# COACHING STAFF/2003 OUTLOOK



Head Coach Mary Lewis Christopher Newport (1985) Ninth Year

Mary Lewis is in her ninth year at the helm of the Tribe women's gymnastics program. She has been coaching collegiate gymnastics since 1989, when she assisted the Christopher Newport University staff. She came to William and Mary from James Madison University in 1992, and served as a graduate assistant until 1994. Prior to her tenure at James Madison, Lewis was the head coach at Longwood College for the 1991-92 season.

Lewis graduated Magna Cum Laude from Christopher Newport in 1985 with a bachelor of science degree in governmental administration and public management. She completed her master's degree at James Madison in kinesiology and adult fitness in May of 1994, graduating Summa Cum Laude.

Lewis spends her summers working at the Woodward Gymnastics Camp in Woodward, Pennsylvania, organizing weekly schedules for campers ranging in levels from beginner to elite.



Assistant Coach Richard J. Sabel Fourth Year


Now in his fourth year as assistant coach, Richard Sabel is in his fifth year overall with the program after serving a season as a volunteer assistant.

Sabel brings over 12 years of collegiate and professional experience to the College. He served as a gymnastics judge and assistant for the University of Illinois, helping guide the Fighting Illini to the 1990 Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championship.

Sabel's expertise includes state, national and international level competitions, including the Colonial Classic (2000-02), the Prairie State Games in Urbana, Illinois (1988-93),

the World Championship Team Trials in Austin, Texas (1995) and the 1991 Artistic Gymnastics World Championships in Indianapolis, Indiana.

He continues to be an active member for USA Gymnastics as a judge, a position he's held since 1987. Sabel is also a member of the National Association of Women's Gymnastics Judges and the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians.



Volunteer Assistant Coach Adrian Eissler William and Mary (2002) First Year

Serving in the role of volunteer assistant coach this season will be Adrian Eissler, a 2002 graduate of William and Mary who competed on the Tribe men's gymnastics squad for four years.

Eissler was a Monroe Scholar and a four-time Academic All-American for the College.

A two-time winner of the Mister Award for being most responsible for and inspirational to the team's character and success, Eissler helped lead the team to an appearance in the NCAA Championships in 2002.

Before the team qualified for NCAAs last year, Eissler had previously made the championships on rings and parallel bars while also twice receiving All-ECAC honors.

Eissler graduated from the College in April of 2002 with a bachelor of arts degree in history and english.

## 2003 OUTLOOK

The 2002 season was one of mixed emotions for William and Mary women's gymnastics coach Mary Lewis. The Tribe had another successful season, repeating as Eastern College Athletic Conference champions and setting team records for scores on the vault and beam as well as all-around. But Lewis is bittersweet at having to say is

"Last year's senior class was an impact class for this program," Lewis said. "Not that others weren't, but that group was very pivotal. We won our first conference title when

goodbye to the seniors from last year.

they were freshmen and we watched them grow into a complete team. But the foundation has been laid."

And now, the torch has been passed, and it's up to a new group of seniors, in addition to the other returnees and a heralded freshman class, to continue the tradition that is Tribe gymnastics.

"I feel very confident with who we have in here," Lewis said. "We have to replace a lot, because last year was phenomenal, but this group's strength and motivation will certainly help." The following is a look at the 2003 William and Mary women's gymnastics team:

### Seniors

Despite having to follow in the footsteps of the very successful Class of 2002, this year's group of seniors seems poised to lead the team to yet another strong performance.

**Kady Dendramis**, a 5-foot-4 senior, is battling back from a concussion suffered last year, but has been a very solid performer on the uneven bars in her career. She is tied for the school-record in the uneven bars with a







9.900 (3/24/01) and has occasionally worked on the vault and floor exercise.

Hard-working senior **Kat Echeverria** returns as one of the team's top motivators. A competitor with a great work ethic, Echeverria is a scholastic All-American who holds a leadership role on the team. She has performed in exhibitions on the vault.

Coming off of two surgeries, **Kerri Simpson** is prepared to help out as an extra set of eyes for the Tribe coaches this year. Depending on how her rehabilitation goes, she may train on the balance beam as well as the floor exercise. Simpson will help with choreography while taking on more of a coaching role during her recovery period.

Senior co-captain Erin Skinner is poised to step into an all-around spot in her final year of competition. After competing on the vault and floor exercise (she shares the school record on floor with a 9.900) in her first two years at the College, Skinner added a third event when she filled in on uneven bars after a teammate's injury last year. A self-motivated gymnast, Skinner learned a new vault last year and is looking to increase her difficulty on each event this season.

The other co-captain, Amy Van Deusen, struggled with shoulder problems last year, but is healthy now and looking to lead the team on the bars. Very solid on the bars, Van Deusen is expected to be one of the anchors of the lineup, according to Lewis. She only competed on the floor once last year due to injury, but is expected to compete in that event this season. She has also added a beam routine to her repertoire.

