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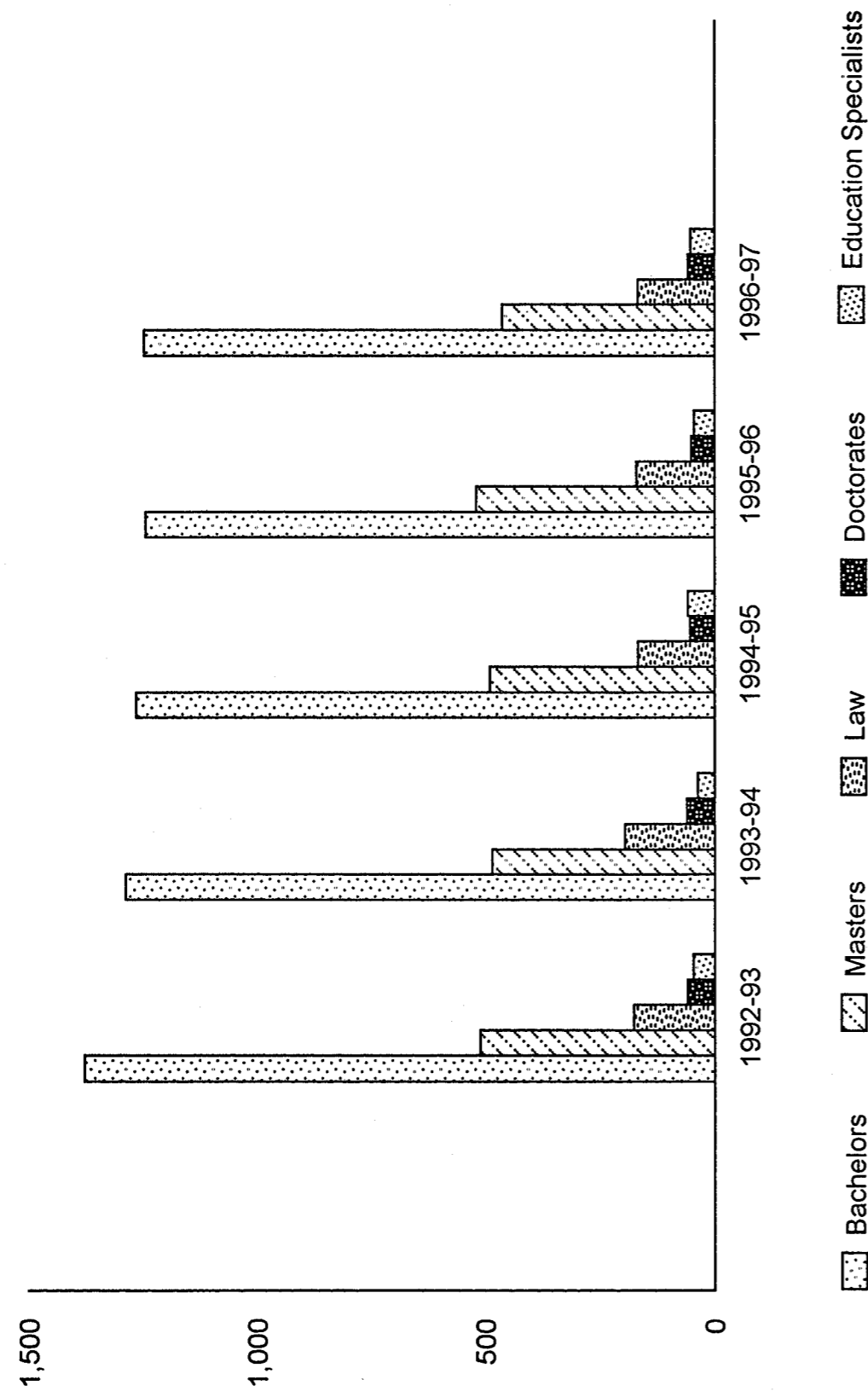

