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# Directions to W&M

Take exit 238 off I-64 and head toward Williamsburg. At second light, turn right on route 132. Cross over 60-Bypass at light, and continue on toward business district of Williamsburg. After the railroad tracks, go straight over Lafayette Street (at light) and take your first right onto Scotland Street. Scotland T's onto Richmond Road at Zable Stadium (football).

To Busch Field: Turn right and go four short blocks. Turn left onto Brooks Street and follow to the backside of W&M Hall. Busch Field will be on your right. To Barksdale Field: At W&M Hall, follow Campus Drive to a T. Turn right and follow for 1000M to T at Jamestown Road. Go left on Jamestown and Barksdale is on left approximately 1000M from turn.



### The College of William and Mary

#### W&M: Into The Fourth Century

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now in its fourth century, W&M is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was chartered February 8,

1693, by King William III and Queen Mary II of England to bring education to a growing number of British colonists and Christianity to the Native Americans. Today, William and Mary is a public, four-year, co-educational residential university, with a nationally recognized liberal arts program. Although it has retained the college name in its title, William and Mary is now a modern university.

Many of America's early leaders were educated at William and Mary, including U.S. Presidents Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, and renowned U.S. Chief Justice John Marshall. George Washington served as the college's first American



chancellor from 1788 until his death in 1799.

William and Mary students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in America, in 1776. The College was the first to offer elective courses and to use the honor code system of conduct. The first chair of law in America was established at William and Mary in 1779. In addition, the College awarded the first degree in law in 1793.

The College's historic campus includes the Sir Christopher Wren Building (1695), the oldest college building in the nation where classes are still conducted. This and other 18th-century structures of William and Mary were restored to their original appearance through grants from philanthropist John D. Rockefeller during the restoration of Colonial Williamsburg in the late 1920s.

Although polls, rankings and guidebooks cannot fully capture the character of any educational institution, they do provide



useful indications of the quality that students can expect. For years, the academic excellence of the College of William and Mary has been widely recognized by the growing raft of magazines and guidebooks that annually rank American colleges and universities. From U.S. News and

World Report to The Princeton Review, William and Mary and its programs are listed among the nation's strongest.



Over the last 300 years, William and Mary has developed a sterling national reputation for its academic standard of success. And for the last century, the Tribe athletics program has been working just as diligently to maintain its position as one of the top athletics departments in the nation ...

When the College's stringent academic standards are taken into consideration, the accomplishments of W&M's athletic programs are even more amazing. Over 500 student-athletes participate in 23 intercollegiate sports, and last year, those teams won over 57 percent of their competitions en route to a combined record of 205-154-2.

The 2001-02 athletic year was a typically strong one for the Tribe. Five Colonial Athletic Association titles, one East Coast Athletic Conference championship, a share of the Atlantic 10 football crown and a first place showing at the USA Collegiate Gymnastics meet are examples of William and Mary's strong season.

The women's tennis team captured its 16<sup>th</sup> CAA Championship,

while the women's soccer squad qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the 10th straight season. Perennial powerhouses like the cross country and track and field squads didn't disappoint, either, challenging for conference titles yet again in 2001.

The success isn't limited to just those programs. The volleyball and men's gymnastics teams earned their first berths in NCAA postseason action, while the men's golf team earned a bid to the NCAA East Regional, showing that improvement is occurring across

the board.

Since the merger of the men's and women's athletics departments in 1986, William and Mary has seen more than its fair share of success on and off the field. With graduates of the program running major corporations or running down the opposition in a National Football League game, a degree from W&M has proven to be a stepping-stone to a successful future.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Continuity is emphasized in the W&M athletics department. As the shaded box below shows, William and Mary has a history of stability with its head coaches. The current head coaches at W&M have been with the program for an average of 12.5 years. This retention rate leads to better performances on the field and a better overall experience for the student-athlete.

From the administration to the training staff to the coaches, the Tribe sports family is committed to providing each student-athlete at the College with the best possible experience, both academically and athletically, for his or her collegiate career.

Nine W&M head coaches have been in their current positions for 15 or more years: Al Albert - men's soccer (31 years), Cliff Gauthier - men's gymnastics (29 years), Debbie



- 3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.