### **Juniors**

After battling through numerous injuries in her first two years, junior **Catie Borklund** is prepared to take on a peercoaching role this season. Expected to step up as a motivator, Borklund is rehabbing a torn ACL which will prevent her from competing. In the past, Borklund had performed exhibitions on the vault.

Expected to move into an all-around slot this year is junior **Suzanne Chaves**. After competing on vault, bars and floor exercise at nearly every meet last year, in addition to a few appearances on beam, Chaves appears ready for all-around competition.

Jamie Weinfeldt, who competed on bars, beam and floor at almost every meet last year, is also a possibility for all-around competition this year. Weinfeldt had a spectacular freshman year, becoming the first rookie gymnast in Lewis' tenure to lead off on bars. An incredible beam worker, Weinfeldt doesn't appear to be far away from an all-around spot after continuing her progression last year.

### Sophomores

An excellent beam worker, **Emma Cross** will be counted on for consistency this season. Cross set the Tribe's freshman record and tied the school record with a score of 9.900 on the floor exercise. She will also train on the bars in addition to the beam and floor exercise.

Former Elite gymnast Rachel Glasmire is recovered from a broken hand suffered before the fourth meet last season and is expected to contribute to this year's Tribe effort. A phenomenal bar worker, Glasmire should anchor the lineup along with Van Deusen. In her three meets last year, Glasmire scored a 9.7 or better each time. She has worked hard on her beam routine in the offseason.

**Breanna Korsman** is a new addition to this year's team. She looks to add depth for the Tribe on bars. A veteran of the club sports gymnastics team at W&M, Korsman will have an impact on bars.

One of the most consistent vaulters on the team, there was rarely a meet that **Jaci Lynn** didn't have her marks counted as part of the team's score on vault. A first alternate to regionals, Lynn looks to continue training on bars this season.

A very solid beam and vault performer, **Jess Patterson** tied Jess Dancu's school-record on the vault last year before Dancu bettered it later in the season. Patterson has upgraded her vault from a hand front tuck to a hand front pike and is also one of the team's more consistent beam workers. She has also started to train on the floor exercise and hopes to be ready to step in on that event if necessary.

Lewis has come to expect solid scores on the bars from sophomore **Alison Shonerd**, a hard-worker who also contributes on the vault. Shonerd also continues to train on the floor exercise, where her biggest attribute is solid tumbling passes.

### Freshmen

The five first-year additions to the Tribe squad all come in with sparking credentials and have performed at levels of competition that should ease their transition to college athletics.

Jessica Baker will likely impact the team the most on the vault and the floor exercise. She looks to add depth to the bar lineup as well. Baker made marked improvements in two years on her club team.

Hailing from nearby Virginia Beach, Annie Carroll is expected to train in all four events for the Tribe. Her biggest contributions are likely to be on the vault and floor exercise. She is also going to be looked at to add depth on bars, though an elbow injury

suffered last April will slow her training in that event.

A strong vaulter and tumbler, freshman **Kristen Gaidish** looks to contribute in any number of events for the College. Gaidish could see time on the vault, beam or floor exercise.

Looking to earn an all-around spot in her first year is **Brittany Gibbs**. The freshman has a very good chance to immediately help the team on the vault and floor exercise, and also has good beam skills. In addition, she could add depth on the bars.

**Kate Magee** will likely focus most of her time on the balance beam. Though she is coming off of a shoulder injury and a stress fracture in her foot, she is a powerful vaulter and tumbler and will contribute to the team on those events.

### Schedule

As has been the case the past few seasons, William and Mary has a tough, nationally-competitive schedule that should give the team a good idea of where it stands compared to other schools in the country.

"We're becoming a lot more competitive," Lewis said. "A lot of the teams we'll face have competed at the regional level, and some have been at nationals."

According to Lewis, the team's chances of fulfilling its goals of defending its ECAC title and competing for a spot in the regional championships will greatly improve if the team can get off to a good start.

"We have to see if we can get into a groove early in the season," Lewis said. "We have a lot of motivation and we have the ability to do very well."

And if this year's group of gymnasts can follow the model set by last year's senior class, only good things are in store for William and Mary gymnastics.








For more than 300 years, the College of William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was chartered February 8, 1693, by King William III and Queen Mary II of England to bring education to a growing number of British colonists and Christianity to the Native Americans. Today, William and Mary is a public, four-year, co-educational residential university, with a nationally recognized liberal arts program. Although it has retained the college name in its title, William and Mary is now a modern university.

Many of America's early leaders were educated at William and Mary, including U.S. Presidents Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, and re-



William and Mary students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in America, in 1776. The College was the first to offer elective courses and to use the honor code system of conduct. The first chair of law in America was established at William and Mary in 1779. In addition, the College awarded the first degree in law in 1793.

The College's historic campus includes the Sir Christopher Wren Building (1695), the oldest college building in the nation where classes are still conducted. This and other 18th-century structures of William and Mary were restored to their original appearance through grants from philanthropist John D. Rockefeller during the restoration of Colonial Williamsburg in the late 1920s.



