TRIBE OPENS SEASON IN CHARLOTTESVILLE

The William and Mary field hockey team will open the 2008 campaign on the road with a pair of matches, Aug. 29-30, in Charlottesville, Va. The Tribe will battle No. 11 Virginia for the 24th straight season on Friday, Aug. 29, at 2 p.m. It marks the third straight season the College has made the trek to Charlottesville to battle the Cavaliers. The Green and Gold will wrap up the trip with a neutral site affair against Providence on Saturday, Aug. 30, at 2 p.m. Fans are asked to arrive early for the game on Saturday due to the increased traffic around the Virginia campus with the Cavaliers football game against USC. Both contests will be played at University Hall Turf Field.

OPENING WITH SUCCESS

Since 1973, the Tribe has enjoyed a successful record in regular-season openers. W&M has amassed a record of 26-6-3 (.786) in regular-season openers. The College posted a victory in its previous five season openers, including a 4-2 win over Lock Haven last season. Under head coach Peel Hawthorne, W&M is 16-5 (.762) in season-opening contests.

TRIBE NEWS AND NOTES

- The Tribe received two votes in the Preseason STX/NFHCA Top 20 rankings. The 2008 slate will pit W&M against nine teams that were either ranked or receiving votes in the poll.

- The College returns six starters and 15 letterwinners from last season.

- W&M continues to have a young roster as evident by 17 out of 24 players having freshman or sophomore athletic eligibility.

- The Tribe went 7-4 at home in 2007 improving to 119-53-2 $\left(.690\right)$ all-time at Busch Field.

SCOUTING NO. 11 VIRGINIA

Virginia returns nine starters and 13 letterwinners from last season's 11-10 team that finished the season ranked No. 18 nationally. UVA has advanced to the NCAA Tournament each of the last two seasons under the direction of head coach Michelle Madison.

Inge Kaars Sijpestijn is the Cavaliers top returning player after earning All-America honors a season ago to go along with all-region and All-ACC accolades. She finished the 2007 season with 23 points on nine goals and fives assists. Sijpestijn has 31 career goals as a collegiate. Traci Ragukas is also a returning all-region selection for UVA. Ragukas topped the Cavaliers in scoring last season with 28 points and 13 goals. UVA also returns both its starting goalkeepers from a season ago. Amy Desjadon started 12 contests and finished with a GAA of 1.91 to go along with 52 saves. Devon Burnley appeared in 19 contests with nine starts and capped the year with a GAA of 2.17 to go along with 56 saves.

The Cavaliers lead the all-time series with the Tribe at 21-15-2, including an 11-5-1 mark in Charlottesville. The College will look for its first win in Charlottesville since the 2004 campaign when it downed No. 12 UVA, 5-4. Last season, Virginia downed W&M, 2-1, in Charlottesville.

SCOUTING PROVIDENCE

Providence was picked to finish fourth in the 2008 BIG EAST Preseason Coaches' Poll. The Friars return 17 letterwinners and eight starters from a squad that advanced to the conference championship game last season. In 2007, Providence finished the year at 14-8 overall and ranked No. 20 nationally. In the preseason STX/NFHCA poll, the Friars were just outside the top 20 receiving the third most votes of teams listed in the also receiving votes category.

2008 TRIBE FIELD HOCKEY

The Friars had a trio of players named to the Preseason All-BIG EAST team. Jessica Lane was one of five unanimous selections to the Preseason Team, while goalkeeper Rachel Chamberlain and Nellie Poulin joined Lane on the 11-player preseason squad. Lane finished the 2007 campaign with 18 assists, which fell just one shy of the Providence school record. She was an All-BIG EAST choice and an all-region honoree. Chamberlain earned BIG EAST Goalkeeper of the Year and All-BIG EAST First-Team honors for the second straight season. She posted a 1.25 goals against average to go along with 100 saves and five shutouts. In 2006, Chamberlain was a third-team All-America selection. Poulin was an All-BIG EAST and all-region choice in 2007 after finishing with 22 points on nine goals and four assists.

The Friars and Tribe have split the all-time series at 2-2. The last time the two teams met in 1999, W&M notched a 3-0 win in Storrs, Conn.

OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN

Senior Katie Broaddus and junior Wesley Drew will serve as the Tribe's co-captains in 2008. Both players are returning starters with Broaddus heading up the College's backline and Drew leading the charge in the midfield.

Over her career, Broaddus has appeared in 57 matches with 40 starts. Over the last two seasons, the Clifton, Va., native has started all 38 matches for the College. Broaddus has scored six goals over her W&M career and owns 14 career points. In her first season as a defender in 2007, Broaddus topped the Tribe and ranked among the CAA leaders in defensive saves with three.

Drew is one of the Tribe's most versatile players. She was one of three returning Tribe players to start all 19 matches last season. She ranked fourth on the team in assists with four and capped the season with eight points and two goals.

TRIBE RECEIVES VOTES IN PRESEASON POLL

W&M received votes in the 2008 STX/National Field Hockey Coaches Association Division I Preseason Poll released on Aug. 26. The Tribe was one of six CAA schools that were either ranked in the top 20 or listed among the also receiving votes category.

The College was one of 13 schools outside the top 20 to be listed among the also receiving votes category. The Tribe received two votes for the preseason top 20. In total, the Tribe schedule will feature nine schools either ranked among the top 20 or receiving votes. W&M will face No. 7 James Madison, No. 8 Old Dominion, No. 11 Virginia, No. 12 Duke and No. 16 Princeton. The Green and Gold will also face Providence, Delaware, Northeastern and Hofstra, who were all receiving votes.