#### **Compliance and Academic Support**

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned a faculty academic advisor through the Academic Advising Office, directed by Dr. Randolph Coleman. Students remain with this advisor until they declare a major at which time they select a faculty advisor in their major field of concentration. The Academic Advising Office provides support and guidance to students as they plan their academic progress to graduation.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center

#### Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

#### **Sports Psychology**

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is consid-

ered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

#### **Sports Medicine**

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, six fulltime certified athletic trainers, graduate and undergraduate student trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The College is also in the process of evaluating and pursuing CAAHEP accreditation of its entry-level athletic training education program. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.

### **Facilities**



The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatced in the Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Busch Tennis Courts, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

### **Coaching Staff**





Tara Brown enters her fourth year at the helm of the Tribe's program with her goal of moving the squad back into national prominence clearly in focus. The positive influences of her strong leadership, preparation and attention to detail are witnessed by the team's continued progress towards restoring the Tribe's tradition-rich lacrosse legacy.

Brown was named Virginia's State Coach of the Year (by the Virginia Sports Information Directors) in 2001 by leading the Tribe to its first winning record and NCAA post season appearance in three years (1998). The squad ended post-season play with a final national ranking of 10th and a 9-7 overall record (5-2 in the always-competitive Colonial Athletic Association). Faced with a schedule that featured 10 teams ranked in the national top 20, the College rang up victories over traditional powers such as Virginia and James Madison.

Brown, who emphasizes aggressive defense and an up tempo offensive style of play, came to the Williamsburg campus after spending two seasons (1998-99) at the University of Connecticut, where she gained a wealth of experience as the top assistant. Prior to working at UConn, Brown held similar positions at Cornell University (1996 - 97) and The College of New Jersey (1994 - 96).

"I am very excited to be a part of a program that has such a strong winning tradition," said Brown. "I'm especially excited about this season, where I feel we have all the ingredients assembled to meet our established goals. William and Mary has an established reputation nationally in both

academic and athletic circles and is an institution which prides itself on producing well rounded student-athletes. This philosophy matches my own."

A 1993 graduate of the University of Virginia, Brown was a varsity athlete in both field hockey and lacrosse for four seasons while in Charlottesville. She played defense wing on UVa's national championship lacrosse squads in the 1991 and 1993 seasons and earned second team All-America honors in 1993. Brown spent two seasons as a member of the United States National Lacrosse Team (1993-95) and was an Academic All-America as well. Also a standout in field hockey, she served as captain of the squad for her junior and senior seasons.

After receiving her BA in history from Virginia, Brown went on to work on her Master of Arts degree in teaching at the College of New Jersey, which she completed in 1996.

Brown, a native of Villanova, PA and graduate of Radnor High School, is married to Tim Brown and lives in the Williamsburg area. The couple has a one-year old daughter, Kelly Alicia Brown.



Kristin Hagert, a 2001 graduate of Loyola College, enters her first season on the College's coaching staff.

Hagert will be responsible for assisting Brown with recruiting, academics and on-field instruction. She will also help oversee the off-season conditioning program and the day-to-day office management duties. Hagert will be in charge of writing and editing the team newsletter as part of her role in maintaining alumni relations for the program.

Hagert gained valuable coaching experience by spending the past year (2001-02) coaching and teaching in Wantage, England at St. Mary's School, one of the country's premiere boarding schools. In this position, she was a fulltime physical education teacher and the resident lacrosse coach.

During her playing career at Loyola, Hagert was a pivotal defender for the Greyhounds. Loyola made appearances in the NCAAs in each of her four seasons (1998-2001) and appeared in the Final Four after both her junior and senior years (2000 and 2001). Hagert served as co-caption her senior season (2000-01) and was named to the NCAA Division I Final Four All-Tournament team and First-Team All-CAA in 2001.

Along with her athletics grant-in-aid, she received a Presidential Academic Scholarship to Loyola College. Graduating with Summa Cum Laude honors and a journalism degree from Loyola, Hagert was a member of the Communications National Honor Society in 2001. She was awarded for her leadership and service to the college by being inducted into the Alpha Sigma Nu Jesuit Honor Society in 2000. Hagert also was honored with Loyola's Gravtis award for distinguished student service.

A native from Annapolis, MD, Hagert graduated from St. Mary's High School in 1997 as her class' salutatorian.

