes

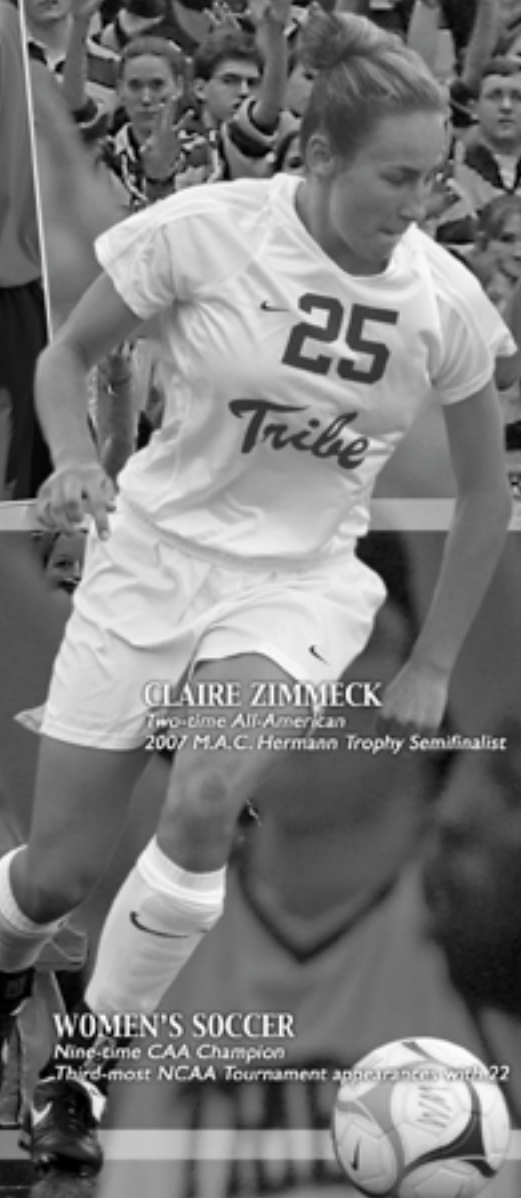
• The College's Athletics Department showed a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 86 percent among its student-athletes who entered school on athletics scholarships in the 2000-01 athletics year in data released by the NCAA in 2007.

- The national average among all Division I schools was 63 percent. W&M is tops in both the CAA and among all Division I Virginia schools.

- In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its sports, and not surprisingly, W&M has set the pace with 25 winners in the six-year history of the award.

The College

THE COLLEGE OF WILLIAM AND MARY

The College of William and Mary is a public university located in Williamsburg, Va. Founded in 1693 by Royal Charter issued by King William III and Queen Mary II of England, William and Mary is the second oldest college in the country after Harvard. William and Mary has a long history of liberal arts education and a growing research and science curriculum that demonstrates a strong commitment to undergraduate research. The College, which became a state university in 1906, has been designated a "Public Ivy," and for nine straight years has been ranked by U.S. News & World Report as sixth-best public university in the country – and the nation's top small public university.

Also referred to as "the alma mater of a nation," the College has educated four U.S. Presidents – George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, which is the third most of any college in the country. William and Mary also claims several firsts, including the 1776 creation of Phi Beta Kappa – the country's first academic honor society – the first honor code of conduct for college students, and the first collegiate law school, established in 1779. William and Mary is also home to the Sir Christopher Wren Building – the country's oldest academic building still in use – and the President's House, the oldest home of a university president still in use.

WILLIAM AND MARY FACTS:

- In addition to four U.S. Presidents, William and Mary has educated a number of this country's key historical figures, including U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Marshall and 16 signers of the Declaration of Independence.
- More recent famous alumni from William and Mary include U.S. Secretary of Defense Robert Gates ('65), the late David Brown ('78) (astronaut on the Columbia Shuttle), actress Glenn Close ('74), comedian John Stewart ('84), fashion designer Perry Ellis ('61), actor Patton Oswalt ('91), the late Mark McCormack ('51) (founder of sports and celebrity agency IMG), actress Linda Lavin ('59), NASCAR and Gibbs Racing's J.D. Gibbs ('91), Minnesota Vikings star Darren Sharper ('97), and Pittsburgh Steelers Head Coach Mike Tomlin ('95).
- In 2008, William and Mary recognized as 5th-highest producer of Peace Corps volunteers among mid-sized schools (5,000-15,000 students). As of January 2008, 51 W&M alumni are serving. Since the Peace Corps' inception, 499 W&M alumni have volunteered with the Corps, making the university the 82nd-highest producer of volunteers of all time.
- For 2007-2008, the College had more Fulbright Scholars than any other college of university in Virginia, and it had the highest application-to-award rate among nation's top research institutions. In 2006-2007, 12 William and Mary students were named Fulbright Scholars. Eleven received the honor in 2007-08 and scholars are studying in countries such as Argentina, Hungary, Uganda, Sweden, Senegal, and Ecuador.
- In 2008, U.S. News ranked William and Mary sixth among all public colleges and universities and 33rd out of all universities – both public and private. The William & Mary Law School ranked tied for 30th in 2008 by U.S. News. The Mason School Business ranked 40th in nation (2008) by Financial Times and 71st in the world. William and Mary ranked 4th-best bargain in higher education by Kiplinger's in 2008. Newsweek magazine named W&M "hottest small state university" in 2006.
- In 2008, W&M received a record number of applications for undergraduate admission for the 3rd year in a row. More than 11,500 undergraduate applications were received.
- According to a recent survey, William and Mary students contribute 323,000 hours of community service per year. Seventy-five percent of undergraduates and 50 percent of graduate students report they volunteered during their time at the College. Ninety percent of undergraduates report they will volunteer in the community they reside in following graduation.

W. TAYLOR REVELEY III INTERIM PRESIDENT

Taylor Reveley became interim president of the College in mid February 2008. Before assuming his current post, he served as dean of William & Mary Law School for almost a decade, starting in August 1998. He is the John Stewart Bryan Professor of Jurisprudence.

Reveley received his A.B. from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs

in 1965. At Princeton, he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and rowed on the lightweight crew for two years. Reveley went to law school at the University of Virginia, receiving his J.D. in 1968. During the United States Supreme Court's 1969 term, he clerked for Justice William J. Brennan, Jr.

Reveley has extensively studied and written about the constitutional division of the war powers between the President and Congress. In 1972-73, he spent 13 months studying the war powers while an International Affairs Fellow of the Council on Foreign Relations in New York City and a Fellow of the Woodrow Wilson Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C. He is the author of *War Powers of the President and Congress: Who Holds the Arrows and Olive Branch?* (University of Virginia Press, 1981).

Before joining William & Mary, Reveley practiced law for many years at Hunton &

Williams, where he specialized in energy matters, especially those involving commercial nuclear power. He was the managing partner of the firm for nine years.

Much of Reveley's extracurricular time over the years has gone to non-profit organizations. He has served on many educational and cultural boards, including those of Princeton University (where he is a trustee emeritus), Union Theological Seminary in Virginia, St. Christopher's School, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, JSTOR, the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, the Virginia Historical Society, the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities, the Richmond Symphony, and the Presbyterian Church (USA) Foundation.

Reveley and his wife Helen have four children—Taylor, Everett, Nelson, and Helen Larnier—and a daughter-in-law, Margaret Louise (Marlo, married to Taylor).



SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR CHANCELLOR

Justice O'Connor spent her childhood on an isolated cattle ranch in southeastern Arizona tending to a variety of ranch chores, raising farm animals, and reading voraciously. After completing school in El Paso, Texas, she journeyed west to continue her education at Stanford University, where her

professors inspired and challenged her to make a difference in her nation and the world.

Justice O'Connor earned a B.A. in economics (*magna cum laude*) from Stanford University and a LL.B. from Stanford Law School. She was an editor of the law review and graduated third in her law class—two spots behind her friend and future colleague, the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist.