Although polls, rankings and guidebooks cannot fully capture the character of any educational institution, they do provide useful indications of the quality that students can expect. For years, the academic excellence of the College of William and Mary has been widely recognized by the

Over the last 300 years, William and Mary has developed a sterling national reputation for its academic standard of success. And for the last century, the Tribe athletics program has been working just as diligently to maintain its position as one of the top athletics departments in the nation ...

When the College's stringent academic standards are taken into consideration, the accomplishments of W&M's athletic programs are even more amazing. Over 500 student-athletes participate in 23 intercollegiate sports, and last year, those teams won over 57 percent of their competitions en route to a combined record of 205-154-2.

The 2001-02 athletic year was a typically strong one for the Tribe. Five Colonial Athletic Association titles, one East Coast Athletic Conference championship, a share of the Atlantic 10 football crown and a first place showing at the USA Collegiate Gymnastics meet are examples of William and Mary's strong season.

The women's tennis team captured its 16<sup>th</sup> CAA Championship, while the women's soccer squad qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the 10th straight season. Perennial powerhouses like the cross country and track and field squads didn't disappoint, either, challenging for conference titles yet again in 2001.


The success isn't limited to just those programs. The volleyball and men's gymnastics teams earned their first berths in NCAA postseason action, while the men's golf team earned a bid to the NCAA East Regional, showing that improvement is occurring across the board.

Since the merger of the men's and women's athletics departments in 1986, William and Mary has seen more than its fair share of success on and off the field. With graduates of the program running major corporations or running down the opposition in a National Football League game, a degree from W&M has proven to be a stepping-stone to a successful future.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics,

soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Continuity is emphasized in the W&M athletics department. As the shaded box below shows, William and Mary has a history of stability with its head coaches. The current head coaches at W&M have been with the program for an average of 12.5 years. This retention rate leads to

better performances on the field and a better overall experience for the student-athlete.

From the administration to the training staff to the coaches, the Tribe sports family is committed to providing each student-athlete at the College with the best possible experience, both academically and athletically, for his or her collegiate career.

Nine W&M head coaches have been in their current positions for 15 or more years: Al Albert - men's soccer (31 years), Cliff Gauthier - men's gymnastics (29 years),

### Athletics Director Terry Driscoll



With a strong personal commitment to the concept of the scholar-athlete and to competitive success, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll, Jr. enters his seventh year as athletics director at the College.

"In the athletic world, William and Mary is well recognized for a rare combination of two attributes: its academic strength in the classroom and its competitive strength on the field," said Driscoll. "Ilook forward to the challenge of continuing the tradition of academic

and athletic achievement."

A basketball All-America selection and an Academic All-America honoree in his days at Boston College, Driscoll is an exemplary leader. Since his collegiate days, Driscoll has filled a variety of executive posts in the sporting goods industry, as well as completing an 11-year stint as a player in the National Basketball Association and as a player and coach in an Italian professional basketball league.

Driscoll has supervised the marketing of athletic products in national and international markets, enhanced the television exposure of a variety of NCAA events (including the Final Four basketball tournament) and organized and directed such internationally recognized events as the World Cup soccer games in Boston and the women's World Volleyball Grand Prix in Hawaii.

The athletic program Driscoll directs fields a total of 23 men's and women's teams which boast strong records in NCAA, Colonial Athletic Association and Atlantic 10 competition. Last year, W&M posted a .571 overall winning percentage with five teams finishing in the nation's top-25 polls. Tribe athletes also earned seven All-America certificates and 16 national academic citations during the year.

Driscoll, who graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from Boston College in 1969, began his post-graduate career as a first-round draft pick of the Detroit Pistons. Before joining the Pistons, however, Driscoll opted for a year of professional basketball in Italy where he fulfilled his dream of living abroad and learning a second language. He rejoined the Pistons in 1970 and played with the Bullets and Bucks before returning to Italy in the fall of 1975, where he was named Outstanding Foreign Player of the Year. He played three years before an injury forced his retirement in 1978. He then coached his former team to two Italian League Championships before returning to the United States.

Driscoll began his post-playing career as an athletic sales promotion agent in 1980 and quickly moved up the ladder. With the purchase of Bike Athletic by Kazmaier Associates in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. Driscoll was named president of KSG Inc. in 1987 and expanded the agency from 24 to 50 states by 1989. With the domestic sales agency in place, Driscoll expanded to international marketing and sales from 1989-93.

In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International. Also in 1993-94, Driscoll assisted with the 1994 World Cup Organizing Committee as Venue Executive Director, and his Boston venue was cited for its operational success. In September of 1994, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing in Honolulu the opening round of the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week Pan-Pacific competition.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife Susan. The couple has two children, Keith, 27, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, 23, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.

### Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser



Barbara Blosser comes into her 11th year as the College's Associate Athletic Director. Blosser came to William and Mary as head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13).

Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to

NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletic Director. Over the past 16 years her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and now serves

as the person primarily responsible for administering the day to day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committee's such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition and Women's Basketball Committees.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her '78 team took the OAISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a bachelor of science degree in education. At OSU she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, in 1978. In 1993 she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.