King, who is currently enrolled in the College's law school, has come in and made an immediate impact in his first collegiate coaching position, working with the College's field players.

"Matt is a terrific addition to our coaching staff," says head coach Tara Brown. "With his experience as a collegiate player he brings a fresh look to our attack movement and the defense."

As a 1998 graduate of Colby College, King brings four years of collegiate playing experience to the practice field for head coach Tara Brown. He earned four varsity letters while patrolling the midfield for Colby and was the squad's captain as a senior.

A multiple sport standout as a scholastic at Kingswood-Oxford High in West Hartford, CT, King earned varsity letters in swimming, football and

### **2003 Season Preview**



As the William and Mary lacrosse squad heads into its fourth season under the watchful eye of head coach Tara Brown, the program has its sights set on challenging for a league title in the always-competitive Colonial Athletic Association and making a return to the NCAA Tournament.

The foundation for the optimism comes from the core of nine returning letterwinners from a season ago. Included in this group are three of the top five point scorers from 2002 and a total of six players with starting experience. Mixed in with the returning starters is a talented freshman class that brings the program a host of potential contributors.

"I am extremely excited about the potential of this group," says Brown, who earned Virginia Sports Information Directors Coach of the Year Honors after the 2001 season. "They have shown me an intensity and desire to improve that I feel is leading us towards a break out season."

A look back to 2002 will show that the sum of the team's success could not strictly be measured by its final record, but instead by individual and team accomplishments turned in during the regular season. Brown guided a young team through a demanding conference schedule, as CAA foes proved to be some of the top teams in the nation, with four league teams in the top 20 at the conclusion of the regular season.

Certainly, William and Mary will miss the three graduated all-conference performers; Colette Chaput (attack), Meghan Schneider (midfield) and Lauren Nelson (defender), as well as the steady defensive presence of 2002 team co-captain Lindsey Sukay. Brown will rely on senior team captain Allison Evans and fellow senior Jen Cully to step up and provide the young squad with leadership.

Evans ended the year as the team's co-scoring leader (tied with Chaput) with 52 points and earned all-league honors as a midfielder. Her 19 assists was the 10th-best single-season effort in the College's history, while her 41 draw controls was the fourth-highest total in the Colonial Athletic Association. A complete player on both ends of the field, Evans also finished in the league's top 10 in caused turnovers (22).

While 2002 was Cully's first season as a full-time starter, she has seen significant game action over the course of her three-year career and is the team's most experienced line defender.

Aside from the aforementioned seniors, the vast remainder of the College's lineup is a youth-laden crew, as the freshman and sophomore classes make up 16 of the 24 athletes on the roster. The leader amongst these relative newcomers is energetic sophomore midfielder Morgan Watkins, who established herself as one of the CAA's rising young stars by posting 29 goals and 10 assists as a freshman last season.

With the graduation of two of the league's top defenders in Nelson and Sukay, one of the main focuses of the fall practice session was to identify and develop a defensive presence. Junior co-captain Nicole Lewis and junior Aimee Duffy responded to the challenge and each brought their games up a notch and look primed

to have break out seasons in 2003.

When looking for challenges, the Tribe lax program needs to look no further than its 2003 schedule to see a season full of tests laying ahead, as 11 of the 17 games on the slate are against teams which held a top 20 ranking in the 2002 final poll. In fact, focus in the early season preparations should be easy to maintain, as the team will be faced with starting the year against three of the top programs in the nation.

As daunting as the schedule may seem, Brown sees enough talent and a competitive

desire in the program to compete and be successful at the highest levels.

"I think this fall our team showed it could compete against

some of the top programs in the nation," says Brown. "We have a tremendous amount of talent and, more importantly, an even larger amount of desire to return the program to the nation's elite."

The following is a brief look at the College's roster, by position.

#### **Attack**

Brown enters the spring with five attackers who have seen collegiate game action. Kelly McQuade is the most experienced of the returnees, as she has seen action in 30 games, including starting all 17 contests last season. She has averaged nearly a goal for every game played over her career (28 scores) and comes into this spring after having spent the fall as an attacker on the Tribe's NCAA-qualifying field hockey team.