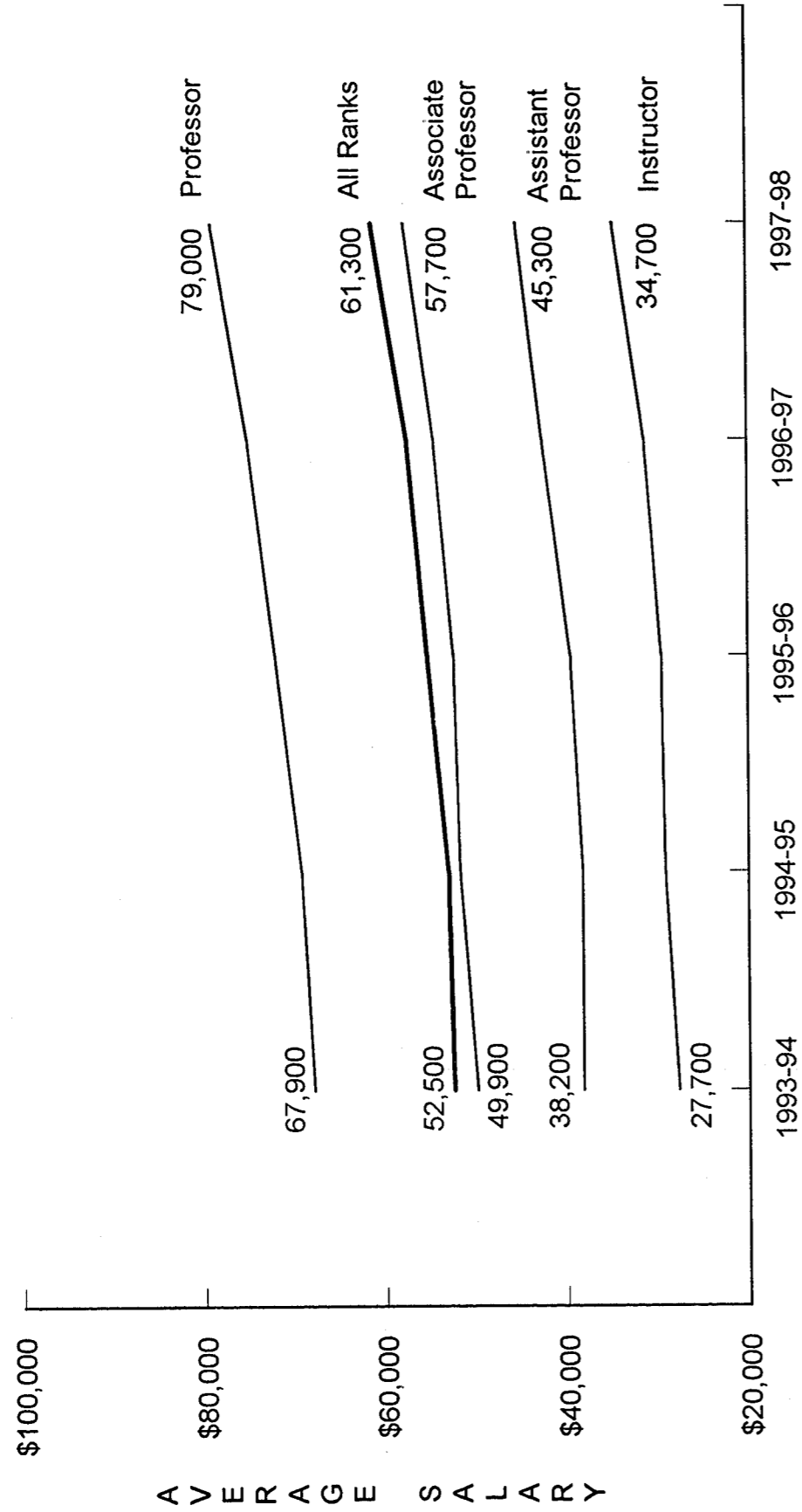

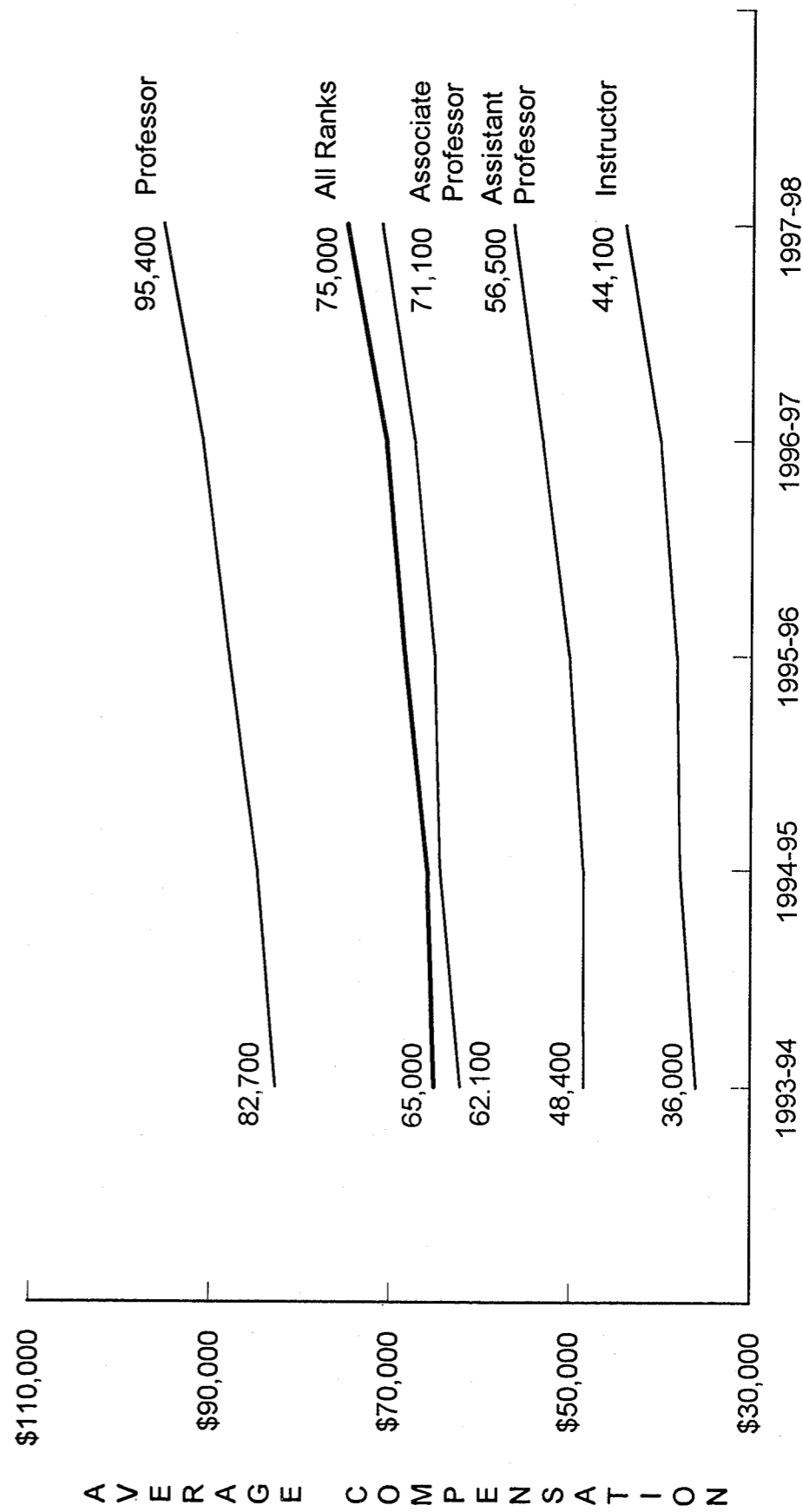
Table 48: Average Salary of Full-Time Instructional Faculty by Rank