After being admitted to the bar, Justice O'Connor served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California, from 1952 to 1953, and as a civilian attorney for the U.S. Army Quartermaster Market Center in Frankfurt, Germany, from 1954 to 1957. From 1958 to 1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965 to 1969. She was appointed to the Ari-

zona State Senate in 1969, and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms, during which she served as Majority Leader. In 1975, she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals.

President Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. She succeeded the Honorable Henry A. Kissinger as Chancellor of the College of William and Mary in 2005. In the year since her investiture, she has visited the College several times, visiting classes, talking with students, and addressing two academic conferences.

She is married to John Jay O'Connor III, whom she met in law school. They have three sons: Scott, Brian, and Jay.

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR TERRY DRISCOLL

Under the steady guidance and watchful eye of Terry Driscoll, the William and Mary Athletics Department has solidified its standing as one of the nation's preeminent broad-based programs. As Driscoll enters his 13th year as athletics director, he has overseen an unprecedented era of improvement in terms of funding and facilities while also

maintaining the College's rich history of producing well-rounded student-athletes.

Driscoll oversees a program that is committed to balancing academic demands with athletic success. One of the department's stated goals each year is to finish among the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, which has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the director.

In the last five years alone, the Tribe's program has combined for a total of 23 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) titles. This past season, W&M claimed four CAA titles (Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Track & Field and Women's Tennis). As recently as 2002-03, W&M had a school record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament, with four teams winning conference titles and six that finished in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. Overall, no institution in the CAA can claim more all-time league championships than the 92 William and Mary has earned.

As impressive as the athletic accomplishments have been during Driscoll's tenure, the program's academic successes have been even greater. In the NCAA's inaugural (2004) APR rankings, a measurement of academic progress based on academic eligibility, retention, and graduation of student-athletes, W&M was fourth in the nation overall and first among institutions offering athletic performance-based scholarships. Additionally, the Tribe football team has posted a 100 percent graduation rate three times, while the majority of the program's squads have consistently ranked among the nation's finest in terms of graduation. In 2002, the CAA started recognizing Scholar-Athletes of the Year for each of the 22 sports it sponsors, and the College has had a conference-high 26 individuals receive the honor.

In addition to the many academic and athletic successes, Driscoll's impact on the program has been equally impressive in terms of physical and financial improvements. Since taking over as athletics director, Driscoll has overseen the construction of more than \$20 million in new facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, la-

crosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Most recently, the College dedicated a new \$11 million, 30,000 square-foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center at Zable Stadium in the summer of 2008. During the last three years, the venerable stadium has been enhanced with an \$800,000-plus video scoreboard (2007), the installation of a \$650,000 permanent lighting system (2006) and an \$840,000 state-of-the-art Field Turf Pro artificial playing surface (2006).

In addition to the physical structures, Driscoll has also worked with the Associate Athletics Director for Development, Bobby Dwyer, to increase the annual fund-raising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to the current annual total of approximately \$2.7 million.

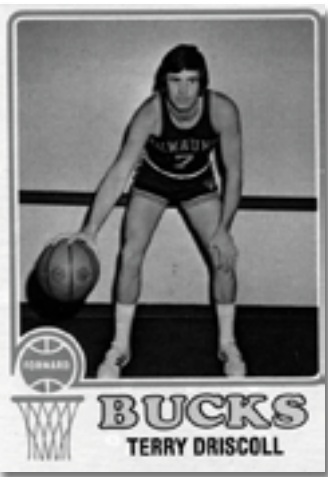
A true student-athlete himself, Driscoll's leadership skills were developed during his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament Finals as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom as a biology major garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth overall pick of the 1969 NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three spots after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and then coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communications - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the venue executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports to organize the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



TRIBE FACILITIES

William and Mary is committed to building and maintaining outstanding facilities for all 21 of its varsity athletic teams. The College has demonstrated this commitment by investing approximately \$16 million toward the construction and upgrade of its athletics facilities during just the last five years. Among W&M's recent projects was the construction of the \$11 million, 30,000-square foot Jimmie Laycock Football Center, which was dedicated this past June. In recent years, the College has hosted NCAA tournament events for football and women's tennis, while a number of other W&M programs have hosted conference championships at Tribe venues.

ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

With more than two decades of success athletically and academically, the Colonial Athletic Association has established a reputation as one of the nation's top collegiate conferences.

The CAA encompasses five of the nation's nine largest metropolitan areas with a geographic footprint that stretches from Boston to Atlanta. The conference has produced 16 national team champions in five different sports, 33 individual national champions, 12 national players of the year, 11 national coaches of the year and 12 Honda Award winners. Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars and 20 NCAA post-graduate scholars. In 2007-08, the CAA had five ESPN the Magazine Academic All-Americans and more than 1,700 of our 4,000 student-athletes received the Commissioner's Academic Award after posting at least a 3.2 grade point average while lettering in a varsity sport.

The landscape of the conference stretches along the majority of the East Coast, and includes six of the nation's top 25 media markets – New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Boston (7), Washington, D.C. (8), Atlanta (9) and Baltimore (24). The number of television homes in the CAA market exceeds 19.7 million.

The CAA currently sponsors 22 sports with the addition of a 12-team football league in 2007. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and volleyball. In 2007-08, 26 teams earned NCAA Tournament berths and 46 student-athletes received All-America honors.

The conference has made its presence known nationally in men's basketball with at least three teams advancing to post-season play for the past five years. Last season, conference champion George Mason earned its third NCAA Tournament trip since 2001, VCU received its fourth post-season berth in five seasons with a spot in the NIT and Old Dominion reached the quarterfinals of the inaugural CBI for its fourth consecutive postseason ap-

pearance. In 2006, George Mason became the first mid-major program since 1979 to reach the Final Four, knocking off powerhouses Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and Connecticut along the way. The Patriots were ranked No. 8 in the final ESPN/USA Today Top 25 poll, which was the highest ever for a CAA team.

The CAA has also had at least three women's basketball teams participate in post-season play for the past three years. Perennial power Old Dominion, which has won three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and was national runner-up in 1997, captured its 17th consecutive CAA title last season and reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2002. James Madison made its third consecutive post-season appearance and advanced to the third round of the WNIT, while VCU advanced to the second round of the WNIT in just its second post-season trip in school history.

The conference also excels in many other sports. CAA squads have combined to win 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981. Delaware and Towson have each reached the Final Four of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship. For the first time, three women's soccer teams reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2007 and at least one men's soccer team has advanced to the final 16 of the NCAA Championship in five of the last six years. Hofstra finished 15th overall at the NCAA Wrestling Championship and William & Mary placed 15th nationally in men's cross country. In baseball, the CAA had 23 players chosen in the 2008 Major League draft, which was the second-highest total in league history. Hofstra won its NCAA-record 11th-straight conference title in softball and reached the NCAA regional finals. Individually, the W&M women's tennis duo of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship in 2008 to earn All-America status for the second straight season, and Georgia State golfer Joel Sjöholm placed 13th overall at the NCAA Men's Golf Championship.

CAA member institutions are committed to excellence in the classroom. The Colonial Academic Alliance was created in 2002 by the league's presidents with a goal of expanding their partnership to all aspects of university life outside of intercollegiate athletics. Among the programs already established are an undergraduate research conference, coordination of study abroad programs and granting visiting academic status to student-athletes traveling to an away contest so that they have access to libraries, academic resource centers and computer labs.

In 2002, two faculty members from CAA institutions were awarded academia's most coveted distinction – the Nobel Prize. John B. Fenn, a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Virginia Commonwealth University, received the Nobel Prize for chemistry, and Vernon Smith, a professor of economics and law at George Mason University, shared the Nobel Prize in economic sciences.

Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager has guided the CAA since its inception. The conference traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members- George Mason University, James Madison University, and the College of William and Mary - were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and American University) and decided to form a new association. The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985.

Charter members George Mason, James Madison, UNC Wilmington and William and Mary were joined by Old Dominion University in 1991 and by Virginia Commonwealth University in 1995. The conference added the University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University in 2001. Georgia State University and Northeastern University became members of the conference on July 1, 2005.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who stand out both on the playing field and in the classroom.