Senior Julie Scurachio and a pair of juniors in Laurice Rutledge and Lauren Work all have seen significant minutes over the past two seasons and possesses the talent to be impact players in 2003. Work saw the most action of the three last year, as she logged nine points (seven goals, two assists) over 12 appearances. She brings a total of 31 career points into the season (23 goals). Scurachio's outstanding strength and extremely powerful shot give her the potential to be a threat from any position in front of the cage. She has scored 17 goals and has a total of 22 points coming into the year. Rutledge has seen the fewest minutes of the three, but her intensity and desire to improve should position her to make much more of an impact in the coming season.

Ashton Cawthorn, who transferred into the program as a sophomore last season after spending her freshman year at James Madison, brings another hard-working presence to the team's attack. She has outstanding field vision and makes good decisions in distributing the ball.

Explosive freshman Colleen Dalon packages a strong physical presence with deceptive speed and will challenge for playing time in the spring. Fellow newcomer, Laura Nolan spent the fall rehabbing a knee injury, but, with complete recovery, her field vision, decision-making and stick skills will be an asset to the low attack. Another freshman, Heather Barnes, comes into the program with outstanding speed and will look to use the spring to continue refining her stick skills.

#### **Midfield**

The midfield should prove to be the team's deepest position, as five of the unit's six returning upperclassmen have seen some level of collegiate game action. Certainly, Allison Evans and Nicole Lewis, the team's co-captains, bring the most experience to the field. Evans is a returning all-league selection who will be counted on to be the squad's top playmaker. She led the team in assists (19), caused turnovers (22) and draw controls (41) a season ago and looks poised to post even bigger numbers in 2003. Lewis came back from an early season injury to start the final 10 games and has looked stron-

ger than ever during the team's fall drills. Her healthy return has brought strong leadership and communication to the midfield defense, while her outstanding speed gives a spark to the Tribe's transition attack.

Morgan Watkins returns as perhaps the team's purest scorer, as she connected on 29 of 53 shots a season ago. In starting all 17 games, she matched the solid scoring output with an equally impressive all-around game, as she returns with the top ground ball total from a year ago (39) and the second most draw controls.

Junior Aimee Duffy adds even more speed and athleticism to an already fast midfield and will enter the 2003 season looking to earn her first fulltime starting assignment. She has seen 17 games of action over the past two seasons, with a career-high 10 coming last season.

A trio of sophomores in Katie Knarr, Alison Ritz and Carrie Stirt round

out the College's returning midfielders. All three saw limited playing time in 2002 and used the season to continue to develop. Ritz has shown excellent explosiveness in and around the eight-meter, while Knarr has the quickness to lead transition attacks or get back to stop opponent's break outs. Stirt brings speed and strong checks to the defensive midfield.

Freshman Morgan Lang came in and made an immediate positive impression with her quickness and all around game awareness during the fall. This strong showing has positioned her to challenge for immediate time.

Fellow freshmen Rebecca Dankner and Larissa Blick also add depth. Dankner has proven to be a very coachable player with an intense work ethic. Blick brings the Tribe a young talent with good speed and an aggressive style of play.


#### **Defense**

Finding replacements for a pair of graduated All-CAA performers was possibly the biggest challenge of the off-season. Thankfully, Brown brings a wealth of experience to the position, as she was an All-American caliber defender on a pair of national championship teams while at Virginia. Leadership on the defensive end will begin with the unit's only projected senior starter, Jen Cully. Cully made all 17 starts last season, and will enter the 2003 season looking to challenge for all-league honors.

After seeing 11 games of action in 2002, sophomore Becca Hall used this past off-season to improve all facets of her game and solidify herself as one of the top defenders on the squad. A strong player, Hall made the most of her time on the field, as she recorded 14 ground balls, five draw controls and caused four turnovers in 215 minutes of action.

After Hall and Cully, the game experience is limited for the College. But while experience may be short, senior Alysa Murdock has been more than willing to put forth the effort and commitment to improvement. She saw her hard work pay off this fall season, as she saw significant game action in the scrimmages. Sophomore Megan Gallivan also used the fall drills to make strides in her game and will enter the spring looking to have an increased roll.

Sophomore Sydney Richards and freshman Kitt Turnbaugh give the Tribe a solid pair of keepers to complete the defense. Turnbaugh saw the majority of the action during the fall scrimmages and played well enough to create a strong competition for the starting keeper position this spring. Richards, who played every minute of every game last season, will make up the other half of this competition.
